Dear Mr. Harlan:

Your letter requesting information concerning adoption of a European war orphan was referred to me for reply.

In view of the fact that UNRRA is an international organization and our responsibility is limited to that of temporary care for displaced persons, it is not possible for us to make specific arrangements with individual citizens of any particular country for the care of children.

In accordance with our agreement with the Children's Bureau, U. S. Department of Labor, Washington, D. C., I am referring your letter to that agency. The Children's Bureau is the official National Agency particularly concerned with this matter and is in touch with the appropriate agencies and authorities in the United States concerned with planning for the care of any children who might be admitted to the United States on a permanent basis. You may be certain that the Children's Bureau will place your inquiry in the appropriate channels and meanwhile you may communicate with them directly for more specific information.

Dear Mr. Stigler:

I greatly appreciate your interest in bringing to our attention, by your letter of 19 February 1946, the existence of agricultural surpluses located in your District.

Unfortunately, in this instance, it will not be possible to consider the possibility of purchasing the commodities available. UNRRA is not supplying items such as canned turnips, mustard and kale greens, as each of the countries receiving assistance are presumed to be able to produce for themselves adequate quantities of such types of food. Since each country produces its own green foods and because of the comparative per pound cost of various food items, UNRRA is attempting to concentrate on the lower cost unprocessed foods, such as grains and dry peas and beans.

I regret that it is not possible to be of assistance in your efforts to help dispose of the surplus canned greens that are available in your District. However, I am sure that you will appreciate that it would be unwise for UNRRA to spend money for foods that can be grown in sufficient quantities within the countries receiving assistance.
