Summary of cables from the Agence France Presse

Togo

WASHINGTON, 14 - Commandant Badjo, Chief of the military Junta in Lomé, seems to be in complete control of the situation and all is quiet in the Togolese capital, declared Monday the State Department spokesman. In American official circles it is stated that the question of recognition of the new regime is not even asked. It is pointed out that the provisional Government - which was hinted to by one of the leaders of the coup d'état, the NCO Bodjole, on the Lomé radio - has still not been constituted.

In official circles it has been noted that two candidates have been mentioned to head the provisional Government: Mr. Antoine Meatchi, former Minister of Agriculture who was living in exile in Ghana, and Mr. Nicolas Grunitski who was Prime Minister from 1956 to 1958 and brother-in-law of the assassinated President. Mr. Grunitski was residing in Danomey. The State Department is not in a position to confirm if these two personalities have already reached Lomé.

In official circles it is stated that it is still too soon to assess the situation and to say in which Direction Sunday's events will influence the policy of friendship towards the West which was pursued by the late President.

One of the first reactions of American circles had been to wonder if Ghana had not played a part behind the scenes. The State Department's spokesman, mentioning reports transmitted by the United States Ambassador to Togo, Léon Poullada, stated that for the time being there was no indication of a foreign influence. The prevailing impression is that the coup d'état was motivated by considerations of an internal nature. The army was discontented of its pay and also of the measures pertaining to the discharge of soldiers who had earlier served in the French military forces.

The State Department spokesman, Mr. Lincoln White, read the "film" of Sunday morning events. According to him, President Olympio was killed Sunday in the course of the morning in front of the American Chancellery, where he might have been going to ask for asylum. The Chancellery is located behind the private residence of the late President. Ambassador Poullada and one of his deputies found the body at 7.20 a.m. (local time) on 13 January.

According to the report transmitted to Washington, Ambassador Poullada had been informed at day-break that a company of the Togolese Army had rebelled and had seized President Olympio and members of his Cabinet.

The American Ambassador had then immediately gone to the Chancellery and was stopped in front of the presidential residence by soldiers armed with machine-guns. When he insisted, Ambassador Poullada was allowed to enter the Chancellery and obtained the withdrawal of a few soldiers who were on the Chancellery grounds. The soldiers had first refused to obey when the American diplomat had asked to speak to their officers, they had replied that they had none.

The buildings of President Olympio's residence and of the Chancellery were surrounded by troops. Ambassador Poullada had heard rumours that President Olympio might be hiding in the gardens of the Chancellery. At 6.15 am, local time, Mr. Poullada had not been able to find him. A night watchman had apparently run away. Ambassador Poullada had then asked one of his advisers, who was living on the other side of the street, to keep watch on the Chancellery while he intended to go round the town. In town he noticed a few patrols, but the situation was quiet. At 7.25 am, he returned to the Chancellery and noticed that a side door was open and that in front of it President Olympio, who had been hit by three bullets, was lying dead. The Adviser who had been entrusted with watching the Chancellery later stated that he had heard shots around 6.45 am.

Dear M. Owen,

I had a meeting with M. Grunitzky the Head of the provisional government on Saturday 19th. He told me that he sent cables to all Chief of States and to the Secretary General requesting the recognition of his government. He explained that under present circumstances what is needed is National Union and reconciliation of all political trends and that he had made appeals to his people to leave aside past political resentments and to unite now to save unity and peace. He renewed his firm intention to hold general elections at the earliest date and expressed the hope that all political factions will agree to present an united electoral list and asked that I explain the situation to the Secretary General. I assured him that the Secretary General will certainly support any action aimed at preserving peace, unity and prompt re-establishment of democracy in this country, that UNTAB and this mission here will do their best to assist his government at this difficult moment.

As already stated in my previous reports, there is now no alternative to M. Grunitzky's government. I think for this reason that his government will be recognized, but many African States will first make an issue of the condemnation of the murderers of President Olympio before any act of recognition. These are the reasons why I cabled my suggestion that no action be taken from New York until most African States have recognized this government. Meanwhile here I will keep close working contact with the government in order to make our presence felt and to counterbalance bilateral foreign influence. Despite the apparent quietness, a very dangerous situation could develop out of the smallest incident with the existence of the group of soldiers now conscious of their power, the intelligentsia aware of their impotence, all of this in the background of underlying competition of influence between Ghana on one side, the neighbouring french speaking countries and Nigeria on the other side.

Request vigorous intervention for release of five ministers, Freitas Paulin, Hospice Coco, Amegee Paul, Sankaredja Martin and Namoro Karamoko in order to prevent their assassination. Present situation in Togo much confused by foreign intrigues. Honour to suggest dispatch of special mission to investigate. Those who carried out order to assassinate President Olympio possess arms, very elated, uncontrolled. As Minister of Interior ready to supply evidence throwing light on Olympio murder. My presence and that of Ministers arrested and exiled would be essential upon arrival in Togo of mission requested. Maintenance of order by UN Force would be absolutely necessary.
