

GENERAL

1. The general situation during the period under review was reported to be calm .
2. The humanitarian officer of the sector attended the following :
 - a. Coordination meeting with NGOs at Milob sector HQ on Mondays and Fridays with a view to make necessary liaison and inform them of the needs of communes provided by the teams.
 - b. Coordination meeting with Human Rights on a daily basis.
3. A Milob team which visited Ruhashya commune was confronted by the Astt Bourgemastre of the commune who was not happy with the work of UNAMIR in general . He **complained that the UNAMIR in general and Milobs in particular were not able to provide any worth while assistance to the commune .He also complained that the cachat of the commune was swelling and transfer of the prisoners was taking too long .The Milob team brought him to the sector HQ office .Accompanied by the Humanitarian officer the team proceeded to the Human Rights office in Butare and held a discussion with the HR authorities .After a discussion for about one hour ,he was satisfied and contented . His impression of the Milobs was also changed.**

OWN HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

4. Following are the activities observed /carried out by the Milob teams.
 - a. SHYANDA (GR 7718) Team visited the commune office and interviewed the Youth Mobilising Officer by name Mr Rukaka Eugene. He explained that the communes urgent needs were food and water for the returnees . ~~The~~ ^{There} second most important requirement was material for rebuilding houses and material for farming . The commune has 11 primary schools, 03 secondary schools and 02 technical schools .These are in need of furniture and stationary assistance.He also requested UNAMIR assistance in

h. Prisoners.

(1) The sanitary situation is poor in the jail of Musambira Commune (8274) because the latrines are full. The Bourgmestre asked UNAMIR to send a septic vehicle.

(2) At Mugina Commune (9267) the Bourgmestre requested UNHCR for transfer of six prisoners, four to Kibuye and two to Gisenyi Prefectures, as they belong to these Prefectures. This Sector intends transporting them in due course of time after necessary arrangements are made.

(3) See Annex B for statistics.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Hum Offr attended two meetings with the NGOs organized in the Prefecture Bureau and Ruhango Sous-Prefecture Bureau.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good. Hum Offr met with the Prefect of Gitarama and Sous-Prefect of Ruhango and asked them to give their proposals concerning construction of ten water points.

8. CONCLUSIONS. The main points of the situation development causing specific problems are (1) influx of returnees from Zaire and (2) beginning of agricultural seasons.

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Rehabilitation of Kibuye's agricultural sector in the hope of restoring self-sufficiency. Beans, sweet potatoes, mixed vegetables and sorghum continue to be the staple crops in Kibuye. Cash crops continue to recover and coffee, banana and tea production is increasing modestly.

9. HEALTH. MSF and UNICEF continue to work diligently to improve and run hospital facilities throughout the prefecture. In general the quality of health care provided is poor and overcrowding, untrained staff, broken equipment, inadequate water and latrine facilities, and lack of transportation for the injured exasperate this bad situation. MSF vaccinated the new returnees this week and will continue to do so as and when they enter the prefecture. There were several people given rides to hospital by Milob patrols operating in the area. Malaria continues to be the main cause of illness on these trips.

10. WATER AND SANITATION. ICRC continues to make progress in repairing broken pipes and improving the availability of water. They are installing new water points monthly however shortfalls in water still occur daily throughout the prefecture.

11. EDUCATION. Many schools continue to require rehabilitation work to the buildings, furniture and equipment. Other concerns remain the need for paper, pencils, exercise books and other educational materials, inadequate pay for teachers, a requirement for nutritional supplements for students and teachers, as well as the need for balls, toys and playground equipment to make learning interesting and fun for students.

12. RETURNEES. UNHCR, Human Rights, and indirectly UNAMIR, continue to assist personnel to return to the prefect. Numbers of returnees are listed on the summary sheet attached. A shortage of available housing still exists. Returnee camps are generally in good order but require more cooking containers, mats, machetes, hoes, blankets, and food. They have some medical problems, mainly malaria. The UNHCR rep is aware of their problems and is attempting to meet their needs.

13. INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS. IDP's may become a problem in future as old caseload personnel are occupying housing belonging to some returnees. At present this is not a major problem.



14. JUSTICE. The proper justice system is still not in place to begin the trials of prisoners accused of genocide. Prosecutors and defence lawyers are still required.

15. PRISONS. The one prison here in Kibuye now houses approx 2092 people. This facility was designed to hold 250 people so problems of over crowding, poor hygiene and poor nutrition make the quality of life very difficult for these inmates. A proper security fence around the prison is still required to improve the quality of life for inmates as this will allow them to expand out of their cramped quarters. HAC is requested to arrange an engineer to see if UNAMIR can provide this fence or at the least find another agency to provide this fence. This problem has gone on far too long and requires immediate attention.

16. SIGNIFICANT INCIDENTS. The 28 returnees arriving this week is significant in Kibuye. We expect continued strain on the limited housing

REPORT ON OUTBREAK OF CHOLERA AND
MEASLES IN NYAGAHIMA

1. The MILOBS HQ at Kibuye reported the outbreak of cholera and measles at Nyagahima (GR1953) to the Nicoy HQ on 15 Sep 95. The Nicoy medical team were airlifted to Kibuye on 16 Sep 95. The rest of the journey was made by road as there was no favourable landing site at Nyagahima.
2. Investigation conducted at Nyagahima and Ngoma hospital revealed that there was no single incidence of cholera. Measles is under control with ten death recorded. The last death occurred ten days prior to this visit.
3. It is hereby recommended that MILOBS should scrutinize all information relating to health properly before disseminating same to the appropriate authority
