1. Yesterday, 30 Sep 1994, the DFC and his delegation visited Mungaga refugee camp in Goma. The population of Mungaga camp is estimated to be 200,000, including an undetermined number of RGF soldiers and their families. The RGF commanders were not present in the camp at the time of the DFC's visit. However, the delegation did meet with the young men who are acting as the Prefects of the camp.

The delegation held discussions with the Prefects lasting about two and a half to three hours. Issues discussed related to the general security of refugees in the camp and the possibility of repatriation to Rwanda. The Prefects informed the delegation of the following:

- a. They do not want the RGF soldiers in the camp to be separated from the civilians;
- b. If there is any repatriation, both civilians and soldiers should be repatriated together;
- c. Schools have been opened in the camp;
- d. A Security Commission, comprising the young men in the camp, has been set up to protect the inmates.

3. The Prefects also told the delegation that the refugees would remain in Zaire until the situation in Rwanda changes. They stressed that the RPF is an invading force and therefore expects the international community to take care of it. UNAMIR in general, and Gen Dallaire in particular, were held responsible for the overthrow of the former legitimate Rwandan Government. UNAMIR was branded as being pro RPF. The Prefects further requested that the UN place an embargo on the present BBGNU in Rwanda and pursue the Arusha Agreement. The delegation, in response to this request, reminded the Prefects that, despite the existence previously of the Arusha Agreement, the Civil War had still broken out. They questioned whether the terms of the Arusha Agreement would now be viable for and be acceptable to all factions.

KIBEHO/NDAGO AND SURROUNDING AREAS

INTRODUCTION

1. This assessment is based on 60 plus incidents reported since early Sept '94. It is provided in order to assist planning of operations in the areas of Kibeho GR 5007 and Ndago GR 5201.
2. The area of sector 4A which includes Kibeho and Ndago and the communes of Butare Prefecture to the East have been of particular intelligence interest for some time now. There have been numerous reports of Threat Forces (Former RGF, Interahamwe and bandit elements) from the DP camps committing murders and attacks both within the camp confines and in the surrounding areas. There have also been a significant number of incidents involving RPA troops in this region.
3. This report covers :-
 - a. political aspects
 - a. incidents involving the RPA,
 - b. incidents involving Threat Forces,
 - c. incidents involving refugees.
 - d. deductions and
 - e. assessment.

POLITICAL ASPECTS

4. Since late September the Prefect of Gikongoro and RPA commanders have conducted a number of discussions and public rallies with camp leaders and inhabitants of both Kibeho and Ndago camps in attempts to persuade the people to return home. On 24 Nov the DP's complained to the Prefect that when they return home they find their houses occupied or destroyed and that some returnees are arrested by the RPA.
5. In mid Nov the NGO's in both Kibeho and Ndago ceased operations in the camps for a 48 hr period due to the increase in tension. Britcon and Ausmed ceased their contribution to the humanitarian effort in the two camps at around the same time.

INCIDENTS INVOLVING THE RPA

6. On 1 Nov locals in Ndago informed Malawi troops of an incident which occurred in Ruko GR 5200 in which the RPA had killed 6 people and absconded with a mother and two children. All

those killed/injured/kidnapped were said to be related to a known militia leader during the war. This incident led to the movement of DP's from Ndago to Kibeho and the comment from DP's that they would not return home as long as the RPA were in power.

7. A number of reports have been received of RPA harassment in the Runyinya commune GR 6012 and the Cyafurwe area GR 5317. The bulk of the reports suggest that robbery by the RPA was the motive and the RPA camps at Ramba GR 5414 and Mbasa GR 5410 are reportedly where the soldiers responsible come from. Local Tutsi's in Ramba are said to act as guides for the RPA in their collection of cattle and other possessions.

8. The RPA have denied access to UNAMIR troops on a number of occasions in the Runyinya area. They insisted that a newly deployed Malawi Pl move to a different location in the commune on 12 Nov. Large numbers of refugees have reportedly returned to refugee camps from the Runyinya commune.

INCIDENTS INVOLVING THREAT FORCES

9. On the night of 20 Oct 94 11 people were murdered in their homes in Gasasa GR 556125 in the Runyinya commune. Locals claimed that the attackers were Interahamwe who had come from refugee camps in the area of Rwamiko GR 4913. Locals also claimed that there had been a number of attacks in that area in the past week with a number of locals being killed.

10. A murder took place on Ni 4/5 Nov in Karama in the Runyinya commune. Three women were killed, one seriously injured and a male slightly injured. The burgemeister suspected that the assailants came from the refugee camps in the Rwamiko area, and that they were killing witnesses to atrocities which took place during the war.

11. On 14 Nov Ghanbat reported finding 2 grenades in the house of a suspected bandit at Runyinya. The bandit escaped.

12. Malawi Coy reported that two elderly women of around 70 years were macheted to death and two young boys severely beaten on 14 Nov in Mpanda GR 5607. The assailants were reportedly from the Kibeho camp.

13. The RPA reported to Malawi Coy on 15 Nov that they had arrested 7 people in Runyinya who were from Kibeho and had been recognised by locals as killers during the war. One of them was shot dead by the RPA as he tried to escape.

14. OC Malawi Coy and Sector 3 Comd visited the Burgermeister of Runyinya on 19 Nov. The Burgemeister stated that the Interahamwe were stopping refugees in Kibeho camp from returning to their homes. He claimed that after people had returned to their communes the Interahamwe followed them up and killed them. He further stated that there were 96 Interahamwe operating in the area led by one GATIBITA Thomas and they had access to military uniforms and grenades. He reportedly has followers in Ndago GR 5101, Munini GR 4800, Kibeho and Rwamiko GR 4813 camps.

15. Ghanbat conducted a cordon and search in the Kibeho camp on 20 Nov and found three hand grenades.

16. Sector 3 HQ reported that eight people had been killed and four injured in Ramba GR 5414 on 21 Nov. No further detail.

INCIDENTS INVOLVING REFUGEES

16. A number of reports have been received of people returning to both Kibeho and Ndago camps after being resettled in their home communes. The most common reason given has been harassment/killings by the RPA. A large proportion of returnees have reportedly come from the Butare Prefecture, including the Runyinya commune.

17. Malawi Coy reported on 22 Nov that two persons, NGOMA MBIRUTI and ROWABA LINDA often visited the village of Ramba GR 5414 and threatened the locals that they would be killed if they did not return to the refugee camps.

18. During Op Homeward there has been a number of incidents of intimidation by elements within the camps as refugees were being loaded for repatriation. Threats were made that DP's would be killed by the RPA on their return and that families of DP's left behind in the camp would also be killed. This activity often led to the large numbers of people registered by UNHCR for a move, reducing drastically during the 24 hrs between registration and uplift.

19. One particular agitator reported by Britcon was seen in both Ndago and Kibeho on consecutive days during loading. He was described as about 25 years old and wearing a distinctive green felt cowboy style hat.

DEDUCTIONS

20. The Prefects and RPA commanders have attempted to persuade DP's to return to their home communes. This effort appears to have had a negligible effect.

21. RPA activity has done little to create the necessary environment required to entice refugees home. Whether the reports of such activities are true or the result of a successful propaganda campaign by Threat Force elements is irrelevant; if the reports reach the refugees they have the same effect.

22. Threat Force activity both inside and outside the camps is resulting in the instability desired by those forces. It is possible that some of the activity attributed to the RPA has in fact been conducted by armed Threat elements wearing military style uniforms.

23. The Threat Forces currently enjoy sanctuary within the camps and are well placed to maintain, through propaganda, both a high level of support for the former government and continued campaigns against the current one.

24. The numbers of Threat Forces and their supporters within the camps is likely to be significant. This is particularly so given that a large proportion of DP's are guilty of some form of

crime committed during the war and there has to date been no policy statement from the government to explain how it intends to bring to justice those it considers guilty.

25. The numbers of reports of armed attacks outside the camps, possibly by Threat Force elements, suggest that they have access to weapons. Quantities are unknown but they are likely to be restricted to small arms and hand grenades. *Para 15, 16, 18,*

26. There may be some level of coordination between Threat Force elements in Kibeho, Ndago and other camps in the area.

ASSESSMENT

27. A search of any refugee camp is unlikely to be productive if the Threat Forces are forewarned.

28. Following any searches of camps the Threat Force propaganda machine will swing into action and the threat to UNAMIR forces will increase significantly. This is likely to occur whether Threat Force elements are removed at the time or not.

25/11/95 29. If attempts are made to arrest Threat Force elements during a search of the camps, particularly in the presence of RPA troops, those elements are likely to resist with whatever force and weaponry they have available. This is likely to include firing on UNAMIR troops.

30. The Threat to UNAMIR troops following a joint operation with the RPA could be reduced if a well planned and implemented Psyops campaign was conducted prior to the operation.

Subject: REINFORCEMENT OF FC's
GUIDANCE TO SECTOR COMDS

1. In view of recent incidents in MUSANGE and MUSEBEYA, FC is concerned about UNAMIR's ability to provide protection to DPs and NGOs.
2. It is critical that we protect DPs from forcible ejection, protect NGOs to prevent their withdrawal, prevent clashes where and when ever possible between RPA and DPs, as well as avert confrontation between RPA and UNAMIR. Accordingly, Sector Commanders should review their contingency plans and conduct rehearsals to ensure quick dispatch of Rapid Reaction Force/Reinforcements to trouble spots throughout the sector. The response must be speedy and forceful.
3. Additionally, Sector Commanders should ensure that they are aware of all NGOs operating within their sectors and are to ensure that they have a dedicated, reliable means of communication with NGOs which may imply exchange of frequencies, or co-location as well as ensuring that there is a clear chain of command with the camps for security which, is known to the NGOs.
4. It is also suggested that frequent meetings between UNAMIR and NGOs within camps and sectors be undertaken to co-ordinate security/protection within the camps. As well, it is also imperative that meetings between UNAMIR and RPA Commanders within the sectors be conducted frequently to diffuse situations before they occur and to co-ordinate RPA security concerns with our activities.
5. If possible, fore warning should be obtained from the RPA if they are contemplating and continuing the forceful removal of DPs within the camps so that security for DPs, UNAMIR personnel and NGOs can be planned.

Incident as of 11350b 94. (10) RPA soldier from Kaduha base gr 4724, drove to Musebeya gr 3933. On routine patrol their vehicle was surrounded at the market by locals who threw stones and grenades at RPA. To extricate themselves RPA fired in air, it didn't taunt them, they became more aggressive on the alternative platoon through grenades and fired shots in the air. Our own troops disarmed and provide protection to all RPA soldiers. Casualty toll locals at 7 dead, 13 seriously injured. Casualties are likely to be higher those hit kept running and are not accounted for. All casualties to Kigeme hospital gr 4725. RPA soldiers were escorted by own troops back to Kaduha. The NGO organization called feed the children was distributing items at market but suffered no casualties.

Report on the IDPs movement from Chanika camp to Kigali of the 07/11/94.

This morning exercise was supposed to be a joint operation between IOM, UNHCR and UNAMIR, to evacuate No. 786 IDPs from the Chianika camp to Kibungo with overnight in Kigali. The agreement was :

- departure scheduled from Butare at 06.30 (IOM trucks);
- meeting point at Gikongoro at 07.30 (UNAMIR escorts and HCR for registration).
- confirmation by UNHCR personnel of the registered people;
- loading and departure to destination.

Today' s situation in Chanika camp has been:

- IOM arrived in Gikongoro with a fleet of No. 9 trucks at 07.15, no escort was present at the meeting point and the UNHCR field assistants showed up on time and escorted the convoy to Chanika camp.
- It took more than one hour to load two trucks, total 90 people.
- Two MILOBS finally showed up at 8:30, and escorted at 9:00 the first two trucks to Kisi.
- At 09:30 three Zambian officers arrived and were informed by us on the need for additional soldiers due to increase in agitators around the loading site; at this point, the three officers left the site to look for help, leaving us in the middle of a potentially explosive situation.

At 10:00 four officers (Zambia) finally arrived, by then, the agitators in the crowd had started to act in a provocative manner and they continued to do so towards UNAMIR. According to the OIM and HCR staff present, the UNAMIR people answered back, imitating the gesture of "cutting throat". The crowd immediately took advantage of the situation and started to shout, saying that the IDPs who had already been loaded in the third truck were going to be killed after their departure. At this point, the situation went out of control and the UNAMIR soldiers were completely overwhelmed and started backtracking towards their cars while the IDPs, excited by the crowd, got down from the third truck. The crowd at this point had become violent and threatening. The convoy had to leave in a hurry with people throwing stones to the departing convoy.

This incident showed that the non French speaking UNAMIR officers had not been briefed, had no team leader and were not in sufficient number.

There is also a strong need for at least one UNHCR supervisor during the loading operation.

D'autre part l'expatrié est menacé verbalement.

Contact de l'expatrié 17 H 40 demande une escorte pour rentrer sur Gikongoro voyant que la population local est agitée et que la clôture de la distribution en serait retardée.

Consigne de la base AICF: attendre une intervention de l'UNAMIR sachant qu'il est difficile de sortir du lieu de distribution sans traverser la masse de population.

- 17 heures 45 minutes:

Un membre de l'AICF se rend à l'UNREO et part immédiatement avec un de ses membres au Q.G. des observateurs militaires de l'ONU.

- 17 heures 50 minutes: Rencontre avec le major Racine qui avertie les troupes Ghanéenne et nous avertis du lieu de rendez vous: check point UN sortie de Gikongoro direction Butaré.

- 18 heures 15 minutes : toujours aucune nouvelle de l'escorte.

- 18 heures 25 minutes : nous quittons le check-point pour se rendre à la base UNAMIR de Gikongoro.

Rencontre avec un officier de liaison qui nous avertie que l'escorte est sur le point de départ et que le lieu de rendez vous est bien le check-point.

Retour au check-point et attente .

- 18 heures 40 minutes : arrivée de l'escorte une voiture avec 5 soldats.

Explication du lieu où nous devons nous rendre sachant qu'ils ne connaissent pas la route de KIZI.

- 19 heures: les soldats veulent se déplacer avec un véhicule blindé comme protection (mais pas de chauffeur...) et veulent repartir sur leur base chercher un chauffeur.

Après 15 minutes de discussion ils se décident de quitter le check point sans blindé mais accompagné d'un véhicule AICF qui ouvre la route.

- 19 heures 15 environs, appelle d'Axelle, la situation se calme et la population se disperse, vu la lenteur de déplacement de la MINUAR, elle propose que nous nous retrouvions sur la piste.

- Vers 19 heures 30, arrivée à l'embranchement de la piste nous quittons la route et nous nous engageons sur la piste, à ce moment, la MINUAR refuse de s'engager dessus estimant qu'ils ne sont pas suffisamment protégés.

5 minutes après nous apercevons les feux des deux voitures AICF. Axelle arrive et nous pouvons repartir sur Gikongoro.

20 heures, nous avons amené le garde se faire soigner à la base de la MINUAR (points de suture à la tête et à la main). Nous avons alors pu remarquer que ce soir là une grande fête était organisée dans la base de la MINUAR.

SUBJECT : PERSISTENT INDISCIPLINE BY UNAMIR PERSONNEL

Ref. my previous reports of gross indiscipline by UNAMIR personnel and drivers; I would like to recall some of the most serious and recent incidents:

1. On 13th October 1994, UNAMIR Soldiers driving in convoy refused to stop at an RPA Check Point (GR.C96 95) and threatened to use their weapons.

2. On 16th October 1994, a vehicle Reg. N°. 49762 driven by the Australian medical team knocked down an RPA Soldier one Sgt BIZIMUNGU; the soldier sustained a fractured femur. They simply drove off ignoring the advice of our soldiers at the scene to call the Gendarmerie and record their statements.

3. On 25th October 1994, in Commune TABA, Secteur Kamonyi one Mr. BYUMA Amos (52) was knocked and killed on spot by a Zambian soldier driving in convoy from Gitarama to Kigali. They did not even stop to see what damage they had caused.

4. On numerous occasions your truck drivers have deliberately driven into VIP motorcades with near fatal consequences; this has continued despite constant reminders that this kind of action is definitely very dangerous.

5. On the night of 31st October 1994 A UNAMIR APC commanded by a Lt. refused to stop at an RPA Check-Point (GR.D 1281) and stopped only after being intercepted by our own troops. In the first place the mission of the APC is unclear so far and besides we have always explained to you that the APCs are responsible for destruction of our roads which are already in poor condition in some areas.

As a result the Ministry of Defence has asked me to inform you that the APCs may not be driven on our roads unless clear permission is sought in advance and your drivers should show respect for the Rwandese people and the National laws.



SIGNIFICANT INCIDENT REPORT

1. BRITCON have established an R&R base in the Queen Elizabeth's national park in UGANDA. As a result of a recce to the Park on 12 Oct 94, it was planned to get groups of 20 BRITCON personnel away once every 3 days for approximately 36 hours. The programme started on 16 Oct 94 and is expected to go on until 10 Nov 94 and so enable maximum participation before BRITCON depart theatre. Until 31 Oct 94, each group was able to cross the border without incident.
2. On 31 Oct 94, whilst on a change over day, a BRITCON vehicle had difficulties crossing into UGANDA at the GATUNA crossing point. The young officer in charge of the group was led to believe that he needed a special pass to enter UGANDA and was led to the local authorities in KABALE to confirm this. When it became apparent that he was not going to be allowed to complete the journey to the National Park, the group returned to KIGALI.
3. On 1 Nov 94, Maj Duncan was despatched to the border to investigate this problem which appears to have sprung up over night. It now appears that all UNAMIR personnel are experiencing the same problem at the border. On further investigation, it appears that this problem may have occurred as a result of the initial incident involving BRITCON troops yesterday.
3. COMBRITCON has instigated a full investigation into the matter to ensure that other UNAMIR troops are not penalised if it proves that the problem was caused by BRITCON; UNAMIR will be fully briefed on the outcome of the incident once it is known. It should be noted that the problem at the border is now resolved and BRITCON personnel will continue to go on R&R in UGANDA.





SUBJECT: Responsibilities of the Receiving and Inspection Unit



A receiving and inspection unit is to be established in all UN missions. This unit is the focal point for the receipt of all incoming shipment. It is responsible for receiving, inspecting, and certifying acceptance or rejection of all items purchased for the mission. In particular it will ensure that specifications have been met regarding quality, quantity, delivery date and any special instruction given to the vendor. The unit is also responsible for maintaining records of all incoming shipments and for promptly notifying EDP, Transport, Communications and PCIU that items of their areas of competence have arrived.

On the arrival of a shipment the RIR Unit will:

- 1 - Receive and inspect all UNAMIR shipped items;
- 2 - certify the acceptance of the items if their quality, quantity, specifications and date of delivery are in conformity with the purchase order, or in case of transfer from other missions, with the PT107 (herewith attached); and fill the Receiving and Inspection Report (PT 31, copy attached) ;
- 3 - inform immediately the respective units, in the case of EDP, BMS, Communications and Transport products as well as PCIU for general services category of items; it will be the responsibility of these units to certify the acceptance or rejection of the goods; the receiving and inspection unit will ensure that these units prepare all the relevant Receiving and Inspection Reports (or Discrepancy Reports); the RIR could be used in both cases, as a formal Discrepancy Report Form already designed does not exist;

4 - if the quality, quantity, specifications or the delivery date are not conform with the purchase order the unit may reject the products. The receiving and inspection unit will prepare a Discrepancy Report, which might be the same as the Receiving and Inspection Report, in 5 copies, explaining the reasons for the rejection and communicate it the Chief Procurement Officer for further action.

The RIR is the basic document for the settlement of the bills for all local purchases and for claims against the vendor, if necessary.

Considering the importance of the work of the RI unit, all concerned are invited to cooperate in order to facilitate it in the performance of its task.

The Special Representative of the Secretary General has just approved the creation of an UNAMIR Recreation and Welfare Club to be implemented immediately.

The purpose of the Club is to promote and maintain the highest possible level of morale and welfare among UN staff by providing suitable facilities for outdoor sports, indoor games, a reading room, a video library, swimming facilities, facilities for send-off parties and "happy hours", means for going on hikes, picnics, and carrying out other activities which will enhance the staff members' leisure hours.

The Constitution of the Club calls for elections for members of the Welfare Club Committee. However, for the time being, in view of the urgent need to establish the Club, the Special Representative has authorized the launching of Club activities through a ad hoc volunteer committee made up of two persons each from the following:

Civilian Component
Military Component
UN Agencies (Coordinated by UNDP)
Representatives at large

We shall ensure that the ad hoc volunteer committee has broad geographical and cultural representation, as well as senior, middle and junior ranks of officers and personnel. The office of the OIC Administration shall be responsible for the final selection of the ad hoc committee.

Accordingly, volunteers should express their interest through their respective Heads of Branches/Sections/Organizations. The Heads of Branches/Sections/Organizations will in turn submit the names of volunteers to Mr. Mtshana M. Ncube, Administrative/Legal Officer, Room 3045, Tel. Ext. 11099, Amahoro Hotel, UNAMIR Headquarters, no later than 26 October 1994.

In the meantime the Constitution of the Recreation and Welfare Club will be circulated.

Regarding the clarification sought in your response to OIC/Administrative Circular No.007/94, please note that the information contained in the Attachment to that Circular were abbreviated versions of the provisions of the Status of Mission Agreement.

The full text of the provision on the wearing of uniforms - Article VI, paragraph 37 - answers your questions as follows:

"37. Military members and the United Nations Civilian Police of UNAMIR shall wear, while performing official duties, the national military or police uniform of their respective States with standard United Nations accoutrements. United Nations Security Officers and Field Service Officers may wear the United Nations uniform. The wearing of civilian dress by the above-mentioned members of UNAMIR may be authorized by the Special Representative at other times. Military members and civilian police of UNAMIR and United Nations Security Officers designated by the Special Representative may possess and carry arms while on duty in accordance with their orders".

On all other points, formal requests were made by the SRSG to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, on 5 October and 11 October 1994, for appropriate instructions to be issued to all Government agencies regarding implementation of the Mission Status Agreement. Follow-up is currently being organized after responses to the above circular were received.

DISCIPLINE - CAR PARKING OUTSIDE SECURE LOCATIONS

A. 2000.1/CMPO\DISC dated 17 Oct 94.

1. Further to Reference A, it has been brought to my attention that United Nations Field Operations Manual Chapter 12 makes provision for the driver to be held financially responsible in the event of loss or damage of a vehicle.

2. In the case of accidents which occur while the vehicle is being used for official travel, the driver will normally only be held responsible as a result of gross negligence on his part and the liability will not normally exceed 50% of the value of the vehicle or, in the case of an accident, 50% of the cost of repair.

3. When the vehicle is being used for non-official travel - liberty journeys - the situation is viewed more seriously. The driver is held financially responsible for any loss arising as a result of his negligence - whether gross or not. Assessments may be up to the full cost of replacing the vehicle or, in the case of an accident, the full cost of repair.

4. In the context covered by Reference A, it would be difficult to consider a social visit to a night club to be official travel. Personnel should be warned that, in the event of the loss of a vehicle, they may be held personally financially liable for that loss, to the full replacement value of the vehicle.

5. DFC/COS has remarked that individuals might take greater care of UN vehicles if they had paid for those vehicles themselves.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS POLICY OBJECTIVE

Sam
17/10

1. The objective of public affairs (PA) activity is to cultivate the attention and support of the media by promoting the credibility of the United Nations Assistance Mission in Rwanda (UNAMIR) and through that support, gain an understanding and backing of the general public towards the mission. Accordingly, the PA Programme will highlight the role, capabilities, conduct and activities of UNAMIR's military Contingents and Peacekeepers within the framework of the mission.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS STRATEGY

1. Approach. The PA approach in achieving the policy objective will be twofold:

- a. to provide maximum information on the role, capabilities, conduct and activities of UNAMIR to the international public, through journalists, consistent with operational security parameters and the requirement for appropriate disclosure in the release of personnel information; and
- b. to promote the activities of the military units and individual peacekeepers to the greatest extent possible.

2. In short, PA activity will attempt to be as open and proactive as possible without breaching operational imperatives.

3. PA Responsibilities. In-theatre Public Affairs Officer (PAffO) will be responsible for the following functions:

- a. advising the Comd and senior staff on all aspect relevant to PA;
- b. exploiting all opportunities to highlight and promote UNAMIR activities;
- c. responding to media queries from international and local media, in that order;
- d. staffing and coordinating sponsored media visits in-theatre if deemed necessary, and supporting non-sponsored

- e. liaising with Contingent PAffOs (Annex B), RPA PAffOs and other PA organisations as required;
- f. arranging news conferences and technical briefing as and if required;
- g. preparing and distributing news releases, backgrounders, fact sheets and other documentation when required;
- h. providing media training when required.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS IMPLEMENTATION

1. Messages. A number of messages/themes will underline all media opportunities taken to highlight the role, capability, conduct and activities of UNAMIR. They are the following.

- a. that UNAMIR's military contingents are an integral part of the mission and an essential part of the peace process in Rwanda;
- b. that UNAMIR's humanitarian activities are pro-active and aimed at helping the present government at eliminating human suffering by organising and dispatching voluntary work parties where most required;
- c. that UNAMIR have the resources and personnel necessary to capably carry out the mission; and
- d. that UNAMIR carry out the mission despite the challenges and constraints;

PUBLIC AFFAIRS CRISIS MANAGEMENT PLAN

1. Management of information during a crisis is of prime importance and can greatly damage the reputation of the UN if not handled properly. The following procedure will be followed in case of a sudden and/or unexpected amount of media attention due to either a negative or positive incident.

- a. the Force Public Affairs Officer, Capt Grenier, will be informed immediately following any/all incidents that have a remote chance of creating media attention;
- b. no statements will be issued until the Force PAffO has been given a chance to assess the situation and

formulate a recommendation to the Force Commander;

c. the front gate sentries will be responsible, in times of crisis, to register all media inquiring at the gate. (See Annex A)

PUBLIC AFFAIRS ORGANISATION & OPERATIONS

1. The Force PAffO will operate out of UNAMIR HQ Room 2020. He will be responsible for all PA activity for the Force Commander, act as the Force Commander's Spokesperson and will oversee all public affairs activities within the operational theatre of UNAMIR.

2. The PAffO will answer directly to the Force Commander and will coord PA activities with UNNY when considered necessary.

3. The UNAMIR PAffO will be provided timely and accurate information in regards to daily operations and activities of UNAMIR. It is vital that any event of potential public interest, negative or positive, which may not be conveyed at prayers be brought to the attention of the PAffO.

4. PA Mechanisms. The implementation of the PA objectives will occur through the use of several mechanisms. These mechanism are as follows:

- a. regular telephone interviews to international media agencies;
- b. coordinated media interviews with persons other than PAffO;
- c. news conferences, when considered necessary;
- d. photo releases; and
- e. video releases.


MEDIA RELATIONS

1. UNAMIR finds itself in a totally different posture than during the war. Media attention is now shifting to other corners of the world and interest in the Rwandan story is diminishing. UNAMIR must now take positive control of the information flow if it is to reflect accurately its activities. Phone interviews will be carried out by the Force PAffO and the weekly media briefing will be utilised as a planned forum for dissemination of information. Media

Advisories and News Releases will also be used when considered necessary as these methods are the cornerstone of all PAff activity.

CONCLUSION

1. It is paramount that staff at all level understand the long term benefits of PAff activity and that maximum cooperation be provided to the Force PAffO.

CONTINGENT INFORMATION OFFICER
DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. All UNAMIR contingents will appoint a contingent Public Affairs Officer (C PAffO). The C PAffO shall:

- a. inform the Force PAffO as soon as possible about significant incidents or events that could impact on public opinion or attract the attention of the media;
- b. develop and maintain a contingent PAff Plan based on and in compliance with the UNAMIR PAff Standing orders and its annexes;
- c. prepare a media visit plan as an annex to all operational activities selected as PAff opportunities;
- d. prepare and maintain a contingent PAff crisis management plan;
- e. refer all queries that have no direct relation with the contingents activities to the Force PAffO;
- f. coordinate and inform Force PAffO of all PAff activities in theatre in order to maximise visibility for the UN when deemed appropriate;
- g. develop and maintain a contingent "press kit" to include as a minimum, a short backgrounder on the contingents mission in theatre, biographies on key pers, photo of contingents crest if available and fact sheets on key pieces of equipment; and
- h. attend the Force PAffO's weekly planning meeting.

INTERNAL INFORMATION DIRECTIVE

1. Information intended for the military components of the mission may not be regarded by some as having the degree of importance to the future of the mission as is the information directed to the media or international publics. However, an informed and aware Internal Public is the cornerstone of UNAMIR's entire program, because the public always regards the soldier as the most reliable source of information. Contingent Commanders are encouraged to provide complete, timely and accurate information on Contingents policies, operations and activities to their soldiers. (Contingents are reminded to address only contingent matters and not to discuss UN Policies, activities and operations.)

2. To foster pride, self worth and professionalism among our military Force, the passage of information should go beyond the publication of routine orders and instructions. Contingents are encouraged to use other methods of release of information such as:

- a. articles or notices in a newsletter type publication;
- b. pamphlets or messages distributed to soldiers; and
- c. displays and information booths.

3. Internal information is a command responsibility which is vitally important to the operational effectiveness and morale of each unit. To be effective, it must function up and down the chain of command. COs and supervisors must be aware of the methods outlined and the resources that are at their disposal to keep their unit well informed on Contingent issues.

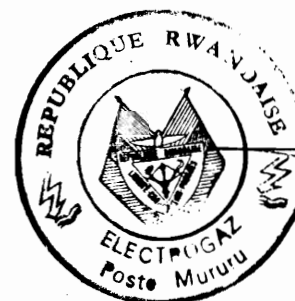

Subject: WATER SUPPLY - BLUE BERET CAMP

1. I have this morning been briefed by Steve Estell on the water supply situation generally and, in particular, in Blue Beret Camp.

GENERAL

2. Within Kigali, the city power and water systems are now working but they are fragile and minor difficulties result in sporadic supply. Reservoirs are generally full. The water supplied is of good quality; although the bacteria count is too high for it to be considered potable it could certainly be drunk in an emergency.

3. City water supply has been restored to Chez Lando and the Meridian Hotel. It has not been restored to HQ UNAMIR nor the stadium; there is no real reason for this, even if the supply were sporadic.

BLUE BERET CAMP

4. Guaranteed water supply to the village requires modifications to the supply line, which follows the road above the village.

5. There is a part constructed reservoir outside the village fence below the level of the village. It is not known whether this was being constructed specifically for the village or as part of other work. There are no pumps or pipework but requisitions to the value of \$15,000 have been raised to obtain the parts needed to incorporate this reservoir into the supply system for the village. This will then provide a substantial reserve.

6. As a temporary measure, 9 Para Sqn RE from BRITCON are to insert a pillow tank into the supply line. A 100,000 litre tank will be placed near Mr Kahn's house and this will gravity feed water to the whole village. When city water is available, this will keep the tank topped up but, when supply is interrupted it



RWANDAN NATIONAL SEEKING PROTECTION WITH ASC

1. On 4 Oct 94 at approximately 1300 hrs a Rwandan national, Mr Gratien MVUNABO, sought and was provided protection by the ASC based at the Central Hospital of Kigali (CHK). This man had been chased across the road by at least three RPA soldiers. On Mr Mvunabo being protected by ASC soldiers the RPA soldiers demanded that he be returned into their custody as they believed that he had been involved in crimes against humanity. This was refused on the basis that Mr Mvunabo had sought protection from UNAMIR troops. It was explained to the RPA that Mr Mvunabo would, if he consented, be handed to the Office of the Prosecutor of Kigali as per discussions conducted between the ASC Legal Officer and the Minister of Justice of Rwanda. The RPA representatives were invited to attend at the Prosecutor's Office so they could witness the hand over.
2. It was explained to Mr Mvanabo that he was not going to be handed to the RPA but to the Prosecutor's office in the presence of the ICRC. The accused said he was happy for this to occur. The ICRC were then contacted and it was arranged for them to attend the Prosecutor's Office for the hand over.
3. At the Prosecutor's Office Mr Mvanabo was handed over to Mr Jean MULERI a Rwandan police inspector. ASC ensured that the police confirmed, in writing, that the accused was now in their care. The ICRC were present during this process. There were no RPA representatives at the Prosecutor's Office.



2. RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED ON UNAMIR PERSONNEL

A. TO CARRY OUT ITS MANDATE UNAMIR TROOPS REQUIRE UNRESTRICTED MOVEMENTS WITHIN ITS AOR. LISTED BELOW ARE INCIDENTS THAT HAVE IMPOSED RESTRICTIONS ON TROOPS MOVEMENTS/DEPLOYMENTS BY RPA IN RECENT TIMES.

- (1) ON 24 AUG 94 VEHS PTLs CONSISTING OF PERS OF BRITCON FD AMB AND ENGRS, AND NGOs WERE STOPPED AT AN RPA CHECK PT GR 5107 BY RPA TROOPS. RPA OFFICERS CLAIMED TO HAVE NO KNOWLEDGE OF THE UN PTL. THE PTL WAS TOLD LAY DOWN THEIR WPNS. THE WPNS WERE UNLOADED AND THE RPA OFFICER TOOK SERIAL NUMBERS OF THE WPNS AND ID CARD NUMBERS OF THE UN PERS PRESENT. THE PTL WAS

FINALLY ALLOWED TO RETURN.

(2) ON 04 SEP 94, TWO MILOB TEAMS FROM GIKONGORO (SECTOR 4A) TRIED TO RECCE NEW ROUTES IN AND OUT OF THEIR SECTOR TO FACILITATE RESUPPLY OF DISPLACED PERSONS IN CAMPS IN THE SECTOR. THIS WAS IN ANTICIPATION OF LIKELY RESUPPLY PROBLEMS DURING THE RAINY SEASON. THE TEAM WHICH WENT NORTHWARDS WAS STOPPED BY THE RPA AT BRIDGE GR 5550 AND DENIED ACCESS TO THE BRIDGE. THE SECOND TEAM WHICH WENT SOUTH TRIED TO EXPLORE ROUTES FROM MUNINI GR 478998 TO BUTARE WAS ALSO STOPPED AT KAMANA GR 513974 AND ASKED TO RETURN.

(3) ON 09 SEP 94, A MILOB TEAM ENROUTE TO BUGESERA TO CONDUCT A RECCE WAS STOPPED BY RPA TROOPS AT CHECK POINT LOCATED NEAR MASAGA GR 7921. ON ENQUIRY THE TEAM WAS TOLD BY THE RPA OFFICER ON THE GROUND THAT THE AREA WAS RESTRICTED FOR GENERAL MOVEMENT AS IT WAS A MILITARY ZONE. THE TEAM WAS THEREFORE DIRECTED TO BUGESERA THROUGH KABUGA GR 8124.

(4) ON 10 SEP 94, A MEDICAL OFFICER AND MEMBERS OF AUSTRALIAN TMT SECTION INCLUDING LO FROM TAC HQ, ATTEMPTED TO RECCE HOSPITAL FACILITIES AT KARAMA GR 6111. THEY WERE DENIED ACCESS TO THE FACILITIES BY THE RPA. WHEN RECCE PARTY COMMANDER ASKED TO SEE AN OFFICER THEY SAID THERE WAS NON AVAILABLE. AFTER 15 MINUTES THE RECCE PARTY LEFT THE ROADBLOCK. WHEN THE RPA LO AT TAC HQ WAS MADE AWARE OF THE INCIDENT, HE SAID THAT HIS ORDERS ARE TO UNAMIR ACCESS TO AREAS WHERE RPA TROOPS ARE DEPLOYED.

(5) THERE WAS A REPORT OF MASS GRAVES AT GR 6405 AND NYAKIRANDA GR 6503. AUSMED STAFF WHO TRIED TO VISIT THE SITE ON 12 SEP 94 WERE DENIED ACCESS BY THE RPA. ON 13 SEP 94 MILOBS ALSO TRIED TO GO TO THE SAME AREA THEY WERE ALSO DENIED ACCESS BY THE RPA.

(6) ON 14 SEP 94 THE FOLLOWING INCIDENTS WERE REPORTED.

(A) A PTL SENT TO KINIGI GR 5440 WAS STOPPED AT RPA CHECK POINT. SUBSEQUENTLY THE PTL USED ALTERNATE ROUTE TO CONFIRM WHETHER THEIR BEING DENIED ACCESS TO THE AREA WAS AN ISOLATED CASE. THE PTL WAS NOT WAS NOT STOPPED AT ANY OTHER CHECK POINTS, BUT WHEN THEY AGAIN ENCOUNTERED THE SAME CHECK POINT FROM THE REVERSE DIRECTION THE PTL WAS ORDERED FROM THEIR CARS AND FORCE TO WAIT APPROXIMATELY ONE HOUR UNTIL AN OFFICER ARRIVED. THE RPA OFFICER EXPLAINED THAT THERE WAS NO PROBLEM AND THAT THE CHECK POINT HAD ACTED IN THAT

MANNER BECAUSE THEY HAD NOT BEEN INFORMED OF THE UN PTL PLAN.

(B) RPA PUT RESTRICTIONS ON LOADING/UNLOADING OF BARGE AT GISENYI FOR THE RESUPPLY OF FRAFBATT TROOPS IN KIBUYE BECAUSE IT HAD ARRIVED LATE. HOWEVER THE MATTER WAS RESOLVED AFTER NEGOTIATIONS BETWEEN MILOBS IN THE SECTOR AND RPA AUTHORITIES THERE.

(C) MILOB ASSISTED BY A SECTION OF MALAWIAN TROOPS CONVEYED 11 RETURNEES TO GITARAMA AND 34 TO KIGALI. RPA TROOPS AT CHECK POINT GR 530078 DEMANDED THAT MILOBS ESCORTING RETURNEES SHOULD PRODUCE A MOVEMENT PERMIT FROM THEIR SUPERIORS (RPA). THE RETURNEES AND ESCORTS WERE DELAYED FOR ABOUT 20 MINUTES BEFORE THEY WERE PERMITTED TO PASS THROUGH TO KIGALI.

(7) NICOY ADVANCE PARTY AND GHANBATT RECONNAISSANCE FOR FUTURE DEPLOYMENTS IN SECTORS 1 AND 2 RESPECTIVELY HAVE BEEN HAMPERED BY RPA ELEMENTS IN THE MENTIONED SECTORS DESPITE THE FACT THAT CLEARANCE HAS BEEN SOUGHT THROUGH RPA LO IN FORCE HQ SINCE 5 SEP 94. NICOY ADVANCE PARTY AT THE MOMENT DEPLOYED IN BYUMBA. ATTEMPTS TO RECCE NYAGATARE GR 3657 AND MURAMBI GR 4601 HAVE NOT BEEN SUCCESSFUL. GHANBATT HAS REPORTED ON 20 SEP 94 THAT IT HAS MANAGED AFTER NEGOTIATIONS WITH LOCAL CIVIL/MILITARY AUTHORITIES GAIN ACCESS TO AREAS IT WANTED TO RECCE IN SECTOR 2. AFTER BEEN DENIED ACCESS TO THE SECTOR ON TWO OCCASIONS.

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
