REPORT ON TRIP TO MELOS FOR THE PURPOSE OF SIGNING FOR AND
TAKING OVER GERMAN SUPPLIES FOR UNRRA.

(1) Met and talked over situation with Capt. Twin, English Officer in charge of the captured supplies. No secrecy possible because the whole Island knew what was being done.

(2) Met with the Medical Supply Committee appointed by UNRRA and Dr. Vrandiades, Cyclades Health Officer. Under the able leadership of Dr. Males, this Committee being the only one officially appointed by UNRRA agreed to take charge of all the supplies whether connected with Health or not. The Committee wisely appointed a sub-committee to take charge of the Power Generators, Telephone, Petrol, Oil, Coal and Lubricant. The Medical Committee await further instructions from UNRRA, and will be glad to have another officially appointed committee or committees to take charge of all supplies not having to do with health. The Committee stated that they are very anxious to have all these supplies remain on Melos, because it means so much to the future of the Island. Citizens of the Island are operating the power plants, telephone etc. with the fuel left there by the Germans. Payment is made to the workers to run these by giving them part of the food supplies left there. This was started by the Army left in charge of the supplies to keep things going. It was agreed that since there was no other means of payment that this should continue as long as the food lasted or until other instructions would be sent by UNRRA.

(3) Inspected the Hospital and Medical supplies left by the Germans. The Committee stated that they would leave them intact until further instructions from UNRRA. Committee gave a signed list of all the hospital and medical supplies. See Appendix 1.

(4) Checked on the drugs left by UNRRA Syros. Medical Indent made out for the coming month to the Medical Supply Committee Cyclades Region. Brought back for this Committee in Syros. As requested by the Pharmacist Mr. Armenis, of the local Medical Committee arrangements were made to move the drugs to the regular drug store, Plaka, which is more accessible to all on the Island than the temporary storeroom now in use. Capt. Twin made the arrangements.

(5) Met with the Sub-committee who are to be in charge of the power houses, telephone and fuel supplies. Inspected with them the two Diesel engines at Adamis. These supply the electric power and power to run the ice plant. The food supplies brought in by the Farouk were being stored in the ice plant. The committee explained that there was enough room to store food supplies for the Island as well as to make ice. It was agreed that the Hospital when it should start operating would be given preference for ice as a small ice box was found and will be taken to the Hospital. The two Diesel engines in the power house are powerful enough to supply the whole Island of Melos with electricity and only need two substations located in selected spots on the Island. This will require only some wire to complete as other supplies for this operation are on the Island. Asked the Engineer Mr. Morostis to make an estimate of the required amount of supplies, needed for this, as understood that the gasoline engines located in two other towns will be too expensive to operate after the German supplies of gasoline are used. This Sub-committee will be responsible to the Medical Committee, until otherwise instructed by UNRRA.

(6) Inspected the food left. Some of it is spoiled but much is usable. It will not last long, however, because it is used in lieu of money to pay the workmen. What remains, because of misunderstanding with the Nat'l Guard left to guard it, is to be stored in the Hospital building, and have the local police guard it or to have a man paid with rations from the supplies to look after it. The local people have lost confidence in the Nat'l guard stationed in Melos. There will be little if any food left for the Hospital.

(7) All the supplies were listed by Capt. Twin in general and by the Committees in detail. This was grouped in four parts making four appendages. Each of three copies was signed by the UNRRA representative, officially asked to sign for the supplies, local appointed UNRRA representative, Officer Supervising the Handover, and Greek Officer present at the Handover. Distribution of the copies was as follows: - one c

to each of the following, UNRRA Syra, H.Q. Force 142, and Nat'l Guard. Unfortunately no copies were left with the Medical Committee in charge of the supplies except there were copies of each of the appendages or detailed lists, which were also signed by the above persons.

(8) All persons talked to on the Island were concerned with the order of the Greek Mil. Athens to ship all the automobiles (3 trucks and 1 car). These are the only means of transportation on Melos except for mules which are needed on the farms. This transportation is needed especially to unload the ships bringing supplies and transporting them to the villages scattered over the Island. Capt. Twin sent a cable protesting this order but has had no word about it, and has no other recourse than to send the trucks to Athens on the next available boat. Wrote letter to Mr. Brown Reg. Director UNRRA Syra calling his attention to this, and asked him to tell the Nomark who was under the impression that these cars were to be left on the Island of Melos for civilian use.

(9) Spoke with the men in charge of civil affairs on the Island and of the Villages of Plaka and Adamis. The Sub-prefect of Melos was in Athens, but Mr. Emanuel Armenis assisted by Mr. Zervoudakis were carrying on. They all promised co-operation, and approved of the set-up and the persons left in charge of these supplies.

(10) Capt. Twin placed a guard on the supplies of oil and gas left at Adamis. This was approved by the Committee until other arrangements could be made. When the Greek Mil leaves the Island (soon?) Capt. Twin will ask the Navy to keep guard, unless other arrangements have been made at this time.

(11) The water used for the ice plant and electric power in Adamis comes from a well dug by and of the property of Mr. Sirmalen (American of Greek birth) who is quite willing that this continued to be used, but would like to have some water for his garden as there is plenty for both purposes. The garden has had none since the Germans appropriated the well and built the present buildings over the pumps.

(12) Some of the cable that connects Adamis and Mt. of San Elias and Topakas, used by the Germans to transfer electricity, has been appropriated by civilians. This is strong enough to carry the current generated by the power house and was approximately 15 kilometers long. It was suggested that this be collected for proper use.

(13) The repair shops and the hand worked dry-dock as well as other harbor facilities have been turned over to the Greek Navy by Greek Mil. This is mentioned because many of the citizens of Melos were under the impression that these also were turned over to UNRRA.

(14) The Medical Committee is setting up records and controls especially for the Gas and oil and food supplies. They will record everything that is given out for use or in payment for labor, and have accounts ready for inspection at any time.

(15) The civil authorities as well as members of the committee and private citizens expressed the wish that all the equipment taken from the Germans and turned over to UNRRA be left on the Island for the use of the citizens there.

Members of the Medical Supply Committee left in charge of the supplies:

Dr. Vassilios Mallis, President, Dr. Emmanuel Kypreos, Dr. Andreas Komis, Mr. Yacovis Armenis, Pharmacist, and Mr. Yeoryies Stayikopoulos, Justice of the Peace. Mr. Paniotis Vikhos previous member left for the Army and has not been replaced.

MILOS

A meeting was held with the presidents of the communities; Those present were Nikolaos Ferentinos, Plakas, Mr. Markantonis from Tripiti, Mr. Themistokles Karvayeris of Pano Triavassalos, Mr. Fragoulis Kanakaris, of Triavassalos and Mr. John Kavrouthakis; Mr. John Sirmolour of Adamas served as interpreter. Dr. Llewellyn and Miss Martha Crawford of U.N.R.R.A.

The committee had been informed of the GWR proposed plans by the Nomarch. In his letter the Nomarch had suggested a clinic for each community. This they did not feel necessary as 4 of the 6 villages are very close together.

Their final decision, which to us of UNRRA seemed excellent, was for two clinics one at Plaka to serve, Plaka, Pano Triavassalos, Triavassalos and Tripiti. This clinic to be held daily at the "Hospital". Dr. Kommis was appointed as the physician with Stella (Georgiou) Malli, as his helper, and a 2nd clinic to be held daily at Adamas. This clinic would help the people of Adamas and Zephiria. Dr. Emmanouil Kypreos, was chosen as the physician and his help will be Aikaterini (Ioannou) Vichou. This clinic will have the use of a home at Adamas. The clinics will be opened Nov. 1st 1945. They seemed clear as to operation of these clinics, those eligible, records to be kept provision of equipment, and medical supplies. However raised point, that Dr. Mallis is conducting a free clinic, daily, as requested by U.N.R.R.A.

The crippled and Disabled program was explained to them. there were no cases that they knew of, but will post the information.

State their U.N.R.R.A. rations are being received regularly, but transportation between Syra and Milos difficult.

Asked for the rest of the Census forms that they had not completed, and returned to Syra, explaining the necessity of our having these in order to be sure of our figures in sending rations. The president of Tripiti gave us those of his that were outstanding.

They brought up the problem of their need of fertilizers. Suggested they send a specific statement of their needs to Mr. Binopoulos, agricultural Officer of U.N.R.R.A. at Syra.

Their child feeding problem is from 0-14. There are no feeding stations. They give out the timed milk and other foods in bulk and state they will continue this way until receive instructions from PIKPA.

15/10/45

Meeting with the Medical Committee

1) State they are getting their supplies regularly but the variety of drugs is too limited.

On next indent they will indicate what other drugs they would like and for what reasons.

2) State the prices of drugs are too high. Estimate that 50% of prescriptions not filed as people unable to pay for them.

They will keep a specific list of these instances and forward to J.MSSC in Syra with recommendations as to price adjustment.

3) Were informed dental supplies would be available and requested to have the dentist send in a statement as to supplies he has on hand and a list of his needs.

4) The Hospital

The X-ray equipment (Left by the Germans) has been used. Have screened about 250 people mainly doing chest examinations.

5) Have an adequate supply of film on hand which they are unable to use as cannot develop the film.

c) Mr. Paul Green (U.N.R.R.A.) inspected the equipment and will submit a report. States: Simple, foolproof, portable apparatus, which appeared to be in working order.

d) Emergency operations have been done.

e) Clinic is held daily 8-10:30 by Dr. Mallis and Dr. Kypreos as requested by UNRRA. This clinic has been open to ALL and is FREE. Dressings and treatments in the clinic are done free. If medicine needed are given a prescription which is filled at the pharmacy. Only the indigents get their medicine free.

5) C.L.O. on hand 6 barrels, (originally had 13). Started distributing it in July. Now being given out in the schools to all school age children.

6) Malaria

a) 30 families in the Halakas area were given atabrin to use as a prophylactic. Dr. Kypreos states they took this regularly until they had to pay for it (per instruction from JMSSC of Syra.) now however have received a supply from the Ministry of Health which is to be free.

b) "Very few" cases from rest of the island (Dr. Kypreos states 300 in his private practice.) Cases are diagnosed on clinical findings alone. In only a very few instances have blood slides been made and examined. Drs. agreed in future to take blood slides; will send report of their findings to Syra.

7) Trachoma- The Doctors estimate there are 10 cases per 1000 cases, mostly located in Tripiti and Triovassalos.

8) Nutrition Survey.

Dr. Llewellyn discussed with the committee the nutritional survey work that has been done by the various doctors and asked their help with the work on Milos. Dr. Logothetis for the past 5 months has been working for the Patriotic Foundation. He has examined 830 children between the ages from 0-14. His examination has been quite detailed. He agreed to send us a summary of his findings to date and in the future will use the "Nutrition Survey" forms and send them to us.

I regret my delay in replying to the above, but would state that although your memo was dated August 7 it was only received here on September 1. The question of the medical supplies was already the subject of rather complicated correspondence, and I have had to wait until the position was clarified.

Your memorandum suggested that the equipment and supplies be taken in charge by the Agricultural Bank, but I trust on reconsidering the matter you will agree this is not the correct procedure, as the supplies were actually in the medical stores for issue by the Joint Medical Committee and could not be considered comparable with the stores held in the Agricultural Bank Depot for issue to the Joint Medical Committee.

The supplies were originally taken over by UNRRA and handed to an Emergency Joint Medical Supply Sub-Committee. Since then they have been taken over by a reconstituted Medical Supply Sub-Committee, as provided for in the Ministry of Hygiene's memo No. 1152/4827 of September 15, as per copy herewith:

"In reply to your letters 133541 and 187270 we beg to inform you that our Ministry considers that the material of a full hospital abandoned by Germans at Milos should remain in the island for the continuation of the functioning of the hospital for the relief of its population.

"For this purpose the material in question will be taken over from the local Medical Supply Sub-Committee who were administering it up to date, after drawing up as regular and detailed lists, by a Committee consisting of:

- 1) Fiscal Inspector, Milos
- 2) President of Commune Plaka, Milos
- 3) V. Malis, Military Doctor, retired
- 4) Andreas Komis, Doctor
- 5) John Armenis, Pharmacist

"The functioning of this hospital in general will be arranged later.

The General Director of the
Ministry of Hygiene,
Kopanaris."

Although the matter is now apparently disposed of, I thought you would be interested in my observations in connection with Paragraph 2 of this memo in case others feel the stores should have been taken on charge by Agricultural Bank:

1) There was no representative of the Agricultural Bank on the island, and it is my opinion that the equipment and supplies do not fall directly within the category or the type that is handed over and dealt with on normal Fortnightly Stock States.

2) The equipment should be considered as forming an integral part of the hospital, and not as equipment available in the nature of stocks.

3) In a similar manner, the supplies could be considered in circulation for the needs of the island. A great volume of unnecessary work and documentation would be involved if they were to be taken on charge by the Agricultural Bank through their records and then re-issued by them, and this would only result in the present position being arrived at.

As Mr. Mallis is away I reply to your letter of 8 instant.

The delay in answering is due to the fact that the letter was not given to me in time.

1) The instruments medicines, machines and other materials of the German Hospital have not been delivered to anybody but they are still in our hands as Committee of the Medical supplies, Milos, to which the Hospital was turned over in time.

2) The formation of the provincial Hospital, Milos, and the stay of the existing one have not been approved until now by the Ministry of Hygiene.

Until the receipt of this approval a clinic for out-patients is functioning in the Hospital and in case of emergency but rather rarely we accept in-patients mainly soldiers and sailors of the Navy.

Some X-rays examinations and small surgical operations are taking place.

The babies Station, the infant welfare and the Center of pregnant mothers of P.I.K.P.A. are being provisionally sheltered in one of the hospital rooms.

Will you kindly exercise your influence on the Ministry for the quick approval.

Subject: Milos Malaria Control

Investigation of the areas of malaria incidence on Milos disclosed that there were two main sources. One was a clearly defined area in the center of an intensive farming district near Zepheria. This area will be placed under larval control operations, equipment for the beginning of which was left on the island. A sanitary inspector is being dispatched to supervise larvaciding operations. The Malakas area was also found to be quite malarious. Control of larvae here would be quite difficult due to the scattered water sources. In this area malaria control is to be effected by prophylactic atebine treatment.

Arrived in Milos on 12 May with the UNRRA HQ health survey team. A meeting was held with the Eparch, Mr. Zervouthakis, in which the purpose of the trip was outlined.

Immediately after arrival Dr. Mendeloff (Lt. USPHS) and Dr. Daugherty (Lt. Comdr. USN) started spleen index surveys among the children in the Plaka-Plakis area. These surveys were continued by Dr. Daugherty in Tripiti, Triavassalos, Adamas, Zepheria, Alike, Lagada and the Halakas farming area.

This survey was very helpful in indicating the areas which would require anopheline larvae investigation. Absence of malaria in the small children in Adamas, Plaka-Plakis, Tripiti and Triavassalos indicated that there was little or no malarial mosquito breeding in these areas altho domestic mosquito adults were present in considerable numbers. Older children and adults who showed positive spleens, almost without exception, had worked in the fields on farms near Zepheria.

The spleen index in the Zepheria area was high (47%) in both children and adults. Entomological investigation disclosed anopheline breeding in the fresh water near the salt marshes. Some breeding was also found in the streams on the hills above the village. Altho some anopheline breeding was found on the Eastern slopes of the island the sparse settlement in this area did not allow much malaria contact.

Entomological and spleen surveys were made in the Halakas area. This area comprises both the North and South slopes of Mt. Ilias.

There was a high spleen index and anopheline breeding was found in the myriad scattered potholes and springs on the mountainside. The area is entirely agricultural and so no villages or centers of population requiring special attention exist.

It was felt that any mosquito control measures in this area could not be justified, at this time, from the expenditures required for the number of people involved. It was therefore agreed that atabrine prophylaxis should be undertaken in this area. To that end, a meeting was held in which the doctors (medical committee) agreed on a method of atabrine distribution and instruction in its use. The atabrine prophylaxis program was outlined by Miss Martha Crawford. The help of the schoolteachers and priests was enlisted in providing an educational program in the use of atabrine.

The villages of Zepheria and Tripiti have a common president, John Vikhos, who was contacted and, with the help of the Eparch, proposed to set up a malaria control committee which will work with the local sanitary inspector and supply local obligatory labor for malaria control work.

One sprayer together with paris green and kerosene was delivered to the president of Tripiti, and a supply of oil is to be sent. Dr. Vrondiades agreed to permanently assign a sanitary inspector to supervise spraying and drainage operations on both Milos and Kimolos. It is hoped that the inspector can be assigned and full-scale operations commenced within the next two weeks.

6-8/6/45

Discussion with Medical Committee:

- 1) Atribrin left for distribution for prophylactic use in the village of Halakis has not been distributed for this purpose, because there have been several cases of Malaria reported in other areas including Provata, Hora, and Alika, and the Com. felt that this medicine should be used for curing these cases and that the 35000 tablets left were not sufficient for both purposes. Advised that if cases were prevented that cures would not be necessary, but the Com. felt that all the Atribrin should be kept to treat those who had the disease. As soon as more is sent to the Island they will start the prophylactic program. Ased that more be sent as soon as possible.
- 2) Mosquito spraying had not been started either because of lack of transportation. The trucks left on the Island were to be shipped to Athens very soon and it was impossible for the Com. to get a hold of one for this use.
- 3) The distribution of Cod Liver Oil has been delayed because of an epidemic of enteritis caused by the Islanders eating too much meat (having not had any for four years) according to the doctors. After this has subsided the program will be started. Suggested that they start with small doses of a few drops and work up to the amount required amount in a few days. Also suggested that C.L.O. be considered a food as is Olive Oil, and not a medicine, as most seem to think it.
- 4) Typhoid inoculations have been started on a 1000 school children.
- 5) The Doctors felt that there was a great need for rice in the treatment of enteritis. As it is there is nothing for dietary treatment but tea. Other supplies needed beside the Atribrin and the rice were rubber tubing for enema bags etc.
- 6) The young girls group set up to aide and demonstrate the giving of C.L.O. are waiting for the signal from the Drs. to go ahead. They have been informed that there is a Scholarship for one year of hospital training given by the Patriotic Foundation for one person from Melos.
- 7) Dr Mallis brought up the need for trained mid-wives on the Island. There are none at present and the need is great.
- 8) Mr Paniotis Vikhos has been forced to resign from the Com. as he must leave for military service with the Nat'l Guard. He has not been replaced

As a result of the survey work done by Drs. Dougherty and Mendeloff and Capt. Kennedy certain problems in relation to the health of the people became apparent. Their findings showed the need for the use of prophylactic treatment for Malaria in the "Halakas Area" of the Island where it is not feasible to introduce a Malarial control program. The results of the nutritional survey done demonstrated the need for supplementing the diets of the infants, pre-school children and pregnant women with cod liver oil as they showed evidence of the lack of vitamins A&D in their diets, and in their physical condition. Their is evidence of these same deficiencies in the school age children, but as it is a chronic deficiency which will be little affected by the use of Cod liver oil at this time, emphasis should be placed on giving it to the first group in an effort to prevent deficiencies.

The Doctors of the island report recent cases of typhoid fever in the village of Tripiti and anticipate its occurrence in all parts of the island this summer. They feel there is need for an extensive program of immunization.

On May 20th I met with the Medical Committee of the island to discuss these problems with them and to help work out a plan with them. The use of Atebrin therapeutically and prophylactically was discussed in detail. Capt. Kennedy discussed with the doctors the area in which a malarial control program was to be initiated and the area where such a program could not be carried out (Halakas Area). The doctors agreed that the prophylactic use of atabrin in the latter area was indicated. They do not know the actual population of this area, their estimates varying from 500 to 1000 people. Enough atabrin was left to cover the prophylactic needs for 1000 people and in addition 6000 tab. for therapeutic use, for one month. Dr. Emmanuel Kypreos, who in the past has been the "Government Doctor" of the island volunteered to go to the Halakas area and distribute the first supply of atabrin to each family. He will explain to the people, the reasons for using this drug, its action and how and when it is to be taken. Families are then to go to the pharmacist for additional atabrin as needed.

Distribution of Cod liver oil

The doctors agreed that in light of the findings made by Dr. Mendeloff Cod liver oil should be made available first to infants, pre-school children and pregnant women. Babies from 40 days of age, pregnant women from the 3rd. month of their pregnancy. They estimate that there will be enough cod liver oil for the school children also which the doctors feel should be distributed through the schools.

There was considerable discussion as to how the people may best be stimulated to want to give their children cod liver oil. It was suggested by Dr. Mallis that a group of interested young women be gotten together and instructed used for this purpose. This suggestion was accepted by the other members of the committee. The help that the school teachers could give was also emphasized. Meetings were scheduled with the school teachers and the group of young women.

Typhoid immunization program: The doctors felt such a program necessary. They agreed to immunize any person who applied to them. Did not want to set up a clinic for it. However at the time the prefect was there there was discussion of

purposes. It was agreed that pending final decision by the Government a room could be equipped and used as a clinic for the population of Milos. Dr. Mallis will be the medical attendant. He will treat indigent persons and will set up a clinic for the immunization of the population against typhoid to which all the people will have access. It was felt that there was need for stimulation of the peoples interest and that the teachers and young women could be very helpful in this respect.

Meeting with the group of interested young women: Dr. Mallis and Miss Crawford met with this group. There were 12 young girls present:

and Mrs. Vickou, wife of the president of Tripiti, who is from South Africa, speaks english of course, and is very interested in the health of the people. Dr. Mallis outlined ways in which he felt they could be helpful. There was the discussion in detail of the need for codliver oil, specifically how it would help the people receiving it, when it should be taken and quantity to be taken (to be taken twice a day, after breakfast and after supper. Children up to 2 to be given 1 teaspoonful morning and night and the older children and pregnant women 1 soup spoonful morning and night.)

The use of typhoid vaccine was explained in detail also.

There was discussion also of things to look for when visiting in the homes(such as scabies, other skin conditions, Children and especially babies with diarrhea) and instructions to the parents about taking the children to the their doctor for medical care when these things were noted.

Catina Cambouri took detailed notes of the meeting. Isuggested to the girls that they form a club. Asked them to send me a report of their progress to Syra and to write for help with any problems they may have.

The girls discussed these plans with their parents and in each instance they were quite willing to have them participate in this work.

Meeting With the School Teachers:

There are 7 schools on Milos. The school of Adamas has been badly destroyed and at present school is held in the community center building, which is totally inadequate to their needs. There is no school building now at Tripiti and school is held in a private house, which is far too small for the 200 students. At plaka the school building was used as a hospital by the Germans, and at present school is held in a private house, which, too, is far too small for the 225 children attending. The school building at Triavasolos is in use. The building has 75 sq. meters of space for 411 children.

The teachers will prepare estimates of the cost of repairs for the damaged school buildings and a list of equipment they need which they will forward to the head of the schools at Syra.

Six of the schools are elementary schools and the seventh is a Civil school of four classes which are the equivalent of the first four classes of the Gymnasium. Children wishing to complete the Gymnasium must go either to Syra or Athens.

Discussed with the teachers the reasons why the children should take cod liver oil and the children from the Halakas area atebrin. Explained the action of these drugs, how they should be taken, when and in what amounts. They agreed to utilize every opportunity to teach the children and their parents the need for these things.

The teachers requested they be given a supply of first-aid materials

for use in the schools. They feel these are needed not only for first-aid treatment, but as a teaching tool in their health instructions to the children.

The teachers expressed their interest in these health measures and appreciate the fact that they are in a position to be very helpful and influential in implementing this program.

Visits to the Villages:

Following these meetings visits were made to the villages to talk to key people about the program. Contacted the presidents of the communities, the priests, interested women and men. Their response was encouraging, but feel closer supervision will have to be given to the program for a while.

Medical Supplies:

Medical supplies were turned over to the Medical Committee. A sufficient supply of typhoid vaccine was left to immunize 1475 people. Additional vaccine will have to be sent later. Sufficient atabrin was left for ~~the~~ prophylactic use for 1000 people for one month and in addition a quantity for therapeutic use.

MILOS- HOME INDUSTRIES

Almost all the homes have looms. Very few women however made things to sell. Prior to 1919 there was an organization in Adamas that made a variety of handwoven articles and sent them to the mainland to be sold.

Observed the work done in about ten homes. Their work was of excellent quality and well finished. They use a large variety of designs and colors in their work.

The materials they use are wool, dyed and spun by them, and cotton thread- Stimonia # 10. Of the latter for each bed cover they use 1000 dramma. This cotton thread they have not been able to obtain consequently there are only 3 women on the island doing any weaving at present.

In addition to the weaving the women make table linen and window curtains. These are made of linen with cut-work designs that are quite elaborate. For this work they use linen thread # 20-25-30 and 35.

A large amount of lace is made for which they use net thread "Lasse" #46 and 56.

These women are accustomed to making cotton yard goods from which they make men's shirts, childrens dresses and some womens clothes and under clothes. If they could obtain the necessary materials they would soon replenish their supply of clothing. For this cotton yard goods they need Stimonia #10. They are also very much in need of dyes for the materials they make.

Subject: Preliminary Report on Melos, 12-15 May 1945

- 1) A party of 14 UNRRAs personnel landed on Melos 12 May 1945, in order to investigate the status of the islands inhabitants with regard to health, nutrition, economic position, clothing and shelter. This appraisal was done in rather thorough fashion within three days.
- 2) I am unable to speak authoritatively of the results of the entire survey, inasmuch as some of the data requires further analysis. The data with regard to health and nutrition has already been given to Dr Parmelee and Miss Crawford. I think it is safe, however, to make a few general statements about conditions on Melos:
 - a) The island's economy was not badly dislocated by the war. The Germans had plenty of supplies, and they treated these with the people. As a result, although there is practically no currency in circulation, there is very little true poverty.
 - b) The nutritional status of the population is, for present ^{day} time Greece, surprisingly good. (the anthropometric data have not yet been analyzed, however) In the towns and villages there were signs of chronic vitamin A deficiency, and the usual chronic rickets, but no acute deficiency states were observed. Even the cave dwellers were in fair condition. There are 5000 sheep and 5000 goats on the island and there is much poultry. In the plains there are some vegetables; No signs of vitamin A deficiency, were observed there. Fish are plentiful, there is a little wheat and some barley.
JRC shipments have been very sporadic.
 - c) General public health conditions are fairly good. Spleen indices were 10% in the towns and 47% in the villages near the salt marshes. The malaria problem is thus rather definitely related to a clearly defined area. Tuberculosis incidence was not investigated, of course, but TB did not seem to constitute a large problem. There has been no typhus on Melos. But there have been sporadic cases of typhoid fever. Scabies was not very much of a problem and lice were not seen during our examinations.
 - d) The sulfur mines and perhaps the kaolin factory can be quickly set in operation, I was told by Mr Alexopoulos of UNRRA. The price situation will prove troublesome, however.
 - e) Schools are open and functioning rather well, it seemed to me. The teachers of Plaka and Triavasalos were excellent folk.
 - f) There has been considerable damage ^{to} buildings at Adamas. The mines at Voudia ^{have} been wrecked. Otherwise, damage from warfare has been minimal. There are 10,000 land mines, however, on the island, and the surrounding waters are heavily mined.
- 3) In general then, Melos is in a fairly comfortable position as compared with other Cyclades islands, at the moment. Nevertheless it will certainly require wheat and other staple foods. There are no milk centers operating there now and I am not certain that any should be begun unless adequate supplies are assured. A moderate amount of clothing has been distributed and medical supplies are being taken care of now. The large and well-equipped German hospital in Plaka should be maintained as a civilian hospital, at all costs. Much of its excellent equipment has already been removed by the Greek Army

MILOS

Miss Willms, RNC arrived with Athens HQ UNRRA group on 12 May, remained until 18th.

Dr. Parmelee, RMO " from Syros with Miss Crawford, Mrs. Bis and Miss Karimali by "Imerra" on 14 May and remained until 18th.

Inventory of the hospital equipment and supplies left by the Germans was begun by Miss Willms and Mr. Norelli of the Joint Medical Supply Committee in Athens and was completed with the aid of Dr. Parmelee, Misses Crawford & Karimali and Mrs. Bis. The Greek military authorities had taken over the building (originally a school building but altered to serve as hospital) and all its contents, but the understanding was that the matter would be settled in Athens between the Ministries of War and Health. The hope of the Milos population is that the hospital can be run as a civilian institution, with the needed space allowed for caring for Greek soldiers. Dr. Mallis, who had returned from Kimolos where he had gone as a refugee, took great responsibility in the matter of collecting the supplies in one part of the building and assisted in the task of inventorying. (50-60 beds, 83 mattresses)

Meeting was called of the IRC Committee, plus certain other citizens and UNRPA representatives (Norelli, Willms and Parmelee).

The plan for a Joint Medical Supply Sub-committee to be organized on every island was explained by Dr. Parmelee, who presided at the meeting. It would be understood now, that all drugs on the island should be pooled and that the old Committee would not longer be responsible for handling medical supplies. As Dr. Vronthiades' representative, Dr. Parmelee nominated the members of the new Joint Committee (names starred above) with Dr. Mallis as President.

At present, all drugs would be distributed free, later a pay system would be worked out. (For the first month, all food is to be distributed free.)

The matter of distribution of drugs throughout the island was discussed, each island committee being responsible for working out details in each case. Mr. Norelli reported that the Ministry of Health is working on the price list which will finally be put into effect. In reply to a question as to the malaria situation, Mr. Norelli explained that atebrom would be available for prophylactic purposes - one tablet a day for six days a week for three weeks; then, two or three times a week.

Drugs brought from Athens by Mr. Norelli would be turned over to the committee and these could be supplemented by the supply sent from Syra, as well as the case of Red Cross drugs which had been turned over to the Joint Med. Supply Committee in Syros, for delivery, by Mr. Nordenstrom.

Typhoid vaccine was requested by the Committee, as nine cases of typhoid fever had been reported from Tripiti.

Cod liver oil - 11 barrels reported to be awaiting transportation from the port. Advised the committee to put on a campaign of administering this to the children, despite the approach of hot weather. Suggested that Miss Crawford who would remain on the island for some days, might help start a program with the school children.

Drugs brought from Athens by Mr. Norelli were turned over to the Committee. Other supplies already on the island were to be pooled and an inventory made, also an indent to present to Miss Crawford. Before the "Imerra" departed for Syros, the Red Cross case of drugs and the Joint Med. Supply Com. shipment had been removed and placed in the clothing storehouse, where Miss Crawford might sort and arrange for delivery of the most needed supplies to the Committee.

Among the supplies from Athens were quinine tablets 5000; quinacrine (to be used same as atebrom); atebrom tablets; Halazone (Abbott) for water disinfection.

As Mr. Mallis is away I reply to your letter of 8 instant.

The delay in answering is due to the fact that the letter was not given to me in time.

1) The instruments, medicines, machines and other materials of the German Hospital have not been delivered to anybody but they are still in our hands as Committee of medical supplies, Milos, to which the Hospital was turned over in time.

2) The formation of the Provincial Hospital, Milos, and the stay of the existing one have not been approved until now by the Ministry of Hygiene.

Until the receipt of this approval a clinic for out-patients is functioning in the Hospital and in case of emergency but rather rare we accept in-patients mainly soldiers and sailors of the Navy. Ly

Some X-rays examinations and small surgical operations are taking place.

The babies Station, the infant welfare and the Center of pregnant mothers of P.I.K.P.A. are being provisionally sheltered in one of the hospital rooms.

Will you kindly exercise your influence on the Ministry for the quick approval.

Discussion with Medical Committee:

- 1) Atribrin left for distribution for prophalactic use in the village of Halakis has not been distributed for this purpose, because there have been several cases of Malaria reported in other areas including Provata, Hora, and Alikia, and the Com. felt that this medicine should be used for curing these cases and that the 35000 tablets left were not sufficient for both purposes. Advised that if cases were prevented that cures would not be necessary, but the Com. felt that all the Atribrin should be kept to treat those who had the disease. As soon as more is sent to the Island they will start the prophalactic program. Ased that more be sent as soon as possible.
- 2) Mosquito spraying had not been started either because of lack of transportation. The trucks left on the Island were to be shipped to Athens very soon and it was impossible for the Com. to get a hold of one for this use.
- 3) The distribution of Cod Liver Oil has been delayed because of an epidemic of enteritis caused by the Islanders eating too much meat(haveing not had any for four years) according to the doctors. After this has subsided the program will be started. Suggested that they start with small doses of a few drops and work up to the amount required amount in a few days. Also suggested that C.L.O. be considered a food as is Olive Oil and not a medicine, as most seem to think it.
- 4) Typhoid inoculations have been started on a 1000 school children.
- 5) The Doctors felt that there was a great need for rice in the treatment of enteritis. As it is there is nothing for dietary treatment but tea. Other supplies needed beside the Atribrin and the rice were rubber tubing for enema bags etc.
- 6) The young girls group set up to aide and demonstrate the giving of C.L.O. are waiting for the signal from the Drs. to go ahead. They have been informed that there is a Scolarship for one year of hospital training given by the Patriotic Foundation for one person from Melos.
- 7) Dr Mallis brought up the need for trained mid-wives on the Island. There are none at present and the need is great.
- 8) Mr Paniotis Vikhos has been forced to resign from the Com. as he must leave for military service with the Nat'l Guard. He has not been replaced

As a result of the survey work done by Drs. Dougherty and Mendeloff and Capt. Kennedy certain problems in relation to the health of the people became apparent. Their findings showed the need for the use of prophylactic treatment for Malaria in the "Halakas Area" of the Island where it is not feasible to introduce a Malarial control program. The results of the nutritional survey done demonstrated the need for supplementing the diets of the infants, pre-school children and pregnant women with cod liver oil as they showed evidence of the lack of vitamins A&D in their diets, and in their physical condition. There is evidence of these same deficiencies in the school age children, but as it is a chronic deficiency which will be little affected by the use of Cod liver oil at this time, emphasis should be placed on giving it to the first group in an effort to prevent deficiencies.

The Doctors of the island report recent cases of typhoid fever in the village of Tripiti and anticipate its occurrence in all parts of the island this summer. They feel there is need for an extensive program of immunization.

On May 20th I met with the Medical Committee of the island to discuss these problems with them and to help work out a plan with them. The use of Atebrin therapeutically and prophylactically was discussed in detail. Capt. Kennedy discussed with the doctors the area in which a malarial control program was to be initiated and the area where such a program could not be carried out (Halakas Area). The doctors agreed that the prophylactic use of atebrin in the latter area was indicated. They do not know the actual population of this area, their estimates varying from 500 to 1000 people. Enough atebrin was left to cover the prophylactic needs for 1000 people and in addition 6000 tab. for therapeutic use, for one month. Dr. Emmanuel Kypreos, who in the past has been the "Government Doctor" of the island volunteered to go to the Halakas area and distribute the first supply of atebrin to each family. He will explain to the people, the reasons for using this drug, its action and how and when it is to be taken. Families are then to go to the pharmacist for additional atebrin as needed.

Distribution of Cod liver oil

The doctors agreed that in light of the findings made by Dr. Mendeloff Cod liver oil should be made available first to infants, pre-school children and pregnant women. Babies from 40 days of age, pregnant women from the 3rd. month of their pregnancy. They estimate that there will be enough cod liver oil for the school children also which the doctors feel should be distributed through the schools.

There was considerable discussion as to how the people may best be stimulated to want to give their children cod liver oil. It was suggested by Dr. Mallis that a group of interested young women be gotten together and ~~insttute~~ used for this purpose. This suggestion was accepted by the other members of the committee. The help that the school teachers could give was also emphasized. Meetings were scheduled with the school teachers and the group of young women.

Typhoid immunization program: The doctors felt such a program necessary. They agreed to immunize any person who applied to them. Did not want to set up a clinic for it. However at the time the prefect was there there was discussion with the military authorities about the use of the German Hospital for civilian

purposes. It was agreed that pending final decision by the Government a room could be equipped and used as a clinic for the population of Milos. Dr. Mallis will be the medical attendant. He will treat indigent persons and will set up a clinic for the immunization of the population against typhoid to which all the people will have access. It was felt that there was need for stimulation of the peoples interest and that the teachers and young women could be very helpful in this respect.

Meeting with the group of interested young women: Dr. Mallis and Miss Crawford met with this group. There were 12 young girls present:

and Mrs. Vickou, wife of the president of Tripiti, who is from South Africa, speaks English of course, and is very interested in the health of the people. Dr. Mallis outlined ways in which he felt they could be helpful. There was then discussion in detail of the need for codliver oil, specifically how it would help the people receiving it, when it should be taken and quantity to be taken. (to be taken twice a day, after breakfast and after supper. Children up to 2 to be given 1 teaspoonful morning and night and the older children and pregnant women 1 soup spoonful morning and night.)

The use of typhoid vaccine was explained in detail also.

There was discussion also of things to look for when visiting in the homes(such as scabies, other skin conditions, Children and especially babies with diarrhea) and instructions to the parents about taking the children to the their doctor for medical care when these things were noted.

Catina Cambouri took detailed notes of the meeting. Isuggested to the girls that they form a club. Asked them to send me a report of their progress to Syra and to write for help with any problems they may have.

The girls discussed these plans with their parents and in each instance they were quite willing to have them participate in this work.

Meeting With the School Teachers:

There are 7 schools on Milos. The school of Adamas has been badly destroyed and at present school is held in the community center building, which is totally inadequate to their needs. There is no school building now at Tripiti and school is held in a private house, which is far too small for the 200 students. At Plaka the school building was used as a hospital by the Germans, and at present school is held in a private house, which, too, is far too small for the 225 children attending. The school building at Triavasolos is in use. The building has 75 sq. meters of space for 411 children.

The teachers will prepare estimates of the cost of repairs for the damaged school buildings and a list of equipment they need which they will forward to the head of the schools ~~##~~ at Syra.

Six of the schools are elementary schools and the seventh is a Civil school of four classes which are the equivalent of the first four classes of the Gymnasium. Children wishing to complete the Gymnasium must go either to Syra or Athens.

Discussed with the teachers the reasons why the children should take cod liver oil and the children from the Halakas area atebrin. Explained the action of these drugs, how they should be taken, when and in what amounts. They agreed to utilize every opportunity to teach the children and their parents the need for these things.

The teachers requested they be given a supply of first-aid materials,

4.
for use in the schools. They feel these are needed not only for first-aid treatment, but as a teaching tool in their health instructions to the children.

The teachers expressed their interest in these health measures and appreciate the fact that they are in a position to be very helpful and influential in implementing this program.

Visits to the Villages:

(Zepheria area
& villages surrounding
Plaka.)

Following these meetings visits were made to the villages to talk to key people about the program. Contacted the presidents of the communities, the priests, interested women and men. Their response was encouraging, but feel closer supervision will have to be given to the program for a while.

Medical Supplies:

Medical supplies were turned over to the Medical Committee. A sufficient supply of typhoid vaccine was left to immunize 1475 people. Additional vaccine will have to be sent later. Sufficient atebrin was left for ~~the~~ prophylactic use for 1000 people for one month and in addition a quantity for therapeutic use.

MILOS- HOME INDUSTRIES

Almost all the homes have looms. Very few women however made things to sell. Prior to 1919 there was an organization in Adamas that made a variety of handwoven articles and sent them to the mainland to be sold.

Observed the work done in about ten homes. Their work was of excellent quality and well finished. They use a large variety of designs and colors in their work.

The materials they use are wool, dyed and spun by them, and cotton thread- Stimonia # 10. Of the latter for each bed cover they use 1000 dramma. This cotton thread they have not been able to obtain consequently there are only 3 women on the island doing any weaving at present.

In addition to the weaving the women make table linen and window curtains. These are made of linen with cut-work designs that are quite elaborate. For this work they use linen thread # 20-25-30 and 35.

A large amount of lace is made for which they use net thread "Lasse" #46 and 56.

These women are accustomed to making cotton yard goods from which they make men's shirts, childrens dresses and some womens clothes and under clothes. If they could obtain the necessary materials they would soon replenish their supply of clothing. For this cotton yard goods they need Stimonia #10. They are also very much in need of dyes for the materials they make.
