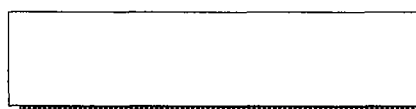

Harold Evans, Press Secretary to Prime Minister Macmillan, met informally with correspondents and made the following points:

1. The Prime Minister congratulated U Thant on his success in discharging his most difficult task;
2. The two men had not met before and the Prime Minister felt that it was a most pleasant, agreeable and useful occasion (the Prime Minister is looking forward to entertaining the Secretary-General in London in early July);
3. The two had a talk before lunch for about 45 minutes (the Secretary-General was alone, the Prime Minister had his private secretary and Sir Patrick with him). Among the subjects discussed were the Congo: there was general agreement that settlement could be reached by the Congolese themselves. The financial situation of the UN was also discussed -- bond issue is a stop-gap measure.
4. Asked (by Pauline Frederick): "How about the subject of a permanent Secretary-General?" Mr. Evans replied: "We feel it would be good for the UN if U Thant saw fit to be a candidate for permanent Secretary-General."
