UNAMIR AND NGO INSTALLATIONS IN KIGALI CITY

C. HQ UNAMIR Op Instruction 3000.12 (Ops) dated 30 Aug 94

GENERAL

1. UNAMIR and NGO installations in KIGALI are vulnerable to trespass by armed or unarmed unauthorised personnel; there have been attempted encroachments in the past. The Rapid Reaction Force (RRF) has been constituted to provide a direct response to this threat. On order, INDBATT will assume RRF responsibilities from GHANBATT, AUSMED and CANCON.

MISSION

2. To protect UNAMIR and NGO installations in Kigali against unauthorised encroachments.

EXECUTION

3. General Outline. The RRF is a motorised platoon. It is capable of responding to an immediate threat at section level, and to augment that force as required, up to platoon level. INDBATT will assume full Sector 6 RRF responsibilities on order.

4. Groupings and Tasks.

a. INDBATT.

(1) Grouping. No change.

(2) Tasks

(a) Assume responsibility for RRF.

(b) Detail one infantry section as RRF.

(c) Undertake the following on order:

(i) Guard threatened UNAMIR/NGO installations,

MILITARY COORDINATION OFFICER TO HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

1. The Human Rights Commission has identified the need for a military officer to assist them in certain areas of support to their operation. I have agreed to its request and enclose the Terms of Reference of the Military Coordination Officer(MCO):

The HRC MCO will work in support of the administration of the HRC to facilitate its personnel in the conduct of their duties. The overarching consideration in this appointment is that the HRC's independence is respected; the coordination function does not infer any military control. He will work under the direct authority of DCos Ops, keeping him informed of his activities. The MCO is to provide advice on the military security situation as it affects HRC operations. He is to coordinate HRC's requests for helicopters, the provision of military escorts when requested by HRC, and to facilitate HRC's field operations e.g. providing training assistance in the use of map and compass, radios, off-road driving and emergency maintenance etc.

2. I see this appointment as extremely useful in providing start-up assistance to the fledgling HRC, but intend the post to remain until such time as it is no longer required. I have appointed Maj Lancaster as MCO.

MASS GRAVES

1. On 15 Sep 94 SO3 G2 conducted a recce of a mass grave site in conjunction with elements of AUSCON. During the course of the recce another 2 sites were identified and contact established with a local civilian source.

2. The primary site recce'd was the church in NTARAMA (Sector 2, GR 064666). An estimated 300-400 bodies are in the church or the immediate area surrounding it. To date the bodies have not been buried and are in an advanced state of decay, most consisting solely of skeletons. The size of some of the skeletons clearly indicates that children were killed. Walking sticks indicate that old people were also murdered. Source claims that the massacre was carried out by soldiers of the former RGF on 15 Apr 94. Source states that 3 truck loads of troops were sent down from KIGALI to kill Tutsis in the area.

3. One of the other mass graves was behind the Shell petrol station at the western end of KAYUMBA (Approx GR 096635). Source claims that "hundreds" of bodies are buried there. The area is covered with piles of earth and it was not possible to verify this claim at the time.

4. Source was able to guide elements of the recce party to the other site which is a feature to the North of KAYUMBA (GR 094648). Fleeing Tutsis from KAYUMBA hid in the forest which covers the hill and were reported to have been hunted and killed by INTERAHAMWE over a period of days from 11 Apr 94 onwards. Source claims that about 400 bodies are scattered all over the hill. The recce party was able to verify 22 and believes that 100 is a more reasonable estimate.

5. A list of all mass graves is to be drawn up and updated on a regular basis. The list will be distributed by this HO. Addressees are asked to contribute all details of mass graves in their possession to G2, HQ UNAMIR as a matter of urgency in order that the scale of the problem can be assessed and all information collated centrally. Details should include whether or not the site has been confirmed as a grave, approximate numbers of bodies (if possible), grid reference and a brief description of the site ie. above or below ground.

7. The early provision of items listed in (1) of column (e) of Annex A through HAC effort will be most welcome.



1. Having been discussed the above mentioned subject with the appropriate authorities a plan has been prepared for gradual reduction of Air Ops Cell manning and operation. Proposal is made considering the request made by Rwandese authority to extend the activities of Air Ops Cell for another one month with effect from 1st November 1994 (ltr is attached herewith). Regarding the request made for donating the equipment presently used by this cell to Rwandese authority may be considered at appropriate level.

A. The present activities of Air Ops Cell may be continued until 30 Nov 94. After handing over the function of this cell to Rwandese authorities the role of this cell may be changed into Air Ops Liaison Cell to liaise any air ops matter(military) in Airport on behalf of UNAMIR.

B. The reduction of manning may be effected as follows :

- 1. Phase-1 . Two officers, Maj Monjur Hossain UNID MO-604 and Sqn Ldr Antwi Boasiakoh Samuel UNID M-1218, will be released with effect from 26 Oct 94 as per Milobs deployment plan(Ref B).
- 2. Phase-2 . Two officers, Wg Cdr ATM Nazrul Islam UNID MO-576 and Maj Radomir Jass UNID M-1632, will be repatriated by the end of Nov 94 on completion of their tour of duties with the UNAMIR.
- 3. Phase-3 . With the strength of 4xMILOBS the Air Ops Liaison Cell will function its activities until UNAMIR interest is required to be served.
- 4. Transport. With the reduction of manpower , the Cell will surrender one transport to the MILOB HQ as discussed.

2. In view of the reductions in the flow of UNAMIR flights the hours of ops of this cell may be reduced to 0600-2000LT.





PASSAGE OF INFORMATION

1. The Force Commander has expressed his concern about the flow of information through UNAMIR as whole. It is the function of the G2 Cell within this HQ to establish and maintain a system for the collection, collation and dissemination of all military information within UNAMIR.

2. It cannot be over emphasised that all information needs to be passed quickly and accurately to the G2 Cell in order that they are able to fulfil their task of keeping the Force Commander and the remainder of UNAMIR as fully informed on the situation as possible. There are, however, a number of particular points to which I would ask particular attention be paid.

MASS GRAVES

① 3. MILOB Gp HQ s asked to compile a list of all mass graves and massacre sites identified thus far. The list should be forwarded to this HQ with a grid reference, approximate number of bodies contained therein and a description as to whether the bodies are buried or on the surface.

BANDITRY

② 4. This HQ receives occasional reports of incidents of "banditry". The details are often vague and contain little in the way of facts. It is requested that MILOBs be tasked to ask specific questions of people reporting such incidents in order to ascertain exactly what happened, where and when. It is also important to determine whether or not the person who reported the incident is an eye-witness or merely passing on information from a third party.

BORDERS

③ 5. The state of the borders between RWANDA and neighbouring countries is of interest to this HQ and it is requested that the daily SITREP issued by MILOB Gp HQ be augmented by a statement declaring the borders to be open or closed to UNAMIR, refugee or NGO traffic.



It is also alleged that there is an infiltration of some militia from Burundi through the forest Naturelle De Nyangwe into the sector.

2. To forestall any possible future disturbances in the Sector, you are requested to be extra vigilant in your efforts in providing security in your areas of responsibility. If these infiltrations are not checked, UNAMIR will obviously be failing in its duties in the sector. Commanding Officers are reminded on the need to institute measures in strengthening security in their areas of responsibility.

Dear Mr. Khan,

It has been reported that on the wake of the RPF's victory in Kigali a large number of Rwandan refugees have crossed to Uganda with an estimated 200,000 heads of cattle. It is feared that the cattle which appear to be located in Nyagatare, Mutura in Kagera area near the Uganda border are exposed to contagious Bovine spongiform encephalitis (BSE) and foot and mouth disease (FMD) and in consequence large losses may occur.

Interested groups have approached this office to solicit the assistance of the United Nations to diffuse this explosive situation by arranging rapid vaccination to the affected cattle within Rwanda. In view of the poor conditions on the Rwanda side, it was suggested that the Government of Rwanda be requested to cooperate in the vaccination effort, and to provide the necessary equipment and personnel on full funding basis. Should such request be made to the Government of Rwanda, we are confident that positive response will be received.

It is recommended to launch a one-week operation which will entail about 40 teams of five technicians each to operate over 70 zones. The total cost, excluding the cost of vaccines, but including costs of personnel, ice and logistic arrangements, is estimated to be in the range of \$200,000 to 250,000.

We urge your office to consider mobilizing the UN system support and through Rwanda Government to approach Government of Uganda to cooperate in mitigating the emergency situation that could have a disastrous consequence on the cattle population of Rwanda.

Subject : Incident about CIVPOL's office

1 - At 10:20 a.m. on 27 September 1994, a group of Rwandan soldiers led by two officers (lieutenants) came to CIVPOL's office and asked the staff to leave the office within 24 hours. Before leaving the compound, one of the officers placed soldiers in the yard and ordered them to unload several boxes which were stored in sheds and inside the office building.

2 - I should like to remind you that this is the second instance in which Rwandan soldiers have entered UNAMIR's compound. The first incident reporting their claims on the premises is described in our letter dated 21 September 1994.

3 - In light of the fact that CIVPOL premises are under full occupation by Rwandan troops, I have decided to have the following removed :

- transmission equipment and all service related documents,
- furniture
- the electric generator unit

4 - Given the fact that the R.P.A. is firmly determined to takeover the building and in order to avoid further incidents, I suggest that another building be found as soon as possible to accomodate CIVPOL offices.

5 - This incident clearly displays the contempt in which UNAMIR is held. It would therefore be appropriate to send a formal protest to Rwandan authorities in order to prevent this precedent from becoming a rule in the future.

SUBJECT: PROCEDURES FOR TASKING AND OPERATION OF SECOND LINE ROAD TRANSPORT

Introduction.

1. Second line road transport within UNIMAR II is a scarce resource, as it is in all operations. To enable the most effective and economical use of Second Line road transport it must be managed intensively. The result of this intensive management will be prioritisation and consolidation of tasks, improved lift capacity, more timely satisfaction of transport requests, and an overall improved service from the second line vehicle fleet.

Aim

2. The aim of this instruction is to describe the procedures for requesting and tasking UNAMIR II second line road transport resources.

General

3. First Line road transport is organic unit transport, available for tasking by units as they see fit. Second line road transport is controlled by the SO Tpt HQ UNAMIR II and provides the capability to lift bulk loads and formed bodies of troops within the UNAMIR II area of operations. Second Line transport support is allocated in accordance with priorities set by HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops staff. Third Line road transport will not be discussed in this instruction.

4. The following forms will be used to enable management of the Second Line road transport asset:

- a. Transport Task Request. Transport Task Requests are to be submitted, direct to the SO Tpt, by UNAMIR II military or civilian staff requiring transport support beyond the capability of their own First Line road transport. Effective immediately, requests for Second Line road transport support will only be accepted on a Transport Task Request form. An example Transport Task Request form is at Annex A. The example Transport Task Request should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. Requests should be submitted not less than 48 hours in advance of the task. The SO Tpt will prioritise the Transport Task Requests and consolidate tasks. Requests should include, in the remarks column, a point of contact at both the pick up point and delivery point where possible. Advice will be provided, within 24 hours, as to whether the Transport Task Request has been approved. If the

request cannot be approved (for example, due to a lack of transport resources) an attempt will be made to make alternative arrangements. Alternatives may include providing transport on another day, or exploring other sources of transport support (for example, air transport).

- b. Task Vehicle Availability. Units providing Second Line road transport are to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms, not later than 0900 hours daily, direct to the SO Tpt. Units required to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms will be advised by the SO Tpt. An example Task Vehicle Availability form is at Annex B. The example Task Vehicle Availability should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. By consolidating the Task Vehicle Availability Forms the SO Tpt will be able to determine how much transport resource is available daily to satisfy Transport Task Requests, submitted in accordance with sub-paragraph a. above.
- c. Transport Task Orders. On the basis of Task Requests, as advised in sub-paragraph a. above and, vehicle availability, as advised in sub-paragraph b. above, the SO Tpt will consolidate and assign tasks to Second Line road transport. Transport Task Orders are the sole authority to task UNAMIR II Second Line road transport. An example Transport Task Order is at Annex C. Transport Task Orders can only be authorised by staff of the HQ UNAMIR II Log Coord Cell. Copies of Task orders will be provided to both the unit assigned the task and to HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops.

Conclusion

5. The Second Line road transport management system described will come into effect upon receipt of this instruction. As a result, it is anticipated that over the coming months the ability of the UNAMIR Second Line road transport organisation to respond to force requirements will be greatly enhanced. The cooperation of UNAMIR civilian and military staff in this endeavour will serve to accelerate this process of improvement.

1. ENCLOSED PLEASE FIND A NOTE WHICH HAS FORMED THE BASIS OF MY DISCUSSIONS TODAY, ON THIS SUBJECT, WITH THE FRENCH PERMANENT MISSION. AS EXPECTED, THE FRENCH WERE VAGUE ON MUCH OF THE DETAIL PARTICULARLY IN RELATION TO THE ASSESSMENT OF THE OPERATIONAL CAPABILITY OF THE AFRICAN CONTINGENTS AFTER THE FRENCH LEAVE RWANDA.

2. THE FRENCH HAVE ADVISED THAT PARIS IS SENDING MORE EQUIPMENT DESTINED FOR THE AFRICAN CONTINGENTS. THEY COULD NOT HOWEVER PROVIDE US WITH DETAILS AT THIS TIME. WE WERE TOLD THAT IT IS UP TO OP TURQUOISE TO DECIDE HOW THE EQUIPMENT IS ALLOTTED BETWEEN THE CONTINGENTS.

3. I HOPE THE NOTE AT LEAST EXPLAINS OUR CONCERNS AND NATURALLY WE WOULD LIKE YOUR ASSESSMENT PARTICULARLY OF THE FIVE FINAL POINTS OUTLINED AT PARA 4. CLEARLY IT IS UNAMIR WHO IS ACCEPTING THE RISK IN THIS ARRANGEMENT.

4. THE SIX AFRICAN COUNTRIES REPRESENTED HAVE BEEN FORMALLY ASKED TO INDICATE THEIR WILLINGNESS TO JOIN UNAMIR AND REMAIN IN RWANDA. WE WILL CONTINUE TO PRESS FOR A QUICK RESOLUTION OF THIS MATTER. MAY I HAVE YOUR REPLY TO THE QUESTIONS RAISED AS SOON AS YOU ARE ABLE.

REGARDS

AFRICAN CONTINGENTS CURRENTLY WITH OPERATION TURQUOISE

1. It is proposed that the African contingents which are currently serving with the French forces in the HPZ, as part of Operation TURQUOISE, will be placed under the UN umbrella of UNAMIR, to coincide with the French withdrawal from Rwanda on or about 22 August.

2. The French, principally through their mission to the UN, have advised that they will leave behind certain equipment with they have previously provided to the African contingents. What is not clear is whether this equipment is adequate for the operational needs of those contingents or is the UN likely to be faced with a fresh round of demands for equipment after the French leave.

3. A separate but related issue is the on going logistic support of the French. The French offer to leave their log unit behind (in Goma) until 15 September, begs several questions. Can this log unit continue to effectively support the African contingents in the absence of their French hosts. I am concerned that without an integral first line support structure within this loose grouping of contingents, the French log unit at the other end of the lake may not be able to effectively support the African troops. The implication here being that unless this group is placed under the admin/log support structure of another host battalion (of UNAMIR), UNAMIR may be faced with some difficult problems. If the Goma based French log unit can't effectively do the job can UNAMIR take up this additional task. If yes, then how soon.

4. In summary, the following issues need to be addressed:

- . has the Rwanda Govt agreed to all contingents staying
- . under what terms will the various contingents be accepted into UNAMIR
- . for how long will the UN ask these contingents to remain in UNAMIR
- . how operationally effective will the African contingents be upon the withdrawal of the French forces on 22 August
- . will the UN need to find yet more equipment
- . can the contingents operate effectively without host battalion support
- . can UNAMIR cope if the French log unit pulls out as early as 15 September

OUTBREAK OF MALARIA IN SECTOR 4

1. The rate at which troops are contracting malaria in the mission area especially in Sector 4 is alarming and it is becoming a source of worry to Command. At this rate, it can only be adduced that tps are not taking the necessary preventive measures. It must be remembered that before the civil war, we lost two of our civilian colleagues through malaria attack.
2. Again the tendency of tps carelessly littering the area with empty canned food containers (a source of mosquito breeding) can not be ruled out. And with the onset of the rainy season, the situation will become worse if this practice is not checked.
3. Units are therefore advised to caution troops to dispose off these empty cans at the appropriate dumps and also to be advised to take the necessary preventive measures to avert the outbreak of malaria in the mission area.

4. Attend telephone calls for any flight request and fill-in the appropriate proforma, after approval from govt. rep. inform HO-9 for further action.
5. When any FAX is received, if flight approval is required than after approval from the govt. rep. that is to be kept for HO-9's perusal.
6. Passenger manifestation is done in the UNAMIR HQ Air Ops Cell, all passengers intends to travel in UNAMIR flights are to be directed to the UNAMIR HQ.
7. If any PPR NO and UN callsign is allotted by the duty officer then that has to be carefully entered in the Record book considering the fact that there might be a duplication of the same.
8. When PPR NO and UN callsign is informed to the operator over telephone or through FAX the same is to be noted in form to avoid confusion.
9. The duty officer on the evening shift will fill-in the SITREP and leave it on the ops room, one of the duty officer in the morning shift will deliver it to the duty officer of Force HQ. He will also collect any mail from Force HQ, for Air Ops Cell, KIA.
10. The duty officer of the morning shift will also send a copy of duty officers log sheet for the previous day through FAX to Geneva in the morning.
11. The standby duty officer will remain in his residence, he will be called upon in case of any emergency.

12. The duty officer will ensure the proper use of the INMARSATT telephone. No unofficial or private call is allowed. Proper entry must be made for calls and Faxes.

13. Person not authorised to use the phone may however use it after seeking permission from either Mr Lambo or Wg Cdr Nazrul. The permission is not to be given by the duty officer.

14. Use own discretion to handle any unforeseen situation or contact Mr Lambo/ Mr Glesson (HM/ HM-1, CH-7/9) or Wg Cdr Nazrul (HO-9, CH-5 or 7) for advice.



another six officers. You are required to make your own arrangements of rotation of duties so you could tasks all your officers to go through all types of tasks allocated to you.



10. MILOBs will move with their vehicles to the Airport and hand over their vehicle keys to Capt Cherif of Senegal when all the shuttle completed. Also all walkie talkies will be handed over to Capt Cheriff before departing KIA.

SUBJECT: Security checks

Further to my information circular of 16 November 1995 on Security checks at UNAMIR premises (Amahoro and Trafipro), the following additional security measures will come into immediate effect at Trafipro. The aim of these measures is to further tighten the loose ends in our system.

(a) The water point gate (back gate) will be closed to all in-coming vehicles after 1730 hrs. daily; and only vehicles in the parking lot will be allowed exit. On Saturdays the gate will be closed at 1330 hrs. and will remain closed on Sundays.

(b) The main gate will be the only entry point to all vehicles after the closure of the water point gate.

(c) All visitors to local staff members will be met by the individual staff members outside the gates;

(d) All staff members working late will be required to sign out, as well as signing in and out on late entry, and on weekends;

(e) Staff members are advised to properly close their offices at close of duty, and that if any office is left open, the staff member may be obliged to reimburse the UN for any loss of goods and/or equipment from the office in question; They are further advised to leave the lights on in their offices at night.

(f) The back entrance to the two main office buildings will be closed at the close of duty, and entry will only be through the main entrances.

Your understanding and cooperation in the event of any inconvenience caused by these measures will be highly appreciated.



WEEKLY HUMANITARIAN REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 14 - 20 OCT 95

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The humanitarian situation in general seems to be slowly limping back towards normalcy. The agricultural activities are at a reasonably active pace. Problems in the areas of food, water, health care and education still continue to hamper resumption of normal life.

HAC ACTIVITIES

2. The requests dealt with by HAC during the week were:

a. Transportation Requests. The transportation requests accepted by HAC were as follows:

(1) Transportation of government rations (8 tons) from Kigali to Butare (sector 3B).

(2) Transportation of potato seeds (15 tons) and beans (10 tons) from Kigali to Rutare and Giti respectively.

(3) Transportation of office equipment for Kibuye prefecture office from Kigali to Kibuye.

b. Medical Support to Prisoners. Consequent to the CIVPOL report on poor medical conditions in Makango commune cachot in Gitarama prefecture and request of local RPA Commander, ICRC has been approached for providing medical assistance.

c. Provision of Diesel for Generator at Ministry of Rehabilitation. The request for provision of diesel for generator at Ministry of Rehabilitation had been forwarded to DCOS SP. The Administration agreed to provide the fuel and has asked the Ministry for further details

3. UHAAG. The following requests were considered by UHAAG meeting on Wed 25 Oct 95:

a. Provision of Septic Truck and Pit Latrines at Kanombe Military Hospital. A request was received from the Kanombe Military Hospital authorities for provision of septic truck for a day and digging of pit latrines. The septic truck will

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be provided after the pending requests have been cleared. Digging of pit latrines will be undertaken by the Force Engineers.

b. Grader and Dump Trucks for Kibungo. A request was received from Department of Roads and Bridges for provision of a grader for road repairs and dump trucks for haulage of gravel in Kibungo. The FEO informed that these equipment were not available at present due to the ongoing task at Gashora bridge and the pending tasks.

c. Pit Latrines at Primary School in Kigali. A request was received from a primary school in Kigali for digging of pit latrines. The request was accepted in case the school was capable of undertaking construction of the latrines once the pits had been dug. The task will be done by the Force Engineer Company after ascertaining the requirements and financial capabilities of the school.

d. Security Fencing at Butare Rehabilitation School. A request had been received from the School authorities through MILOBS Sector 3B, for construction of a security fencing at Butare school. The Group decided that the matter could be decided after exact requirements had been assessed by the Force Engineers and MILOBS, in consultation with the school authorities, and subject to the cost being reasonable.

4. Sector 1A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. Details of major activities carried out are as follows:

(1) Supply of Seeds and Agriculture Materials. The distribution was done in Gikomero commune. With the full support of the local officials, the European community for the items and INDBATT for the transportation.

(2) Medical Aspect. With the support of an Indian medical team the medicines supplied by the Government of India were presented by the humanitarian team to Rushashi orphanage named "Orphelinat Sans Frontieres" (O.S.F.) on 19 Oct 95. "AMDA" an NGO agreed to provide medical support along with his medical team once a week to Butamwa commune.

(3) Temporary Shelters. With the support of UNHCR, tents (plastic sheets) for temporary shelters were delivered by the humanitarian team to Musasa and Rushashi orphanages.

5. Sector 1B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) MILOBS finished delivery of UNICEF schooling materials from Gitarama to the communes. MILOBS also began to deliver blankets for orphanages on 20 Oct 95. 124 blankets for Kabgayi St Joseph (721622), 200 for Kabgayi (719679), 194 for Nyanza, Kigoma (729411) and 150 for Nyanza St Antonie were delivered.

(2) A meeting under the auspices of UNHCR was held on 18 Oct 95 to co-ordinate the activities of all related NGOs in preparation for the refugee repatriation programme.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Housing. Agency Rwandese for Development and Cooperation (ARDEC) a Rwandese NGO is constructing houses in Runda commune (9882). They are planning to construct 764 houses in that commune of which 104 have been already constructed.

6. Sector 2A

a. General Living Conditions

(1) Health Care

(a) Gituza health centre (GR 324213) had insufficient drugs to combat an outbreak of dysentery. An average of 50 patients per week reported for dysentery treatment.

(b) Refugee Trust organised an education campaign on good nutrition for about 100 mothers at the Giti Dispensary (2302) on 17 Oct 95.

(c) UNICEF and WVI conducted vaccination exercises in Muhura, Rutare and Giti communes on 19 Oct 95 against meningitis.

(d) The number of out-patients at the Mulindi health centre (GR 042371) had dropped from 70 - 80 daily to 10 - 30 daily due to introduction of consultation fee of 50 amafaranga (FRW), lab fee of 100 FRW and in-patient fee of 20 FRW per day as part of the Ministry of Health directives.

(2) Housing. The NGO CARITAS distributed roofing sheets to 30 families in Kgombe commune on 12 Oct 95. In Tumba commune, UNHCR had promised to rehabilitate this commune

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office structure.

(4) Farming. ADRA provided 4,800 hoes to the Ngarama commune for distribution to farmers.

7. Sector 2B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. The following major activities were carried out during the week:

(1) Distribution of 25 and 19 blankets donated by the Austrian Relief Programme to Bare (5449) and Gahara (5442) health centres respectively.

(2) Sick orphaned boy picked at IDAGAZA and sent to GHANCOY RAP and then to Kibungo hospital for treatment.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Water. The water situation in the sector was relatively stable. There was no report of inadequacy of water except for the case of Rwamagana hospital. UNHCR was contacted and an assurance obtained on resumption of supply.

(2) Health Care. Rwinkwavu hospital was found to be in need of plastic covers for 200 mattresses so as to avoid stains.

(3) Farming. The Prefect through the Ministry of Rehabilitation was able to obtain seeds and hoes for distribution in the prefecture. Distribution was seen going on by own team at Nasho. Each family received 2 hoes and 3kg of beans.

(4) Returnees

(a) The expansion work on the Nyakarambi and Birenga transit camps is still going on.

(b) Old case returnees settled in the areas of Nyaminga (6599)/Akagera National Park and Nyagahandagaza (6069) complained about lions attacking their cattle.

c. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) UNICEF is presently carrying out a renovation exercise at the Rukumbeli health centre.

(2) UNHCR received 15 refugees (family heads) from Tanzania who were brought in to assess the situation in

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the Kibungo prefecture and to convince other refugees still in Tanzania to return to Rwanda.

Sector 3A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. The HAC has continued to provide limited transport assistance to the hospital at Kigeme.

b. General Living Conditions. The general living conditions are satisfactory except that there is a general complaint about the inadequacy of agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizer and farm implements. There is rising resentment by the general populace against the restriction of material assistance to only orphans, widows, survivors of genocide and the infirm.

9. Sector 3B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) There are 20 families comprising 150 persons who belong to Gikongoro prefecture and want to go back to their home commune. A request has been made to UNHCR, Butare for their transportation. The commune has 2000 IDP returnees from Kibaho which includes 800 male and 1200 female. Presently the commune has a total of 350 returnees of 1959-61. The commune authority has asked for lands for these returnees at Songa sector from the government.

(2) Team went to sector 1B in connection of transferring a 9 years old boy named SINDATIGAYA to his home commune Muyira. Team briefed the Sector Commander of 1B regarding the location and situation of the father of the boy. The case has been taken over by UNHCR, Gitarama. On 11 Oct 95 Rwandan authority moved the boy from the Ntongwe cachote to Juvenile centre of detention in Gitagara. Team has given the particulars of boy's father, henceforth UNHCR will make necessary contact with the boy's father and arrange transportation for the father to visit his son.

b. Situation in Rehabilitation School Butare. The Force Engr Coy has made the following progress in the Rehabilitation School project in Butare:

(1) Work on the sanitation system completed (100 toilets with GSI sheets shed).

(2) Work on water supply line is in progress and following work has been done:

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(a) New line to main kitchen, dinning hall and admin block.

(b) Repair of bathroom in three building.

(c) Water supply to hospital.

(3) Electrical fittings have been in 16 buildings.

10. Sector 4

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) On Wed 16 Oct 95 opening ceremony of the Kamembe orphanage for non accompanied children at the former site of the "Noviciat des Jesuites" in Cyangugu was held.

(2) MILOBS Humanitarian team together with the UNHCR representative visited the site in Bweyeye sector (GR 1310) where a number of refugees are presently settled. All of them were living in Cibitoke commune in Burundi before returning to Rwanda. Before the 1994 war, all were living in the Gikongoro prefecture but now there are two groups, one willing to settle in Gikongoro and the other willing to remain in Bweyeye sector. The Bourgmestre has been requested to compile two separate lists and when these lists are complete, UNHCR will move the returnees to their new location.

b. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) Food. WFP presently employs approximately 3,000 locals working under the "Food for Work" programme in the Cyangugu prefecture. Their monthly ration consists of, 50kg of maize/cereal, 30kg of beans and seven kilograms of oil.

(2) Refugees. There are two new NGOs working with refugees. The first is "Concern Worldwide" which arrived at Bugarama Cite transit camp on 2 Oct 95. They are assuming some services previously done by UNHCR. The second is "The Netherlands Development Agency" (SNV) which arrived in the Cyangugu prefecture on Thu 12 Oct 95. This NGO is presently setting up in Cyangugu with a staff of three to be augmented to six. 15 locals will be employed by the agency responsible for housing construction and regional development.

11. Sector 5A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) On 16 Oct 95 five boxes of text books were conveyed to Ndusu commune by a MILOBS team as part of the humanitarian assistance from the Ruhengeri prefecture. They were received by the Bourgmestre.

(2) On the same day a MILOBS team presented used clothing to the Janja orphanage. The clothings were provided by UNHCR.

(3) On 16 Oct 95 the NGO called Inter SOS from Italy distributed food and other items to the nutrition centre in Rwankuba (6038), Kinigi commune responding the request made by one of our MILOBS teams. The nutrition centre is also feeding about 200 orphans.

(4) On 17 Oct 95 one patient who was injured in a road accident was brought to Ruhengeri hospital by a MILOBS team.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Health Care

(a) The major problem facing Kabingo sector in Ndusu commune was an outbreak of diaorrhea and dysentery diseases. MSM-H and STC have been informed.

(b) A MILOBS team visited the health centre at Rosoro sector in Ndusu commune. Amongst the problem facing the centre were inadequate drugs, mattresses and blankets. STC is assisting the health centre.

(2) Housing. In Kigombe commune the Karwasa Resettlement Project was visited by a MILOBS team in order to find out the progress of work on the building construction. It was discovered that 14 houses were being roofed and there was construction activities continuing at the site.

(3) Agricultural Activities. UNHCR distributed seeds and hoes in Kinigi commune. The Union Europeene distributed carrot and onion seeds in the Nyarutovu commune.

12. Sector 5B

a. General Living Conditions

(1) Agricultural. The planting of crops continues to accelerate. All the agronomists within the communes have been encouraged to monitor the progress of the crops closely and report any difficulties.

b. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) COOPI. In Mutura commune they have supported some 400 families. They have distributed a total of 5250 hoes and 26 tons of beans seeds.

(2) WFP. They have finished construction of two tents within the Nkamira transit centre with a total capacity of 800 tons. The Food for Work Programme continues in Kibiliria with a project on house construction. It will involve some 720 families and construct 300 houses. They will be paid with 40 tons of food for a total of six months. Road rehabilitation continues in Kanama, Mutura, Gaseke and Ramba. In Satinskyi a fish pond project has been started, 4000 fingerlings have been delivered to the site. In the near future WFP plans to begin another housing project in collaboration with FFH. It will construct an additional 500 houses in 5 communes. Finally they have begun a reforestation project which includes 10 nurseries per commune with 1 per secteur.

(3) Food for the Hungry. Continues with its seed distribution programme in concert with UNHCR within 6 of the 12 communes. They have served a total of 4060 families.

(4) INTERSOS. Will distribute 8.5 tons of beans seed to the communes of Kayove and Nyamyumba on behalf of UNHCR.

(5) BORNEFORNDEN. A Danish NGO agency is operating in the communes of Giciye and Karago. They are helping some 400 families via support families in Denmark. To date they have distributed 1319 hoes, 50 of 80 insecticide dispensers, 1500kg of dithane, they intend to distribute 2000kg of beans seed and 20 tons of NPK 17.17. They are also assisting by renting fields for families with no land. In the near future they plan to distribute 20 pigs, 200 goats, 300 sheep, 800 rabbits and 800 chickens.

c. Local Authorities. It is clear from the meetings attended this week that the Ministry of Rehabilitation and the Ministry of Environment have diverging views. The major difficulty is that land is required very quickly in order to

ensure a smooth transition of returnees to the communes. Those settled in the camps in the Gishwati will probably be moved, destination or timing of move yet to be determined. The intent to stop the destruction of the forest is clear. The Ministry of the Environment representative stopped a planned distribution of seeds to those camps located in the forest.

13. Sector 5C

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. MILOBS team have visited numerous schools, hospitals and orphanages during the week. On 18 Oct 95, a MILOBS patrol flew by heli to the returnee camp in Bwiza (3694) and monitored the situation there with members of WFP. MILOBS also requested and delivered approximately 100 blankets to Gisovu (2952) and Rwamatamu (1557) commune offices. They also brought approximately 50 blankets and some rehydration fluids to Karangera hospital.


b. General Living Conditions

(1) Health. MSF and UNICEF are working diligently to improve and run hospital facilities throughout the prefecture. In general the quality of health care provided is poor and overcrowding, untrained staff, broken equipment, inadequate water and latrine facilities and lack of transportation for the injured exasperate this bad situation.

(2) Water and Sanitation. ICRC is slowly making progress in repairing broken pipes and developing new sources of water.

CONCLUSION

14. The humanitarian assistance presently being undertaken by UN agencies and NGOs is helping the people to get on their feet and the future may not be as bleak as now. However this assistance and the present aid mechanism may be threatened if the security situation worsens in an uncontrolled flood of returnees.

RADIO RWANDA NEWS SUMMARY

Kigali, October 28, 1995 - In an audience yesterday with Rwanda's Prime Minister Rwigema, the Director-General of the ICRC, Mr. Cornelio Sommaruga, said the perpetrators of last year's genocide should be punished in accordance with international conventions. He stressed that no one should shield those criminals. Expressing his sympathies to the Rwandese nation, Mr. Sommaruga promised to seek increased assistance for this country. He reiterated his earlier stand that the repatriation of refugees must be done under conditions that ensure their dignity. The Prime Minister commended ICRC for its humanitarian assistance during last year's crisis. Present at the ceremony were the following Ministers: Mrs Martha Mukamurenzi of Justice, Mr. Patrick Mazimhaka of Rehabilitation and Social Reintegration and Col. Joseph Karemera of Health.

A delegation of nine Kenyan Parliamentarians was hosted to a dinner last evening by the Speaker of the National Assembly, Mr. Juvenal Nkusi. Led by the Chairman of FORD - Kenya, Mr. Michael Kijana Wamalwa, the delegation had earlier visited Mugombwa genocide site, in Butare. The Kenyans are here on a three-day visit to meet Government officials and learn from the Rwandese experience. During the dinner at Hotel des Mille Collines, the Speaker of the National Assembly thanked Kenya for the asylum given as far back as the early 60s to Rwandese refugees who were victims of colonial and political manipulation. Mr. Nkusi stressed that the current Government is striving to eradicate the culture of impunity started in 1959. Mr. Michael Kijana Wamalwa said in his toast that most Kenyans do not support President Moi in his attempt to protect genocide suspects living in Kenya. He added that if Moi understood the meaning of genocide he would not have uttered the statement he recently made on that issue. The FORD - Kenya leader indicated that the purpose of the Parliamentarians' visit was to learn from the Rwandese experience, with the awareness that what befell Rwanda could happen to Kenya.

The Minister of Rehabilitation and Social Reintegration, Mr. Patrick Mazimhaka, received yesterday at the Airport 50 Rwandese children returning from their asylum in Italy. The children had been flown to Italy for treatment last year, at the height of the April-July crisis. Mr. Mazimhaka explained that another group of 30 children is due to return. The new arrivals will be taken to a children's centre in Muhura commune, Byumba, where efforts will be made to find parents or relatives of the young returnees.

The repatriation exercise recorded yesterday 104 returnees from Zaire through Cyangugu. Another group of earlier returnees numbering 80 left yesterday the Nedera transit camp for their communes in Byumba. Further, eight more were recorded at Gatuna border post in Byumba,

having transited through Uganda due to fears spread by rumours in Zaire camps, which allege that the Gisenyi route is a sure warrant to death.

Meanwhile, a delegation of Rwandese refugees from Migano Camp in Burundi toured yesterday Gashora Commune in Kigali Rural to assess the security situation and report back to their fellow refugees. They met their relatives and neighbours and were astounded to find the situation normal. According to these refugees, rumours in the camps, which they found baseless, allege mass killings of returnees. The delegation promised to correct the wrong impression created in the camps by well-orchestrated lies. On the issue of possible arrests, it was explained to the refugees that those returnees who are genocide suspects are liable to arrest as individuals, in accordance with the law.

Rwanda is to receive about US\$ 13 million from the IMF. The funding is in compensation for the loss of coffee and tea exports incurred due to last year's war.

RADIO RWANDA NEWS SUMMARY

Kigali, October 30, 1995 - The delegation of nine Kenyan Parliamentarians ended its visit here yesterday morning. H.E. President Pasteur Bizimungu, who received the senior opposition politicians on Saturday evening, informed the visitors that his Government wishes to see Kenya resume diplomatic relations with Rwanda. The Kenyan Parliamentarians had earlier visited Gisenyi, where they were able to witness the welcome extended to returning refugees from camps in Zaire. The Head of the delegation, Mr. Michael Kijana Wamalwa, who is Chairman of FORD-Kenya, said in his statement before departure that the visit had helped the Kenyans to get a better grasp of the situation in Rwanda. He indicated that a lot of lessons had been learned from the tour, adding that it was clear to his delegation that last year's genocide here had been simply a result of bad politics engineered by former leaders. He reiterated that most Kenyans do not support President Moi's views in favour of genocide suspects.

The Rwandese Prime Minister, Mr. Pierre Célestin Rwigema, accompanied yesterday the First Lady, Mrs. Séraphine Bizimungu, on a visit to Kigoma Commune, in Gitarama. With them was the Minister of Information, Mr. Jean Pierre Bizimana. The three personalities were welcomed in their native Commune by the Prefet of Gitarama, Mr. Nyandwi, and the area Commander, Col. Ndengeyinka. The visitors urged the people to maintain security in the area. A donation of Rwfr 100,000 was offered by the Prime Minister to the orphanage at Ihanika, in the same Commune.

A five-day seminar for medical personnel on mother and child care closed in Kigali on Saturday. Sponsored by Italian Cooperation and World Health Organization, the seminar dealt with sexually transmitted diseases and the scourge of AIDS.

Abroad

Sudan has accused Uganda of carrying out an offensive deep into Southern Sudan. The Sudanese military announcement said the offensive was done with the complicity of the rebel SPLA.

Tanzanians held yesterday their multi-party Presidential elections. The polling deadline, initially set for 4 p.m., was extended to 8 p.m. Out of 16 million Tanzanians who qualify to vote,

only 9 million had been registered. In last week's elections for the Zanzibari Head of Government, the ruling Chama Cha Mapinduzi won the vote. There are four candidates vying for the Union's presidency: Benjamin Mkapa of Chama Cha Mapinduzi, Augustin Lyatonga Mrema of NCCR - Mageuzi, John Momose Cheyo of UDP and Prof. Ibrahim Haruna Lipumba of Civic United Front (CUF).

HUMANITARIAN WEEKLY SITREP 23 - 29 OCTOBER 1995

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remains calm. Organized repatriation continues, figures for the week are attached.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira Transit camp. Attendance of the monthly inter-agency coordination meeting. Assisted IOM with escort patrol to the Kayove commune to deliver food and returnees. Coordinated with NICOY transport assistance in support of National Tree Day and with the pre-olympic trials to be held in Gisenyi. Escorted Canadian representatives from 95 CMSSG to the orphanage in Murura and Enfants du Rue where they dropped off donations. Also attended a social event at the Nyundo Orphanage Noel.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

3. a. FOOD NTR

b. WATER Awaiting response from HAC on results of the water point recommendations forwarded some time ago. Although no promises are or were made regarding this project, I think it is important that we provide feedback on the status of these projects. It will be more and more difficult to remain credible in the communes if all we do is ask what needs to be done and then are not seen to actually be doing anything.

c. HOUSING FHI and WFP have reached an agreement to begin a housing construction/repair project for vulnerable families in five communes. The project will see the construction of 500 homes in the next three months. This will provide an average of 9 homes in each of the 53 secteurs. Food assistance to 1,980 families for construction labour and the fabrication of 250,000 bricks and 334,000 tiles will be provided. Each house will be constructed of 1,500 bricks and 2,000 tiles. It is anticipated that a total of 100MT of maize, 60MT of beans/peas and 12MT of oil will be distributed to each commune per month for the next three months.

d. EDUCATION School will begin in the Gisenyi communes in early November. COOPI continues to rehabilitate these schools, FHI continues to organize and provide assistance to returnees in order for them to attend school.

e. FARMING FHI has agreed to provide seeds in stock to non-returnee vulnerable families in Gaseke and Kanama communes. They provided 5 tons of Beans to Kanama and 3 tons of beans to Gaseke. Transport of these items was provided by UNAMIR

f. HEALTH CARE/PROBLEMS Both MSF/MERLIN remain ready to support both transit camps should a sudden influx occur.

PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

4. The Canadian representatives from 95 CMSG distributed sports items, cots, footwear and miscellaneous items to the orphanage at Murara and the Enfants de la Rue.

NGO'S

5. A. COOPI NTR

B. ICRC NTR

C. MERLIN/MSF MSF reports that the health centre located in Murara is completely rehabilitated. The centre in Kora should be completed by the end of the month.

D. WFP Continues with its Food For Work programmes in Gaseke and Kanama. As mentioned previously they have coordinated and combined their efforts with FHI in a housing project.

E. Food for the Hungry Continued to coordinate the agencies that indentify and register vulnerable families and unaccompanied children at the Nkamira transit centre. During the week they registered 129 vulnerable families/364 persons. 24 of the families/78 persons are destined to resettle in the five communes of FHI operations, Karago, Giciye, Mutura, Rewerere and Rubavu. The remaining 105 families/286 persons are destined for other prefectures. FHI will pass the information regarding these families to the appropriate UNHCR sub-offices.


UN AGENCIES

6. UNHCR Received a mission from Kigali including representatives of the Ministries of Rehabilitation, Agriculture, Environment and Tourism, Public Works, Health and Education. The mission along with the Sub-Prefect, local representatives of the Ministries and a UNHCR

SM visited potential sites for the permanent resettlement of the old caseload returnees in Mutura Commune. Nearly 800 hectares were identified as probable sites, pending official documents from the government. The possibility of exploiting some 1000 hectares bordering the Volcano Park will be examined. Gishwati Forest officially remains off limits for resettlement, however over a thousand families are currently occupying land in the Mutura section of the forest alone.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES

8. Relations between UNAMIR and the local authorities remain cooperative and cordial

SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Following are the tasks done by Milob in coordination with formed troops, local authority and NGOs:
 - a. Collected food from CRS warehouse, Butare using 1 x Mali coy truck and delivered at Rusatira (7431) commune for returnees.
 - b. Provided 2 x trucks from Mali coy to carry the remains of genocide victims at Ruhashya (6926) and shyanda (7718) communes.
 - c. provided 1 x pickup (UNAMIR 457) to Ngoma (7112) commune to ferry the people who attended the reburial ceremony held in Butare National University.
 - d. Transported school materials from Butare prefecture office to Huye (6714), Mbazi (7117) and Shyanda communes for onward distribution to commune school using Milob veh (UNAMIR 1074).
 - e. Coordinated with the NGOs to attend Mine Awareness lecture held on 27 Oct 95 at Mali coy in Gikongoro.
 - f. Coordinated with UNHCR, Butare to transfer 117 IDPs from Rusatira to different prefecture which will start from 30 Oct 95.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

2.
 - a. Water: Due to rain season water situation is a little bit better in most of the commune. Some of the communes are facing problems with the pumps which were either destroyed during war or are out of order due to lack of technical know how by the users such as in Mbazi and Nyabisindu communes. Oxfam is still working on the water system and pipeline in Mugusa (8425) commune.
 - b. Food: Distribution of food by NGOs is being carried out with limited interval and the quantity distributed is insufficient. 10 / 20 percent of the total needy people are getting food.
 - c. Health Care: MSF, AICF, and some other NGOs continued to assist diligently to improve and run hospital / health center facilities throughout the prefecture. In general, quality of health care is poor due to lack of medicine, untrained staff, overcrowding and non availability of equipment. It is reported that the outbreak of desentry at RUYENZI Orphanage center is still prevailing among the children. MSF has taken water samples from the spring for checking. MSF carried out immunization programme for children at Kigembe commune this week.

d. Agriculture: Farming activities are being carried out in all the communes. The major problems in this matter are shortage of agricultural implements and seeds, though local government and NGOs continued to support people with the hope of making them self-sufficient in food.

d. Education: This week milob team visited a school named 'Group Scolaire De Save' in Shyanda Commune and informed that there are 820 students including 220 orphans who needed financial assistance. Beside this in all communes, schools need assistance in terms of rehabilitation work to buildings, supply of school materials, recreational facilities including development of play grounds etc. The special needs for all students is to provide them with text books. No new books have been provided to students after the war.

e. Returnees: The rate of influx of returnees has been reduced since last week. During this week a total of 222 arrived in the way station, Butare for onward despatch to various prefecture. 198 refugees crossed border posts in Kigembe commune on foot and went to their home communes. Out of 222 returnees only 50 were absorbed in Butare prefecture.

f. Prisons: A total of 246 prisoners have been transferred to Nyanza prison from various commune chacotes during the week. Most of the commune chacotes are over crowded and living conditions are very poor. Figures of Karubanda prison remain same as of last report. Following are the figures of Nyanza prison as of 27 Oct 95:

ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES AND NGOs

3. Human rights Representative in Butare is supervising transfer of prisoner. Feed The Children is assisting the orphans in various orphanages in coordination with WFP. CRS and ICRC are providing food, seeds and agricultural implements to locals and prisoners. MSF and AICF are providing limited medical assistance to some communes. OXFAM and UNICEF are assisting in restoring water supply systems in MUGUSA commune.


REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE

4. Ruhashya commune requested for an electrician to repair their electrical wiring in the commune office. Mbazi commune requested to repair their water pump. Maraba commune requested for a loader to clean garbage from market place. All communes require roofing sheets for houses which are being built for returnees.

CONCLUSION INCLUDING ASSESMENT

5. This HQ is sending a various request from communes to various organizations including UNAMIR. But the response is inadequate to our request forwarded. NGOs and other humanitarian agencies working in the prefecture have reduced their activities may be due to financial constraints or otherwise. Our teams are yet to find out the reasons why the number of returnees have reduced to such an extent.

ARE FOUND MOVING AROUND DURING THE CURFEW HOURS. THIS CURFEW WAS IMPOSED BY THE RPA TO STOP THE INFILTRATION OF FRGF/MILITIA FROM THE ZAIRE.

(4) ANOTHER MILOB PTL AT GAKARA SECTOR GR 3921 IN KARAGO COMMUNE REPORTED THAT THE SITUATION IN THE AREA IS TENSE DUE TO THE INCREASE OF ARMED ROBBERIES TAKING PLACE IN THE AREA. LOCALS IN THE AREA BELIEVE THE ROBBERIES WERE CARRIED OUT BY INTERHAMWE/MILITIA COMING FROM THE GISHWATI FOREST. LOCALS WERE ORDERED TO JOIN THE RPA NIGHT PTL FOR SECURITY REASONS. MILOBS ALSO CONDUCTED PTL IN VARIOUS COMMUNES WITHIN THE SECTOR AND REPORTED THE SIT AS CALM.

(5) IN KIBUYE MILOB SECTOR HQ ON 28 OCT 95 COORDINATED THE EVACUATION OF THE SECURITY OFFICER OF THE KIBUYE PREFECTURE. HE WAS SUFFERING FROM SEVERE MALARIA AND WAS IN KIBUYE HOSPITAL, BUT HOSPITAL AUTHORITY COULD NOT PROVIDE SUPPORT TO HIM AS THE CASE WAS SERIOUS. HOWEVER WITH THE EFFORT TAKEN BY THE FORCE MEDICAL OFFICER HE WAS EVACUATED BY HELI TO KIGALI AND WERE TAKEN TO THE RPA MILITARY HOSPITAL.

(6) ONE MILOB TEAM ON 28 OCT 95 PTL AT BWIZA GR 3694 CAMP UNDER RUTSIRO COMMUNE TO DELIVER HUMANITARIAN SUPPLIES TO THE LOCALS AND TALKED TO THEM. THE LOCALS WHO ARE OLD CASE RETURNEES ARE AFRAID BECAUSE OF THE PEOPLE WHO ARE LIVING INSIDE THE GISHWATI FOREST HAVE ALLEGEDLY PLANTED MINES IN IT. 

3.(UN-R) SECTOR 4: MATARE SECTOR, NYARUSHISHI (850 228): 05 2315B SEP: AN ELECTRIC POWER PYLON WAS COMPLETELY DESTROYED BY EXPLOSIVE DEMOLITION, CUTTING POWER LINES AND TELEPHONE CABLES. COMMENT: THE SABOTAGE IS CONSISTENT WITH THOSE ACTIVITIES CARRIED OUT BY EX-FAR IN SECTOR 5, AIMED AT ATTACKING RWANDAN INFRASTRUCTURE; A DELIBERATE ACTION TO DISRUPT SECURITY AND INFRASTRUCTURE WHILE DISCREDITING RPA IN A REGION WHOSE PREDOMINANTLY HUTU POPULATION HAD APPEARED TO BE WAVERING AS TOWARDS ACCEPTANCE, IF NOT SUPPORTING OF THE CURRENT GOVERNMENT. SUCH ACTS OF SABOTAGE ALSO SERVE TO TRAIN EX-FAR/MILITIA WHILE MAINTAINING PRESSURE ON THE RWANDAN GOVERNMENT.

4.(UN-R) SECTOR 5: MILOBS REPORT RADIO AMAHORO CONTINUES TO BROADCAST A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF DISINFORMATION TO THE REFUGEE CAMPS IN ZAIRE. COMMENT:

A. (UN-R) IT IS BECOMING INCREASINGLY CLEAR THAT THE VOLUNTARY REPATRIATION PROGRAM SPONSORED BY THE UNHCR IS IN DIFFICULTY. THE HUTU MILITIAS IN THE CAMPS HAVE OPPOSED THE PLAN, AND ARE ACTIVELY WORKING TO INTIMIDATE AND DISCOURAGE THE REFUGEES FROM RETURNING TO RWANDA. RADIO AMAHORO IS BROADCASTING DISINFORMATION FROM GOMA, APPARENTLY DESCRIBING IN GRAPHIC TERMS THE TORTURES THAT RETURNEES ARE SAID TO SUFFER. OF THE 300,000 REFUGEES IN BURUNDI, 58,000 HAVE INDICATED A WILLINGNESS TO RETURN. HOWEVER, WHEN IT COMES TIME TO GET ON THE BUS, THEY OFTEN CHANGE THEIR MINDS.

B. (UN-R) ON 4 SEP, THE PRIME MINISTER OF TANZANIA SAID THAT HIS COUNTRY MAY BE COMPELLED TO CONSIDER FORCED REPATRIATION OF IT'S 700,000 RWANDAN REFUGEES. ON THE SAME DAY, A US DIPLOMAT IN KIGALI WAS QUOTED BY REUTERS AS SAYING THAT THE ZAIRIAN GOVERNMENT WOULD HAVE TO RESUME FORCED REPATRIATIONS, AND THAT IT WASN'T NECESSARILY A BAD THING. ON 5 SEP, PRESIDENT BIZIMUNGU APPEALED TO ALL TWO MILLION RWANDAN REFUGEES LIVING OUTSIDE RWANDA, ASKING THEM TO RETURN. HE HAS GUARANTEED THEIR SAFETY, AND ORDERED THE GOVERNMENT NOT TO MAKE ANY ARBITRARY ARRESTS.

The security situation in the prefecture continues to remain calm. The Zairian/Rwandan border is open for all traffic including UNHCR vehicles.

II. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

B. RPA - RWANDA PATRIOTIC ARMY -

The RPA LO has indicated that the cordon and search operation in the Gishwati Forest is continuing. The RPA are sweeping from the west and south however the going is difficult. The RPA have some limited success consist of finding some caches of military equipment such as rucksacks, grenades and some anti-pers mines. There is no indication of how long this operation will continue.

E. GENDARMERIE -

CIVPOL Monitoring Team in the prefecture is assisting the Gendarmerie in the investigation of incidents of banditry and murders cases. The relationship between CIVPOL Team and the 3 Gendarmerie brigades in the prefecture is excellent.

2. SOCIAL:

Majority of the people in Gisenyi Prefecture continue to participate in social activities especially soccer and basket clubs, even though there are fears of moving around in the night in the south of the Prefecture.

3. COMMERCIAL:

There are visible increase in commercial activities

throughout the prefecture. Shops are being expanded to cater for the number of people entering the country through the various border posts to resettle.

4. ECONOMIC:

There is an inflationary spiral of goods and services.

5. HUMANITARIAN:

A. The number of spontaneous returnees on 4/9/95 from Zaire through Gisenyi/Goma Border Posts was 16.

B. The total number of returnees for 04 Sep, spontaneous and organized repatriation, as at 1600 hrs has been 96.

III. OWN ACTIVITIES:

A. We visited the Prosecutor in Gisenyi to follow up the investigations of the arbitrary arrest of Elie Biryuranye, the Conseiller of the Kanamba Sector, Commune Kanama. He was arrested on 02 March 95 and should be free since 5 weeks. Investigation in progress.

B. We has been informed of the medical assistant of Gisenyi hospital that one local is in admission transported of the Gisenyi prison. It is suspected that he has been tortured and broken a leg in the prison. Investigation in progress.

INVESTIGATION:

CIVPOL Monitoring Team in the prefecture is assisting Human Rights Monitors and the Gendarmerie in the investigation of Human Rights violation cases and incidents of banditry and murder. The team is also assisting UNAMIR Military Police and the Gendarmerie in motor accident cases throughout the prefecture.

INCIDENT REPORT - CONTINUATION

1. The incident reported at ref was confirmed by ETHIOBATT and RPA. However, the timings given differ between 1100 hrs and 1745 hrs on 12 July 95.

2. According to RPA-Offr and other sources the shooting was initiated by troops from the Zairian side near or from the refugee camp using small arms and heavy machine guns which are in position around the camp.

The firing lasted the whole afternoon and was responded by RPA.

3. The evacuation of 2 casualties (civilians) from the refugee camp to the General Hospital of BUKAVU was reported. No informations about other wounded people were confirmed today. Surprisingly no casualties were reported on RPA-side, no informations about casualties on the Zairian side (Military personnel) are available at the moment.

4. According to RPA-Offr and other sources there are FRGF troops and Milicias located inside the camp, equipped with weapons or with access to weapons used by the Zairian troops.

5. On Thu 13 July 95 from 1110 hrs to 1200 hrs a meeting between Representative of Ministry of Defence of Zaire and local RPA-SecCdr took place in the middle of the bridge at RUSIZI II. Local RPA-SecCdr was trying to find out the reason of shooting and to convince the Zairian authorities to relocate the camp away from the border further inland.

During the meeting the GRID references of the place where the shooting started were given to the Zairian Representative. He assured to provide this information to the Zairian troops to contact the milicias to find out the reason and background of the fighting.

These informations were provided by RPA-Offr.

6. After the meeting local RPA-SecCdr moved to BUGARAMA border crossing to meet the commander of the Zairian troops deployed along the border to discuss the matter.
7. After his arrival in KAMEMBE later this afternoon MILOBS will meet him again to receive the latest informations.
8. The situation in the PQANZI REFUGEE CAMP is calm at the moment. However, one MILOB team will continue to monitor the camp.



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
