**INITIAL OUTLINE MOVEMENT APPRECIATION FOR
THE WITHDRAWAL OF UNAMIR
PHASE 1**

Background

1. UNAMIR has been directed to withdraw half of its troop strength immediately and the remainder on 8 Dec 95. This paper is the initial appreciation into the conduct on the movement plan for the immediate withdrawal.

Assumptions

1. The following assumptions are made:
 - a. The withdrawal will be a phased operation;
 - b. UNAMIR will reallocate its priorities to achieve the mission;
 - c. The period for the operation is from the announcement of the commencement until 30 Nov 95.


Mission

2. To withdraw 966 troops from UNAMIR Rwanda by 30 Nov 95.

Conduct of Operation

3. This plan only deals with the operation of moving the 966 troops out as required the UNNY memo of 29 Sep 95. The movement plan for the withdrawal after 8 Dec 95 is being treated as a separate operation.

4. The concept of operations would be for a three phased move as follows:
 - a. Phase 1: Move of the troops from the sector to Kigali;
 - b. Phase 2: Move of the troops by air to their national location;
 - c. Phase 3: The movement of the COE to its home location;

Phase 1

5. UNAMIR has sufficient road assets, utilizing both 95 FLSG AND B&R, to conduct the move of each contingent from its current sector location to Kigali, based on:

- a. 135 personnel in each location;
- b. Approximately five containers per contingent;

Phase 2

6. In Phase 2 the MCC will move the contingents from Kigali to their national location. In this phase commercial air is the preferred option to fly the contingents home. There are two options to conduct the move, they being:

- a. Option 1: The air plan can be structured so that the moves can be approved by the LCC in UNAMIR and not have to go to UNNY, which would increase the lead time. This is the fastest and most efficient method.
- b. Option 2: To request UNNY to perform the air plan on behalf of UNAMIR. Considering the urgency of the operation this is deemed the slowest of the two options.

Phase 3

7. For the movement of the COE there are two options available, they being:

- a. Option 1: The concept will be to offer the containers as a consolidated contingent consignment to a freight forwarder for the complete move.
- b. Option 2: For UNAMIR to undertake the move. Civilian contractors have already been identified for a similar operation and they can be redirected to undertake these moves. This would entail the follows factors:

(1) The northern route through Uganda would be used rather than the Tanzanian route for the following reasons:

- (a) The road is deteriorating;
- (b) The wet season is due to start soon;
- (c) The Tanzanian elections are due to start this month and it could cause some instability;

(2) The establishment of a mov det in Kampala;

(3) The selection of the Port of Mombasa as the POD for the COE;

(4) The possible use of rail to reduce the cost;

8. Under normal circumstances Option No.2 would be the preferred option since the control would remain with UNAMIR but because the operation has to commence as soon as possible, then Option 1 is the one most easily implemented.

Air Plan

9. As previously discussed UNAMIR would undertake the responsibility to conduct the air plan rather than UNNY due to the amount of time available to mount the operation. Four of the flights would be by commercial charter i.e. Mali, Ghana, Nigeria and India. The remaining flight to Malawi flight can be performed by UNAMIR to reduce costs. The plan can be altered later to meet the operational and financial requirements.

Sequence of Withdrawal

10. The following will be the sequence of the withdrawal:

- a. Sector 3;
- b. Sector 2;
- c. Sector 5;
- d. Sector 4;
- e. Sector 1;

Coordination with Civilian Withdrawal

11. It extremely important to coordinate the contingent withdrawal so it allows sufficient time for ISS to deinduct the sectors just prior to the departure of the military. Accordingly ISS will develop a plan which will be incorporated into the withdrawal sequence, allowing sufficient time in each location for the normal functions of the civilian component to be wound down and withdrawn.

Timetable

12. There are two timetables attached to this appreciation, they being:

- a. A timeline chart showing the activities and tasks which need to be coordinated and undertaken in conjunction with the withdrawal of the military from each sector. This is the basis for the second chart;
- b. The second timeline chart depicts the overall movement plan for the withdrawal of UNAMIR elements identified for withdrawal from the sectors and Rwanda.

Cost

13. A broad calculation on the costs associated with the withdrawal of the contingents and their equipment are as follows:

a. Air plan:	\$ 760,000
b. Movement of COE:	\$ 190,000
c. Total:	\$ 950,000

Recommendations

14. Accordingly the following recommendations are made:

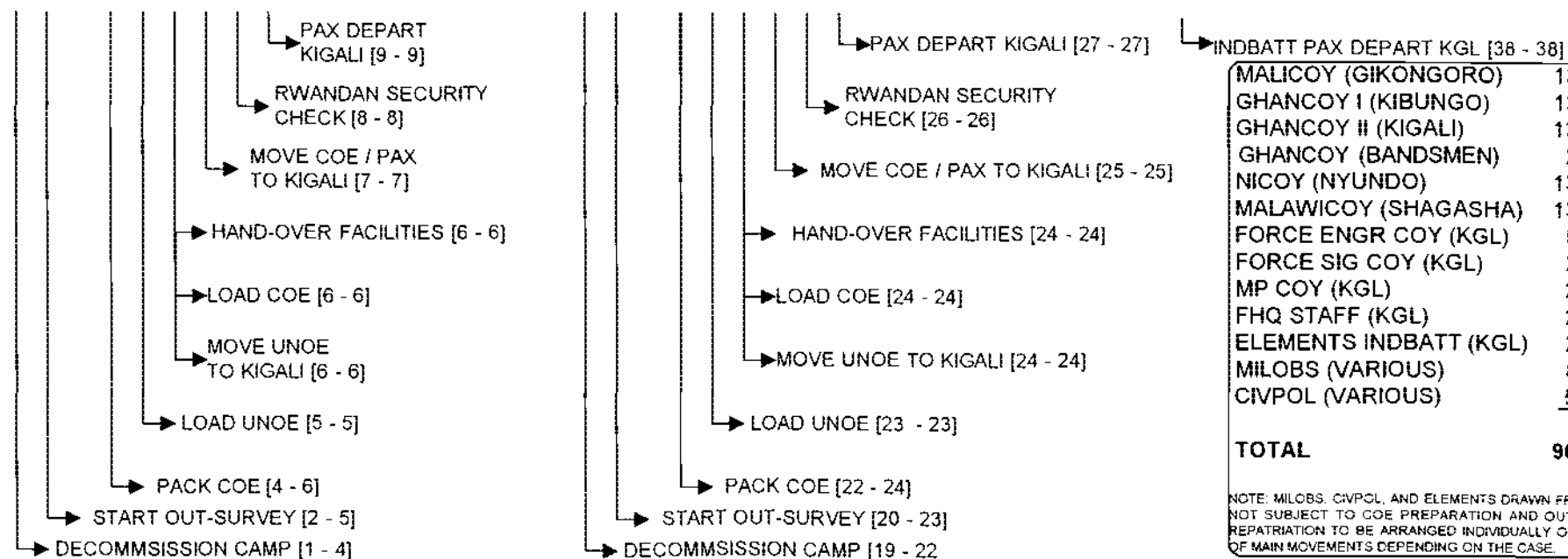
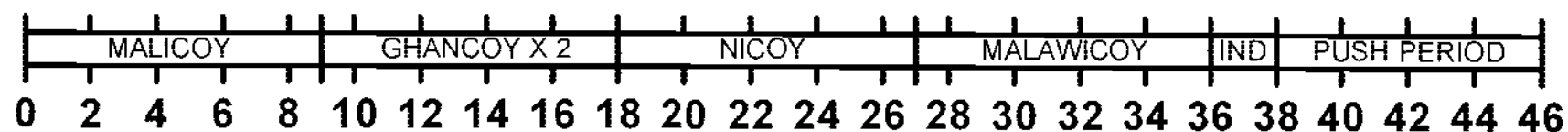
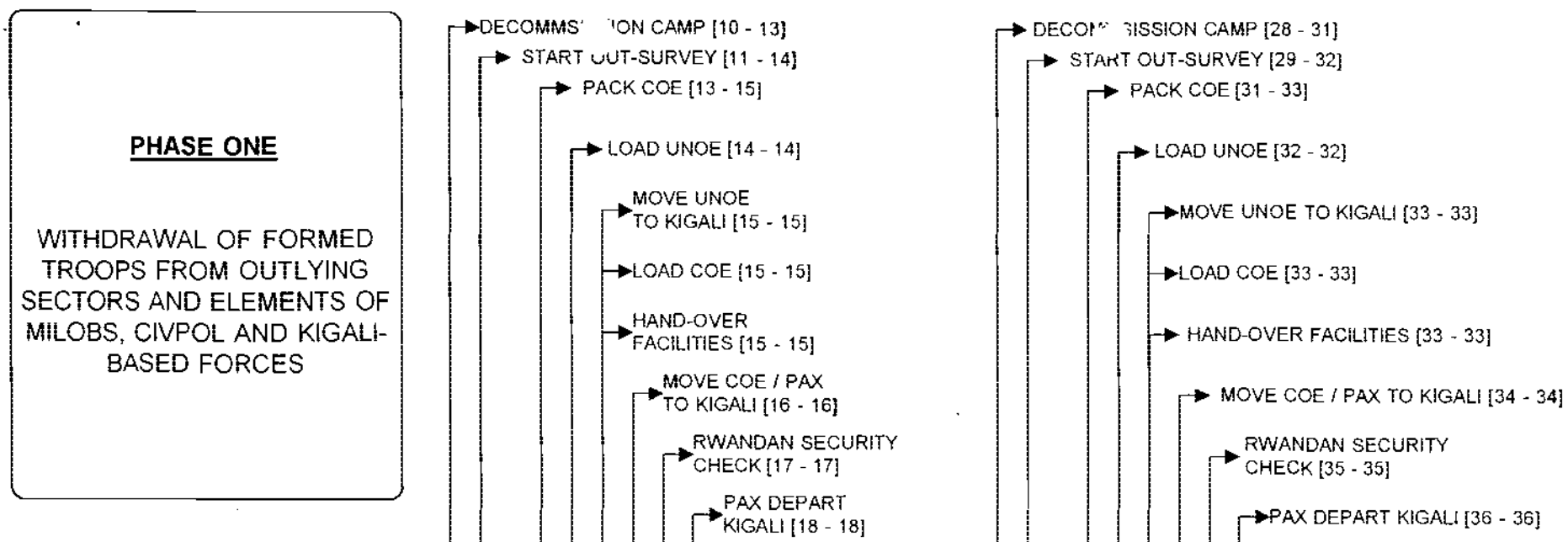
- a. UNAMIR undertakes the conduct of the air plan;


Ghana Band

Consequent to a request from the Ministry of Defence conveyed to me by Mr. Claude Dusaidy to retain the Ghana Band contingent until it completes the training of the Rwanda Patriotic Army Band, I am pleased to inform you that arrangements for the continued stay of the Ghana Band consisting of 25 persons have been made.

As you know, the Ghana Battalion was in the process of being downsized in accordance with the new mandate. As we are retaining the Ghana Band and as the downsizing has been meticulously planned in order to conform to the new mandate, the Ghana Band consisting of 25 soldier-musicians would be in excess of the agreed figures of 1,800 on October 9th until they complete their training of the RPA Band and return home.

SUBJECT: AMENDMENT TO STRENGTH OF GHANIAN CONTINGENT AFTER DOWN SIZING OF FORCE STRENGTH	

1. THE RWANDAN GOVERNMENT HAS REQUESTED FROM UNAMIR THE RETENTION OF TWENTY FIVE (25) SOLDIERS FROM GHANAIAAN CONTINGENT REGIMENTAL BAND FOR TRAINING AND SUPPORT OF ITS OWN NATIONAL ARMY BANDS WHICH IS CURRENTLY UNDERGOING SOME REORGANIZATION. IN VIEW OF THE CURRENT DOWN SIZING OF THE FORCE STRENGTH, SUCH REQUEST IS SEEN AS AN EXCEPTIONAL CASE FOR WHICH THE NEED TO ADJUST THE STRENGTH OF GHANAIAAN CONTINGENT WILL THEREFORE BECOME ESSENTIAL THUS INCREASING GHANAIAAN CONTINGENT STRENGTH TO 295 INSTEAD OF 270 AS EARLIER PROPOSED. THIS PROPOSAL DOES NOT REQUIRE BRINGING ADDITIONAL SOLDIERS FROM GHANA, RATHER, AN AMENDMENT OF THE CURRENT CONTINGENT'S STRENGTH WILL BE ACHIEVED WITHIN THE MISSION AREA. HOWEVER, THIS

B. FC Brief (Re-allocation of the Medical company strength) dated 4 Aug 95

1. At Reference A you were advised of the UNAMIR force structure and draw down plan to comply with the new mandate. In that plan a formed troop strength of 100 personnel was allocated to the medical company replacement for AUSMED. However, due to the inability of the UN to get a military replacement for AUSMED, medical support will be provided by the Norwegian Refugee Council (Level 2 hospital) from 23 Aug 95.

2. Therefore, the Force Commander has approved the re-allocation of the medical company formed troop strength (vide Reference B) as follows:

- a. INDBATT will maintain their current formed troop strength at 725 by retaining the 65 personnel that were to be repatriated over the period 5 - 8 Oct 95.
- b. The Military Police platoon will be maintained at its current strength of 58 personnel by retaining the 13 personnel yet to be repatriated.
- c. The staff officer strength of the HQ will be decreased to 42 personnel, instead of 35, to allow extra support to be provided in the area the FMO, G4, etc; and
- d. The Indian Movement Control Unit of 15 personnel will remain for the duration of the mission to assist with the final withdrawal of UNAMIR from Rwanda. This is yet to be officially approved by UN HQ New York.

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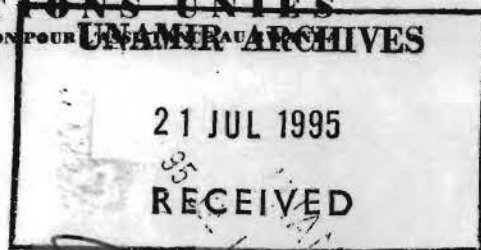

1. WE ACKNOWLEDGE RECEIPT OF YOUR FAX AT "C" ABOVE WITH MANY THANKS(.) WHILE WE APPRECIATE YOUR EFFORTS TO REDEPLOY TO UNAMIR MILOBS FROM UNOMIL, WE WOULD LIKE TO BRING TO YOUR ATTENTION THAT PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE HAS TAUGHT US THAT MILOBS REDEPLOYED TO US FROM THAT MISSION HAVE NEITHER BEEN FRENCH NOR ENGLISH LITERATE, BUT RATHER SPANISH SPEAKERS(.) AS A RESULT OF THAT, WE HAVE HAD TO RECOMMEND AND REQUEST FOR THEIR REPATRIATIONS FROM THIS MISSION(.) IN ORDER TO AVOID RECURRENCE OF A SIMILAR PROBLEM, IT WOULD THEREFORE BE GREATLY APPRECIATED IF ONLY THOSE MILOBS WHO ARE EITHER FRENCH OR ENGLISH SPEAKING WOULD BE REDEPLOYED TO UNAMIR(.)

2. GREAT INTEREST HAS BEEN EXPRESSED BY MANY STAFF OFFICERS OVER THE SURPLUS STAFF CONVERSION TO MILOBS, BEGINNING FROM THOSE WHOSE DDMs ARE IN AUG 95(.) IT IS OUR VIEW THAT IF THEIR TOURS OF DUTY WERE EXTENDED TO THE END OF THE CURRENT MANDATE, IT WOULD SERVE US A GREAT DEAL INDEED AS WE ALREADY EXPLAINED ON PARAGRAPH ONE OF OUR EARLIER FAX DATED 05 JUL 95(.) 
Subject : REPLACEMENT OF STAFF-UNAMIR HQs AND MILOBS

1. The attached fax which is dated 08 Jul 95 from UN HQs New York has reference to the downsizing of the UNAMIR Force Headquarters staff as a result of the new mandate. As we all are aware, the current number of staff would be cut down to 35 in compliance of that mandate.

2. In the past few weeks, D COS (SP) through numerous correspondences has suggested to UN HQs New York the number of staff positions which need to be retained and or DDMS extended where necessary, until the end of the current mandate. The UN HQs is taking necessary action with the various Governments whose personnel's DDMS have been recommended for extensions to seek their concurrence. In the fax attached (para 3 in particular), UN HQs New York is suggesting the conversion of the affected officers into Military Observers and would like to obtain the opinion of those concerned.



2. MILITARY OBSERVERS. THE FOLLOWING ACTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN:
 - A. THE ROTATION OF ALL MILITARY OBSERVERS IS BEING ARRANGED ON SCHEDULE.
 - B. SINCE ANY NEW MILOBS INDUCTED AT THIS STAGE WILL HAVE A TRUNCATED TOUR OF DUTY, WE ARE ATTEMPTING TO REDEPLOY MILOBS FROM UNOMIL WHERE A REDUCTION IN THE STRENGTH OF MILOBS IS LIKELY TO BE AFFECTED BY THE END OF THIS MONTH. WE SHALL KEEP YOU INFORMED OF FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS.
3. STAFF OFFICERS. WE ARE IN THE PROCESS OF REQUESTING EXTENSIONS FOR THE STAFF OFFICERS PROPOSED TO BE RETAINED BEYOND THEIR PRESENT DDM. ALTHOUGH WE APPRECIATE YOUR POSITION ON LETTING THE STAFF OFFICERS WHO COMPLETE THEIR TOUR OF DUTY IN OCTOBER CONTINUE IN THE MISSION BEYOND 9 OCTOBER 1995, WE CANNOT AGREE TO THEIR RETENTION AS THE AUTHORIZED STRENGTH OF STAFF OFFICERS WILL BE EXCEEDED FOR THAT PERIOD. HOWEVER, WE ARE CONSIDERING AN OPTION WHEREBY THE STAFF OFFICERS RENDERED SURPLUS COULD BE CONVERTED TO MILITARY OBSERVERS TO OVERCOME ANY SHORTFALLS IN THE STRENGTH OF MILOBS THAT MAY ARISE EVEN AFTER REDEPLOYING A LIMITED NUMBER OF OBSERVERS FROM UNOMIL. THIS CONVERSION COULD BE EFFECTED DURING AUGUST AFTER OBTAINING THE CONCURRENCE OF THE COUNTRIES CONCERNED. IF NECESSARY, SHORT EXTENSIONS OF THE TOUR OF DUTY COULD BE CONSIDERED TO COVER THE ENTIRE PERIOD OF THE CURRENT MANDATE.
3. SUBJECT: REDUCTION OF UNAMIR MILITARY POLICE

References;

- A. Meeting held at CO's office - MP Coy with DCOS SP, FPM and CO Force MP Coy on 16 June 1995 at 1430 hrs.

1. I feel obliged to let you know the situation of events, as it affects the MP Coy. I was caught aback when at about 1045 hrs today, the FPM called me on the radio, and asked me to reach him on land line.
 2. The FPM asked me after I had done as requested (on land line), whether I had received his letter in respect of Strength Reduction. I answered in the affirmative. At the time I had just received Reference B which was sent out yesterday. The FPM said I should call him so that we could discuss after going through it.
 3. At Reference A above, at the end of the meeting, the DCOS SP directed that I and the FPM should meet together and workout the new-look MP Coy, comprising of 30 personnel, including the Commander. The DCOS SP gave us guidelines that would help us in our selection of those to be repartirated, and those to remain as part of the 30- man team. At the said meeting, the DCOS SP said that one of us either FPM or myself would have to be the Comd of the new MP Detachment, or a MILOB is brought in to command it. But he said, he would rather the former. The DCOS SP said that the FC has a preference for me, and he does not know why. In any case, the 3 of us laughed at this remark. But, I find it embarrassing that he made such a remark.
 4. At Reference C, I wrote to express my strong views about the

drastic reduction in the strength of the Military Police from 67 to 30. I tried to convince the authority on the need to have more MPs on the ground, especially at this crucial stage i.e withdrawal phase. The impression I got, both from the FPM and the DCOS Sp, was that, the decision was final. That the MP was to be reduced to a 30- man team, no more.

5. I was really glad to hear from the DCOS Sp himself , when in the evening of 24 June 95, at the UNAMIR HQ entrance, I stopped to pay my respect, he told me that the strength of MP Coy to remain had been increased to 45 men. The following day, the FPM told me the same thing.

6. What I find really disappointing is the fact that, at the last meeting I Had with the FPM in his office, in respect of the subject matter, we had agreed that he should do some inquiries and that we will meet at a later date. The meeting at the FPM's office was held in the presence of Capt Kaunda, though he was not slated for the meeting, but he actively took part and contributed to the discuss. Yesterday, two of my officers approached me at different times, to findout about the latest as regards strength of MP. They wanted to confirm what they heard about the proposal from the FPM to the DCOS SP.

7. I dismissed it initially as mere rumour, but in-order to re-assure myself, because there had been a precedent vide References D and E respectively. The FPM denied that there was nothing of that nature. He said the issue still remained as per our last meeting in his office. He went further to inform me that he was only present at the DCOS SP office during the handing and taking over ceremony between the former DCOS SP and the new DCOS sp. I was further dazed. At Reference A, the former DCOS SP promised that he would accompany the new DCOS SP to the MP Coy as part of his farewell and to formerly introduce him, and also allow me brief him about the situation in the MP Coy. I have since been looking forward to this meeting.

8. Reference B was unilaterally done without any input from me. I consider this act very bad and un-coordinated. Taking a look at


Reference B, it probably was never intended for my knowledge. I am saying this, because my info copy was done with free hand, an after thought. Still on Reference B, the FPM gave the number to be repatriated as 16 and those to remain as 43 + 2 officers from the FPMs office.

9. I would like to state here that, how he arrived at these figures is a mystery to me. The staff in the FPM's office have never been regarded as part of the MP Coy. The FPM wants to repatirate 6 Zambian MPs out of a total of 24 and yet add 2 more from his office. Worse of all, the FPM recommended that I

should be repatriated. How he wants to justify this, I do not know. I am a Major and a staff officer like the FPM, and I was duly nominated to serve here. I arrived at the mission area on the 21 May 95. It is a common knowledge that during the FPMs' stint in the MP Coy, the atmosphere in the Coy was not conducive. Much as I do not claim to be a saint, but I believe that so far, I have had a cordial working relationship with all the officers and soldiers serving under me, in the MP Coy. I believe that I owe them a duty of justifying their stay or repatriation..

10. Finally, I would like this situation to be corrected. I believe that we are all here to do our best by contributing to the efforts of the United Nations in bringing peace to Rwanda.


SUBJECT: REDUCTION IN THE STRENGTH OF THE FORCE MP COY

Reference: FPM memo dated 13 June 1995, attached.

1. I would like to express my views in respect of the above mentioned subject matter.
2. As much as I agree that the exercise is in line with the decision of the Security Council to review the UNAMIR mandate in Rwanda, nevertheless the role of the MP until final withdrawal can not be over-emphasised. If the present strength of the MP in Rwanda, which is 67 in number, can not be complimented, it should be left intact.
3. It is common knowledge that within the next couple of months, until the 9th of December, 1995, UNAMIR will witness a drastic reduction in size, especially Military presence. It is also a probable fact that crime rate will escalate. For the sake of posterity, I believe that we should do our best to ensure security until the last minute. And hopefully, leave a legacy of security awareness behind us in Rwanda.
4. Though section 41 of the Status of Mission Agreement (SOMA) somehow limits the scope of the powers and responsibilities of the UNAMIR Military Police, to only Military members of UNAMIR. But Paragraph 8 of the SRSG's Bulletin No 1 of 17 march 1995 (which was addressed to all United nations Civilians, Crimpol and Military personnel), was more instructive on this point. However, the said paragraph 8 of the SRSG's bulletin, did not spell out all the other additional tasks the MP Coy have been coping with almost on a daily basis. The MP Coy is on the radio network for 24 hours in order to ensure that UNAMIR personnel and Rwandese alike, have a peaceful existence.
5. I would rather suggest that, MP personnel whose term expires within the next 3 months, be given an extension of stay, till the end of the mandate. This will definitely ensure continuity, and a way of showing appreciation to the force.

6. Furthermore, I have been working on a proposal for a Joint Security Task Force (JSTF) for Rwanda. This would comprise MP personnel, Gendarmerie, Civpol and the Rwandese Patriotic Army (RPA). Any depletion in the present strength of the Force, will affect the workability of this proposal.

- PLEASE REFER TO YOUR MIR 2329 OF 23 JUNE 1995.
- THE PLAN AS FORMULATED BY YOU MEETS THE REQUIREMENTS OF THE REVISED MANDATE. FALD AT THIS HEADQUARTERS ARE ALREADY IN TOUCH WITH UNAMIR MOVEMENT CONTROL CENTRE AND HAVE CONFIRMED THAT THE SCHEDULE OF ROTATION AND REPATRIATION CAN BE IMPLEMENTED STARTING WITH THE REPATRIATION OF THE TUNISIAN CONTINGENT WITH EFFECT FROM 30 JUNE 1995, USING UNAMIR AIRCRAFT FOR THE FIRST FEW FLIGHTS.
- YOU MAY NOW PROCEED WITH DETAILED PLANNING FOR THE DRAWDOWN WITH THE ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS BEING COORDINATED WITH FALD.
- THE STRENGTH OF THE MILITARY POLICE PLATOON AFTER DRAWDOWN HAS BEEN SHOWN AS 45. PLEASE SPECIFY HOW YOU PLAN TO REACH THIS FIGURE FROM THE PRESENT COUNTRY-WISE CONTRIBUTION. WE ARE IN CONTACT WITH THE PERMANENT MISSION OF CANADA CONCERNING THE RETENTION OF THE MILITARY POLICE. HOWEVER IT IS POSSIBLE THAT THE RESPONSE WILL NOT BE POSITIVE. YOU ARE REQUESTED TO ALSO ENUMERATE YOUR OPTIONS IF THAT BE THE CASE.
- AS REGARDS NIGERIA, MALAWI AND MALI, WE INTEND TO APPROACH THE RESPECTIVE PERMANENT MISSIONS TO EXTEND THE TOUR OF DUTY OF THE CONTINGENTS PRESENT IN THE MISSION TILL THE END OF THE CURRENT MANDATE PERIOD. WE SHALL REVERT TO YOU AS SOON AS WE HAVE THEIR RESPONSES.
- AS INTIMATED EARLIER, THE TROOP CONTRIBUTORS HAVE BEEN INFORMED OF THE BROAD OUTLINE OF THE PLAN. WE NOW AWAIT CONFIRMATION FROM YOU THAT ALL THE DETAILS OF THE PLAN FOR REPATRIATION OF THE CONTINGENTS OR PART THEREOF HAVE BEEN FINALIZED. BASED ON THIS CONFIRMATION WE SHALL INFORM THE TROOP CONTRIBUTORS OF THE SCHEDULE OF REPATRIATION INCLUDING THE NEED FOR REORGANIZATION OF THE CONTINGENTS STAYING ON IN THE MISSION AND CHANGES IN COMMAND AND CONTROL THAT THIS MAY NECESSITATE.

Subject: STRUCTURE OF INDEPENDENT COMPANY GROUPS

Reference:

A. G3 Plans 5000.26 (Plans) dated 13 Jun 95

General

1. Reference A advised the Force Commander's concept of operations for the formed troops under the revised mandate. It identified the requirement to have four independent company groups located at Kibungo, Nyundo (near Gisenyi), Gisakura and Gikongoro. Below are the guidelines for the structure and support of these companies.

Strength

2. The company groups are to have a strength of 135 personnel consisting of the following:
 - a. Company group commanded by a LTCOL.
 - b. Three infantry platoons (30 personnel each).
 - c. Company HQ plus a Combat Support Platoon of 38 personnel. The Combat Support Platoon is to contain a Transport Section, Maintenance Section, Supply Section, Communication Section and an Engineer Liaison Detachment.
 - d. One Medical Section consisting of RMO, Nursing Officer, Preventive Health Assistant and three medics.

Administrative Requirements

3. Transport. The following transport resources are to be allocated to each independent company group:
 - a. Four Trucks.
 - b. 21 Patrolling Vehicles (these include Mambas and APCs).
 - c. Two Ambulances.

4. Accommodation and Ancillary Facilities.

- a. Proper living accommodation for the company groups with the facilities for maintenance of vehicles.
- b. Appropriate sanitation and bathing facilities within the accommodation.
- c. For Withdrawal/Evacuation Contingencies.

- (1) Nine living tents (16 men tents).
- (2) One large store tent/two medium size store tents.
- (3) One kitchen and dining shelter.

5. Water. One bladder of 100,000 ltr capacity for potable water (including 20 days reserve) is to be allocated to each company group. The resupply will be from Kigali once a week. Any requirement of non potable water will be gained from the local resources.

6. POL. One tank of 10,000 ltr capacity that will include the reserve of 20 days. Resupply will be from Kigali once a week.

7. Combat Rations. Companies to hold 10 days reserve.

8. Miscellaneous Stores.

- a. Two generators of 40 KVA capacity.
- b. One refer (freezer).
- c. One refer container (cooling).
- d. Cooking gas and kerosene supply will be as required.

Communications

9. All independent company groups are required to provide their own integral communications. The Force Signal Company will provide communication from the Force HQ to the independent company HQ. Any rear link to the home countries is to be provided by the contingents.



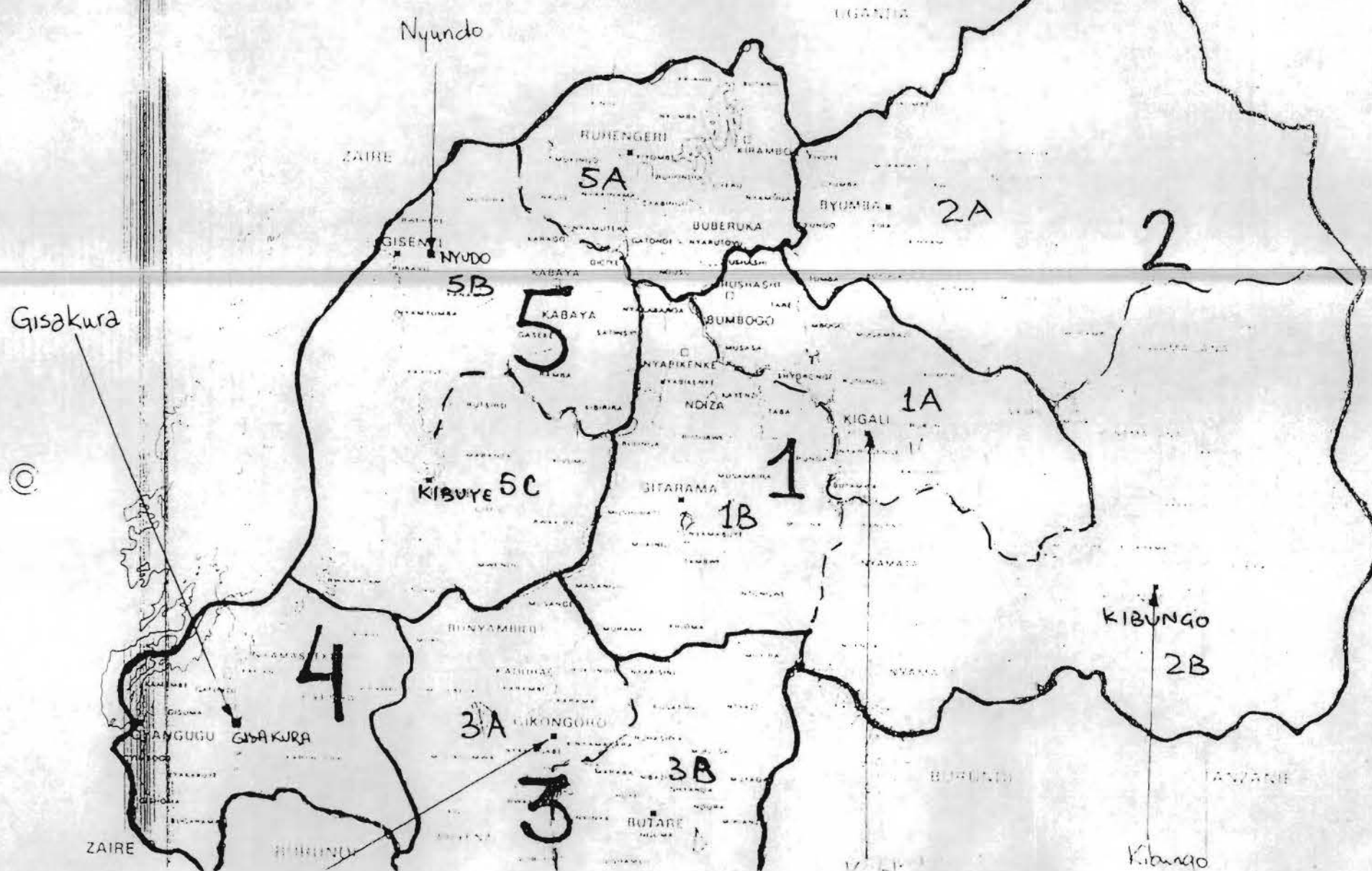
1. Reference Force HQ letter dated 13 June 95 and our dated 10 June 95 on above subject.



1. I would like to express my views in respect of the above mentioned subject matter.
2. As much as I agree that the exercise is in line with the decision of the Security Council to review the UNAMIR mandate in Rwanda, nevertheless the role of the MP until final withdrawal can not be over-emphasised. If the present strength of the MP in Rwanda, which is 67 in number, can not be complimented, it should be left intact.
3. It is common knowledge that within the next couple of months, until the 9th of December, 1995, UNAMIR will witness a drastic reduction in size, especially Military presence. It is also a probable fact that crime rate will escalate. For the sake of posterity, I believe that we should do our best to ensure security until the last minute. And hopefully, leave a legacy of security awareness behind us in Rwanda.
4. Though section 41 of the Status of Mission Agreement (SOMA) somehow limits the scope of the powers and responsibilities of the UNAMIR Military Police, to only Military members of UNAMIR. But Paragraph 8 of the SRSG's Bulletin No 1 of 17 march 1995 (which was addressed to all United nations Civilians, Civpol and Military personnel), was more instructive on this point. However, the said paragraph 8 of the SRSG's bulletin, did not spell out all the other additional tasks the MP Coy have been coping with almost on a daily basis. The MP Coy is on the radio network for 24 hours in order to ensure that UNAMIR personnel and Rwandese alike, have a peaceful existence.
5. I would rather suggest that, MP personnel whose term expires within the next 3 months, be given an extension of stay, till the end of the mandate. This will definitely ensure continuity, and a way of showing appreciation to the force.

Subject: **PROPOSED UNAMIR FORCE STRUCTURE FOR THE REVISED
MANDATE**

Reference:

A. UNHQ New York Code Cable 1937 dated 9 June 1995

1 With effect 9 Jun 95 UNAMIR has received a new mandate (Reference A) which has shifted the focus from a peace-keeping to a role of assisting in the normalisation and stabilisation of Rwanda. On this basis, the tasks that UNAMIR will undertake can be divided into:

- a. tasks specifically required to sustain a United Nations peace-keeping presence in Rwanda, mainly in Kigali; and
- b. tasks aimed at assisting the government of Rwanda in promoting reconciliation and reconstruction and in the promotion of a climate conducive to the stability and to the return of refugees.

2. In response to the new mandate, a concept for future operation in Rwanda was developed by this HQ and passed to UNHQ New York. UNHQ was requested to determine the troop contributing nations as soon as possible to allow the commencement of planning for the downsizing of UNAMIR formed troops and the rotation of personnel and equipment back to contributing nations. Extracts from the UNAMIR concept of operation are produced below for your information.

Force Commander's Concept of Operations

3. The revised mandate will require UNAMIR to reduce its formed troop strength to 1,800 personnel by 9 Oct 95 passing through a strength of 2,330 by 9 Sep 95, or sooner. The force level of 2,330 will be used as a bench mark rather than an intermediate stage in order to avoid disruption

and turbulence in redeployments. The Milobs and Civpol strengths will remain at their current authorised levels of 320 and 120 respectively. Helicopter support should remain at the current establishment of five aircraft provided by Canadian Helicopters International.

4. To achieve the new mandate Rwanda will be divided into five sectors (Enclosure 1) and UNAMIR will be structured with a reduced Force HQ, a battalion group and support services (medical, military police, logistics, engineer, signals) located in Kigali to conduct tasks to sustain peace-keeping operations. A movement control unit of fifteen military personnel will be required for a period of three to four months to supplement the Movement Coordination Centre to assist with the downsizing of UNAMIR as directed by the new mandate. These personnel must be fluent in English, be trained in all aspects of field movement (road, rail, sea, air & freight operations) and be capable of being deployed independently in small teams both within the theatre and to the sea points of departure.

5. Four independent company groups (commanded by LTCOL) will be located in Kibungo, Nyundo (near Gisenyi), Gisakura and Gikongoro to provide a focal point for the provision of humanitarian aid, assist UNHCRFOR representatives, facilitate the return and reintegration of refugees into their home communes and provide limited assistance and expertise in engineering, logistics and medical care.

Proposed Force Structures

6. The revised mandate has been approved with a total force strength of 1800 formed troops, 320 Milobs and 120 Civpol. Therefore, the following force structure is proposed:

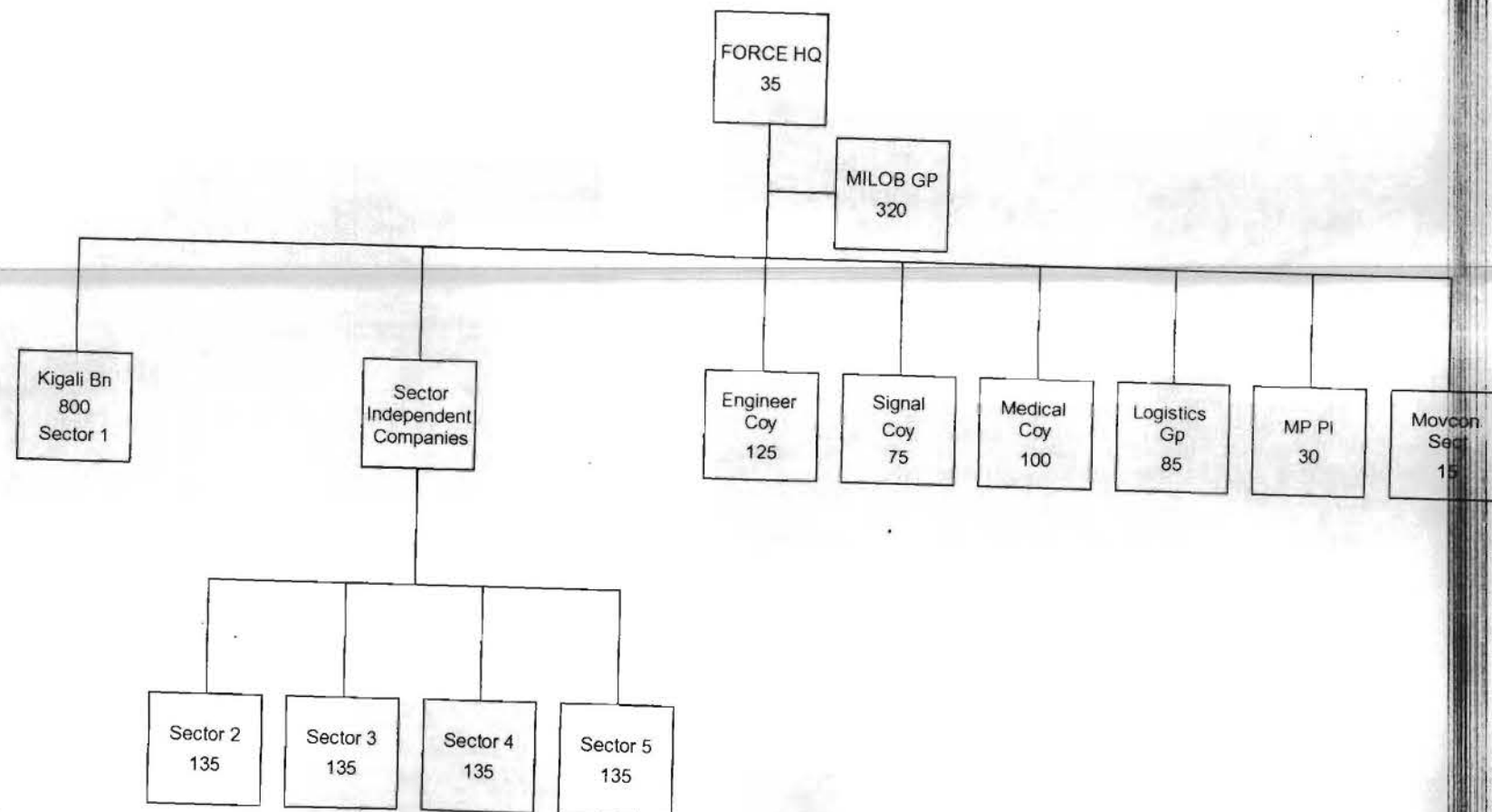
- a. Force HQ (35 pers)
- b. One battalion of four infantry companies in Kigali (800 ✓ pers)
- c. One engineer squadron (125 pers) ✓
- d. One medical company (100 pers) ✓
- e. One signal company (75 pers) ✓
- f. One Logistic Group (85 pers) ✓
- g. Four independent company groups (each of 135 pers)
- h. One military police platoon (30 pers)
- i. One movement control unit (15 pers)
- j. Milobs (320)
- k. Civpol (120)

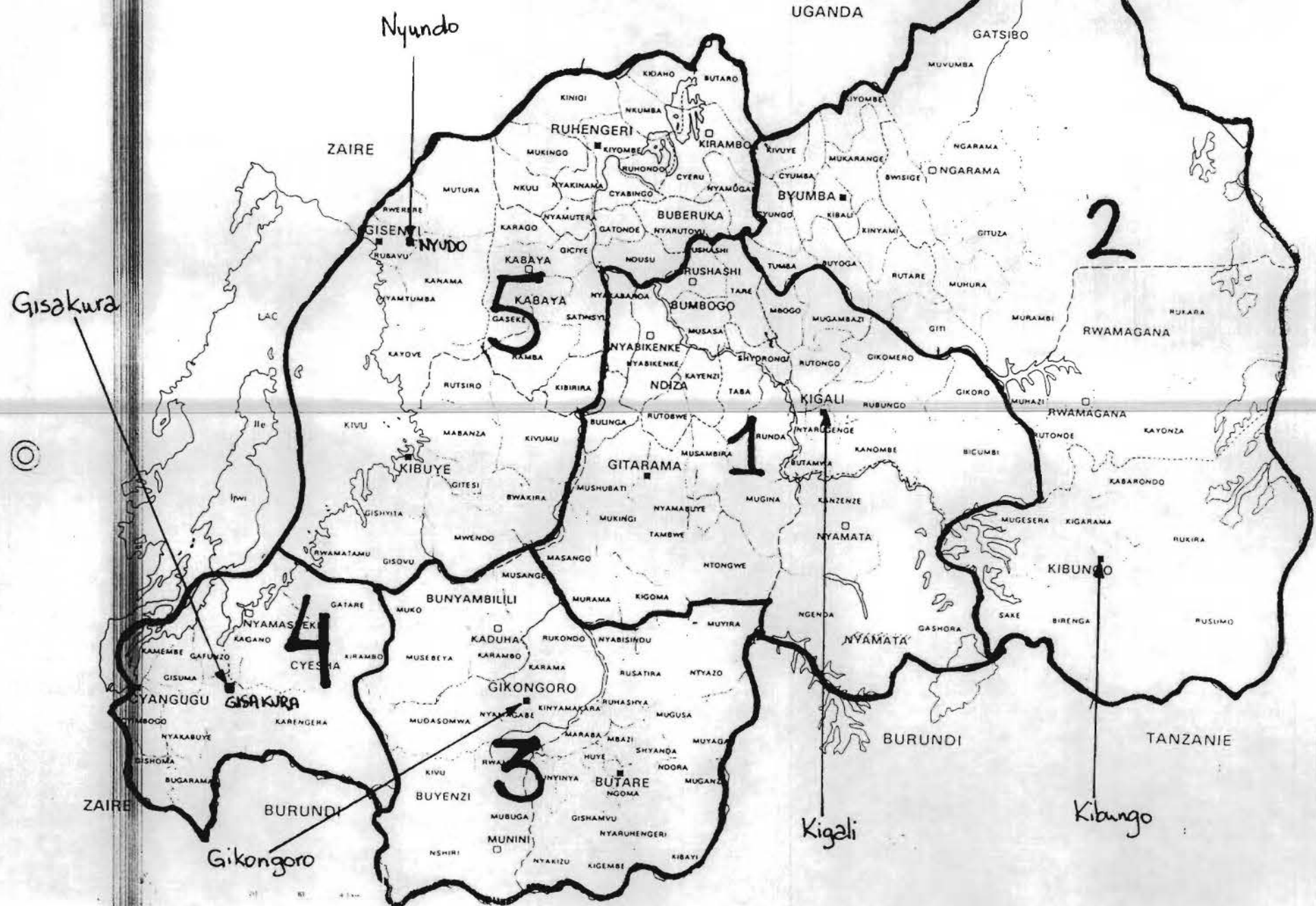

**SECURITY COUNCIL EXTENDS AND ADJUSTS MANDATE OF
UNAMIR UNTIL 8 DECEMBER 1995**

Resolution 997 (1995) adopted unanimously
9 June 1995

Text of the Resolution

The Security Council,

Recalling all its previous resolutions on the situation in Rwanda, in particular its resolution 872 (1993) of 5 October 1993 by which it established the United Nations Assistance Mission for Rwanda (UNAMIR), and its resolutions 912 (1994) of 21 April 1994, 918 (1994) of 17 May 1994, 925 (1994) of 8 June 1994, and 965 (1994) of 30 November 1994, which set out the mandate of UNAMIR,

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General on UNAMIR dated 4 June 1995 (S/1995/457),

Recalling also its resolution 955 (1994) of 8 November 1994 establishing the International Tribunal for Rwanda, and its resolution 978 (1995) of 27 February 1995, concerning the necessity for the arrest of persons suspected of certain offenses in Rwanda,

Stressing the importance of achieving genuine reconciliation among all members of Rwandan society within the frame of reference of the Arusha Peace Agreement,

Noting with great concern reports of military preparations and increasing incursions into Rwanda by elements of the former regime and underlining the need for effective measures to ensure that Rwandan nationals currently in neighbouring countries, including those in camps, do not undertake military activities aimed at destabilizing Rwanda or receive arms supplies, in view of the great likelihood that such arms are intended for use within Rwanda,

Underlining the need for increased efforts to assist the Government of Rwanda in the promotion of a climate of stability and trust in order to facilitate the return of Rwandan refugees in neighbouring countries,

Emphasizing the necessity for the accelerated disbursement of international assistance for the rehabilitation and reconstruction of Rwanda,

Calling again upon all States to act in accordance with recommendations adopted by the Regional Conference on Assistance to Refugees, Returnees and Displaced Persons in the Great Lakes Region, held in Bujumbura in February 1995,

Recognizing the valuable contribution that the human rights officers deployed by the High Commissioner for Human Rights to Rwanda have made towards the improvement of the overall situation,

Acknowledging the responsibility of the Government of Rwanda for the safety and security of all UNAMIR personnel and other international staff serving in the country,

Reaffirming the need for a long-term solution to the refugee and related problems in the Great Lakes States, and welcoming, therefore, the intention of the Secretary-General to appoint a special envoy to carry out consultations on the preparation and convening, at the earliest possible time, of the regional Conference on Security, Stability and Development,

1. Decides to extend the mandate of UNAMIR until 8 December 1995 and authorizes a reduction of the force level to 2,330 troops within three months of the adoption of this resolution and to 1,800 troops within four months;

2. Decides to maintain the current level of military observers and civilian police personnel;

3. Decides, in the light of the current situation in Rwanda, to adjust the mandate of UNAMIR so that UNAMIR will:

(a) Exercise its good offices to help achieve national reconciliation within the frame of reference of the Arusha Peace Agreement;

(b) Assist the Government of Rwanda in facilitating the voluntary and safe return of refugees and their reintegration in their home communities, and, to that end, to support the Government of Rwanda in its ongoing efforts to promote a climate of confidence and trust through the performance of monitoring tasks throughout the country with military and police observers;

(c) Support the provision of humanitarian aid, and of assistance and expertise in engineering, logistics, medical care and demining;

(d) Assist in the training of a national police force until such time as the Government of Rwanda has entered into bilateral arrangements for the establishment of other training programmes;

(e) Contribute to the security in Rwanda of personnel and premises of United Nations agencies, of the International Tribunal for Rwanda, including full-time protection for the Prosecutor's Office, as well as those of human rights officers, and to contribute also to the security of humanitarian agencies in case of need;

4. Affirms that the restrictions imposed under Chapter VII of the Charter of the United Nations by resolution 918 (1994) apply to the sale or supply of arms and matériel specified therein to persons in the States neighbouring Rwanda, if that sale or supply is for the purpose of the use of such arms or matériel within Rwanda;

5. Calls upon the States neighbouring Rwanda to take steps, with the aim of putting an end to factors contributing to the destabilization of Rwanda, to ensure that arms and matériel are not transferred to Rwandan camps within their territories;

6. Requests the Secretary-General to consult the Governments of neighbouring countries on the possibility of the deployment of United Nations military observers, and to consult, as a matter of priority, the Government of Zaire on the deployment of observers including in the airfields located in Eastern Zaire, in order to monitor the sale or supply of arms and related matériel to Rwanda; and further requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the matter within one month of the adoption of this resolution;

7. Takes note of the cooperation existing between the Government of Rwanda and UNAMIR in the implementation of its mandate and urges the Government of Rwanda and UNAMIR to continue to implement the agreements made between them, in particular the Status of Mission Agreement of 5 November 1993 or any subsequent agreement;

8. Commends the efforts of States, United Nations agencies and non-governmental organisations which have provided humanitarian assistance to refugees and displaced persons in need, encourages them to continue such assistance, and calls upon the Government of Rwanda to continue to facilitate their delivery and distribution;

9. Calls upon States and donor agencies to fulfil their earlier commitments to give assistance for Rwanda's rehabilitation efforts, to increase such assistance, and in particular to support the early and effective functioning of the International Tribunal and the rehabilitation of the Rwandan judicial system;

10. Encourages the Secretary-General and his Special Representative to continue to coordinate the activities of the United Nations in Rwanda including those of the organizations and agencies active in the humanitarian and developmental field, and of the human rights officers;

11. Requests the Secretary-General to report to the Council by 9 August 1995 and 9 October 1995 on the discharge by UNAMIR of its mandate, the humanitarian situation and progress towards repatriation of refugees;

12. Decides to remain actively seized of the matter.

NB

The UNAMIR had originally been established by resolution 872 (1993) of 5 October 1993. Resolution 918 (1994) had expanded the mandate of the Mission to include responsibility for the security of civilians and of humanitarian operation, had increased its strength to up to 5,500 troops and imposed an arms embargo on Rwanda.

By its action today, the Council affirmed that the Chapter VII restrictions imposed by resolution 918 (1994) apply to the sale or supply of arms and matériel to persons in the States neighbouring Rwanda, if such arms or matériel are for use within Rwanda. It called upon the States neighbouring Rwanda to take steps to ensure that such arms and matériel are not transferred to Rwanda camps within their territories.

In a statement to the Council, the representative of Zaire called for an independent investigation to refute the claims that his country had been involved with the sale or supply of arms for use in Rwanda. He said it was up to the Government in Rwanda to create a favourable climate for the return of the refugees.

The representative of Rwanda, speaking after the vote, called for an end to the arms embargo against his Government and for an international commission to study the problem of the refugee camps. He added that the change in the UNAMIR mandate reflected the changed situation in his country.

Background

 - tasks specifically required to sustain a United Nations peace-keeping presence in Rwanda, mainly in Kigali; and
 - tasks aimed at assisting the government of Rwanda in confidence-building and in the promotion of a climate conducive to the stability and to the return of refugees and displaced persons.
- The revised mandate will require UNAMIR to reduce its formed troop strength to 1,800 personnel by 9 Oct 95 passing through a strength of 2,330 by 9 Sep 95, or sooner. The force level of 2,330 will be used as a bench mark in order to avoid disruption and turbulence in redeployments. The Milobs and Civpol strengths will remain at their current authorised levels of 320 and 120 respectively.

Proposed Tasks and Troop Requirements - Proposed Mandate

• **Tasks to Sustain Peace-Keeping Operations**

- Provide security for United Nations personnel and facilities and contribute to the security of personnel and premises of United Nations agencies. *Currently there are twenty four section tasks and probable tasks for another nine sections. This will give a total of thirty three tasks.*
- Contribute to the security of the International Tribunal, including full time protection of the Prosecutors office, as well as those of human rights officers. *It is anticipated that the tasks of protection of the Tribunal HQ and accommodation and escorts for the tribunal members will require nine sections. No personnel have been dedicated for the protection of human rights offices.*
- Protection of NGOs as required. *Currently, there are no sections allocated for this task.*
- Ready Reserve. *Currently there are three sections allocated for this task and are located in Kigali only.*
- Command, Control and Support Elements. *Provision of command and control, liaison and planning in operations and logistics functions will require 40 personnel. Provision of a limited engineer squadron will call for 150 personnel. The provision of medical unit which would include a level one, two and three treatment facility, trained aero medical evacuation (AMF) and road evacuation crews, and preventative medicine advice through environmental health teams will require 125*

personnel. The provision of a limited signals unit to provide HQ signal support and signal detachments in some sectors would demand 75 personnel. Continuation of the Integrated Logistics System will require 85 personnel. The provision of military police support to UNAMIR will necessitate 30 personnel. A movement control unit of 15 personnel will be required for possibly 3 to 4 months to assist the downsizing of UNAMIR. These tasks will require a total of 515 personnel.

Tasks to Assist the Rwandan Government in Confidence-Building and in the Promotion of a Climate Conducive to the Stability and to the Return of Refugees

- Monitoring throughout the country with Milobs and Civpol. This will be carried out by 320 Milobs and 120 Civpol.
- Support the provision of humanitarian aid. This will be carried out by the formed troops in the prefectures and from Kigali.
- Facilitating the return and reintegration of refugees into their home communities. This will be carried out using formed troops, Milobs and Civpol in the communes and prefectures.
- Provide assistance and expertise in engineering, logistics, medical care and demining. This will be provided by the UNAMIR HQ, force logistic unit, engineer unit and medical unit.
- Limited reserves of formed troops in certain prefectures (these troops would not undertake any patrolling duties but would assist in the performance of the above tasks as required). This task will be performed by three independent companies (3 x 160 pers each) by 9 Oct 95. Due to the difficulties in communications and logistical resupply as a result of geographical dispersion, independent companies will be more appropriately supported by force elements vice unit elements.
- Assist in the training of a national police force until bilateral agreements have been reached. This will be provided by Civpol.
- Be prepared to deploy Milobs in neighbouring counties with the priority to Zairean airfields to monitor arms and military equipment supply. This will be provided by UNAMIR Milobs.

Possible Force Structures

- The revised mandate has been approved with a total force strength of 1800 formed troops, 320 Milobs and 120 Civpol. Therefore, the following force structures are possible:
