1. Presently the HAC is organized as follows:

- a. Chief Humanitarian Officer (CHAO) - MILOB - Lt Col Austria
- b. Humanitarian Operations Officer - MILOB - Maj - Canada
- c. Humanitarian Field/Liaison Officer - MILOB - Capt - Canada
- d. Humanitarian Field/Liaison Officer - MILOB - Capt - Nigeria
- e. Staff Officer Clerk - Staff - SSgt - Ghana

2. The tasks and organization of the HAC were reviewed in late Jun 94 to account for the expanded UNAMIR force and were approved by the Force Commander, Gen Dallaire. The organization however was never established due to the war ending. Tasks for the HAC were outlined in OpO 18 dated 31 Aug and were revised based on the actual situation in September and included in OpO 20 dated 06 Oct 94.

3. The tasks for the cell were last reviewed by the HAC on 06 Feb 95 at the request of the UNAMIR Plans Cell. The tasks were approved and were to be included in a forthcoming OpO 21.

4. Presently, the following organizations conduct humanitarian co-ordination operations for the UN:

- a. The Humanitarian Offices of the SRSG
- b. UNREO
- c. the IOC under the auspices of Op RETOUR
- d. the HAC for the FC and in assistance to UNREO
- e. all Milobs deployed for their Sector Commanders

5. The HAC has been performing its duties to date based on OpO 20 however the major tasks are as follows:

- a. Patrolling throughout the country to address specific humanitarian problems as planned by the CHAO, as

directed by the FC or UNAMIR HQ or as requested by UNREO and the IOC.

- b. Providing advice and arranging security for humanitarian operations co-ordinated by UNREO.
- c. Providing advice and arranging security for NGO organizations conducting humanitarian operations.
- d. Collating humanitarian information forwarded by Sectors and formed troops, analyzing it, investigating when required and forwarding the information to UNREO for co-ordination and action.
- e. Conducting follow-up patrols to confirm the effectiveness of humanitarian action concerning major humanitarian problems and informing FC, Force HQ and UNREO.
- f. Providing advice to Sector humanitarian representatives.
- g. Conducting specific tasks for the SRSG however the cell has not received any tasks in this field for some months.
- h. Providing advice to the IOC concerning Op RETOUR.

6. All tasks remain valid in the view of the HAC. If the tasks are not valid then the cell should be disbanded and all humanitarian information should be collated by a staff officer at Force HQ and referred to UNREO for action. Follow-up would be strictly between the SRSG and UNREO with UNAMIR providing only security as requested.

7. If the cell is to be retained then it must be manned to conduct the above tasks to a high standard yet still be capable of having the flexibility to provide for the morale of the cell in the area of CTO and leave and an ability to react to unforeseen circumstances.

8. To continue performing its tasks to a high standard the HAC must have access to communications capable of contacting all Sectors. It requires a staff as follows:

- a. A CHAO to direct the cell and interface with senior representatives of the UN and NGO agencies, the Office of the SRSG and the Government.
- b. An Operations Officer to plan operations on behalf of the CHAO and to formulate plans for future operations.
- c. Three staff officers to collate information for FHQ. The officers should include an engineer to advise on infrastructure and mines as required and an UNCIVPOL to interact with local authorities for humanitarian organizations.

- d. A secretary and clerk for cell administrative control.
- e. A Rwandese interpreter to translate as required.
- f. Three Milob patrols of three Milobs each to patrol throughout the country to address specific concerns of the FC, the CHAO, the SRSG, UNREO or the IOC. Three patrols are necessary to ensure continuous operations while taking into account CTO and leave. These Milobs would result in teams versant with the humanitarian situation throughout the country, well known by UN and NGO agency senior representatives, focused on humanitarian operations and capable of being dedicated to a specific humanitarian problem until rectified.

9. Op RETOUR has been and continues to be seen as an UNREO initiative. They control the operation and have been giving more and more responsibility to the Government. While the ideals of the operation were good, it is felt that it perhaps did not take into account the number of IDPs who are unwilling to return to their communes due to participation in the killings in April.


10. Op RETOUR could well be considered as a fine effort by the international community but an operation which has not met its aim. To this end, it is likely that the Government will now take over and come up with a strategy which will see to the closure of the camps in a different manner albeit short of closing them by force. UNREO will continue to provide advice and support to the Government through participation in the IOC.

11. The CHAO should attend all planning meetings organized by the IOC in the same manner as the OPI Op Retour did prior to his re-patriation. In addition the HAC should perform the following:

- a. Attend the daily coord meeting at the IOC and brief the FC on plans discussed and implemented.
- b. Conduct patrolling in conjunction with UNREO and the Government to verify conditions in the communes and camps.
- c. Advise UNREO on security arrangements for the operation.
- d. Assist the IOC in strategies for improving the operation and advising FHQ of discussions in this area as well as the office of the SRSG as required. consultation with the office of the SRSG.
- e. There is no requirement for permanent HAC presence in the IOC at this time. However, if required the staff officers could report there on a rotating basis.
- f. A full briefing on Op RETOUR by HAC Ops to include difficulties observed and expected would be the best way to explain the exact participation of the HAC.

12. A meeting should be held soonest to co-ordinate the

activities of the agencies cited in para 4 as considerable
overlap and confusion exists at present.

DAILY REPORT ON RADIO RWANDA PROGRAMMES

Kigali, March 10, 1995 - The Rwandese Foreign Minister, Mr. Anastase Gasana on Thursday held talks with the Belgian Ambassador to Rwanda, Mr. Frank de Koninck. Their talks focused on the Belgian contribution to assist the Rwandese judicial system and educational system.

Mr. Gasana also on Thursday met the Resident Representative of the UN Development Programme (UNDP), Mr. Sukeiro Hasekawa and they discussed the implementation of the Geneva resolutions on the rebuilding of Rwanda.

Mr. Hasekawa announced that UNDP was going to set up a permanent secretariat to follow up the implementation of the Geneva resolutions.

- The Rwandese Minister of Information, Mr. Jean Baptiste Nkuriyingoma, on Thursday held a meeting with members of the national commission on the press. It was announced that three radio stations, namely Radio Agatashya, Radio Ubumwe of Kabgayi Roman Catholic Diocese, and Radio RDH of Cladho human rights group, two television stations, namely Videocam and Tele-Peace, had officially requested the authorisation to start broadcasting in Rwanda.

Mr. Nkuriyingoma expressed his satisfaction over the progress of the work of the commission on the press, whose document was ready to be discussed by the cabinet meeting.

The members of the Rwandese national commission on the press expressed their concern over the spread of writings in the Rwandese press of which the content is contrary to the spirit of national reconciliation.

- The UNAMIR Force Commander, General Guy Tousignant on Thursday met the Prefect of Byumba, Mr. Deus Kagiraneza, and they discussed the incident of a grenade attack on Sunday on the UNAMIR compound in Byumba.



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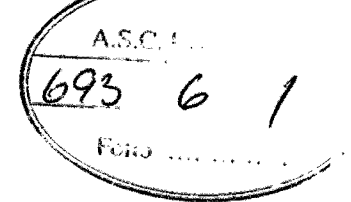

to the Security Council on UNAMIR



As you are aware, the Security Council, by its resolution 965 of 30 November 1994, requested the Secretary-General to report to the Council by 9 February 1995 and 9 April 1995 on UNAMIR's discharge of its mandate, the safety of populations at risk, the humanitarian situation and progress towards the repatriation of refugees. In this connection, Headquarters has informed us that it expects our draft of the proposed report for 9 April to reach New York by 27 March, at the latest. Accordingly, you are kindly requested to submit your contributions covering your respective area(s) of responsibility to me, with a copy to the Political Adviser, Mr. Sammy Kum Buo, no later than 10 a.m. on Monday, 13 March.

Your contributions should cover developments since the Secretary-General's last progress report to the Security Council on 6 February 1995 (Document S/1995/107), and reflect progress made and/or difficulties encountered in the implementation of the mandate entrusted to UNAMIR under Security Council resolution 965. In this connection, emphasis should be paid to specific aspects covered in the said resolution, especially those relating to the provision of security for human rights monitors, training of a new, integrated national police force, cooperation of the Government with UNAMIR in the implementation of its mandate and in particular in ensuring unimpeded access to all areas of Rwanda by UNAMIR forces and personnel of the international tribunal and human rights observers, the operation of Radio UNAMIR, the status of arrangements for the establishment of an effective mine clearance programme, resources needed to meet immediate needs of the Government, and any other requirements still needed for UNAMIR to carry out the extended and expanded mandate given to it in the resolution. You may also wish to suggest concluding observations on the overall situation in Rwanda as it relates to your respective area(s) of responsibility. On the basis of the contributions, the Political Adviser should prepare a first draft of the report.

Your immediate attention to this matter would be greatly appreciated.

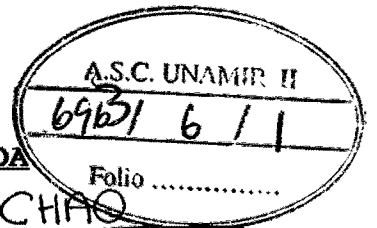

Gen

1. The process of providing humanitarian aid to the needy people living in Sector 6 has begun well. Patrols have been able to identify the areas where help is required. The interaction with the other agencies involved is taking place. The RPA, NGOs and the local population are favorably disposed towards our program. The methods of providing aid to the people in a systematic and phased manner have been discussed in my previous letter on the subject. The requirement at present is to focus our attention towards wide area coverage before we home on to specific areas. This is required so that there is wide awareness of our program amongst the general population. This will also pave the way for the formation of the village/commune committee as the people would be more forthcoming and positive towards our program. Thus Phase 1 of our program will be to carry out humanitarian aid on a wide area.

Aim

2. To lay down the modus operandi for execution of Phase 1 of our program to provide humanitarian aid to the people living in Sector 6.

General Outline

3. Phase 1 of the program to provide humanitarian aid to the people living in Sector 6 would be executed as follows:-

- (a) Meet the people in their home environment.
- (b) Know the requirements of the people.
- (c) Establish contact with the representatives of the people.
- (d) Propagate the idea of the program amongst the local govt reps, RPA, and the NGOs.

- (e) Identify the areas where the people require immediate help.
- (f) Identify resources and harness them so as to provide succor to the people from their immediate needs.
- (g) Carry out frequent re-assessment of resources available vis-a-vis prioritization of the peoples needs so as to obtain the best resource utilization.

Modus Operandi

4. Wide Area Coverage will be carried out by means of patrols from the rifle coys and personal liaison by the Bn Committee. The process of meeting the people, identification of their needs, liaison with the local authorities and identification of the resources has been going on since the last two months. A great deal of progress has been made in these fields and we are in a position to commence our project on provision of humanitarian aid to the people living in Sector 6 .

5. The following test projects were undertaken and completed successfully :-

(a) Orphanages. The following orphanages were provided with help to tide over their immediate needs:-

(i) Sisters of Charity Orphanage. This is located in Kigali City near Saint Famille Church. The following assistance has been provided :-

- (aa) One cooked meal to all the children of the orphanage.
- (ab) Rations for 250 children handed over.
- (ac) Entertainment program for all the children organized at Chez Lando hotel.

(ii) Masaka Orphanage. This orphanage is being run by the organization "Companion International". The following assistance has been provided to the orphanage :-

- (aa) Repair of water pipeline.
- (ab) Laying of additional water pipeline to meet the requirements for water by the orphanage.

(iii) Unaccompanied Children Center. This is located in Kigali City (REMERA Commune). The following assistance has been provided to this center :-

(aa) Restoration of water supply.

(ab) Provided facility for storage of 5000 litres of water within the complex. A syntex water tank as well as a new pipeline was laid.

(ac) Electrical wiring was laid within the complex and the electricity supply was restored to the center.

(b) Medical Clinic at Tare. This medical clinic is being run by an NGO "African Humanitarian Action" at Tare in the Kigali Prefecture. The following assistance was provided to the organization :-

(i) Complete electrification of the medical clinic as well as the staff quarters of the org was carried out.

(ii) Water supply line was laid and the plumbing work was carried out.

(c) Distribution of Education Material. Since the schools have started functioning, our patrols have been reporting that there is acute shortage of educational material with the schools. The project to distribute education material to these schools was undertaken with the help of UNICEF /AMURT . The following communes were provided with education material:-

(i) BUTAMWA Commune. (Kigali Prefecture/Sect 6)

(ii) MBOGO Commune. (Kigali Prefecture/Sect 5)

(iii) MUGAMBAZI Commune.(Kigali Prefecture/Sect 1)

(d) INDBATT Medical Clinics. Two medical clinics are being run by our bn , one each at SOALTEE and ALEXANDRA locations. Both these clinics are performing yeoman service to the local population in Sect 6. Large number of patients are provided with free medical advice

and free medicines. Every day 400 to 500 patients are treated by the INDBATT clinics. The medical clinics have treated the following number of patients since the time the clinics were established:-

(aa) ALEXANDRA : 4653. (since 09 Jan 95)

(ab) SOALTEE : 13,740. (since 01 Dec 94)

(e) Provision of Free Medical Aid by Patrols. All patrols have been taking along a Nursing Assistant with enough medicines to cater for common ailments. This aspect of the patrols providing medical attention to the people in the remote areas of Sect 6 has proved to be a great success and the local people in remote areas are very much in favor of continuing it.

6. On appraisal of our performance in these test projects as well as the positive reaction of the local population towards our program it is clear that we are working on the correct lines. It should be the endeavor of all pers connected with the program to now move further. To speed up the program the following actions will be essential:-

(a) Adoption of Communes for Indepth Study. Tps will be earmarked for specific communes. They will be required to carry out indepth study of these communes to include the aspects as given out in paragraph 3 of this letter.

(b) Assistance to Orphanages. Assistance to the orphanages will continue as before. Efforts to enlarge the scope of help is to/explored. Any other orphanage which requires our help will be provided help if within our resources.

(c) Provision of Education Material to Schools. This on going program of provision of education material to the schools in our area of responsibility will continue. Necessary liaison with the concerned UN / NGO organization will continue to be maintained. In addition to their other tasks patrols will be planned to gain information on all schools within our AOR so as to assess the requirement of education material of each school.

(d) Provision of Medical Assistance. This will continue as before. Both clinics ,at SOALTEE and ALEXANDRA, will continue to provide free medical aid to the people of KIGALI City and it's surrounding areas as before. All patrols will continue to take a nursing assistant with them with adequate medicines for ailments of common nature, for provision of free medical aid to the people living in the remote areas of our sector.

(e) Meet the NGOs Fortnight. The Bn Committee will meet the NGOs located in KIGALI. Though meeting the NGOs is going to be an on-going process since they are going to be an essential part of our project, however, a greater impetus is required to be initiated so that these agencies are also made aware of our program. We must be able to identify areas of mutual interest so that all our efforts compliment each other instead of working at cross purposes. It will also help us in optimizing our efforts.

7. Detailment of Communes. The communes falling within our AOR are sub-allotted to various teams for indepth study as follows:-

- (a) Maj M S Hooda and Team
 - (i) Kigali City.
 - (ii) Gikomero Commune.
- (b) Maj MM Singh and Team. Butamwa Commune.
- (c) Maj TPS Rana and Team. Kanombe Commune.
- (d) Maj GS Bora and Team. Rubungo Commune.


Conclusion



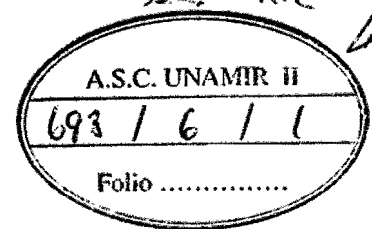

UNREO Humanitarian SitRep
26 August 1994



This Sitrep is produced three times every week; Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The information is compiled from inputs by organizations working in Rwanda including UNICEF, WFP, UNHCR, WHO, FAO, IOM, UNAMIR, US-JTF and NGOs. This document is intended to represent the best available information as of 1200 26 August 1994.

GENERAL SUMMARY

A WFP/FAO survey suggests only five million people are still living in Rwanda from a pre-war population of 7.9 million. With 1.9 million refugees, this means that up to one million people perished in the genocide.

Half the remaining population (2.5 million people) in Rwanda face food shortages over the next few months and malnutrition rates are rising.

Increasing numbers of people are asking to be brought home.

Cyangugu is calm with reduced numbers of displaced persons; the international strategy to place the people in camps within Rwanda rather than allowing them to move to Zaire appears to be working. However, there are reports of intimidation of crowds and relief workers by FAR elements.

Violence is increasing in the camps and NGOs are concerned about deterioration in security, especially in the Goma region.

Tensions remain high in Burundi.

FOOD SECURITY

2.5 million people in Rwanda will face grave food shortages for the next five months according to a WFP/FAO assessment mission. Initial estimates of food aid needs until the next harvest in December total 165,000 tonnes - 140,000 tonnes of cereals, 17,000 tonnes of pulses and 7,000 tonnes of vegetable oil. The most affected areas are Byumba, Gikongoro, Ruhengeri and Kigali.

The mission reported that only five million people are still in Rwanda out of an estimated pre-war population of 7.9 million. Other estimates of population movements would concur with this assessment. It is estimated that there are perhaps some 1.9 million refugees with up to 1 million killed during the war. Of the five million still living in the country, some 800,000 are classified as Displaced Persons.

A SCF/UNICEF report also notes that malnutrition rates are increasing in the South West. Normal rates of malnutrition in the country are between 5-10% of children less than 80% weight for height (WFH). MSF-France have screened all children in one camp in Gikongoro and report 15% malnutrition. This situation could deteriorate because October and November are traditionally the worst months of the year for food supply in Rwanda. A survey carried out in 1992 showed that over 40% of the population suffered some food shortage during these months.

The conclusion is that despite the harvest in some areas not being as badly affected as originally predicted, there is still an extremely serious food shortage that needs to be addressed and seeds and tools are in short supply. According to FAO the last day for planting crops in Rwanda this season is 1 October.

SOUTH WEST

The situation in Cyangugu is reported as calm; HCR reported declining numbers of people arriving from Kibuye and Gikongoro. There are still some 2000 people waiting to cross into Zaire across Rizizi 2 bridge as of 25 August. ICRC has established a mobile clinic at Ruzizi 2. On 24 August 140 people were returned to their homes in Gitarama and Kigali by HCR and the British Army contingent of UNAMIR. On 26 August Rwandese Immigration Officers began operations at Rizizi 1, charging 4000RwFr for a visa to people travelling from Zaire to Rwanda. Similar operations are scheduled to begin at Rizizi 2 as of 27 August in a bid to collect revenue.

UN agencies and NGOs have been continuing in their efforts to convince the displaced population to move to camps in Rwanda rather than cross into Zaire. Local authorities are helping the international community to identify possible sites.

The camp at Mururu (5km from Ruzizi 2 crossing) is filling up rapidly with some 500 arriving every day. Latest count (25 August) is 4,000 out of 10,000 total capacity. This filling has prompted the opening of a second site at Kimbogo which will have a capacity of 5000.

The apparent success in finally persuading the displaced population to remain in Rwanda has caused a backlash from the FAR. Although many people appear keen to transfer to the Rwandan sites rather than cross into Zaire the UNREO Field Office in Cyangugu reported on 25 August incidents of intimidation of the crowd by people trying to prevent the displaced persons staying in Rwanda and moving to Mururu camp. The intimidators are presumably RGF supporters who want to bring the displaced population into Zaire. Staff from HCR and IOM were also intimidated with sticks and so they returned to their base.

Around Kibuye the situation is described as being generally calm with a significant reduction in the numbers of people in the camps. The population of three camps visited by UNREO on 24 August had dropped from 10,000 each over the previous week to 2-3,000. UNAMIR are assisting with the repatriation effort.

However, there are confirmed reports of an incursion of a small detachment of armed RPF troops near Mabanza. The troops penetrated approximately 20km into sector 4 before being turned back by Senegalese troops of the UNAMIR contingent. Although only an isolated and minor incident the local population were reportedly distressed by their presence. There is no information at present whether the incursion was an accident or deliberate. The Rwandese Government has officially announced that it will only move into the former French zone in a civilian capacity until UNAMIR gives it's consent to a military presence.

• Around Gikongoro there are reports of people moving home from Cyanika camp (5km from Gikongoro) aided by UNAMIR transport. The UNREO Field Office also reports adequate food supplies in the camp for the moment. However, sanitation continues to be of major concern and will present a serious risk to public health as the rains continue. Recent UNAMIR surveys of the area south of Gikongoro estimated some 345,500 displaced persons in 14 camps as of 24 August. Some 400 were returned to their homes by HCR/UNAMIR 23-24 August.

The UNREO Field Office in Gikongoro reported two recent destabilising incidents where a hand grenade exploded at Cyanika camp on 25 August, injuring several, and two grenades exploded at Ngaro camp, also on 25 August, killing 2 and injuring 4.

NORTH WEST

There are increasing reports of further deterioration in camp security in the Goma area with escalation in violence and intimidation once again. The Zairean Government has asked to meet for the first time with the Rwandese Government to discuss the refugee problems. A three day meeting is being held over the weekend 26-28 August.

KIGALI

UNAMIR continue to be faced with increasing reports of unexploded ordnance and booby-traps. UNREO maintains an updated map identifying sites where unexploded ordnance in the city. The British Army Explosive Ordnance Disposal team report that \$4million is needed to start a comprehensive bomb clearance programme.

The restoration of power supplies has been recognised as a prime need for the rehabilitation of the country; it is estimated that six weeks and \$2 would be required to restore power sources.

The western half of Kigali now has a working telephone system; a complete city network is expected to be ready shortly.

General Marcel Gatsinzi, former commander of the Rwandan army, is in Kigali having discussions with the new Government. He was brought to the capital from Bukavu by UNAMIR at the request of the Government.

Salaries for local staff is a major issue that needs addressing; with no business, no banking and no revenue, payment for work becomes critical to the rehabilitation of the country. Workers want cash rather than food and with the need for large numbers of workers to rebuild the economy, a solution is required to pay them. UNDP are in close discussions with the Government and the relief community to identify possible solutions. The Rwandese Finance Minister is in Washington discussing funding options with possible sources of funding.

HUMAN RIGHTS

The UNCHR reports that 147 Human Rights Monitors will be operating in Rwanda by the end of September. At a General Meeting held on 26 August, the importance was stressed of

thorough, rapid and complete investigation of violations of human rights in the country and in the refugee camps in bordering countries.

BURUNDI

A UNREO assessment mission in Bujumbura reported increasing tensions in the city on 25 August as discussions about power sharing continue. There have been some 230,000 refugees arriving in the Kirundo area from south of Butare in the last six weeks; however, it appears that the tension in the country is primarily of internal cause rather than being directly related to the refugee exodus. Many trees in the city have been observed as being half-cut through to enable rapid creation of roadblocks should the situation deteriorate further.

HUMANITARIAN HEALTH SUPPORT

1. Further to our previous discussions on humanitarian health support, it is requested that additional information be provided in relation to the extent of humanitarian health services support being provided by NGO.
2. UNAMIR currently provides a significant amount of humanitarian primary health care support, in addition to its primary responsibilities, throughout the country. The extent of this support is quantified in the epidemiological data provided in the UNAMIR Medical Treatment Reports. During the period immediately following the civil war, the provision of primary health care was absolutely critical, given the collapse of the public health infrastructure, and the greater proportion of patients presented for critical care. This pattern has abated relatively quickly and now the majority of patients present for routine treatment on a daily basis. Nevertheless, the dependency on UNAMIR and NGO for this type of medical support is still great and any premature withdrawal may jeopardise the relief effort.
3. It is the intention of UNAMIR to gradually withdraw this support in line with the re-establishment of the public health infrastructure and in co-operation with the humanitarian effort. This HQ is maintaining liaison with UNICEF to keep abreast of developments in this regard. However, in order to gain a full appreciation of how this should be coordinated, UNAMIR wishes to gain an appreciation of the extent of humanitarian support provided by all agencies throughout the country. Accordingly, enclosed please find an information sheet designed for this purpose. It is requested that NGO health services be canvassed to supply this information.
4. Your assistance with this matter will be greatly appreciated.



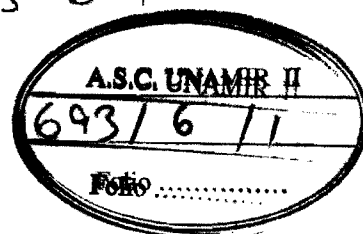



1. On the 16th and 25th of November, Clinics have been run in the subject Medical Centre, following approaches made by Brian Smith, of Feed the Children.
2. The centre provides the medical support for approximately 48,000 people in the surrounding region and is staffed by 6 X Medical Assistants. Prior to the war it serviced a population of 60,000 and had a staff of 4 X doctors and 60 other health professionals.
3. The centre has been effectively looted, but is in a very serviceable condition overall, and would require little effort to bring it back up to speed. Principle problems relate to the looting of stores and equipment which has left the community with little in the way of support.
4. On the last visit, assessment was made of children which were attending the clinic, which indicated a significant incidence of mal-nourishment.
5. Request you liaise with UNREO to determine if an NGO would consider accompanying us on our next visit with a view to establishing a more appropriate degree of medical support to the area.

6. I have attached copies of the visit reports as Enclosures 1, 2 and 3, for your information and would be happy to discuss the situation with anyone who displayed an interest.

REPORT ON VISIT TO KIBILIRA HOSPITAL ON FRI 25 NOV

1. The PSF stores were delivered as planned. Regular resupply will be needed, see attached request for next week.
2. 79 children were screened for malnutrition using the Weight For Height Chart (Save the Children Fund, UK). Eleven were less than 80% of the reference weight for height. Three of these were less than 70%. Beans, skim milk powder, and cooking oil, should be obtained for 20 children, for one week, for our next visit. This is a logistic responsibility.
3. The cases referred to us included one case of inoperable lymphoma, a child with Burkitt's lymphoma, several skin disorders, some fractures, a man with ascites, a man with a large abscess we drained, and an infant about to die from meningitis. There is a balance between instructing the staff and getting our own medics to do things. I suggest we procure a manual of procedures from say, MSF, in French, or Where There is No Doctor, in Swahili, from Rotary Club of Dar es Salaam, PO Box 1533 Dar es Salaam, Tanzania.
4. We went to visit another medical center at the end of the day but got a vehicle stuck in crossing a bridge. I have told the locals to repair all such bridges if they want any reconnaissance of other medical facilities.
5. Ultimately the whole area needs NGO support. There may be other centers worth opening, which we could be involved in, given the resources and commitment.

REPORT ON VISIT TO KIBIKIRA HOSPITAL 16 NOV 94

1. This facility was visited by myself, two medics, and an escort party. The information is from observation and discussion with the head medical assistant.
2. The facility serves a surrounding population of 39,000. There were 3-400 people waiting to be seen on our arrival. There are ample competent medical staff at the facility.
3. The main need was for drugs and consumable medical stores. We gave the MAs what we had brought, made suggestions on how to run the clinic, and saw patients they asked us to see, amounting to about 20 in all.
4. There was favouritism, RPA, and the strongest getting to the front influencing who would be seen ahead of others. — *Will require triage by MMA in waiting area to overcome.*
5. The common medical problems were there, and many trivial ones also. I saw one severely malnourished child and was told there were 20-50 others in the community.
6. I was shown a list of required stores and stolen equipment. I have attached a suggested list of stores available from PSF.
7. I recommend that we visit the facility at least once more, to deliver some more stores, and to see how many malnourished children there really are. For this second visit, I suggest we try to acquire the stores listed, and perhaps take some food. The level could be obtained in a small quantity from UNICEF, i.e. a few bags of beans and some cooking oil. ← *Does OC have any contacts in UNICEF*
8. I suggest we start trying to involve an NGO ASAP, eg IMC (International Medical Corps). The facility mainly needs resupply, gradual improvement of buildings, equipment and procedures. I have tentatively told the MA we would return Friday 25 Nov.

PROJECT PROPOSAL - NURSING EDUCATION AT CHK

1. Enclosed is a Project Proposal for the provision of nursing education for Rwandan nurses at CHK. The proposal has been jointly prepared by the Australian Medical Support Force (AUSMED), Emergency and Samaritan's Purse in response to an identified need for formal nursing training to enable a better standard of care, which will result in a quicker turn over of patients, and to provide the technical competence needed for eventual self sufficiency in the hospital.
2. Training is already being undertaken at the hospital, but only on an intermittent basis. It has proven to be very successful, with the nursing staff being very responsive. However, the training needs to be formalised and properly managed and funded. The purpose of the Project Proposal is to achieve this.
3. The project is currently unfunded. However, professional support is available and will willingly be provided by the organisations proposing the project.
4. Financial support is required to enable the formal education programme to be implemented. Your financial assistance and support is requested. Please provide early advice on whether you will be able to assist us in the provision of this necessary education programme. The point of contact is Major Beverley Wright, the AUSMED Senior Nursing Officer, who will coordinate the programme. She can be contacted at any time at the AUSMED facilities at CHK.

PROJECT PROPOSAL

Introduction:

AUSMED is currently providing assistance to the NGO hospital CHK. We have in place a modified training programme in the surgical ward whereby AUSMED staff attend MO's rounds, following which they assist the local nursing staff to develop further current surgical nursing skills.

A midwifery programme has been developed and an assessment made. This has not been implemented owing to limited resources available from within AUSMED.

PROPOSAL

This proposal is jointly submitted by the ADF (Australian Defence Force), Emergency and Samaritan's Purse. It relates to both surgical and midwifery programmes and is being provided in response to identified needs by AUSMED, Emergency and Samaritan's Purse. Specifically, needs centre around the development of a basic training programme which would address the issues listed below.

- a) High infection rate.
- b) Increased length of stay in hospital.
- c) Impaired recovery rate.
- d) Poor hygiene.
- e) Need for improved ward environment.

Objectives/ Definition

- a) To develop a training programme in conjunction with local staff, thereby meeting and clearly identifying their needs.
- b) To implement both programmes utilising where possible local staff with appropriate qualifications.
- c) To improve current standards of care and recovery rate post surgery and post partum. This will be achieved by involving local staff in development, implementation and delivery programme, thus providing them with an effective tool for further use at local level.

Activities Identification

- a) Establish a working group to develop the programmes.
- b) Identify the trainers who will organise the programme, advise on the format of the programme and ensure the successful application of the programme.
- c) Identify venue for teaching.

Resource Identification

a) Financial

The financial resources are directly related to human and materials required for development and implementation of the programmes. (See Annex A)

Per Diem and allowances as agreed between sponsoring organisations and participants of the programme.

b) Materials

This will comprise of items such as stationary, photocopying, printing, required texts and also consumables required for ongoing care of patients serviced by AUSMED (i.e. non UNAMIR patients). The list could be limitless therefor a conservative estimate has been applied. Some of these items could be supplied through PSF and obtained by locally.

c) Human Resources

The following personnel would be required to support these programmes:-

1. Registered General Nurse
2. Registered midwifery nurse.
3. Local trainer or trainers - with recognised nursing and midwifery qualifications able to deliver programme information and lessons.

NB. One of the above to be identified as the co-ordinator of the programme.

4. Interpreter - must be someone who is able to translate medical terms with adequate understanding.
5. Participants
6. AUSMED medics as selected by SNO AUS. Med Spt. Coy. These will have understanding of cultural issues and traditional approaches to medicine and nursing care.

REPORTING

Modalities of reporting will consist of:-

1. Report on response to the proposal to the C.O. AUSMED.
 - A nominated individual from each of the three agencies should contribute to the report
 - The report should be submitted within ten (10) working days from reply to proposal. This will allow 24hrs for review of proposal and eight (8) days to evaluate response, collate the information and write the report for submission to C.O. AUSMED.
2. Reports on progress of activities (this will depend on how long the programme will be). It is suggested that a report should follow each module of the programme.

EVALUATION.

Evaluation should be ongoing, terminal and following completion of the whole programme. It will be based on the expected outcome of each education module presented and also on the perceived expected recovery rate of patients treated. The following intervals have been identified as evaluation times:-

- a) Completion of each module or
- b) Completion of each set of modules.

It will include:-

Perceived effectiveness of the programme designed

Outcomes of the programmes designed

Evaluation by participants

Basic cost benefit analysis

RESOURCE & ACTIVITIES SCHEDULE

The expectation is that these programmes would be established and implemented within four (4) weeks from agreement between interested parties that project should proceed following final proposal completion.. Implementation to proceed then as soon as funding is available. Scheduling of activities relative to priorities to be in the following order:-

- a) Programme content identified, established and clarified
- b) Lesson plan developed
- c) Handouts completed and printed ready for distribution .

Suggested scheduling would be:-

BUDGETING:

IMPLEMENTATION:

Implementation of the educational aspect of the programme will be the responsibility of the co-ordinator supported by other identified support personnel. Service delivery supplied by AUSMED will continue at a level dependent on available resources, both human and material, in accordance with their current mandate.

CONCLUSION:

Pre-war CHK is reported to have provided a good standard of nursing care. At the present time the provision of such care cannot be provided or maintained and is severely handicapped because of a lack of both human and material resources. This project proposal is submitted with the view that the population at large in Kigali will benefit from such activities.

It is envisaged that the programmes will provide the local staff with an effective tool that can be utilised both now and within the future for further development. A favourable response to this project will be much appreciated as it is considered an efficient and effective mechanism to ensure and maintain a good standard of patient care to the population of Kigali and the surrounding areas.

It is considered that this project is sustainable by local resources in the future. Reasons for this belief are:-

- * Local staff will be involved in the planning, implementation and delivery
- * Materials (some) required and used for set up can be utilised again later, eg . charts, books etc.
- * Tool developed will provide a base for staff to apply to similar activities in the future without necessarily requiring expat. support.

ANNEX A

ESTIMATED COST RELATED TO ACTIVITIES

In the months August through to October a number of civilian patients have received treatment through ASC Med Spt Coy. Costs incurred therefore relate to service within this facility. They serve as a guide only and it is anticipated that sponsors will consider this when agreements for support are made.

Anticipated costs for the actual training component has not been submitted at this stage although it is expected to include educational materials, salaries for local staff and Per Diems where appropriate.

RWANDAN NATIONAL SEEKING PROTECTION WITH ASC

1. On 4 Oct 94 at approximately 1300 hrs a Rwandan national, Mr Gratien MUVUNABO, sought and was provided protection by the ASC based at the Central Hospital of Kigali (CHK). This man had been chased across the road by at least three RPA soldiers. On Mr Muvunabo being protected by ASC soldiers the RPA soldiers demanded that he be returned into their custody as they believed that he had been involved in crimes against humanity. This was refused on the basis that Mr Muvunabo had sought protection from UNAMIR troops. It was explained to the RPA that Mr Muvunabo would, if he consented, be handed to the Office of the Prosecutor of Kigali as per discussions conducted between the ASC Legal Officer and the Minister of Justice of Rwanda. The RPA representatives were invited to attend at the Prosecutor's Office so they could witness the hand over.

2. It was explained to Mr Muvunabo that he was not going to be handed to the RPA but to the Prosecutor's office in the presence of the ICRC. The accused said he was happy for this to occur. The ICRC were then contacted and it was arranged for them to attend the Prosecutor's Office for the hand over.

3. At the Prosecutor's Office Mr Muvunabo was handed over to Mr Jean MULLER a Rwandan police inspector. ASC ensured that the police confirmed in writing, that the accused was now in their care. The ICRC were present during this process. There were no RPA representatives at the Prosecutor's Office.

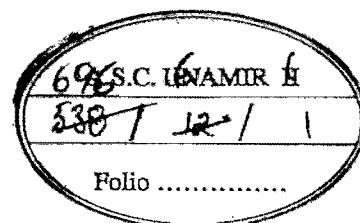

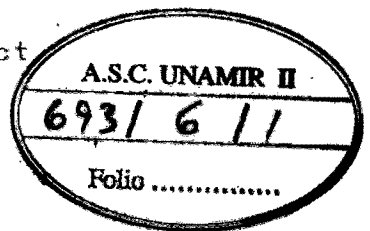

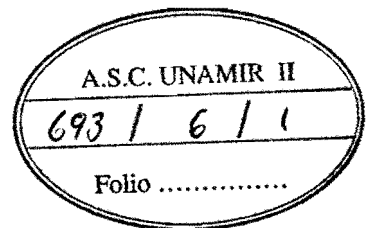

PROVISION OF SECURITY TO AUSTRALIAN NGO PERSONNEL

1. AUSMED has a responsibility to provide security and protection for Australian NGOs in the event that the security situation deteriorates. We must also be prepared to assist with their evacuation. It is therefore necessary for us to know the names of the NGO organisations that are operating in Rwanda, their locations, and the number and names of their staff. We must also have a plan which enables us to react to NGO locations to provide protection and /or to evacuate them to a safe location. We should also provide advice on what to do if the security situation deteriorates.

2. I intend to assign the responsibility for the planning and provision of security to NGOs to OC Rifle COY. OC Rifle COY is to produce a plan which meets the following minimum requirements:

- a. There is to be a consolidated list of all Australian NGOs, their work and residential locations, and the names of their staff by location.
- b. There is to be an established means by which NGOs can contact the nearest AUSMED element in the event of an emergency.
- c. There is to be an established means by which AUSMED can contact the NGOs to alert them to a security threat and to coordinate their evacuation.
- d. There are to be muster locations nominated for each NGO element. These should be AUSMED establishments where possible.
- e. There is to be an established procedure for activating a QRF which conforms to normal operating procedures, ie the request or alert is received in the CP and the Duty Officer/operations staff task the QRF.

- f. The infantry commanders are to know the location and layout of the NGO work areas and the location of their residences.
 - g. The NGOs are to be given a handout which details the procedures to be followed to request assistance or in the event of an emergency. The handout should also detail the precautions that should reasonably be taken by NGOs.
 - h. There is to be an outline plan for the evacuation of NGOs which should be similar to an SPE but with a road and an airlift option.
3. The main Australian NGO operating in Rwanda is CARE Australia with which we have established a very good relationship. I feel that it would be prudent for us to develop our procedures using CARE Australia as a model. To this end, I would like the above plan to be enacted for CARE Australia by Fri 23 SEP 94. Ms Muller from CARE Australia will provide a list of personnel and addresses on 20 SEP 94 and will also bring in their Motorola radio which should be programmed to our operations channel as their only means of contacting us in an emergency. Ms Muller will also provide the details for their Butare staff. The arrangements for Butare will need to be coordinated with the TSG.
4. The overall plan for providing security for Australian NGO is to be presented to me by 30 SEP 94.
5. The SO2 Legal is to provide advice to OC Rifle COY on the legal aspects of using force to protect NGOs and to effect their evacuation.



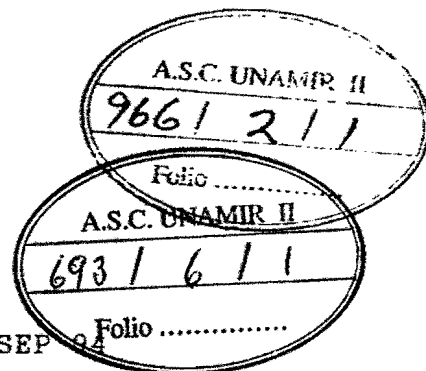

Evaluation des infrastructures sanitaires du Rwanda Phase 2

1. Justification.

Rehabilitation of public health system.

A la suite des événements récents qui ont secoué le pays, l'ensemble des structures sanitaires du pays a souffert de pillages et de destruction diverses. 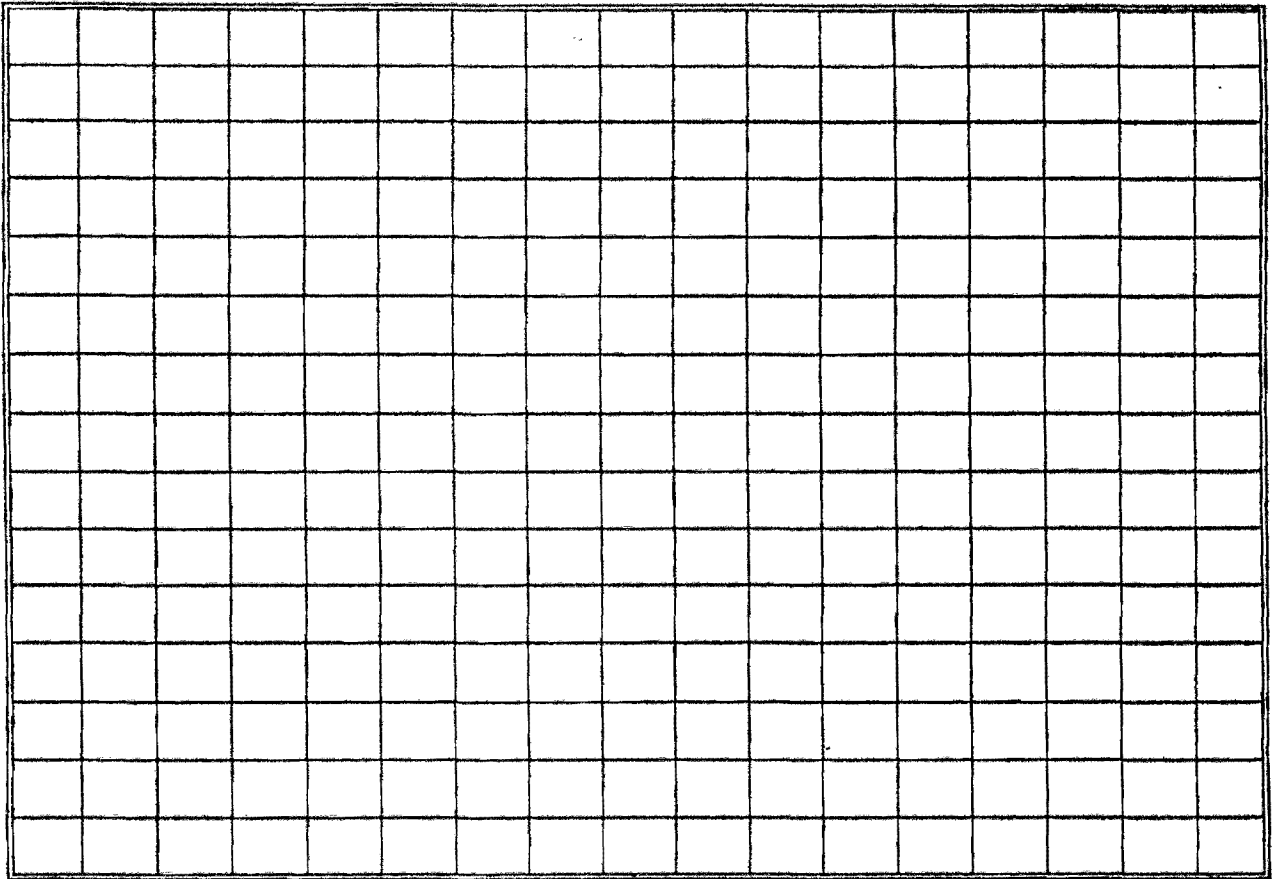

PLAN OF ACTION
FOR THE RETURN OF DISPLACED AND REFUGEES TO THEIR HOME AREAS

I. Overall Situation

More than two and a half million people are presently located outside of their home areas as a result of the events of the last five months. Nearly two million of these have sought refuge outside of the country and some half a million to seven hundred thousand people are displaced within Rwanda, predominantly in the southwest of the country.

The refugees living outside Rwanda are located in:

Spontaneous return of refugees from these areas into Rwanda has been hampered by:

- prevailing insecurity in the Bugesera and Kibungo prefectures (bordering Burundi and Tanzania)
- information on conditions in Rwanda disseminated in the camps by the ex Government
- intimidation in the camps against returnee candidates by militia elements

The vast majority of the refugees were "called" into exile, rather than pushed out of Rwanda. It is generally recognised that the recent movement of large numbers of people into Zaire was as much a result of RGF instructions to withdraw broadcasted over Radio Milles Collines as it was a result of an RPF advance. The present "anchoring" of refugees in the camps is further reinforced by the leadership structures which have emerged. These are for the most part formed from the extremist components of the old government.

The displaced "caseload" is of a different nature. People are located in the old southwest humanitarian zone. These displaced fled the advance of the RPF by passing the northwest prefectures (considered to be the heartland of the Hutu extremists) and converged in the

southwest area occupied by moderate Hutu populations. The reduced level of radicalisation of this group and the distances they covered over the last months would explain why the displaced located in the old French protection zone did not flee into Zaire when French forces withdrew. Consequently this group could be considered to be more amenable to returning to their home areas. Over the last few days small numbers of displaced have started to return. Large scale return, however, is constrained by the questions and concerns over the RPF treatment of returnees.

II. Proposed Strategy

Given the above analysis, the suggested approach is to focus returnee support operations on the southwest displaced populations. The refugee populations would be addressed following the successful reintegration of the displaced. Attention should be placed on providing assistance in areas ~~from~~ ^{to} which the displaced ~~have come~~ ^{will return} and in which the humanitarian community is presently least visible.

NB * The international humanitarian community should be encouraged to consider working in the prefectures [Giterama, Kibungo, Bugesera and Butare.] Coverage of these areas by international NGO/UN Agency staff would contribute to increasing the:

- absorptive capacity of the areas to which the people return
- level of confidence returnees may have in returning

~~To the extent possible,~~ The overall approach should be based on trying to attract people back to their home areas, rather than pushing them out of their present locations. Additionally, community based efforts should be encouraged rather than returnee targeted assistance. This would also contribute to easing possible tension between returnee populations and those who had remained behind.

III. Challenges

In defining an approach/strategy a number of points, if not realities, need to be taken into account and addressed. These include:

1. NGO and UN agency personnel resources are finite. It would be unnaturally optimistic to imagine that a returnee assistance programme could be implemented without affecting ongoing humanitarian efforts. Given the present location of the "targeted" returnees as well as the nature of needs in the southwest, those NGOs and agencies *NB located in the southwest and specifically the Prefecture of Cyangugu should be encouraged to move to the prefectures identified in section II
2. Though the events of the last months have been devastating to the Rwandan people, infrastructure has been relatively spared. Donors should be encouraged to tailor their emergency funding of a returnee operation to immediate first phase infrastructural recovery actions

3. In order to ensure the sustainability of the international efforts, the nascent government administration should be given the leadership of the returnee programme. Ownership of the operation coupled with the resources to implement the operation would possibly give the confidence and authority to government officials to ensure that internationally acceptable procedures are used in applying justice locally

4. It should be remembered that the RGF for the most part withdrew from Rwanda. A sizeable military and militia force exist in Zaire and Tanzania. Forays into Rwanda are being effected by militia groups operating out of Ngara camp. Security of international humanitarian staff in the Kibungo and Bugesera Prefectures will need to be assured. Additionally, as the urge for refugees to return increases so will militia aggressiveness against international relief workers in the camps of Goma, Bukavu and Ngara

IV. Humanitarian Actions

1. Formation of a Returnee Task Force comprised of interested NGOs, UN Agencies, UNAMIR representatives

1. Joint UN/NGO/UNAMIR assessment missions in the Prefectures of Giterama, Butare, Bugesera and Kibungo

2. Establishment of regional returnee coordination centres with representatives of the Ministry of Rehabilitation

3. Information campaign with UNAMIR support targeted on the southwest and subsequently on Goma, Bukavu and Ngara

4. Mandate of UNREO Logistics Coordination Cell changed to cover returnee operation. IOM coopted into the structure


