SUBJECT: DR. SIMONFAI - HUNGARIAN RELIEF ACTION.

1. On the 8th October, Dr. Simonfai called at the UNRRA Office, advising that he had been told by the Chief of Mission's Office (Colonel Ekserdjian) that the Bureau of Relief Services could assist him with a travel order for Trieste. He advised that a Priest whom he knew and who was a representative from Hungary to the Vatican had received such an UNRRA travel order in May. The writer explained that, in times past, individuals wishing to be repatriated among the D.P. groups had received UNRRA travel orders, but that this practice had been discontinued, nor had it ever applied to entrance to Allied Military Government areas.
2. Dr. Simonfai was advised to call at the Public Security Office of the Allied Commission regarding permission to enter the Venezia Giulia region. He explained that his trip was for the purpose of transporting bundles to Hungary and ensuring against black market thefts at the Italian and Yugo-Slav borders by Italian or Yugo-Slav guards.
3. The writer explained that this entire matter was quite beyond the competence of UNRRA, and that even UNRRA workers would require entry permits and travel orders from the Military to enter the 13th Corps area.

1. On October 3rd, Dr. F.SIMONFAI conferred with Mr. Sorieri and the writer regarding his wish to work in close co-operation with UNRRA Italian Mission and to receive UNRRA services of billeting, messing and transport in Italy. (Dr. Simonfai came to Italy in early May this year, and, upon presentation of a letter signed by Mr. Stanley Sommer of the UNRRA Hungarian Mission, has received UNRRA transportation and billeting. This arrangement was an informal one without formal agreement, arranged through the Chief of Mission's Office).

2. Mr. Sorieri explained that it would be necessary for Dr. Simonfai to prepare a letter outlining the scope of the activities of the Organization which he represents in Italy, and including mention of the specific services he wished UNRRA to provide. Mr. Sorieri explained that, upon receipt of this letter, UNRRA Italian Mission would be able to determine whether it would be possible, within the framework of UNRRA, for an agreement to be worked out between this Organization and UNRRA, and hence, whether UNRRA could continue to provide services for him and other representatives of the Hungarian Relief Action.

Dear White:

I attached a copy of a letter brought by Dr. Simonfai from Mr. Sommer, Chief of the UNRRA Hungarian Mission.

Dr. Simonfai is now in Rome and is proceeding with the arrangements for the collection of gift parcels in Italy for eventual transmission to Hungary. He is in the process of completing arrangements with the Italian Government whereby they will assist in the transportation of the parcels collected from the two collection centers of Rome and Milan to Trieste by rail. There will remain the problem of onward transportation from Trieste to Budapest.

Dr. Simonfai has written to the representatives in Trieste of the UNRRA Hungarian Mission and has asked for their assistance. He has also asked this Mission to write you and inform you of the position and to solicit your sympathetic consideration of any requests that may reach you in this connection.

In brief, the whole scheme seems to have the support of the UNRRA Hungarian Mission and of the Hungarian Government and, therefore, this Mission is being as helpful as it can to facilitate Dr. Simonfai's task. I am sure you will adopt the same attitude.

We are glad to have your letter of September 2nd written after sending us SVG 26.

We were certain that our letter of July 29th to Dr. Cavallier of Hungarian Red Cross would explain the reasons for the procedure that we follow. At the time the arrangements were made, International Postal Service was not open between Hungary and Italy, Austria and Germany, nor would ACC grant postal privileges to Hungarian Red Cross directly.

After receiving your SVG 26 we investigated further and found that International Post was opened between Hungary and Italy and Austria during August but not between Hungary and Germany. Hungarian Red Cross has been advised to use International Post to Italy and Austria and they are continuing to use our postal facilities for Germany.

It is therefore quite in order now for Italy and Austria to use International Post directly with Hungarian Red Cross, Baross-uca 15, Budapest, Hungary. However, Germany should continue to address tracing inquiries for Hungary to Tracing Section, UNRRA Budapest, APO 777, U.S. Army, as suggested in our cable 168 to London, repeated Arolsen Misc.28, dated July 27th.

SUBJECT: Interview with representative of Hungarian Repatriation Mission.

On 9th July, Mr. PAPP, who advised us that he represented the Hungarian Repatriation Mission, Via Vellini No.12 (telephone 82772), called at our office for an interview regarding problems of repatriation of Hungarian nationals.

Mr. Papp stated, in reply to our enquiry, that he was an official representative of the present Hungarian Government, accredited by the Allied Control Commission (including British, American and Russian) as a repatriation representative. He said that he was not representing a private organization.

Mr. Papp enquired whether UNRRA could assist in connection with the repatriation of persons of Hungarian nationality and ineligible for UNRRA care. We explained that this was impossible, but that we would be pleased to consult with him further after future consultation with the appropriate representatives of the Italian Government as to the best procedure UNRRA should follow in advising applicants of Hungarian nationality ineligible for UNRRA care wishing to be repatriated to Hungary. We stated, further, that it would be necessary for us to consult with the Military to determine what our official relationship should be to the Hungarian Repatriation Mission, and that in connection with eligible D.Ps of Hungarian nationality.

The writer explained general UNRRA Resolutions affecting displaced persons. At one point, Mr. Papp enquired whether UNRRA could not extend its repatriation assistance to include persons of Hungarian nationality ineligible for UNRRA care, but was advised that, under UNRRA Resolutions, this was impossible.

Mr. Papp advised that Movement Orders were no longer necessary through the British, French, American or Russian zones in Austria, and that the usual procedure in connection with repatriation now would be the procuring of Austrian or Yugo-Slav visas for return to Hungary. We explained that this would have to be cleared with the appropriate Military authorities before UNRRA could follow these procedures in connection with the repatriation of Hungarian eligible displaced persons.

It is suggested that we discuss our proper relationship with the Hungarian Repatriation Mission with the Military. It is further suggested that we might consult with the Italian Government about proper procedures to follow in the case of persons of apparent Hungarian nationality wishing repatriation but ineligible for UNRRA care.

25 May, 1945

A small delegation of the Committee of Free Hungarians in Rome, including also the Secretary General of the resistance movement, came to my office today, having been referred to me by mutual acquaintances.

They stated that a group of refugees, comprising eighteen women and forty-five men, have arrived from Hungary on foot, and most of them are now sheltered in Cinecitta'. According to their information, a larger number of Hungarian refugees may be expected soon. All of these were driven out of Hungary by the German Army while the bitter fighting between the Germans and the Russians was going on. Some of these cases are anti-Fascist refugees, others are doubtful. The Committee of Free Hungarians is screening all arrivals.

Although there is a certain degree of self-help among the Hungarian colony in Rome, they wanted to find out if UNRRA would supply some clothing and medicines. There is no need for food for the time being, because that is supplied in Cinecitta'.

I explained to these people that the only categories of Hungarians who might be assisted are those displaced by action of the enemy because of race, religion or activities in favor of the United Nations. I also told him that for the time being the problem is a small one, and the AC is well-equipped to take care of the needs of these refugees of Cinecitta'.

If the problem becomes too large, I advised them to submit a formal request for assistance to UNRRA, which would be given all possible consideration.

I tried to call in Sorieri or Ratay, but they were both tied up.
