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



DAILY PRESS BRIEFING OF OFFICE OF SPOKESMAN FOR SECRETARY-GENERAL

LEONA FORMAN, SPOKESWOMAN FOR THE PRESIDENT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, STARTED TODAY'S BRIEFING BY TELLING CORRESPONDENTS THAT EGYPT, GUINEA-BISSAU, REPUBLIC OF KOREA, POLAND AND CHILE HAD BEEN ELECTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THIS MORNING TO FILL FIVE SEATS AS NON-PERMANENT MEMBERS OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL (SEE PRESS RELEASE GA/8989 ISSUED TODAY).

THE PRESIDENT OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY WAS SCHEDULED TO HAVE A WORKING LUNCHEON WITH THE CHAIRMEN OF THE MAIN COMMITTEES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO REVIEW THEIR WORK ON RESPECTIVE AGENDA ITEM 7, WHICH WILL THEN BE BROUGHT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AS RECOMMENDATIONS FOR DECISIONS.

TOMORROW, PRESIDENT FREITAS DO AMARAL WILL HOLD CONSECUTIVE MEETINGS WITH THE WORKING GROUP ON THE QUESTION OF EQUITABLE REPRESENTATION AND INCREASE IN THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL, AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED TO THE SECURITY COUNCIL; WITH THE AD HOC OPEN-ENDED WORKING GROUP OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE AGENDA FOR DEVELOPMENT AND WITH THE HIGH-LEVEL WORKING GROUP ON THE FINANCIAL SITUATION OF THE UNITED NATIONS. THESE MEETINGS, THE SPOKESWOMAN SAID, WOULD TAKE PLACE IN CONFERENCE ROOM 3, STARTING AT 3 P.M.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TOMORROW WOULD BE TAKING UP AGENDA ITEM 45, THE SITUATION IN CENTRAL AMERICA: PROCEDURES FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A FIRM AND LASTING PEACE AND PROGRESS IN FASHIONING A REGION OF PEACE, FREEDOM, DEMOCRACY AND DEVELOPMENT. THE ASSEMBLY WOULD HAVE THE REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL, A/50/499, RELATING TO THE PROCESS ACHIEVED BY CENTRAL AMERICAN COUNTRIES IN THOSE AREAS. IN THE REPORT, THE SECRETARY-GENERAL REFERRED TO THE VISIT HE MADE TO HONDURAS, EL SALVADOR AND GUATEMALA IN APRIL 1995. DURING THE VISIT HE WAS ABLE TO CONFIRM THE EFFORTS MADE THROUGHOUT THE REGION TO CONVERT THE IMPROVED PROSPECTS FOR PEACE INTO REALITY, WITH DEMOCRATIC INSTITUTIONS BEING STRENGTHENED AND AN INCREASED ASSERTIVENESS OF CIVIL SOCIETY GENERATING A NEW AND MORE DIVERSIFIED POLITICAL PROCESS. THE REPORT ALSO REFERRED IN DETAIL TO THE UNITED NATIONS SUPPORT PROVIDED TO THE REGION. THE ASSEMBLY WILL ALSO HAVE BEFORE IT DOCUMENT A/50/482, A NOTE FROM THE SECRETARY-GENERAL, CONTAINING THE THIRD REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE UNITED NATIONS HUMAN RIGHTS VERIFICATION MISSION IN GUATEMALA (MINUGUA). NICARAGUA WILL INTRODUCE A DRAFT RESOLUTION, THE SPOKESWOMAN SAID.

JUAN CARLOS BRANDT, ASSOCIATE SPOKESMAN FOR THE SECRETARY-GENERAL, TOLD CORRESPONDENTS THAT THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS IN GENEVA. AT 10:30 A.M. GENEVA TIME HE MET WITH THE ACTING SPECIAL REPRESENTATIVE FOR WESTERN SAHARA, ERIK JENSEN, TO DISCUSS THE SITUATION IN WESTERN SAHARA AND THE WORK OF THE UNITED NATIONS MISSION FOR THE REFERENDUM IN WESTERN SAHARA

DAILY PRESS BRIEFING

8 NOVEMBER 1995

AT 11:30 A.M. THE SECRETARY-GENERAL MET WITH THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE "TROIKA" OF THE EUROPEAN UNION (EU): THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF SPAIN OF THE UNITED NATIONS OFFICE AT GENEVA (UNOG) AND REPRESENTATIVE OF THE PRESIDENCY OF THE EU, FERNANDO-MARTIN VALENZUELA MARZO; AND THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVES OF FRANCE AND OF ITALY TO UNOG, DANIEL BERNARD AND GIUSEPPE BALDOCCI, RESPECTIVELY. MR. BRANDT REMINDED CORRESPONDENTS THAT AMBASSADOR BALDOCCI WAS DUE TO BECOME THE NEXT PRESIDENT OF THE EU. ALSO PRESENT AT THE MEETING WITH THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION, JEAN-PIERRE LENG. THE SECRETARY-GENERAL'S FORTHCOMING VISIT TO THE INSTITUTIONS OF THE EUROPEAN UNION WAS AMONG THE TOPICS DISCUSSED.

IN THE AFTERNOON, THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS DUE TO MEET AT 4 P.M. WITH THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF KUWAIT TO UNOG, MOHAMMED S. AL-SALLAL, AND AFTERWARDS AT 4:15 P.M. WITH THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF THE INTERNATIONAL TRADE CENTRE, DENIS BELISLE. AT 4:30 P.M., HE WAS SCHEDULED TO MEET WITH THE SECRETARY-GENERAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS CONFERENCE ON TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT (UNCTAD), RUBENS RICUPERO. AT 5:15 P.M., THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS MEETING WITH THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF IRAQ TO UNOG, AMBASSADOR BARZAN AL TIKRITI, TO DISCUSS THE IMPLEMENTATION OF SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 986 (1995) THE SO-CALLED "FOOD-FOR-OIL" RESOLUTION. AFTERWARDS, AT 6 P.M., THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS DUE TO RECEIVE THE VICE-MINISTER FOR EUROPEAN AFFAIRS OF THE FOREIGN AFFAIRS MINISTRY OF THE LIBYAN ARAB JAMAHIRIYA AND SPECIAL ENVOY OF THE PRESIDENT, ABDAL ATI OBEIDI, TO DISCUSS THE IMPLEMENTATION OF SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS ON LIBYA, INCLUDING RESOLUTIONS 748 (1992) AND 883 (1993), MR. BRANDT SAID.

THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WOULD LEAVE GENEVA TOMORROW FOR A THREE-DAY STATE VISIT TO POLAND. HE WOULD BE IN STRASBOURG, FRANCE, ON 13 AND 14 NOVEMBER. A PRESS RELEASE, EXPANDING ON THE ANNOUNCEMENT MADE BY THE SPOKESMAN ON MONDAY, 6 NOVEMBER, WOULD BE AVAILABLE IN THE AFTERNOON.

THE SECURITY COUNCIL WAS DUE TO HAVE CONSULTATIONS OF THE WHOLE AT 3 P.M., TO REVIEW THE SANCTIONS AGAINST IRAQ AND THE SITUATION IN THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA (INCLUDING THE RESOLUTION INTRODUCED LAST MONDAY ON BEHALF OF THE CONTACT GROUP). MR. BRANDT SAID IT WAS EXPECTED THAT UNDER OTHER MATTERS, COUNCIL MEMBERS WOULD BE BRIEFED BY THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF GERMANY (IN HIS CAPACITY AS COORDINATOR OF THE CONTACT GROUP) ON THE LATEST INFORMATION CONCERNING THE PEACE TALKS IN DAYTON, OHIO.

REPORTS FROM HAITI INDICATED THAT THE SITUATION IN PORT-AU-PRINCE WAS "TENSE", MR. BRANDT SAID, FOLLOWING THE INCIDENT YESTERDAY AFTERNOON IN WHICH TWO MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT WERE SHOT, ONE FATALLY, AS THEY CAME OUT OF A DOWNTOWN BANK. WHILE THERE WERE INDICATIONS THAT THE ATTACK COULD HAVE BEEN CRIMINAL IN NATURE, IT HAD POLITICAL IMPLICATIONS BECAUSE BOTH MEN WERE PROMINENT SUPPORTERS OF PRESIDENT ARISTIDE. JEAN HUBERT FEUILLE, THE REPRESENTATIVE FROM PORT SALUT AND A FORMER BODYGUARD OF THE PRESIDENT, WAS KILLED IN THE ATTACK. JEAN GABRIEL FORTUNE, THE REPRESENTATIVE FROM LES CAYES, WAS RECOVERING FROM SURGERY AND WAS EXPECTED TO LIVE, THE SPOKESMAN SAID. IN A STATEMENT TODAY, THE UNITED NATIONS MISSION IN HAITI (UNMIH) CONDEMNED THE ACT OF VIOLENCE AND

MR. BRANDT CALLED CORRESPONDENTS' ATTENTION TO A DOCUMENT ISSUED TODAY (S/1995/922): IT WAS A MID-TERM PROGRESS REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL AS MANDATED BY THE SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION 1087 (1995), SPECIFICALLY PARAGRAPH 11 OF ITS RESOLUTION. THE SPOKESMAN CALLED CORRESPONDENTS' ATTENTION TO PARAGRAPHS 41, 42 AND 43 OF THE REPORT. THESE DEALT WITH ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL ASPECTS AS WELL AS THE SECRETARY-GENERAL'S OBSERVATIONS. THE SAME DOCUMENT HAD FOUR ANNEXES, OF WHICH THREE DEALT WITH THE COMPOSITION AND STRENGTH OF THE MILITARY COMPONENT OF THE UNITED NATIONS MISSION IN HAITI; THE CIVILIAN COMPONENT OF THE SAME MISSION; AND A TABLE WITH HAITIAN STATISTICS ON CRIME.

ON THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA, MR. BRANDT TOLD CORRESPONDENTS THAT UNITED STATES AUTHORITIES HAD JUST CONFIRMED THAT AMERICAN JOURNALIST DAVID ROHDE FROM THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE MONITOR, HAD BEEN RELEASED TODAY TO UNITED STATES EMBASSY OFFICIALS IN BELGRADE. IN BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA, THE CEASE-FIRE CONTINUED TO HOLD AND AIR AND ROAD ACCESS TO SARAJEVO REMAINED UNHINDERED. IN CROATIA YESTERDAY, THREE JETS BELONGING TO THE CROATIAN AIR FORCE OVERFLEW PART OF THE ZONE OF SEPARATION IN EASTERN SLAVONIA, NEAR VINKOVCI. MEANWHILE, THE CO-CHAIRMAN OF THE STEERING COMMITTEE OF THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA, THORVALD STOLTENBERG, DID NOT RULE OUT THE POSSIBILITY THAT FURTHER TALKS ON THE FUTURE OF THAT REGION COULD TAKE PLACE WITHIN THE NEXT FEW DAYS. MR. STOLTENBERG HAD POSTPONED HIS RETURN TO DAYTON, OHIO, TO TAKE PART IN THE PEACE TALKS, AS HE WOULD BE GOING FIRST TO GENEVA TO MEET WITH THE SECRETARY-GENERAL.

THE UNITED NATIONS COMMISSION OF ENQUIRY TO INVESTIGATE REPORTS OF MILITARY TRAINING AND ARMS TRANSFERS TO FORMER RWANDESE GOVERNMENT FORCES ARRIVED THIS MORNING IN KIGALI, RWANDA. THE CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMISSION, MAHMOUD KASSEM (EGYPT), IN HIS REMARKS AT THE AIRPORT, INDICATED HIS INTENTION TO CONTACT THE GOVERNMENTS OF ALL THE STATES OF THE GREAT LAKES REGION, ANY OTHER GOVERNMENTS, NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS AND INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN ORGANIZATIONS WHICH MIGHT HAVE RELEVANT INFORMATION, AS WELL AS INDIVIDUALS OR GROUPS WITH FIRST-HAND, EYEWITNESS INFORMATION. THE COMMISSION WOULD SUBMIT AN INTERIM REPORT TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WITHIN THREE MONTHS, AND A FINAL REPORT SOON THEREAFTER. A PRESS RELEASE DETAILING THE COMMISSION'S MANDATE, ITS COMPOSITION AND ACTIVITIES IN THE NEXT FEW DAYS, WAS AVAILABLE TO CORRESPONDENTS, MR. BRANDT SAID.

THE INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ELDERLY, WITH THE THEME "AGEING IN THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY: CHALLENGES", WOULD BE COMMEMORATED IN THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL CHAMBER THURSDAY, 9 NOVEMBER FROM 10 A.M. TO 12:30 P.M. THE EVENT WAS SPONSORED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INFORMATION (DPI) AND THE NONGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE ON THE ELDERLY. DELEGATIONS, STAFF, NONGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION REPRESENTATIVES AND THE MEDIA WERE INVITED.

DID THE MEETING BETWEEN THE SECRETARY-GENERAL AND THE IRAQI AMBASSADOR MEAN THAT IRAQ WAS "SOFTENING" TOWARDS RESOLUTION 986? A CORRESPONDENT ASKED. NO, MR. BRANDT SAID, IT MEANT THAT THE SECRETARY-GENERAL HAD ONCE AGAIN SEIZED THE OPPORTUNITY TO EXPRESS HIS VIEWS TO THE GOVERNMENT OF IRAQ REGARDING THAT RESOLUTION. AS RECENTLY AS 27 OCTOBER, THE SECRETARY-GENERAL HAD MET WITH IRAQ'S VICE-PRESIDENT (SEE SG/SM/5882, ISSUED ON 27 OCTOBER). ON THAT OCCASION, THE

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MEETING WAS ALMOST TOTALLY DEVOTED TO THE DISCUSSION OF THE "FOOD-FOR-OIL" RESOLUTION. THE SECRETARY-GENERAL, AS HE HAD IN THE PAST MEETINGS WITH IRAQI OFFICIALS, URGED THE GOVERNMENT TO ACCEPT THE RESOLUTION AND BEGIN NEGOTIATIONS ON ITS IMPLEMENTATION.

REGARDING HAITI, A CORRESPONDENT SAID THAT ACCORDING TO PRESS REPORTS, EARLY THIS MORNING, A FORMER PRESIDENT OF HAITI HAD BEEN ARRESTED IN THE TOWN OF LES CAYES AND SEVERAL HOUSES WERE BURNED. WAS THE UNITED NATIONS STILL IN CONTROL OF THE SITUATION? HE ASKED. THE UNITED NATIONS WAS VERY MUCH IN CONTROL OF THE SITUATION, MR. BRANDT SAID. HE AGAIN REFERRED CORRESPONDENTS TO THE SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT AND INDICATED THAT IF ANY MORE INFORMATION ON THOSE EVENTS WAS OBTAINED, IT WOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE.

A CORRESPONDENT EXPRESSED HIS SURPRISE AT THE FACT THAT MR. STOLTENBERG WAS IN BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA AND NOT IN DAYTON, OHIO. "MR. STOLTENBERG WAS IN DAYTON, HE WENT BACK TO THE REGION TO CONTINUE HIS NEGOTIATIONS ON THE QUESTION OF EASTERN SLAVONIA AND WAS GOING TO GO BACK TO DAYTON" THIS WEEK, MR. BRANDT SAID. HE ADDED THAT, AS THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS IN GENEVA, IT WAS DECIDED THEY WOULD MEET THERE BEFORE MR. STOLTENBERG RETURNED TO OHIO.

DID THE UNITED NATIONS HAVE ANY COMMENT AT ALL ON THE HUMAN RIGHTS WATCH REPORT ON WESTERN SAHARA? A CORRESPONDENT ASKED. THE REPORT WAS RECEIVED YESTERDAY, MR. BRANDT SAID, AND WAS BEING STUDIED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PEACEKEEPING OPERATIONS. A RESPONSE TO ITS CONTENTS WOULD BE FORTHCOMING IN DUE COURSE. A NUMBER OF THE ISSUES DISCUSSED BY THE REPORT HAD ALREADY BEEN ADDRESSED. FOR EXAMPLE, THE OFFICE OF THE UNDER-SECRETARY-GENERAL FOR INTERNAL OVERSIGHT SERVICES, KARL PASCHKE, HAD PUBLISHED TWO REPORTS ON THE SUBJECT. IT WAS ALSO "VERY STRANGE", MR. BRANDT SAID, THAT THE REPORT FOCUSED ITS CRITICISM EXCLUSIVELY ON ONE SIDE OF THE QUESTION OF WESTERN SAHARA.

COULD THAT RESPONSE MEAN BY THE END OF THE WEEK? THE CORRESPONDENT ASKED. AS SOON AS THEY HAD THE TIME TO STUDY AND ANALYSE IT CAREFULLY, MR. BRANDT SAID.

WAS THERE ANYTHING NEW ON THE RWANDAN RAID ON THE HUTU CAMP? A CORRESPONDENT ASKED. MR. BRANDT SAID THE UNITED NATIONS OFFICE IN KIGALI CONFIRMED THIS MORNING THAT THE INCIDENT TOOK PLACE ON 5 NOVEMBER AND IT WAS AN OPERATION BY THE RWANDAN GOVERNMENT ARMY ON IWAWA ISLAND. THE ISLAND HAD BEEN USED BY MEMBERS OF THE FORMER RWANDAN ARMY AS A TRAINING CENTRE AND WAS ALLEGED TO HAVE 500 SOLDIERS. 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15 PRISONERS AND WAS SHOWN A VARIETY OF CAPTURED RIFLES, MACHINE GUNS, LAND-MINES AND EXPLOSIVES IN VARIOUS STATES OF REPAIR. THE UNAMIR MILITARY OBSERVERS WERE TOLD THAT 141 FORMER RWANDAN GOVERNMENT FORCES WERE KILLED. FIVE RWANDAN SOLDIERS WERE KILLED AND 13 WERE WOUNDED DURING THE OPERATION.

A CORRESPONDENT SAID THERE WAS A STORY IN U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT MAGAZINE ABOUT THE GOVERNMENT OF ZAIRE'S REARMING OF HUTU SOLDIERS INSIDE THAT COUNTRY, IN ORDER TO HAVE THEM INVADE RWANDA, WHICH WOULD TRIGGER A RWANDAZAIRE WAR. HAD THE SECRETARY-GENERAL TAKEN ANY PREVENTIVE ACTION? HE ASKED. MR. BRANDT SAID HE HAD SEEN A COUPLE OF REPORTS ON IT, INCLUDING FROM THE WIRES, BUT THAT AS YET HE HAD NOTHING SPECIFIC ON THAT PARTICULAR REPORT. THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WAS FOLLOWING DEVELOPMENTS IN THAT AREA WITH THE UTMOST INTEREST.

WHAT IDEAS WAS THE UNITED NATIONS CONTRIBUTING TO THE PEACE TALKS ON THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA THAT WERE TAKING PLACE IN DAYTON AND WHAT WAS THE EXACT ROLE OF THE UNITED NATIONS IN THOSE TALKS? A CORRESPONDENT ASKED. WHY WAS IT LEFT OUT OF THE SUMMIT? MR. BRANDT INDICATED THAT MR. STOLTENBERG WAS TAKING PART IN THE TALKS. THE FACT THAT HE HAD NOT BEEN THERE ON THE FIRST DAY OF THE TALKS WAS DUE TO HIS OTHER COMMITMENTS, INCLUDING HIS NEGOTIATIONS REGARDING THE ISSUE OF EASTERN SLAVONIA, AND SHOULD NOT BE TAKEN AS A SIGN THAT THE UNITED NATIONS WAS LEFT OUT. HE HAD NOT BEEN THERE FOR THE OPENING SESSION, BUT HAD BEEN THERE LATER AND WOULD GO BACK AFTER HIS TRIP TO GENEVA. THE SPOKESMAN DECLINED TO REFER TO THE DETAILS OF THE NEGOTIATIONS, INCLUDING ANY IDEAS CONTRIBUTED BY THE UNITED NATIONS, WHILE THOSE NEGOTIATIONS WERE GOING ON.

WOULD THE PRESIDENT OF THE INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL TRIBUNAL FOR THE FORMER YUGOSLAVIA, ANTONIO CASSESE, SPEAK TO THE PRESS? A CORRESPONDENT ASKED. MR. BRANDT SAID THAT DUE TO A VERY HEAVY SCHEDULE, HE DID NOT BELIEVE JUDGE CASSESE HAD TIME, BUT HE WOULD ASK HIM BEFORE HE LEFT NEW YORK.

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

RADIO RWANDA NEWS SUMMARY

The local and foreign journalists visited IWAWA island yesterday, to see the prevailing situation after the attack. They noticed that the ex-FAR killed were aged between 18 and 35, and some of them were in military uniforms. The island is now deserted. The 15 ex-FAR captured told journalists that they have been sent by Major KIGINA from MUGUNGA refugee camp. They arrived on the island on September 20, 1995. Journalists saw a very big military training ground. Some arias of the island were mined and one mine exploded on an RPA soldier cutting off his leg.

The International Commission of Inquiry to investigate reports on military training and arms transfer to the ex-FAR, arrived in Kigali yesterday. The commission is headed by Ambassador MAHMOUD KASSEM from Egypt, and its members are: Inspector Jean-Michel Hanssens (Canada), Col Jurgen G.H Almeling (Germany), Lt-Col Jan Meijvogel (Holland), General Mujahid Alam (Pakistan), Col Lameck Mutanda (Zimbabwe). This Commission was appointed by the UN Security Council in its resolution No 1013. The Security Council called upon the Great Lakes Governments to cooperate fully with the commission, including responding positively to its request for appropriate measures to facilitate the smooth running of inquiries, to guarantee security to the members, and the freedom and security of the witnesses who will help the Commission to achieve its mandate.

The annual financial assistance of NORWAY to RWANDA of 3 billion francs, will be channelled through NGOs and UN Agencies operating in Rwanda next year. The Norwegian Ambassador based in London, Mr Tom BRAUSEN, promised the Rwandan Prime Minister P-Célestin RWIGEMA that Norway will contribute to the construction of houses for returnees. It will also help Rwanda to establish industries to manufacture durable building material.

**Press Statement by the Chairman of the
International Commission of Inquiry**

The Security Council, in its resolution 1013 (1995) dated 7 September 1995, requested the Secretary-General of the United Nations to establish, as a matter of urgency, an International Commission of Inquiry to investigate reports of military training and arms transfers to former Rwandan government forces in violation of the embargo imposed under its resolutions 918 (1994), 997 (1995) and 1011 (1995).

The mandate of the International Commission as outlined in resolution 1013 (1995) is:

- (a) to collect information and investigate reports relating to the sale or supply of arms and related matériel to former Rwandan government forces in the Great Lakes region in violation of Council resolutions 918 (1994), 997 (1995) and 1011 (1995);
- (b) to investigate allegations that such forces are receiving military training in order to destabilize Rwanda;
- (c) to identify parties aiding and abetting the illegal acquisition of arms by former Rwandan Government forces, contrary to the Council resolutions referred to above;
- (d) to recommend measures to end the illegal flow of arms in the subregion in violation of the Council resolutions referred to above.

On 20 October 1995, the Secretary-General of the United Nations appointed the International Commission of Inquiry, consisting of:

- Ambassador Mahmoud Kassem, Egypt (Chairman);
- Inspector Jean-Michel Hanssens, Canada;
- Colonel Juergen G.H. Almeling, Germany;
- Lt. Colonel Jan Meijvogel, Netherlands;
- Brigadier Mujahid Alam, Pakistan; and
- Colonel Lameck Mutanda, Zimbabwe.

The Security Council in its resolution 1013 also calls upon the Governments of the States of the Great Lakes Region, in which the International Commission will carry out its mandate, to cooperate fully with the Commission, including responding positively to requests from the Commission for assistance, access in pursuing investigations, and appropriate measures to guarantee the safety and security of the members of the Commission and guarantees from the Governments of full respect for the integrity, security and freedom of witnesses, experts and any other persons working with the Commission in the fulfilment of its mandate.

Pursuant to the said resolution, it is our intention to make contacts with the Governments of all the States of the Great Lakes Region, as well as any other Government, non-governmental organization or international humanitarian organization that may have relevant information.

We are also particularly interested in interviewing or obtaining statements from individuals and groups with first-hand eye-witness information related to our mandate. All interviews conducted by the International Commission will take place in conditions of complete confidentiality. Furthermore, any information received would be handed entirely confidentially.

Our Commission is neutral and independent and seeks the cooperation of all parties. The Commission will carry out interviews in places the Commission finds it necessary to visit in order to carry out its mandate. Persons with first-hand eye-witness accounts can contact the Commission either directly or through any United Nations Office of their choice.

On completion of our mission, we shall present our report to the Secretary-General of the United Nations, H.E. Mr. Boutros Boutros-Ghali, in New York.



COMMISSION OF INQUIRY TO INVESTIGATE REPORTS OF MILITARY TRAINING AND ARMS TRANSFER TO RWANDA WILL VISIT FIVE AFRICAN COUNTRIES

The International Commission of Inquiry to Investigate Reports of Military Training and Arms Transfers to Former Rwandese Government Forces, was appointed by the Secretary-General of the United Nations on 20 October pursuant to Security Council resolution 1013 (1995). The International Commission will visit Burundi, Rwanda, Uganda, the United Republic of Tanzania and Zaire.

The International Commission is composed of the following members, among them military and police experts: Ambassador Mahmoud Kasseh, Egypt (Chairman); Inspector Jean-Michel Hanssens, Canada; Colonel Jürgen G.H. Almeling, Germany; Lt. Colonel Jan Meijvogel, Netherlands; Brigadier Mughid Alam, Pakistan; and Colonel Lameck Mutanda, Zimbabwe.

The Commission will have a small support staff. Its mandate, as set out in Security Council resolution 1013 (1995) of 7 September, is:

- (a) To collect information and investigate reports relating to the sale or supply of arms and related material to former Rwandan government forces in the Great Lakes region in violation of Council resolutions 918 (1994), 997 (1995) and 1011 (1995);
- (b) To investigate allegations that such forces are receiving military training in order to destabilize Rwanda;
- (c) To identify parties aiding and abetting the illegal acquisition of arms by former Rwandan government forces, contrary to the Council resolutions referred to above; and
- (d) To recommend measures to end the illegal flow of arms in the subregion in violation of the Council resolutions referred to above.

The International Commission is authorized to make contacts with the Governments of all the States in the region, as well as any other Government, non-governmental organization or international humanitarian organization that may have relevant information.

The Council has called on all States to cooperate with the Commission and to provide it with assistance and any information they may have. The countries concerned have also been asked to provide the International Commission with the freedom of action it needs to carry out its task when visiting border points, airfields and refugee camps, and to guarantee the safety and freedom of movement of the International Commission's members and staff.

The International Commission, which is scheduled to arrive in Rwanda on Monday, 6 November, will submit an interim report to the Secretary-General within three months (or earlier) as stipulated by the Council, and a final report as soon as possible thereafter.

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



RADIO RWANDA NEWS SUMMARY

Kigali, November 6, 1995 - I.L.E. President Pasteur Bizimungu closed yesterday evening the international conference on genocide in Rwanda. About one hundred recommendations were submitted by the participants to the Government. The President announced that a permanent secretariat would be set up to follow up the work of the conference and liaise with the participants. He said the latter would in fact serve as an extension of the Secretariat. Among the adopted recommendations were measures aimed at the moral and material rehabilitation of the survivors. These include the seizure of criminals' properties and indemnification by France and Belgium in view of their role in the tragedy. The Conference also submitted views on alternative systems of justice to help the Government face better the consequences of genocide. The Rwandese Head of State was grateful for the rich and varied experience of the experts at the conference, whose many useful ideas would be reviewed by the Government, together with the National Assembly and the Supreme Court, for the adoption of appropriate strategies on managing the aftermath of genocide. Stating that genocide being an international crime must be fought by the international community, the President stressed that the international coalition to combat genocide is a coalition for mankind. He thanked all participants, whom he described as potential ambassadors of Rwanda in their respective countries. His special thanks were extended to the Conference Rapporteur, Prof. William Shabas, the Speaker of the Ethiopian National Assembly, Dawit Johannes and the Conference Coordinator, Transport Minister Charles Muligande. In a subsequent interview, President Bizimungu was asked if the Government would manage to attain the recommended indemnification from France and Belgium. He responded that the essential thing is to see those countries at least acknowledge their part in wrong-doing, for without that gesture there is a risk of a repeat. Another Radio Rwanda interview featured the Minister of Justice, Mrs. Marthe Mukamurenzi, who welcomed the recommendation of instituting special tribunals, or special chambers in Courts, to deal with genocide cases. She said this would accelerate the dispensation of justice.

At the start of his address, President Bizimungu asked the Assembly to observe one minute of silence in memory of the Israeli Prime Minister, Yitzhak Rabin, who was slain on Saturday at a peace rally in Tel Aviv. It is reported that the President had earlier sent a message of condolence to the Israeli Government. The assassin is said to be a 27-year old extremist Jew of the right wing. At Today's funeral of the Israeli statesman, who was a Nobel Prize winner, there are tens of world leaders expected to pay their last respects. These include President Clinton of USA, King Hussein of Jordan, President Chirac of France President Mubarak of Egypt, Prince Charles of UK and the Moroccan Prime Minister. It will be the first visit by President Mubarak to Jerusalem since he became Egypt's President. It will also be the first visit by the Jordanian King since the rebirth of Israel in 1948.

Prime Minister Pierre Célestin Rwigyema represented the Government yesterday at a reburial ceremony to give a decent funeral to genocide victims in Butare's Shyanda Commune. He was accompanied by Dr. Augustin Iyamuremye, Minister of Agriculture and Animal Resources. The Prime Minister thanked the Bourgmestre and the people of Shyanda for their new-found harmony and for organizing this decent reburial of their dead. It was stated that the

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waves of massacres in the 60's and in 1973, and even initially showed aversion to participation in last year's genocide. Those who got involved did so under pressure from outsiders. The sous-prefet of Butare who attended the funeral called upon the culprits in the Commune to repent and ask for forgiveness.

A Ugandan by the name of Yusuf Busingye was shot dead yesterday while escaping arrest by military personnel in the Mateus area of Kigali Centre. He was reportedly caught red-handed after snatching a lady's hand-bag. The late Busingye had in his pockets Ugandan papers and a forged Rwandese Passport. Reports said he was suspected to have been a UNAMIR employee.

Abroad


Zambian authorities exhumed yesterday bodies of six children who had been slain in ritual murders that have shocked the nation. Six suspects have been arrested in connection with the killings, which are said to be motivated by the macabre trade in human organs. Some of the suspects are African and others Asian.

Prime Minister Rao of India ended his State visit to Burkina Faso yesterday, after opening an Indian Embassy in Ouagadougou and signing a trade pact with the Burkinabe Head of State, Blaise Compaore. The latter said his country would support the proposal for India to have a permanent seat on the Security Council. The Indian delegation continued its Africa tour with a visit to Ghana.

The PLO leader, Mr. Yasser Arafat, will not attend today's burial of the assassinated Israeli Premier. A spokesman for PLO said the Organization was against Arafat's attendance of Rabin's funeral, but a delegation would be sent from the Palestinian territory under the Israeli rule.
