SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Last week following assistances were provided by this HQ in coordination with other agencies.

- a. On 27 Nov 95. two trucks for Shyanda and Kibayi commune to carry office materials from Butare Prefecture.
- b. On 29 Nov 95. two trucks for Muyaga commune to carry office furnitures from Butare prefecture.
- c. Coordinated the request of National University, Butare with GHANA COY in Kigali and arranged transport to carry food from Byumba to Butare.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

2.
 - a. Water: NTR.
 - b. Food: NTR.
 - c. Health Care: Team visited cilnic at Ruhashya commune run by AICF (NGO) and found that the situation is critical. Medical supply is in adequate and thus the number of patient have reduced to 30 from 150 per day. AICF would leave the clinic in next month. Malaria situation has dropped off in Ndora commune.
 - d. Agriculture: NTR.
 - e. Education: School at Cyarumbu sector of Maraba commune have 700 students. This school lacks teaching materials and need NGOs assistance.
 - f. Returnees: The reason s for refugees not returning home is that the situation is not still favourable. People within the country are also feared as to what may happen to them which hampers day to day development work, agriculture and social improvement. Last week a total of 86 returnees arrived in the way station and 23 of them were absorved in various communes of Butare prefecture.

g. Prisons: The commune prison at Mugusa presently holding 240 prisoners. Out of them documentation of 170 prisoners have been completed and need transfer to Nyanza prison. There is no change of Nyanza prison from our last report. The state of Karubanda prison in Butare are as follows:

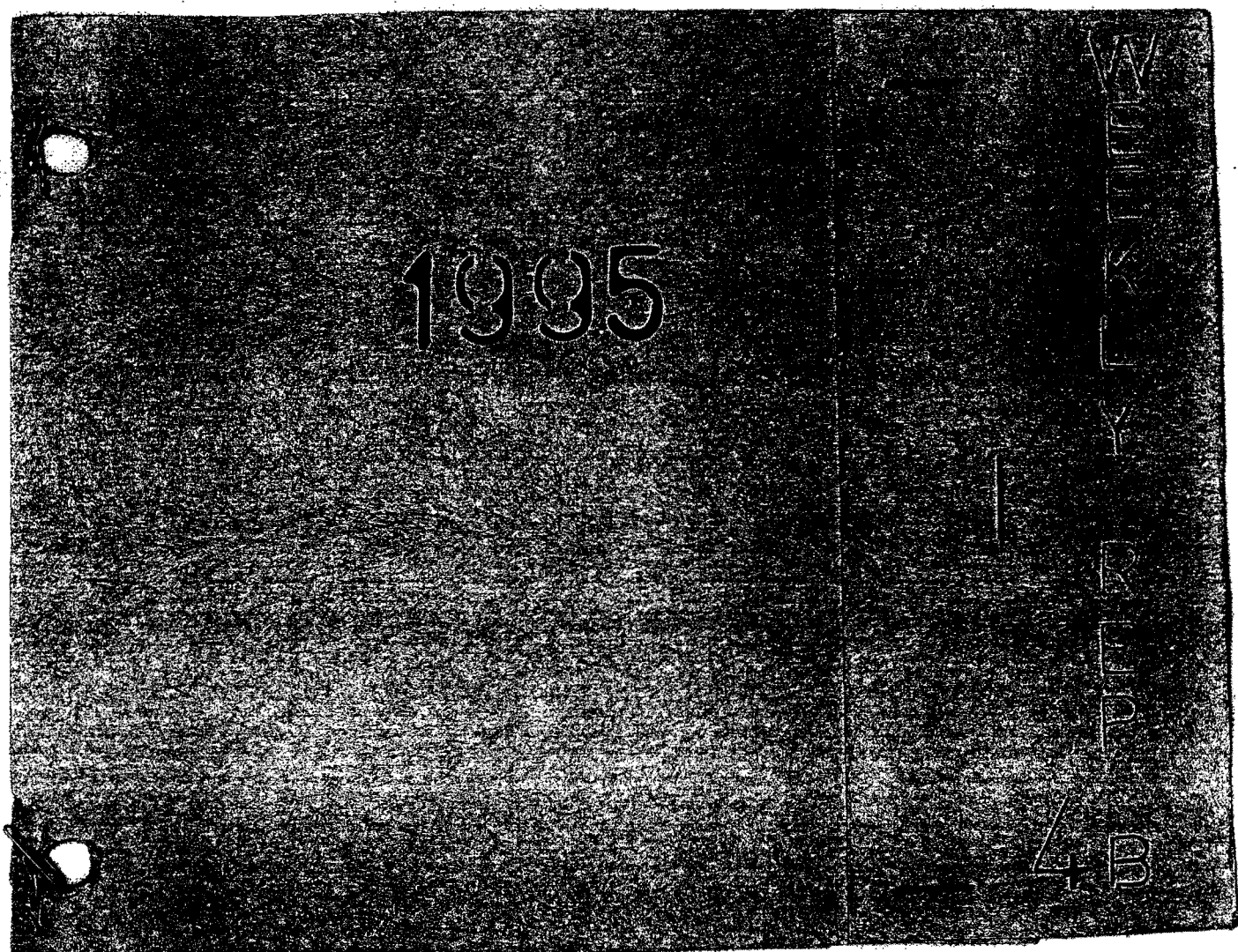

SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Last week no assistance was provided by this HQ in coordination with other agencies.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

2. a. Water: NTR.
- b. Food: CRS gives out food to the disabled and the poor on monthly basis. in Mbazi commune. The people are complaining that the food given to each persons is not enough the commune auths are appealing to the NGOs to increase the amount.
- c. Health Care: AICF (NGO) has hand over the Mbazi health center to the Rwandan authority. There is a lack of supply of drugs as compared to the number of locals coming for treatment. At Muyira commune people are suffering from dysentery and malaria which need immediate care by NGOs / Government.
- d. Agriculture: Due to lack of rain farmers are expecting low production of food through out the prefecture.
- e. Education: School at Kibilizi sector is being repaired by the assistance from Feed The Children.
- f. Returnees: Last week a total of 246 returnees arrived at the way station Butare. 87 returnees have been absorbed in the prefecture and others have gone to various prefectures. On 23 Nov 95. a meeting was held in UNHCR office Butare to discuss about refugees situation in the prefecture. Representatives from HRFOR and UNAMIR were present there. All members present in the meeting have varified that some communes in Butare Prefecture have problems with the local authorities. These communes are Kibayi, Kigembe, Nyakizu, Runyinra, and Ndora. They also agreed that tension is prevailing in all communes having border with Burundi. An unknown source reveal that there is a special group in the prefecture. who are the against of repatriation there by causing hostile activities in various communes with a view to stop the refugee movment. However matter could not be confirmed.
- g. Prisons: No change from previous report.

- h. Orphanage: There are two orphanages at Ngoma village in Butare town. orphans in these center facing numerous problems like food, water, shortage of blankets, shortage of school material etc.

ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES AND NGOs

3. AICF is carrying out inoculation and immunization against POLIO at Ruhashya and Muyaga communes hospital under the programme of WHO. The response from the locals in this matter is satisfactory. INTER-SOS is developing its new medical clinic at Muyaga commune. ICRC is conducting a survey of unaccompanied children in the area in an attempt to link up children and relatives.


REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE

4. The youth officer of Rusatira commune has requested for some sports material to organize matches among the youth. These items can be arranged from the Welfare officer of UNAMIR By HAC and can be distributed to each sector.

The Bourguemaster has requested for a grader to work on the surrounding roads within the commune. The latter of request is attached with this report. He also requested for an electrical generator.

CONCLUSION

5. The approach towards the end of the current mandate is making some commune authorities reluctant to give any information / request to Milobs since they feel its now a waste of time.

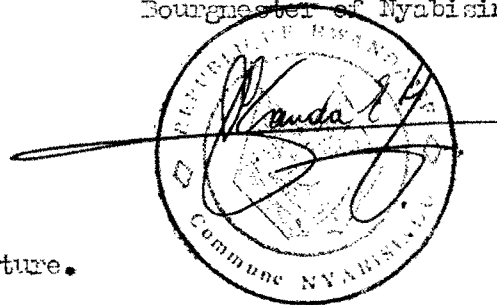

SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Following are the tasks done by Milob in coordination with armed troops, local authority and NGOs:
 - a. Provided 2 x trucks from Mali coy to carry woods from Gikongoro to Ruhashya (6926) commune which were used for reburial ceremony to prepare coffins.
 - b. Force Engr team has completed their assigned task of Rehabilitation Center and gone back to Kigali on 11 Nov 95.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS


2.
 - a. Water: NTR.
 - b. Food: NTR.
 - c. Health Care: Ruyenzi clinic authority in Ntyazo (8631) commune informed that they are finding increase in people suffering from the effect of AIDS.
 - d. Agriculture: NTR.
 - e. Education: At Rusatira commune all schools are functional having 33 unqualified and 21 qualified teachers and 3029 students. All schools need school material like text book, note book, training for teachers and reconstruction of 4 schools.
 - f. Returnees: At Rusatira (7431) commune 198 IDPs were pushed back to their home communes in various prefectures. Most of them belongs to Gikongoro prefecture. At Mbazi 4755 returnees have arrived till date which includes OCL, NCL and IDPs. This commune has 84 families of OCL and commune authority is planning housing project for them. From 06 Nov 95 to 10 Nov 95, a total 130 returnees arrived in Way Station, Butare. Out of 130, 121 has been absorbed in various prefecture.
 - g. Prisons: No change from previous report.

ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES AND NGOs

3. OXFAM is active in repairing water supply system at Mugusa commune. ICRC is distributing food to Gishamvu commune. Feed The Children is assisting unaccompanied Children in Nyakizu commune.

REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE

4. Mbazi commune needs hoes and seeds for 2980 families, 624 houses need to be rebuild and 110 houses need repair. There are 1477 widows, 991 orphans living with relative and 1624 disabled persons who need assistance for survival. 1548 destroyed houses need rehabilitation in Muganza commune.

SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Following are the tasks done by Milob in coordination with formed troops, local authority and NGOs:
 - a. Provided 4 x trucks from Mali coy to transfer prisoners from Maraba (6321), Nyaruhengeri (7607) and Ndora (8112) communes to Nyanza prison at Nyabisindu (7138) communes.
 - b. An electrician was provided by force Engr coy to check and rectify some problem at Rusatira (7431) commune.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

2.
 - a. Water: Water pump at Syarumbo sector in Maraba (6321) commune is out of order and needs to be rehabilitated. Water tank in Ramba sector under Runyinya (6012) commune was damaged during the war which needs to be repaired. Most of the sector including Gikongoro communes depends on the same tank.
 - b. Food: Distribution of food by NGOs is being carried out with limited interval and the quantity distributed is insufficient. ICRC is assisting in providing food to Nyakizu (5694) commune. WFP promised to bring food to Kbayi (8497) commune but nothing has been materialized.
 - c. Health Care: Health Center at Mugombwa sector in Muganza (8407) commune running shortage of qualified medical staff. Kibilizi clinic in Runyinya (6012) commune seriously needs solar panel for supply of electricity in the clinic. In general most of the clinic / hospital within the prefecture facing shortage of drugs.
 - d. Agriculture: NTR.
 - d. Education: NTR.
 - e. Returnees: This week only 76 returnees of 94 arrived in the prefecture and are being settling down in various communes.

SECTOR HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. Following are the tasks done by Milob in coordination with formed troops, local authority and NGOs:
 - a. Collected food from CRS warehouse, Butare using 1 x Mali coy truck and delivered at Rusatira (7431) commune for returnees.
 - b. Provided 2 x trucks from Mali coy to carry the remains of genocide victims at Ruhashya (6926) and shyanda (7718) communes.
 - c. provided 1 x pickup (UNAMIR 457) to Ngoma (7112) commune to ferry the people who attended the reburial ceremony held in Butare National University.
 - d. Transported school materials from Butare prefecture office to Huye (6714), Mbazi (7117) and Shyanda communes for onward distribution to commune school using Milob veh (UNAMIR 1074).
 - e. Coordinated with the NGOs to attend Mine Awareness lecture held on 27 Oct 95 at Mali coy in Gikongoro.
 - f. Coordinated with UNHCR, Butare to transfer 117 IDPs from Rusatira to different prefecture which will start from 30 Oct 95.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

2.
 - a. Water: Due to rain season water situation is a little bit better in most of the commune. Some of the communes are facing problems with the pumps which were either destroyed during war or are out of order due to lack of technical know how by the users such as in Mbazi and Nyabisindu communes. Oxfam is still working on the water system and pipeline in Mugusa (8425) commune.
 - b. Food: Distribution of food by NGOs is being carried out with limited interval and the quantity distributed is insufficient. 10 / 20 percent of the total needy people are getting food.
 - c. Health Care: MSF, AICF, and some other NGOs continued to assist diligently to improve and run hospital / health center facilities throughout the prefecture. In general, quality of health care is poor due to lack of medicine, untrained staff, overcrowding and non availability of equipment. It is reported that the outbreak of desentry at RUYENZI Orphanage center is still prevailing among the children. MSF has taken water samples from the spring for checking. MSF carried out immunization programme for children at Kigembe commune this week.

d. Agriculture: Farming activities are being carried out in all the communes. The major problems in this matter are shortage of agricultural implements and seeds ,though local government and NGOs continued to support people with the hope of making them self-sufficient in food.

d. Education: This week milob team visited a school named 'Group Scolaire De Save' in Shyanda Commune and informed that there are 820 students including 220 orphans who needed financial assistance. Beside this in all communes, schools need assistance in terms of rehabilitation work to buildings, supply of school materials, recreational facilities including development of play grounds etc. The special needs for all students is to provide them with text books. No new books have been provided to students after the war.

e. Returnees: The rate of influx of returnees has been reduced since last week. During this week a total of 222 arrived in the way station, Butare for onward despatch to various prefecture. 198 refugees crossed border posts in Kigembe commune on foot and went to their home communes. Out of 222 returnees only 50 were absorbed in Butare prefecture.

f. Prisons: A total of 246 prisoners have been transferred to Nyanza prison from various commune chacotes during the week. Most of the commune chacotes are over crowded and living conditions are very poor. Figures of Karubanda prison remain same as of last report. Following are the figures of Nyanza prison as of 27 Oct 95:

ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES AND NGOs

3. Human rights Representative in Butare is supervising transfer of prisoner. Feed The Children is assisting the orphans in various orphanages in coordination with WFP. CRS and ICRC are providing food, seeds and agricultural implements to locals and prisoners. MSF and AICF are providing limited medical assistances to some communes. OXFAM and UNICEF are assisting in restoring water supply systems in MUGUSA commune.


REQUEST FOR ASSISTANCE

4. Ruhashya commune requested for an electrician to repair their electrical wiring in the commune office. Mbazi commune requested to repair their water pump. Maraba commune requested for a loader to clean garbage from market place. All communes require roofing sheets for houses which are being built for returnees.

CONCLUSION INCLUDING ASSESMENT

5. This HQ is sending a various request from communes to various organizations including UNAMIR. But the response is inadequate to our request forwarded. NGOs and other humanitarian agencies working in the prefecture have reduced their activities may be due to financial constraints or otherwise. Our teams are yet to find out the reasons why the number of returnees have reduced to such an extent.

GENERAL

1. The general situation during the period under review was reported to be calm. On 18 Oct 95, there was a procession organized by the teachers and students of National university to mark the anniversary of last year genocide. They were carrying some placard asking justice to be taken against those responsible for genocide. On the same day a representative from the International Tribunal visited the National University. The aim of this visit was to meet professor Mr. Jacques Nsengemiriyi who is said to be one of the witnesses of 1994 genocide. However the representative could not meet the professor because he was attending a meeting which was presided by the ministry of education.
2. The humanitarian officer of the sector attended the following :
 - a. This week Coordination meeting with NGOs at Milob sector HQ could not arranged due to the reluctance on their part.
 - b. Coordination meeting with Human Rights on a daily basis. The aim of this meeting is to know the condition of the commune prison and necessary arrangements are coordinated to transfer prisoner from over crowded prison to less crowded one. During this week transfer of prisoners has been done from seven communes within this prefecture.

OWN HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

3. Following are the activities observed /carried out by the Milob teams:
 - a. MBAZI (7117). Team visited the commune and was informed that the prim-mover of water pump is out of order since long which needs UNAMIR technician assistance.
 - b. RUSATIRA (7431). Team visited the commune observed locals were provided with food at KIRUHUGO (7228) sector by the commune authority. There are 20 families comprising 150 persons who belong to Gikongoro prefecture wants to go back to their home commune. A request has been made to UNHCR, Butare for their transportation. Commune Authority requested for food supply for 30 prisoners who are without relative. The commune has 2000 IDP returnees from Kibaho which includes 800 male and 1200 female. Till to day commune has a total of 350 returnees

of 1959-61. commune authority has asked for lands for these returnees at SONGA sector from the government but matter is not yet materialized. Team observed that the commune office is being repaired with the financial assistance provided by the GARSHOREN a Belgian NGO.

c. NYABISINDU (7138). Team visited the commune informed that there are 200 refugees of 1959 and reported back to the commune. they have dispute with the local on land issue. team also visited a milk pasturization plant which processed 2000 ltr of milk per day. The actual capacity of the factory is 10000 ltr per day.

d. NDORA (8112). Team visited the commune and observed that new houses are being constructed using local materials. Locals were found cultivating the firm in a group as cooperative.

e. MUYIRA (8639). Team went to sector 1B in connection of transferring a 9 years old boy named SINDATIGAYA to his home commune Muyira. Team briefed the sector cdr of 1B regarding the location and situation of the father of the boy. The case has been taken over by UNHCR, Gitarama. On 11 Oct 95 Rwandian authority moved the boy from The Ntongwe cachote to Juvenile center of Detention in Gitagara. Team has given the particulars of boy's father, henceforth UNHCR will make necessary contact with the boy's father and arrange transportation for the father to visit his son. On 17 Oct a delegation of refugees comprising 15 member from Burundi visited the commune to assess the security situation in the commune and went back on the day after. They were satisfied about the situation and will try to convince their fellow in Burundi.

f. RUHASHYA (6926). Team informed that there are 3278 IDP returnees settled in the commune. Till to day 106 refugees of 1994 and 360 refugees of 1959-61 arrived in the commune. All refugees were provided with land by the commune but they need house building material and agricultural implements. There are 908 widows and 628 home less families who need assistance.

g. RUNYINYA (6012) Team was informed by the assist Bourguemastr that there have been robbery and stealing of cattle in Kibingo and Gikombe sectors over last weeks. He also added that some returnees stay in the bush during the night for fear of patrolling soldiers in the commune though general situation appears to be calm. The assist Bourguemaster also state that the commune is the poorest in the prefecture therefore lack basic requirements of living.

h. KIGEMBE (7096). On 14 Oct 95. Minister of health from Belgium visited the commune to assess the condition of returnees.

i. NYAKIZU (5694). Team visited the commune informed that a bridge on the route Butare- Nyakizu (600 meter away from the main road) needs Engineer attention for its repair.

j. KIBAYI (8497) Team informed that the Old Bourguemaster has not received any salary since employment. However periodically certain financial assistance and food has been provided by the government. A large number of houses were found empty indicating that a large percentage of population from this commune is yet to return.

AGRICULTURAL AND COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES

3. Locals were found carrying on with normal agricultural activities and preparations for the new harvest season due to rain. Cultivation of beans are in progress. Normal activity was seen in the commercial places.

4. Up date figures are given below:

SITUATION IN REHABILITATION CENTER, BUTARE

6. The Force engr coy has done the following progress on the rehabilitation center:
 - a. Work on the sanitation system completed (100 toilets with GSI sheets shed)
 - b. Work on water supply line is in progress and following work has been done:
 - (1) New line to main kitchen, Dinning hall and admin block
 - (2) Repair of bathroom in three building.
 - (3) Water supply to hospital.
 - c. 16 buildings are completed with electric fitting.

NGO ACTIVITIES BY COMMUNES

7. Following are the NGO activities by communes:
 - a. At Rusatira ICRC rep was distributing letters to relatives from the refugees at Zaire. A total of 12 such letters were distributed. CRS has brought 800' hoes and various types of seeds for distribution in the commune
 - b. At Ruhashya CRS is distributing food to 2806 families once in a month. Food items includes beans and cooking oil which is insufficient. ICRC was seen tracing the missing persons of the last year war.
 - c. At Nyabisindu CRS has stopped distributing food since last month because of some adminstrative problem. AVIS is providing medicine to the hospital.
 - d. At Mbazi CRS provides food to the commune once in a month. Feed The Children have delivered 500 hoes to the farming cooperative. Commune has a desperate need of medicine specially antibiotics. The infant nutrition center also lacks foon for the malnourised children.
 - e. At Runyinya. Out of 12 sectors only 5 sectors are getting food form NGOs. Rest of the sectors are in need of foods. This commune has received a large quantity of school materials (e.g. Exercise books, pens, papers, office materials) for smooth running of school.
 - f. At Huye. No NGO is working on the broken water pipeline. Returnees in the commune needs hoes and seeds to cultivate the lands.

ORPHANS AND ORPHANAGE SITUATION

8. Following are the additional information on the subject to be added with our previous report:

- b. At Huye there are 200 orphans in an orphanage center run by terre-Des-Hommes (NGO). Other 250 orphans are living with their relatives.

GENERAL


1. The general situation during the period under review was reported to be calm. On 11 Oct 95 The President of Ireland accompanied by her husband and minister for development Visited Butare. She went to National University and delivered speech to the students on good relationship between Ireland and Rwanda. Then she was taken to unaccompanied children center run by Concern and Nyanza prison. The Sector Cdr of Milob Sector and Ops Officer also accompanied her throughout her visit.
2. The humanitarian officer of the sector attended the following :
 - a. Coordination meeting with NGOs at Milob sector HQ on Mondays and Fridays with a view to make necessary liaison and inform them of the needs of communes provided by the teams. From the attendance it seem that NGOs are to much reluctant to participate this meeting.
 - b. Coordination meeting with Human Rights on a daily basis. The aim of this meeting is to know the condition of the commune prison and necessary arrangements are coordinated to transfer prisoner from over crowed prison to less crowed one.

OWN HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

3. Following are the activities observed /carried out by the Milob teams:
 - a. MBAZI (7117). Team visited the commune and was informed that the Bourgemaster who died on 26 Sep 95 in Bujumbura hospital was buried on 29 Sep 95 in Butare. From 20 Apr 95 to 11 May 95, 3394 IDPs were registered in the commune and On 28 Aug 95 50 refugees came from Zaire in this commune. Team also observed 20 couples registering their marriage at the commune office.
 - b. MUGANZA (8407). Team informed that Bourguemaster of the commune was dismissed. No one is appointed yet.
 - c. SHYANDA (7718). Team during their routine visit to the commune went to see the progress of repair work on water pump in Save secondary school. They observed several leakage on piping in around pumping system. The team was informed by the assist Bourguemaster that three persons had been arrested in connection with the murder of the judge of Butare (Please refer our weekly report dated 01 Sep 95).

HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE TASKS COMPLETED

11. In last week this sector provided following assistance:
- a. A technician from Engr coy repaired the water pump in Save sector in Shyanda commune. A letter of thanks from school authority is attached with the report. the water system still needs improvement to supply enough water.
 - b. A truck was provided to MARABA commune for transporting palstic sheets.
 - c. A truck was provided to KIGEMBE commune for transferring 35 prisoners from the commune cahote to Nyanza prison.
 - d. A truck was provided to SHYANDA commune for carrying remains of genocide victims.

GENERAL

1. The general situation during the period under review was reported to be calm except an incident which took place on 3 Oct 95 in Cyarwa within Butare town. Three armed persons believed to be RPA soldiers attacked Mr. Butare and his wife in their house which is co-located with one of our Milob houses. Fortunately the family could run outside the house and shouted for assistance from neighbours and the man rushed to the Milob house. Milob personnel and RPA soldiers who were patrolling in the same area arrived soon at the spot but by then those armed men ran away. Military police and civpol of this sector carried out an investigation and found no loss of money and injury.
2. The humanitarian officer of the sector attended the following :
 - a. Coordination meeting with NGOs at Milob sector HQ on Mondays and Fridays with a view to make necessary liaison and inform them of the needs of communes provided by the teams.
 - b. Coordination meeting with Human Rights on a daily basis.

OWN HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

3. Following are the activities observed /carried out by the Milob teams:
 - a. NDORA (8112) Team visited the commune and was informed by the assistant Bourguemaster that they are expecting few hundred returnees from Burundi in the next few months. He expected the following problems to crop up :
 - (1) Shortage of building material for the repair of houses.
 - (2) Farming tools and equipment.
 - (3) Requirement of seeds.
 - (4) Lack of qualified teachers for schools.
 - (5) Insecticides and pesticides.
 - b. MUGANZA (8407). Team observed the people of the commune decorating the reburial site and was informed that the graves would be covered with glass to serve as a monument for the tourists and the future generation to see.

c. KIGEMBE (7093). Team during their routine visit to the commune on the 29 Sep 95 observed that a large crowd had collected at the commune HQ for distribution of rations by ICRC. However the programme could not be carried out as the ICRC trucks could not cross the Butare -Kigembe bridge. The dimensions of the bridge for its repair have been ascertained by the Engr det and passed on to your HQ. The team also reported that the Bourguemastre of the commune was changed on the 30 Sep 95 .

d. HUYE (6714). The reburial ceremony fixed for 30 Sep 95 was postponed to 07 Oct 95 due to the reburial of Maj Gen Fred Rwigema in Kigali on the same day.

e. MUYIRA (8639) Reference to your letter no 5000.1 (HAC) / ops/ 37 dated 19 Sep 95 regarding minor prisoner, details are as follows:

(1) Team went to MURAMBA (GR 893469) and spoke with the father of the boy SINDAIGAYA. The wife of the man died in the month of August 95 and he has to manage four children in the house. It is difficult to visit his son in NTONGWE cachet which is 12 hours journey from his house. He requested that his son be moved to the MUYIRA cachet. The Bourguemaster has agreed to do necessary arrangement for transferring the child in his commune.

f. MARABA (6321). Team meet with Bourguemaster and was informed that the commune is presently facing lack of food to feed the refugees and orphans. The date of reburial ceremony has been shifted from 21 Oct 95 to 04 Nov 95. A pipeline serving the commune from HUYE commune is damaged and need an urgent repairs so that the commune's water problem is solved.

g. KIGEMBE (7096). The bourguemaster informed the team that there are about 1500 houses which are unoccupied and the commune authorities are building about 400 additional houses in anticipation of more returnees into the commune. the commune has organized a work force to build those house for returnees.

h. RUSATIRA (7431). Assist bourguemaster reported on the following problem:

(1) Lack of transport to visit commune.
(2) Lack of medical attention for inmates of local detention camp
(3) Lack of funds and materials to repair 1152 homes in various sector in the commune.

i. RUHASHYA (6926). Team visited the commune and was informed that commune needs 1200 hoes and seeds for 600 families. Missionaries at KIRIHURA sector in the commune is facing problem of water. At present they are buying water for 500 frw per drum from locals. Bourguemaster requested for materials to complete the construction of 50 houses built by locals for 905 widows.

SITUATION IN REHABILITATION CENTER, BUTARE

7. The Force engr coy boys are doing a splended job in the center. Team visited the center and noticed a distinct progress on the on going work on the sanitation system and water supply system. Water line has been connected to the center and the kitchen, admin blocks and the clinic. They are under-taking the following tasks:

Work on the sanitation system

Work on water supply line is in progress

Work on repair of main power line is in progress

8. The center is in urgent need of a security fence around the complex. At the moment it is very difficult to control the children from sneaking out unnoticed.

NGO ACTIVITIES BY COMMUNES

9. Following are the NGO activities by communes:

a. MUGANZA (8407). LWF an NGO were seen in the commune with 2 x truck loaded with food awaiting for distribution.

b. KIGEMBE (7093). WFP and Feed The Children have promised to assist the commune by providing food to the work force who are building house for the returnees.

c. NYAKIZU (5694). ICRC distributed food at Rutowe sector for 4000 people at the scale of 2 per family. The scale of items per person contsains following:

- (1) Maize- 2kg
- (2) Cooking oil- 1.5kg
- (3) Beans- 4 kg
- (4) Soap

ORPHANS AND ORPHANAGE SITUATION

10. Following are the aditional information on the subject to be added with our previous report:

- a. At KIGEMBE there is no orphanage. presently 600 orphans are being looked after by the relatives. No NGO's is assisting these families. Orphans are facing problem of clothing and fooding.
- b. At RUNYINYA there is no orphanage however at present 812 orphans are being looked after by various families. No NGO's at assisting to them. Orphans are in need of clothing and food.
- c. At MARABA there is no orphanage in the commune but having 428 orphans living with relatives. No NGO's assisting them and they need food and clothing.

DETAINEES STATE BY COMMUNE

11. Following are the changes/ information on detainees by commune to our last report:
 - a. MUGUSA- 246. Document of 200 detainees have completed and ready to transfer to other prison.
 - b. RUHASHYA- commune authority requested to shifted 100 inmates from the cachet to other prison.
 - c. NYAKIZU- Presently there are 120 prisoners inthe cachet.

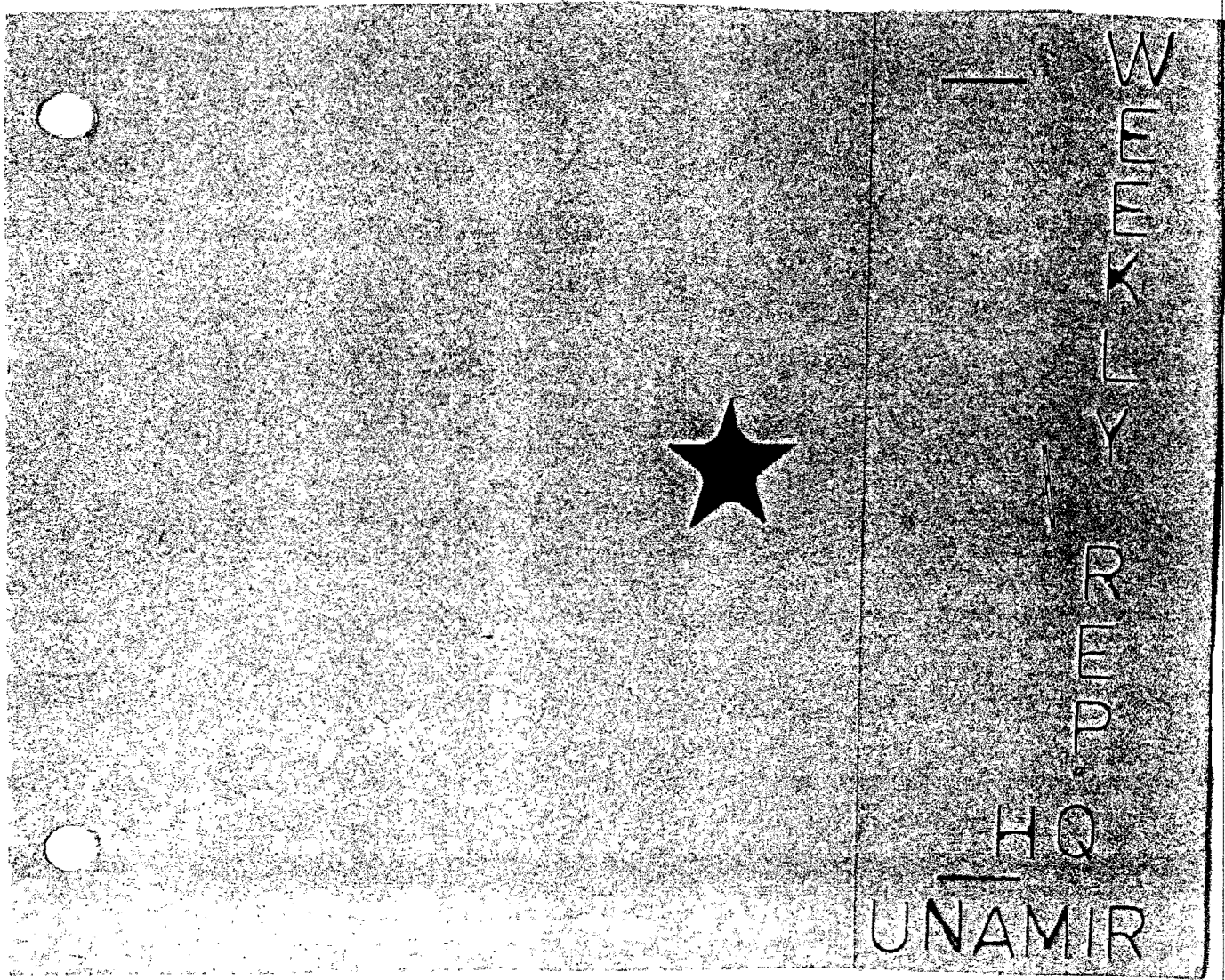

WEEKLY HUMANITARIAN REPORT FOR THE PERIOD 07 - 13 OCT 95

GENERAL SITUATION

1. The general humanitarian situation in the country seems to be improving slowly with continuing efforts by UN, NGOs and other agencies. The health care situation in the country is not adequate despite the efforts of NGOs and local authorities. Lack of medicines and qualified staffs are the main deficiencies along with lack of transport, electricity, beds etc. Educational system requires support in form of text books, teaching materials and furniture as well as building repairs in the schools.

HAC ACTIVITIES

2. The requests dealt with by HAC during the week were:

a. Transportation Requests. The transportation requests accepted by HAC were as follows:

(1) Transportation of 200 bags of cement from Kigali to Muhura in Byumba prefecture for primary schools.

(2) Transportation of food items and school materials from Kigali to Muhura.

(3) Transportation of blankets (858) from Kigali to Gitarama.

b. Blankets for Orphanages in Gitarama Prefecture. The request from orphanages in Gitarama prefecture for provision of a total of 858 blankets was taken up by HAC with the Austrian Relief Programme. The blankets were later collected and distributed to the orphanages within the week.

c. Reburial Ceremonies. The request from Butare prefecture for assistance in reburial ceremonies by provision of plastic sheets and transport was forwarded to UNHCR for necessary support.

3. UHAAG. The following requests were considered by UHAAG meeting on 16 Oct 95.

a. Reconstruction of Bailey Bridge at Gashora. The Rwandese

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Ministry of Transportation (MINITRAPE) has requested for assistance in reconstruction of the bailey bridge at Gashora in Kibungo prefecture. The Ministry will be providing the bridging stores while UNAMIR has been requested to undertake the bridge launching and transportation of the stores. The task has been accepted will require approximately 50 persons from the Force Engineers for a period of 15 days.

b. Repair of Track. A request was received by the FC's office from Bourgemestre of Rubungo commune for repair of a six km track Zindiro - Karama. The meeting decided that the request be undertaken by the Force Engineers, once trailers are available and dozers can be moved to the repair site.

c. Requests for Generators and Vehicles. Requests had been received from UNHCR for five generators for Goma camp and from Ministry of Defence for four generators and two vehicles for Directorate of Communication. The meeting decided that the requests could not be met as UNAMIR did not have any surpluses in these items at present.

4. Sector 1A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. During this period MILOBS in the sector actively assisted in contacting NGOs for supply of seeds and various equipment to communes. In addition a visit by medical team of UNAMIR was also arranged to the communes. Further details of major activities carried out are as follows:

(1) Supply of Seeds and Agriculture Materials. Seeds and hoes were delivered by MILOBS to the Bourgemestres of Gikoro commune on 11 Oct 95 and Shyorongi commune on 12 Oct 95.

(2) Medical Camp. On 13 Oct 95 approximately 250 patients were treated by Indian medical team in Mwendo sector (0181).

(3) Musasa Commune. A MILOBS patrol observed the repair of water supply system by NGO ZOA and UNICEF.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Housing. Available houses in most accessible communes have been occupied. However there are still houses available in remote areas, but they require some repairs.

(2) Returnees. The capacity of various communes to absorb fresh returnees is being ascertained.

5. Sector 1B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) MILOBS continued delivery of UNICEF schooling materials from Gitarama to the communes. This week 22 and 16 boxes were delivered to Taba (8863) and Mugina (9267) respectively.

(2) MILOBS also provided transport to the Prefect for the swearing in ceremony of Bourgmestres at Masango (6254), Kayenzi (8389) and Runda (9882).

(3) Two trucks from INDBATT conveyed food from WFP warehouse in Kigali for MEMISA in Taba commune on 13 Oct 95. About 907 children are to benefit from the food aid.

(4) Humanitarian Officer met with an official of CRS to discuss plans for the reception of expected returnees to the prefecture. He provided the official with the communes database.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Water. There is marked improvement in Gitarama and surrounding communes.

(2) Health Care. Diarrhoea and general malaise continue to be a problem in the prefecture. Diarrhoea is prevalent amongst the prisoners. There is no reported case of any endemic disease.

(3) Farming Activities. Shortage of agricultural implements and seeds is being addressed by the Agricultural Department of the prefecture.

6. Sector 2A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) The sector assisted the Kivuye commune with two pick-ups for the distribution of 600 bags of food items to 12 families of 51 people on 9 Oct 95.

(2) GHANBATT provided a truck to the NGO GOAL Ireland for the conveyance of building materials for the Byumba transit camp. The truck worked for one week.

(3) Muhura commune had requested for transport to convey 200 bags of cement, 850 kg of food items and school materials from Kigali to Muhura. The requested task has since been completed.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Food. WFP distributed food items within the Ngarama commune on 13 Oct 95. On the same day, ADRA also distributed seeds and hoes to farmers in the commune.

(2) Health Care. In Buyoga commune, AMREF is rehabilitating the Buyoga health centre. The health centre in the Muhura commune GR 301081 is still without any NGO support.

(3) Education. A high powered German Delegation called DONNERSBERGKEIS visited the Rutare commune on 11 Oct 95 and promised to rehabilitate the Secondary school and also provide furniture for the primary schools. In the Bwisige commune, the government of Germany had promised a grant of 33,000 DM to the Bwisige Secondary school. The grant will to be channelled through RENAN PALATINA, sister commune of Bwisige in Germany.

7. Sector 2B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. The following major activities were carried out during the week:

(1) The Humanitarian cell organised the distribution of 50 blankets donated by the Austrian Relief Programme to the Gahini hospital (9958).

(2) The MILOBS assisted in the carting of rations to the ZAMBATT convoy stuck at the Rusumo border post (8737).

(3) GHANCOY assisted in conveyance of food items from Kigali to Kibungo (6159) on 12 Oct 95 and from Rwamagana (4884) to Mushubati (3278) on 13 Oct 95.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Food. Food for work programme continued in a majority of the communes under the aegis of the concerned NGOs. UNICEF carried out a distribution of beans.

(2) Health Care

(a) At Musaza (6942) in Rusumo commune (7449) there have been reports of an increased number of children mainly of oldcase load of returnees suffering from Kwasiokor (probably rickets) caused essentially due to malnutrition.

(b) The health centre at the new settlement area of Nasho (Rukumbo) (9466) became operational on 12

Oct 95. The area has reportedly high incidence of malaria and some cases of malnutrition.

(c) The health centres at Bare (5449) and Gahara (5442) have been recording high figures of malaria. At Bare an increased number of measles have also been reported.

(3) Farming. Intense farming activity continued all over the prefecture. At most places the farmers were seen preparing their fields for sowing. UNICEF carried out a distribution of beans for sowing at the rate of 5 kgs per family in Rukara commune (0157). A similar distribution of beans seeds at the same scale was carried by IMC at Gahara in Birenga commune.

(4) Returnees

(a) A total of nearly 14,500 old caseload returnees are to be resettled at Nasho. A team from the Ministry of Rehabilitation is at present in Nasho area to carry a survey and assess the feasibility of resettlements in the area.

(b) 20 Persons were reportedly handed over by the Tanzania army to RPA at Rusumo border post on 10 Oct 95. They were reportedly taken by the RPA to their camp adjacent to the Nyakarambi transit camp.

(c) The expansion of the Nyakarambi and Birenga transit camp is proceeding on schedule. The latest state of accommodation at the two transit camps are Nyakarambi - living huts for returnees (large) 13 (two additional huts are under construction) and kitchen huts 03. Birenga - tent huts (small) 112 (additional huts are under construction), kitchen sheds 06 and bathrooms 05.

c. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) AFRICARE is providing medical cover to the old case of returnees being resettled in the Nasho area. It is also assisting in repairing the water supply system in Gisenyi (8952) and Kwankoba (8861).

(2) ACIST is assisting in cultivation by distributing seeds and implements through the cooperative scheme in the communes of Sake (4454), Birenga (5959), Kigerama (6270) and Kabarondo (6278).

8. Sector 3A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. The sector coordinated all HAC activities in the sector. HAC gave transport to Kigeme hospital to carry their confectioneries from town to the hospital site. It also gave transport to the RPA for their redeployment.

b. General Living Conditions. The general living conditions is satisfactory. However the locals are asking for farm implements which are not adequately supplied by NGOs.

9. Sector 3B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. Following are the activities observed/carried out by the MILOBS teams:

(1) The Engr recce team recce two bridges along the route Gishamvu. They have recommended changing of decking.

(2) Shyanda (7718). Team during their routine visit to the commune went to see the progress of repair work on water pump in Save Secondary school. They observed some leakages in the piping.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Housing. The commune is engaged in preparation of materials for houses. Presently a brick making and tiles making programme is on as phase I. They produce 65000 bricks per month. In phase II these will be utilised to make houses.

(2) Returnees. Team was informed that on 9 Sep 95 a delegation of refugees from Burundi visited the commune in order to know the security situation in the area and to check the state of their things. The delegation was composed of 6 men and 6 women.

(7) Health Care. Team visited an orphanage at Cyotamakar GR 8233 and found an outbreak of dysentery. A total of 15 boys were affected. MSF is assisting in treating the water with chemical.

b. Situation in Rehabilitation School Butare. The Force Engr Coy has made reasonable progress on the continuing work at the Rehabilitation School in Butare:

(1) Work on the sanitation system completed.

(2) Work on water supply line is in progress.

(3) Work on repair of main power line is in progress.

c. UN Agencies and NGOs Activities

(1) UNHCR donated plastic sheets for the communes reburial ceremony at Muraba.

(2) Feed the Children distributed farming tools to returnees and orphans at Muyira.

(3) ICRC is continuously visiting the prison and assisting with food and medicine. CARITAS distributed food and CRS distributed seeds, beans and cooking oil to the returnees at SAVE complex.

10. Sector 4

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. It was revealed during a visit by MILOBS to Bweyey sector GR 1310, that refugees were crossing at an unofficial crossing point from Burundi in that sector. They were directly dispersing to their communes without any registration by UNHCR or the commune authorities. UNHCR was informed of this development.

b. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) MDM continue to operate the hospital in Bugarama transit camp. CONCERN is also upgrading facilities in the camp especially food supplies and shelters.

(2) In Nyamesheke Sub-sector, WPF distributed food at Gasayo (GR 9941). The Councillor of Gikundamvura has requested assistance in the construction of pipe water systems in Mwegera GR 9514 and Nyamigina GR 9212.

(3) The MALAWI Company provided two trucks to the RPA on the 11 Oct and 13 Oct 95 for general administration and transportation to Bweyeye and Gafunzo. Also on 9 Oct 95 MALAWI Company provided one truck to IRC for transportation of cement from Bugarama to the central prison in Kamembe.

(4) Three medical personnel from Malawi Company attached to Gihundwe hospital treated 58 inpatients and approximately 247 outpatients who were mainly children. At their medical aid post at Shagasha, the MALAWI Company treated 17 local patients.

(c) Refugees. A total of 255 refugees arrived in the prefecture through the various entry points during the week. A total of 129 refugees also arrived at Nyagatare transit camp as against 203 departed refugees during the week.

11. Sector 5A

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities

(1) On 10 Oct 95 a MILOBS team presented 35 pieces of toilet soap to the Janja orphanage in Nyamutera commune.

(2) On 11 Oct 95 a MILOBS team presented some stationeries to SALEM RWANDA orphanage in the Ruhengeri town. This stationeries were provided to us by UNAMIR.

(3) On 12 Oct 95 a MILOBS team transported 10 boxes of text books (educational materials) to Cyabingo and Gatonde communes and handed over to the representative of Ministry of Education.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Health Care. A MILOBS team visited Gitare health centre (7446) in Kidaho commune being assisted by MSF-H. About 80 patients are treated daily with common diseases like worms, malaria and eye problems. MSF Doctor visited the centre once in a month which is considered to be inadequate.

(2) Housing. In Nyamugali commune at Muvumo sector (8719), 17 hectares are earmarked for resettlement of 59/60 returnees. There are no resettlement programme for returnees in Gatonde commune but returnees are living in the different sectors of the commune.

(3) Education

(a) In Butaro commune at Kabyaza school (835437), three of the nine classrooms are at window level. The others are still at foundation level. The school is being constructed by AIDE and ACTION.

(b) The Assistant Burgmaster of Nyamugali commune requested for assistance to repair doors and windows for primary schools at Mushogi (9017), Nemba (8427) and Rusha (8327).

(c) In Ndusu commune the Janja Secondary school has the problem of water and diesel to operate generator.

(d) A Secondary school was reopened recently in Kigombe commune. Presently there are 600 students but 290 are expected to be enrolled soon

(4) Refugees. According to the Burgmaster and MINIREISO

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rep at the Kigombe commune so far a total of 4678 (59/60) and 36134 (1994 returnees have been received. They said that lands have been acquired to settle the returnees of 59/60 in the following areas, Nyakinama (5827) - 800 families. Karwasa (6456) - 52 families and Nkumba (6639) - 91 families, but each family has to pay 8000 Francs for land and 5000 Francs for the supply of stones.

12. Sector 5B

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. Activities for the week included constant monitoring of the situation in Nkamira transit camp. Numbers of returnees have not been high, so the camp is pretty much emptied daily.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Housing. A 300 house construction project has been started in Kilibira commune for the new returnees. Of this number 230 have been started and 40+ have been completed. 128 of these houses are to be allocated to women.

(2) Education. COOPI reported that they have completed their third phase of training non-qualified teachers with the latest graduation of 482 persons. In addition they have completed work on 17 primary schools.

c. UN Agencies and NGOs

(1) COOPI. Continues its work with the development of the two transit camps. They have requested assistance with dump trucks and dozer and the use of the septic tank truck.

(2) ICRC. Will open a local office within the next week.

(3) MERLIN/MSF. MSF's work in preparation of the Saint Marie Gotti centre for unaccompanied children is near completion. Once complete it will house up to 160 children for up to three months at time.

(4) WFP. Continues with its Food for Work Programmes. In the Gaseke commune two new projects will be initiated soon. One for the construction of houses and the second for road work.

(5) UNHCR. The final food distribution for old caseload returnees was completed in the Mutura commune by INTERSOS. It was intended for some 10,455 persons, however MINIREISO presented a supplementary list at the

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last moment, which resulted in 21,775 sharing the allocation of food.

(6) In Kayove commune the MINIREISO distributed food to 877 returnees. In the Nkmira transit camp each returnee is receiving one months full food ration before they depart the camp. In addition they receive no-food items like blankets, jerrican, kitchen utensils and a bucket and soap.

13. Sector 5C

a. Sector Humanitarian Activities. MILOBS team have visited numerous schools, hospitals and orphanages during the week. On 13 Oct 95, a MILOBS patrol flew by heli to the returnee camp in Bwiza (3694) and delivered 50 kg maize seed and a small quantity of rehydration salts.

b. General Living Conditions

(1) Food. The WFP is the principal food distributor here. They provide food primarily to FFW on Kibuye water project, Gisovu tea plantation and Bwakira seed multiplication project, Orphanages in Kibuye (Enfants du Monde), Gishyita and Mabanza, hospitals at Kibuye, Kilinda and Mugonero as well as supplementary food to nutrition centres in Gisovu, Rwamatamu, Rutsiro and Bwakira.

(2) WFP constantly has difficulty distributing the required quantity of food because of the poor quality of the roads in this prefecture and the frequent break downs of their trucks.


(3) CARITAS and Solidarity also provided food aid in this prefecture. The children continue to be the prime concern for aid.

(4) Water and Sanitation. ICRC is slowly making progress in repairing broken pipes and developing new sources of water. Shortfalls in water still occur daily throughout the prefecture.

(5) Education. The Ecole Technique Normal in Kibuye is providing high quality technical training to 245 young women in the secondary school. This school has a payment claim against UNAMIR for approximately 6.5 million RFR for damages that were done to the facility when it was previously occupied by UNAMIR soldier.

CONCLUSION

14. The humanitarian situation is expected to improve with the ongoing efforts of various agencies and NGOs especially as now the coordination among them is better. However the threat of deterioration of the security situation looms large and it will seriously hamper the humanitarian aid in case it comes true.

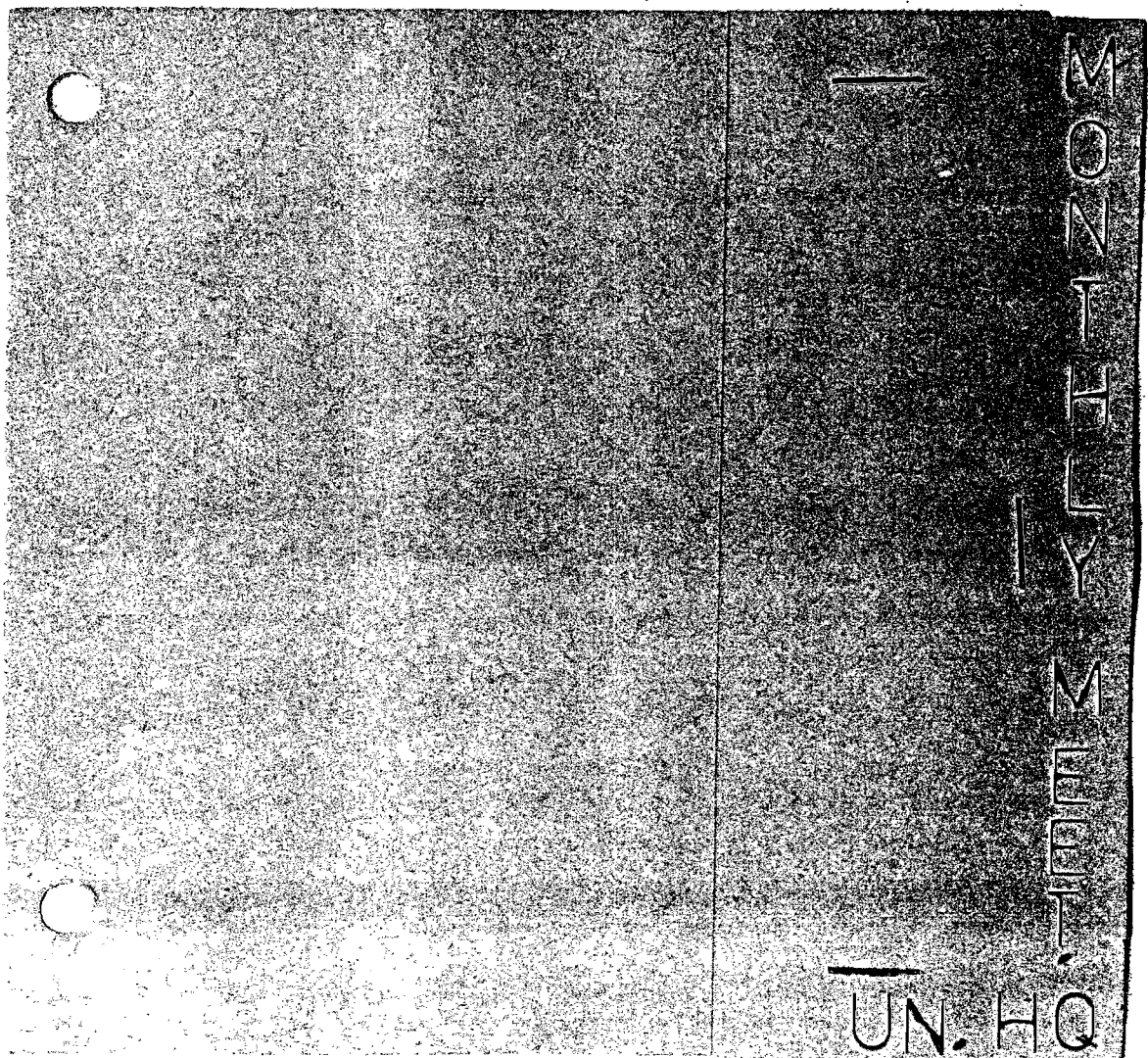

ITEM I - INTRODUCTION

1. The Chairman welcomed all participants and opened the meeting at 0935 hrs.

ITEM II - MINUTES OF LAST MEETING

2. The Secretary read out the minutes of the last meeting.

ITEM III - POINTS FROM LAST MEETING

3. Repair of Water Pump. The FEO informed that a technician from Force Engineer Company has been sent to Butare to inspect/repair the water pump in the secondary school there.

Action - Force Engineer Company

4. Repair of Generator. The CAO rep informed that a technician from the Generator Repair Unit was being sent to Kibuye for inspection/repair of the generator at Kibuye hospital.

Action - STO

5. Land Levelling at Byumba Transit Centre. The FEO informed that a joint reccee will be carried out by Force Engineer Company and NGO GOAL to assess the requirements. The work can start immediately after that as equipment is moving back from Nkamira transit camp.

Action - Force Engineer Company

ITEM IV - REQUESTS DEALT WITH BY HAC

6. Transportation of Blankets. A request was received from NGO CARITAS to transport blankets from Kigali to Kibungo. The request was sent to GHANCOY. The task has since been completed.

7. Track Improvement. A request for improvement of about 200m track near Nyabarango river bridge was received from Sector 1A. The request was forwarded to the FEO. The FEO informed that the work has been completed by the Force Engineer Company.

8. Rearrangement of Containers. A request for a fork lift for rearrangement of containers at Nkamira Transit Camp was accepted and forwarded to DCOS SP.

Action - CLOGO

9. Transportation of food and seeds. A request was received from Sector 1B for transportation of food items and seeds in Gitarama prefecture. The request has been sent to DCOS SP for provision of transport.

Action - CLOGO

10. Provision of Water Bladder. Request for a water bladder for school at Kamonyi in Gitarama prefecture could not be met due to non-availability in UNAMIR. The request has been redirected to UNICEF.

ITEM V - REQUESTS CONSIDERED BY UHAAG

11. School For Demobilised Children. A request was made by Minister of Education during a conference in Education Ministry for provision of sucker truck for draining septic tanks at the school. The requirement projected was for 7-10 days. The CAO rep informed the Group of the problems in providing a sucker truck for such a long duration as UNAMIR had only one sucker truck. The FEO informed that some manual emptying of the septic tank was being undertaken by UNICEF and hence provision of the truck for 4-5 days may be adequate. The CAO rep intimated that he will approach the CAO for a decision on the matter.

Action - STO

12. Repairs in School at Byumba. A reccee of the school was carried out by the FEO for assessment of effort and funds required. The report has been submitted to SRSG's office.

13. Rehabilitation of Destitute Children. A request was received from Sector 3B regarding possible assistance in rehabilitation of destitute children and women. The Chairman expressed the inability of UNAMIR in assisting in such matters. However, number of NGOs and churches were undertaking such action in different areas and they should be approached for assistance.

Action - Sector 3B

14. Rehabilitation of Water Points. The Chairman projected the problem being faced by people in collecting water from natural springs as most of the water points there were destroyed during the war. He suggested that UNAMIR could undertake rehabilitation of selected water points by construction of small cemented tanks and putting up a 2-3m long steel pipes. The FEO informed that this task was a low cost one and could be undertaken by the contingents in their respective sectors. The task mainly involved manpower effort and only very limited technical expertise. The meeting decided that each sector could identify about ten water points in its sector and then rehabilitation would be undertaken by the contingents. Technical advice and supervision, if required, will be provided by the Force Engineer Company.



ITEM VI - MISCELLANEOUS POINTS

15. CAO's Terms of Reference. The CAO rep informed the meeting of the directions received by him from the officiating CAO regarding his terms of reference as member of UHAAG. These terms include no supply of any equipment (vehicles, generators, computers) to any organisation till the future mandate is clear, no acceptance of continued support tasks but only one-time assistance tasks, non-availability of water deliveries and septic tank pumping, only emergency usage of third line transport and only limited one-time usages of cargo space on UNAMIR aircraft. The Secretary pointed out that these terms are going to severely curtail the UNAMIR capability of providing humanitarian assistance.

ITEM VII - CONCLUSION

16. The meeting concluded with the Chairman expressing his view that despite all these restrictions UNAMIR will be able to provide humanitarian assistance to the people of Rwanda, as given in its mandate, if all the agencies of UNAMIR show a will to assist in the task.

OPENING

1. The meeting started at 1000 hrs with a welcome address by the CHAO.
2. He stressed on some points arising from the last meeting.

He explained that at the last meeting, emphasis was placed on early submission of Weekly Hum Reports yet HAC had to be sending reminders to Sec Hum Offrs on early submission of reports.

He further explained that such a situation affects the early submission of HAC Weekly Report as HAC depends on the information submitted by Sec Hum Offrs for the preparation of its Weekly Report.

3. The CHAO touched on the need to improve on our performances, he said even though we are faced with logistics problems, there is the need to improve upon our performances with the little logistics support we have. He said going on patrols and recce would let us have more information with regard to humanitarian needs in the various sectors.

RELATIONSHIP WITH LOCALS AND NGOS

4. The CHAO asked Hum Offrs to try as much as possible to maintain good relationship with locals especially those in authority ie. Prefect, RPA Commanders and Bourgmestre and also NGOs working in their respective sectors. He explained that where cordial relationship exist work of Hum Offrs become very easy.

ACCURACY OF REPORTING

5. The CHAO told Hum Offrs to be accurate in their reporting. He said accurate reporting is very essential as HAC HQ occasionally had to be asking for clarifications for previous reports received. He said such a situation causes unnecessary delay in taking action on urgent matters.

UNAMIR'S NEW MANDATE

6. The CHAO highlighted HAC responsibilities under the new mandate. He said HAC has a lot to do under the new mandate and

called for the support of all for success to be achieved.

LOGISTICS SUPPORT FOR HAC

7. On logistics, the CHAO said he was aware of the logistics problems facing the cell as well as Hum Offrs in the various sectors. He however, cautioned all present to take care of the limited resources available to enable them perform efficiently. The CHAO after covering these points handed over the meeting to the DCHAO.

HUM SPECIAL PATROLS

8. The DCHAO said with the new mandate and the responsibilities assigned to HAC, intensive patrols would be organised to all sectors to obtain information on humanitarian activities throughout the country. He explained that this will involve personnel from HAC HQ, Sec Hum Offrs and specialists from IOC. He further said HAC HQ had already started this programme and at least two patrols in a week would be undertaken.

9. The DCHAO also placed emphasis on HAC tasks under the new mandate. He said success would only be achieved by the concerted efforts of all involved.

BRIEF BY SEC HUM OFFRS

10. The DCHAO called on Sec Hum Offrs to brief on Hum activities in their respective sectors within the past month.

a. Brief By Sector 1 Hum Offr

(1) The Sec Hum Offr highlighted on problems in his sector, problems highlighted on included the following:

(a) Water. He explained that Tumba and Kinyami communes face acute water shortage. He called for a solution to the problem.

(b) Refugees. On refugees, he said they were still returning from Uganda and Tanzania and that basic needs such as food, water and shelter were needed to resettle them.

(c) Mines. He said the presence of mines in certain areas of the sector pose a threat to people and asked for an early demining.

b. Brief BY Sector 2 Hum Offr

(1) The Hum Offr in Sec 2 explained that the humanitarian situation in the sector was very stable, he said the food situation was quite encouraging except for few areas where water problems exist.

(2) He said he was enjoying the support of the Milob team in the sector.

(3) He suggested the need to have more than one Offr as the Sec Hum Offr in view of the task ahead.

c. Sector 3

(1) The Hum Offr in his briefing, stated that orphans in the sector were many but scattered and that makes it difficult to obtain information about these orphans. He explained that most of them were living with relatives.

(2) He also highlighted on water problems in the sector. He said he had received a request from a School in his sector for supply of water. He stated that the request had already been forwarded to HAC for further action.

d. Sector 3A

(1) Sec Hum offr who had just been transferred to the sector identified the following as problematic areas:

(a) Orphans. He said there were lot of orphans in the sector who need assistance.

(b) IDPs. IDPs in the sector need proper resettlement.

(c) Road Network. The Hum Offr lamented over the poor road network in the sector. He explained that conditions of roads in the sector were very bad and that few transport services were available in the sector.

(d) He said the need to assist in infrastructural repairs in the sector could not be over emphasised.

(2) The Hum Offr also complained of lack of logistics support, he said this problem makes one ineffective in the performance of his duty. He appealed for logistics support to enable them become effective in the discharge of their duties.

(3) The Hum Offr also mentioned that the Bourgmestre told him the FC had promised him of a computer and other office equipment. He explained that the Bourgmestre wanted to know when the items would be delivered to him. He appealed to the CHAO to check on the promise from the FC.

(4) The CHAO on his part, said he was aware of the promise. He explained that the FC had told him about the promise, and that efforts were being made to get these items from the NGOs for presentation. He however, asked the Hum Offr to ask the Bourgmestre to improve his relationship with UNAMIR. He explained that information received indicated that the Bourgmestre is hostile to UNAMIR personnel.

e. Sector 4A

(1) The Sec Hum Offr was accompanied by another offr who was introduced as being the offr who acted on his behalf during his absence. The A/Hum Offr briefly outlined humanitarian activities in the sector over the past month. He explained that even though the humanitarian situation was steadily improving, there were still areas of concern, these he said were:

- (a) Lack of portable water in some communes.
- (b) Lack of qualified teachers in some schools.
- (c) Lack of transport facilities in most communes.

(2) He explained that there were only few transport facilities in the communes and this affects humanitarian activities. He also mentioned rampant arbitrary arrest of locals by the RPA.

(3) The DCHAO on his part explained that the issue of unqualified teachers could not be taken up by HAC since IOC had no department dealing with education. On the question of arbitrary arrest by RPA, he said such issues should be reported to Human Rights Field Officers in their respective sectors for necessary action.

f. Sector 4B

The Sector Hum Offr's problems were not different from what had already been mentioned. He had similar problems as Sector 4A. He appealed for assistance in the form of food provision to orphans and refugees. He also asked for a solution to water and transport problems in the sector.

g. Sector 4C

(1) The Hum Offr expressed concern over lack of logistic support. He said lack of transport has made his work very difficult. He explained that without transport, it would be very difficult to achieve the desired goal as he could not be mobile to know what is actually happening in the communes. He therefore appealed for logistic support.

(2) He also mentioned of mass returnees from Zaire and Tanzania. He explained that returnees were expected shortly from these countries.

(3) He further told the meeting that NGOs in his sector had expressed concern about the withdrawal of UN troops from the sector. He said the NGOs were very apprehensive.

h. Sector 6

(1) The Hum Offr said even though the humanitarian situation was slowly improving, there were still areas of concern. He further explained that the past week experienced erratic water shortage in Kigali and surrounding areas. Some areas of concern were:

(a) Increase in population in Kigali. He explained that the population of Kigali has increased over the past few months and this calls for increase in infrastructural services.

(b) Permanent Refugees at Ndera Transit Camp. He explained that there were 76 permanent refugees at the Ndera Transit camp. He said these refugees need to be resettle in the communes.

(c) Completion of Kabusunzu Primary School Latrines. He explained that the Force Engr Coy has dug pit latrines for the above named school but lack of poles/cement is hindering progress of the project. He therefore appealed for assistance to enable the project to be completed.

(d) Yatima Orphanage. He appealed for assistance for Yatima orphanage as it is in dire need of blankets and beds.

HAC SPECIAL PATROL BRIEF

11. The past patrol leaders gave a short brief on their respective patrols conducted. They indicated that they had submitted written reports to the DCHAO for necessary action.

HAC DATA BANK

12. The SO Comm said a database was being established at HAC. He explained he requires information from all Sec Hum Offrs for the data bank. He gave details of type of information required and further explained that he had already sent messages to all sectors

further explained that he had already sent messages to all sectors on the info required and said those who have not yet received the message could contact him in his office for copies.

13. The Hum Offr of Sector 3A wanted to know the priority of humanitarian activities in the country. He said humanitarian activities going on now depends on the initiative of the hum offrs. He further said he felt there should be a mechanism of which there would be priorities for humanitarian activities in the country.

CONCLUSION

14. The CHAO in his closing remarks, said HAC is not doing badly but there was more room for improvements. He urged Hum Offrs to continue working harder and also build good relationship with all those in their respective sectors.

15. He also charged all to take proper care of the scarce logistics available to them.

16. The meeting finally came to a close at 1145 hrs.

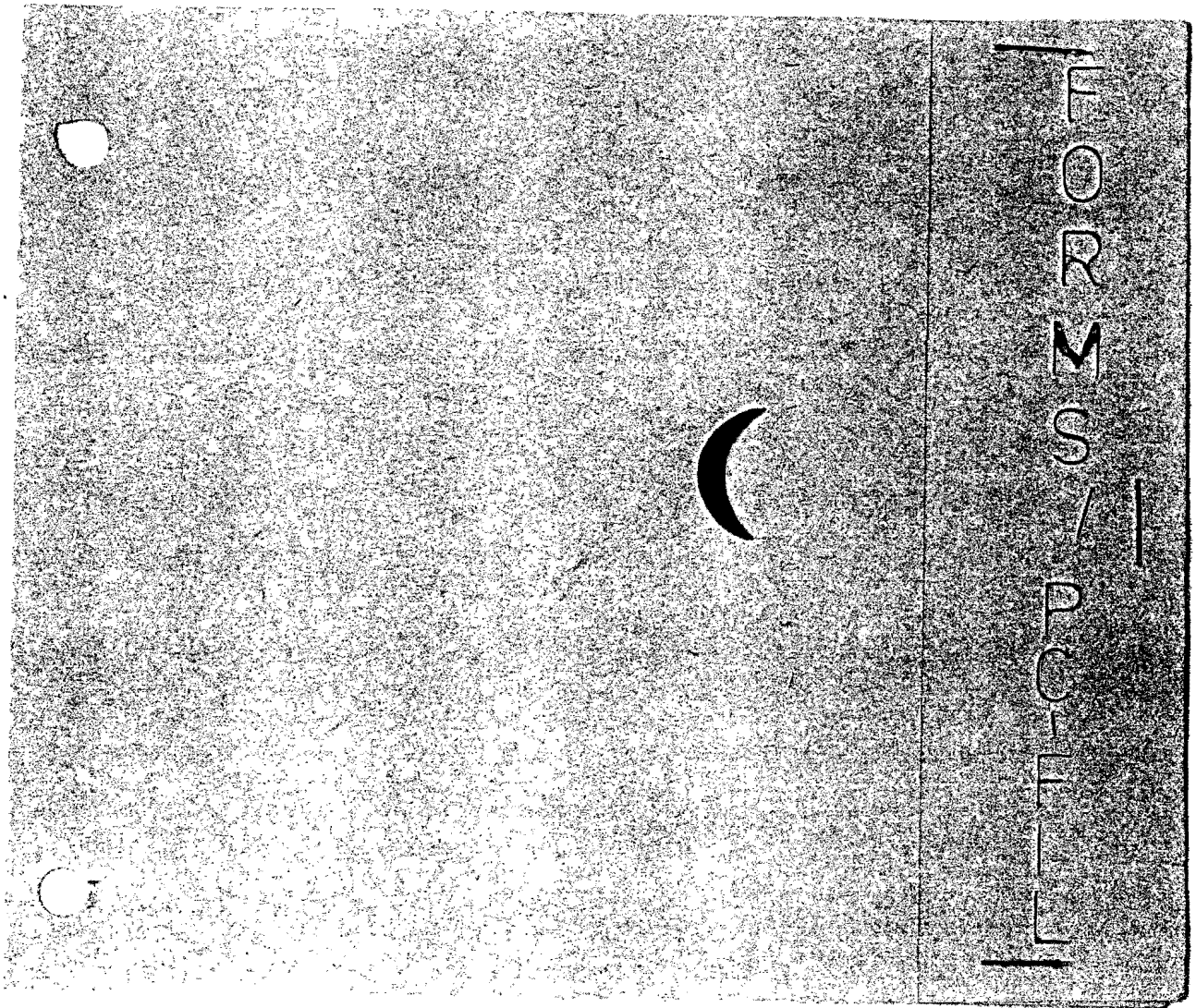

TO SECTOR COMMANDERS CONFERENCE GIKONGORO
JULY 1995

HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES

1. The following is the most important information collected by the MILOBS teams during the past two weeks:

- A. At Muganza (GR 8407) - Bourgermeister was presiding over land disputes at the commune office.
- B. At Ngoma (GR 9637) - Mr Semukungu Athanase was nominated as the new prefect of Butare Prefecture.
- C. At Kibayi (GR 8497) - Bourgermeister reported to have problems with accommodation, because returnees who had arrived earlier had occupied the houses of later arrivals. He also reported that he received returnees at an estimated rate of 90 (ninety) per day (from Burundi).
- D. At Niakizu (GR 5694) - Bourgermeister requests to repair the bridge at GR 601979. This was requested by the Humanitarian Officer by letter on 15 July 1995. HAC, the Force Engineer Team came from Kigali to recce the work on the bridge last 25 July 95.
- E. At Ndora (GR 8112) - Reburial of victims of the genocide took place on 15 July 1995 and was attended by the vice-president, state ministers and other authorities. For this day on behalf of the prefecture it was requested by letter dated 13 July 1995 to repair some kilometers of the route between Butare - Ndora. The work was made by the Force Engineers on 14 July 1995.
- F. At Kigembe (GR 7093) - Bourgermeister reported that all the sectors have organized centers for refugees (total 60 families). In this place they spend the night for their own security. He also reported having received 150-200 refugees per day. A total of 3242 refugees from Burundi were received from 13 June to 13 July 1995.
- G. Local authorities in Butare requested the use of our low loader to uplift their bulldozer from Gikongoro to Butare, any day this week. The request was made by fax to the Milob GP HQ on 24 July 1995, no answer yet received.
- H. All the problems, needs and requests received by the Milobs teams are treated at two levels. The first one is those requests that we can arrange with the local NGOs and the second one is those requests that are forwarded to HAC in Kigali because it is impossible to do it with local resources.
