I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:1.1 GNU/LOCAL AUTHORITIES:PMT - KIBUYE Prefecture:

Reported that the Prefect of Birambo addressed about 2000 locals at the Commune HQ in Commemoration of last year's genocide on 1/4/95 at 09.00 hrs. Wreaths were laid at the grave sides of the victims buried in the commune during the genocide. The team also reported that some of the locals were seen carrying placards with inscriptions - "no more killing and shooting in Rwanda". The area was reported calm.

1.2 RPA:PMT - GISENYI Prefecture:

Reported that at the check point of the Gisenyi/Goma Border one Abdoukarim Habinshuti was arrested on the way to Goma by RPA on 08 Apr. 95, between 10.30 and 12.00 hrs. The team disclosed, that the arrested Person is an RPA soldier in Butare Battalion. Reason for arrest and his whereabouts unknown. Investigation in progress. Human Rights to be informed.

PMT - CYANGUGU Prefecture:

Reported that on 7/4/95 between 21.00 hrs and 23.00 hrs there was an exchange of fire between RPA and bandits coming from Ijwe Island at Ishara near Nyamasheke area. One bandit had been killed.

2. SOCIAL:

Majority of the people in the country continue to participate in social activities especially soccer and night clubs, even though there are fears of moving around in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible increase in commercial activities throughout the prefectures. Shops are being expanded to cater for the number of people entering the country through various border posts to resettle.

4. ECONOMIC:

The domestic economic situation is making subsistence living very hard and out of reach of many in the prefectures.

5. HUMANITARIAN:

5.1 PMT - GITARAMA Prefecture:

Reported that a host of Hutus who took refuge at Gitarama MILOBS HQ on 4/4/95 had been resettled to their respective communes on 8/4/95 after a dialogue with the Gitarama Prefect, Human Rights, the Gitarama RPA Brigade Commander, the Sector Commander and CIVPOL Monitoring Team.

5.2 PMT - CYANGUGU Prefecture:

Reported that 9 refugees from Zaire and 5 from Burundi crossed into Rwanda on 09/4/95. They are awaiting evacuation to their various home communes.

III. OWN ACTIVITIES:

1. CIVPOL HEADQUARTERS:

UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures.

2. CIVPOL MONITORING TEAMS:

PMT - GISENYI Prefecture:

Visited the Gendarmerie Brigade of Gisenyi on 8/4/95 and had discussions with the Chief, Major Jean Bosco Rutikanga. The subject of the meeting was on enforcement of traffic regulations by the gendarmerie in the prefecture. The Chief of the Gendarmerie Brigade accepted the suggestions of CIVPOL CPMT and proposed to keep a close contact with CIVPOL PMT in the sector for technical advice.

PMT - GITARAMA Prefecture:

Reported that the security situation in the area remains calm. A cross section of locals interviewed by the team disclosed that there has been no cases of harassment by the RPA or any group during the period.

3. TRAINING:

The training of gendarmes at RUHENGARI National Gendarmerie Training School is in progress.

IV. CRIME WAVE

UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures have reported that criminal activities such as armed robbery and arbitrary arrest of locals are on the increase.

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be under control but hardly normal in view of the recent crime wave.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:

1.1 GNU:

PMT - KIGALI Prefecture:

A. Reported that the Government of National Unity and the International Community paid their last respect to some of the victims of the genocide. Wreaths were laid at the grave sides of victims buried on 06 Apr. 95 at Rebero Burial Grounds in Kigali. In attendance were the President and Vice-President of Rwanda, the Prime-Minister and the Deputy Prime-Minister, the SRSG, FC, Hon. Ministers, Diplomats, the Clergy and VIPs.

The team further reported that UNAMIR came under serious criticism at the burial grounds as Government and Civil Society leaders read their address at the function. The criticism centered on the various roles played by UNAMIR during and after the last year's genocide.

B. Ref. 3./A of Sitrep No. 309/95 dated 06 Apr. 95 the team reported that at about 15.00 hrs on 06 Apr. 95 the tribunal on genocide started sitting with 07 suspects on murder charges brought before the panel for trial. The suspects were seen in

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be under control but hardly normal in view of the recent crime wave

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:

1.1 RPA:

A. PMT KIBUYE PREFECTURE:

That on 25/3/95, RPA arrested 06 locals from RUTONDE Sector for undisclosed reason. They are currently being detained in KIBUYE prisons. Human Rights informed.

B. PMT GITARAMA PREFECTURE

That indiscriminate firing had been observed in the Prefecture for the past one week. The team further reported that on 3/4/95, RPA fired more than one hundred rounds of ammunition in NYAMABUYE sector. Reasons for firing unknown. Investigation in progress.

C. PMT GISENYI Prefecture:

Reported that the Asst. Bourgmestre of MUTARA Commune had hinted that on 27 Mar 95, one RPA soldier was shot and killed by Militia suspected to have come from a refugee Camp in ZAIRE. Human Rights informed. Investigation in progress.

1.2 MILITIA:

PMT - GISENYI PREFECTURE:

Reported that on 1/4/95 at 0100 hrs, 07 armed men suspected to be Interhanwe attacked the residence of a local at Gisenyi and killed his wife. His son was also injured. Two suspects have been arrested in connection with the incident.

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be under control but hardly normal in view of the recent crime wave

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:

1.1 GNU

PMT KIGALI PREFECTURE

Reported that the celebration of the first anniversary of the genocide will commence on 07/4/95 at Rebero Hill in Kigali. Friday 07/4 to Monday 10/4 95 have been declared as public holidays. Among the events earmarked during the celebration is a seminar on the effects and implications of genocide on National Development.

1.2 GENDARMERIE.

PMT BYUMBA PREFECTURE.

Reported that as a result of an accident involving one of NIBATT Trucks which knocked down a local woman who sustained injuries on 01/4/95 at about 1200 hrs the local Gendarmerie mounted a Road Block in Byumba to prevent movement of UNAMIR Vehicles/personnel in and out of Byumba. They further demanded for the vehicle to be impounded and the driver also detained at their station. Meanwhile, the victim is said to be on admission at NIBATT Clinic. The vehicle is impounded at the Byumba Gendarmerie station pending further negotiations on the incident.

1.3 LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

PMT KIBUYE PREFECTURE

Reported that the Bourgmestre of Mwendo addressed locals in the area on 01 April 95 and assured them that there would not be outbreak of violence in the country during the 1st anniversary celebration of the genocide in the Country.

In another development, the team reported that returnees who left the country as far back 1959 are making claims to their bonafide Property from locals who have illegally acquired them.

Social advancement centres are on the increase in the country and has facilitated social gatherings amongst the local population in all spectrum of life, even though there are fears of moving in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:

1.1 GNU

PMT Ruhengeri reported that there was a heavy explosion followed by gunshots on 31/3/95 at 0100 hours in Kanembe Commune near the airport. No casualty reported. Investigation in progress.

1.2 RPA

- a. PMT Ruhengeri reported of intensification of foot and vehicular patrols in the prefecture. Checkpoints have been mounted in all vantage points with thorough checks on UNAMIR Vehicles.
- b. PMT Kibuye reported that a local had been shot dead on 24/3/95 at 3 km from Kibingo Sector in Mabanza Commune by RPA. The team further disclosed that 7 locals have also been arrested by RPA in the same Sector between 16/3/95 and 28/3/95. 2 others from Mushubati were also arrested on 29/3/95. Reasons for the arrests and killing not known. Human Rights informed. Investigation in Progress.
- c. PMT Cyangugu reported that on 25/3/95 at 1900 hrs, RPA shot dead 2 local women and a 2 year old child at Seririenzi village in Nyamasheke Commune. The same team reported that in Nirambo Commune, 2 locals have been killed by RPA on 25/3/95 at 2030 hrs. Reasons for the killings unknown. Investigation in progress, Human Rights informed.

1.3 Militia

PMT Gisenyi reported that 5 locals had been killed on 28/3/95 at 2100 hrs in Kanama Commune by unknown persons. The perpetrators suspected to be Interahamwe wore Military Uniform. Investigation in progress.

2. SOCIAL

Social advancement centres are on the increase in the country and has facilitated social gatherings amongst the local population in all spectrum of life, even though there are fears of moving in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible growth in retail businesses of consumer's goods in the prefectures.

4. ECONOMIC:

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:

1.1 RPA

A PMT - RUHENGARI PREFECTURE:

That RPA Conducted a house to house search in RUHENGARI town on 29/3/95. Residences of UN Personnel and NGOS were not left out in the exercise. Military hardware were recovered from houses of some locals. The RPA BN Commander disclosed after the exercise that the operations was a normal routine check.

B PMT KIBUYE PREFECTURE.

Reported that a local woman who allegedly sent food to her detained husband at Mwendo Commune Prison had been shot dead by RPA on 26/3/95 at about 1800 hours after failing to stop at a designated point. Human Rights informed.

2. SOCIAL

Majority of the people in the country continue to participate in social activities especially night clubs, even though there are fears of moving around in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible increase in commercial activities throughout the prefectures. Shops are being expanded with various commercial items.

4. ECONOMIC:

There is an inflationary spiral of goods and services due to the recent demonetization exercise which led to the expansion of the supply of bank money and credit in RWANDA.

5. HUMANITARIAN:

A. PMT CYANGUGU PREFECTURE

PMT Cyangugu Prefecture visited Nyagatare transit Camp on 28.3.1995 and disclosed that 109 refugees in the camp are awaiting evacuation to their various home communes.

B. PMT RUHENGURI PREFECTURE.

Reported that 7 refugees crossed from Uganda into Rwanda on 26.3.1995 and have been evacuated to their home communes.

CIVPOL ACTIVITIES

CIVPOL HQ :

Continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures.

PMT GISENYI PREFECTURE

Visited the Bourgmestre of Rubavu Commune who disclosed that the Security situation in the Commune is tense due to recent killings of 3 locals by unknown persons suspected to be Interahamwe from ZAIRE. 

That 3 locals have been killed by RPA on 24/3/95 in NKUGU sector of BUGESERA Commune. The team was denied access to the area by RPA soldiers. The Team also reported that arbitrary arrests of locals by RPA in GASEKE and KABARONDO within KIGARAMA Communes during the night is on the increase. Most locals in the areas sleep outside their homes in the night in order to escape arrests. Human Rights informed.

b) PMT KIBUYE PREFECTURE.

Reported that the RPA Commander addressed a large number of locals in the area on 26/3/95 to dispel the rumours of attacks by FRGF and 1994 revenge killings by the RPA and assured them of their safety. The Team also reported that 5 locals had been arrested by RPA on 26/3/95 in Connection with last year's Genocide. Human Rights informed.

c) PMT CYANGUGU PREFECTURE

Disclosed that there was an exchange of fire on 26/3/95 at 1000-1300 hrs between RPA and Zairen Soldiers who have been keeping Vigil near refugee Camp at Panzi. Two RPA Soldiers were reported to have been killed during the incident. Cause of the incident is unknown. Investigation in progress.

In another incident, the Team disclosed that a local pregnant woman had died at BUKAVU clinic on 25/3/95 as a result of assaults she received from RPA Soldiers on 24/3/95 at RAZIZ for failing to pay an unspecified amount of money to the Solders in order to cross into ZAIRE. Human Rights informed.

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:1.1 GNU

PMT Kibuye disclosed that 2 detainees have been killed in the prison during the 1st week of March 95 for unknown reasons. Human Rights informed. The same team reported of incidents of shooting heavy weapons on 20 March 95 at about 23.00 hrs around the lake which is very close to Guest House and Hotel Kibuye.

1.2 RPA:

A. PMT Kigali reported that the local interpreter at CIVPOL HQ had once again been arrested by RPA on 21 Mar. 95 and detained at NYAMIRAMBO Brigade. Enquiries made from the Commander of NYAMIRAMBO Brigade revealed that the local had been accused of having participated in last year's genocide. Human Rights informed.

B. PMT Kibuye reported that 4 local girls in MUBUGA Village were on 19 Mar. 95 forced to vacate their inherited residence around SENBATT by RPA. The girls have been accused of being informants for UNAMIR. Human Rights informed. The monitors have also been informed about a number of arbitrary arrest of locals by RPA as follows:

a. A family of 4 returnees have been arrested in GISHYITA Commune on arrival and detained in prison for undisclosed reasons. Investigation in progress.

b. 7 locals working with ADRA were arrested on 14 March 95. They are suspected to have taken part in the genocide. Human Rights informed.

c. 12 locals have been arrested on 16 March 95 in GISHYITA Commune for having taken part in the war. Human Rights informed.

d. Also a vehicle suspected to be conveying local prisoners was seen heading towards Kibuye prison from Rwamatamu and GISHYITA Communes. It was being guarded by RPA.

C. PMT Gitarama reported that 28 locals mainly women and children had fled their homes in RUNDA Commune to seek protection at Sect. 3 HQ for fear of arrest by RPA. Investigation in progress. Human Right informed.

1.2 MILITIA:

PMT Kigali reported that about 6 armed bandits in military uniform and driving an unregistered Toyota Land Cruiser vehicle attacked the Ethiopian Restaurant at Nyarugenge on 22 March 95 at about 02.30 hrs. They took away 2 Video sets and a briefcase containing cash of about US \$ 10,250 and 2,000,000 Frw. Investigation in progress.

1.3 GENDARMERIE

PMT Cyangugu patrolled BUGARAMA on 22/3/95 and visited Gendarmerie Brigade HQ where authorities disclosed that 60 locals have been detained in cells for various offenses including genocide. Human Rights informed.

One of the suspects had been arrested whilst the other had fled from the country through GATUNA border. Investigation in progress.



I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:1.1 GNU:PMT - CYANGUGU Prefecture:

CIVPOL representatives attended a one day seminar organised by ICRC on 17 Mar. 95 at CYANGUGU the organisers of the seminar explained the various roles being played by ICRC during and after the war. About 20 NGOs and MILOBS were also in attendance.

1.2 RPA:PMT - BUTARE Prefecture:

A. Conducted patrols in BYARUHENGARI Commune and reported that locals in the commune have been subjected to numerous arrests by RPA especially during the night. As a result most locals sleep in their farms in the night. Human Rights to be informed.

B. In another incident, the team hinted that greater number of locals have found their way to IDP Camps in response to rumor being circulated about attack by former RGF and Militia in April.

PMT - GITARAMA Prefecture:

Visited MUIKINGI Commune on 18 Mar. 95 and was briefed by the Bourgmestre that RPA had detained 20 locals suspected to have taken part in the war in the commune cell. Human Rights to be informed.

PMT - CYANGUGU Prefecture:

A. Reported that on 15 Mar. and 16 Mar. 95 two locals from BUGARAMA Commune were arrested by RPA for undisclosed reasons. Human Rights have been informed. Investigation in progress.

B. In another incident the team reported that RPA had confiscated 2 trucks belonging to a local returnee from ZAIRE. 2 drivers and the wife of the owner of the trucks were severally assaulted and detained and were later released to go back to ZAIRE. The 2 trucks are being held in RPA Barracks in CYANGUGU. Human Rights informed.

C. Also in the same prefecture, intelligence reports gathered by CIVPOL Monitors indicate that there is a planned attack by RPA to kill HUTU suspects being held in prisons in the prefecture in connection with the one year anniversary of the war on 6 April 95.

Visited the office of the Prosecutor and was informed about the sudden deaths of 24 local prisoners at MUHIMA BRIGADE. Further enquires about the incident revealed that the victims were among 74 local prisoners who had to be conveyed from GIKONDO Commune on 16 Mar. 95 to KIGALI Central Prisons. The prisoners were detained in a small room measuring about 4m x 4m at MUHIMA Brigade with both door and window closed as the KIGALI Central Prisons was closed at the time of their arrival at the prison. Officials at MUHIMA Brigade found the victims dead in the early morning of 17 Mar. 95. 3 of the local detainees had to be rushed to the hospital in critical conditions. Information had it that the dead victims have been buried at NYAMIRAMBO Cemetery in KIGALI. Investigation in progress.

PMT - RUHENGARI Prefecture:

A joint team of CIVPOL, MILOBS and Human Rights conducted patrols in NYARUTOVU Commune and was briefed by the Bourgmestre that the Communal Police in the area had detained 7 locals suspected to have stolen cattle. The names of the detainees were disclosed to the team.

In another incident the team reported that on 17 Mar. 95 at about 10.50 hrs the UNHCR Regional Coordinator for GISENYI was subjected to intensive searching together with his veh. (UNHCR 5636) at a check point in RUHENGARI which had been

mounted by RPA. Efforts by CIVPOL/MILOBS to save the situation was not attended to as the officer-in-charge of the check point accused UN of being involved in causing insecurity in the country.

PMT - GISENYI Prefecture:

A. Reported that there was a grenade explosion in MUHIRA Sector of RABAVU Commune on 17 Mar. 95 at about 07.30 hrs. 01 local was killed whilst on other was injured and is on admission in a local hospital and in a critical condition. In another development, 2 grenades were found by MSF local staff while digging a pit latrine at MURARA Orphanage Centre. Investigation in progress.

B. The team further reported that there had been an attack on family of 5 at KANAMA Commune on 17 Mar. 95 at about 20.00 hrs. 4 locals were found dead with multiple machet wounds on their head. The whereabouts of the fifth person aged 5 is unknown. Assailants not known. Investigation in progress.

C. In another incident in GISENYI, UNAMIR CIVPOL monitors have assisted in the release of a Toyota Haice Mini Bus belonging to COOPI, an NGO based in GISENYI which was impounded by the local Gendarmerie on 17 Mar. 95.

PMT - BUYUMBA Prefecture:

Visited RUSHAKI Clinic and was hinted by the authorities of the clinic that a 34 year old woman had been raped by 2 RPA soldiers on 13 Mar. 95 in the KANIGA Sector. The woman's condition is reported to be serious and is on admission at the clinic. The 2 soldiers have been detained by RPA. Investigation in progress.

A joint team of CIVPOL, MILOBs and Human Rights patrolled NDUSU and GATONDE communes on 16 Mar. 95 and inspected police cells. 10 locals, including 3 women had been detained for various offenses. The officer-in-charge of the prison when contacted disclosed that the detainees would be transferred to RUHENGARI Gendarmerie cells in the near future.

PMT - BUTARE Prefecture:

Visited KIGEBE Commune and reported that there are currently 10 prisoners in detention in KIGEMBE prison. Human Rights informed.

3. TRAINING:

The training of gendarmes at RUHENGARI National Gendarmerie Training School is in progress.

IV. CRIME WAVE

UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures have reported that criminal activities such as armed robbery and arbitrary arrest of locals are on the increase.

V. Investigation:

CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures are assisting Human Rights Monitors in the investigation of Human Rights violation cases. The teams are also assisting UNAMIR Military Police in motor accident cases throughout the prefectures.

The personnel of the Military Police Coy which is a professional body should be educated on the need of being courteous and fair in the execution of their duties especially when dealing with civilians.

I therefore recommend orientation course for the MP Coy to avoid a similar incident in the future.

To serve as a deterrent to others, disciplinary action should be taken against the erring Military Policemen involved for applying excessive force on the traffic violators.

Subject: Assault by M.P Cpl Alain Parent against Mr Paul Ischlika (CSO).

Introduction : This case deals with an assault on Mr Paul Ischlika (CSO) by Cpl Alain Parent of Military Police.

Facts of the Case

On 17/2/95 between 1500 and 1600 hours, Cpl Alain Parent of the Military Police was on duty at the UNAMIR Force HQ when Mr Paul Ischlika (CSO) arrived on UNAMIR vehicle 1105. He turned left after entering the main gate to park his vehicle in the space allocated to him near the container used as the stationery ware house. On reaching the spot, he found that UNAMIR vehicle N°4617, belonging to the Nigerian Company had parked in his parking space and in his attempt to look for an empty space to park his vehicle, he was confronted by Cpl Alain Parent for having used a route alleged to be one way and therefore ordered him to go back and use the approved route.

According to Mr Ischlika, he pleaded with Cpl Parent to allow him park since he was already in another packing space and more over there was no sign or indication that the road he used was a one way-route. This generated into a hot argument during which Cpl Parent held the hand of Mr Ischlika and insisted that Mr Ischlika move his vehicle from that place or he Cpl Parent would not allow him to leave the scene.

Investigation

On 24/2/95, Cpl Parent was invited for questioning but he refused to answer any question or give a written statement. His reason being that he had submitted a comprehensive report including his statement on the same issue to his Commanding Officer and that his lawyer in Canada has also instructed him not to give any more statement. Unfortunately all attempts made to get the statement of Cpl Parent released to CIVPOL for further investigation proved futile. However the scene was inspected and statements taken from eye witnesses. Mr Paul Ischlika was also questioned and statement taken from him. (Copies attached marked A-D)

On 1/3/95 a memo was sent to the CO MP Coy to release the leader

of the escort team who was on UNAMIR vehicle N° 4617 for interrogation but there was no response. (Copies attached marked 1-3.)

However, on 10-3-95 two traffic violation reports against Mr Ischlika for i) Driving wrong way on a one way street.

2) Parking in a reserve area/zone and a statement from one Colin S. Cannor of UNAMIR HQ was received by CIVPOL Commissioner for action (Copies attached marked E-G)

Findings

- 1) That Cpl Parent was on duty at UNAMIR HQ on the day of the incident.
- 2) That there is no sign or mark indicating that the road turning left is one way route.
- 3) That Mr Ischlika actually used the road turning left in a bid to enter his car park near the container used as stationery warehouse.
- 4) That UNAMIR Vehicle N°4617 was parked in Mr Ischlika's parking space.
5. That Mr Ischlika parked his car in the space provided for the HAO.
- 6) That there was a confrontation between Cpl Parent & Mr Ischlika during which Cpl Parent grabbed Mr Ischlika's hand and prevented him from leaving the scene.
- 7) That out of the four witnesses only one gave evidence in favour of Cpl Parent and this could not be corroborated by any one, not even Cpl Parent himself since he refused to comment or give a written statement on the incident.

Opinion

1. As much as one would appreciate the fact that Cpl Parent was performing a lawful duty as a law enforcement officer, he could have adopted a better approach to the issue. Enforcing traffic regulations within UNAMIR HQ Premises, could be done as stated in UNAMIR rules and regulations. i.e sending official reports of any erring officer to his/her head of department who will inturn take the necessary disciplinary action against the officer.

2. The grabbing of Mr Ischlika's hand by Cpl Parent and preventing him from leaving the scene indeed amounts to assault and is not the best way.

3. From the statement of Mr Colin S. Connor, it appears Mr Ischlika also failed to cooperate with the Cpl Parent by refusing to obey simple instructions given by the MP who was performing a lawful duty.

Recommendation/Conclusion

- 1) The Military Police Coy must be educated on the need of being courteous and fair in the execution of their duties especially in dealing with the civil population.

2) In the same way, other UNAMIR components should also be advised to cooperate with the MPS in the discharge of their duties.

3) There is the need for proper marking of the roads within UNAMIR HQ to indicate where and where not to turn so as to avoid a similar incident from occurring in future.

Je voudrais expliquer librement de la manière suivante:

At 1515 hrs LT. on 17 February 1995 I arrived at the UNAMIR HQ from the airport with my vehicle UNAMIR 1105. My allocated car park is the 3rd space in the last row at the top end near the container used as the Stationery Ware House. Ever since I was allocated this space I have always used the left bend to enter my parking space.

Throughout my six months with UNAMIR as Chief Security Officer, it has never at any time been made known either by an Administrative circular or by a sign post that the left bend is a "NO ENTRY".

Proceeding to my parking space I realized that a military vehicle UNAMIR 4617 belonging to the Nigerian Company was parked in my place. Infact there were two of those vehicles with about 20-25 Nigerian military personnel around who were the escort party to the Nigerian Delegation. In the process of looking for another space I saw a military vehicle coming towards me, which I allowed to pass, but at that point in time I had seen an open space belonging to the Humanitarian Officer where I was trying to park, as I did not want to ask the Nigerians out of my place.

Apparently Cpl Parent whom I had never met or known before, and who was in the said vehicle, abruptly stopped his vehicle came out and shouted at me to back out as that was a NO ENTRY. I pleaded with him to allow me to park this time as I was only couple of meters away from the space and that next time I will take note, but he refused and kept on shouting at me in a very rude and authoritative manner to a point that I felt humiliated. In any case I had no where to back out as he had parked his vehicle behind me. In view of this I decided to park my vehicle in open the space of the HAO who is a friend and colleague of mine.

For parking in that space, Cpl Parent still kept harassing me that I should not park there as it belonged to another person, failing to realize that my own space was occupied by somebody else. Alighting from my vehicle and in an attempt to lock the door on the off-side, Cpl Parent blocked me by aggressively standing in my way and ordered me not to move an inch. Each time I tried to evade him he will cross my way. On several occasions Cpl Parent grabbed me on my left arm and pushed me back preventing me from moving.

Twice Mr. Tony Adams the Transport Despatch Officer who was present told him that I was the CSO but Cpl Parent said he didn't give a damn. All this took place before all the local staff drivers, and the Nigerian Military escort Team, who I am sure will be willing to testify. Infact it was a public scenario.

When I asked Cpl Parent why he was assaulting me, he said because I defied his orders, pointing at his arm band on his sleeve with the M.P. on it. Asking Cpl. Parent who told him that, that access road was a "No Entry" he said his Company commander told him. When I further asked him to show me the Notice he told me "you being the chief security you should put it up.

As a matter of interest Cpl Parent even summoned another junior military police officer (a Ghanian) and ordered him to detain me on the spot.

When Cpl Parent demanded for my ID card which was hanging on a chain around my neck, three times I showed him only to allow me to pass but he kept holding me back that he was not yet finished with me. You will be surprised to note that a Senior Nigerian military officer who was seated in their vehicle tried to pacify Cpl Parent but no, he wouldn't listen, as he was bent on imposing his military discipline on me.

As far as I am concerned, there is a legitimate Camp Commandant in the person of Capt. Dewgun appointed by the Force Commander who is responsible for the security of the UNAMIR HQ including any indiscipline behavior on the part of any staff member. Perhaps Cpl Parent's appointment as military police supersedes every authority in this mission and has the mandate to physically assault staff members for defying his orders.

As a military police officer who is supposed to impose discipline on the military, and who is also supposed to be disciplined himself, I am sure there are many ways Cpl Parent could book me to task than publicly humiliating and assaulting me for defying his orders particularly in my capacity as the Chief Security Officer for UNAMIR.

Before concluding, I would like to emphasize the following points:

- (i) That, that particular access road has never been, an even up till now is not a "No Entry". To prove my case, there is big white Arrow on the ground pointing in two directions including this very road;
- (ii) That the UNAMIR HQ comes directly under the Camp Commandant Capt. Dewgun and not the Military Police;
- (iii) That as International civilian staff, I am not subjected to military orders, more so from a military police corporal, hence we have the SRSG, ED, CAO, and the CCPO who are directly responsible for all indiscipline behavior on the part International civilian staff members;

- (iv) *Assuming that I was in every way wrong in this incident which is not the case, does that mandate Cpl Parent to assault me physically and publicly.*

The witnesses I would like to mention here are:

- (a) *Mr. Tony Adams - The Transport despatch Officer;*
- (b) *The Nigerian Military Escort Team from Byumba;*
- (c) *Our Local drivers who were around their minibuses.*

At about 1515 hrs. Lt. 17 February 1995, I returned from Transport Workshop and parked UNAMIR 600 in the despatch pool reserved parking area. As soon as I came out of this vehicle I saw the chief security officer Mr. Paul Ischlika arrived and parked in the area designated for the HAO because his parking space was occupied by a military vehicle UNAMIR 4617 belonging to the Nigerian contingent.

Immediately he was confronted by the M.P. Cpl. Alain Parent who told him that he had entered the parking area via a no entry route.

Mr. Ischlika then told the M.P. to allow him to park this time because he was only few meters away from the parking space he wanted to use, but cpl. Parent refused and kept shouting at him to move out of the place.

The CSO asked the military police to show him the sign indicating that it was a one way drive. He also asked him who told him it was a one way traffic. Cpl. parent expressed that he was told by his company that this route was a one way drive.

Mr. Ischlika then told the M.P. that it was not a one way drive. There was no one way sign and for six months he had used this route because this was not made known to him through an Administrative circular or the erection of a sign post. Cpl. Parent then blocked the path of Mr. Ischlika and pushed him. Mr. Ischlika then asked the M.P. "why are you assaulting me? "

Cpl. Parent continued to shout in a very rude manner humiliating Mr. Ischlika. Immediately I intervened and told cpl. Parent that he should take it easy. Then I informed him that the person he was assaulting was the chief security officer. Cpl. Parent showed me his stripes, and the M.P. arm band. At this time the CSO attempted to pass again and cpl. Parent pushed Mr. Ischlika a second time.

This time he grabbed the CSO by the hand preventing him from moving.

The CSO started to shout "Why are you assaulting me !!!".
This is the second time you have pushed me.

I told Cpl. Parent that this man was the CSO but he said:
"I don't give a damn."

Cpl Parent then asked the CSO for his driver's permit and ID card which was hanging on a chain around his neck which he showed him, but he kept holding Mr. Ischlika back and said "I am not finished yet."

A senior Nigerian military officer tried to settle this matter but cpl. Parent would not listen. Then I escorted Mr. Ischlika from the scene leaving cpl. Parent to do his paper work.

On the 17th/2/95 between 15^h16^hhrs, a military police Corporal whose name I couldn't establish immediately, attacked and assaulted R. Paul Isilikha who had just by-passed the Corporal and had already finished parking. The Corporal jumped out of his car & rushed to Paul claiming that Paul had passed in the wrong way. He ordered Paul to get in the vehicle and drive again so that he passes in the right way. Paul explained to the Corporal that since he had parked already, there was no need for him (Paul) to follow the Corporal's orders. Paul's explanations angered the Corporal who reacted to the amusement and surprise of all the people present by forcing him to lock his vehicle as well as stopping him from making any movements towards his office, by pushing and holding Paul's shoulders and hand respectively more than twice. After a hot argument the Corporal ^{demanded} an I.D Card from Paul which he quickly mailed to him to do whatever he wanted. It still didn't stop the Corporal from enjoying Paul's shoulders - whenever he tried to move thinking that the Corporal had finished getting what he wanted from the I.D Card. The situation however, was rectified after the intervention of some Nigerian officers who were parking near the scene by calling the Corporal and talking to him briefly.

Personal observations.

- There is a possibility that the Corporal had planned an attack on Paul for some time, but had no way how to do it directly until then when we caught him in the so called offence. Because sincerely a thinking responsible person can't almost fight somebody for such a reason.
- There is no doubt at all that the Corporal was very wrong to handle/assault Paul, since there is no sign post to indicate that there is a one way. Surprisingly however, so many cars have continued to pass in the same place and nobody has been arrested.

Recommendations.

I do recommend for a harsh military disciplinary action against the Corporal in order for his colleagues not to repeat the same similar mistakes especially on civilian staff.

I also appeal to the concerned authorities to put in place sign post showing that there is a one way to avoid further embarrassments to innocent people like Paul who might again be victims of such undisciplined and irresponsible military police officers.

Conclusion.

I highly praise and admire Paul's gentility for not retaliating to this behaviour done on him by the Corporal as this should have caused a more serious case in UNAMIR.


relating to an incident on Friday 17 February 1995.

2. On Friday 17 February 1995 at approximately 1500 hrs, I drove into the UNAMIR car park in a marked UNICEF vehicle. Since my visit was due to be very short I drove around, what I regarded as, the one-way circuit in front of the Headquarters and reversed into an empty parking bay reserved for the G4 vehicle. I waited to ensure that none of the other vehicles driving around was about to use the bay I had just entered, then I got out of my vehicle, locked it, and began to walk towards the main entrance of UNAMIR. 

3. As I was about to cross the main part of the circuit I noticed Mr Paul Ischlika, the UNAMIR Security Officer, swing into the parking lot against, what I understood to be, the flow of traffic. As Mr Ischlika swung right to pull into a vacant parking bay he was stopped by a UN Canadian Military Policeman. The MP appeared to remonstrate with Mr Ischlika for driving the wrong way around the one-way circuit. Mr Ischlika replied that he always parked in that spot and he proceeded to accelerate the last few metres into the parking bay. As he accelerated away the MP shouted at him to stop and then approached the parked vehicle apparently to remonstrate with Mr Ischlika both for his attitude and his driving. Mr Ischlika got out of his vehicle and began to shout at the MP that he always parked in that place, he always drove into the car park by turning sharp left and right and that he was not aware of any one-way system. 

4. The exchange between Mr Ischlika and the MP then became more and more heated with Mr Ischlika shouting and swearing at the MP. The MP appeared to remain remarkably composed during an extremely aggressive verbal tirade by Mr Ischlika who continued his onslaught despite the growing presence of national and international staff and a visiting delegation of Nigerians. The MP then appeared to try to take a note of Mr Ischlika's details from his UNAMIR identity card at which stage I proceeded into the main UNAMIR building.

5. I considered the actions of the Military Policeman during that part of the incident which I witnessed to be perfectly reasonable and, indeed, restrained considering the language and attitude of Mr Ischlika.

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE:1.1 GNU:A. PMT - KIGALI Prefecture:

Visited the Ministry of Information and was briefed by the Director of Cabinet that the Minister of Information had held a meeting with Rwandese Journalist and had strongly criticized newspapers which publish articles about division among the population.

B. PMT - KIBUYE Prefecture:

Reported that BIRAMBO Sub-Prefecture has no Judicial Officer/Public Prosecutor nor Gendarmerie for effective maintenance of law and order in the area. Investigation in progress.

C. PMT - RUHENGARI Prefecture:

Reported that a meeting was held at the RUHENGARI Conference Room on 15 Mar. 95. In attendance were all the 16 Bourgemestres of the prefectures. Details of the meeting were not disclosed. Investigation in progress.

D. PMT - GISENYI Prefecture:

Reported that the European Union Commissioner, Mrs. E. BONINO visited GISENYI from GOMA with a delegation of 10

including journalist on 13 Mar. 95. They were briefed by UNHCR officials on security in the area.

E. PMT - RUHENGARI Prefecture:

Reported that the Councilor for CYAVE Sector of KIGOMBE held a meeting with about 700 locals on 16 Mar. 95. It was discussed at the meeting that all matters of sensitive in nature should be reported to the civilian authorities and not to the RPA. The Councilor further directed that unfounded rumors about locals involvement in last year's genocide should cease with immediate effect.

1.2 RPA:

PMT - KIGALI Prefecture:

A. Further to yesterday's report of the arrest a local UNDP Staff member it has been revealed by the Commander of NYAMIRAMBO Brigade that the local is detained at the NYAMIRAMBO Brigade Station. The Commander further disclosed that he is accused of having participated in genocide during the war and would be transferred to KIGALI Prison in the near future.

B. Reported that Mr. RAPHAEL GATERA a local staff of UNICEF and Mr. AUGUSTINE SEMUHUNGU also a local staff of Brown and Root have been arrested by RPA on 13 Mar. and 14 Mar. 95 respectively. They are currently detained at GIKONDO BRIGADE in KIGALI. The Commander of the Brigade when contacted refused to give details for their arrest. Investigation in progress. Human Rights informed.

2. SOCIAL:

Majority of the people in the country continue to participate in social activities especially soccer and night clubs, even though there are fears of moving around in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible increase in commercial activities throughout the prefectures. Shops are being expanded to cater for the number of people entering the country through various border posts to resettle.

4. ECONOMIC:

There is an inflationary spiral of goods and services due to the recent demonetization exercise which led to the expansion of the supply of bank money and credit in RWANDA.

5. HUMANITARIAN:

A. Reported that 2 NGOs namely PAM and CARITAS were met distributing some quantity of corn and beans to the locals in ZARA Commune.

B. The team also patrolled KABARONDO Commune and was briefed by the Asst. Bourgmestre that there were 757 orphans in various adopted homes within the commune who need assistance from NGOs to keep them in good health.

A. In another incident, the team visited the Bourgmestre of KIGARAMA Commune who complained that promises made by NGOs some time ago to assist them with farming implements and seeds as well as public utilities have not been met. The Bourgmestre further stated that there was lack of adequate medical facilities and food in the local prison.

Disclosed that Mr. KAYIRANGA CHARLES, a local staff of Brown and Root had been arrested by the RPA on 28 Feb. 95 near IVECO in GIKONDO area of KIGALI for no apparent reason. Information has it that the local is detained at GIKONDO Brigade Camp. Human Rights monitors informed.

2.2 PMT - GITARAMA Prefecture:

Visited the Bourgmestre of RUNDA Commune to discuss security situation in the area. The Bourgmestre disclosed that banditry activities had increased in the commune due to the rumours circulating among the locals that those suspected to have taken part in last year's war were going to be arrested. He assessed the security situation as unstable. Human Rights informed.

2.3 PMT - KIBUNGO Prefecture:

Reported that the leader of Human Rights Monitoring Team in KIBUNGO had been expelled from the area on 09 March 93 on the orders of the Prefect of KIBUNGO for no apparent reason. In another development the team visited Ghanbatt and MILOBs Sector Commander to discuss security situation in the area.

3. TRAINING:

The training of gendarmes at RUHENGARI National Gendarmerie Training School is in progress.

IV. CRIME WAVE

UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures have reported that criminal activities such as armed robbery and arbitrary arrest of locals are on the increase during the week.

V. Investigation:

A. CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures are assisting Human Rights Monitors in the investigation of Human Rights violation cases. The teams are also assisting UNAMIR Military Police in motor accident cases throughout the prefectures.

B. CIVPOL Monitoring Team in KIGALI visited the Chief of Operations, National Gendarmerie HQ in connection with the stolen 4 Runner veh. the property of UNAMIR CIVPOL which was robbed at gun point from a CIVPOL observer. The Chief of Operations had promised to assist with the investigations. Sitrep No. 3(2) of 09 March 95 refers.

BY UNAMIR MILITARY POLICE

This investigations has to do with the assault on Mr Patsey Mullings, Senior BMS Officer, causing injuries on his body by a unit of the military police who were on traffic patrol duties on 17th February 1995.

2. FACTS OF THE CASE

On 17th february 1995 at about 2200 hrs Lt. Mr Patsey Mullings was driving home in UNAMIR Vehicle number 458 after he had dropped a passenger with whom they had attended a party at the communication compound.

b) A patrol unit of UNAMIR military Police stationed at the intersection close to UNAMIR HQ flagged him down and requested him to submit himself to the usual military police check.

c) During this encounter, a scuffle ensued and the complainant in this case was overpowered, handcuffed and sent to UN Hospital for alcohol test.

d) Blood sample was taken from him, and he was treated for injuries sustained during the violent encounter with the military police unit.

Investigation : -

a) Two memos with reference CIVPOL/MEMO/174/95 dated 23rd Feb, 1995 and CIVPOL/MEMO/182/95 dated 25th February 1995 were sent to the Commander of the UNAMIR Military Police Company requesting the appearance of Cpl Alain Parent and other members of the team who were on traffic Patrol with him on 17/02/95.

b) Cpl Alain Parent reported for interrogation on 24/02/95 at about 0900 hrs as requested but declined to answer any questions or write statement in respect of this case. His reason was that, he had informed his lawyer in Canada about this case and had instructions not to speak about this incident. He then advised the investigating team to request for his official report about this incident from his commanding officer (Major Plante).

c) The investigating teams requested for these documents in a letter reference CIVPOL/MEMO/182/95 dated 25th Feb 1995. There is no response from the commanding officer as of the time of this report.

d) As investigations progresses, the team discovered that the leader of the team on the night of this incident was warrant officer Bessette. He was with Cpl Alain Parent when he reported for questioning at the UNCIVPOL Liaison office at the UNAMIR HQ but he never identified himself as a member of the team only to be informed while CIVPOL Commissioner and I were on clarification visit to Major Plante (CO) that WO BESSETTE was the team leader and had left for CANADA to return after 3 weeks.

e) On 27th February 1995 at about 0900 hrs, warrant officer TAHRISHILI and Cpl/C TRABELI MONDHER reported in response to an earlier memo sent to the CO, MP, COY. The two Tunisian Military Policemen Volunteered statements in writing and answered questions from investigating teams. Their statements are attached to this report and marked A and B

f) On 24th Feb 1995, Major Charles Enart of the G2 operations, volunteered a statement in respect of this investigations and narrated his ordeal in the hand of the same Unit of the military Police led by W/O BESSETTE on 17/02/95. His statement is attached and marked 7

The investigation team visited the UN Hospital to authenticate Photocopy of the outpatient clinical record and medical fitness advice attached to Patsey Mullings report. These document were confirmed genuine and their contents re-written with medical terminology made clearer. This document is attached and marked 7.

FINDINGS : - Investigations conducted into this matter reveals the following :-

a) That on 17/02/95, a team of military Police Company comprising W/O Bessette, W/O TAHRISHILI, Cpl ALAIN PARENT and Cpl TRABEL SI MONDHER were on night traffic patrol/control of UNAMIR VEHICLES

i) That this incident threatened Patsey Mullings Health conditions and was advised to stay off duty for 2 days. See attached document marked 3A.

j) That there is no evidence so far to justify the magnitude of force applied on Patsey Mullings.

Opinion

There is no doubt that the MP Unit were performing a noble duty but the manner the incident was handled exposed their inexperience in handling matters of traffic violations involving civilians. They showed they are used to their military environment and ways of policing their nucleus armed society. The Unilateral actions of Cpl Alain Parent contacting his lawyer in Canada in respect of a matter being investigated in Rwanda without officially notifying UNAMIR is a serious bridge of administrative procedure and indirect call for a criminal charge against him. This I suggest be viewed seriously.

Recommendations : In view of the findings enumerated earlier, I recommend orientation Course for the MP Unit to avoid a more serious incident and disciplinary actions against the erring policemen for applying excessive force in contravening a traffic violator. This is subject to your considerations, please.



Subject Incident involving UNAMIR Military Police on Friday
17. 2. 95, causing Grievous Bodily Harm to Staff Member

At about 2000 lt. I attended a party in the Communications compound. Departing at about 2200 lt, and took a passenger to Remera and proceeded to drive home.

While I was driving along the road which passes at the back of Amahoro Hotel I saw the Military Police standing at the intersection close to UNAMIR HQ, an officer indicated me to stop. This I did. He told me to park near two African Military Policemen attached to UNAMIR. I obeyed his instructions. One of the Africans asked me for my identification card and my driver's license and as I was about to show them these documents a Canadian Military Police, Cpl. Parent I.D. #M 7583 came to the drivers side, pushed the two Africans aside and told me to come out of the vehicle. I complied, then suddenly Cpl. Parent started to push me in front of UNAMIR 485 and said. "Go in front of the vehicle. Go in front of the vehicle."

To find out, what is the meaning of this abusive treatment I enquired. "What is the meaning of this?" Cpl. Parent said, "breathe in my face." I refused. He continued to push me. I escaped and ran inside the vehicle, started to lock the door and wind up the window. The engine of UNAMIR 485 was still running. I tried to turn off the motor when Cpl. Parent pushed his right hand through the opening of the window and tried to take the key from the ignition.

I held the key and asked. "What do you want?" Cpl. Parent did not reply, instead he opened the door grabbed my left hand and started to pull me out of the vehicle. At this point, two Tunisians - Chemingui, Souheil # M 7585; the other small in body, his name and I.D. number I could not make out because he was shielding it; another Canadian Military Police came to his assistance. They assisted Cpl. Parent in pulling me out of the vehicle, forcing me down on the road surface on my back and fastened handcuffs on my hands.

While the Military Police was trying to put the handcuffs on my hands, I saw one of them attempt to draw a weapon from his right side. I thought he was going for his gun, but he drew a black baton instead and used it as a menace in my face.

Throughout this ordeal I was afraid I would loose my life so I screamed, but no one offered assistance. I pleaded that I have hypertension and I should not be manhandled in this

manner. I am an international staff member and any information they need could be obtained by writing down the number on my identification card and query the matter with the administration. These unruly Military Police did not care for one minute, nor did they heed my cause, instead they continued to ill-treat me. The tall Canadian M. P. drove a Land Cruiser to my side while Cpl. Parent opened the door and the two Tunisians pushed me into the back seat; they sat one on each side of me as the vehicle was driven to the Military Police Headquarters.

At the station Cpl. Parent made a radio call to the Australian medical facilities and informed them he had a prisoner who needs medical examination. The person answering the radio message replied that they were ready to accept the patient. Another caller told Cpl. Parent that he had another person near the gate of the Belgium Village to be taken to the hospital also.

I began to cry for water because I was thirsty and my mouth was dry. I could feel that the anxiety was causing my blood pressure to rise, so I remained calm. In the past I was advised by my doctor to try and keep calm in trying to maintain a normal heart beat, but in this situation when my body was in pain it was impossible to maintain a state of calm. Incessantly, I asked the Military Policemen if they knew what the level of blood pressure 220/120 meant? This means I could snap at any moment if they continue to force me to react, without giving me water to drink.

All the way to the Kigali Central Hospital, the Tunisians held my hands and squeezed the handcuffs as tight as possible causing my wrists to hurt. My right foot was placed in a very awkward position and I asked them to release the pressure of the handcuff on my hands and give me a chance to move my right foot but none of the four Military Policemen offered any assistance. Then I asked them why are you treating me like a criminal? But they did not answer. I repeated this phrase over and over. "I am a UN staff member and I don't deserve to be treated this way. How can I jump out of the car with two strong men beside me and a handcuff on my hands?" But no one heeded my pleads.

At the hospital Cpl. Parent approached the doctor and from the vehicle I could hear the doctor say. "I have no means to measure a person's alcohol content and it is only if the person volunteer to give blood then I would take a sample. That is the way it is done in Australia." Cpl. Parent mumbled something and came up to me and asked me if I am willing to give blood samples? I told him no because he did not give me water.

Again, I was dragged out of the vehicle and taken into the hospital where the doctors gave me water and I allowed them to do medical inspection. Before the doctor started he asked the Military Police to remove the handcuffs. This was done. When my blood pressure was taken and it read 220/120, the doctor explained that this was caused because of the anxiety. Please see a copy of the doctors report attached for reference.

When the medical examination was completed and the doctors dressed my right foot and put a bandage on my ankle, I was asked to sign for the sample of the blood which was given to me because they refused to explain what was written in the medical report although I volunteered to give blood.

I was driven from the hospital back to the Military Police Headquarters and when I was taken to a cell on the left side of the compound I asked for a telephone to call my home so

that I could explained to my friends that I was taken prisoner by the Military Police, this offer was refused. Cpl. Parent said if I did not go into the cell before he counted to three I would see what will happen. Immediately he counted: One, two, three and four Military Policemen held me by the arm and legs, lifted me up and threw me onto a cot and locked the door. Cpl. Parent instructed the guards to check on me every fifteen minutes for the first hour and every half hour until day light. He asked the men if they had flashlight and they said no. Soon after some one approached with a torch and shone it into my face while I was sitting on the cot wrenching in pain. Between the hours of 0200 and 1100 I was not given any food, and not even a drop of water to take the medication the doctor gave me to ease the pain caused by these inflicting injuries.

At about 0830 the Canadian Military Police and the two Tunisians came to the cell. They stood sideways so that I could not look at their names nor I.D. number. I asked them for water and they refused to give me a drink. I asked them also if they had informed the administration of my whereabouts and called my home. To this question they replied. "We are trying."

It was about 1100 when Sgt. Kamanga came to the cell and asked me what happened? I explained that I was given no water to drink, no food and no assistance to get my medicine for hypertension. He told me to wait. Shortly, he returned and told me that these permission was refused. I told him I had mineral water in UNAMIR 485 and he left. A few minutes later he returned with a bottle of water.

At about 1200 lt. I was released and given a piece of paper which read: Report to CCPO immediately.

In making this complaint I would like the authorities to:

1. Conduct an investigation into this excessive and wanton use of force which amounted to aggressive assault causing grievous bodily harm inflicting wounds and excessive pain for which I am undergoing medical treatment and physiotherapy.

2. Show me where I have inflicted any wound any grievous bodily harm or any intent to assault any of these Military Police in line with their duties.

Please be aware that I know that a non-violent approach would bring a favorable response and if Cpl. Parent had approach me in a different manner this situation would never occur. This un-wanton behavior by the Military Police is unprecedented in the history of my service. I was treated like a common criminal. Even if I was under the influence of alcohol(a case the Military Police cannot determine), I was dragged out of a United Nations vehicle in which I sought refuse, forced to the ground and handcuffed while four big strong men sat on my legs and body causing me grievous bodily harm while I kept saying: "I am an international staff member. I don't deserve to be treated this way. The fact is I was mobbed by persons who should uphold the law and no member of the general public deserve this abusive treatment.

3. Please note, all the Military Police who inflicted this

treatment can be easily identified.

4. The United Nations driver's handbook states:

(a) Drivers and passengers of UN vehicles must produce their UN I.D. card and driver's permit when asked by an MP, and the drivers should adhere immediately.

(b) In order to safeguard the security of persons or property, or to prevent the possibility of committing a serious offence, MPs are authorized to take possession of driving permits and/ or vehicle keys, particular in cases involving:

(i) driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs

(ii) Impaired driving through physical exhaustion due to sickness or fatigue;

(iii) Reckless or dangerous driving

(iv) Leaving the scene of an accident without acceptable reason.

(v) The MPs have no power to perform tests for alcohol. Breath analyzers are not compulsory. Offenders may be convicted on the evidence of those who testify to the observance of this offence.

(vi) In the case of a suspect driving with impaired vision, the MP should where possible have the suspect examined by a Medical Officer with the aim of obtaining a professional medical opinion regarding impairment.

Cpl. Parent did not outline any of these offence to me nor did he give me any test to prove I was driving under the influence of alcohol. From the moment he stopped the vehicle, his only intent was to beat me and put me in jail.

I held the key and asked. "What do you want?" Cpl. Parent did not reply, instead he opened the door grabbed my left hand and started to pull me out of the vehicle. At this point, two Tunisians - Chemingui, Souheil # M 7585; the other small in body, his name and I.D. number I could not make out because he was shielding it; another Canadian Military Police came to his assistance. They assisted Cpl. Parent in pulling me out of the vehicle, forcing me down on the road surface on my back and fastened handcuffs on my hands.

While the Military Police was trying to put the handcuffs on my hands, I saw one of them attempt to draw a weapon from his right side. I thought he was going for his gun, but he drew a black baton instead and used it as a menace in my face.

Throughout this ordeal I was afraid I would lose my life so I screamed, but no one offered assistance. I pleaded that I have hypertension and I should not be manhandled in this manner. I am an international staff member and any information they need could be obtained by writing down the number on my identification card and query the matter with the administration. These unruly Military Police did not care for one minute, nor did they heed my cause, instead they continued to ill-treat me. The tall Canadian M. P. drove a Land Cruiser to my side while Cpl. Parent opened the door and the two Tunisians pushed me into the back seat; they sat one on each side of me as the vehicle was driven to the Military Police Headquarters.

At the station Cpl. Parent made a radio call to the Australian medical facilities and informed them he had a prisoner who needs medical examination. The person answering the radio message replied that they were ready to accept the patient. Another caller told Cpl. Parent that he had another person near the gate of the Belgium Village to be taken to the hospital also.

I began to cry for water because I was thirsty and my mouth was dry. I could feel that the anxiety was causing my blood pressure to rise, so I remained calm. In the past I was advised by my doctor to try and keep calm in trying to maintain a normal heart beat, but in this situation when my body was in pain it was impossible to maintain a state of calm. Incessantly, I asked the Military Policemen if they knew what the level of blood pressure 220/120 meant? This means I could snap at any moment if they continue to force me to react, without giving me water to drink.

All the way to the Kigali Central Hospital, the Tunisians held my hands and squeezed the handcuffs as tight as possible causing my wrists to hurt. My right foot was placed in a very awkward position and I asked them to release the pressure of the handcuff on my hands and give me a chance to move my right foot but none of the four Military Policemen offered any assistance. Then I asked them why are you treating me like a criminal? But they did not answer. I repeated this phrase over and over. "I am a UN staff member and I don't deserve to be treated this way. How can I jump out of the car with two strong men beside me and a handcuff on my hands?" But no one heeded my pleas.

At the hospital Cpl. Parent approached the doctor and from the vehicle I could hear the doctor say. "I have no means to measure a person's alcohol content and it is only if the person volunteer to give blood then I would take a sample. That

is the way it is done in Australia." Cpl. Parent mumbled something and came up to me and asked me if I am willing to give blood samples? I told him no because he did not give me water.

Again, I was dragged out of the vehicle and taken into the hospital where the doctors gave me water and I allowed them to do medical inspection. Before the doctor started he asked the Military Police to remove the handcuffs. This was done. When my blood pressure was taken and it read 220/120, the doctor explained that this was caused because of the anxiety. Please see a copy of the doctors report attached for reference.

When the medical examination was completed and the doctors dressed my right foot and put a bandage on my ankle, I was asked to sign for the sample of the blood which was given to me because they refused to explain what was written in the medical report although I volunteered to give blood.

I was driven from the hospital back to the Military Police Headquarters and when I was taken to a cell on the left side of the compound I asked for a telephone to call my home so that I could explained to my friends that I was taken prisoner by the Military Police, this offer was refused. Cpl. Parent said if I did not go into the cell before he counted to three I would see what will happen. Immediately he counted: One, two, three and four Military Policemen held me by the arm and legs, lifted me up and threw me onto a cot and locked the door. Cpl. Parent instructed the guards to check on me every fifteen minutes for the first hour and every half hour until day light. He asked the men if they had flashlight and they said no. Soon after some one approached with a torch and shone it into my face while I was sitting on the cot wrenching in pain. Between the hours of 0200 and 1100 I was not given any food, and not even a drop of water to take the medication the doctor gave me to ease the pain caused by these inflicting injuries.

At about 0830 the Canadian Military Police and the two Tunisians came to the cell. They stood sideways so that I could not look at their names nor I.D. number. I asked them for water and they refused to give me a drink. I asked them also if they had informed the administration of my whereabouts and called my home. To this question they replied. "We are trying."

It was about 1100 when Sgt. Kamanga came to the cell and asked me what happened? I explained that I was given no water to drink, no food and no assistance to get my medicine for hypertension. He told me to wait. Shortly, he returned and told me that these permission was refused. I told him I had mineral water in UNAMIR 485 and he left. A few minutes later he returned with a bottle of water.

At about 1200 lt. I was released and given a piece of paper which read: Report to CCPO immediately.

In making this complaint I would like the authorities to:

1. Conduct an investigation into this excessive and wanton use of force which amounted to aggressive assault causing grievous bodily harm inflicting wounds and excessive pain for which I am undergoing medical treatment and physiotherapy.
2. Show me where I have inflicted any wound any grievous

bodily harm or any intent to assault any of these Military Police in line with their duties.

Please be aware that I know that a non-violent approach would bring a favorable response and if Cpl. Parent had approach me in a different manner this situation would never occur. This un-wanton behavior by the Military Police is unprecedented in the history of my service. I was treated like a common criminal. Even if I was under the influence of alcohol (a case the Military Police cannot determine), I was dragged out of a United Nations vehicle in which I sought refuge, forced to the ground and handcuffed while four big strong men sat on my legs and body causing me grievous bodily harm while I kept saying: "I am an international staff member. I don't deserve to be treated this way. The fact is I was mobbed by persons who should uphold the law and no member of the general public deserve this abusive treatment.

3. Please note, all the Military Police who inflicted this treatment can be easily identified.

4. The United Nations driver's handbook states:

(a) Drivers and passengers of UN vehicles must produce their UN I.D. card and driver's permit when asked by an MP, and the drivers should adhere immediately.

(b) In order to safeguard the security of persons or property, or to prevent the possibility of committing a serious offence, MPs are authorized to take possession of driving permits and/or vehicle keys, particular in cases involving:

(i) driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs

(ii) Impaired driving through physical exhaustion due to sickness or fatigue;

(iii) Reckless or dangerous driving

(iv) Leaving the scene of an accident without acceptable reason.

(v) The MPs have no power to perform tests for alcohol. Breath analyzers are not compulsory. Offenders may be convicted on the evidence of those who testify to the observance of this offence.

(vi) In the case of a suspect driving with impaired vision, the MP should where possible have the suspect examined by a Medical Officer with the aim of obtaining a professional medical opinion regarding impairment.

Cpl. Parent did not outline any of these offence to me nor did he give me any test to prove I was driving under the influence of alcohol. From the moment he stopped the vehicle, his only intent was to beat me and put me in jail.



On 17 February 1995, I was working the night shift patrolling the movement of UNAMIR vehicles and personnel. I was in the company of Canadian Warrant Officer BISSETTA, Canadian Corporal PARAIN and Tunisian Corporal TRABELSI.

Around 23:10 at the intersection near UNAMIR Headquarters we signaled for Mr. Patsey MULLINGS to pull over to verify that his papers were in order. Corporal PAREN asked Mr. MULLINGS for his driver's license and identification card. Mr. MULLINGS refused to give hand over his papers. In the meantime, we could smell alcohol on his breath. He was very hostile and spoke very loudly. He told us that he had been a police officer for fourteen years. At that moment, Corporal PAREN told him to step out of his vehicle. Mr. MULLINGS hesitated a great deal before getting out of the car. Finally he got out swaying in every which direction. He gestured at us and acted as if we were flies (insignificant). He told us that we were idiots. We tried to calm him down and treated him with leniency, but he did not respect us as military police.

When Canadian Warrant Officer BISSETTA asked him for the key and papers, Mr. MULLINGS shoved him hard.

Following his aggression toward us and given his inebriated state, we took him into custody and presented him to the doctors on duty at the Australian hospital for a report.

Mr. MULLINGS was driven to the military police station where he was held until we completed our investigation.

Upon our arrival at the intersection of UNAMIR HQ at approximately 23:00, the patrol stopped the UNAMIR NISSAN vehicle No. 458 driven by Mr. Patsey MULLINGS, UNID No. 088 to verify that his papers were in order.

Upon stopping the aforementioned driver, Corporal PARENT noticed that the driver was inebriated. At this moment the driver began to show hostility toward members of the patrol as they carried out their duties. The driver even used physical force on Warrant Officer BESSETTE by pushing him to the ground and then categorically refusing to show his identification, driver's license, or turn in the keys of his vehicle since he was drunk.

Since his state did not permit him to continue to operate the vehicle, and to avoid a possible accident, the said driver was driven by the patrol to the UN-MP-COY office where he was taken into custody to complete the investigation.

I. GENERAL SITUATION:

The security situation in the country continues to be stable but somewhat tense.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

1. POLITICAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE: NTR.

2. SOCIAL:

Majority of the people in the country continue to participate in social activities especially soccer and night clubs, even though there are fears of moving around in the night.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible increase in commercial activities throughout the prefectures. Shops are being expanded to cater for the number of people entering the country through various border posts to resettle.

4. ECONOMIC:

There is an inflationary spiral of goods and services due to the recent demonetization exercise which led to the expansion of the supply of bank money and credit in RWANDA.

5. HUMANITARIAN: NTR.

III. OWN ACTIVITIES:

1. CIVPOL HEADQUARTERS:

UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures.

1.1 CIVPOL Commissioner met UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers from HQ and other prefectures on 09 Mar. 95 to keep them informed of their performances in order that the observers may be able to compare current activities with planned programmes and get assignments more efficiently performed.

2. CIVPOL MONITORING TEAMS:

2.1 PMT - KIGALI Prefecture:

With the intervention of UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Team in KIGALI and Human Rights monitors, the local interpreter at UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ have been released at 12.00 hrs on 09 March 95 to report to KIGALI RPA Camp on at 09.00 hrs on Sunday 12 Mar. 95 for further interrogation. CIVPOL Sitrep No. 214/95 of 08 March 95 refers.

3. TRAINING:

The training of gendarmes at RUHENGARI National Gendarmerie Training School is in progress.

IV. CRIME WAVE

UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures have reported that criminal activities such as armed robbery and arbitrary arrest of locals are on the increase during the week.

V. Investigation:

A. CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures are assisting Human Rights Monitors in the investigation of Human Rights violation cases. The teams are also assisting UNAMIR Military Police in motor accident cases throughout the prefectures.

B. CIVPOL Monitoring Team in KIGALI visited the Chief of Operations, National Gendarmerie HQ in connection with the stolen 4 Runner veh. the property of UNAMIR CIVPOL which was robbed at gun point from a CIVPOL observer. The Chief of Operations had promised to assist with the investigations. Sitrep No. 3(2) of 09 March 95 refers.
