
Subject: Admission of Police and Gendarmerie into Displaced
Persons Camps.

To : See Distribution

1. In several instances difficulty and confusion has resulted when policemen or members of the Gendarmerie have attempted to enter Displaced Persons camps in the performance of their duties. It is directed that whenever such circumstances occur the military personnel available will give their fullest cooperation to the police.

2. The police and Gendarmerie will be instructed to contact the military personnel whenever it is necessary to execute any of their duties within Displaced Persons Camps.

SUBJECT: Unit Alert Force

TO : All Batteries and Displaced Persons Camp Commanders

1. General: The displaced persons camps present a constant possibility of outbreaks of such a nature as to make alert forces a necessity. The purpose of these instructions is to achieve a system whereby such an alert force can be assembled and dispatched to a desired location with a minimum of delay.

2. Unit Alert Force

a. This unit will have an alert force of forty men which will be available at all times.

b. Composition

1. Each battery has personnel which are used for functional duties or local details. Such men may be designated for the alert force provided they are available to report on one half (1/2) hour notice.

2. The batteries will be required to furnish as a minimum the following numbers of men:

(a) Headquarters Battery - - -	15
(b) Battery "A" - - - - -	5
(c) Battery "B" - - - - -	5
(d) Battery "C" - - - - -	5
(e) Service Battery - - - - -	10

3. These men may be selected from the Personnel Section, Message Center, Operations, Battalion and Battery Supply, Logistics Personnel, and Maintenance Sections.

4. Each man so selected will be informed of the procedure to be followed when he has been alerted.

5. This requirement will be met during off-duty hours so that at all times there will be the required minimum of men informed of their duties as "alert" personnel present in the battery area where they can be found without delay.

c. Individual Equipment

- (1) Individual weapons with sufficient ammunition
- (2) Combat clothing, including steel helmets.
- (3) Tear gas, smoke, and fragmentation grenades where available

3. Procedure:

a. When such a situation arises that required military aid, it will be reported by the quickest means to this headquarters. Such reports will be directed to the Battalion S-3 during duty hours (0600-1800). During off-duty hours (1800-0600), the Battalion Duty Officer will be notified at the staff B.O.O. In either case the officer notified will alert all batteries and will inform Division Artillery of the situation. (Headquarters can be reached by dialing 1327).

b. When alerting the batteries the code word, "Alert", will be employed which will be immediately sounded in the battery area. Further instructions as to transportation and the assembly point will then be issued.

c. Batteries will formulate plans for the procedure to be followed within the battery when the alert is sounded. It will include preparatory measures which will be constantly in force. In this regard battery commanders will ensure themselves that the battery alert detail has the required equipment in an accessible place.

d. The battalion officer in charge of the force (the S-3 or duty officer) will designate an assembly point most appropriate to the situation. He will designate which batteries will furnish the two (2) trucks which will be needed to transport the alert force. He will instruct the batteries which will not furnish transportation to have their details report to a battery designated to furnish trucks. This is applicable to batteries A, B, C, and Service which are all within a short distance of each other.

e. At the assembly point the battalion officer will take charge of the alert force. He will check the number of men and their equipment.

f. Guides: When the Bn S-3 or Bn Duty Officer is alerted by the DP Camp or other agency he will arrange for a guide if he does not know the camp location. Such a guide may be obtained from the DP camp. If the situation prevents the dispatching of a camp guide, a guide may be obtained from the DP office by calling Captain Reese (Phone 1473 or 1473 Extension 2). During off-duty hours the Bn Duty Officer will have to call the B.O.O. for a guide.

g. Upon arrival at the detrucking point the alert force will be turned over to the camp commander. In his absence the battalion officer in charge of the force will retain control.

h. Detrucking Point: This is a location to be designated by the camp commander where the alert force will report and detruck. It will be near the camp, but will be located under cover and out of hearing. The camp commanders will detail a man to meet the alert force at this point if he cannot do so himself.

4. Miscellaneous:

c. All battery personnel normally in the office will be made thoroughly aware of the importance of securing all available personnel immediately.

d. The significance of the code name, "Riot" will be learned by all unit personnel. When this alarm is sounded, preparation for moving to the scene of the dis-order will take top priority.

e. Batteries are further directed to alert their entire complement in such an emergency as presented herein. The requirements of paragraph 1b (2) are the T/O force. All the other available personnel, over and above those necessary for security, will be a force in readiness, equipped and standing by.

f. Extreme caution must be exercised, even in the case of serious trouble, to prevent injury to innocent persons.

GUARD ORDERS

I. General

The guard will consist of NINE (9) privates of the guard. Guard will not carry firearms.

There are THREE (3) posts. Post No 1 is HELLBRUNN STONE.
Post No 2 is HELLBRUNN WOOD. Post No 3 is BA. WHSE.
etc. NO-4 CAMP WAREHOUSE

II. General Orders

1. Guards will be in proper uniform at all times. This consists of the following:

- a. Helmet liner with net properly painted.
- b. G.D. with Field Jacket - neat and clean.
- c. Combat boots.
- d. Raincoat (when necessary).
- e. Overcoat (when necessary).
- f. Garments will be buttoned at all times.
- g. Rainbow patch and authorized chevrons will be worn.

2. Guards will report to all inspecting officers in the following manner:

Sir
Pfc John Jones
Battery A, 232d FA Bn
Guard at Camp HELLBRUNN.

3. Guards will know the location of the camp office and be able to direct all inspecting officers and messengers there.

4. Guards will not allow unauthorized military personnel to enter the camp.

5. Guards will not interfere with entrance or exit of person residing within the camp except: (1) when ordered to do so by proper authority, (2) when he suspects illegal entry by persons engaged in black market activities.

6. Guards will not allow U S Army vehicles to leave camp with P's in vehicle unless driver has pass from the office.

7. Guards will check all vehicles except recognized detail trucks for their authenticity for being in the camp area.

SUBJECT: Security in DP Camps.

TO : Camp Commanders, Displaced Persons Camps.

Camp Commanders will submit to DP Headquarters by 1700 each Wednesday the following report:

1. Quote any rumors which are prevalent among the displaced persons in your camp.
2. List arrests which have been made in the camp during the week. (Examples: illegal possession of firearms, creating a disorder, black market activities, theft, etc.)
3. a. How do you estimate the morale in your camp (low, fair, good, high)?
b. Is there any unrest or are there any disturbing factors which might lead to trouble among the persons in your camp?

This report can be written by hand or in any convenient form and will be forwarded to this headquarters (Att: S-2) by DP Headquarters.

SUBJECT: Guard Orders for Displaced Persons Camp.

TO : Commanding Officer, 194th Field Artillery Group (Atten: S-2).

1. Effective this date, the following changes to Guard Orders for displaced persons camp dated 6 September 1945, Headquarters 975th Field Artillery Battalion, are amended to read:

A. Sub-paragraph (a) of Paragraph 1 which reads: Any American Officer regardless of rank will be allowed to enter any camp under jurisdiction of this headquarters, is amended to read: Any American Officer on official business will be allowed to enter any camp under jurisdiction of this headquarters.

2. The following paragraphs of Guard Orders referred to in paragraph 1, are amended to read: To be able to direct inspecting officers and messengers to the camp office. SUBJECT: Guard Orders.

TO : All Camp Commanders.

1. The following orders are applicable to all camps:

- a. Any American Officer ^{on official business} ~~regardless of rank~~ will be allowed to enter any camp under jurisdiction of this headquarters. *He will be directed to Camp Hq.*
- b. In case an Officer is not present at the camp when an inspecting Officer enters, the senior NCO (Non Commissioned Officer) present is the Camp Commander, and he will accompany the inspecting officer during his tour of the camp.
- c. The senior NCO (Non Commissioned Officer) present will know where the camp commander is at all times and he will be able to notify the camp commander in case the inspecting officer desires the camp commander's presence.
- d. No U.S. troops will be allowed to loaf around the camps.
- e. Recommended changes to camp Special Guard Orders will be forwarded to this headquarters.
