
Please refer to your Code Cable 3558 inquiring about security for German CIVPOL.

1. As far as we have been able to ascertain, the complaint regarding security was made by Captain Bernhard Lenhard who is based in Cyanguu. He confirmed that he had made a report to his contingent leader about the situation in the area of his operation.
2. The security problem he had addressed concerned communication facilities with the Sector Headquarters. His hand set radio capability did not allow him access in case of emergency. Though the radio set installed in his vehicle had a wider range, he had requested to have a base radio installed at CIVPOL office. This has been done on 21 November 1995.
3. We also contacted Captain Sontowsky who is based in Gikongoro about security problems. He confirmed that he had written a report to his contingent leader about the security situation in his area of operation related to two landmine explosions and gun fights in the Nyunge forest. Apart from these incidents he had no further comments and considered everything else safe.
4. There has not been any further security report filled with us by German CIVPOL staff.
5. We hope this clarifies the points raised in your code cable.

SUBJECT: Security of CIVPOL personnel

1. As discussed, we have been approached by the Permanent Mission of Germany which expressed concern about the safety and security of its civilian police officers serving with UNAMIR. According to information received by the Permanent Mission, the UNAMIR CIVPOL teams in Cyangugu and Gikongoro have been without communications equipment for some time. The German authorities are therefore concerned that, in an emergency situation, these CIVPOL officers might be cut off and thereby exposed to undue security risks. The Permanent Mission has also expressed concern about the safety of its CIVPOL officers in Kigali who have apparently been the victims of a number of robbery attempts recently.

2. We would be grateful if you could look into the matter and advise us accordingly, to enable us to respond, as appropriate, to the concerns raised by the German Permanent Mission. Many thanks and regards.

4. Thank you for your cooperation.





1. Following the adoption of Security Council resolution 1029 (1995), we need to take immediate action to implement the new UNAMIR strength levels authorized for the final mandate extension ending 8 March 1994.

2. We would therefore appreciate receiving at your earliest convenience, your plans/timetable for the reduction of formed troops to 1400 and Milobs to 200. Moreover, since Security Council has not authorized the continuation of UNCIVPOL, we shall also need your plan for the closing down of that programme and the repatriation of the concerned personnel.

3. For your information, we have already received inquiries from troop contributors about our reduction plans and intend to convene a troop contributors' meeting early next week for that purpose.
