SITUATION

1. a. UNAMIR. Changes in the military, political and humanitarian situation caused UNAMIR to alter its working procedure. Under the expanded mandate of the Security Council, UNAMIR has deployed forces and support capabilities in RWANDA with an aim to contribute largely in the military, political and humanitarian fields. Ghana, UK, Australia, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Canada, Tunisia, Zambia, Malawi, Chad, Senegal, Congo, Mauritania, Niger, Guinea-Bissau and USA have contributed forces. Forces of the USA do not come directly under UNAMIR but are in direct support for humanitarian assistance.
- b. Political. The political situation remains calm. The newly formed Broad Based Government of National Unity (BBGNU) of RWANDA has started functioning. USA has reopened its embassy in RWANDA and other countries are also planning to re-establish their embassies in RWANDA. Beside this, a number of high level teams from different countries are visiting RWANDA to engage in talks with the present Government.
- c. Military. The military situation remains calm, yet apprehensive. The relief in place with French Coalition Forces (FCF) in Sector 4 (formerly the HPZ) was completed with effect 211130B Aug 94. MILOB teams have deployed to all sectors. Deployments are shown at Annex A
- d. Humanitarian. The Force continues to coordinate humanitarian activities with other humanitarian aid agencies and the return of displaced people to their homes. WPF and other aid agencies continue to deliver food and other aid items to displaced people. In the South West, fears amongst locals continue after the FCF withdrawal. The following activities continue:

(1) Stabilization of the refugees/displaced persons in the present locations by provision of food, water, medical support and basic public health measures with an emphasis in Sector 4. Limited services in Sector 4 had created a situation of despair and a resultant significant movement of people west to BUKAVU. Planning for home area preparation and repatriation of refugees/displaced persons has commenced. KIGALI International Airport is now open for 24/7 operations and essential services in KIGALI are being improved.

(2) KIGALI is the centre of gravity of the humanitarian relief and sustainment effort/programme for RWANDA. From the NODAL POINTS, materials are brought to the Distribution Points under the arrangement of UNAMIR. UNAMIR, along with NGOs and local authorities, distribute food and other items to the affected people. There are a number of distribution points in each affected prefecture. NODAL POINTS have been established in RUHENGARI, BYUMBA, GITARAMA, BUTARE and GIKONGORO. In these NODAL POINTS, trucks, food, assistance supplies (like soap), clean water, medical supplies and facilities have been stockpiled. Personnel, experts, material handling, transport and security are all in evidence in order to ensure that onward distribution, and/or more extensive care/treatment, is provided to the various WAY STATIONS between these nodes and to the outlying areas. The WAY STATIONS have been established every 20 Kms or so along the major corridor of GISENYI-RUHENGARI. This principal corridor leading to KIGALI has been established in order to relieve the pressure on GOMA. A pseudo-quarantine radius from the ZAIRE border is in effect (40 Kms) to screen cholera victims before they move beyond RUHENGARI to KIGALI. NGOs are assisting to establish the WAY STATIONS. Concurrently, transport of seriously ill and other displaced persons from sector 4A and sector 4B through GITARAMA to eastern and western prefectures is being pursued. A second priority is the BURUNDI-BUTARE-GITARAMA-KIGALI corridor. The third priority is the TANZANIA-RUSUMO-KIBANGO-RWAMAGANA-KIGALI corridor. The Humanitarian Affairs Cell (HAC) of UNAMIR, with direct support from the US civilian/humanitarian element, is coordinating all military support in the corridor so that there is no duplication. The last priority is the BYUMBA-KIGALI corridor.

(3) When the flow of refugees returning to their home areas increases, the emphasis will switch from route feeding and support to take-home WAY STATION centres located on the secondary axes. The location of NODAL POINTS and WAY STATIONS is shown at Annex B.

## MISSION

2. UNAMIR is to provide security, and to assist and coordinate the humanitarian support of participating countries/organizations to facilitate a rapid and effective end to the crisis in RWANDA.

## EXECUTION

### 3. General Outline

a. The thrust of the effort remains one of security to create the necessary conditions to bring back the refugees and displaced persons and resettle them in their respective home areas. About one million refugees are presently staying in GOMA and two million refugees are waiting to return home from Sector 4. Confidence building activities among the population in ensuring their security, extensive assistance in carrying out humanitarian tasks by different countries/agencies, monitoring cease-fire, assisting the BBGNU to participate in establishing the relief capability in RWANDA and in re-settling displaced persons/refugees is of paramount importance.

b. A strong, resolute UN presence will be provided in all sectors to ensure adequate security. The emphasis will be placed on patrolling, surveillance, escort duties and protective operations (cordon and search road blocks, etc). High mobility and the flexibility to rapidly concentrate forces must be retained throughout the operation. Protected sites are to be established at locations where Rwandans are in need of security. The operation will be continued in 2 phases:

(1) Phase 1. It is expected that most of the refugees/displaced persons will be well on their way to their home areas by the beginning of phase 1. They have to be supported logistically until the next harvest of crops expected by December/January if the planting is to take place in September/October as RWANDA is an agriculturally based country. Food, clean water, medical facilities, road and bridge reconstruction, home building material, farming tools, etc will have to be provided and/or stockpiled in the NODAL POINTS for onward distribution and/or production. Operations will be conducted to ensure that these activities are free from interference by subversive and criminal interference. Deployment is shown at Annex A.

(2) Phase 2. As conditions in RWANDA stabilize and the BBGNU gains control of the situation, the BBGNU, with NGOs, must be capable of providing sufficient assistance without direct UNAMIR and other nation support. A progressive handover of all activities to the Government and NGOs will be done in accordance with a normalisation process. This phase will be accomplished when the majority of the refugees/displaced persons have returned to their homes and the routine life sequence is re-established. While the provision of security will be maintained, some troop redeployment may be necessary to effect handing over responsibilities of Sector 4 to the Rwandan Government. Withdrawal of Infantry Bns in Sector 4, except for one Motorized Bn (yet to be determined), which will deploy throughout Sector 4, will take place.

4. Groupings and Tasks. Operation Support Hope (US), Operation Passage (Canada), and Operation Gabriel (UK) have deployed in coordination with UNAMIR.

(f) Monitor border crossing by refugees and armed individual/groups in own area of responsibility.

(g) Control the main axis in Sector 4A.

(h) Monitor Eastern boundary of Sector 4 in own area of responsibility.

(i) Provide security in large towns and in refugee/displaced persons' camps.

(j) Ensure that RGF troops are not present.

(k) Detain /arrest any suspected individual/groups and hand them over to local authority.

- (l) Guard UN installations in own area.

(e) Participate in security operations with local authorities such as Communal Police and Gendarmerie.

(f) Undertake, control measures (road blocks, cordon and search, etc) in conjunction with local authorities.

(g) Monitor border crossing by refugees and armed individual/groups in own area of responsibility.

(h) Control the main axis in Sector 5.

(i) Provide security in large towns and in refugee/displaced persons' camps.

- (i) Protect airfield/ strips(s) in own area.
- (j) Ensure that RGF troops are not present in sector.
- (k) Detain /arrest any suspected individual/ groups and hand them over to local authority.

a. Grouping. Signal Squadron, medical platoon, an engr platoon with water purification detachment, a defence and security platoon, air traffic control detachment, a services support squadron and a national support element.

b. Tasks

- (1) Provide Force communications throughout the AO.
- (2) Establish hospital and medical clinic facilities at deployment sites.
- (3) Provide medical support to refugees/displaced persons.
- (4) Encourage refugees to return to their home areas.
- (5) Assist NGOs where possible with the distribution of food and water to refugees/displaced persons.
- (6) Assist UNAMIR in transporting the refugees to their home areas when possible.
- (7) Assist UNAMIR in the management of stores and equipment.
- (8) Be prepared to augment GHANBATT security force in accordance with UNAMIR instructions for security of UN and NGO installations in KIGALI CITY (TBI).

13. AUSTRALIAN CONTINGENT (MEDICAL SUPPORT FORCE)

a. Grouping. Force medical staff, level three medical facility and defence and security company.

b. Tasks.

- (1) Provide medical support to UNAMIR forces in accordance with the Force Medical Support Plan.
- (2) Maintain a level three medical facility with:
  - (a) surgical capability;
  - (b) specialist support elements; and
  - (c) at least 35 beds.
- (3) Be prepared to deploy a treatment section of up to two casualty clearing points as required.

- (4) Be prepared to deploy a dental section and preventative medicine section as required.
- (5) Provide a road ambulance service as directed.
- (6) Be prepared to provide up to two AME teams.
- (7) Provide health advice to the FMO.
- (8) Provide medical support to refugees/displaced persons within capacity.
- (9) Assist NGOs, where possible, with distribution of food, medical supplies and water to refugees/displaced persons.
- (10) Be prepared to augment GHANBATT security force in accordance with UNAMIR instructions for security of UN and NGO installations in KIGALI CITY.

14. **BRITISH CONTINGENT (OP GABRIEL)**

- a. **Grouping.** Engineer squadron, Log Sp squadron, Fd Amb and Maint coy.
- b. **Tasks.**
  - (1) Provide engr sp to UNAMIR principally through the maint of routes, repair of bridges and the provision of water pts.
  - (2) Provide engr advice to HQ UNAMIR.
  - (3) Assist in the restoration of essential svcs and facilities as dir by HQ UNAMIR.
  - (4) Be prepared to clear mines, unexploded ordinance and booby traps for other UNAMIR contingents where appropriate and where resources will allow.
  - (5) Provide med sp to refugees/displaced persons as dir by HQ UNAMIR.
  - (6) Provide surgical sp to UNAMIR as dir by HQ UNAMIR.
  - (7) In conjunction with BROWN and ROOT, provide 2nd line repair and recovery sp to UNAMIR contingent vehs and eqpt within deployed capabilities.
  - (8) Provide maint advice to HQ UNAMIR as required.
  - (9) Provide bulk fuel sups to UNAMIR as dir by HQ UNAMIR and limited distr of fuel to UNAMIR units within KIGALI.

(10) Assist NGOs with distribution of food, water and other humanitarian sups to refugees/displaced persons.

(11) Assist in tpt of refugees and displaced persons to their home areas where possible.

(12) Provide a focus for tasking of UNAMIR tpt assets and assist with coord of log sp to force as dir.

15. HAC

a. Coordinate all activities of NGOs and other Humanitarian organizations.

b. Assist US Force in their humanitarian efforts.

c. Arrange reception of the refugees at GISENYI in coordination with Govt authorities and NGOs.

d. Identify the WAY STATIONS in between GISENYI and RUHENGARI and assist Sector 5 and NGOs in establishing the WAY STATIONS.

e. Provide assistance to US Forces and NGOs to stabilize refugees in GOMA and BUKAVU.

f. Attract and motivate refugees/displaced persons to return to their homes.

g. Monitor the movement of refugees from GISENYI to RUHENGARI.

h. Ensure that WAY STATIONS are well equipped with food, water and medical facilities.

i. Coordinate with US Forces and NGOs for lifting refugees from RUHENGARI and GIKONGORO to their homes.

j. Select the DISTRIBUTION POINTS in the Prefecture/Commune in coordination with local authorities and Sector Commanders.

k. Disseminate all pertinent data to human rights rapporteur.

l. Prepare a guideline for the DISTRIBUTION PTS regarding their organization and tasks.

m. Collect data from Sectors on the need of the affected people, eg. farming tools, seeds, fertilizer, house building materials, health centres etc.

1. SUMMARY The situation throughout the country remains calm.
2. REFUGEE AND DP ACTIVITIES
  - a. Refugees continue to be repatriated through Sectors 4 and 5.
  - b. Displaced persons in Sector 4B are becoming more confident with the situation and are eager to return to their homes in the KIGALI area.
  - c. A large number of weapons are being seized from displaced persons in Sector 4B. Checks for weapons are to intensified on road blocks.
3. RGF/INTERAHAMWE ACTIVITIES
  - a. Two former gendarmaries have surrendered themselves to UNAMIR forces in GISHYITA (Sector 4B). They are to be handed over in accordance with laid down instructions.
4. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS
  - a. A man was killed and his wife wounded in SOVU (Sector 4A). The investigation is ongoing with six suspects being held in NYESAYU.
  - b. The local populace in Sector 5 are locating mines and munitions almost daily. EOD has been requested to send a mine field recce team to survey the Northern part of the Sector which is believed to be heavily mined.
  - c. In RUHENGARI (Sector 5) a grenade explosion was heard but no casualties were reported.
  - d. In NYUNDO (Sector 5) 2 x mines were located. The type is not yet known and EOD has been informed.



5. **ASSESSMENT**

a. The munitions located by the populace in Sector 5, combined with the arms caches reported previously may well indicate that the former RGF plan to mount some sort of offensive action in the future. It is assessed that they have the capability to mount only limited insurgent action at the moment but the threat from hardline elements in the former RGF will grow as time goes on and they become better organised.





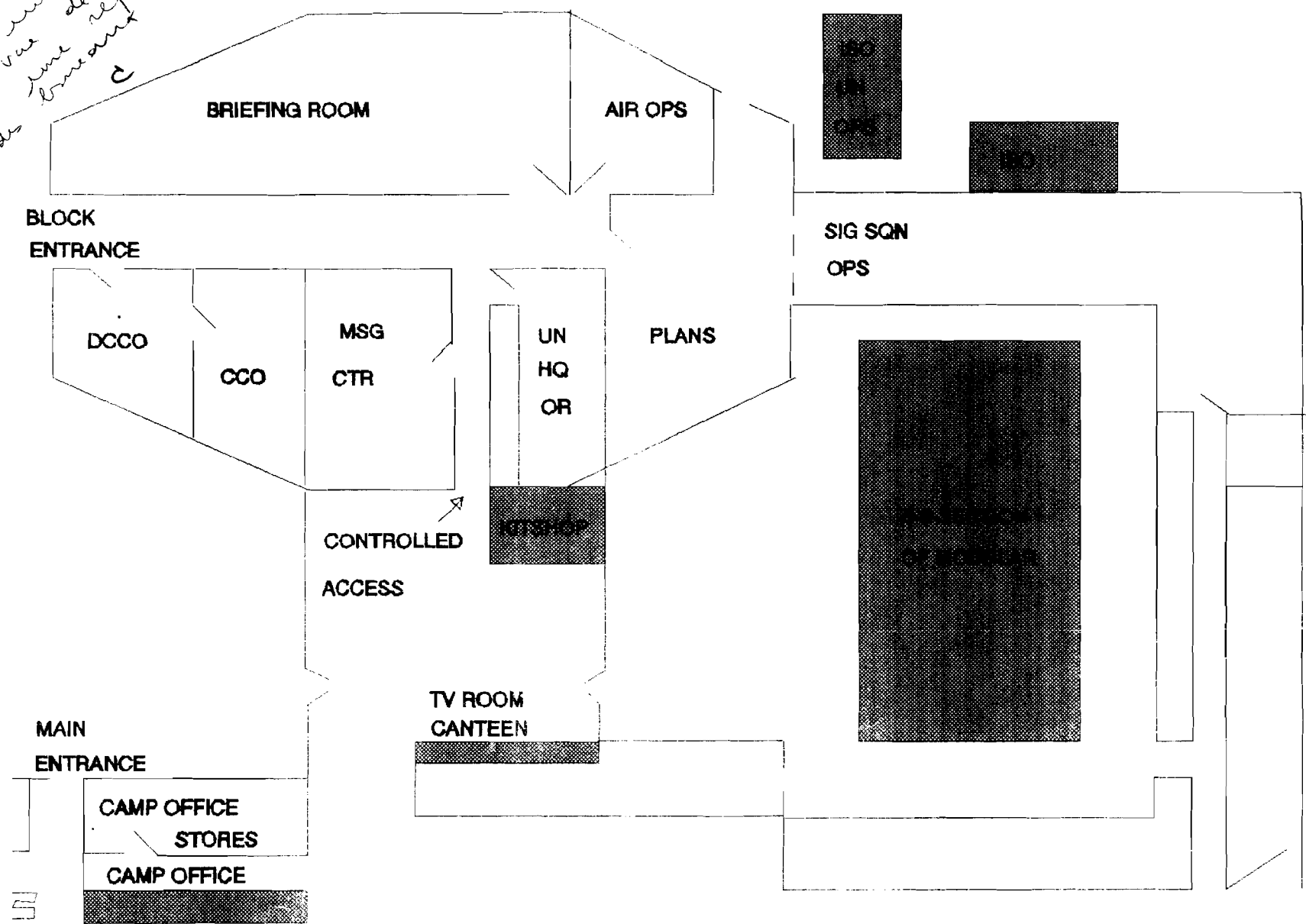

**SUBJECT:** PROCEDURES FOR TASKING AND OPERATION OF SECOND LINE ROAD TRANSPORT

Introduction.

1. Second line road transport within UNAMIR II is a scarce resource, as it is in all operations. To enable the most effective and economical use of Second Line road transport it must be managed intensively. The result of this intensive management will be prioritisation and consolidation of tasks, improved lift capacity, more timely satisfaction of transport requests, and an overall improved service from the second line vehicle fleet.

Aim

2. The aim of this instruction is to describe the procedures for requesting and tasking UNAMIR II second line road transport resources.

General

3. First Line road transport is organic unit transport, available for tasking by units as they see fit. Second line road transport is controlled by the SO Tpt HQ UNAMIR II and provides the capability to lift bulk loads and formed bodies of troops within the UNAMIR II area of operations. Second Line transport support is allocated in accordance with priorities set by HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops staff. Third Line road transport will not be discussed in this instruction.

4. The following forms will be used to enable management of the Second Line road transport asset:


a. Transport Task Request. Transport Task Requests are to be submitted, direct to the SO Tpt, by UNAMIR II military or civilian staff requiring transport support beyond the capability of their own First Line road transport. Effective immediately, requests for Second Line road transport support will only be accepted on a Transport Task Request form. An example Transport Task Request form is at Annex A. The example Transport Task Request should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. Requests should be submitted not less than 48 hours in advance of the task. The SO Tpt will prioritise the Transport Task Requests and consolidate tasks. Requests should include, in the remarks column, a point of contact at both the pick up point and delivery point where possible. Advice will be provided, within 24 hours, as to whether the Transport Task Request has been approved. If the

request cannot be approved (for example, due to a lack of transport resources) an attempt will be made to make alternative arrangements. Alternatives may include providing transport on another day, or exploring other sources of transport support (for example, air transport).

- b. Task Vehicle Availability. Units providing Second Line road transport are to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms, not later than 0900 hours daily, direct to the SO Tpt. Units required to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms will be advised by the SO Tpt. An example Task Vehicle Availability form is at Annex B. The example Task Vehicle Availability should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. By consolidating the Task Vehicle Availability Forms the SO Tpt will be able to determine how much transport resource is available daily to satisfy Transport Task Requests, submitted in accordance with sub-paragraph a. above.
- c. Transport Task Orders. On the basis of Task Requests, as advised in sub-paragraph a. above and, vehicle availability, as advised in sub-paragraph b. above, the SO Tpt will consolidate and assign tasks to Second Line road transport. Transport Task Orders are the sole authority to task UNAMIR II Second Line road transport. An example Transport Task Order is at Annex C. Transport Task Orders can only be authorised by staff of the HQ UNAMIR II Log Coord Cell. Copies of Task orders will be provided to both the unit assigned the task and to HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops.

Conclusion

5. The Second Line road transport management system described will come into effect upon receipt of this instruction. As a result, it is anticipated that over the coming months the ability of the UNAMIR Second Line road transport organisation to respond to force requirements will be greatly enhanced. The cooperation of UNAMIR civilian and military staff in this endeavour will serve to accelerate this process of improvement.



GENERAL OPERATION ORDER

I SITUATION:

Since signature of ARUSHA agreements on 4 th of august 1993 between government of Republic of RWANDA and FPR, war fare stopped. Ceasefire is respected by the two parties under United Nations observance, (UNAMIR). Meanwhile, a permanent insecurity climate prevails in the whole country and particularly in Kigali the great town. This insecurity appears on using by civilian people of war weapons, grenades and other guns unlawfully held by them.

II MISSION:

1) General missions:

UNAMIR police operations are led through CIVPOL which is one of her components. Mission of CIVPOL within UNAMIR is to contribute to reestablishment and maintenance of security in collaboration with Rwanda Police and Gendarmerie. According to Kigali town, PMT Kigali Police and Gendarmerie have in charge to check, to assist and to advise POLICE and GENDARMERIE staffs.

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- after each withdrawing a critical meeting should be immediately held by the responsables and sanctioned by a written report intended to Gd. and CIVPOL through official channels.
- a training is necessary in the unities before operations beginning.

Chaque poste de contrôle devrait être occupé par deux moniteurs de police (PM). Ceux-ci devraient observer, contrôler et assister l'action de la GdN. **A DECREE N°12/79 OF 7TH MAY 1979 PERTAINING TO FIREARMS AND THEIR MUNITIONS**

I, Habyarimana Juvenal the President of the Republic of Rwanda, Seeing the Constitution especially in its 64th, and 69th articles of lot (1), and reviewing the 21st November 1964 Decree pertaining to firearms, I decree the following on the request of our Internal Affairs Minister, Defence Minister and upon the National Assembly suggestion of 2nd March 1979 and 20th April 1979.

**By the following Contents of the decree we understand;**

- Powerful Firearms: All sorts of Firearms breech loaded whether used for hunting or for self defense
  - Poisonous firearms: Firearms releasing bullets with sparks.
  - A general store: A store agreed by the administration where firearms are centralised by the transporter in order to be sent to authorised retailers.
  - A Public Warehouse : A Premise granted by the government and submitted under the Customs for storing any goods provided the owner pays the required dues.
  - Munitions of Powerful firearms: All munitions of breech loaded weapons.
  - Munitions for poisonous Firearms: Powder and all chemical components which make bullets produce sparks.
  - Special warehousing regulations: Regulations respected in order to deposit goods in the public warehouse, regarding goods security and warehousing dues.
2. The importation, lending, granting, selling, dumping, owning, carrying, deposition and transportation from the public warehouse of firearms, their spare parts and munitions should be authorised by the Minister of Defense. Apart from this Decree 's stipulations steps to procure the authorisation are described by the Presidential decree.
3. No body is entitled to own weapons destined to military if he does not carry out military functions approved by his profession. But the Defense Minister can abolish such a regulation if he finds it necessary to take special measures depending on circumstances such as safeguarding people and defending the territory.
4. Apart from the military, a written authorisation is required in order to own firearms in whatever circumstance.
- No one is allowed to carry a firearm other than a soldier except when he is entitled by a written firearm licence.
5. The Minister of Defense may at any time order the registration of all Firearms and all types of munitions destined for trade and personal property. He may inquire for a certification concerning respect of article 9 stipulations. The penalty for disrespect to this decree is stipulated in article 13.
6. Any body having a licence to own or carry a firearm may be called upon by authorised personnel to investigate whether he has the firearm or firearms mentioned in the licence, if he does not have it so, the penalty stipulated in the article 13 is applied.
7. Transiting firearms and munitions into the Republic of Rwanda requires an authorisation issued by the government where the

weapons will be used. Names of Administrators and other personalities who will use the weapons should be mentioned on the authorisation. The Minister of Defense may stop the transit in special circumstances and on temporally terms if he fears that it may put in question the Republic security.

8. The Minister of Defense may determine regions where the traffic importation, keeping, and carrying of firearms and munitions are forbidden if circumstances or territorial intelligence network requires so.

9. An authorisation to own or carry a firearm is issued to an individual personally;

If he shows convincingly that he will not offer, lend, or sell illegally the granted firearm.

If he is a traveller holding an authorisation from his country proving that the firearm and munitions will be used personally.

10. A licence to own or carry a firearm is renewed annually. It is issued after corresponding dues are paid.

The fee is 1000 Rwanda Francs per firearm of any type. The fee is 200 Francs per firearm held as a sample or still in the process of manufacturing.

For poisonous firearms the fee is 500 Francs per firearm. Apart from the case mentioned in article 12 no dues can be refunded if any body holding an authorisation to own or carry a firearm gets another one to sell, grant, or dump firearms in the same year.

10. People holding a licence to trade in firearms and munitions personally or for some body else pay dues fixed by the Presidential decree as follows; A licence to sell poisonous firearms and their munitions at 2500 to 50000 Francs.

A licence to sell powerful firearms and munitions at 4000 up to 50000 Francs. There is no change in dues whether you trade in both firearms and munitions or one of the two.

A licence to trade in firearms expires on 31st December of the year in question, if it was issued during the first 6 months dues are calculated for the whole year but if it was issued in the later half of the year dues are half way.

No dues can be refunded if the licence holder stops dealing in firearms before his licence expires.

12. The licence to own a firearm, trade in, or carry it can be deprived from the owner if he uses it illegally. Or if social security is put in question. Dues corresponding to the remaining period can be refunded in that case. The authority keeps such a firearms and munitions. The dues refunded are calculated on the exact number of months remaining. The Minister of Defense is the only person entitled to withdraw firearm licences.

13. Whoever will do contrary to this Decree and lend, own, transport, trade, grant and dump firearms or munitions will be sentenced to a penalty of 7 days to one year imprisonment and a fine of 5000 to 50.000 Francs or one of the two.

Whoever trades in firearms or munitions in a war zone must be imprisoned he may be sentenced to a penalty prolonged to 10 years' imprisonment.

Special confiscation of firearms and munitions can be authorised by the court.



No body should keep, make, repair, exhibit, offer, transport, store, or import prohibited firearms.

15. Prohibited firearms are; Stick shaped ones, folded ones, separable ones, poisonous and all silenced ones. With respect to this Decree, whatever may be fixed to any firearm rendering it to be counted among the above mentioned ones is forbidden.

16. The above mentioned does not apply to government troops firearms. Whoever will do contrary to the stipulations in article 14, will be sentenced to a penalty of not more than one year and a fine not exceeding 15000 Francs or one of the two.

17. Shooting and carrying loaded firearms in suburbs or near inhabited areas is forbidden except for military trainees or while protecting the population.

18. Whoever will do contrary to the stipulations in article 17, will be sentenced to a penalty of 15 days up to 30 days of imprisonment and a fine of not more than 2.500 Francs or one of the two.

19. The 21st November 1964' Decree concerning firearms is abolished.

20. This Decree will be in effect a months after it have been anounced in the Official Gazette.

CIVPOL has to arrange check-points together with the GendNat. The target will be to seize illegally weapons.

How should the check-points be established:

Every check-point has to be manned by a minimum of 2 PM. PM have only to monitor the action and instruct the officers of GendNat how to establish a check-point and how to manage the search under consideration of personal security for the police officers.

A check-point should not be established more than 3 hours. The locality of check-points should be lightened during darkness.

The different check-points should be established for a limited area.

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For security reasons the check-points have to be accompanied by UNAMIR-Military. Arrangements with Military are acquired.

GendNat has to stop all vehicles and persons passing a check-point and start a search for weapons. No house search without a search warrant by local criminal proceeding.

Time and place of check-points must be changed every day and the dates have to be secret as long as possible before taking action.

The seizure of weapons has to be managed by GendNat. CPMT has to report about the check-points and seizure of weapons in the Daily SITREP.






