1. A growing note of criticism, as well as an increase in the number of specific requests for corrections and explanations of "discrepancies", has been noted in recent communications from the Reports and Analysis Branch, D.P. H.Q. This is viewed with concern, as a matter of pride, quite separately from the specific points raised - which are being dealt with as appropriate, by corrections or by explanations of our failure, as in the past.

2. In self-defence, we should like to point out some historical facts regarding this Division and its relations with D.P. H.Q., Reports and Analysis Branch, upon which evaluation of our talents for approximating the requirements of CHQ Order No. 34, in its various revisions, is logically contingent.

3. In early February, 1947, when the undersigned effectually replaced the former Zone Reports Officer, this Division was staffed as follows :

7 Class I's
4 Class II's
2 D.P.'s

At this time, the work of the Division was largely administrative, as the operational side was supervised by four Reports Officers at the District Offices. The compilation of routine statistical reports for D.P. H.Q. and the U.S. Army, the outlining of reporting policies for the field, the answer of routine queries, etc., left ample time for remedying personnel deficiencies (of quality, not quantity), for discussions on policy with the Chiefs of Departments - eventually, for participation in the planning of the March-April reorganisation. During this time no more serious criticism was received from the Reports and Analysis Branch than that which came via a Field Observer (Mrs. D. Johnson) to the effect that this Division was "ridiculously overstaffed". Nothing that could conceivably be qualified as "guidance" came from Reports and Analysis Branch at that time - nor, as it has proved - at any subsequent time.

4. By April 15th, 1947, the staff of this Division consisted of :

4 Class I's
5 Class II's
2 D.P.'s

In the meantime, this Headquarters had become operational, a change in orientation which can best be illustrated by saying that whereas, before, 70% of our time could have been directed toward fulfilling the demands of higher headquarters, now (i.e. from 30th March forward) only a scant 50% is even possible. Needless to say, the demands of higher headquarters did not diminish, while field problems multiplied ten-fold.

5. Since 30th March, 1947, this Division has struggled to give adequate technical supervision to the Team Reports Officers in their many problems arising from the regrouping of installations, and the reductions in force. Former Districts I and II, in addition, have had to "catch up" on the area type of organisation already operative in Districts III and V at the first of the year. This Division has not been able to do an adequate job of assistance to the Teams during this period. Furthermore, the single most needed directive, that on the organisation of D.P. records according to Area Team needs, is only now nearing completion - with many problems still to be discussed with the military, who have ignored the records problem (as has D.P. H.Q.) since the SHAEF Guide.

6. The above glimpse of some of our local problems is given only because it has become clear that the attitude of Reports and Analysis, D.P. H.Q., has been to ignore all but that portion of our operation which most obviously affects it.

7. A certain lack of identity of interests is perhaps natural in the relations between opposite numbers at different echelons of an operation such as this one, but this Division feels the tone and some of the content of a letter such as yours of 21st May, 1947, are neither justified nor excusable. Similarly, personnel recommendations made without knowledge of our operation - such knowledge as might, for example, be obtained at least in a brief visit - can scarcely be expected to obtain our support.

8. A detailed reply to your letters of 21st May and 4th June accompanies this.

1. Reference your letter 21st May, 1947, the following detailed reply has been prepared.

2. Your paragraphs 2 - 9 deal with the Monthly Narrative Report to the Chief of Operations.

(a) Par. 2, April Narrative Report, contains information requested under LIEI(d) and (e), B2(b), B5(c), and (d), LIEI(g), LIEI3(a). Inasmuch as these data appeared to be of routine nature, they were left in the appropriate sections, as had also been done in the March Narrative Report. More attention was given this matter in the May Narrative Report, in compliance with your request.

(b) Par. 3. No contradiction as alleged, as reference to context would surely make clear. Opposition to segregation moves was quite distinct from the implementation of the Standard Operating Procedures laid down in the directive cited - the former constituting a problem of policy, the latter a resolution of operating problems in line with Military and UNHRA reorganisation.

(c) Par. 4. Reference is made to paragraph 5a, our letter of 19th May, 1947, explaining the omission. With regard to the glaring omission you note in our March report, we have no explanation. It is recalled, however, that when the Zone Reports Officer brought the March report to Paris, he did communicate the fact orally.

(d) Par. 5. Comment noted.

(e) Par. 6. Outline of military reorganisation was made informally in your office early in April. A "complete outline" was not obtainable in time for the May report, as requested. Meanwhile, Monthly Station Lists of this Division indicate how the Zone is divided into Military Posts and Area Teams, with mutual relationships. Eighteen Posts have eighteen Teams - with one Team serving two Posts in three instances and two Teams in one Post in three instances - while Bremen and Berlin are subject, as in the past, to Special commands. Next higher sub-division is Military District Headquarters, I and II, and after that, EUCOM. Military Government Kreis Teams

fall, like UNHRA Teams, within the Military Post set-up, with ultimate M.G. supervision from the Land M.G. Headquarters and CMGUS. U.S. Constabulary covers the Zone as a security police force, with Headquarters at Heidelberg. The only point at which the administrative intervention of Constabulary is felt by the regular Army is in the special circumstance that Military District II Headquarters, at Heidelberg, reports to the C.G., U.S. Constabulary, before EUCOM. Military District I Headquarters reports direct to EUCOM. Until some more detailed schedule can be obtained from EUCOM itself, our Station Lists plus this outline will have to suffice.

(f) Pars. 7 - 9. We are in general agreement with your criticisms, and have complied as far as possible in our report for May. The June report will be consolidated even further.

3. Your paragraphs 10 - 23 deal with the Monthly General Statistical Reports prepared by this Division.

(a) Par. 10. We had supposed this point was cleared in the discussions with your Headquarters relative to our Administrative Order No. 246 early in April. An amendment to this Order is forthcoming, which among other things, asks that the reporting of Russian Ukrainians be resumed. It will probably not be effective until July. Breakdown of Jewish population is given as we receive it - should other Ukrainian listings appear, we will pass them on to you.

(b) Par. 11. Employment figures given you have never consisted solely of Burgomeister Payroll data. Comparison of March Monthly General Statistical report totals with those presented in May should bear this out. It is not recalled how this misunderstanding arose. Is the presentation in the May report satisfactory now?

(c) Par. 12. The matter of continuous revision of repatriation statistics from this Zone is not one in which your Headquarters has displayed much understanding. To compare our figures with EUCOM figures earlier or later than those with which we have just put in many work-hours comparing our own figures, is a ridiculous waste of time by one or the other echelon. Under date of 13th June, 1947, we submitted to you the latest of EUCOM's revisions, together with our own figures on emigration to the United States. In a telephone conversation with Miss Jamieson, at that time, permission was requested to delay our reporting of repatriation movements until EUCOM has settled on a "final" figure - a week or ten days later. Verbal permission was received, and this procedure is being followed in the weekly cables. This should eliminate the sort of thing described in your Paragraph 12.

(d) Par. 13. Careful check of our April cables fails to reveal any repatriation category "S.A." or, for that matter, any movement of fifteen. It will be noted that the only South Americans repatriated during the month were reported as "Chilean". The single Kalmyk was repatriated to the U.S.S.R. In view of your objection to this reporting, do you wish us to discontinue breakdown of other Soviet repatriants, e.g. Latvians, Lithuanians, Estonians, Ukrainians, etc.?

(e) Par. 14. Repeated efforts have been made to obtain this information, not made easier by the predilection of your Headquarters for EUCOM repatriation totals. Our information must necessarily, in a matter of this kind, be obtained from UNHRA Repatriation Centers - whose movement totals are different from those finally adopted by EUCOM. It is hoped to supply with the June report a breakdown indicating repatriation as follows: Number from UNHRA Installations, Number from German Economy, and Number from Army Guard and Labour Camps.

(f) Par. 15. Reference is made to our letters of 19th May, 1947, and 13th June, 1947.

(g) Pars. 16 and 17. It appears extremely doubtful that the information requested - as, indeed, most of the data on the Unaccompanied Children programme during April and May - will ever be obtained. The whole problem of Unaccompanied Children reporting in this Zone is being made the subject of a very strong recommendation to the Successor Agency. Reference is made to our letter of 13th June on this subject.

(h) Par. 18. Reference is made to the note accompanying Table VI of the Monthly General Statistical Report for May. In view of a long-standing confusion in this Zone, still not resolved, on the part of both UNHRA and the military regarding definitions of Assembly Centers and annexes, it has been necessary continually to reclassify installations. As Zone control has improved, largely through improvement of reporting procedures, installations have gradually increased in number. Few of these "new" installations represent new commitments in recent months. You are probably aware that in this Zone UNHRA "camps", "assembly Centers", "annexes", etc., are extremely various in size, kind, and location. It is felt that at the present time our figures represent more accurately than in the past, actual number of distinct physical aggregations of Displaced Persons, with separate internal administrative structures.

(i) Par. 19. Reference is made to our letter dated 16th June, 1947. Training School staffs are attached to the Area Teams in whose area of jurisdiction they fall.

(j) Par. 20. All this Division can say is to repeat that, in addition to a map carried by Mr. Edwards to Paris and left with Mr. Cohen, we have sent you three maps on tracing paper, and one copy of every survey of "Special Categories of Displaced Persons in the U.S. Zone" that we have made. At the present time, we are preparing the latter survey every two or three weeks. We have no more map paper, and have been unsuccessful, as has the EUCOM Statistical Branch, in getting printed copies of the map made.

(k) Par. 21. The report "D.P. Population in Centers" is prepared every two weeks, alternately with the bi-weekly Summary. It is prepared at the request of EUCOM, according to their breakdown.

(l) Par. 22. Comments noted.

(m) Par. 23. Comments noted.

4. Reference your letter of 4th June, 1947, the following detailed reply has been prepared.

(a) Par. 1. In view of the arbitrary nature of the terms, in our operational experience of this Zone, your question is not pertinent. You may take our current total of installations as a "camp" total in good faith.

(b) Par. 2. Reference is made to our Administrative Order No. 246, dated 1st April, 1947. "Polish Byelo-Russians" are former Polish citizens of White Russian ethnic nationality, whom we must distinguish as not repatriable to Poland, under the provisions of the Polish-Soviet treaty of 1944-45.

(c) Par. 3. In view of the Volksdeutsch background alleged in the case of the Mennonites, and the circumstances of their emigration, it was felt that perhaps you would be interested in them as a group. In view of the fact the reporting "USSR" accompanied the religious designation, it is felt no great confusion could have resulted, at that level.

(d) Par. 4. Comments noted.

(e) Par. 5. The following breakdown is submitted :

1. Pending publication of our June Station List, the following changes in Area Team and Special Installations are drawn to your attention.

2. Besides the changes indicated in the attached Simplified Station List and in General Bulletin No. 193 :

- (a) Wiesloch Mental Hospital has reverted to the status of a Special Hospital operated as part of Area Team 1021.
- (b) The Bad Wiessee Training School closes 15th June, 1947; a new site is being sought but has not yet been determined.
- (c) The Knielingen Warehouse has been moved to Ludwigsburg where it is still under the direction of Mr. Robinson. New telephone number is LUDWIGSBURG 5487. The Nurnberg Warehouse, formerly operated by Mr. Deans, has been consolidated with the Warehouse operated by Mr. Morris who now supervises the entire operation. New telephone number is NURNBERG 26295.
- (d) Miss M. Borland will remain as Repatriation Division Representative until June 30th. Mr. Grigg, for your information, is now Chief of Repatriation and Emigration Division at this H.Q.

3. The former Team 1001, with Area Headquarters at Ettlingen, has been consolidated with Team 1021, Darmstadt. All Installations of former Team 1001 are now operated by Team 1021 under Mr. Buford's direction.

1. We have attached the following statistical tables herewith, in compliance with your written and telephoned requests :

- A. Repatriation from U.S. Zone of Germany, cumulative from 1945 to 31st May, 1947, by nationality.
- B. Emigration and Resettlement from U.S. Zone of Germany, cumulative from March, 1946, to 31st May, 1947, by nationality.
- C. Emigration to the U.S.A. from the U.S. Zone of Germany, cumulative from May, 1946, to 31st May, 1947, by nationality.

2. The Repatriation table constitutes Civil Affairs Division, EUCOM, (Statistical Division D.P. Branch), revision of SHAEP, USFET, TUSA, and other partial statistics. We have received verbal assurance that no further revisions will be required. It is regretted that breakdown of the large "Others" figure cannot be supplied. If further research should make this breakdown available we will cable it you immediately.

3. Table of D.P. Emigration and Resettlement has been obtained from the same source mentioned above. Off the record, it may be mentioned that the statistical practice in Frankfurt has been to bury some Soviet Nationals in the "Others" classification. No breakdown of this category has so far been obtained and we have been told does not exist.

4. The table on Emigration from this Zone to the U.S.A. represents a detailed revision, shipment by shipment, of our previous figures. These are UNRRA figures based on our Bremen records. EUCOM maintains figures on emigration to the U.S. which are based on numbers entraining in this Zone for shipment to Bremerhaven. Needless to say, these are no kind of careful count of actual emigration. The

i.e. the EUCOM figures.

category "Undetermined and Unclassified" in this breakdown is composed of non-quota emigrants. In this connection it should be noted that EUOCH figures on repatriation to the U.S. are obtained in the same way they obtain emigration records. For this reason we have substituted on the Repatriation table our own Bremen figures so that in this one particular our repatriation statistics differ from EUOCH.

5. We will book calls to your office, beginning Monday morning, 16th June, and every week thereafter; if telephone service during the past two weeks does not improve it might well be Wednesday or Thursday before we get through.

1. Reference is made to Section II, paragraph E.3, of the May Narrative Report to the Chief of Operations. Both the March/April reorganisation, which was never quite completed, and the present reorganisation, which at the present time is not yet completed, have involved shifting of personnel and shifting of records, so that no coherent Zone-wide statistics have been possible down to this date.

2. At the present time we are working with Miss Heise in an effort to obtain a picture of the Search Team Operation down to May 15th. Miss Heise believes complete statistics to that date can be obtained and that the Search and Tracing Officers being assigned to Area Teams can pick it up from that point for the 30th June report. Every effort will be made to complete this survey in the next ten days.

3. Copy of the partial report will be forwarded your office. Are you interested in receiving, at the same time, available statistics on Unaccompanied Children in Children's Centres and Camps for the same period? These would be partial.

4. Assuming that the present reorganisation of the former Child Welfare Division is the final one, it should be possible to provide you with the complete Statistical Report on Unaccompanied Children in the U.S. Zone by 12th July, based on Team Reports of 30th June.

4. The accuracy of the figure of "Employables" quoted is questionable as this probably includes a percentage of women with children. Employment Division this headquarters states that without skilled interviewers to judge cases on an individual basis it is impossible to give an accurate figure of employables. The last survey conducted showed 67 percent of the entire D.P. population as employable.

5. The omission of sections of the Zone Director's Monthly Report is explained as follows:

a. Military Screening. Due to the fact that there has been no zone-wide screening during the month of April and that there is no longer an Eligibility representative at this headquarters, this report was omitted.

b. Care. There is now no Relief Services Division as such at this headquarters to coordinate care activities, however, the various types of care are reported under specific headings such as Health, Child Care, Employment etc.

c. Relations with Military. This has been covered in the statement of the Zone Director and in the various sections when applicable.

4. The accuracy of the figure of "Employables" quoted is questionable as this probably includes a percentage of women with children. Employment Division this headquarters states that without skilled interviewers to judge cases on an individual basis it is impossible to give an accurate figure of employables. The last survey conducted showed 67 percent of the entire D.P. population as employable.

5. The omission of sections of the Zone Director's Monthly Report is explained as follows:

a. Military Screening. Due to the fact that there has been no zone-wide screening during the month of April and that there is no longer an Eligibility representative at this headquarters, this report was omitted.

b. Care. There is now no Relief Services Division as such at this headquarters to coordinate care activities, however, the various types of care are reported under specific headings such as Health, Child Care, Employment etc.

1. Pursuant to your telephoned request of 17th April, 1947, the following information is being 'phoned to you to-day :-

2. Child Search: Between 15th March and 1st April, 1947, the Child Search Division of this Headquarters underwent considerable reorganisation. The Division was sub-divided into :-

(a) Functions of tracing, search and repatriation.

(b) Child care.

The search and repatriation functions were combined with tracing functions, remaining at the former Zone Tracing Bureau in Wiesbaden. Miss Reiss, Miss Matthews, and others of the Child Search Division concerned with these functions, moved their offices to Wiesbaden. The function of Child care continued to be maintained under the supervision of a Deputy Division Chief, Miss Trigg, with offices at this Headquarters.

A personnel ceiling of 50 was set for the entire search and tracing activities, of which 18 would be personnel already attached to Zone Tracing Bureau in Wiesbaden.

Child search and care activities in the Field were to be maintained by three groups of Child Search personnel, each headed by a former District Child Search Officer and attached, for housekeeping purposes, to a regular Area Team. The target date for the completion of this reorganisation was 1st April.

3. Central Tracing Bureau: A letter has gone forward from the Deputy Zone Director, Department of Field Operations, on the subject of the delegation of certain functions of this Bureau to this Headquarters.

4. Screening and Eligibility: In a TWI dated 3rd March, 1947, the Zone Director suspended the UNRRA Eligibility Review in this Zone. During the month of March UNRRA participation in Military screening activities has been gradually withdrawn.

5. Relations with Military: Effective 16th March, 1947, the organisation of the United States Army in this Zone was reconstituted. As of this date the Zone was divided into two Military Districts, with Headquarters at Heidelberg and Bad Tols respectively. Sub-Divisions within the Military Districts took the form of 17 Military Posts.

With few exceptions the UNRRA reorganisation followed Post boundaries in order to facilitate close liaison between Area Team Directors and Post Commanders. While, for the most part, Post Commanders appointed had no previous experience of the D.P. Operation, the Army made a considerable effort to assign, as Post S-5 Officers, persons with lengthy experience as D.P. Officers. In certain instances, where necessary, S-5 Officers were replaced by Officers with the requisite experience.

Effects of the Military reorganisation include re-organisation of Supply and Transport procedures. At the Post-Area Team level progress is discussed elsewhere in the monthly Zone Director's report.

6. Total Employables:

7. Reference pages 18 and 19 of the Zone Director's monthly report, "peak month" signified the month in which most coal was made available to UNRRA in this Zone. "Revised Supply SOP" is a collaboration between the Military and UNRRA and, when ready, will be published simultaneously by both organisations. This SOP deals with D.P. Supply and will cover the needs of the Field in terms of Post-Area Team relationship.

8. Dates of reorganisation: According to the records of this Division, Team organisation in this Zone as of 20th January was 32 regular Teams and 11 special Teams; as of 20th February, 31 regular Teams and 11 special Teams.

This most recent reorganization, for which a target date of 1st April was set, was to result in the reduction of regular Teams to 20 and special Teams to 4. This was accomplished, the four special Teams consisting of 1026 Bremen, 1027 Berlin, 1075 Bad Wiessee, and 1029 Wiesbaden. 1075 is the D.P. Training Centre and 1029 Wiesbaden represents the combined Child Search and Tracing functions.

9. With reference to the "Others" category, in the Employment section of the Monthly Statistical Report this category includes persons under UNRRA care working on a part-time basis at miscellaneous jobs within the German Economy (Artisans, Repairmen, etc.).



1. Subject order requests statistics on Military Screening and the UNRRA Eligibility Review by nationality. Several difficulties with regard to the reporting of these programs should be brought to your attention.
2. Most complete statistics on Military Screening in this Zone by nationality have been compiled by U.S. Army authorities. While Zone HQ personnel have access to this material, the Army regards it as highly classified information and we are, therefore, unable to transmit.
3. Regular monthly reports on the progress of Military Screening and the UNRRA Eligibility program have been required of the teams for several months. However information obtained regarding both programs has been by camps rather than by nationalities. In the case of the material on Screening only, information is quite incomplete due to the differing attitudes of the various Army Screening Teams to UNRRA's participation. With regard to the Eligibility Review, our information is much more complete - although, as previously mentioned, the totals are by camps only, and until now have been submitted at monthly rather than fortnightly intervals.
4. In view of these circumstances and the fact that the Screening and Eligibility Report requested by your Headquarters specifies other kinds of data, we would appreciate your advice as to how we might best approximate your needs for this information.





Statistical information on Unaccompanied Children reported by teams in the U.S. Zone in accordance with current zone directives is not sufficiently comprehensive to enable us to submit fully the information as required by Administrative Order No. 34, revised 31 October, 1946, Part II, Annex F.

At the time of preparation of the report forms in current use and in consultation with Mrs Feder, Reports and Analysis Branch, Central Headquarters, it was not anticipated that these details would be required, and to enable us to meet these requirements fully would necessitate the re-drafting of our reporting system in the zone and the substitution of forms designed to cover the reporting of these items in addition to information already requested.

The following items are at present available only in a Jewish - non - Jewish breakdown, not by nationality within these groups, as required by your order :

Item 2. -	Numbers of Unaccompanied Children in German Homes
" 3. -	" " " " " Institutions
" 15. -	" " " " " documented

It would therefore be appreciated if the reporting of Items 2,3 and 15 could be continued in the present form, i.e. as in the Monthly Report dated 10th November 1946.

Provision has now been made for the regular reporting of Items 23, 24, 25 and 30. With reference to Item 30, it is estimated that the bulk of children in this category would be mainly within the infiltrate groups whose situation is so fluid that the current validity of such information would be questionable, taking into consideration the lapse of time between the date of the report from the teams, the 15th of each month, and the submission of the consolidated report from Zone to Central Headquarters on the 10th of the following month.


It is suggested that in the reporting of Item 30 in the case of Jewish children, the presence of a parent or parents in other countries, Austria, Poland, Hungary etc. be reported and in anticipation, this information has been requested of the teams.

Compilation of statistics for these groups, Items 23, 24, 25 and 30 cannot be submitted until the monthly report due 10th January, 1947 which includes all data submitted by teams in their reports as of 15th December, 1946.

1. In response to your Cable No. 393 the following data is submitted.

2. General comments by Repatriation Officer.

a. When individuals or small groups desire repatriation, it usually takes 6-7 weeks to obtain exit permits from the combined Travel Security Board in Berlin.

b. U.S. Citizens are not in camps unless application has been made to the Consul, and no Red Cross Parcels given out in most districts unless they give proof they have been to the consul. Follow-up procedure to be established to notify District of decision when Consul has disposed of case.

c. Believe majority to have been caught over here because of personal reasons, (i.e. family problems, employment, etc.)

d. Screening of U.S. and Latin Americans slow because of lack of staff at Consul's office and priority given to emigres because of quota deadlines.

e. The papers of British nationals have been sent to the British Interests Office, where screening is done on an intensive basis and therefore is slow.

f. Spanish are being transferred to Italy, and will make their own way from there.

Majority are unscreened but believed to be Republican.

g. There is an unofficial Swiss Consul in Munich screening the Swiss.

SUBJECT : Policy definition of "Stateless" persons,
and of status of "Ukrainians".

TO : Lt General Sir Frederick Morgan, Chief of Operations
in Germany, UNRRA Central Headquarters, APO 757.

1. There exists a great deal of confusion in the minds of many people, both UNRRA employees and DP's, as to what makes a person "Stateless". This confusion makes for false reporting, and at times hinders repatriation. Therefore a definition of policy along the following lines is urgently requested;

a) At what point does a non-repatriable person become "Stateless"?

b) What authority declares a person to be "Stateless"?

c) What evidence is needed for being declared "Stateless"?

d) What is the present status of "Ukrainians" born west of the Curzon line, and therefore Polish, but who have been refused entry into Poland by the Polish Liaison Officer?

e) What is the present status of "Ukrainians" born East of the Curzon Line, but unwilling to return to USSR?

f) What is the present status of "Ukrainians" who resided in Czechoslovakia and other European countries but never obtained citizenship and are not permitted by Liaison Officers to return, especially if the persons themselves wish to be known as "Ukrainian Stateless"?

2. At the present time Polish Ukrainians are counted as Poles although they are non-repatriable, thereby falsifying the statistical picture to a large extent. Other Ukrainians are counted as "Stateless" although there is no clear legal justification for this. This also confuses the statistical picture, and makes planning difficult.

3. As a further illustration of the type of problem involved, there are a group of 400 Kalmycks in a camp. Before the war they were scattered all over Europe, and were forcibly deported by Hitler into Germany. They do not wish to return to the various countries of their birth and citizenship, but wish to migrate en masse to their ancestral country, Mongolia, and therefore declare themselves to be "Stateless".

4. An early clarification of these points is greatly to be desired.
