1.D.	Agriculture: Attended the agricultural meeting sponsored by MINIAGRO 19 October 1995. During the meeting a new Danish NGO operating within the sector made the following announcement. They will be helping 400 targetted families through a direct sponsorship program via families from Denmark. To date they have distributed 1319 hoes, 50 insecticide dispensers, 1500 kg of Dithane and will distribute 2000 kg of bean seeds and have distributed 20 T of NPK 17.17 fertilizer. They have also rented fields for those families that did not have land. In addition they intend to distribute 100 kg of potatoes per family. Finally they stated that the following livestock will be distributed: 20 pigs, 200 goats, 300 sheep, 800 rabbits and 800 chickens.	UNHCR
1.E.	Education: FHI reports that school within the Gisenyi communes will start in early November. FHI staff have organized lists and programmes to assist returnee children to attend school. The school project has recieved school materials from UNICEF and has requested clothing items from UNHCR.	
1.F.	Transport: As a result of the tripartate meeting between Zaire/Rwanda/UNHCR, UNHCR has been tasked to put together a fleet of 30 vehicles to give them the capability of transporting a minimum of 2000 persons per day with a surge capability of transporting up to 7,500 per day.	UNHCR

2.A.	Treatment of Returnees by RPA:	MILOBS
2.B.	Influencing of Population within Sector: As a result of the tripartate meeting UNHCR and both governments are attempting to organize a method by which refugees from the camps in Zaire can be permitted to visit their communes in Rwanda for a short one day visit to assess the situation first hand and then return to the camps and tell others of their experience. At the same time efforts are being made to allow Rwandan officials to visit the camps in an attempt to encourage the refugees to return. No firm plan has yet been announced.	MILOBS
2.C.	<p>Rumors from Zaire Camp: There has been quite a bit of mine activity within the Goma region. The latest occurred on Sunday 29 October when two US American Relief workers were involved in a mine strike. One of the women lost both her legs. It is difficult, due to lack of access to the other side, to determine who and why is conducting this campaign of de stabilization. In any case at least two NGO's have reportedly suspended operations, with others significantly upping their security measures.</p> <p>There is speculation that the destabilization attempts are or could be conducted by the local citizen of North Lac Kivu. They reportedly are fed up with the refugee camps and the damage they are causing to their forests and wild life.</p>

2.E.	<p>Meeting with Local Authorities:</p> <p>The Humanitarian Team representative attended the inter-agency meeting 26 October 1995.</p>	MILOBS

2.F.	<p>Resources Available to Local Government:</p> <p>FHI and WFP have reached an agreement to begin a housing construction/repair project for vulnerable families in five communes. The project will see the construction of 500 homes in the next three months. This will provide on average 9 homes in each of the 53 secteurs. Food assistance will be provided to 1,980 families for construction labor and the fabrication of 250,000 bricks and 334,000 tiles. Each house will be constructed of 1,500 bricks and 2,000 tiles. It is anticipated that a total of 100MT of mais, 60MT of beans/peas and 12 MT of oil will be distributed to each commune per month.</p>	<p>FHI WFP</p>
2.G.	<p>Local Situation:</p> <p>The local economy continues to develop. We are noticing road work repairs being done. Building being painted. The market is well supplied and very busy.</p> <p>The border still remains closed to all traffic carrying humanitarian aid to the Goma camps.</p>	<p>MILOBS</p>

2.H.	<p>Security Situation: The situation appears to be getting more active. On two occasions the RPA have apprehended infiltrators. The first incident occurred 17 October 1995. Five insurgents were caught in the area of Rubavu Commune GS 2313. These insurgents were carrying a significant amount of ammunition and explosives, consisting of A/Pers mines, SA ammo, detonation cord, rifle grenades and hand grenades. When questioned by MILOBS they stated that they were part of a 200 man force that landed in the Kayove area from the Isle Ijwi on 28 September 1995.</p> <p>The second incident occurred 20 October 1995 when one insurgent was caught in the Gishwati forest. He had been wounded by a grenade blast from a grenade which his fellow insurgents threw. He told us that he had come from the Lac Vert camp on 4 October 1995 and that his group had 8 rifles and 6 mines. He stated that his groups mission was to destabilize the area, he also stated that his group never did get the chance to leave the forest to conduct any operations.</p> <p>In the adjoining sector of Kibuye there were two mine strikes, 31 October 1995. Both involved local citizens. One anti-pers mine was stepped on by a man in the morning, he lost his leg. In the same area as the first a second unexploded anti-pers mine was found and removed. The second incident occurred at 1900 hours when a donated Japanese bus hit an anti-tank mine. Three people were killed and six were injured.</p> <p>It appears that the insurgent activity is moving slowly inland from the coast of Lac Kivu.</p>	MILOBS

2.K.	Health: MSF reports that the health centre in Murara is completely rehabilitated and that the centre in Kora should be completed by end month. Monitoring of the health condition of the returnees indicates that in general the returnees are in average to good health.	MSF
2.L.	Prisons: The project to install security lights has been revived thanks to COOPI. They estimate it will take two weeks to gain budget approval.	MILOBS

3.A.	UN/NGO/Government Cooperation: A close and cordial relationship has been established for some time.	
3.B.	MILOB/UN Agency/NGO Cooperation:  On 20 October 1995 approximately 37 NGO's and MILOBS attended mine awareness training conducted in the NICOY compound. The training was very successful. The sector will be requesting that the training be repeated to allow those who were unable to attend the 20 October session to participate. It will be recommended that the training take place on a Sunday to allow for maximum participation.

HUMANITARIAN WEEKLY SITREP 25 - 31 DEC 1995

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The general situation in the Sector remains calm. Minor security incidents continue to occur in the outlying areas of the prefecture. There has been an increase in the number of infiltrations from across the border near the Parc Des Volcans.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. The Sect coord provision of UNAMIR tpt from NICOY to FHI for the transportation of building material to the communes. The Sect was approached by the Inspector of Schools to assist in distribution of test papers to the communes. The milobs provided escort to IOM vehs going to Kavoye. The weekly statistics for returnees are attached.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

4. a. HOUSING The joint FHI/WFP housing project continues in five communes. 35 houses have been constructed and 227 are under constuction. The project is likely to be completed by Feb 96.

b. EDUCATION NTR

c. HEALTH CARE/PROBLEMS The milobs report a large number of malaria cases in the Kivumu 2303 and other areas of west of the Gishwati Forest.

Both MSF/MERLIN remain ready to support both transit camps should a sudden influx occur.

NGOS'

6. FHI has distrubuted 150 tons of food which include maize, beans and cooking oil.

UN AGENCIES

7. UNHCR Continues with the repatriation process. The planned repat of OCL from Masisi has been suspended till 03 Jan. The sit in Goma was tense after a shooting incident on 27 Dec in which a Lt Col of the Zairian Army was killed.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES

8. Relations between UNAMIR and the local authorities remain cooperative and cordial.



HUMANITARIAN WEEKLY SITREP 9 - 15 SEPTEMBER 1995

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains stable. However, a major incident occurred in the Kanama Commune which resulted in the shooting deaths of 108 people in three separate sites. Organized repatriation continues although at a very slow rate. Figures for the week are attached. Zairian authorities closed their border 13 September following the incident in Kanama.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Major activity centered on the incident in Kanama. In addition the team visited the Secondary School in Rambara to inform them that UNAMIR was unable to fill their request for material and supplies. We continue constant monitoring of the returnee situation regarding numbers. The two dump trucks for the work at Nkmira transit camp arrived. Initially they were being loaded with gravel by hand with local labor. As of 14 September we gained approval for the use of the backhoe and it was deployed to assist with the work in the camp.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

3. a. FOOD Markets continue to appear to be well stocked. Prices for potatoes and beans are reported to be up considerably.
- b. WATER During a meeting with the ICRC water programme representative it became clear that the water shortage in the area Mutura Commune is neither new or likely to be solved even in the distant future. The simple problem is that the nature of the volcanic soil will not allow easy access to existing water. At the same time the nature of the ground makes the installation of a water pipe system so expensive that it is unlikely to be funded. A study and proposal was done by the World Bank before the war. However in the remainder of the Prefecture of Gisenyi north of the Ruhengeri/Kigali road continues to have its existing water systems improved and repaired.

f. HEALTH CARE/PROBLEMS Nigerian Company has resumed its visits to the two returnee camps in the Kayove Commune.

PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

4. As mentioned earlier the numbers of returnees this week was not significant. The detailed breakdown by number and destination commune is attached.

NGO'S

6. A. COOPI Continues its work with the development of the two transit camps.

B. ICRC Has begun the process of installing wood beds into the Gisenyi Prison. The preparation of the annex to the Gisenyi Prison has been put on hold pending direction from Kigali. In addition, the overcrowding situation is now resulting in potential health problems to the inmates. In particular the inability to get off their feet. The Prison Director will open the main cell block at night and allow the prisoners to sleep in the courtyard at night, but only if he can get some security lighting up in the courtyard for security. This request has been staffed up through the HAC.







GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains reasonably stable. This week there was only one significant incident. The Bourgmestre of Kayove and an accompanying Agricultural Specialized were ambushed and killed 27 September 1995. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira Transit camp. The sea containers will be moved next week to improve space in the camp. It was incorrectly reported last week that they had been moved. A check with the local ICRC indicates that the request for security lighting to be installed in the Gisenyi prison has still not been received at their level. It appears that this one has or will fall through the cracks. The lighting at the main border post was installed and is functioning.

3. During the week visited a number of orphanages and a centre for homeless children. It is apparent that all of these organizations need mostly clothes, shoes, toys and blankets. I did manage to get some mattresses through local sources for one orphanage. Have requested on the daily sitrep assistance from HAC in determining if there is a way to demand these goods from agencies in Kigali that may have these materials in warehouses. To date no reply has been received.

7. UNHCR Continues with the work of receiving, and transportation of returnees.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES

8. Attended the monthly inter-agency meeting yesterday. Representatives of all NGO's, local government, and UNAMIR attended. There were two main points of discussion throughout the meeting. Firstly, the very slow process of land redistribution and secondly the lack of resources provided by the various NGO's.


9. There is no question that the first problem is the main contributing factor to the second problem. MINERESO seems unable to commit land resources to the returnees on a permanent basis. As a result UNHCR and other agencies cannot concentrate on either the rehabilitation or construction of new infrastructure.

10. For example there are two camps in the Kayove area of the Gishwati forest that have been there for some three months. These people were moved there from the college transit centre on MINERESO's request. As a result they should be looked after by the government. Patrols through that area indicated that they are receiving little or no assistance. As a result they are being provided medical care through NICOY, they live in UNHCR sheeting.

---

Until the government resolves the issue of settlement in the Gishwati the NGO agency will not be able to render infrastructure assistance. The same situation is believed to exist in the Kora camp.

11. If the flow of returnees should accelerate and the problem of land allocation and resources not be resolved there is potential for serious social problems, which will no doubt be capitalized on by the FRGF.

1. The situation remains calm. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached. During the tripartate meeting held between Rwanda/Zaire and UNHCR it was agreed that Rwanda would receive up to 20,000 returnees per day. (10,000 through Gisenyi and 10,000 through Cyangugu) No start date or anticipated start date was given. However we in UNAMIR should start thinking now of how we could assist UNHCR with transportation resources should this occur soon.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira Transit camp. Numbers of returnees have not been high, so the camp is pretty much emptied daily.

3. Also continuing to gather data on orphanages in the prefecture. The local government official responsible for orphanages will provide the data early next week.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

3. a. FOOD NTR

c. HOUSING A 300 house construction project has been started in Kilibira Commune for the new returnees. Of this number 230 have been started and 40+ have been completed. 128 of these houses are to be allocated to women.

d. EDUCATION COOPI reports that they have completed their third phase of training non-qualified teachers, with the latest graduation of 482 persons. In addition they have completed work on 17 primary schools as follows:

4. In the Satinski Commune there are 1909 Widows and 1701 orphans. Any assistance in the form of food, clothes would be well appreciated.

5. A. COOPI Continues its work with the development of the two transit camps. They have requested assistance with dump trucks, and dozer and the use of the septic tank truck.

B. ICRC Will open a local office within the next week.

C. MERLIN/MSF MSF's work in preparation of the Saint Marie Gotti centre for unaccompanied children is near completion. Once complete it will house up to 160 children for up to three months at time.

D. WFP Continues with its Food for Work Programmes. In the Gaseke Commune two new projects will be initiated soon. One for the construction of houses and the second for road work.


#### UN AGENCIES

6. UNHCR The final food distribution for Old caseload returnees was completed in the Mutura Commune by INTERSOS. It was intended for some 10,455 persons, however MINEREISO presented a supplementary list at the last moment, which resulted in 21,775 sharing the allocation of food.

7. In Kayove Commune the MINEREISO distributed food to 877 returnees. In the Nkmira transit camp each returnee is receiving one months full food ration before they depart the camp. In addition they receive non-food items like blankets, jerry can, kitchen utensils, and a bucket and soap.

#### LOCAL AUTHORITIES

8. In spite of a written request made by the Gisenyi Coordinator for MINEREISO to the Prefect, no land has been officially allocated to the returnees for resettlement as yet. A definitive answer from the Government is still forthcoming.

## HUMANITARIAN BRIEF

SECT-5 17 JUN95

### General Situation

1. The general situation prevailing in sect 5 makes this sector an ideal platform for humanitarian work. During the period from 20 May to 17 Jun, the humanitarian work by MILOBS in this sector was carried out as per the guidelines given by HAC. Important information which could assist NGOs and other UN agencies to continue with their humanitarian work was provided to them. MILOBS also accompanied NGOs and UN agencies in remote\ sensitive areas to access the requirements of food, medicines and other essential commodities.

2. There has been some turnover of people in UN agencies and NGOs. Humanitarian team met the concerned agencies and explained integrated system of working followed in this sect. This was primarily to ensure continuation of smooth functioning, optimal utilisation of resources and maximum cooperation.

### Major Humanitarian Problems.

3. Old Caseloads. This problem was projected during the last conference held on 20 May and is still a major source of concern. College reception center is the only center remaining which houses 59\60 returnees who are awaiting resettlement in land to be allotted to them by the MINRIESO. The college reception centre has following problems:

- a). The infrastructure is not sufficient to provide basic hygienic conditions to the returnees as the place is very overcrowded.
- b). Long waiting period and uncertainty about their future can turn these people into unpredictable lot. They can turn violent and at the slightest pretext can resort to looting and demonstrations. MINRIESO till date has not been able to identify sufficient land for their rehabilitation.

### Humanitarian Activity

4. A brief account of humanitarian activity by various agencies is as follows:

- a). UNHCR.
  - \* Organised repatriation from Goma during the period of report, however the number of returnees has been less.
  - \* Food distribution in communes.
  - \* Resettlement of old caseloads.

- b). WFP.
  - \* Provide food to old caseloads in reception centre.
  - \* Provide food for work for different ongoing projects.
  - \* Provide food to returnees in the communes on as required basis.
- c). COOPI.
  - \* Runs the college reception centre and looks after its sanitation.
  - \* Rehabilitation of primary schools.
  - \* Seed and tool distribution in communes.
  - \* Training of about teachers.
- d). ICRC.
  - \* Monitor the prison condition and treat sick prisoners.
  - \* IT is carrying out water rehabilitation in the sect.
  - \*
- e). MSF\MERLIN\ MEMISA.
  - \* Rehabilitation of health centres including their staffing.
  - \* Manning of health posts in remote communes.
  - \* Vaccination programmes in the communes.
  - \* MERLIN looks after college health center medical post which has an appx str of people.

#### Achievements-MILOBS

5. The Ministry of Family and promotion of women, approached MILOBS, seeking assistance in transporting non food items to the communes of Satinsyi, Gaseke, Kibilira and Kayove. Over 300 kitchen sets, blankets and mats were supplied using integral transport and transport provided by TUNBATT.

6. A tracked dozer from the force engineer (requisitioned by the MILOBS) was used to clear mud blockage in water outlet, in the Gihira hydro-electric project, run by the Electrogaz. This will ensure uninterrupted electric supply in Gisenyi prefecture. The dozer was later used to dig yet another garbage pit in the college reception centre.

7. MILOBS coordinated the movement of joint heli patrol comprising of M S F, MERLIN, UNHCR and MILOBS to visit areas made inaccessible by rains. These patrols checked the food stocks at Ngororero commune which is meant for 10,000 people staying in Ramba commune. MERLIN distributed medicines in

Ngororero and Kibilira commune. In another heli patrol MSF could reach Jomba(5609), a remote post made inaccessible by rains. UNHCR was also part of this heli patrol and they monitored the food situation and the condition of the returnees in the communes.

8. MILOBS and the medical team from TUNBATT immediately reached accident site on 05 Jun at Nemba(7718) where a local bus had met with an accident. They assisted local medical authorities in evacuating the injured .

9. Sector commander and Humanitarian team visited Gisenyi Prison and looked into the prison condition. The septic tanks are overflowing and need to be drained out at the earliest. Attempts to get a pumper truck have not been successful. We have told the prison authorities that we are on top priority and vehicle will be provided for draining the septic tank at the earliest.

Recommendations\ Points For Discussion.

10. Mosts of the roads in the sect are not motorable due to rains, effort to reach inaccessible areas is being done by making use of heli patrol. This has brought valuable information. It is recommended that heli patrol should be given higher priority.

11. Request was made by prison authorities for provision of some sports equipment(a few set of volley ball kit) so that prisoners can have some recreation and will also be good for their health. It is recommended that some sports equipment to be provided to the prison authorities so that prisoners are benefited.

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains calm. With the exception of one incident in Rubavu commune which occurred 17 October. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira Transit camp. Numbers of returnees have increased somewhat this week.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

3. a. FOOD NTR

e. FARMING The planting of crops continues to accelerate, all the agronomists within the communes have been encouraged to monitor the progress of the crops closely and report any difficulties.

f. HEALTH CARE/PROBLEMS Both MSF/MERLIN remain ready to support both transit camps should a sudden influx occur.

PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

4. NTR

NGO'S

5. A. COOPI Continues its work with the rehabilitation of schools, both the transit camps and in addition its agricultural program in concert with UNHCR. In Mutura commune they have supported some 400 families. They have distributed a total of 5250 hoes and 26 tons of bean seeds.

B. ICRC Will has opened a local office in Gisenyi.

C. MERLIN/MSF NTR

D. WFP Continues to work in three major areas, Repatriation/Returnees, Seed protection with World Vision, and Food for Work program. They have finished construction of two tents within the Nkamira transit centre, with a total capacity of 800 tons. The Food for Work program continues in Kibiliria with a project on house construction. It will involve some 720 families and construct 300 houses. They will be paid with 40 tons of food for a total of six months. Road rehabilitation continues in Kanama, Mutura, Gaseke and Ramba. In Satinskyi a fish pond project has been started, 4000 fingerlings have been delivered to the site. In the near future WFP plans to begin another housing project in collaboration with FFH. It will construct an additional 500 houses in five communes. Finally they have begun a reforestation project which includes 10 nurseries per commune with 1 per secteur.

E. Food for the Hungry Continues with its seed distribution program in concert with UNHCR within 6 of the 12 communes. They have served a total of 4060 families. They conduct two types of seed distribution, targeted group and general distribution to support the local officials and population. In addition they work closely with the agronomists in all communes to ensure maximum gain is achieved from the seeds/tools/fertilizer provided.

F. INTEROS Will distribute 8.5 tons of bean seed to the communes of Kayove and Nyamyumba on behalf of UNHCR.

G. BORNEFORNDEN A Danish NGO agency is operating in the communes of Giciye and Karago. They are helping some 400 families via support families in Denmark. To date they have distributed 1319 hoes, 50 of 80 insecticide dispensers, 1500 kg of Dithane, they intend to distribute 2000 kg of bean seed and 20 tons of NPK 17.17. They are also assisting by renting fields for families with no land. In the near future they plan to distribute 20 pigs, 200 goats, 300 sheep, 800 rabbits and 800 chickens.

#### UN AGENCIES

6. UNHCR Continues to oversee the repatriation of returnees and coordination of the agricultural distribution of seeds.



LOCAL AUTHORITIES

8. It is clear from the meetings attended this week that the ministry of rehabilitation and the ministry of environment have diverging views. The major difficulty is that land is required very quickly in order to ensure a smooth transition of returnees to the communes. Those settled in the camps in the Gishwati will probably be moved, destination or timing of move yet to be determined. The intent to stop the destruction of the forest is clear. The ministry of the environment representative stopped a planned distribution of seeds to those camps located in the forest.



GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains calm. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira Transit camp. Attendance of the monthly inter-agency coordination meeting. Assisted IOM with escort patrol to the Kayove commune to deliver food and returnees. Coordinated with NICOY transport assistance in support of National Tree Day and with the pre-olympic trials to be held in Gisenyi. Escorted Canadian representatives from 95 CMSG to the orphanage in Murura and Enfants du Rue where they dropped off donations. Also attended a social event at the Nyundo Orphanage Noel.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

3. a. FOOD NTR

b. WATER Awaiting response from HAC on results of the water point recommendations forwarded some time ago. Although no promises are or were made regarding this project, I think it is important that we provide feedback on the status of these projects. It will be more and more difficult to remain credible in the communes if all we do is ask what needs to be done and then are not seen to actually be doing anything.

c. HOUSING FHI and WFP have reached an agreement to begin a housing construction/repair project for vulnerable families in five communes. The project will see the construction of 500 homes in the next three months. This will provide an average of 9 homes in each of the 53 secteurs. Food assistance to 1,980 families for construction labour and the fabrication of 250,000 bricks and 334,000 tiles will be provided. Each house will be constructed of 1,500 bricks and 2,000 tiles. It is anticipated that a total of 100MT of mais, 60MT of beans/peas and 12MT of oil will be distributed to each commune per month for the next three months.

d. EDUCATION School will begin in the Gisenyi communes in early November. COOPI continues to rehabilitate these schools, FHI continues to organize and provide assistance to returnees in order for them to attend school.

e. FARMING FHI has agreed to provide seeds in stock to non-returnee vulnerable families in Gaseke and Kanama communes. They provided 5 tons of Beans to Kanama and 3 tons of beans to Gaseke. Transport of these items was provided by UNAMIR

f. HEALTH CARE/PROBLEMS Both MSF/MERLIN remain ready to support both transit camps should a sudden influx occur.

PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

4. The Canadian representatives from 95 CMSG distributed sports items, cots, footwear and miscellaneous items to the orphanage at Murara and the Enfants de la Rue.

NGO'S

5. A. COOPI NTR

B. ICRC NTR

C. MERLIN/MSF MSF reports that the health centre located in Murara is completely rehabilitated. The centre in Kora should be completed by the end of the month.

D. WFP Continues with its Food For Work programmes in Gaseke and Kanama. As mentioned previously they have coordinated and combined their efforts with FHI in a housing project.

E. Food for the Hungry Continued to coordinate the agencies that indentify and register vulnerable families and unaccompanied children at the Nkamira transit centre. During the week they registered 129 vulnerable families/364 persons. 24 of the families/78 persons are destined to resettle in the five communes of FHI operations, Karago, Giciye, Mutura, Rewerere and Rubavu. The remaining 105 families/286 persons are destined for other prefectures. FHI will pass the information regarding these families to the appropriate UNHCR sub-offices.


#### UN AGENCIES

6. UNHCR Received a mission from Kigali including representatives of the Ministries of Rehabilitation, Agriculture, Environment and Tourism, Public Works, Health and Education. The mission along with the Sub-Prefect, local representatives of the Ministries and a UNHCR

SM visited potential sites for the permanent resettlement of the old caseload returnees in Mutura Commune. Nearly 800 hectares were identified as probable sites, pending official documents from the government. The possibility of exploiting some 1000 hectares bordering the Volcano Park will be examined. Gishwati Forest officially remains off limits for resettlement, however over a thousand families are currently occupying land in the Mutura section of the forest alone.

#### LOCAL AUTHORITIES

I would ask that you arrange for the truck to report to both the College and the Nkamira transit camp as soon as possible.



GENERAL SITUATION

1. Security incidents throughout the week have been on the increase. As mentioned in the sector operational sitrep on 2 November it appears that the incidents are not only increasing in number, but are now occurring over a larger area simultaneously. It may be that the insurgents are concentrating in the Gishwati before they attempt to take on the RPA in the field. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Visited the Mutura Communal office to investigate a request to rehabilitate the electricity. However upon arrival it turned out that electricity had never been in the communal office and that power lines would have to be laid and the building wired. The assistant bourgmeister was told that the job should be given to government, that UNAMIR could not assist. The security lighting for the Gisenyi prison may be put in place within the next two weeks. The COOPI representative will take on the project since it is such low cost. This will enable the overcrowding problem at night to be reduced somewhat.

3. Discussions with FHI indicate they may request transport assistance for their house construction project. I will coordinate with NICOY next week.



GENERAL SITUATION

1. The only major event to occur this week was the RPA assault on the Isle of Wahu on 6/7 November. Detailed supplemental sitrep was sent to MILOB HQ. There were three mine strikes in the areas of Gaseke and Giciye. Two were anti-pers with one anti-tank mine. Two local women were involved in the anti-pers strikes and lost one leg each. The anti-tank mine resulted in two dead. The vehicle involved belonged to the Swiss embassy.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Generally a slow week. Visited the Gaseke Commune to inquire on bridge rehabilitation. They requested assistance with the repair of 8 wooden bridges. They will provide the materials. I will be visiting there again next week to determine which of the eight bridges should be repaired. Of course we continue to monitor the repatriation process. Numbers of returnees appear to be getting lower and lower. Figures for the week are attached.



HUMANITARIAN WEEKLY SITREP 11 - 18 NOVEMBER 1995

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains stable as it was in the last week but some NGOs are scared to carry out their operation at the rural area. However, our MILOB teams escorted/guided them in some time. The liaison officer of RPA reported that one Bourgamestre OF RUBAVU Commune has injured from the personnel mine at IWAWA Island and three other received minor injury.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. I have arranged one truck from NICOY Nyundo to bring about 7 tones of food from KIGALI on 20 Nov 95 to RUMBURA Secondary school at KARAGO commune (4517). They also agreed to carry books and stationery to Nyamyumba, Kayove, Rubavu, Gicye, karago, Gaseke, Satinsyi, Kibirira, and Ramba primary school with effect from 20 to 22 Nov 95. I attended all NGOs meeting arranged by UNHCR on 15 Nov 95 and the following point were discussed :

- a. UNHCR Gisenyi has received information from Goma that a mass influx may take place at any moment.
- b. The zarian authority is keeping to the 31 Dec 95 deadline for repatriation.
- c. that the daily number of returnees may exceed our capacity to provided transport and house them.
- d. IOM has 15 transports at this moment with a capacity of 2000 persons. They are putting their effort to get more 15 veh from other places for having the capacity of 5000 people in three convoys daily, and
- e. If the influx exceed the transport and housing capacity, then the returnees be allowed to proceed on foot to either transit camps or their own communes if local authorities agree with this planning.

3. a. FOOD Markets continue to appear to be well stocked. Prices for the essential commodities are reported to be up considerably.

C. MERLIN/MSF There is a agreement between MSF and MERLIN to work together for providing support to the large influx.



GENERAL SITUATION

1. The general situation in the Sector remains calm. Minor security incidents continue to occur in the outlying areas.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. This week close liaison with the Education Department resulted in a number of tasks involving transport of food from Kigali to Rambura and the transport of books and stationary to Karago, Gaseke, Satinski, and Giciye. In addition a coordination conference with the Sector NGO's was held to get a feel for how the Sector was prepared, should a large influx occur. As a result of the meeting the first draft of the Sector contingency plan has been completed. The final draft will be forwarded to SOO by 27 November 1995. Of course we continue to monitor the repatriation process. Numbers of returnees appear to be getting lower and lower. Figures for the week are attached.
