MONTHLY MOVEMENT REPORT

AUGUST 1964

I MEDICAL SECTION

A. ACTIVITY

The Clinic continued to receive patients who were from the International and Local Staff or their families, including the Nigerian Police Contingent.

Medical treatment was given to all ambulatory patients. Patients needing hospitalization were directed to the Danish Red Cross Hospital.

Medical examinations were given to candidates for new employment, to those whose contract had ended and for any requested laboratory tests.

The total number of examined, treated, or hospitalized patients, was 1,391.- for the month of August 1964.-

B. INCIDENCE of DISEASES

1.- Infectious diseases. No infectious diseases have been observed except for one case of Chicken-pox (Hospitalized).

2.- Malaria. Because of the dry season, only few malaria cases were reported this month.

3.- Digestive System. There were some cases of dyspepsia, dysentery, diarrhoea and a few cases of intestinal parasites.

4.- Respiratory System. Cases of Common Cold and influenza were the most prevalent.

5.- Venereal Diseases. A few cases of gonorrheic urethritis and two cases of soft sores were reported.

C. VACCINATION and INOCULATION

Inoculation and vaccination were given routinely to all staff members and Dependents in order to secure 100% protection.

7 September 1964

All evacuees from the interior of the Congo were checked by a special team under the guidance of Dr Cenerelli for regular vaccination. Those in need, were vaccinated before repatriation.

D. MEDICAL SUPPLY

The Clinic was adequately supplied by the Medical Supply Depot.

E. MISCELLANEOUS

The Clinic provided a small quantity of Gamma-Globuline, for epidemic areas.

II HYGIENE SECTION

A. SPRAYING

The following places were sprayed and dusted with either Gammexan or DDT to maintain good sanitary standard :

- 1) Headquarters offices.
- 2) Various Residences and Staff houses
- 3) The food Supply depot, the PX and the Commissary stores.
- 4) Necessary Hospitals.
- 5) All common use localities.

B. FOOD INSPECTION

All food suspected of decomposition and deterioration, was inspected.

Any supplies which were found to be unfit for human consumption, were condemned and ordered to be destroyed.

I. MEDICAL SECTION

A. ACTIVITY

- 1) During the report period the Clinic received patients belonging to both the International and Local TAB Staff and their families as well as the Nigerian Police Contingent.
- 2) Medical treatment was given to all Ambulatory patients. Those needing hospitalisation were directed to the Danish Red Cross Hospital.
- 3) Periodic and new employment medical examinations were given as well as requested Laboratory tests.
- 4) The number of patients examined, treated or directed to the Hospital totalled 1.036 during the month of July 1964.-

B. INCIDENCE of DISEASES

- 1) Infectious Diseases. Three cases of Mumps have been observed. Each was immediately sent to the Hospital for isolation and treatment.
- 2) Malaria. There have been no malaria cases reported during this period.
- 3) Digestive System. Cases of Dysentery, Diarrhoea, Dyspepsia and Intestinal Parasites were noted, especially among the Local Staff.
- 4) Respiratory System. Most of the respiratory cases were common Cold or Influenza of mild severity.
- 5) Venereal Diseases. The few cases observed were Gonorrhoea.

C. INOCULATION and VACCINATION

Inoculation and Vaccination were given routinely to all staff and their dependents so as to secure 100% protection.

D. MEDICAL SUPPLY

The Clinic was adequately supplied from the Medical supply Depot.

E. MISCELLANEOUS

1) The Kivu, Kasai and Equateur areas are considered as endemic for infectious Hepatitis. Approval is requested for the administration of Gamma-Globuline to all personnel posted in these localities.

2) A number of new arrivals in the Congo reach Leopoldville after having received only the first dose of certain vaccines and report to the Clinic for the rest of the series. Unfortunately the Clinic is not equipped to stock all types and varieties of these certain vaccines existing throughout the world. Since it is desirable to maintain the homogeneity of the dosage, I suggest that all points transferring Personnel to Leopoldville be instructed, when it is possible, either to complete each series before the employee is transferred or that the rest of the series is sent with him.

II. HYGIENE SECTIONA. SPRAYING

The major portion of the report period was spent in spraying and dusting with either Gammaxan or DDT solution, in order to maintain a good standard of sanitation in :

- 1) Headquarters offices,
- 2) Residences and Staff houses,
- 3) Food Supply Depot, PK and Commissary stores,
- 4) Hospitals,
- 5) Public and common utility localities.

A few days were occupied in spraying river banks near residential areas with "Malaria Oil".

B. FOOD INSPECTION

All food suspected of decomposition or contamination, was inspected.

Any supplies which were found to be unfit for human consumption, were condemned and ordered to be destroyed.

MONTHLY MOVEMENT REPORT - JUNE 1964

a : ACTIVITY : This Clinic continued to receive patients belonging to Civilian and Military GNOC Staff, based in Leopoldville, or being in transit.

Medical Treatment was given to patients who could be treated ambulatory. Patients needing hospitalization, were sent to the Danish Red Cross Hospital.

Laboratory examinations were done for patients and for newly engaged personnel.

The total number of the examined, treated or sent to the Hospital patients, was 1,496 for the period from 1 st June to 30 th June 1964.--

b : INCIDENCE OF DISEASES :

1) INFECTIOUS DISEASES : Except for one case of ^{mumps} ~~measles~~ no other infectious diseases have been observed.

2) MALARIA : Few mild cases of Malaria have been seen among the local and International Staff.

3) DIGESTIVE SYSTEM : They were cases of dysentery, diarrhoea, dyspepsia and intestinal parasites.

4) RESPIRATORY SYSTEM : Most of the cases were common cold and influenza.

5) VENERAL DISEASES : Few cases of gonorrhoea have been observed.

6) VACCINATION and INOCULATION : Effort was done to assure a 100% protection of the Staff members.

7) MEDICAL SUPPLY : The Clinic was efficiently supplied with medicines from the GNOC Medical Supply Depot.

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MONTHLY HEALTH REPORT FOR DECEMBER 1962

ACCOMMODATION

- 1 (a) Troops movements on a big scale took place during the month. While some stations were almost empty of troops, acute shortage of accommodation was felt in others into which new troops were inducted. All practicable steps were taken to promote ventilation and reduce over-crowding.
- (b) Shortage of mosquito nets reported last month continues to exist.

WATER SUPPLY

- 2 As reported previously, troops obtain water supplies from local civil sources. Regimental Medical Officer or local Senior Executive Medical Officer ensure that the water for drinking purposes is safe either by normal chlorination or boiling where practicable.

NUTRITION

- 3 Supplies of fresh and dry rations were satisfactory, qualitatively and quantitatively.

NIGHT SOIL DISPOSAL AND DISPOSAL OF NON-EXCRETAL WASTE PRODUCTS

- 4 There has been no change since last month's report.

VACCINATION AND INOCULATION

- 5 All troops and ONUC civilian staff are protected by vaccination and inoculation against some prescribed communicable diseases.

CIVIL HEALTH SERVICE AND CONDITIONS

- 6 The health of the ONUC civilian community (International civil staff and locally employed staff) has remained satisfactory.

(a) New cases in outdoors

Total outdoor consultations for minor ailments from the International staff is 290 of whom 18 were admitted to ONUC hospitals.

883 locally employed ONUC persons came for outdoor treatment of whom 12 were admitted to ONUC hospitals.

- (b) There was no outbreak of any notifiable disease in the civil population.

HEALTH OF TROOPS IN THE CONGO

- 7 (a) General state of troops' health continued to be satisfactory. there was no case of notifiable infectious disease.

(b) The hospital admission rate remains within permissible limits.

(c) Venereal diseases

There were 2 cases: all from Nigerian Contingent.

(d) A total of 9 cases of malaria has been admitted to ONUC hospitals.
