## SECRETARY-GENERAL EXPRESSES CONCERN OVER CLASHES ALONG THAI-KAMPUCHEAN BORDER

Following is the text of a statement made today by a spokesman for Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar:

The Secretary-General has followed with serious concern the escalation of fighting along the Thai-Kampuchean border and especially the reports of armed incidents between Thai and Vietnamese troops.

As he repeatedly emphasized during his recent trip to the region, no durable solution can be brought about to the Kampuchean problem by military means. He remains convinced that the restoration of peace and stability can only be achieved through a process of genuine negotiations, which the parties concerned should seek with renewed determination and good faith.

03 Kampuchea and disarmament issues were of particular concern during the  
04 Secretary-General's three-week trip (25 January-15 February) to South-East  
05 Asia and the Pacific, during which he visited eight nations.

06 *visiting Thailand, Laos and Vietnam*  
After ~~conferring with regional leaders~~ on the first leg of the journey  
07 (25 January-1 February), the Secretary-General said he had gone to the area  
08 *make an evaluation on the question of Kampuchea*  
to ~~evaluate the situation and attempt to find "common ground" between the~~  
09 ~~parties involved in the situation in Kampuchea, which might lead to a~~  
*progress towards a*  
10 ~~negotiated settlement.~~ He had received "clarifications" from the leaders of

11 Viet Nam regarding their position, *which he intended to convey to the*  
and had met with other parties concerned.

12 *He did not feel that*  
"Unfortunately, the positions of the parties are still very, very far  
13 apart", he said. A quick solution would not be easy or even possible in the  
14 near future, but he stood ready to assist all involved to find common ground  
15 for a dialogue towards a negotiated settlement in South-East Asia. The  
16 Secretary-General appealed to all to "stop confrontation, start talking,  
17 make peace".

18 ~~Mr. Pérez de Cuéllar~~ had had talks with top officials of Thailand, the  
19 Lao People's Democratic Republic and Viet Nam, as well as with leaders of  
20 Democratic Kampuchea. He also made a brief stopover in Singapore on his way  
21 to Malaysia. (For details of these visits, see UN Chronicle 1985, No. 1).

22 In Malaysia (1-3 February), Mr. Pérez de Cuéllar had talks on the  
23 Kampuchean situation with Prime Minister Mahathir bin Mohamad and Foreign  
24 Minister Tengku Ahmad Rithauddeen. In remarks at a dinner on 2 February in  
25 Kuala Lumpur, he said that after a protracted period of suffering,



01 destruction and agony, "we have a moral obligation to enable the peoples of  
02 the region to fulfil their legitimate aspirations for peace and dignity, and  
03 to a future of well-being and prosperity".

04 Mr. Pérez de Cuéllar also discussed with the Prime Minister and Foreign  
05 Minister their country's efforts to fight drug abuse, and its position  
06 regarding the question of Antarctica. Also discussed were plans for the ~~50th~~  
07 ~~anniversary of the Bandung Conference, International Youth Year, and the~~  
08 ~~United Nations 40th anniversary and the~~

09 During a five-day visit to Indonesia (3-7 February), the  
10 Secretary-General met with Indonesian President Gen. Soeharto, Vice-President  
11 Umar Wirahadikusumah, and Foreign Minister Mochtar Kusumaatmadja.  
12 Discussions with Indonesian leaders centred mainly on the question of  
13 Kampuchea. He was also briefed on the situation of Indochinese "boat people"  
14 in Indonesia, now totalling 20,000.

15 On a ~~second~~ stopover in Singapore (7 February), Mr. Pérez de Cuéllar  
16 held ~~further~~ discussions with Foreign Minister S. Dhanabalan, ~~again~~  
17 concentrating on the Kampuchean situation.

18  
19 New Zealand

22 Disarmament and nuclear issues highlighted many discussions during his  
23 visits to New Zealand and Australia. In New Zealand (9-12 February), the  
24 Secretary-General exchanged views in Auckland with Prime Minister David  
25 Lange, other government officials and citizen groups on a number of issues,  
26 in particular disarmament, ~~and New Zealand's nuclear policy. The situation in~~  
27 ~~New Caledonia,~~ A planned visit of a New Zealand rugby team to South Africa,

01 and a variety of other issues were reviewed.

02 On 11 February, at a press conference in Wellington, the  
 03 Secretary-General said ~~that New Zealand's nuclear policies were in line with~~  
 04 ~~on the policies pursued by New Zealand in the field nuclear~~  
 05 ~~the philosophies of the United Nations. Asked what effect New Zealand's~~  
 06 ~~field But stressed that the United Nations policy in that~~  
 07 ~~recent moves would have internationally, he replied: "Perhaps you are~~  
 08 ~~regard was consistent; it was against the nuclear arms race~~  
 09 ~~setting an example of consistency, as far as your campaign against nuclear~~  
 10 ~~arms and nuclear arms development is concerned."~~  
 11 ~~and in favour of nuclear and conventional disarmament.~~

08 Later that day, at a parliamentary reception, he said: "We at the  
 09 United Nations share your profound concern about the escalating arms race and  
 10 the danger that the growing nuclear arsenals of the great Powers pose to all  
 11 countries. Even countries which are not parties to the conflict will be  
 12 victims of an irresponsible decision of a few leaders."

13 In Australia (12-15 February), he met with Prime Minister Robert Hawke  
 14 Foreign Minister William G. Hayden, ~~Gov-Gen. Sir Ninian Stephen, former Prime~~  
 15 ~~Minister Gough Whitlam, current Australian Ambassador to United Nations~~  
 16 ~~Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization~~, and other Australian  
 17 leaders. In addition to disarmament concerns, matters relating to Kampuchea  
 18 the African crisis, Lebanon, Cyprus and other international issues were  
 19 discussed.

20 During the four-day visit, he visited both Sydney and Canberra, and laid  
 21 a wreath at the Australian War Memorial in the capital city.

22 Nuclear concerns: At Canberra's Australian National Press Club on 14  
 23 February, the Secretary-General said ~~he was aware of concern expressed~~  
 24 ~~regarding nuclear disarmament. "While this continent lies far from the major~~  
 25 ~~centre of nuclear deployment, this concern is both logical and justified."~~  
 26 ~~The present opportunities to break the long impasse in disarmament~~  
 27 negotiations "simply cannot be over-estimated", ~~he said~~, referring to

01 preparations for resuming talks on nuclear and space weapons by the United  
02 States and the USSR, and continuing efforts at the Conference on Disarmament  
03 and at Stockholm and Vienna.

04 Distrust between nations, he went on, not only stemmed from possession  
05 of arms, but also from real conflicts in national interests, which  
06 constituted "serious impediments to disarmament". The United Nations  
07 capacity to facilitate progress towards disarmament was substantial. Every  
08 opportunity should be seized now to bring progress towards disarmament, he  
09 said.

10 Also on 14 February, at a United Nations Association of Australia  
11 dinner <sup>in Sydney</sup>, the Secretary-General said the need for human solidarity and a sense  
12 of community was nowhere more apparent than in the situations of massive  
13 suffering and starvation that were being permitted to occur even though there  
14 were resources to avert them altogether. The famine in Africa was a prime  
15 example.

16 The United Nations system was fully geared to take every possible action  
17 to alleviate such suffering, but the international community would have to  
18 help anticipate and prevent such emergencies from deteriorating to the point  
19 of calamity. "The world community cannot afford to wait for the drama to  
20 come into its collective sitting room before addressing long-term and urgent

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SECRETARY-GENERAL ENDS VISIT TO EIGHT COUNTRIES  
OF SOUTH-EAST ASIA AND PACIFIC

(Received from the Spokesman for the Secretary-General.)

SYDNEY, Australia, 15 February - Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar ended his four-day official visit to Australia this evening and departed for New York.

On the final day of his visit, he attended a luncheon in his honour given by the Governor-General of Australia, Sir Minian Stephen, and Lady Stephen, at Admiralty House in Sydney.

On Thursday evening, the Secretary-General was guest of honour at a dinner given by the United Nations Association of Australia. In welcoming the Secretary-General, the Federal President of the Association, Keith Suter, remarked that the unexpectedly large attendance at the dinner reflected the high esteem with which the Secretary-General and the United Nations were held in Australia.

The Secretary-General was introduced by Australia's Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Richard Woolcott.

In his address, the Secretary-General expressed his warm appreciation of the Association's efforts to promote a greater understanding of the goals and endeavours of the United Nations. He pointed out that although the United Nations was an organization of Governments, it derived "its mandate from the peoples of the world, and its success depended ultimately on their support".

In thanking the Secretary-General, Cough Whitlam, the current Australian Ambassador to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) and former Prime Minister, mentioned the very demanding role that the Secretary-General of the United Nations was expected to fill and the great diversity in aspirations that the 159 Member States have.

The Secretary-General's visit to Australia concluded a three-week tour of South-East Asia and the Pacific.

OBJET: to South-East Asia, Australia, and New Zealand

I. GENERAL

A. Ratification of principal human rights instruments

In his Human Rights Day message (1984) the Secretary-General made a special appeal to Governments to become Parties to the International Covenants on Human Rights and the Convention against Racial Discrimination. Australia, New Zealand and Vietnam are Parties to all three. The Secretary-General may wish, as appropriate in his conversations, to appeal to the Governments of Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand to ratify the three instruments and to Australia, New Zealand and Vietnam to consider ratifying the Optional Protocol to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights.

II. COUNTRY SITUATIONS

A. Australia

In recent years Australia has shown itself a strong supporter of the United Nations Human Rights programme. In 1984 Australia indicated to the Centre for Human Rights its readiness to provide technical assistance in the field of human rights to States in need of such assistance, to support the Centre's fellowship programmes by organizing appropriate programmes in Australia and by helping the Centre in the field of publication, in particular by putting out certain pamphlets. Concrete discussions are presently underway between the Centre and Australian representatives in Geneva on these issues. Australia has also co-operated closely with the Working Group on Indigenous Populations.

The Secretary-General may wish to express pleasure at the positive attitude of Australia toward Human Rights issues.

/...

B. Indonesia

The major human rights issue concerning Indonesia is the situation in East Timor. This aspect is included in a separate briefing paper dealing with the East Timor problem.

C. Vietnam

The question of re-education camps in Vietnam has been brought to the attention of the United Nations in the past. The case of Nguyễn Chan, an 81 year-old man, detained from 1979 and reportedly held in a re-education camp in Ha-Nam-Nimh in the north of the country might be brought to the attention of the Government for any humanitarian treatment which might be given.

D. Malaysia/New Zealand/Thailand

No specific cases are in the Centre's files which would warrant intervention by the Secretary-General.

The United States decision to withdraw from the Nicaragua case before the International Court of Justice

During your forthcoming trip, you might be asked, in Edinburgh or elsewhere, to comment on the US decision to withdraw from the Nicaragua case now before the International Court of Justice and to change the attitude of the United States towards the Court. My advice would be the following:

1. In my view, you could take the position, that it is not for the Secretary-General to comment on the position taken by a state party to a contentious proceeding before the International Court of Justice.
2. You could take the same line if you are asked to comment on the American allegations that the Court is becoming politicized.
3. If you are asked to comment on the low number of Declarations of Acceptance of the compulsory jurisdiction of the Court, (the American statement of yesterday makes quite a case out of the fact that only 44 out of the 155 Member states of the UN have recognized the jurisdiction of the Court as compulsory), you could state that the UN encourages a judicial settlement of disputes and the acceptance of the competence of the Court. The number of 44 Declarations of Acceptance is certainly low and it is to be hoped that that number increases. One should, however, not overlook that the number comprises only the general recognition of the competence of the Court. There are quite a number of treaties and other instruments which contain clauses relating to the jurisdiction of the Court in contentious proceedings, as a rule providing that disputes concerning the application or interpretation of the instruments may be referred to the Court for decision. The 1983/84 Yearbook of the Court mentions more than 200 such instruments and there is also a possibility of Ad hoc submission of a specific dispute to the Court.

4. If asked about the binding force of judgements of the Court and their enforceability, you should refer to Article 94 of the Charter which reads as follows:

1. Each Member of the United Nations undertakes to comply with the decision of the International Court of Justice in any case to which it is a party.

2. If any party to a case fails to perform the obligations incumbent upon it under a judgement rendered by the Court, the other party may have recourse to the Security Council, which may, if it deems necessary, make recommendations or decide upon measures to be taken to give effect to the judgement.

With respect to Article 94, paragraph 2, I would like to add, however, that to my knowledge, recourse to the Security Council with respect to the enforcement of a judgement has not taken place in practice so far.

NOTES ON THE MEETING BETWEEN THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

AND AMBASSADOR KIRKPATRICK ON 15 JANUARY 1985 AT 4.30 P.M.

Ambassador Kirkpatrick stated that it was the conviction of the United States Government that the Vietnamese had "no disposition" at present to depart from Kampuchea. On its side, the United States fully supported the principles adopted by the United Nations in successive resolutions of the General Assembly and in the International Conference on Kampuchea. Ambassador Kirkpatrick expressed the hope that, in his forthcoming discussions with the Vietnamese, the Secretary-General would express the concern of her Government regarding the need to resolve problems relating to Prisoners-of-War and those still considered Missing-in-Action. Further, the United States Government hoped that the Secretary-General would urge the Vietnamese to respond to the US suggestion for another meeting to discuss the freeing and resettlement of those who had been detained in Vietnam because of their association with the United States. Finally, Ambassador Kirkpatrick hoped that the Secretary-General would have the opportunity to intercede on behalf of Mr. William Mathers, a United States citizen whose yacht was seized by the Vietnamese in July 1984 and who was being held without charges.

The Secretary-General took note of the points that Ambassador Kirkpatrick had raised. He indicated the names of the countries he would be visiting. When the Secretary-General mentioned that he would be making a brief stop-over in Laos, Ambassador Kirkpatrick mentioned that a number of American MIA's were still reportedly in that country. She hoped that the matter would therefore also be raised in Vietiane.

The Secretary-General mentioned that his own efforts were, in a sense, parallel to those of the Ad Hoc Committee established after the International Conference. The purpose of his mission would be to encourage a process of negotiations in the region so that Vietnamese forces could, in time, be withdrawn from Kampuchea. The Secretary-General added that he had been in touch, amongst others, with the Ambassador of Democratic Kampuchea and had received a message yesterday from Prince Sihanouk.


In wishing him well for his mission, Ambassador Kirkpatrick stated that she very much hoped that the Secretary-General would be able to receive Assistance Secretary Wolfowitz after his return to New York. The Secretary-General stated that he would be happy to do so.

As the meeting concluded, the Secretary-General mentioned that he had met Ambassador von Schirnding of South Africa on 14 January, who would shortly be visiting his capital. The Secretary-General had urged him to seek ways of making progress in regard to the question of Namibia.

SUBJECT: Your Talk with Secretary General prior to his Asian trip

Paul Wolfowitz regrets he is out of the country this week. He would like to meet with the Secretary General if convenient upon the Secretary General's return.

The East Asian Bureau would like you to raise four subjects with the Secretary General and ask for his help:

1. CAMBODIA

Notwithstanding statements by the Vietnamese, we have seen no indication the Vietnamese are willing to withdraw their forces as a condition of settlement. We strongly support the principles agreed in the United Nations International Conference on Kampuchea in 1981: Withdrawal of all foreign forces and free elections under international auspices.

2. POW/MIAs

We hope the Secretary General will use his good offices to urge the Vietnamese to be more forthcoming in cooperating with us to resolve the POW/MIA problem.

3. REFUGEES

We hope the Secretary General will urge the Vietnamese to respond to our suggestion for another meeting to discuss the freeing and resettlement of persons in Vietnamese prisons because of their association with the former Saigon government and the United States.

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4. WILLIAM MATHERS

An American citizen has been detained by Hanoi since last July when his yacht was seized in what the Vietnamese call their territorial waters. We are not aware of any formal charges made against him. We hope the Secretary General will urge the Vietnamese to release him.

## Cambodia

-- The continued Vietnamese occupation of Cambodia is the major threat to stability in Southeast Asia.

-- It violates the will of the Cambodian people.

-- It threatens the security of Thailand and the other countries of the region because, if allowed to stand, it would represent the vindication of the use of force and because large hostile forces remain on Thailand's borders, forces which have repeatedly violated Thai territory, as recently as this week.

-- It exacerbates tensions between Vietnam and China.

-- It fosters a growing Soviet military presence in a new region.

-- For these reasons, the United States will not normalize relations with Vietnam until its forces are withdrawn from Cambodia.

-- We believe that a negotiated settlement is the best hope for resolving the Cambodian problem. A military victory by either side is not in sight.

-- A settlement should be based upon the principles of the UN's 1981 International Conference on Kampuchea (ICK), i.e., withdrawal of all foreign forces, free elections under international auspices and the establishment of a government in accordance with the will of the Khmer people. These principles have been reaffirmed every year by overwhelming majorities in the UNGA Kampuchea resolution.

-- We and the ASEANS have paid close attention to Hanoi's expressions of its willingness to compromise on a negotiated Cambodian settlement. However, we have seen nothing to indicate that the Vietnamese are prepared to take the fundamental step of withdrawing their forces as a condition or a settlement. To the extent that Hanoi speaks of allowing others besides their own Cambodian clients to participate in a government of national reconciliation, it is in the context of a government formed under the guns of a continuing Vietnamese occupation.

-- Neither we nor the ASEANS could accept a return to power of Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge under any circumstances.

-- We believe that the non-Communist resistance factions of Prince Sihanouk and Son Sann must be major players in any settlement because of their international reputation and their acceptability to the Cambodian people.

#### POW/MIAs

-- The United States has made some progress with the Vietnamese in working toward as full as possible an accounting of our servicemen who disappeared during the war. However, we are not satisfied with that progress.

-- Even if the Vietnamese were to withdraw from Cambodia, the American people would not tolerate normalization of relations with Vietnam until Hanoi demonstrated greater cooperation in resolving the POW/MIA issue.

-- We would appreciate it if the Secretary General would use his good offices to urge the Vietnamese to be more forthcoming in cooperating with us to resolve the POW/MIA problem. It is in Vietnam's own interest to be more helpful.

#### Refugees

-- The UN's Orderly Departure Program is a going concern which has made it possible for Vietnamese to leave the country without risking clandestine departure by sea. We appreciate the active role the UN has played in making the program work.

-- We consulted with the Vietnamese under UNHCR auspices on the US portion of the ODP in October in Geneva, and we have made progress in ensuring a more effective program. However, more could be done by the Vietnamese, including granting exit permits to more persons from areas outside the Ho Chi Minh city region and from the US Special Priority Lists -- persons who presently make up the largest percentage of those still fleeing by boat because they are unable to obtain exit permits.

-- The United States is very interested in setting up a practical program for freeing and resettling in the US the thousands of persons who remain in Vietnamese prisons because of their association with the former Saigon government or the US. These persons and their families are of profound humanitarian concern to the United States.

-- The Vietnamese have said they are willing to let these people go, if the US will take all of them. We have agreed to take these people and their families, provided an orderly program can be set up and mutual agreement can be reached on who is to be included. We will do what is necessary on our part to set up such a program.

-- For example, Vietnam has said that it does not believe these people should be discussed within the UNHCR framework. For this reason we agreed to meet bilaterally with the Vietnamese, without a UNHCR representative present, when we talked about this subject last October in Geneva.

-- We have proposed to the Vietnamese that we meet again to discuss this subject, and we are waiting for a response.

-- Because the continued imprisonment of thousands of these persons remains one of the unresolved humanitarian legacies of the Vietnam War, we would hope that the Secretary General could urge the Vietnamese to respond to our suggestion for another meeting soon so that we can begin to bring them and their families to the United States. In doing so, he can make it clear that we are willing to be flexible in meeting Vietnam's concerns. An agreement would be a significant achievement for the US and Vietnam and would be received very positively by the world community.

#### William Mathers

-- American citizen William Mathers was detained by Hanoi in July when his yacht entered Vietnamese territorial waters. He has not been tried, nor have we been notified of any formal charges. We would appreciate if if the Secretary General would urge the Vietnamese to release Mathers. He can be given the attached fact sheet.

THE WILLIAM M. MATHERS CASE

William M. Mathers, an American businessman who has been living in Singapore since 1970, was taken into custody by a Vietnamese maritime patrol boat on July 21, 1984 (the Vietnamese put the date as July 22) while sailing his yacht So Fong from Singapore to Hong Kong via Thailand. The Vietnamese have told us that he was violating their territorial waters. (The Vietnamese have drawn a base line around the islands off their coast and thus, though the So Fong was apparently in what we, and the larger international community, would consider international waters when apprehended, in Vietnam's view she was on the line separating their internal from their territorial waters.) Mr. Mathers has been held since then in the Mekong Delta city of Can Tho in Hau Giang Province. He has apparently been interrogated with a view to establishing that he was on an espionage mission, though the Vietnamese have told us only of the charge of violating their territorial waters. The other people on the yacht when it was apprehended were four French citizens (two women and two children) and a young Australian working as the So Fong's mechanic. The Vietnamese released the French citizens in September and the Australian on November 29. The former were not charged with any crime, though they did have to pay over \$2,000 for room and board. The latter was found guilty of entering Vietnam's territorial waters without authorization and taking photographs of a border area. He had to pay a \$5,000 fine and have his photographic equipment confiscated. Mr. Mathers is thus the only one of those aboard the So Fong remaining as a prisoner in Can Tho. His boat is moored in a side channel off the Bassac branch of the Mekong and in recent months he has apparently been kept aboard her.

Other than Mr. Mathers' nationality, the Vietnamese authorities seem concerned by the sophistication of the equipment aboard the So Fong and Mr. Mathers' service as an officer of the United States Navy in Vietnam, specializing in diving during the war. There is no reason, however, to doubt Mr. Mathers' bona fides. He left the Navy in 1970 and became a very successful businessman in Singapore, specializing in diving, salvage and marine construction. He also had the hobby of diving to many famous sunken ships, e.g., H.M.S. Repulse, and used the So Fong for his business and his hobby. In addition, he leased the yacht to others to help defray the maintenance costs. Both he and the So Fong are well known in Southeast Asia and have been mentioned in various publications. Mr. Mathers was making the voyage to Hong Kong (where the So Fong was built in 1937) to show the yacht to prospective buyers as he was liquidating his interests in Singapore with a view to returning to the United States.

The United States has, since July, been making representations on Mr. Mathers' behalf with the Vietnamese Embassy in Bangkok. These have included a demarche urging his release by Ambassador Dean. Thus far, however, the Vietnamese have told us only that he is accused of violating their territorial waters, that he is being held in Can Tho, that he is being well treated, and that he is in good health. In the last several months they have told us nothing at all. There has been no outside contact with Mr. Mathers since his arrest, though he was seen briefly from time to time by his shipmates from the So Fong when they were still prisoners. The Vietnamese have kept him in isolation. The Vietnamese have not transmitted any letters from him to his family and friends and we do not know if he has received any of the mail given to the Vietnamese to be passed to him. The Australian Embassy, on our behalf, has asked to visit him, but thus far they have not received permission to do so.

Mr. Mathers has now been held for almost six months with, as far as we are aware, no charges laid against him. He has been given no opportunity to communicate with his family or with his government. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. William H. Mathers, applied in November to the Vietnamese authorities for permission to enter Vietnam and to see their son. As of yet, they have received no reply from the Vietnamese. Mr. Mathers, senior, is connected with the law firm of Chadbourne, Park, Whiteside and Wolff in New York.

Congressional delegations led by Representative Montgomery and Representative Solarz discussed Mr. Mathers with the Vietnamese officials, including Prime Minister Dong, while in Hanoi in December. They received no substantive reply, but Mr. Solarz's group was told by Mr. Dong that Mr. Mathers would be released "soon." We have, however, seen no indication that his release is imminent. In fact, the Vietnamese Ambassador in Bangkok has said that more time will be required to investigate Mathers as he might be connected to the plot to overthrow the Vietnamese Government which was revealed at a December show trial in Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon). A Vietnam Veterans of America delegation was also in Vietnam in November and December, and even visited Can Tho, but they were not allowed to see Mr. Mathers.

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It is the view of the United States Government that nothing the Vietnamese have told us that Mr. Mathers has done warrants his continued detention and that he should be released immediately. To continue to hold him can only bring discredit to Vietnam and harm its interests.

Note for Mr. Dayal

Please find herewith one copy of the Secretary-General's brief for the trip together with a book containing speaking texts.

I leave with a number of points outstanding viz.

A. Composition of the party

The various Permanent Missions will need to be informed officially, perhaps by telephone, that Mr. de Olivares will not be travelling. I have had the opportunity of mentioning this only to the Thai Mission, informally. They are expecting confirmation from the EOSG. Furthermore, should you think it appropriate, the Missions might be informed that I, as the only officer from the 38th floor in the party, should be included wherever possible in the list of invitees to official meetings/functions. I well understand, however, that the decision in this matter rests solely with the Secretary-General.

B. Speaking engagements in Australia

Late on Friday, 18 January, the Australian Mission presented their proposed programme. While there are only very brief toasts at the official engagements, our hosts nonetheless envisage a 20-minute speech at the National Press Club on 14 February and a 10-minute speech on Ethiopia/IYP on 15 February. I have suggested to the Secretary-General that drafts could be prepared here and brought to London by Mr. Ahmed on Wednesday, 23 January. Alternatively, they could be cabled/telexed to us in Bangkok.

C. Contact telephone numbers

The list of contact telephone numbers along the route is a skeleton one due to the failure on the part of Missions to provide us with details requested many weeks ago. Needless to say I or some other member of the party will try to establish telephone contact on arrival in each country/city.

D. Toast for Lunch in Laos

Just this morning the Laotian Ambassador informed Mr. Ahmed that the lunch in Vientiane on 28 January will be hosted by the Foreign Minister. A draft toast, prepared by Mr. Annabi and cleared by Mr. Ahmed is with Sonsoles, secretary to Mrs. Pomés. It is being typed up in final form. Mr. Ahmed could also perhaps bring this to London on Wednesday so that we can submit it to the Secretary-General in Bangkok.

Australia

The Communications Unit of the Centre for Human Rights has received and handled under the so-called "1503 procedure" a small number of communications relating to Australia during 1984. The Australian authorities have given a satisfactory reply to each of these communications (apart from the most recent ones) and we think that there is no case which would call for a further good offices action. Would it be possible, however, to suggest to the Australian authorities to ratify the Optional Protocol to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (Australia is a State party to the Covenant since 13 November 1980)? This would mean that the individual cases so far automatically handled under the "1503 procedure", would be considered by the Human Rights Committee which carefully examines each case before transmitting it to the Government. The number of communications transmitted under the Optional Protocol might therefore well be less than the one currently transmitted to the Australian authorities under the "1503 procedure".

(1) Australia and Human Rights

(a) General remark on the attitude of the Government towards human rights

The Government of Australia is one of the fervent supporters of human rights in the Asian region. It has been a member of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights for extended periods and has always co-operated in a constructive manner. Australia was re-elected last year for a term of three years starting 1 January 1985.

In 1984 Australia indicated to the Centre for Human rights its readiness to strengthen the Centre's capacity to provide assistance in the field of human rights to States in need of such assistance, to support the Centre's fellowship programmes by organizing appropriate programmes in Australia and by helping the Centre in the field of publication, in particular by putting out certain pamphlets. Concrete discussions are presently underway between the Centre and Australian representatives in Geneva on these issues.

The Secretary-General may wish to refer to this extremely positive attitude of Australia.

(b) The issue of indigenous populations

Since 1982 a Working Group of the United Nations Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities has been studying the human rights of indigenous populations. It has to be noted that while other countries who are also faced with the problems of indigenous populations (United States, Canada, Brazil) have displayed reluctance to engage in a process of direct consultation with that Working Group, Australia has always actively co-operated as the Government seems bent on improving the general situation of the indigenous population. Last year the Minister for Indigenous Populations attended the Working Group's session. This attitude might also draw a positive comment from the Secretary-General.

(c) Individual cases

In the past there have been a few communications relating to Australia handled under the "1503 procedure" (allegations of a consistent pattern of gross violations of human rights). In each of these cases the Australian authorities have given satisfactory replies. There is no case which would call for any good offices action. However, it could be suggested to the Australian authorities to consider ratifying the Optional Protocol to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (Australia has been a State party to the Covenant since 13 November 1980). For practical purposes, this would mean that individual cases which now are automatically handled under the "1503 procedure", would be considered by the Human Rights Committee which carefully examines the admissibility of each case before transmitting it to the Government. The number of communications transmitted might thus well be reduced considerably.

Status of ratification of important human rights instruments

It appears that among various regional areas, the Asian area has proportionately the lowest number of ratifications of important human rights instruments. In respect of the six Asian countries which the Secretary-General is going to visit, the status is as follows:

It would be appropriate if the Secretary-General, in his personal talks with leading statesmen of these countries, were to express the hope that these countries should seriously consider becoming parties to the instruments. This would be in line with the Secretary-General's appeal made, inter alia, in his 1984 Human Rights Day message where he stated the following:

"Let us also sustain a determined effort to achieve universal ratification of the International Covenants on Human Rights and of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination. On this occasion, I should like to make a special appeal to Governments which have not done so to become parties to these instruments as soon as possible."

Such an appeal would furthermore be in line with a request addressed to the Secretary-General by the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities to hold "informal discussions concerning prospects for ratification of human rights instruments, with government delegations".

I HAVE NO DOUBT THAT THROUGH MY DISCUSSIONS WITH THEM, I WILL NOT ONLY HAVE A BETTER PERCEPTION AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE ISSUES AND PROBLEMS CONFRONTING YOUR PART OF THE WORLD, BUT THIS WILL GIVE ME AN OPPORTUNITY TO CARRY MY EFFORTS FORWARD IN THE SEARCH FOR A PEACEFUL AND JUST SETTLEMENT OF THESE PROBLEMS.

THIS INDEED WILL BE MY PRINCIPAL AIM IN MY CONTACTS WITH ALL THE PARTIES CONCERNED.

I SHOULD ALSO LIKE TO EXPRESS MY APPRECIATION TO YOU FOR THE WILLING CO-OPERATION AND SUPPORT THAT YOU HAVE ALWAYS EXTENDED TO ME IN THIS TASK INDIVIDUALLY AS WELL AS TOGETHER AS THE GROUP OF AMBASSADORS REPRESENTING THE ASEAN COUNTRIES. IN MY MANY CONTACTS WITH YOU, I HAVE COME TO ADMIRE VERY MUCH THE EFFECTIVE AND SKILLFUL MANNER IN WHICH YOU HAVE REPRESENTED YOUR COUNTRIES AS WELL AS THE COLLECTIVE POSITION OF THE ASEAN AT THE UNITED NATIONS. ## SECRETARY-GENERAL TO PAY OFFICIAL VISITS TO SIX COUNTRIES IN SOUTH-EAST ASIA AND PACIFIC

The following statement was made today by the Spokesman for Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar:

Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar will pay official visits to six countries in South-East Asia and the Pacific from Friday, 25 January, through Friday, 15 February, at the invitation of the Governments concerned. The countries are Australia, Indonesia, Malaysia, New Zealand, Thailand and Viet Nam.

En route to the region, the Secretary-General will visit the United Kingdom where, as Montague Eurton Visiting Professor of International Relations, he will deliver a lecture on international law to the University of Edinburgh on Tuesday, 22 January. On Wednesday, 23 January, he will meet with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and Foreign Secretary Sir Geoffrey Howe.

Following his stay in the United Kingdom, the Secretary-General will visit Thailand (25-28 January and 30 January-1 February), Viet Nam (28-30 January), Malaysia (1-3 February), Indonesia (3-7 February), New Zealand (9-12 February) and Australia (12-15 February). In transit, the Secretary-General will also be making brief visits to Laos and Singapore.

Note for the Secretary-General

The Secretary-Generals's trip to the U.K.  
South-East Asia and the Pacific  
20 January-16 February 1985

Herewith a copy of the current itinerary. I should like to draw your attention to two points in particular.

1. Singapore

Because of airline timetables you will be obliged to stop-over in Singapore twice. The first time will be for 1 hour only on 3 February, en route from Kuala Lumpur to Jakarta. The second time will be on Thursday, 7 February, en route from Jakarta to Sydney. This second stop-over could last 1 3/4 or 3 3/4 hours depending on your preference. The reason I mention this is that you may wish to choose the longer option in order to give the Singaporean Government an opportunity to greet you en passant. As you know you are unable, on this occasion, to accept the invitation to pay an official visit, which the Government of Singapore belatedly extended to you. On the other hand it could be best to postpone any encounter with the Singaporean Government chez eux, until you are paying a fully-fledged official visit.

2. Fiji Prime Minister

Your trip will not take you to Fiji because of the Prime Minister's absence for medical treatment. In fact, the Fijian Prime Minister is due to undergo a knee operation on 13 February, apparently in Canberra. Now it so happens that you also will be in Canberra on 13, 14 and early 15 February. Would you wish us to make discreet enquiries as to the possibility of your paying a brief call on the Prime Minister in Hospital? Such a call could help lighten the inevitable disappointment which the Fijians will share now that you are unable to visit their country. On the other hand it is very possible that the Prime Minister would be indisposed to receiving visitors so soon after an operation.

Secretary-General's visit to South-East Asia  
and the Pacific

As I mentioned to you this morning, Mr. Ahmed will be away from Headquarters for the next week. He left for the Islamic Conference meeting with a number of questions still outstanding on the Secretary-General's itinerary, (copy attached).

1. Malaysia

Apparently the Malaysian Ambassador has confirmed orally to Rafee that the dates are OK in principle. However, he has also said, informally, that the Prime Minister may have to rush back to Kuala Lumpur from an outlying province to be on time to receive the Secretary-General. You may wish to tell the Malaysian Permanent Representative that we need clarification on his Government's views. Do they wish us to postpone by an hour or two the Secretary-General's arrival in Kuala Lumpur or are the times suggested by Rafee OK with them? We need an answer quickly.

2. Australia

The Australian Permanent Representative told Rafee that the Prime Minister is likely to be abroad on a pre-arranged journey at the proposed time of the Secretary-General's visit, (6-9 February). We need the Australian Permanent Representative to confirm this. If the Prime Minister will be there, then the visit can go ahead. If the Prime Minister is absent, then we'll have to reconsider. The Australians are anxious, however, to receive the Secretary-General even in the Prime Minister's absence. In deciding on this, we'll have to bear in mind what happens in regard to Fiji.

3. Fiji

Last month the Secretary-General personally told the Prime Minister of Fiji that he would like to visit Fiji on 12/13 February. The Prime Minister replied that he would be in hospital in Canberra for a knee operation on 13 February and could not receive the Secretary-General although the Deputy Prime Minister could act as substitute. The Secretary-General suggested that Rafee liaise with the Permanent Representative over the following weeks.

Subsequently the Secretary-General intimated to Mr. Dayal and me that he would think it more appropriate not to visit Fiji in the absence of the Prime Minister. Rafee was asked to convey this to the Permanent Representative. However, the Fijian has now apparently confirmed that the Prime Minister will be absent and yet his Government expects the Secretary-General's visit to take place.

It seems to Rafee, and I agree, that if the Fijian and Australian Prime Ministers are absent then the Secretary-General should visit both countries or neither.

**4. New Zealand**

The New Zealand Permanent Representative has been serving his Government very well. Having presumably learned of the doubts regarding the visits to Australia and Fiji, Ambassador Harland has already supplied a proposed programme for the trip to New Zealand, copy attached. You may wish to put this before the Secretary-General.

Note for Mr. de OlivaresThe Secretary-General's visit to South-East Asia  
January-February 1985

1. Mr. Kunugi called Mr. Ahmed from Bangkok 13 DECEMBER . He expressed a desire to join the Secretary-General's party for the visits to Hanoi, Kuala Lumpur and Jakarta. Both Mr. Ahmed and Mr. Dayal feel that Mr. Kunugi's presence in Hanoi could invite the Vietnamese to engage in too detailed a discussion on the question of humanitarian assistance. Moreover, it is possible that Kunugi's presence could discourage openness on Co Thach's part in the political discussions. On the other hand it would clearly benefit Kunugi's standing in the region were he to be in the Secretary-General's party and accordingly it might be incongruous to leave him out, more particularly if he is to go to Kuala Lumpur and Jakarta but not Hanoi.

2. If Kunugi were included in the party for Kuala Lumpur, Jakarta and Hanoi, the discussions with the Vietnamese could be split in two, one part dealing with humanitarian assistance and the second with wider political matters. Mr. Kunugi could join for the first part but not the the second. In addition, the Vietnamese could be advised discretely that the Secretary-General will not be engaging in overly detailed or technical discussions on humanitarian assistance. The Vietnamese would have every opportunity to engage Kunugi in separate discussions of this nature.

3. Mr. Kunugi also reported that Thai officials had broached with him the question of the Secretary-General paying a visit to the Thai-Kampuchean border. It seems that the Thais will include in their draft programme two possible dates for a trip to the border, one before and one after the Secretary-General's visit to Hanoi. The second of these options would be the day of his definitive departure from Thailand, Friday, 1 February. The Secretary-General has already indicated that he would prefer any such trip to take place after Hanoi. Mr. Ahmed feels that a visit to the border should only be undertaken if unavoidable. My own feeling is that it would be difficult for the Secretary-General to avoid seeing UNBRO in the field. After all, his SRSG frequently asks donors to support the Operation. A decision not to visit the Operation could be open to many interpretations.

We would like to consolidate the Secretary-General's briefs by 4 January 1985. Many thanks.

\*\* The host will be Mr. Bowen Wells M.P., Chairman of the UN Parliamentary Group and the company will include a number of Parliamentarians as well as members of the Institute. Further information on the Institute will be provided shortly.

Additional Note

The Secretary-General may wish to note that Australia has recently selected UNDP as a multi-lateral vehicle for implementing an English Language Training programme in Viet Nam and Lao PDR. The Australian Development Assistance Bureau is making available A\$700,000 (US\$600,000) with a promise of equivalent amounts for 1986 and 1987 if the project progresses well. The money will finance language-training activities for the two countries by the Canberra College of Advanced Education operating under sub-contract to UNDP. This arrangement in addition to being a unique example of multi-bilateral cooperation for Indo-China will help alleviate one of the most persistent obstacles to technical cooperation programmes in the two countries - namely the lack of qualified, english-speaking counterparts.
