4. Administrative - Draft closing scheduled prepared by administration staff was faxed vide reference C. With the closure of the Mission, the assets and all permanent civilian staff of UNOMUR will be transferred/integrated to UNAMIR.

a. UNMOs

- (1) Vehicles, radios, equipments issued to UNMOs have already been taken over by civilian staff and stored in the Logistics ware house/Support HQ from those who have already ben repatriated to home country/transferred to UNAMIR.
- (2) "Check out procedure" as per Annex B is strictly followed before finally leaving the Mission Area.
- (3) Settlement of all financial claims (current/outstanding) for those already left have been done. For remainders, it will be followed accordingly.

b. Buildings/CPs/OPs: Hired and UN constructed structured are disposed off as under:

- 1. HQ Area West
- 2. HQ Area East
- 3. Kafunzo OP/CP
- 4. Lubirizi OP/CP

c. Transfer of Vehicles/Equipments

- (1) Already Transferred - Vehicles(total 6), equipments, furnitures which are not required for use in UNOMUR have already been transferred to UNAMIR.
- (2) Being Transferred - All other assets i.e. vehicles, radios, generators, office equipments, furnitures etc. are being transferred to UNAMIR as soon as they are no longer required for operational and administrative use by UNOMUR.

d. Liaison/Assistance Unit

- (1) To coordinate the movement of logistical support for UNAMIR through Uganda a small (2/3 members) "Liaison/Assistance Unit " may remain stationed at Kabale out of presently held UNOMUR civilian and technical staff.
- (2) To maintain the supply route by land for UNAMIR, Katuna crossing point is recommended for use due to all weather good road for heavy vehicles.
- (3) Besides a 2/3 members UNMOs from UNAMIR will also be stationed at Kabale to carry out liaison duties from 21 September 1994.

- (4) The "Liaison/Assistance Unit" may be housed in the present Logistics Ware House/Support HQ which is located in the heart of Kabale town.
- (5) The "Liaison/Assistance Unit" can perform required duties at Katuna border from Kabale which is at a distance of only 20 Km.
- (6) The "Liaison/Assistance Unit" will retain telephone/fax/computer, other office equipments, vehicles, generators as required to keep the unit functional for all purposes.

e. Transfer of Civilian Staff

- (1) All civilian and technical staff (total 17 including 7 locally recruited staff) will remain in Kabale until such time assets are transferred to UNAMIR and commitments with local authorities/owners are finalized. International staff will be transferred to UNAMIR once their services are no longer required in Kabale.
- (2) Contract and services of all (total 7) locally recruited staff will be terminated until their need ceased.

f. Transfer of Files/Documents - Following military documents/correspondences which need to be preserved for future reference will be sent to HQ UNAMIR after the closure of the Mission for retention/further disposal to UN NYK. Routine and internal correspondences will be destroyed by burning before the closure.

- (1) All Code Cables
- (2) All important operational & administrative correspondence
- (3) All maps.

- g. **UN Flag** - UN Flag which will be lowered down from the Mission Headquarters through an "official ceremony" on 20th September 1994, marking the closure of UNOMUR will be despatched to UN NYK for preservation in the archive.

5. **Conclusion** - All UNMOs will be leaving the Mission Area by 25 September 1994. The closure of the civilian wing and their subsequent transfer to UNAMIR will take place immediately on completion all commitments as outlined above. This draft is forwarded to you as directed vide reference 'A' for kind perusal please.

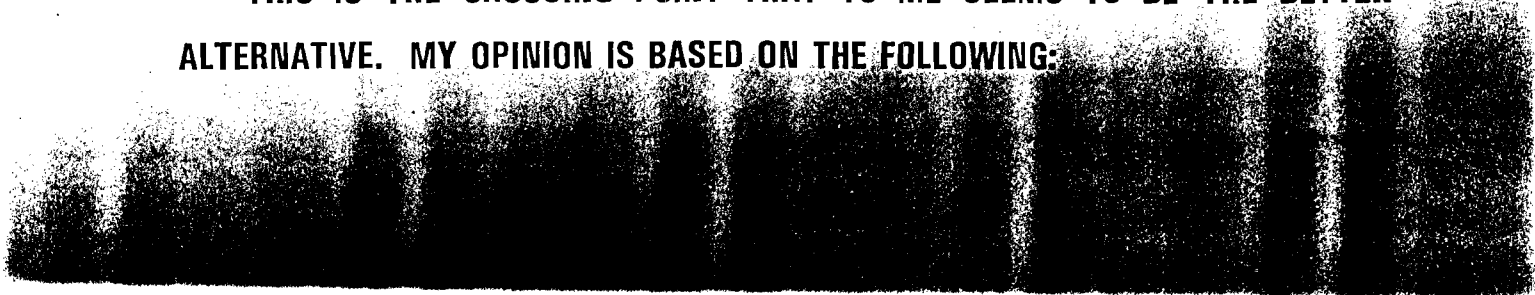
1. TWO CROSSING POINTS ARE TO BE CONSIDERED BETWEEN UGANDA AND RWANDA;
MIRAMA HILLS AND KATUNA.

MIRAMA HILLS

THIS ROUTE HAS BEEN USED BY CANDY LOGISTICS AND UNAMIR DURING THE INITIAL STAGE OF UNAMIR'S REDPLOYMENT. IT IS ASPHALT SURFACE EXCEPT FOR THE PART BETWEEN THE MAIN KAMPALA ROAD AND MIRAMA HILLS WHICH IS A GRAVEL ROAD. THIS MIGHT CAUSE PROBLEMS IF IT IS USED BY HEAVY LORRY TRAFFIC DURING THE RAINY SEASON.

KATUNA

THIS IS THE CROSSING POINT THAT TO ME SEEMS TO BE THE BETTER ALTERNATIVE. MY OPINION IS BASED ON THE FOLLOWING:



- (A) WITHIN UGANDA THE ROAD IS VERY GOOD WITH ASPHALT SURFACE ALL THE WAY. THIS IS ALSO THE CASE WITHIN RWANDA EXCEPT FOR APPROXIMATE 300 METERS THAT IS GRAVEL;
- (B) THE SHORT DISTANCE BETWEEN THE BORDER AND KIGALI;
- (C) THE NEARNESS TO KABALE WHICH IS THE LOGICAL PLACE FOR AN OVERNIGHT STOP. FROM KABALE TO THE BORDER IT IS ONLY 20 KM.
- (D) THIS CROSSING IS THE MAIN CROSSING POINT USED BY NGOs AND LOCAL TRANSPORTERS.

2. LIAISON/ASSISTANCE UNIT IN KABALE


IF THE DECISION IS TAKEN TO STATION STAFF IN UGANDA AGAIN KATUNA IS THE CHOICE. IN OR CLOSE TO MIRAMA HILLS THERE IS NO ACCOMMODATION OF ACCEPTABLE STANDARD FOR LONGER STAY.

IF KATUNA IS CHOSEN STAFF COULD BE ACCOMMODATED IN KABALE (20 KM FROM THE BORDER) AND THE PRESENTLY USED OP BUILDING CAN BE RETAINED, THIS WOULD SOLVE THE PROBLEM WHERE TO PLACE THE OFFICE. I CAN SEE NO PROBLEM FOR STAFF TO LIVE IN KABALE AND TRAVEL TO THE BORDER POINT WHEN NECESSARY.

AN ALTERNATIVE IS TO FIND A SUITABLE BUILDING (VILLA) ALONG THE KABALE-KATUNA ROAD THAT COULD BE USED AS REPORTING CENTRE FOR SUPPLY TRUCKS.

IF CIVILIAN STAFF ARE ASSIGNED TO THIS UNIT I THINK TWO STAFF MEMBERS ARE ENOUGH. ONE OF THEM WITH EXPERIENCE OF COMMUNICATION.

WHEN IT CONCERNS COMMUNICATIONS I LEAVE THIS TO THE EXPERTS. I THINK HOWEVER THAT A DIRECT LINK WITH KIGALI AS WELL AS LOCAL TELEPHONE FACILITIES WILL BE NEEDED. NO TELEPHONE LINES ARE AVAILABLE IN KATUNA.

3. THERE IS HOWEVER AN OTHER ALTERNATIVE AND THAT IS TO HAVE NO STAFF STATIONED IN UGANDA. IF THE NEED FOR ASSISTANCE ARISE STAFF FROM THE RELEVANT UNIT COULD BE DESPATCHED FROM KIGALI OR ANY OTHER UNIT CLOSER TO THE BORDER. FOR THIS ALTERNATIVE TO FUNCTION IT IS IMPORTANT WITH TIMELY AND CORRECT INFORMATION ABOUT THE ARRIVAL OF THE CONSIGNMENTS TO THE BORDER. THIS I THINK WILL BE A PROBLEM WITH THE COMMUNICATION FACILITIES AVAILABLE PRESENTLY BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES.
 4. MY OPINIONS BASED ON WHAT IS MENTIONED PREVIOUSLY IN THIS MEMO, IS THAT IF THERE IS A NEED FOR AN "ASSISTANCE UNIT" IT SHOULD BE STATIONED IN KABALE FOR WORK AT THE BORDER CROSSING AT KATUNA.
 5. FORWARDED TO YOU FOR YOUR PERUSAL AND ACTION AS DEEMED NECESSARY.

THIRD PROGRESS REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE
UNITED NATIONS OBSERVER MISSION UGANDA-RWANDA

I. INTRODUCTION

1. The present report is submitted in pursuance of paragraphs 2 and 3 of Security Council resolution 928 (1994) of 20 June 1994, by which the Council decided to extend the mandate of UNOMUR for a final period of three months until 21 September 1994 and requested the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the termination of the operation before the completion of its mandate. The report covers the period since my last report to the Security Council on UNOMUR dated 16 June 1994 (S/1994/715).

2. UNOMUR, established by Security Council resolution 846 (1993) of 22 June 1993, was mandated to deploy on the Ugandan side of the border with Rwanda in order to verify that no military assistance reached Rwanda. Its monitoring activities focused primarily on transit or transport, by roads or tracks which could accommodate vehicles, of lethal weapons and ammunition across the border, as well as any other material that could be of military use.

II. DEPLOYMENT AND ACTIVITIES

3. As indicated in my previous report (S/1994/715), the drastic change in Rwanda since last April compelled UNOMUR to expand its monitoring activities in Uganda from the areas controlled by the Rwandese Patriotic Front (RPF) to the entire border areas between the two countries. Despite the mission's phased reduction plan to be set out in paragraph 9 of this report, the expanded coverage of 1/0-kilometer border areas continued with vigor and efficiency during the current period under review. It is recalled in this context that the Security Council adopted resolution 918 (1994) on 17 May 1994, by which it invoked Chapter VII of the Charter to impose an embargo on the delivery of arms, ammunition and related material to Rwanda from any part of its borders.

4. UNOMUR has implemented its tasks essentially through patrolling, monitoring and surveillance of the whole stretch of the operation areas, involving both mobile and fixed observations as well as on-site investigations of suspected cross-border traffic. Greatly enhancing these tasks, the details of which were explained in my previous report (S/1994/715), were random aerial surveillance

and patrols by helicopters, including the airlifting of military observers into areas of high elevation for observation of routes leading to the border.

5. I am pleased to report that, in general, UNOMUR's activities in pursuance of its mandate have been effective. Continuous from the situation described in my previous reports to the Council (S/26878 and S/1994/715), clandestine cross-border traffic has remained at an appreciably low level with no evidence of significant armament and/or armed personnel movements detected. Despite the resumption of hostilities and the subsequent chaos in Rwanda, the situation of cross-border traffic from Uganda into Rwanda remained well under UNOMUR control and does not appear to have changed during the reporting period.

6. In addition to the border monitoring activities, the reporting period was highlighted by a vital role played by UNOMUR in supporting the build-up of UNAMIR and coordinating humanitarian activities in and around Rwanda. Such a role was performed at a critical time between early April and early August when the resumed fighting in Rwanda made the use of Kigali airport difficult and, at a later stage, impossible. The significance of UNOMUR's role in this respect remained unchanged even after the unilateral declaration of a cease-fire by RPF on 18 July, which effectively ended the civil war but did little to alleviate the refugee situations.

7. Following the adoption of Security Council resolution 918 (1994) on 17 May, which authorized an expansion of the UNAMIR force level up to 5,500 troops, the mission has become a forward base to back up the movement of personnel, equipment and supply into Rwanda for an expanded UNAMIR. During the closure of Kigali airport, Entebbe functioned as the only air base from which those personnel and supply were routed by land to Rwanda. The following were the measures taken by UNOMUR in support of the UNAMIR build-up:

(a) A team of UNOMUR military observers was stationed at Entebbe to coordinate logistic activities.

(b) UNOMUR escorted 60 APCs as well as convoys with logistic materials and foodstuff from Entebbe to the Uganda-Rwanda border for use by UNAMIR.

(c) A temporary transit camp with the capacity of accommodating at least 100 troops was established at the Mirama Hills checkpoint to ensure smooth entry of newly arriving UNAMIR troops into Rwanda.

(d) Evacuation of UNAMIR casualties have been carried out with the help from UNOMUR.

(e) UNOMUR has made a total of 117 helicopter sorties during

this period between Kabale and Entebbe as well as between Kabale and the Zairian towns of Goma and Bukavu in order to transport UNAMIR and other UN personnel.

8. On the humanitarian front, it is recalled that the United Nations Rwanda Emergency Office (UNREO) and many of NGOs embarked on their initial relief activities in Kabale, where UNOMUR headquarters is located. UNOMUR, inter alia, helped coordinate their activities, provided liaison facilities, gave daily security update on Rwanda, and kept track of their movement to help ensure their security in case of emergencies.

9. In accordance with paragraph 2 of Security Council resolution 928 (1994), I have started implementing the following reduction plan of UNOMUR's size in four phases, with its monitoring activities being scaled down gradually. Three of the four phases have already been carried out.

(a) In Phase I, which took effect as from 15 August, the mission's total strength of 80 military observers was reduced by 25: five MILOBs from Slovakia and 10 from Zimbabwe were transferred to the United Nations Assistance Mission for Rwanda (UNAMIR) while 10 from Brazil were repatriated to home country. (Accordingly, Sector West headquarters was closed together with the observation posts at Lubirizi and Kafunzo.)

(b) In Phase II, effective from 30 August, the mission was further reduced by nine: nine MILOBs from Bangladesh were repatriated to home countries. (The level of monitoring activities in this phase was unchanged.)

(c) In Phase III, effective from 6 September, additional 12 MILOBs left the mission: eight MILOBs from Bangladesh and four from Hungary were repatriated to home countries, leaving a total of 34 UNMOs to continue until the end of the mandate period. (The reduction in the force strength at this stage resulted in the closure of Sector East headquarters as well as the termination of the stationing of the UNOMUR team at Entebbe.)

(d) In the final Phase, which is to take effect upon the completion of the mission's mandate on 21 September, all the remaining MILOBs will leave the area of operation for their respective countries.

10. As of 9 September 1994 (or any day before 21 September), UNOMUR consisted of 34 military observers from the following countries: Bangladesh (3), Botswana (9), Brazil (3), the Netherlands (10) and Senegal (9). In addition, the mission included 11 international civilian and 7 locally recruited staff performing a variety of substantive and administrative support

tasks.

III. FINANCIAL ASPECTS

11. As indicated in my report on the financing of UNAMIR (A/48/837), the administrative costs related to the military observers and civilian personnel of UNOMUR, with effect from 22 December 1993, are included in the cost estimates for the maintenance of UNAMIR. The General Assembly, by its resolution 48/248 of 5 April 1994, authorized the Secretary-General to enter into commitments at a monthly rate not to exceed \$9,082,600 gross per month for the period from 5 April to 31 October 1994, for the maintenance of both operations.

IV. OBSERVATIONS AND CONCLUSION

12. With the completion of UNOMUR, which had lasted nearly a year since its full deployment in September 1993, I would like to present my overall assessment of the role played by the observer mission. I would also like to comment on lessons learned from UNOMUR and prospects for a possible use of such a mission in the future.

13. UNOMUR was intended to create an atmosphere conducive to a negotiated settlement of the Rwandese conflict and to underscore the importance that the international community attaches to the maintenance of peace and security in the region. While the tragic turn of events in Rwanda prevented it from accomplishing its ultimate goal of facilitating such a negotiated settlement, it should be noted that it has successfully played a useful role as a confidence-building mechanism for the parties involved in the peace process.

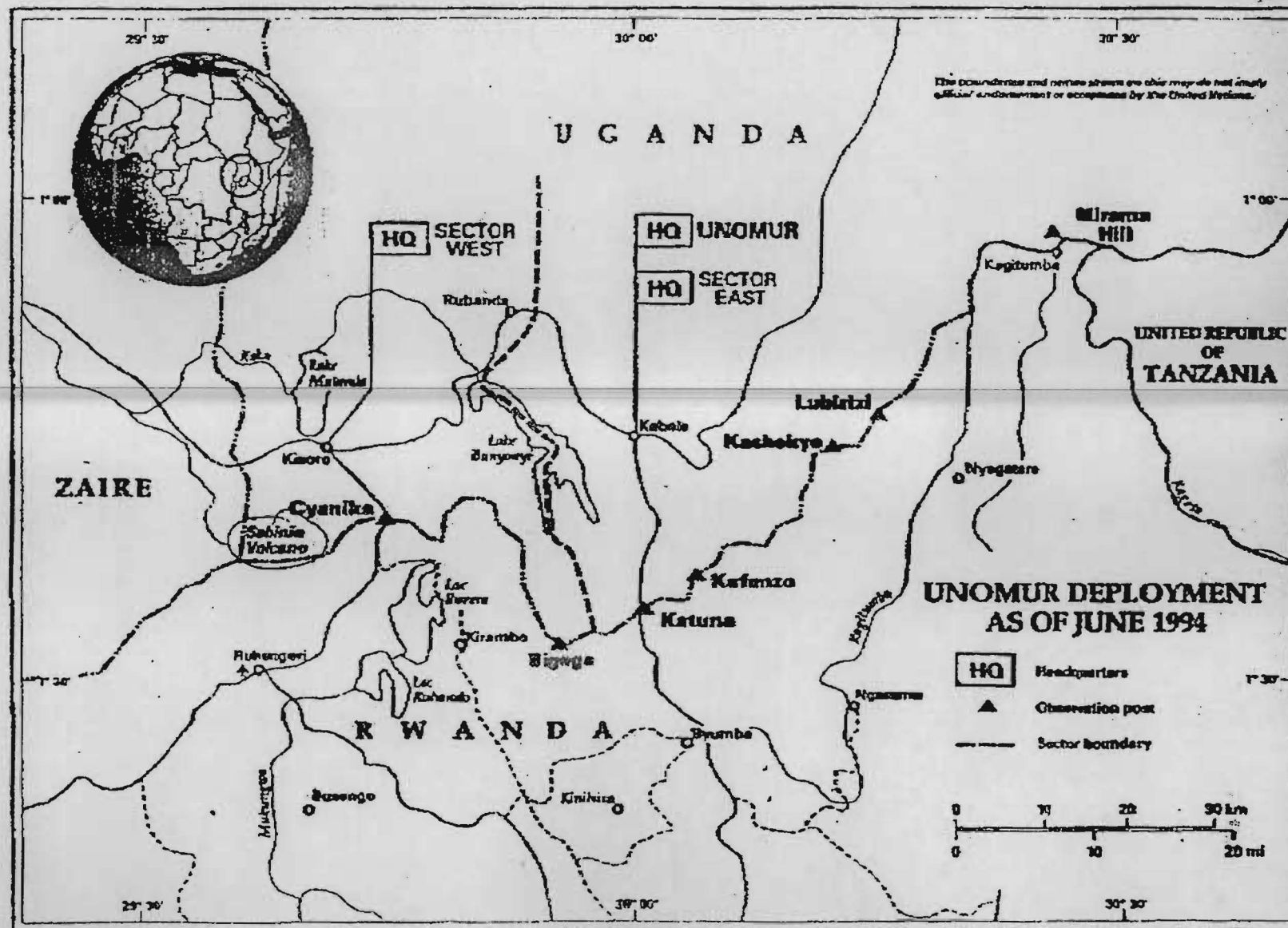
14. Throughout the period of its operation, UNOMUR has indeed functioned as a factor of stability in the area. Despite its limited mandate, UNOMUR has helped UNAMIR to defuse tension resulting from the renewed fighting in Rwanda by allowing the latter to address, at least to some degree, the issue of outside interference in the Rwandese civil war. The issue, as members of the Council are aware, had been one of the major areas of concern in the cease-fire talks held under the auspice of UNAMIR. Special attention should also be paid to the vital role played by UNOMUR in recent months in assisting the build-up of UNAMIR and in coordinating humanitarian relief activities in and around Rwanda.

15. Given the above assessment, it could be said that UNOMUR set a good example for the use of this kind of low-cost, small-scale border-monitoring operations for preventive and confidence-building purposes. In the absence of open hostilities between the States concerned prior to its deployment, the observer mission could be characterized as the preventive deployment of a peace-keeping

operation based on the consent of the Governments concerned. (An interesting comparison could be made with the first preventive deployment of a UNPROFOR contingent in the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia.) The absence of open conflicts, coupled with the prior acquisition of the consent of the parties, contributed to a relatively low level of risk involved in the operation.

16. With the world filled with potential hot spots, I am of the view that despite its low-key presence in areas of potential conflicts, a UNOMUR-type operation would prove to be a very useful tool for the United Nations to forestall the outbreak of actual hostilities. Suffice it to say that such potential conflicts, if not deterred in advanced, would eventually cost the Organization a substantive amount of its finite human as well as material resources.

17. In conclusion, I would like to express anew my appreciation to the Government of Uganda for the cooperation and assistance it has extended to UNOMUR. Indeed, such cooperation and assistance was indispensable for the successful completion of the mission's mandate. I also wish to pay high tribute to both the military and the civilian personnel of UNOMUR for the professionalism and dedication with which they have carried out their tasks.

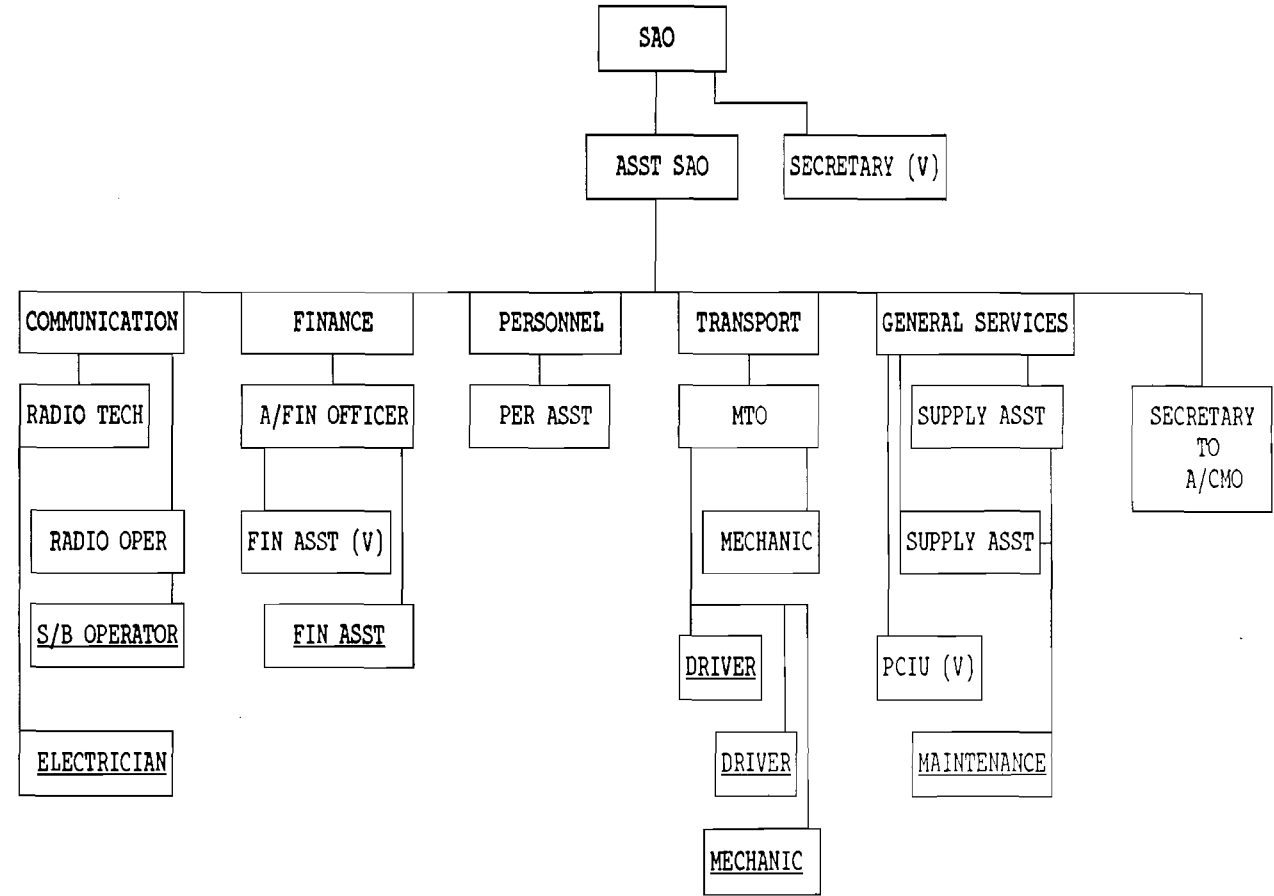

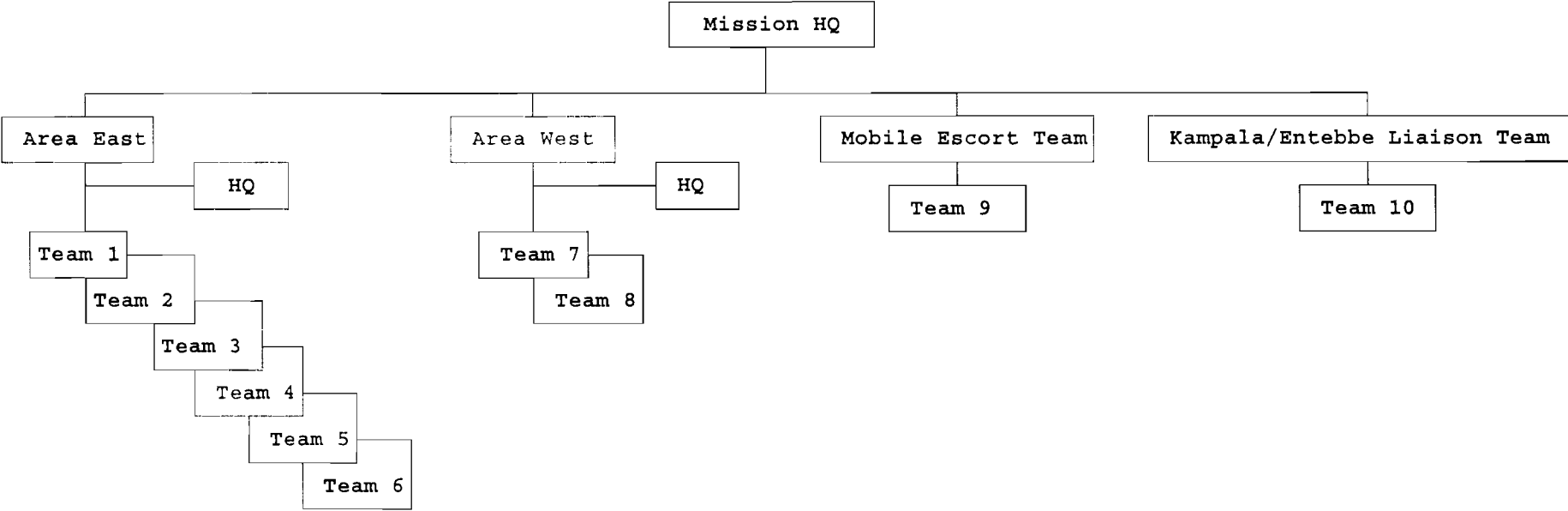

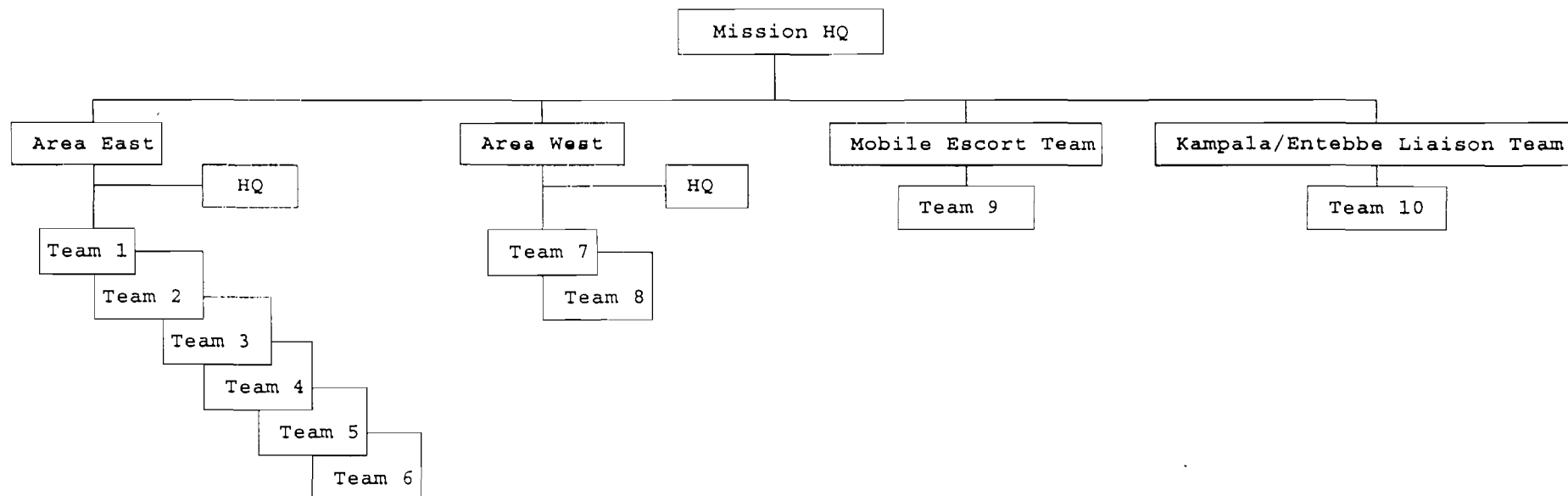

2. THE PROBLEM SEEMS TO BE IN THE CONTENT OF YOUR NATIONAL SITREPS TO THE NETHERLANDS. ENSURE THAT IN FUTURE THE INFORMATION THAT IS FORWARDED TO YOUR NATION WILL NOT EMBARRASS UNAMIR OR UNOMUR OR ANY OTHER NATION OR ORGANIZATION.

3. BE REMINDED THAT WHILE UNDER UN SERVICE ALL INFORMATION PERTAINING TO A MISSION IS THE PROPERTY OF THE UN. SHOULD THE UN BE EMBARRASSED BY ANY LEAK OF INFORMATION FROM WITHIN A MISSION, DISCIPLINARY ACTION IN THE FORM OF REPATRIATION MAY RESULT.

4. LET US TREAT THIS INCIDENT AS AN EXCELLENT LEARNING EXPERIENCE AND NOT HAVE ANY FURTHER REPETITION IN THE FUTURE.

The report of the Secretary-General which is submitted to the Council shows that this mission has obtained appreciable results in the ground. It is aware to ensure the control of the border between Rwanda and Uganda. To accomplish his tasks has benefitted the full cooperation of the Ugandan authorities, and which our council congratulated. The UNOMUR was a factor of stability in the area and has played a useful role for re-established the confidence and the necessary condition for the implementation of the Arusha treaty.

The result of this operation justifies that his mandate be extended for six months. It justifies however that UNOMUR endures to have his own judicial autonomy how wish the Ugandan authorities which have signed an agreement with United Nations to award a status for this mission.
