Resolution establishing new commission for Ruandaurundi specifies as one objective the rapid replacement of Belgian military and paramilitary forces, to be completed before Independence, by indigenous forces and arrangements for the training of the latter with the help of experts or training missions provided by the UN. Our implementation plan call for the early dispatch of 2 UN military advisers. Most grateful if you could propose 2 senior and fully competent men from amongst frenchspeaking ONUC troops. They should be seconded to UN and put on our payroll at an appropriate level. Needed withing a week or two for service through probably May. We realise that ONUC is itself in need of experts, but this request has been necessitated by the need for the immediate implementation of the Resolution referred to above. Question you pose of relaxing ban against transporting correspondents in UN aircraft and vehicles has been carefully considered in meeting of Congo group with Secgen.

Recognize fully basis for your proposal, supported with accustomed vigor by Urquhart's cable of 18 January. We recognize the advantages that might come from a relaxation of the ban, although there is abundant evidence that ready access to the facts need not influence the press very much when reporting on UN activities - vide Eville in both September and December. On the other hand, there are serious difficulties not the least of which is the question of keeping good faith with the spirit, though not necessarily the letter since there is no specific provision, of the status agreement. There would be other obvious difficulties with regard to selection and the inevitable complaints from those not taken when they wanted to be, the responsibility for the acts and statements of unofficial people over whom we have no control which would result from transporting them, and the effect which the relaxation of the policy in the Congo would have on UNEF where it could have serious results. In any case, we would consider it necessary to obtain the consent of the Congolese Government before any such relaxation of the policy.

It is felt, however, that the Government should not be approached on this matter at this time, and that for the time being we adhere to the established policy. However, it is agreed that in quite exceptional situations, the officer in charge might permit a purely temporary relaxation of the restrictions where, in his view, the interests of the operation could be well served by doing so. A case in point was Dayal's relaxation of the ban when he took a plane-load of correspondents to see the ONUC Relief operation in South Kasai. In the meantime also, some sounding of the correspondents themselves might be taken informally to determine what kind of formula they might have in mind, since it would be clear that ONUC could not undertake to haul correspondents whenever and wherever they individually might wish to go.-

Reference ONUC 1380.

1. Since ANC troops at Albertville are being reinforced for purpose of conducting a military operation against the Gendarmerie in the area, the transport assistance requested of ONUC is therefore assistance to the military operation. It follows that the 88 ONUC vehicles which you would propose to hand over at Albertville would be direct assistance to the Military Operation. In other words, ONUC would then become a participant on one side of an active conflict. To do this would clearly require a change in our established policy of avoiding role of an active participant in a conflict situation through direct military assistance to one side. The question now, as it has always been, is whether our support for the Central Government is to go so far as to engage us as an active military partner of the Central Government. If we were to take such a step we would henceforth have to share in responsibility for all actions of the ANC in the area in which our assistance was given. I do not think that any authority can be found for ONUC's participation in this way, even on side of Government which we otherwise support.

2. ANC performance in North Kantanga thus far has been anything but reassuring. Is there any basis for greater promise from this urgent effort? What do they have in the way of officer strength? how will their Logistical needs be met? will they not in all likelihood have to call upon ONUC for Logistical help and for air support?

3. From Administrative point of view, transfer of vehicles is undesirable since it would be extremely difficult to replace them. We have noted with some surprise reference to possibility of procuring an equivalent number of vehicles in "Rhodesia or elsewhere for shipment direct to Elisabethville". We consider it unlikely that Rhodesia would provide a source of military vehicles for ONUC to replace similar vehicles which ONUC had conveyed to the ANC to assist them in fighting against Tshombe's Gendarmerie.

4. For reasons set forth above, am inclined to be negative on the proposal, but would appreciate any further comments you may wish to make.

1. I note that observations set forth your message report unanimous view of those who attended the meeting, including also Gussing.

2. Procedures you propose, involving careful study, visits to areas concerned by UN Representatives and consultations on problem with all authorities concerned, with Gussing's report serving as basis for discussion, are sound and acceptable.

3. Likewise, measures set forth in paragraph 8 (A) to (E) inclusive, meet approval.

4. I emphasize, however, that simultaneously with procedures and measures indicated your message, every feasible effort must be exerted toward dissolution of the camp at earliest possible date. This must continue to be the major and essential objective.

5. Must emphasize, also, that issue of prolongation of camp as UN responsibility is not repeat not negotiable with any authority, although some quarters may be quite content to have UN carry on this onerous responsibility indefinitely.

There are, as you suggested, other possible risks in dissolving camp, but our view is firm that these will have to be taken, for none seems to us to be as great as those resulting from a prolongation of camp.

7. We are not at all sure about advisability of joint ONUC~~2~~gendarmerie patrols at the camp, probably because we are convinced that security function in a refugee camp is not repeat not an appropriate role for military personnel.

8. Would appreciate more information about special camp for former political prisoners referred to in your para 10.

9. We find para 4 of G-103 encouraging.

We suggest that our senior experts in various ministries undertake as a matter of urgency the task of helping in the preparation of breakdown of current and capital expenditure.

As total subsidies granted by central government to each province represents some 60 per cent of public expenditure, steps should also be taken with the assistance of ONUC experts in order to prepare as soon as possible for submission to provincial assemblies detailed budgets showing for which purposes public money is expected to be spent.

1. Col Hubert Fauntleroy Julian is an American citizen of, I believe, West Indian ancestry. I have been acquainted with him for many years. He has an unsavory reputation as an adventurer, speculator and smooth talker. He pursues money and headlines in that order and has had more than his due of both. He is a pilot and flew for Ethiopia during the last war, reputedly as the Emperor's pilot and commander of the Ethiopian Airforce. I have also heard that he is not a very good pilot and busted up a number of Ethiopian planes.

2. We have checked here on his connection with the International Broadcasting Corporation of America and are informed, according to a reliable person who had himself seen the check, that Julian had been paid an advance of 10,000 dollars by that Corporation. Another reliable source says that Julian showed him a letter signed by Tshombe and twenty - five thousand dollars in one thousand dollar bills which Julian claimed to have been paid to him by Tshombe through the Hanover bank. The International Broadcasting Corporation, owned and operated by a Mr. Dahlman, now attempts to disclaim any responsibility for Julian and his Katanga activities although they are fully acquainted with them.

3. Our people in Elisabethville should be warned to watch Julian's activities closely.

1. Stage reached by ONUC military operations making advisable a reappraisal of its organisation, deployment, strategy, tactics and administration in the light of experience gained. Advantage should be taken of experience of veterans such as the Force Commander, his brigade and unit commanders who are due to leave ONUC before long. A survey and analysis of the military operation thus far should therefore be undertaken in March, prior to the departure of key personnel. Would wish Rikhye to participate and suggest 12 March as date of his arrival. 2 or 3 days intensive work ought to cover the ground.

2. It is suggested that key officers be detailed to study certain aspects of military operations and present their views. In order to encourage discussion, at least a summary of their recommendations and the basis on which they reached their conclusions should be available before their presentation. Some points for discussion could be :

- a. Organisation of Headquarters ONUC and its relation within framework of UN operations in the Congo.
- b. Command and control, including distribution of territorial areas on operational basis, suitability of contingents to take over such responsibilities, deployment of radio communications, etc.
- c. Overall military strategic problems and their suggested solution.
- d. Tactics, that is, dealing with law and order situation in a built-up area and in the provinces; control of airfields, control of international frontiers, methods of dealing with tribal unrest protection of refugees and so on.
- e. Employment of fighters in support of military operations.

- f. Air transport, its organisation, command and control, air movement planning, loading and unloading, control of airports, air and navigational communications.
- g. Surface communications and control of such movement, means to restore existing service communications and consideration of possibilities of improving them.
- h. Maintenance organisation. This should include consideration of all aspects of maintenance of the force starting from this headquarters down to a detachment in the field. This should cover different subjects like supplies, medical, vehicle repair, maintenance of aircraft, postal services and so on.
- i. Personnel matters, such as discipline, inquiries, reporting on officers, etc.

You will, of course, have additional items for inclusion.

1. Looking through previous exchange of cables, we observe that in connection with your present commitments you did not favour reduction in Indian administrative units because most of them were providing troops for Albertville garrison. While we fully appreciate need for such garrison, we think it inadvisable to ask India to replace their administrative troops with similar troops for employment as garrison troops. It would be better to ask India for additional infantry instead.

2. We had also asked you to reconsider future retention of Indian engineer unit. During the past year, except for minor tasks, this unit has not been employed. Its replacement on this basis or its employment for garrison duties cannot be justified.

3. As to possible future operations, we have so far not received any clear basis to support your demand for complete replacement of Indian administrative units. Even if it were possible for you to employ the Indian brigade as a formation, full vehicle lift is not available in Katanga. Are we correct in assuming that you are able to lift at least one infantry battalion in south Katanga at a time and ferry them to their objectives? Or would you need USAF airlift to achieve even this goal?

4. For future operations, you have already indicated that workshop and medical teams should be airtransportable. India has accepted this suggestion. With less vehicles and equipment, a decrease in personnel is natural, and therefore should not affect their operational efficiency. Therefore there is no logical basis for us to insist that present personnel strength should be maintained.

5. Reverting to possible future employment for engineers, there does not appear to be any suitable task since bridging and engineer workshops to support them are lacking. In this connection, we still await reply to our 304 and 676. We therefore propose to ask India for an engineer platoon only for mine lifting and miscellaneous duties.

6. It is obvious that additional infantry is needed. Paratroops would be particularly useful. We therefore propose to ask India for a parachute battalion and to decrease administrative troops in the infantry brigade to minimum required.-

1. Suggest that you discuss as matter of urgency with Adoula importance of implementing article 9 of Convention signed 15 November 1960. It is the view here that implementation of article 9 is possible without Parliament's approval.

2. This matter was discussed with Governor Ndele during his recent visit here and he promised to take it up with Adoula on his return to Congo. Suggest you contact Ndele and remind him of his promise.

3. Compensation proposed by Ministry of Finance cannot be considered as acceptable solution. Insistence on compensation would cause undue delays and would adversely affect credit of Central Government and the National Bank which will shortly be established. Furthermore, it might jeopardize our constant efforts to keep monetary assets apart from claims relating to other matters in dispute.-
