*What Ails Us  
who Teach Them?*

*Statement by the Ad Hoc Committee  
for Introducing Peace-Related Ma-  
terial at the Secondary School Level  
... to the Social Studies Curriculum  
Committee of the National Associa-  
tion of Independent Schools.*

Contemporary education at the secondary school level fails to meet the demands of a society in such rapid transition as is ours.

True, students may receive fitting preparation for the colleges which train them further for professional or business life.

In this process they are also exposed to some liberal arts. But this exposure is oriented by and large to the past.

Manifestly absent is any broad range attempt to introduce Social Studies material that illuminates the *present* and helps the student grasp the shape of *things to come*.

David Riesman's charge that our colleges "train students to be consumers" may be leveled against our high schools with equal relevance.

### **A Crisis in Understanding**

Thus it is fair to open the question whether the Social Studies curriculum as it is currently taught actually helps students to understand and constructively control our society.

Do such studies equip students effectively to confront issues they will have to deal with as leaders a few years from now?

What material is now being taught

that enables students to understand the phenomenon of war and other forms of group conflict (e.g. labor struggles, anti-war demonstrations, race rebellions, etc.)?

### **A Crisis in Survival**

In this period of transition, these factors apart, our society faces a crisis of survival produced by the nuclear revolution.

The nuclear-missile technology has advanced so rapidly that it has placed at the disposal of the military a power capable of destroying world civilization.

In contrast the social technology governing the world community is advancing at a relatively slower pace. Ithiel Pool of M.I.T. writes: "It is a cliché that the social sciences are one hundred years behind the natural sciences."

*It is a maximal responsibility of the Social Studies curriculum to help close the gap.*

### **The Gap is Widening**

This gap between the physical and social technology is widening because of the priorities arising out of our present political practices.

The continued acceptance of war as an instrument of national policy and the

consequent obsession with war production and the arms race lead to almost total neglect of more pressing problems of human existence.

What are students taught about the impact of automation and other technological advances on our society?

What do they learn about the crisis of world population and the danger to man presented by urban proliferation, agricultural chemicals, air and water pollution?

Not only is man's very existence threatened, but his environment becomes progressively less safe, healthful, aesthetic.

The consequence of this predicament is a *dehumanization of man*, most noticeable in the progressive worsening of social and physical conditions in our urban centers, and in frequent and increasingly brutal wars.

### **What Can Teachers Do to Counter this Trend?**

We need a new Social Studies curriculum that provides a realistic analysis of man's changing environment both physical and social, and by which the teacher can help a new generation to find answers and reach decisions.

To do this teachers must be trained to

understand what technology is doing to man and his environment.

*Those active in Social Studies must learn the natural sciences sufficiently well to master their implications for man and his society.*

*They must analyze society's existing social, economic and political institutions to see where and how much they need to be changed and extended to cope with the new situations that science has created.*

This analysis demands priority over further technical advances. There are now 20,000 paperbacks in the Social Studies field alone. The thirst and rewards for more factual material need tempering.

#### **Enough Bits and Pieces**

I. I. Rabi, a Nobel laureate, said, "We have more than enough bits and pieces of knowledge to form a culture, a society of majestic dimensions; we have enough information."

And Charles de Gaulle put it, "Yes, we may very well travel to the moon, but that is not really far. The greatest distance we have to travel is still within ourselves."

*Only a true understanding of his social condition will enable man to save himself. We must seek to rehumanize him.*

This Ad Hoc Committee consists of Social Studies and natural science educators in the New York City area who have met for more than a year to discuss these problems and draft this statement. It was presented in June 1968 at the Wingspread Conference of the N A I S curriculum committee in Chicago.

The Committee's services are available, if desired, to aid in the implementation of some of the ideas discussed in this paper. We would be happy to sit down with N A I S to work out recommendations for the training of Social Studies teachers in the natural sciences and for further studies by teachers of the relationship of science to society in the nuclear age.

We could furnish speakers for symposia on these topics; we could be of use in compiling a bibliography. We could make available information on courses in this area currently being conducted at the high school or college level.

"How to Get your Feet Wet."

The Ad Hoc Committee for Peace Studies is a group of teachers who have come into being in order to exchange ideas about the teaching of peace in secondary schools, and to prepare materials based upon current experimentation, teaching and research in this area. This Bulletin is the second in a series. It is designed to answer the most pressing problem confronting a teacher who wishes to explore with his pupils the problems of war and peace: where to begin?

(1) Show a film. Films are excellent curtain-raisers. They present peace issues in simple but human ways; they stimulate discussion, and thus help us and our students to define our universal problem: how to think about peace, how to convince ourselves that it is possible, how to work for it to make it a reality as a first condition of human survival.

Defining the problem is terribly important - it is in itself a huge step, because we can't even begin to think creatively about solutions until we confront and grasp the dimensions of our problem.

There are a number of fine, quite short, 16mm. movies available these days on the theme of war and peace. Peace Course Bulletin #3 will list some of these, and will discuss the ways in which they may be used.

(2) Give a lecture in the area of your own interest:

\* Problems of Democracy: read Richard J. Barnet, The Economy of Death: A Hard Look at the Defense Budget, the Military Industrial Complex, and What You Can Do about Them (New York: Atheneum paperback, 1970). It will give you a lot of ideas for a lesson or a unit in Problems of Democracy or current affairs.

\* Sociology: study Muzafer Sherif, In Common Predicament: Social Psychology of Intergroup Conflict (New York: Houghton Mifflin, 1966)

\* History: Explore the costs of war in human terms, drawing upon the area of your specialty (the American Civil War, the Thirty Years War, the Napoleonic Wars, World War I, the War in Vietnam, etc.)

\* Literature: Explore the message of literary artists with respect to war and what it has meant for humanity. Many of these masterpieces (from Tolstoy's War and Peace to Jonathan Schell's Village of Ben Suc) are available in paperback.

\* The Atomic Age: Give a lecture on "the atomic age," and discuss with your students why it is different from all previous eras in human history. Read and assign John Hersey, Hiroshima (Bantam paperback). For your own preparation use Barry Commoner, Science and Survival (Viking Compass paperback), chapter 5, "The Ultimate Blunder".

(3) Give a series of lectures on peace and war. How many, of course, will depend upon the time that you have for preparation.

(4) Give a course on problems of peace and war in the atomic age, and on the pursuit of peace as a social and political process. Involve your colleagues if you can -- perhaps an English teacher, or a biologist, a physicist, an artist -- in your venture. Maybe you can even try and pool the resources of more than one school for this.

(5) Keep in touch: send \$1.00 to cover the cost of preparing and mailing our Newsletters as they appear.

Films are the most effective tool available to that teacher who, while wishing to introduce the problems of war and peace into the classroom, or to his administration and colleagues, feels that his own background is too limited to tackle the problem by means of a lecture, or a series of lectures. To help this instructor and - we hope others - we have included a list of films that have either been used in peace courses by one of the editors of this Newsletter, or have been recommended to us. It follows that this list is limited, and that the judgments of the films are subjective.

In addition to the annotated list of films, we have also included a long list of audio-visual materials resources used for putting together an elaborate multi-media show on nuclear war and peace. This list is also incomplete and subjective, but points up that in addition to the usual (and more esoteric) commercial resources, the teacher should look to libraries, museums, universities, local and state education departments, and the U.S. government for obtaining films (often without charge). It might also be appropriate to point out that not only the purchase but also the rental of films may be paid for by federal and state funds, such as the Economics Opportunities Act and the National Defense Education Act.

It is unfortunate that the best films are often the most difficult to obtain. For example, "Neighbors" is probably the best at the elementary and junior high school level for the reasons indicated, while "Vivre - To Live" is the best for grades 10 - 12 and the college level. Both, but especially the latter, are difficult to get. Just keep asking - they're worth it.

Obtaining a film is relatively easy. What is more difficult is to utilize the film to maximum advantage. Showing a good film is not enough. It should be followed up with lively discussion. Two good ground rules to apply for optimum discussion are:

1. Preview the film first, preferably with friends and colleagues with whom you can discuss the film;
2. Never discuss the film immediately after it's over; wait at least a few minutes while the full impact sinks in. Rewind the film, potter about, call a recess. On the other hand, it's best to discuss it while it is still fresh in everybody's mind. If possible, have students participate in discussion who have already seen it before. Do not be afraid to show a good film a second time to the same audience.

Last, but not least, since many of you reading this Newsletter already have substantial experience in this area, it is important that you share your experiences with all of us. You may know of additional films that we are not aware of, or may have ideas as to techniques for showing such films more effectively.

### BUILDING THE BOMB

One hour B & W

Documentary on how the atomic bomb was conceived and built. Interesting historical document showing, among other things, how the best minds of the century were harnessed to produce weapons of mass destruction. B.B.C. (Indiana University Audio-Visual Center).

### CICERO MARCH

About 10-15 min. B & W

Useful study in intergroup violence. Blacks decide to march through a white lower-middle class, suburb. Relatively little overt physical violence because of massive presence of local police, state troopers, and national guard, but plenty of verbal abuse. The Film Group.

### DEAD BIRDS

83 min. Color

A film depicting the Dani of New Guinea. These neolithic farmers have evolved an elaborate ritualization of aggression, viz., large scale ceremonial warfare: A victim must be avenged in order to placate his ghost. When such vengeance is successful, the other side is then confronted with the same problem. Thus warfare is continuous, but restrained! The film's length precludes using it in a typical classroom situation, but for an evening it is an extremely powerful, major anthropological event. Robert Gardner (Image Resources, McGraw-Hill, others?)

### GAMES

About 5-10 mins. Color

A Polish cartoon humorously reviewing the sordid history from arrows to atom bombs. Useful at almost any grade level for discussing the problem of war. (McGraw-Hill)

### GOOD TIMES, WONDERFUL TIMES

Full Length Film

A shocking and disturbing film contrasting the gay, unconcerned life of a cocktail party with the horrors of the Nazis and World War II. For an evening with advanced audiences whose psychological energies should then be constructively harnessed. Rogosin Films.



HIROSHIMA - NAGASAKI - AUGUST 1945

16 min. B &amp; W

Made from the original footage recorded by nine Japanese cameramen following the two atomic drops. The film is gruesome and should be shown only to advanced audiences whose emotional energy (generated by the film) can be channeled to constructive action. Center for Mass Communication. 1969.

LANGUAGE OF FACES

17 Min. B &amp; W

This film depends neither on newsreel of past wars nor fantasies of future ones. It is about war which exists in the present tense -- bombs exploding in slow motion -- the turning of a million heads -- another million quiet nods to the mass production of mass destruction. Contemporary Films.

NEIGHBORS

9 Min. Color

This film is an animated parable in which two neighbors destroy each other and themselves over possession of a "flower" which grows between them. The "flower" also becomes a victim as mounting hate leads to a frenzy of mutual destruction. A very effective introduction to the problem of unrestrained violence. Probably most useful at the Jr. High School level, but can be used as a focus of discussion with almost any age group. National Film Board of Canada.

NEWS PARADE 1954

12 Min. B &amp; W

This film is part of an annual series of documentary highlights of any given year. 1954 is particularly valuable in that it shows the detonation of the first U.S. H-bomb, Dien-Bien-Phu of the Indochina war, and other items of interest. Newsreels of the early fifties demonstrate better than any other source, the public image of the cold war as viewed from parochial U.S. Teacher should explain importance of newsreel films in pre-mass-T.V. culture. Castle Films.

NIGHT AND FOG

31 Min. B &amp; W, Color.

A documentary on Nazi concentration camps. Narration in French with English subtitles. Shattering. For advanced audiences only. Should be shown only when the psychological pain can be channeled constructively. Argos, 1962.

REMEDY FOR RIOT

37 Min. B &amp; W

A pictorial essay on the Kerner Report. Also examines solutions that can be proposed to end racism and riots. Carousel Films.

THE CHARTER

14 Min. B &amp; W

Somewhat dated film reviewing the creation of the United Nations and its overall organization. Somewhat dull, but useful if used with some of the more unsettling films. (McGraw Hill, and others).

THE HAT

18 Min. Color

A comic, animated film. Two soldiers are peacefully patrolling a border, while keeping a suspicious eye on each other. The hat of one soldier falls into the territory of the other, leading to a full-scale international crisis. Obviously nations need a higher authority. Good for initiating discussions at the Upper Elementary and Jr. High School level. Film Guide available. World Law Fund.

THE SOLDIER

7 Min. B &amp; W

A soldier, weary from battle, takes time out to refresh his feet and his soul by wading in the surf. He befriends a sea gull. A single shot kills him. "A million deaths is a statistic. A single death is a tragedy." A beautiful film to question the morality of war. Father Peyton's Family Theater.

THIS SOLITUDE

This film was the Christian Exhibit at Expo 67. The facets of technological life are flashed before the viewer against a background of war, pestilence and genocide. Carousel Films, 1967.

TO LIVE - VIVRE

8 Min. B &amp; W

Newsreel excerpts of group violence circa 1938-1958. Brilliant! Probably the best introduction to the universality of war in the contemporary world. Ideal for High School, College, and adult audiences. S.N.Pathe Cinema, 1959. Contemporary Films.

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This Newsletter, up to this point, was ready for distribution when I delayed it a week waiting for a News Release from Manhattan College. The Release denotes the culmination of years of work by our colleague Tom Stonier. It records an academic "first" of important proportions and one of immediate relevance to this Newsletter's purpose. The following is excerpted from the Release of Manhattan College (N.F.G.)

"Riverdale, N.Y. -- Manhattan College has become the first institution in the nation to establish an undergraduate major in the study of peace. The new major, which will be available to students beginning in September, 1971, will be an interdisciplinary one for undergraduates 'interested in the problems of peaceful resolution of conflict and of stability in community and world affairs.'

"Described as a 'major breakthrough' by Dr. Tom T. Stonier, a professor of biology at Manhattan, the peace studies major involves a core curriculum of seven courses, totaling twenty-one credits. Dr. Stonier did much of the organizational work that resulted in the establishment of the major program.

"In addition to regular course work, students will be required to attend a weekly seminar in peace studies and conduct an independent research or field project with an advisor. The seminars will involve team teaching by the peace studies faculty as well as lectures by visiting experts.

"Dr. Stonier calls peace studies a 'rapidly developing science that encompasses many traditional disciplines.' Students majoring in the field have several career options, he explains.

"He describes the new offering as an example of far-sighted thinking. 'As society turns to the university for help, as it always has during time of stress, the need for peace studies by the late nineteen-seventies will be enormous,' he says, 'to deal with the outstanding social problem of the time -- lethal inter-group conflict.'

"With this perspective in mind, Stonier predicts students from the pilot program at Manhattan will help staff future peace studies departments in colleges and universities throughout the nation."

Dear Dr. Eklund,

Following the decision to postpone the meeting of the Scientific Advisory Committee, previously fixed for 8 September 1970, to early in the New Year, I am now writing to let you know that I should like to have the meeting on 24 and 25 March 1971 in New York. I very much hope that this date will be convenient to you. A formal agenda will be sent out at a later date, but I would mention now that the particular matters for discussion will be the arrangements for the Fourth International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy (including a review of the abstracts of papers to be presented), and the proposal discussed briefly at the last meeting of the Committee that the Committee should involve itself in studies of "the problems, political, social, economic and ecological, arising from the developments of science and technology, not only in their individual aspects, but also in their total impact on society and its future". It was suggested that the Committee should co-opt, as the need arose, some scientists from different disciplines and different parts of the world to assist in these studies. I believe that it would be premature to do this at the forthcoming meeting as on that occasion it would be preferable to discuss and define in greater detail what the scope of the studies should be.

At the seventy-seventh meeting of the Scientific Advisory Committee it was decided that the next meeting should be held in New York on September 1970. You will recall, however, that following discussions in Geneva in July, it was decided to postpone the meeting until early in 1971 as this would be a more appropriate time to review the progress being made in the preparations for the Fourth International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy.

There are two principal matters with which the SAC will have to deal next year. The first of these is the Fourth International Conference, and the second the proposals for the Committee's own future and the suggestion made at the last meeting that it should examine the possibility of a UN Conference on "Man and his Future". Professor Sarabhai has taken the lead in the latter and recently discussed it with the Secretary-General. Professor Sarabhai believes that a meeting in March or April would be the best time to discuss this, since a considerable amount of preparation will be required.

On the other hand, it would be desirable to hold a meeting early in the New Year to review the preparations for the Fourth Conference. In this connection, Dr. Eklund has written to members of SAC who are also members of the IAEA SAC suggesting that it would be convenient to hold meetings of these two committees in succession.

It therefore seems desirable that arrangements should be made along the following lines:

- 1) A meeting of SAC should be held in Geneva at some convenient date in January at a time in succession to that of the IAEA SAC, the principal business being to review arrangements for the Fourth International Conference.
- 2) A second meeting of SAC should be held in, say, April in New York to discuss the Committee's future activities and the question of a conference on "Man and his Future" (this meeting would also make a further review of arrangements for the Fourth Conference).

I shall be grateful if you would let me know if these arrangements would be convenient to the Secretary-General and if you would suggest some dates so that I could negotiate a definite time for the meetings with IAEA and with the members of SAC. The Secretary-General's presence would not be essential at the proposed meeting in Geneva, but it would be at the one in New York.

MEKONG COMMITTEE TO BEGIN STUDY TOUR OF PROJECTS  
IN NETHERLANDS AND UNITED STATES

(The following was received from the United Nations Information Service, Bangkok.)

Members of the four-nation Committee for Co-ordination of Investigations of the Lower Mekong Basin (Khmer Republic, Laos, Thailand and the Republic of Viet-Nam) will assemble in Amsterdam on 7 March, to begin a two-week study tour of water development projects in the Netherlands and the United States.

The group, comprising the members and deputy members of the Committee as well as senior Mekong secretariat officers, will:

- Spend two days studying projects and reclamation work on the Zuider Zee, and have discussions with Netherlands Government officials;
- Hold the fifty-first session of the Committee at United Nations Headquarters, and meet with the Secretary-General, U Thant;
- Have discussions with the World Bank and senior United States officials in Washington, 11-12 March;
- Make a detailed inspection of the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) project in the United States.

The four members of the Committee are: Chairman for 1971, Inpeng Suryadhay, Minister of Planning of Laos; Phlek Chhat, Commissioner-General of Planning of the Khmer Republic; Pham Huu Vinh, Secretary-General of Public Works of the Republic of Viet-Nam; and Boonrod Binson, Deputy Minister of National Development of Thailand.

The members and their deputies will be accompanied on the visit by the Acting Executive Agent of the Mekong Committee, W.J. Van Der Oord, and senior secretariat officers.

### New York Meeting

At the New York meeting on 11 March, the Committee will sign a plan of operation, providing for Phase III of institutional support for the Committee's activities from the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

Under the plan of operation, the UNDP will provide a total of \$2,518,000 (including Governments' contributions towards local operating costs), while the Mekong Committee will provide a counterpart contribution, in kind, equivalent to \$2,835,000.

The plan of operation covers a two-year period and states:

"The purpose of the Phase III project is to provide continued UNDP support to the Mekong Committee with special reference to the realization of the following specific aims: the strengthening of the Committee's roots in the four riparian countries (Khmer Republic, Laos, Thailand and the Republic of Viet-Nam); the integration of the Mekong Committee's international scheme for Mekong development with the national plans of the four riparian countries; the strengthening of the Committee as a regional institution, by increasing the proportion, quality and level of riparian staff in its secretariat; and the creation of a suitable foundation upon which the Mekong Committee can build a riparian-staffed and riparian-financed institution."

The plan names the United Nations as the executing agency for the UNDP, acting through the secretariat of the Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East (ECAFE).

Other agenda items for the New York meeting include the question of staff development, and consultations with United Nations and UNDP officials.

During the meeting, Committee members will be guests at a luncheon to be given by the Secretary-General, U Thant.

### Visits to Netherlands, Washington, Tennessee

The Committee will visit Washington on 12 March for further talks with the World Bank on possible future support for the work of the Committee. Meetings are also scheduled with senior officials of the United States State Department and United States Agency for International Development. The United States Under-Secretary of State, U. Alexis Johnson, will give a reception in honour of the visitors.

The study tours of projects in the Netherlands and the United States are being financed by the Ford Foundation.

In the Netherlands, the group will see the hydraulic laboratory at Delft; make an aerial inspection of the Europort area, the Port of Rotterdam and Delta works; and tour the southern and eastern sections of reclamation works on the Zuider Zee.

Meetings will include discussions with the Netherlands Minister for International Co-operation, B.J. Udink, in The Hague.

Following the New York and Washington visits, the Committee will travel to Knoxville, Tennessee, for a five-day intensive study tour of the TVA water and power projects. Discussions will be held with senior TVA officials on planning; state-local government relations; power systems; agriculture and fertilizer developments, and malaria control.

The study tour is scheduled to end on 20 March.

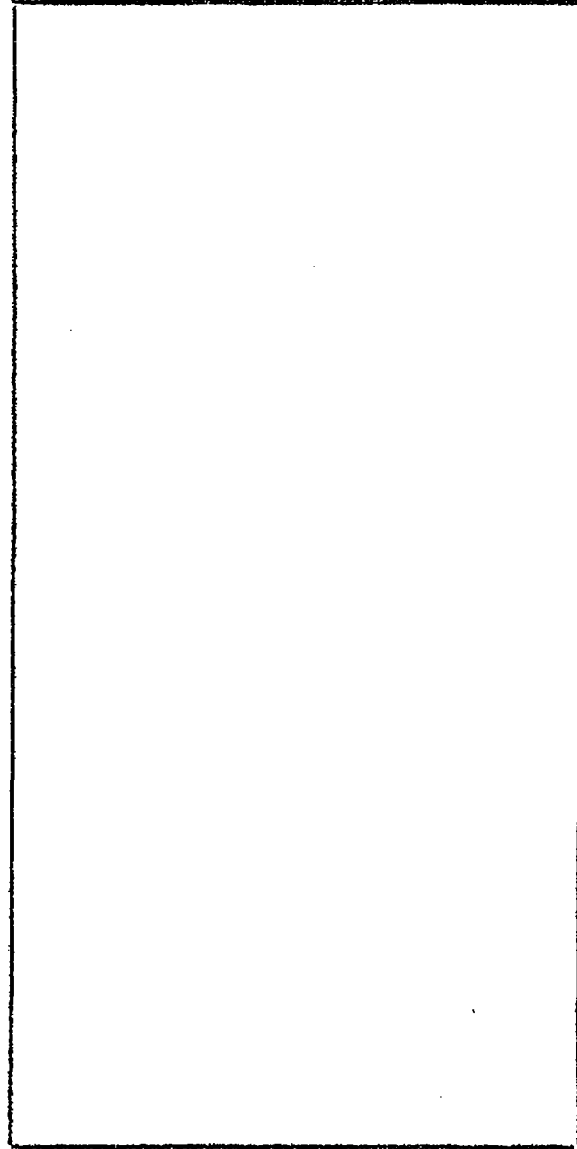

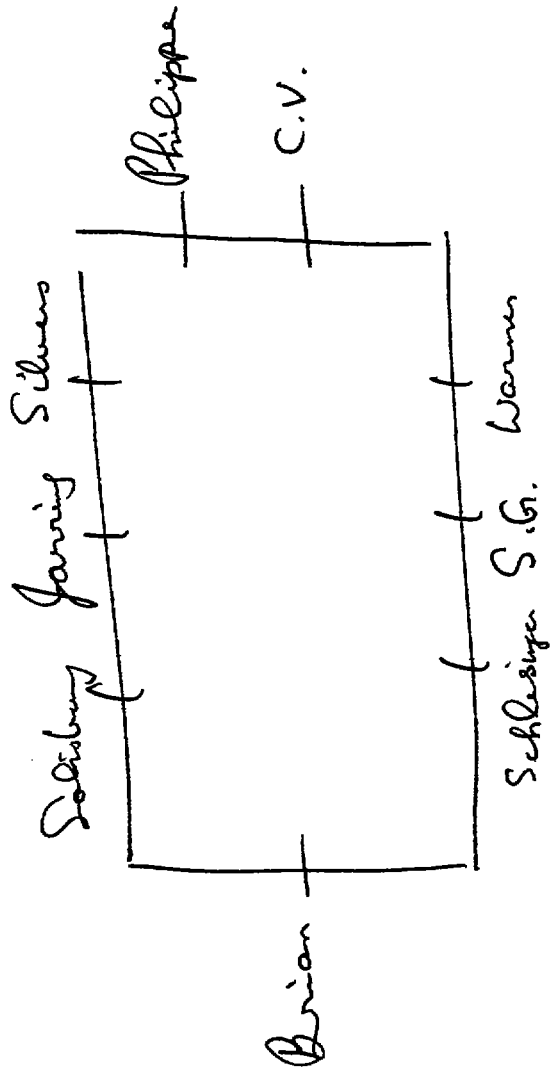
