SUBJECT: Daily and Weekly Situation Reports

REF: DPKO messages dated 7 October 1993, 11 November 1993, 251500 NYT July 1994, 251701 NYT July 1994

1. All peace-keeping missions are required to provide UN Headquarters with daily situation reports (SITREPs) and weekly summaries. Experience has allowed us to refine our information needs regarding these reports. This message is therefore intended to consolidate and update all previous guidance provided to you on the subject of daily and weekly reports to be submitted by

you to UN Headquarters New York. This message will supersede all messages listed above as references.

2. SITREPs should aim to report, in summary form, events, developments, or trends of significance affecting the mission's mandate and operations. SITREPs normally should be sent by code cable. If code facilities are not available, the regular fax channel may be used, but sensitive political and military information should be summarized in as few words as possible, with more detailed data being transmitted by pouch; a telephone call using carefully chosen language may also supplement the information in the SITREP.
3. The various sections in the weekly and daily report are included to reflect the reality that contemporary peace-keeping is often a multi-faceted activity. The length and detail in reports will vary, depending on the level of activity. In all cases, however, situation reports should be as short as possible. As a rule, daily SITREPs should normally not exceed two pages, although we recognize that particular circumstances may sometimes warrant longer reports. At the same time, the reports should "stand alone", covering all of the major aspects of the mission under the appropriate sub-headings. More detailed items, such as press clippings, news summaries, etc., should be sent under separate cover. "NSTR" (nothing significant to report) is fully appropriate for some sub-headings when there has been no development of importance.
4. SITREPs are not intended to replace the normal exchange of detailed communication between missions and Headquarters on specific or substantive matters. Issues requiring action should be the subject of separate cables intended for the relevant unit or units.
5. The daily SITREPs should cover the period midnight to midnight local time, and should be sent so that they reach Headquarters between midnight and 0500 NYT each morning. Any important incidents occurring after the SITREP has been sent should be covered by an "Update to SITREP".
6. Release of the weekly summary reports from you should be timed so that they reach Headquarters no later than 1200 NYT every Tuesday. The information in the report should cover events that occurred from end of work on Monday of the preceding week through end of work on the following Monday. In the case of the weekly reports, since the reporting period ends at the end of work on Monday evening, any developments that occur at "the last minute" can be briefly noted in the report and followed up with a "special incident report", making sure the SitCen is a recipient of that message.
7. During a complex or crisis situation, the SitCen gives frequent briefings (once or more daily) to troop-contributing countries and Security Council members, and therefore requires constantly updated information. In such situations, a mission should send more frequent SITREPs during the day, which would reduce the need for multiple telephone calls. Any major events of a serious nature, especially those likely to receive media attention, should be reported immediately

in a "special incident report", and later included in the daily and/or weekly report.

8. In addition to their use by DPKO officers, the daily and weekly reports from the field missions form the basis of reports prepared by the SitCen that are given limited circulation among senior staff and specialists within Headquarters, including the Secretary-General. To expedite the reporting process, the daily and weekly summaries should be sent directly to the SitCen as a separate addressee (Situation Centre, DPKO, New York). A list of points of contact for the Situation Centre (SitCen) is provided for your reference at Attachment A.

9. With regard to the SitCen's products, some missions have provided feedback as to the usefulness of the "In Brief". This product, *inter alia*, is written by synthesizing a variety of reporting, including routine code cables, on the assumption that particularly sensitive information is sent in "ONLY" cables. "ONLY" cables are not used in the production of any SitCen products.

10. Since the weekly SITREP system has been put into place, the DPKO requirement for a monthly summary was eliminated.

11. At Attachment B, please find the prescribed format for your reports, along with some guidance as to the specific information that we would like to see included in each subject area.

12. Guidance on the preparation of communications incorporating recommendations or requests for action is being issued in a parallel message.

POLITICAL

- Any political events directly affecting the mission or the mission's mandate. In the case of the daily reports, these developments should give the substance and significance of an event. In the case of weekly situation reports, HQ would expect to see more in-depth analytic comments on trends and broader issues when appropriate. This would include the outcome or results of meetings/discussions with major political figures. If there were no tangible results or the meeting was inconclusive, this should also be noted.

MILITARY

- Military events of significance. Examples: important military developments or actions by any of the parties since the last report (by region or sector) or any changes to mission deployment.

HUMANITARIAN

- Significant developments. Examples: aid provided or problems encountered in humanitarian assistance programmes.

CIVIL AFFAIRS

- Important developments affecting CIVPOL, mine-clearing, or UN agencies in areas of responsibility (could include NGOs if applicable), where they impact on the mission's activities, if not covered elsewhere (e.g., in the humanitarian affairs section.)

SECURITY AND SAFETY OF PERSONNEL

- Any information noted or activity observed that affects, or could affect, safety of UN personnel.
- For the weekly SITREP, report on any trends that may have emerged over a period of time.

Major logistic activities or problems affecting operations. If it is deemed sufficiently significant, this information can be included in the weekly summary as well. Such information is of interest to a wide audience as opposed to a specific problem or detail of interest to one specialist. For example, the report of the arrival/or lack of critically needed equipment (APCs, rations, etc.) or the closure of an airport during a crisis is of interest to planning, political and military officers, and the Field Administration and Logistics Division.

CASUALTIES

- Deaths and injuries. Separate military, civpol, and civilian, and classify as to whether it was from hostile action, accident, suicide, natural causes (i.e., heart attack), etc.
- For the weekly, include casualties for the reporting period and a cumulative figure for the year-to-date and the total since the mission's inception.

COMMENTS

- Special Representative/Head of Mission, and/or Force Commander's comments. (Should be included in the daily report only when appropriate.)
- For the weekly, medium-to-long term assessments and observations on the impact that reported events may have on the mission should be included. Upcoming events of significance and their potential impact may also be included.

UNAMIR - RWANDA

Time: 0800 Hours NYT 02 August 1995

MILITARY

Radio Rwanda reported that an RPA company began a training course on de-mining in RUHENGERI with the assistance of USA military experts.

RESTRICTIONS ON MOVEMENT

On 01 August, a MILOB patrol in Sector 3B was informed by the Mayor of MARABA commune that he had received instructions that future MILOB patrols should not be conducted unless they produced written authorization from the Prefect's office.

SECURITY AND SAFETY OF PERSONNEL

On 01 August, an AUSMED vehicle was stopped by the RPA in KIGALI and four Australian soldiers were forcibly removed and assaulted. One soldier was hospitalised after being butt-stroked. Their personal weapons were confiscated. The soldiers and their equipment were released one hour later.

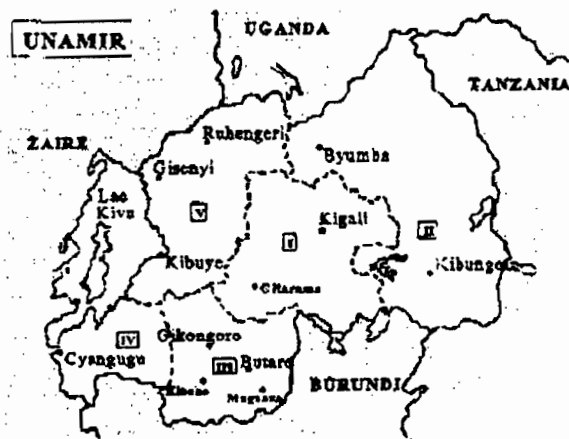

HIGHLIGHTS

► The Burundian FRODEBU party appealed to the government and the army to prevent a civil war.

POLITICAL

On 26 July, *Radio Rwanda* reported that the German Foreign Minister and Vice-Chancellor, Mr. Kinkel was expected to discuss the issue of refugees, as well as other political issues with Rwandese officials on 27 July. Mr. Kinkel has reportedly stated that Germany was satisfied with the return of normalcy to Rwanda, and that it would assist the efforts to strengthen the peace in the country and continued economic cooperation between the two countries. The Force Commander held a meeting with Mr. Kinkel at UNAMIR HQ during which they discussed, among other things, the prospects for the return of Rwandese refugees, the dynamics of the present Rwandese Government and the UN arms embargo on Rwanda.



BURUNDI: On 26 July, Burundi's former ruling party denounced what it said were "ongoing massacres" and urged the government and army to head off a civil war. In a statement read on state-run radio, the party called on national institutions to do everything possible to prevent a civil war which it said the forces of evil sought. It urged all national institutions but particularly the Government, the National Assembly, the army and the police force to do everything in their power to prevent the start of civil war. (REUTER)

On 26 July, Kenyan Foreign Minister Musyoka accused world leaders of being in a greater hurry to punish those responsible for genocide in last year's civil war in Rwanda than to avert a similar catastrophe in Burundi. The Minister said there was a great deal of one sidedness in dealing with the aftermath of the Rwandan war. (AFP)

Two South African peacemakers from KwaZulu-Natal province left on 27 July, for a one-week peace mission to Burundi, organizers said. The two South Africans, Mr. Radebe, ANC leader in MPUMALANGA and Mr. Mlaba, his counterpart in the Inkatha Freedom Party, helped broker peace in the settlement. (REUTER)

MILITARY

On 26 July, Sector 4 MILOBs reported that FRGF and INTERHAMWE forces patrolled the eastern shore of IJWE island during both the day and night. These forces have intensified their efforts to prevent refugees from returning to Rwanda.

HUMANITARIAN

On 26 July, the UNHCR has issued a revised appeal for \$263 million on behalf of the Great Lakes Region of Africa. The agency reduced the 1995 appeal from \$292 million, having received only 40 per cent of that figure by mid-year. Of the \$130 million in available funds, it has already spent almost \$121 million.

- POLITICAL DEVELOPMENTS FOR 13 SEPTEMBER 1995 -

1. Following confirmation by United Nations military observers that 109 persons, including men, women and children had been found shot dead in Kanama commune in Gisenyi prefecture, the SRSG held several meetings with senior UNAMIR military and civilian officials and other United Nations officials to coordinate UN assistance, including aid for the wounded. The SRSG stressed that efforts were underway to determine the circumstances surrounding the killings, including responsibility. He regarded the incident as a serious setback to ongoing efforts to convince refugees to return to Rwanda. UNAMIR military observers, UN Human Rights monitors and UN civilian police observers were dispatched immediately to the area to participate with Rwandese Government investigators, including the RPA and the gendarmerie, in a joint inquiry. The SRSG also met at UNAMIR HQ with senior officials from the Office of the Rwandese Vice-President and Minister of Defence to discuss the incident. The officials expressed their appreciation for the opportunity to share preliminary findings and other information with the SRSG and looked forward to the results of the joint investigation. The Vice-President and Minister of Defence, Major-General Paul Kagame, had also proceeded to the area of the incident.

2. The SRSG also met on 13 September with the Ugandan Ambassador to Rwanda, H.E. Mr. Ignatius Katetegirwe, with whom they reviewed recent developments in the country, including the visit last month of Uganda President Museveni.

3. The SRSG, accompanied by Col. Diarra, the UNAMIR Commissioner of Civilian Police (CIVPOL), met with the Rwandese Vice-Prime Minister and Minister of the Interior, Col. Alexis Kanyarengwe, to discuss among other things UNAMIR's assistance in the training of Rwanda's communal police.

PMT - KIBUYE PREFECTURE

The team during patrols of Rwamatamu Commune, visited the Commune Hospital and was informed of the complete absence of medical drugs and other facilities in the institution. UNAMIR is being requested for assistance.

PMT - CYANGUGU PREFECTURE

The team reported the presence of 185 refugees at Nyagatare Transit Camp awaiting resettlement during a visit. Among them is one refugee from Burundi, a Tutsi refugee from Cyangugu who said all her relatives were killed during the war and that it is not possible for her to be resettled in the place for fear of been killed. She appeals to UN authorities to resettle her else where in the country and if possible assist her in getting a job. Human Rights and other UN agencies involved in such matters have been informed.

PMT - KIGALI PREFECTURE

The team patrolled Kanzenze Commune and the Bourgmestre disclosed that 134 returnees from Zaire and Burundi who arrived in the Commune since 26 August 1995 could not be resettled, as their houses have been occupied by the 1959-60 returnees. However the Bourgmestre and local RPA Commander are trying to resolve the accommodation problem.

IV. TRAINING

The training of GENDARMES at the National Gendarmerie Training School at Ruhengeri is in progress.

V. CRIME WAVE

UNAMIR CIVPOL Monitoring Teams in the prefectures have reported that criminal activities have reduced to some extent.

The team reported that RPA patrol team shot at a Renault Car No BB 3093 whose driver refused to stop when ordered to do so. The driver of the vehicle following the shooting incident stopped and further enquiries revealed that he was drunk and also RPA personnel. The soldier is now under going further questions over his conduct by Gendarmerie.

PMT - RUHENGARI PREFECTURE

The team conducted patrols at KANIGI Commune and reported that in the night of the 4. August 1995 4 armed bandits, 3 dressed in Military uniforms and 1 dressed in civilian clothes robbed some locals of 11 cows and a number of undisclosed belongings. 2 out of the stolen cows have been recovered in the bush within the Commune. Investigation in progress.

PMT - GIKONGORO PREFECTURE

The team conducted patrols at KARAMA Commune and met the Bourgmestre who informed them that 436 returnees from Zaire arrived in the Commune on 24.08.1995. The Bourgmestre disclosed that the returnees are facing accommodation problems since their houses have been occupied by others who arrived earlier.

The team also reported that in the night of the 4 th september 1995 at about 2300 hrs at KARAMBO Commune 4 bandits broke into the house of a local and stole therein food, clothes and 7,000 RWF. The bandits injured the local during the incident and has since been then taken to the Commune Hospital for treatment. Investigation in progress.

PMT - KIGALI PREFECTURE

The team reported that RPA and Gendarmerie have intensified patrols in Kigali City Center with snap checks at strategic points. Reasons for doing so unknown. Investigation in progress.

PMT - KIBUYE PREFECTURE

The team reported that the patrol activities to BWAKIRA Commune could not be conducted because of two broken bridges on the main access roads. However the team gathered from 1 local on their way that RPA personnel are constantly harassing the locals in the Commune. Human Rights informed.

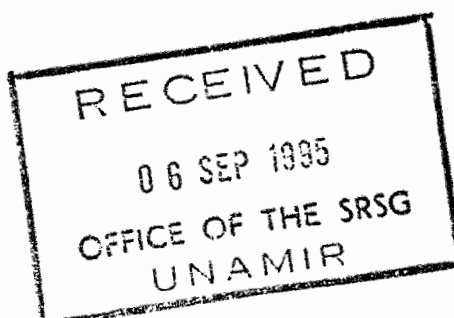

Visited RUSURORO Sector in RUBUNGO Commune and met the Bourgmestre who disclosed that 6 refugees from Zaire have been temporarily re-settled as their houses have been occupied by others who returned earlier. The Bourgmestre promised to resolve the matter soon.

c: PMT - GISENYI PREFECTURE

Ref our Sitrep memo No 734/95 of 01.09.1995 in respect of the murder of a couple at RAMBA Commune on 27.08.1995. The team reported that during the investigations the killers left a note at the scene of the incident naming the person ear-marked as the next target. The killers are suspected to be Interahamwe. Investigation in progress.

d: PMT - GITARAMA PREFECTURE

The team conducted patrols at MYABIKENKE Commune and reported that 2 inmates died in the Commune CACHOT on 28.08.1995. The inmates are suspected to have been tortured by guards whilst in the prison. Another inmate suspected to have been tortured has been evacuated to the Commune Health Center for treatment. Human Rights informed. Investigation in progress.

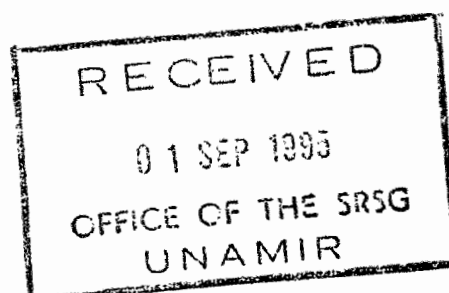

Reported that on 29.08.1995 between 1900 hrs and 2000 hrs 1 local was shot dead outside his house at NSYANDA Commune by unknown persons. Reason for the killing unknown. Investigation in progress.

c: PMT - RUHENGARI PREFECTURE

The team conducted Patrols at KINIGI Commune and was informed that 4 armed men dressed in Military uniforms suspected to be RPA soldiers have been harassing the doctor and patients at the Commune Hospital. Reasons for the harassment unknown. Investigation in progress.

The team also visited the Commune prison and found 2 inmates who have been accused of committing minor offences detained. The prison has good sanitary conditions. Human Rights informed.

d: PMT - GIKONGORO PREFECTURE

The team patrolled NSHILI and KANYAMAKARA Communes and reported that Security situation in both areas is calm..In NSHILI Commune a total of 31 refugees from Burundi and Zaire arrived in the Commune and 151 refugees from Zaire arrived in KANYAMAKARA Commune. All have been re-settled in their home Communes respectively.

The team reported that UNHCR Representative in KIBUNGO Prefecture informed them that 450 registered refugees are expected to arrive in KIBUNGO on 14/8/95 from TANZANIA. He further stated that there is information from their office in TANZANIA that some Rwandese are fleeing the country into TANZANIA from RUKIRA Commune. Meanwhile, 20 returnees from TANZANIA and ZAIRE have arrived in the commune and are awaiting to be re-settled.

The team also visited RUKIRA Commune and met the Bourgmestre who informed the team that the commune has 111 orphans who are in dire need of assistance. He also informed the team that assistance is required to repair the commune's office which was destroyed during the war.

- a. *Orientation course for 19 UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers commenced on 14/8/95.*

Reported that on 13/8/95 at about 21:00 hrs two armed bandits dressed in civilian clothes attacked two guards at ICRC warehouse and stole 95 cartons of vegetable cooking oil. The two bandits used an unregistered TOYOTA PICKUP to convey the items. Investigations in progress.

Reported that the former magistrate of CYANGUGU who is seeking for security assistance is still under the care of CIVPOL CYANGUGU pending the outcome of HR report to Rwandan GVT authorities about this HUMAN RIGHTS violation case.

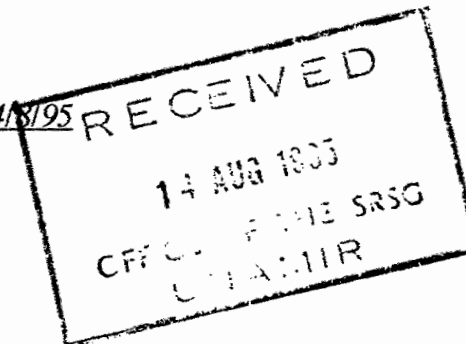

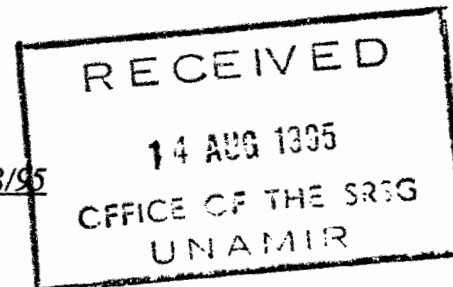

In KINIGI commune 5 locals have been detained. 2 are suspected to have participated in last year's genocide while 3 are accused of theft. Also in NKULI Commune 5 locals were detained. 2 are suspected to have participated in last year's genocide whilst 3 were accused of destroying 2 TUTSI residential houses during the war. Human Rights informed.

- c. PMT-KIBUNGO Prefecture

Visited RUKIRA and KABARONDO Communes and found the situation calm

- d. KIGALI PREFECTURE

Patrolled the city centre and was informed that some operators of illegal bureau d'échange were arrested by Gendarmes for engaging in the exchange of foreign currency on the black market.

The team also gathered that there is a directive given by the Prefect of Kigali to arrest anybody found changing foreign currency on black market no matter of his/her status or nationality.

e. PMT CYANGUGU

Reported that 3 officials of Human Rights team in CYANGUGU informed CIVPOL monitors on 10/8/95 that a local who is a former Magistrate and was detained but has now been released has reported to Human Rights Team for protection as he is being threatened by RPA.

The report further states that the Human Rights officials have contacted the Prefect of CYANGUGU to discuss the issue. The Prefect intends to see some local authorities in Kigali over the issue.

In another instance, the team was informed by the ICRC that returnees who fled the country during the war are being advised on arrival to check orphanage camps with the aim of identifying their children. The exercise has yielded good result, so far 25 orphans have re-joined their families.

b. PMT- CYANGUGU PREFECTURE

Reported that on 9/8/95 41 refugees from ZAIRE crossed into RWANDA through BUGARAMA border post and have gone to their respective home communes for re-settlement.

c. PMT- GIKONGORO PREFECTURE

Reported that on 9/8/95 C.R.S. in conjunction with CARITAS distributed large consignment of oil, beans and sorghum to orphans, old men and women in GIKONGORO.

PMT- BUTARE PREFECTURE

Reported that on 8/8/95 UNHCR brought 128 returnees from BURUNDI whilst 6 were brought on 9/8/95. The returnees are awaiting re-settlements in their home areas.

3. ABOUT 1330 HRS MALAWI S/SGT WAS DRIVING A UNAMIR LANDROVER (ON AN UNAUTHORIZED TRIP) IN TOWN WITH SOLDIERS IN CIVILIAN ATTIRE AS PASSENGERS WHEN HE VIOLATED ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATIONS. THE GENDAMARIES WERE IN THE VICINITY AND AFTER STOPPING HIM THEY APPROACHED HIM DEMANDING TO TAKE HIM TO THEIR BRIGADE HQ TOGETHER WITH HIS VEHICLE. HE REFUSED TO DO SO. DURING THE COURSE OF DISCUSSIONS A MALAWI OFFICER CAME AT THE SCENE. AS THE OFFICER STARTED NEGOTIATING WITH THE GENDAMARIES THE S/SGT'S VEHICLE FLED THE SCENE WITH ABOUT 8 PERSONS ON BOARD AND WITH THE GENDAMARIES

IN PURSUIT FOLLOWED BY THREE RPA VEHICLES. AFTER ABOUT SIX KILOMETRES FROM KAMEMBE TOWN THE RPA VEHICLE TRIED TO OVERTAKE AND BLOCK THE ROAD WHICH THE S/SGT AVERTED. LATER ON HE STOPPED AFTER BEING PRESSURISED BY PASSENGERS ON BOARD. DURING A BRIEF DISCUSSION AND OR SCUFFLE (UNCONFIRMED, SINCE STATEMENTS VARY) THE RPA OFFICER AND ONE OF HIS SOLDIERS STARTED FIRING INJURING THE TWO MALAWI SOLDIERS. ONE WAS SHOT ON THE LEFT LEG AND THE OTHER ON LEFT ARM. BOTH CASUALTIES WERE REFERRED TO GIHUNDWE HOSPITAL AND ADMITTED. THEY HAVE SINCE BEEN TRANSFERRED TO THE UNAMIR HOSPITAL AT AUSMED FOR OBSERVATION. THE DRIVER FLED THE SCENE WITHOUT INJURIES. OUR TROOPS WERE UNARMED EXCEPT FOR ONE GUARD. WHEN THE MALAWI OFFR ARRIVED AT THE SCENE, HE AND 7 OTHER PASSENGERS INCLUDING THE TWO CASUALTIES, WERE TAKEN TO GENDAMARIE STATION AND WERE KEPT IN CUSTODY. THEY WERE RELEASED AT 1805 HRS.

**MINUTES OF CIVPOL COMMISSIONER'S ADMINISTRATIVE MEETING WITH
HEADS OF DIVISIONS AND POLICE MONITORING TEAMS HELD AT CIVPOL
HQ ON 3rd JULY 1995**

OPENING REMARKS.

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, Col. C.O. Diarra CIVPOL Commissioner at 09:40hrs. He welcomed all present and informed the meeting that the security council has reviewed our mandate in RWANDA under resolution number 996 of 9th June, 1995.

He further explained that the revised mandate focuses on assisting in the rationalisation and stabilisation of the country. Thus our role will be mainly monitoring and training of Gendarmes and communal police.

In conclusion he mentioned that at the moment the recognised strength of CIVPOL is the present manpower on the ground and not the establishment figure of 120 officers.

REVIEW OF PREVIOUS MEETING

After making several amendments, the chairman observed that there were so many mistakes in the minutes. He therefore, directed that henceforth written reports be reproduced as presented by each head of division/CPMT to minimize errors.

CONTROL OF TASKS

- 1. The Administrative Assistant has been directed to appoint a clerk to be responsible for immediate typing of minutes;*
- 2. The secretary to ensure minutes are compiled promptly;*
- 3. Welfare Committee to hold meeting and submit proposals to the commissioner of police;*
- 4. CPMTs must ensure that daily sitreps are sent on time through their duty officers;*
- 5. All hand and mobile sets to be reprogrammed, starting from today.*

REPORTS FROM CPMTs AND HEADS OF DIVISIONS

CPMT - KIGALI PREFECTURE

The CPMT reported that the general situation in the area remains calm. Though armed robbery and other acts of banditry continued unabated with the international



community having the highest number of victims. Thus, the local security agencies have increased patrols and cordon and search exercises as part of internal security measure aimed at regulating the activities of undesirable elements.

He reported a noticeable increase in commercial activities. As a result of this healthy development, the central bank of Rwanda gave approval for the re-opening of two commercial banks, namely A.C.B. and Rwandese Bank for Development, Commerce and Industries.

Also during the period under review, the team monitored the return and re-settlement of 28,681 refugees/IDPs in the prefecture. Most of the refugees were from UGANDA, KENYA, TANZANIA, BURUNDI and ZAIRE.

A visit was also paid to Kigali Prison and discovered about 10,000 inmates mostly male adults, women and children suspected of participating in genocide, yet the prison has a capacity of accommodating 2000 detainees. Their present situation has been most pathetic and degrading.

In another development the team reported the visit of former Tanzania President Dr. Julius NYERERE and the discussions held with Rwandese authorities in connection with Arusha Peace-Agreement and possible reopening of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

The team also reported the circulation of counterfeit notes of 5000 Fr denomination which was alleged to have originated from Zaire.

In conclusion, the team reported that the general situation has continued to be quiet.

CPMT - GISENYI PREFECTURE

The CPMT revealed that the general situation is calm but tense in view of the constant infiltration of the INTERAHAMWE, incident of shooting and mine explosion in the area. He reported that on 8/06/95 in Rwerere Commune (very close to the Zairian border) a man was shot by RPA on patrol.

Also on 08/06/95 at about 15:30 Hrs there was mine explosion near TUNBATT HQ at Mutura. No injury to humans or damage to property was recorded.

He also reported that on the night of 7th June, 1995 armed bandits suspected to be INTERAHAMWE numbering between fifteen and thirty attacked Buzuta Cellule in Rubavu commune where they killed one local and injured several others after robbing them of their valuables.

Again, on the night of 8th June, 1995 at Kinyanzovu Sector in Rwerere Commune

there was an exchange of fire between suspected INTERAHAMWE and RPA. One RPA soldier was killed and another wounded by grenade splinters. The following morning of 9/6/95 a woman suspected to be an accomplice was arrested and when she attempted to escape, she was shot by the RPA. A local who was in the house was injured by stray bullets in the stomach and back.

Furthermore, on 24/6/95 locals of KINUNU Sector, KAYOVE Commune reported to the RPA platoon in the commune the discovering at the commune shore of the KIVU lake a boat with hand-grenades and mine. On the receipt of the information, the RPA cordoned and searched the area. Ten men suspected to be INTERAHAMWE were found in the forest. Two of the suspects were killed, others escaped, but were later arrested at MUTURA.

In another instance, on 01/7/95 at about 2:30hrs there was an explosion at Gisenyi Electrogaz and two night watch men were met macheted to death by unknown person or persons. By some conjectures, the authors of the barbaric act were alleged to have unsuccessfully attempted to destroy the Power station.

PMT-GITARAMA PREFECTURE

The CPMT reported that the general security situation is calm, compared against the previous month, especially in connection with safety of UNAMIR Property. That between the 1st June and 13th June, 1995, the sector lost 3 UNAMIR vehicles to armed bandits suspected to be RPA. The vehicles were assigned to MILOBS, MALICOY and Human Rights respectively.

It was further mentioned that the communes are witnessing increase in banditry activities especially at Masango and Murama where armed bandits suspected to be elements of FRGF cross the river Mwogo and perpetrate their nefarious activities. However, RPA soldiers have intensified patrols of the area.

Also the team revealed that at KAYENZI Commune dispensary about 500 children are suffering from malnutrition and they need serious care and attention urgently.

Also on 26/6/95 the team in conjunction with human rights assisted in the delivery and distribution of relief materials to orphans at Rugalika Sector in Runda Commune.

Furthermore, on 29/6/95 at about 01:00hrs 4 prisoners who were alleged to have attempted to escape from custody were shot dead by RPA soldiers on guard. Three other inmates sustained injuries and are presently on admission at Kabgayi hospital.

PMT-GIKONGORO PREFECTURE

The Ag CPMT reported that the situation in the prefecture has been very calm, except in some communes where acts of banditry are on the increase. The ugly acts are committed by men in military uniform suspected to be RPA. Thus, the victims of the offence are afraid of reporting the happenings to the gendarmerie brigade.

Again, about two weeks ago, in MATA Sector, some armed bandits suspected to be RPA in both military uniforms and civil dress raided the area and robbed locals of their cows, money and motor bikes. During the horrible exercise, one local called HABIMANA tried to run away and was shot dead and his corpse has not been recovered.

He also mentioned that ZAMBATT is pulling out to be replaced by MALICOY.

Finally, the CPMT requested for a computer to alleviate the cumbersome exercise of sending handwritten correspondences.

PMT- BUTARE PREFECTURE

The CPMT reported that during the period under review, the team in conjunction with MILOBS escorted relief materials to Nyabisindu, Nyakizu, Muganza, Ntyazo Communes.

The team also conducted recce along the communes bordering BURUNDI with a view to monitoring the movement of refugees.

He observed an increase in cases of car snatching and robberies targeted mainly at NGOS.

The team also monitored the visit of former Tanzanian President Dr. Julius Nyerere to the prefecture.

He concluded by saying that the situation remains calm.

CPMT-KIBUYE PREFECTURE

The CPMT reported that the general situation in the area remains calm and banditry activities along the coast have decreased considerably.

However during the period under review, the team monitored the return and resettlement of 344 IDPS from KIBEHO Camp. It also undertook series of joint patrols with MILOBS, and discovered in one of the exercises that at KINANIRA military school in Rwamatamu commune, a teacher and seven pupils were killed in connection with genocide.

He reported that on 17/6/95 at about 23:30hrs, two members of personnel of SWISS Disaster Relief were robbed a few meters from their residence by two armed men in military uniform suspected to be RPA. During the brief encounter a two door Toyota, Red in colour n° IT.6464, the sum of 160,000 Fr and a German International Passport were snatched. Though the vehicle was later found and brought to the relief organisation, the recovery was not unconnected with the fact that the coordinator of the Swiss Disaster met the Prefect and threatened to withdraw all their services if the vehicle was not found.

The team further monitored the distribution of food in the Prefecture by World Food Programme.

Finally the return of 1824 refugees of 1959/60 was monitored in the prefecture.

PMT - CYANGUGU

The CPMT reported that the situation remains relatively calm compared against previous month. And that banditry activities have remarkably decreased.

He also mentioned that during the period under review, a total of two hundred and sixty one refugees were registered by UNHCR crossing to Rwanda from the neighbouring countries bordering Cyangugu Prefecture, 254 refugees came from Zaire while only 07 came from Burundi.

The team also visited the prison and found about 2000 detainees. The ICRC is giving tremendous assistance in the feeding and sanitary well being of the inmates.

Also during the period, the prefecture witnessed the visit of the US Ambassador and President of the Republic of Rwanda. The President after addressing the locals in Kamembe Stadium, answered questions from the audience bordering on indefinite and indiscriminate arrest of persons by RPA.

Lastly, he reported that workers of CIMERWA at Bugarama embarked on an industrial action agitating for salary increase. However after a negotiated settlement, the action was called-off.

PMT - RUHENGARI

The CPMT revealed that during the period under review, the security situation was relatively calm. And that numerous combined patrols with MILOBS and Human Rights were carried out. During the exercises, it was discovered that NDUSU, BUTARO and GATONDE communes were faced with the problem of scarcity of land for returnees' settlement.

He mentioned that on 1st July, 1995, the CIVPOL Commissioner and three UNDP officials visited Ruhengeri Training School with a view to assessing the volume of repairs and redecoration required in the area/building.

He reported a serious increase in both commercial and social activities in the area, and that according to immigration records the number of returnees crossing Cyanika border have reduced.

FHQ LIAISON OFFICER

He reported that relations with other UNAMIR components have been most cordial. However there were series of complaints that CIVPOL requests are not forwarded well in advance to give room for proper preparations. It is advised that requests be submitted in good time to avoid unnecessary pit falls.

Also UNAMIR has renewed its contract with Kigali Sportif and Sporting facilities are now available for use but bookings have to be done in advance. Also, included in the recreation centre is Saturday night club for all interested UNAMIR staff.

CP PERSONNEL

The CPPO informed the meeting that there has been an improvement in the completion and forwarding of personnel forms and other official UNAMIR documents. But some officers are yet to submit their completed forms. It is imperative that attendance forms are forwarded promptly.

He also informed the meeting that the Medal Parade of the German CIVPOL contingent was coming up tomorrow 4/7/95 at the German Ambassadors' residence, Kigali. Thus the Germans will wait to undertake and complete necessary formalities towards their repatriation on 17/7/95 thereafter.

CPLOGO

He informed the gathering that he attended a meeting on relocation of CIVPOL HQ, to TRAFIPRO and thereafter submitted CIVPOL agenda and a brief after the meeting.

He reported that the entire administrative block requested for has been allocated to us and it will conveniently accommodate all the CIVPOL components. He informed the meeting that a CHECK-OUT procedure proforma has been sent to all head of divisions/CPMTs for the guidance of all personnel. He pointed that the procedure became necessary to ensure that nobody leaves the country without properly handing over all UN equipments issued to him/her. He gave a case of Maj. Diakite as an example, who after completing his tour of duty left with hand motorola and its charger.

He also said that a civilian driver has been redeployed here to help minimize our problems of running around.

He mentioned that vehicles for transportation of recruits to Ruhengeri TS have been secured and the exercise was commencing today 3rd July, 1995.

CPOO

He reported that during the period under review, there has been a great improvement in the sending of daily sitreps by all CPMTs, but however reiterated the need to send sitreps on time.


He informed the meeting that it has been directed that all radio sets are to be re-programmed by the communication department and the exercise has commenced today 3/7/95 with Kigali. Therefore all personnel must ensure immediate compliance.

Furthermore, with regards to manning our base station, all duty officers are further reminded to be conscious of their responsibilities. Leaving the duty post will no longer be tolerated. Also voice procedure on the use of VHF radio must be observed.

CPIO

He reported that during the period under review the unit did not have many cases, but however they were still working very hard on pending investigation.

The Commissioner, in his comment observed that there had been a lot of areas requiring police investigation, but it was rather unfortunate that their performance has left much to be desired.



CLOSING REMARKS

At this juncture, the chairman informed the gathering that new redeployment of personnel was in the offing and that closed down PMTs, that is, Byumba and Kibungo will be re-opened in the ongoing dispensation. Therefore, he advised all CPMTs to remain behind for the collection of the new order tomorrow 4/7/95.

Furthermore, he mentioned that the number of personnel in each PMT and divisions will be trimmed down in view of the fact that all french speaking officers will be posted as instructors to National Gendarmerie Training School, Ruhengeri. That the training of about 500 recruits will commence soonest and the cost of the whole project is being borne by the UNDP.

In another instance, he highlighted the need of having an efficient welfare committee. He charged the present committee with a shortcoming in terms of inactivity. And as a result of this, their impact has not been felt. He charged them to hold a meeting and submit proposals without delay.

OTHER MATTERS

The issue of the Training School sending their own independent sitrep or otherwise was discussed intensively and it was resolved that all information be given to PMT Ruhengeri who would in turn include same in his daily sitrep.

Again, CPLOGO pointed out that since there are English Speaking recruits and the use of interpreters in imparting knowledge has not been without serious intricacies, he suggested re-deploying English Speaking Officers as trainers with a view to solving the problem. The suggestion was unanimously applauded. The chairman welcomed the idea and instantly showed good intention to employ the opinion to accomplish best result.

The meeting closed at 1300 hrs.

Social advancement centers are on the increase in the country and have facilitated social gatherings amongst the local population in all spectrum of life, even though there are fears of movement in the night.

A joint CIVPOL/MILOBS team visited GITI Commune on 2/8/95 and met the secretary who informed that the security situation in the area was calm. The secretary also informed the team that the commune has 1300 orphans living with other families.

In another development, the team reported that 6 returnees from neighbouring countries have arrived in the commune and have been allocated land to re-settle.

He disclosed further that the population in the Commune at the moment is 30,437 as against 42,125 before the war.
