Subject: Forestry Project financed by German Counterpart Funds

A forestry project was recently sanctioned by the German Ambassador through the good offices of Mr. Brooks. The project costs amount to 1.6 million Congolese francs.

2. In the meanwhile, Mr. Linden, Forestry expert, who drew up the project, had to be evacuated from Mushie - the place of his posting. The local administrator M. Jean Pierre Nkanda drove Mr. Linden out of his house, ordered his arrest, and blocked his way out to Leo.

3. The Secretary-General to whom the matter was reported has taken a very serious views of the matter. Copies of cables he has sent are attached.

About two months ago a team of the International Bank came to the Congo to discuss the utilization of the unspent balances of these loans. Mr. Andersen, who represented Agriculture on the team, discussed the matter threadbare in the Ministry and with us. I arranged for his visit to Kivu province.

2. Mr. Andersen asked us to submit a project on the extension of tea cultivation in N. Kivu. A detailed project was submitted to him on September 18, 1963. It provided:-

3. The only snag about the project, is lack of administration, and absence of law order in the territory.

4. I have so far had no reaction from the Bank.

5. The Ministry is fully seized with the urgency of the utilization of this loan and is considering projects of his own. I again discussed this matter with the Secretary-General this morning.

I. GENERAL

1.1. More than 150 persons including 7 senators were arrested demonstrating for the release of the former Congolese Vice-Premier Antoine Gizenga in detention since 1962 on charges of planning a coup d'état.

1.2. In Katanga, the U.N. Irish contingent at Kolwezi was put on alert following disturbing reports about interference with Africans from resuming work at the Union Minière mine. Another trouble spot has developed at Dilolo on the Angolan border.

1.3. In Lac Lee II (Maindombe) province, administration has come to a grinding halt due to rivalries between two political parties and one of our experts (Forester Linden) has been greatly handicapped in his work.

1.4. The Fifth Committee of the United Nations Assembly session being held currently in New York has assigned top priority for the consideration of the proposal of extending ONUC operations in the Congo beyond the target date of December 31, 1963. referred to by the Secretary-General in his report of September 17, 1963 to the Security Council. As requested by the Prime Minister Adoula of Congo, it is proposed to maintain a U.N. Force of 5,000 for the first half of 1964. The Committee has under its purview the costs involved: revised estimates of 1963, proposed estimates of 1964 and expenditure incurred in 1962.

1.5. President Kasavubu ordered the closure of the Parliament which was discussing a new constitution of the Congo. Authority has now been vested in the Prime Minister to enact legislative measures.

II. RELATIONS WITH THE GOVERNMENT

2.1. Continue to be satisfactory.

2.2. There is a continuous clamour for the experts promised by the F.A.O. on the recommendations of the Janssen Mission report.

III. ECONOMIC SITUATION

3.1. The Congolese franc continues on its downward course and is now quoted in Brussels at 400 to a dollar (against 50 before Independence). Devaluation of the franc to a more rational level than the current rate of 64 has been delayed by conflicting advice rendered to the Government. The American counterpart funds generated by food supplies have been frozen until "such time as the Congolese Government carries out an internal stabilization programme designed to ensure that the expenditure of these counterpart funds will not be inflationary".

3.2. The German counterpart funds have stood us in good stead for some of our projects.

3.3. The Common Market has set apart 800 million dollars for the development of Africa.

3.4. Uncertainty about the devaluation of the Congolese franc has adversely affected both imports and exports.

IV. CONGO FUND

4.1. The Congo Fund is being strengthened by further contributions from various countries, notably 1 million dollars from U.S.A. and 1/2 million dollars from United Kingdom. The Government of the Congo has contributed 562,500\$ ear-marked for agriculture. In addition, it has undertaken to underwrite 1963 deficit by 2 million dollars. This will see us through 1963 deficit of 3.7 million dollars.

4.2. So far no definite assurances are forthcoming for contribution to the Congo Fund in 1964.

V. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

5.1. Latest instructions from New York have already been forwarded to Rome. ~~Benefit~~ of verbiage they amount to cutting down our mission to:- ^{Barely}

- (a) 4 posts under E.T.A.P.
- (b) Yangambi Institute to be financed by Special Fund.
- (c) U.N.O.C. will provide no administrative and logistic support.

It is a veritable anticlimax to our ambitious programme of providing 92 experts in 1964.

5.2. Luckily, we have 562,500\$ ear-marked for agriculture. And, if I have to provide for administrative and logistic support, we may just be able to make it up to June, 30, 1964. This hand-to-mouth planning is particularly ineffective in the field of agriculture.

VI. I.N.E.A.C.

6.1. A meeting for discussing the future of I.N.E.A.C. is due to be held in Rome on October 16. Various Governments interested in the project (Germany, France, Belgium, Italy) are expected to be represented at this meeting. Government of Italy has put up a draft agreement for taking over Yangambi which is the subject of request to Special Fund.

6.2. A German mission is expected shortly to study the Neoka project which Germany is considering to take over.

VII. TRAINING PROJECTS

7.1. The Agriculture Assistants course is functioning fairly well. The number of students taking the training is only 17 against provision having been made for 25.

7.2. The Farm Mechanics course is to begin in October after the vacation.

7.3. The Veterinary Wing at the Butembo school is likewise closed for vacation.

7.4. The Poultry Centre has now 22 students taking a three-months course. The sale of birds surplus to requirements of the centre has crossed the sum of 10,000\$. 1500 (2-day old) chicks arrived from Heifer Project in U.S.A. on September 24, 1963.

VIII. OTHER PROJECTS

8.1. Forester Linden's project of 1.681 million Congolese francs and 730\$ has been sanctioned. The Congolese francs will be found from the German Counterpart fund, and the foreign exchange element from the project 01-01.

8.2. Mr. Oldenhove is engaged on the preparation of a seed multiplication project.

8.3. Special arrangements were made for the supply of:-
(a) Vegetable seeds to the Vegetable Growers' cooperative.
(b) Potato seed to Thysville paysannat
(c) Cotton seed to Kabongo- the scene of a lot of political trouble in N. Katanga.

8.4. Mr. Facelina has drawn up a detailed community project for the Ministry of Social Affairs.

8.5. Mr. Copsey classified 89,142 kilos of coffee arabica and arranged for the export of 242,520 kilos of coffee.

IX. FAO BIENNIAL CONFERENCE

9.1. Mr. Garvey Laurent was in Léopoldville in connection with the conference. With his help a delegation for the conference has now been composed. It will comprise:-

(1) Minister (2) Secretary-General (3) Chief of Cabinet (4) Asst. Director (5) Belgian technician.

X. FELLOWSHIPS

10.1. A fellowship has been arranged for Mr. Gambo in aerial map interpretation in Holland.

XI. WORLD BANK

11. A 5-year tea expansion project has been submitted to the World Bank. Stated briefly, the project provides:-

XII. EXPERTS

1. AUGUADRA : is in Bukavu. He has organized a campaign against ticks and vaccination against rabies and rinderpest. He is handicapped due to want of medicines.
 2. BONETT : did extensive tours in the countryside.
 3. BRIMEYER : is acting as agriculture adviser at Goma
 4. COPSEY : has done excellent work in classification of coffee (Arabica) at OPAK-Goma
 5. CRNOSIJA : his fisheries cooperative at Bunia is still under consideration of Government.
 6. DELPHIN : is at Gemena. A Jeep has been shipped to him.
 7. DUPUY : is on leave
 8. FACELINA : is agriculture adviser at Stanleyville. He is engaged on a land reclamation project and on a community development project.

Subject : 1964 Programme

1. Thank you for your memo dated 19 November concerning the Programme for 1964.

2. It is true that the preparation of projects under the Expanded Programme is subject to the costing formula established by the TAB. However, in the case of the Congo an exception has been announced by TAB in their Circular No TAB/CN/1462 dated 11 November, addressed to all Agencies, a copy of which has been sent by me to you. Under the revised formula, we are authorized to exclude local costs from the standard cost figures and hence the figure adopted by you for costing your Programme can be considered in order.

3. I agree with the FAO that the cost of administrative assistance and secretaries required over and above the present level of the Programme might be met from the Funds-in-Trust. In the administrative budget I shall make provision accordingly and the charges would be made to the Funds-in-Trust account. I assume that there will be sufficient savings because of delay in recruitment to take care of these charges.

4. I see no objection to preparing a Category II Programme, that is to say, a Programme which could be implemented as and when savings are shown in the implementation of the Programme of \$562,500 arising from delays in recruitment. This amounts in effect ^{to} saying that the FAO will open recruitment for a total of 44 posts under the Funds-in-Trust rather than 36 posts and it may be that this would ensure that the minimum number of posts you have provided for might be obtained.

The revised budget for 1964 has been drawn up of
gear by the insistence of the PAF to provide \$1,000,000 dollars
for each expert financed from the amount \$10,000,000 earmarked
for agriculture.

2. It will be recalled that I had drawn up the original
budget relying upon the costing formula arrived at by the UNCTAD
Finance based on over a thousand experts in the Congo.

3. In consequence, the PAF has provided:-

I Advisory Posts	2	
II Training Posts	2	(with 3 French Professors)
III Operational Posts		
(a) Central Ministry	4	instead of 5
(b) Provincial Adviser	5	instead of 13
(c) Animal Production and Health	5	
(d) Provincial Foresters	4	
(e) Specialists	5	instead of 8
	<u>27</u>	<u>33</u>

4. It will be seen that operational posts have been reduced to 27 from 36; and the total number of posts from 40 to 31. Of these, 4 posts only are financed by E.T.A.P.

5. The FAO have also asked me to provide for administrative support viz.

2 Secretaries for 24 months
1 Admin. Assist. for 6 months

Total 32,000 \$

Will this be necessary? I made no provision for this under the impression that this was being cared for by you for all agencies.

6. In addition, they have asked me to provide for-

Category II - Operational posts numbering 8 which with equipment, transport and vaccines adds up to 172,000 \$ over and above 562,500. How can we provide this without any funds?

7. I am greatly disturbed over these changes. The original budget had the approval of the Ministry of Agriculture and had been processed through Planning Ministry, Economic Co-ordination, and had the seal of approval of the Prime Minister. Now, we are back again where we started.

8. The point at issue is the average cost of an expert. Should we take it at 18,000 \$ or adopt the Congo Fund formula which varies for experts in accordance with their grades and steps. Unless a decision on this point is available, it is very difficult to draw up a budget. The Congo Fund formula provides for an additional amount of 3,000 U.S. dollars in addition to the grade pay. I wonder whether it will cover:-

- (a) Travel - to and fro
- (b) Family and children's allowance
- (c) Leave allowance - Home Leave
- (d) Pensionary benefits
- (e) 50% of M.S.A. payable in \$.

9. I would have recast my budget on the basis of 18,000 \$ had it not been for the fact that it will be out of tune with the rest of your calculations for all other agencies. A decision in the matter is requested.

Mr. Dorsinville included the following paragraph in his report on his visit to Katanga and Kivu:

" The FAO forestry expert said that, having been called urgently to Bukavu 4½ months ago, he arrived to find that because of lack of transport, failure to pay people in the bush, lack of working material, etc., he could do nothing. A suggestion for a re-forestation programme had come to nothing since labourers were not willing to work for 65 frs. a day, when a bottle of beer cost 70 frs."

Can you advise me whether Mr. Moyaux now has transportation? If not, we should make a determined effort to find him a jeep.

I. GENERAL

1.1. During the month, things moved rather fast even for the Congo. The country has taken a full circle. And, we are almost back again at the point where we stood in 1961.

1.2 The Parliament has been dismissed. Consequent on the discovery of a plot to overthrow the present Government, a state of emergency was declared in the country for 6 months and Leopoldville was placed under Martial Law. (Oct. 20). The Government is being run by a Special Committee comprising of Mr. Anany, Minister of Defence as General Commissioner, assisted by Messrs. Maboti and Bomboko.

1.3. We have had strikes galore. There was a strike of teachers, workers of Air Congo and then there was a postal strike. To avert the constant threat of General Strike, 3 principal Union leaders were arrested (Oct. 24/63). The situation is naturally tense. Recent events in Brazzaville and Dahomey cast ominous shadows on the political scene.

1.4 In Luluabourg, a company of the 9th Battalion of the Congolese Army revolted under the influence of the leaders of Opposition at Luluabourg. 239 mutineers who were brought to Leopoldville are being court-martialled. Another 43 who had run away with their arms into the bush finally surrendered to the military authorities at Luluabourg.

1.5 For their complicity in letting the deputies Bocheley Davidson and Yumbo escape from the Makala prison in Leopoldville, two officers were degraded by General Mobutu in front of the troops in Binza. Two other soldiers, suspected of complicity in this affair, escaped to Brazzaville.

1.6 On October, 18, the General Assembly of U.N. resolved to spend up to 18.2 million dollars for the maintenance of U.N. forces (5,350) in the Congo up to 30th June, 1964. Of this, 3.2 million dollars will be found by the Congo.

II. RELATIONS WITH THE GOVERNMENT

2.1. Continue to be satisfactory.

2.2. The Secretary-General was away throughout the month on a training course. The Minister and the Chief of the Cabinet were in Rome discussing the future of institutions under I.N.E.A.C.

III. ECONOMIC SITUATION

3.1. The impending devaluation of the Congolese franc has held up both imports and exports and both AID and Trade are at standstill. Traders are averse to undertake any commitments. Despite conflicting advice tendered to the Government, the devaluation of the franc to a more realistic level is expected in a matter of days. Unless the devaluation is strengthened by a monetary and fiscal reform, the devaluation will drive the franc further downhill.

3.2. Agriculture production is suffering throughout the country due to:

- (1) Depreciating token of exchange viz. the Congolese franc
- (2) Lack of transport
- (3) Drying up of credit channels
- (4) Want of incentive goods
- (5) Absence of security and administration.

IV. 1964 BUDGET

4.1. The revised budget for 1964 envisages:-

Of the foreign exchange element 637,500 shown above 75,000\$ will be provided by E.T.A.P. The net amount required is 562,500 dollars which has been credited to the Congo Fund in advance.

4.2. This budget has been approved locally and is now under submission to headquarters.

V. I.N.E.A.C.

5.1. I am afraid the case of Yangambi Agricultural Institute will fall between two stools. After negotiations lasting over four months, an application to finance the resuscitation of this institute was submitted to New York: Special Fund. In the meanwhile, the Government of Italy showed interest in this project. The result is that Special Fund authorities have postponed consideration of this project and Italy is just seizing itself over this matter.

5.2. Discussions held in Rome have left things rather in thin air. No decisions have yet been taken.

5.3. My efforts to sell the Neoka research centre to the German Embassy are well on the way to bear fruit. A German mission is at present in Neoka looking into the requirements of the Centre.

VI. TRAINING PROJECTS

6.1. The Agriculture Assistants course is functioning fairly well. The number of students taking the training is only 17 against provision having been made for 25.

6.2. The Farm Mechanics course (6th session) commenced during the month with 29 students. With ONUC transport facilities having gone, it is exceedingly difficult to get the students from the interior.

6.3. The Veterinary Wing at the Butembo school has likewise commenced functioning.

3

6.4. The Poultry Centre has now 22 students taking a three-months course. The sale of birds surplus to requirements of the centre has crossed the sum of 10,000\$. 1500 (2-day old) chicks arrived from Heifer Project in U.S.A. on September 24, 1963.

VII. OTHER PROJECTS

7.1. Forester Linden's project of 1.681 million Cong. francs has been approved by the German Ambassador to be financed by the German counterpart funds. The foreign exchange element amounting to 730\$ will be met from my budget.

7.2. Mr. Oldenhove has put up a seed multiplication project. It was sanctioned during the month, the money having been found from the American counterpart funds.

7.3. Our Vegetable Growers' Cooperative has resulted in a pressing demand from another centre. The formation of another Cooperative Society: 'Cooperative de Kimpanseke' is now under consideration.


VIII. WORLD BANK

8. Another mission of the International Bank for Resuscitation and Development has arrived in Leopoldville. The mission had full and frank discussion about possibilities of agriculture development in the Congo.

IX. FAO CONFERENCE

9.1. It is expected that a fairly big delegation will attend the forthcoming conference in Rome.

9.2. Despite reminders repeated ad nauseum, the Congo has not yet paid its contribution to the F.A.O.



X. EXPERTS

1. AUGUADRA: is in Bukavu. He has organized a campaign against ticks and vaccination against rabies and rinderpest. He is handicapped due to want of medicines.
2. BONETT: was busy considering various projects.
3. BRIMEYER: is acting as agriculture adviser at Goma.
4. COPSEY: has done excellent work in classification of coffee (Arabica) at OPAK-Goma.
5. CRNOSIJA: his fisheries cooperative at Bunia is still under consideration of Government.
6. DELPHIN: is at Gemena. A Jeep has been shipped to him.
7. DUPUY: b resumed his duties on his return from leave.
8. FACELINA: is agriculture adviser at Stanleyville. He is engaged on a land reclamation project and on a community development project.
9. GARZON: is veterinary adviser at Stanleyville. He is handicapped due to want of medicines and equipment.
10. HAUGAARD: is veterinary adviser at Bunia. He has no transport and is at present sharing transport with the fisheries expert Crnosija.
11. JANKOVIC: is Forestry Adviser at Boma. He has submitted an afforestation project. A Jeep has been supplied to him with which he had an accident.
12. JEANNIN: is adviser to the agricultural research organization: INEAC. He is also in charge of the B.D.P.A. course and agriculture education in general. He went to Abidjan


seminar and from there to Rome. He returned to duty after an absence of about a month.

13. LINDEN: is Forestry adviser at Mushie where he has still no reasonable accommodation. He has submitted a Forestry project dealing with thinnings.
14. MOYAUX: is Forestry adviser at Bukavu. He has yet no transport.
15. MARTINEZ-DELICADO: resumed his duty at the Butembo Vet School on return from his leave.
16. MULLER: is Forestry team leader at Leopoldville.
17. OLDENHOVE: is Agriculture adviser at Thysville. He is engaged on a seed multiplication project which has been approved.
18. SPATRISANO: is running the poultry centre.
19. TATON: is agriculture adviser at Bukavu.
20. VAN BATTUM: is looking into tea-making in Kivu.
21. VISSER: is our marketing expert in Leopoldville.
22. WIGET: is in charge of Farm Mechanics Training Centre.

The allocation of \$1 million for 1963/64 for the Congo was thus made on this basis. MONTHLY REPORT

I. GENERAL

1.1. During the month, things moved rather fast even for the Congo. The country has taken a full circle. And, we are almost back again at the point where we stood in 1961.

1.2 The Parliament has been dismissed. Consequent on the discovery of a plot to overthrow the present Government, a state of emergency was declared in the country for 6 months and Leopoldville was placed under Martial Law. (Oct. 20). The Government is being run by a Special Committee comprising of Mr. Anany, Minister of Defence as General Commissioner, assisted by Messrs. Muboti and Bomboko.

1.3. We have had strikes galore. There was a strike of teachers, workers of Air Congo and then there was a postal strike. To avert the constant threat of General Strike, 3 principal Union leaders were arrested (Oct. 24/63). The situation is naturally tense. Recent events in Brazzaville and Dahomey cast ominous shadows on the political scene.

1.4 In Luluabourg, a company of the 9th Battalion of the Congolese Army revolted under the influence of the leaders of Opposition at Luluabourg. 239 mutineers who were brought to Leopoldville are being court-martialled. Another 43 who had run away with their arms into the bush finally surrendered to the military authorities at Luluabourg.

1.5 For their complicity in letting the deputies Bocheley Davidson and Yumbo escape from the Makala prison in Leopoldville, two officers were degraded by General Mobutu in front of the troops in Bina. Two other soldiers, suspected of complicity in this affair, escaped to Brazzaville.

1.6 On October, 18, the General Assembly of U.N. resolved to spend up to 18.2 million dollars for the maintenance of U.N. forces (5,350) in the Congo up to 30th June, 1964. Of this, 3.2 million dollars will be found by the Congo.

II. RELATIONS WITH THE GOVERNMENT

2.1. Continue to be satisfactory.

2.2. The Secretary-General was away throughout the month on a training course. The Minister and the Chief of the Cabinet were in Rome discussing the future of institutions under I.N.E.A.C.

III. ECONOMIC SITUATION

3.1. The impending devaluation of the Congolese franc has held up both imports and exports and both AID and Trade are at standstill. Traders are averse to undertake any commitments. Despite conflicting advice tendered to the Government, the devaluation of the franc to a more realistic level is expected in a matter of days. Unless the devaluation is strengthened by a monetary and fiscal reform, the devaluation will drive the franc further downhill.

3.2. Agriculture production is suffering throughout the country due to:

- (1) Depreciating token of exchange vis. the Congolese franc
- (2) Lack of transport
- (3) Drying up of credit channels
- (4) Want of incentive goods
- (5) Absence of security and administration.

IV. 1964 BUDGET

4.1. The revised budget for 1964 envisages:-

Of the foreign exchange element 637,500 shown above 75,000\$ will be provided by E.T.A.P. The net amount required is 562,500 dollars which has been credited to the Congo Fund in advance.

4.2. This budget has been approved locally and is now under submission to headquarters.

V. I.N.E.A.C.

5.1. I am afraid the case of Yangambi Agricultural Institute will fall between two stools. After negotiations lasting over four months, an application to finance the resuscitation of this institute was submitted to New York Special Fund. In the meanwhile, the Government of Italy showed interest in this project. The result is that Special Fund authorities have postponed consideration of this project and Italy is just seizing itself over this matter.

5.2. Discussions held in Rome have left things rather in thin air. No decisions have yet been taken.

5.3. My efforts to sell the Neoka research centre to the German Embassy are well on the way to bear fruit. A German mission is at present in Neoka looking into the requirements of the Centre.

VI. TRAINING PROJECTS

6.1. The Agriculture Assistants course is functioning fairly well. The number of students taking the training is only 17 against provision having been made for 25.

6.2. The Farm Mechanics course (6th session) commenced during the month with 29 students. With ONUC transport facilities having gone, it is exceedingly difficult to get the students from the interior.

6.3. The Veterinary Wing at the Butembo school has likewise commenced functioning.

I. EXPERTS

1. AUGUADRA: is in Bukavu. He has organized a campaign against ticks and vaccination against rabies and rinderpest. He is handicapped due to want of medicines.
2. BONETT: was busy considering various projects.
3. BRIMEYER: is acting as agriculture adviser at Goma.
4. COPSEY: has done excellent work in classification of coffee (Arabica) at OPAK-Goma.
5. CRNOSIJA: his fisheries cooperative at Bunia is still under consideration of Government.
6. DELPHIN: is at Gemena. A Jeep has been shipped to him.
7. DUPUY: resumed his duties on his return from leave.
8. FACELINA: is agriculture adviser at Stanleyville. He is engaged on a land reclamation project and on a community development project.
9. GARZON: is veterinary adviser at Stanleyville. He is handicapped due to want of medicines and equipment.
10. HAUGAARD: is veterinary adviser at Bunia. He has no transport and is at present sharing transport with the fisheries expert Crnosija.
11. JANKOVIC: is Forestry Adviser at Boma. He has submitted an afforestation project. A Jeep has been supplied to him with which he had an accident.
12. JEANNIN: is adviser to the agricultural research organization: INEAC. He is also in charge of the B.D.P.A. course and agriculture education in general. He went to Abidjan

seminar and from there to Rome. He returned to duty after an absence of about a month.

13. LINDEN: is Forestry adviser at Mushie where he has still no reasonable accommodation. He has submitted a Forestry project dealing with thinnings.
14. MOYLAUX: is Forestry adviser at Bukavu. He has yet no transport.
15. MARTINEZ-DELICADO: resumed his duty at the Butembo Vet School on return from his leave.
16. MULLER: is Forestry team leader at Leopoldville.
17. OLDENHOVE: is Agriculture adviser at Thyville. He is engaged on a seed multiplication project which has been approved.
18. SPATRISANO: is running the poultry centre.
19. TATON: is agriculture adviser at Bukavu.
20. VAN BATTUM: is looking into tea-making in Kivu.
21. VISSER: is our marketing expert in Leopoldville.
22. WIGET: is in charge of Farm Mechanics Training Centre.
