Situation

1. There is a requirement of the sector boundaries to follow the prefecture boundaries and/ or natural features to the maximum extent possible, for ease of executing security and humanitarian ops. This fragmentary order lays down the new boundaries between Sectors 1 and 2.

Mission

2. GHANBATT and NICOY to adopt the new boundary of Sectors 1 and 2 with effect from 0800 hrs on 30 Jan 95.

Execution

3. General Outline. The concerned sectors will adopt the new boundaries for all security and humanitarian ops by 0800 hrs on 30 Jan 95.

4. Delineation of Boundary. Also refer Appendix A showing the new alignment of boundary between Sectors 1 and 2. It runs as under;

a. It bifurcates from the point GR (Grid Reference) 280962 and then runs East along the Southern bank of MUHAZI River to GR 380930 and GR 460953 and then Northwards along the Prefecture boundary through the National Park to the Tanzanian border.

b. The River is included to Sector 1 as the boundary runs along the Southern bank.

5. Coordinating Instructions. The boundaries will be adopted by 0800 hrs on 30 Jan 95.

**INSTRUCTIONS PERTAINING TO THE ROLE OF THE LIAISON OFFICERS  
TO THE MILOBS GP HEADQUARTERS**

1. The CIVPOL Liaison Officer to Milobs GP HQ is in charge of liaising between CIVPOL Headquarters and the Milobs GP Headquarters.
2. In this capacity, he cooperates closely with the Milobs operations room. He maintains a direct contact with the Chief Operations Officer and provides him with data about CIVPOL, finds out about the activities of the Milobs and receives their requests.
3. The CIVPOL Liaison Officer to Milobs has an office at the Milobs GP HQ with facilities of contact between CIVPOL HQ and all of the Kigali based Departments.
4. The Liaison Officer's office is CIVPOL's permanent branch at the Milobs GP HQ. This explains why the office meets with all visitors who wish to get in touch with CIVPOL and provides them with the necessary information.
5. The Chief of the Liaison team hold a register of messages in which all relevant events are recorded.
6. The Liaison Office operates daily from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
7. He collects CIVPOL's messages and does undertake for messages to be forwarded urgently.
8. He keeps MILOBS GP HQ Sitreps which he analyses for the Commissioner and points out to him any relevant feature.
9. For his own information, he checks a situation map posted in the service room.
10. The Chief of the Liaison team is obligated to respect the present instruction.

OFFICE PROCEDURES - FORCE STANDARD DISTRIBUTION LISTS

1. New Standard Distribution Lists for use within the military component of HQ are attached. Staff officers are encouraged to make the maximum use of these Lists as help ensure that no one is omitted from the distribution of any document and remove the chore of typing long distributions on each document produced.

2. The Lists must, however, be used sensibly. While they act as an aide-memoire for staff officers, they do not remove from them the responsibility of considering carefully who needs the information contained in the document under consideration. There is a balance to be struck if we are to ensure efficient and effective passage of information within the Force - those who need to know must receive the necessary information while those who do not have any interest in the subject do not want to be swamped with masses of paper which they have to read to decide whether or not they need the information it contains. We need, too, to remember that distribution of large documents on wide distributions is expensive in terms of paper, photocopying and the time of our too few clerks.

3. Standard Distribution Lists are flexible in their use, as the following examples demonstrate. If the appropriate Distribution List contains addressees who need a particular document, the Distribution on the document might read, for example, 'Lists A and B (less Serials 17 and 21)'. Similarly, the Lists can be used to cover a part of the total distribution of a document thus :

4. It is also possible to differentiate between Action and Information addressees using distribution lists, for example, if it is required to notify the military staff of HQ UNAMIR of some administrative point, but is intended that senior officers should also be aware, and as the matter impinges upon the civilian component of the HQ, the following might be used :

5. In the circumstances in which we find ourselves, any system of distribution lists must be dynamic. They will be reviewed regularly by my staff but addressees are invited to offer suggestions for additions, deletions or amendment to the structure of the lists.



ACCURACY IN REPORTING

1. Every day one or more units submit reports containing vague details of incidents. These types of reports raise more questions than they answer and necessitates someone chasing down the missing information in an effort to obtain an accurate report of the event.

2. The effort necessary to achieve the required detail can be minimized if duty and/or operations officers at all levels were to answer the following questions when they are preparing and receiving reports:

a. **WHAT** happened: a short accurate description of the incident, usually in the chronological sequence that the incident developed and concluding with what further action will be taken by the various people, unit(s) and agencies involved;

b. **WHERE** did it happen: the location of the incident should be as specific as possible but at a minimum the report must include the name of the closest community and the community's grid reference.

c. **WHEN** did it happen: the time of the incident and any significant action(s) within the incident should be identified preferably with a date/time group (ie 161420 Feb 95)

d. **WHO** was involved: the individual who made the initial report should be identified as well as anyone who was affected by the incident or took an active part in the incident. In identifying people, their full names should be given and any official title, position or rank included. For UN personnel, their UNID number should also be included to aid in identifying these people at a later date if necessary.

e. **WHY**: an explanation of the reason why the incident occurred. In providing this detail the source of the reason should be identified so that its credibility can be assessed. If the reason is unknown then any opinion expressed should be stated as such.

3. The UNAMIR Operations Duty Officers will be instructed to critically read all incoming reports against the above questions and to automatically seek clarification where points are unclear or unanswered. This however should be unnecessary if units observe the elements of reporting and remember that brevity should not be at the expense of clarity.

4. If reports continue to be received which do not include the above elements then we will insist on a proforma which provides the necessary details.

WEEKLY HUMANITARIAN REPORT FOR PERIOD 12 FEB TO 18 FEB 95

General Situation

1. The humanitarian situation within Rwanda continues to improve. The IDPs in camps in Sector 4A continue to leave from camps targeted by Op RETOUR however it would appear that many IDPs are moving to KIBEHO and NDAGO camps where food distribution continues. UNREO reports that ICRC will reduce food distribution in camps. Increased arrests continue to be reported in the Sector 3 area. Prisons throughout the country continue to receive new arrivals and are becoming severely overcrowded. A delegation of the Rwandan Parliament visited prisons throughout the country to assess needs.

HAC ACTIVITIES

2. The Cell performed tasked in support of Op RETOUR. A representative of the cell attended the UNREO weekly general meeting with NGOs. The HAC representative passed on security issues of concern to the representatives.

3. HAC sent a representative to a meeting in GISENYI concerning the possible eruption of volcanoes in Zaire.

4. One patrol was conducted during this period. The patrol was a joint effort of HAC, UNREO, the IOC Op RETOUR, the Ministry of Rehabilitation and Ministry of Defence. The patrol visited RUNYINYA, MARABA and MBAZI communes. An HAC patrol report will be forwarded to FHQ, UNREO and Sector 3.

Sector 1

5. Milobs report that ADRA has initiated a seed distribution programme at NGARAMA. UNREO to note.

6. GOAL Ireland has ceased assistance to health centre in MUKONDO due to financial constraints.

7. The bourgmestres of GITI GR 234021, TUMBA GR 9614 and BYOGA communes reported to Milobs that the commune requires seed distribution, food and farming equipment. Milobs continuously have such reports from certain communes in Sector 1 area. UNREO requested to liaise with WFP to include communes in present seed distribution operation.

8. HAC spoke with IOM head of mission concerning the requirement for transport assets to assist in the movement of returnees in the Sector 1 area. Head of Mission told HAC that Rwandese Government does not want IOM or UNHCR to conduct this operation at present time. The reason for this would appear to be that the returnees are from 59/60 and are unsure of where to go however this was not confirmed by the Government. IOM head of mission will contact UNHCR to review the matter and re-negotiate with Government to conduct operation in the future.

#### Sector 2

9. 28 members of the Rwandan Parliament visited the prefecture.
10. Farming tools were distributed to locals in RUKIRA commune GR 6658.
11. GHANBATT transported IDPs and refugees to their homes in the Sector from the ORCs.

#### Sector 3

12. Milobs in Sector 3 report that the communes of MURE GR 5762 and GAKO GR 9052 require medical assistance and farming tools. The water system in GAKO also requires repairs. UNREO to note.
13. Milobs report that there are 60 abandoned orphans in the area. UNREO requested to liaise with UNICEF.
14. MALAWICOY provided transport to WFP to move food from BUTARE to ROSATINA, NYABISINDU and MUYIRA communes.

#### Sector 4A

15. MURAMBI IDP camp reported empty of IDPs.

#### Sector 4B

16. Medical equipment used by FRAFBATT was turned over to the Prefet of KIBUYE.

#### Sector 4C

17. ETHIOBATT transported 65 IDPs from RUSUZI 1 (GR 7624) to NYAGATARE transit camp and provided escort to UNHCR transporting 336 IDPs in Sector 4C area.
18. Milobs attended a rehabilitation conference with RPA to discuss the return of refugees from ZAIRE.

#### Sector 5

19. Milobs provided escort for 2 convoys of 208 returnees to their home communes in KABAYE GR 4906 and SATINSYI GR 5900, 2 convoys of 308 returnees to NGORONGERO GR 5995 and one convoy of 560 returnees to their homes in SATINSYI GR 5800.

20. Milobs reported that the Bourgmestre of KARAGO commune GR 4516 reported that 4400 returnees of 59/60 have been resettled in GAKAGARA GR 4921, NANGA GR 4219, RUMBURA GR 4514 and MWIYANIKE GR 4617. UNREO to note.

21. WFP trucks attempting to bring food from GISENYI to GOMA were looted by the local population of GISENYI. UNAMIR and RPA intervened and trucks were evacuated from the scene. RPA shot and killed two of the looters.

22. The IOC was approached to have TUNBATT vehicles involved in Op RETOUR returned to GISENYI to assist WFP in distribution of humanitarian aid. Tac HQ will inform TUNBATT and Milob Sector 5 HQ when trucks are released.

#### Sector 6

23. INBATT patrol distributed 7 educational packages to TARE GR 8910 and 4 packages to GIKORO commune GR 3786.

24. INBATT repaired the approach road to the NDERA way station, restored the water supply and dug latrines for the IDPs in transit.

#### Op Retour

25. Op RETOUR continued under the direction of UNREO. 2,154 IDPs were moved by vehicle during this reporting period. A total of 37,560 IDPs have been moved since the commencement of the operation.

26. UNAMIR Contingent medical personnel treated 4,790 Rwandan citizens.

27. AUSMED treated 177 Rwandan citizens at CHK.

#### HAC PLANNED ACTIVITIES

28. Patrols will be sent from KIGALI to the Sector 2 area to assess the Op RETOUR procedures at the home communes. A patrol is also planned to GISENYI. HAC will continue to provide patrols in support of UNREO and the IOC Op RETOUR as requested.

THE DANGER OF UNAMIR'S SKIRTS AND BISCUITS

Friends, Brothers, youth, ladies and gentlemen of Rwanda . We, all of us, know the worst moment which our country comes from, moment which has dived a whole nation into an ocean of killings mixed with sorrow and anguish . Yes , Rwanda was bereft of an uncountable number of his people that God himself knows the true number .

However, those responsible for these crimes are all known , unless one pretends to ignore them so that the truth may be hidden-which would be a useless way of seeing things !

We must go on seeking the truth ! Now is the time to say goodbye to all these ignominious facts, so that what we have gained nowadays may be saved for ever .

To make Rwanda be away from its sadness, every Rwandese must do his best . This shall be interesting when foreigners come to us for help and add their forces to what we have already done for ourselves . Thanks are, in advance, presented to them .

We must however define the help should not reduce him to the fact of begging or asking . It must not change our girls and women into prostitute nor make our young boys change into grabbers .

The help we need is that of making a Rwandese know to use his own energy . Thus living according to his own means, in evaluating and in esteeming things at their true values , as our culture has always educated him a long time ago . It goes without saying that the true help will be something new which will make him morally and physically grow well .

What makes us be nervous here in Kigali is to see that most of our young girls wear short skirts that common people call "Mpene barimbuke". Sometimes these skirts may be long but able to let an opening showing their rear . It may also be tight, which makes them look like a ball full of air . These are "UNAMIR's skirts" and are unfortunately taken for granted. We noticed it every evening and night around our street lights where unconscious passers by shout at them "A la MINUAR " .

We should be ashamed of this seemingly accepted behaviour. Parents cry over days and nights but there is no change . Instead, they are mocked and misunderstood by those girls and by all those who tolerate such way of living even if it is destroying our society .

If in Kigali, we speak of UNAMIR's skirts, in Kibuye Prefecture or even in all other places where French soldiers through "Opération turquoise " have been, phrases like "Blanc biscuit ? Blanc biscuit ..." Are heard . It means "white man, give us biscuit " .



All along the road you pass by , that is the song that can even destroy your ears. Young men and girls coming from distant hills fall down and stand up in chows to ask biscuits.

The UNAMIR's car is driven at speed of 10 Km per hour because of the children running in front of it, arms in air as a priest reading his mass in a church.

The givers of biscuits throw them out of their car and assist joyfully to the struggle for life as if it is the only means they can use to distribute this insulting way of help.

Why, if UNAMIR wants to give biscuits, can it not gather all these young in one place or follow them at their homes instead of making them run after their car as if they are playing with animals at the Zoo ?

Dear reader, this kind of help that makes children run after a car, this kind of help that makes our girls take rides in the cars on which it is written UN, UNAMIR, UNHCR and many other writings difficult for us to understand , is unheard of .

Do not forget that this girl you are with into your car could have been studying if wrongdoers had not destroyed her class. Keep in mind that the ten dollars you give her today makes her come tomorrow. Once more we do not need this kind of help !

Fortunately all our girls do not follow this way of doing . However, she who follows it must be stopped. She is also a Rwandese. She should be prevented with all her friends who , together, destroy our new society.

We think it is what we have fought for when we said goodbye to the wrongdoers of the former government. We think it would be good to ask the new destroyers of our society to go away. We emphasize those who show wrong ways to our youth by practices which are far from our normal way of living .

If all the ladies and gentlemen of Rwanda think of it, our Rwandese values are to be restored .

THE VISIT'S PURPOSE WAS TO EVALUATE THE NEEDS OF THE JAIL, AND TRY TO GENERATE INTEREST AMONGST NGO AND UNREO TO



PARTICIPATE IN IMPROVING THE INFRASTRUCTURE. A GRAVE SITUATION EXISTS AND UNAMIR MAY HAVE TO PLAY A LEADING ROLE IN PROVIDING THE SOLUTION.

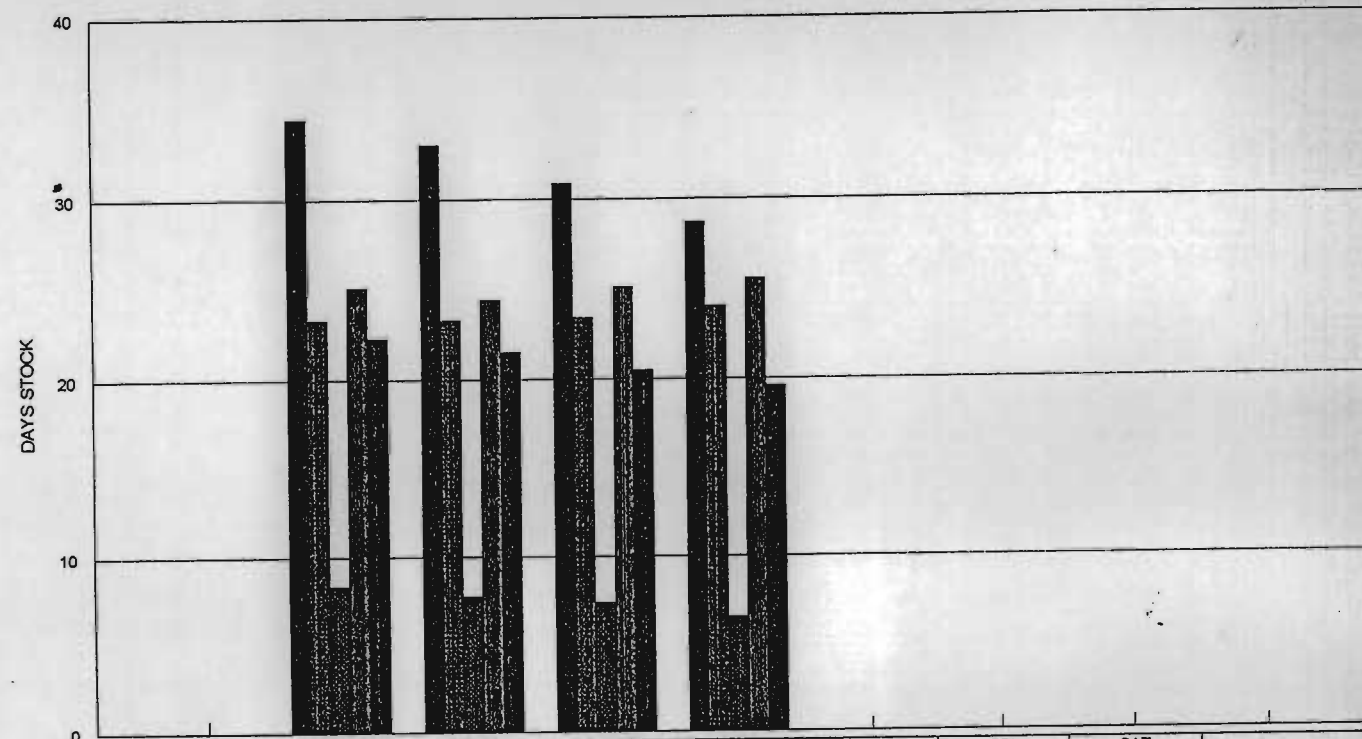

1. GEN SITUATION.

A. THE MILITARY SITUATION IN RWANDA CONTINUES TO BE UNDER CONTROL.

B. IN SECTOR 4C, MASS GRAVES IN KIRAMBO AND GATARE COMMUNE WERE DISCOVERED WITH BODIES APPROXIMATED AS FOLLOWS; HANIKA CHURCH GR 0946, 3000 CORPSES; BUNYAMANZA CHURCH GR 0947, 100 CORPSES; BITABA CHURCH GR 0948, 175 CORPSES AND TIAZO GR 0442, BETWEEN 50 - 60 CORPSES. THE MASS GRAVES DATE BACK TO THE PERIOD OF THE WAR.

2. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES.

A. THE SRSG, AMBASSADOR KHAN, HELD CONSULTATIONS WITH THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE, MR NKUBITO. DURING THE MEETING, THE SRSG INFORMED THE MINISTER THAT THE UNITED NATIONS AND THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY WOULD MOVE AS RAPIDLY AS POSSIBLE TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO THE RWANDAN JUDICIAL SYSTEM AND ALSO HELP TO IMPROVE THE SITUATION OF OVER-CROWDING IN RWANDA'S PRISONS. IN ADDITION, THE SRSG INFORMED THE MINISTER THAT THE DEPUTY PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE IN KIGALI HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED.

B. THE SRSG MET MAJOR-GENERAL PAUL KAGAME, VICE-PRESIDENT AND MINISTER OF DEFENCE. DURING THE MEETING, THEY DISCUSSED THE SUCCESS OF THE GENEVA ROUND TABLE CONFERENCE AND THE IMPORTANCE OF CHANNELLING FUNDING EFFICIENTLY TO ENSURE THE PROMPT EXECUTION OF PROJECTS. IN ADDITION, THE TWO EVALUATED THE SIGNIFICANCE AND POSSIBLE CONSEQUENCES OF THE OAU/UNHCR REGIONAL CONFERENCE IN BUJUMBURA. THE VICE-PRESIDENT EXPRESSED HIS APPRECIATION FOR THE SUPPORT THAT UNAMIR AND THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY IS GIVING TO RWANDA AND ASSURED THE SRSG OF HIS GOVERNMENT'S CONTINUED COOPERATION. THE SRSG BROUGHT UP THE NEED FOR COORDINATED ASSISTANCE IN THE JUDICIAL SECTOR AND ALSO THE NEED FOR AN ENHANCED AND EFFECTIVE INFORMATION STRATEGY TO FACILITATE THE RETURN OF REFUGEES AND DISPLACED PERSONS TO THEIR HOMES. IT WAS AGREED THAT THE RECENTLY ESTABLISHED RADIO UNAMIR WOULD HELP TO DISSEMINATE CORRECT, FACTUAL INFORMATION. THE VICE-PRESIDENT UNDERLINED THE IMPORTANCE OF INDIVIDUALS SUSPECTED OF PARTICIPATING IN THE GENOCIDE BEING BROUGHT TO JUSTICE. HE EXPRESSED HIS HOPE THAT THE INTERNATIONAL TRIBUNAL, AS WELL AS THE RWANDAN JUDICIAL SYSTEM, WOULD BE ABLE TO DISPENSE JUSTICE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

C. THE SRSG AND MS. KAGAME CONDUCTED A SITE VISIT TO THE HOUSING PROJECT FOR WHICH THE GOVERNMENT IS REQUESTING UNAMIR'S SUPPORT.

D. AMBASSADOR KHAN HELD DISCUSSIONS WITH H.E. AMBASSADOR DE CONINCK OF BELGIUM TO EXCHANGE VIEWS ON, AMONG OTHERS, THE POLITICAL CLIMATE IN RWANDA AND BELGIUM'S PROGRAMME OF ASSISTANCE TO RWANDA.

3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES.

A. RPA.

(1) MILOBS IN SECTOR 3A REPORTED THAT RPA HAVE ARRESTED AN ALLEGED INTERHAMWE IN KIGEMBE COMMUNE (GR 7093). HE IS ALLEGED TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR SEVERAL ACTS OF BANDITRY IN THAT AREA. HE IS CALLED CYANGA AND SAID TO BE OPERATING WITH OTHERS FROM A CAMP IN BURUNDI. INVESTIGATION IN PROGRESS.

(2) MILOBS IN SECTOR 4C REPORTED THE CONTINUOUS

ARREST OF SEVERAL PERSONS BY RPA IN THAT SECTOR.

B. FRGF. NTR.

C. MILITIA. NTR.

4. OWN MILITARY ACTIVITIES.

A. FORCE HQ.

(1) NORMAL MILITARY ACTIVITIES WERE CONDUCTED.

(2) THE FC MET THE AIRPORT MANAGER TO DISCUSS AIRPORT OPERATIONS AND UNAMIR SUPPORT. SOME PROBLEM AREAS EXIST BUT THE OVERALL COOPERATION BETWEEN UNAMIR AND AIRPORT AUTHORITIES IS GOOD. FURTHER DIRECTIVES TO UNAMIR AIR OPERATION SHOULD EASILY CLARIFY ANY DIFFICULTIES. LATER HE MET MR BERNARD DUSSAULT FROM CIDA CANADA TO DISCUSS THE EVOLUTION OF RWANDA TOWARDS NORMALISATION. AT THE END OF THE DAY HE MET THE SRSG AND THE DFC TO DISCUSS INTERNAL POLICIES.

(3) THE ARRIVAL OF THE SENEGALESE CONTINGENT WAS DELAYED DUE TO DIPLOMATIC DIFFICULTIES. NO SOLDIERS HELD PASSPORTS, AND THEY WERE NOT ALLOWED TO LEAVE THE AIRPORT. IT TOOK THE PERSONAL INTERVENTION OF THE FC TO THE VICE PRESIDENT TO OBTAIN THE RELEASE OF THE CONTINGENT. THE REST OF THE CONTINGENT DEPLOYMENT HAS BEEN PUT ON HOLD IN SENEGAL, UNTIL PASSPORTS ARE ISSUED. UNNY AND THE POLITICAL AUTHORITY WILL HAVE TO REVIEW THE STATUS OF MISSION AGREEMENT, IN ORDER TO HAVE THE GOVERNMENT RESPECT IT. IN THE MEANTIME ALL DEPLOYMENTS SHOULD BE PUT ON HOLD UNTIL CONTINGENTS ISSUE PASSPORTS TO THEIR MEMBERS.

B. SECTOR 1 (NICOY).

(1) CONDUCTED PATROLS AND SY DUTIES IN AOR.

(2) AT GASEKE THE BOURGEMESTRE INFORMED NICOY PTL OF MINE FIELD AND UXO DEVICES IN THE AREA. AT THE COMMUNE HQ, THE STAFF MENTIONED THAT THEY HAD NOT RECEIVED ANY SALARIES SINCE OCT 94. THEY FURTHER STATED THAT ONLY TEACHERS HAD BEEN PAID. NO THREAT TO SY AND ILLEGAL ARREST WAS REPORTED.

(3) PTLs TO GITUZA MET NGOS RENDERING MEDICAL ASSISTANCE TO LOCALS AT THEIR HEALTH CENTRE. CIVIL WORKERS HAVE RESUMED WORK FULLY IN ALL THE OFFICES VISITED.

(4) THE FOLLOWING NGOS RENDER HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE IN THE SECTOR, AMREF- CLINIC IN BUYUGA, CARITAS - CLINIC IN MEYANZA AND CARE INT - DISTRIBUTING FARM TOOLS AND SEEDLINGS THROUGHOUT THE



SECTOR. THERE IS NO POWER SUPPLY TO BUYUGA DUE TO DAMAGE OF AN ELECTRIC POLE.

C. SECTOR 2 (GHANBATT).

(1) CONDUCTED PTLs AND SY DUTIES IN AOR.

(2) AT ABOUT 220015B FEB 95, A LOCAL FROM RWINUME GR 2463 REPORTED AT OWN TPS MED POST AT RILIMA WITH THREE GUN SHOT WOUNDS ON THE LEFT SHOULDER AND CHEST(RIGHT). BULLETS USED SUSPECTED TO BE 7.62MM. VICTIM WAS TREATED AND REFERRED TO RILIMA LOCAL HOSPITAL IN GASHORA COMMUNE. TPS AT RILIMA DESPATCHED TO VILLAGE TO CONFIRM PERPETRATORS AND REASON FOR THE ATTACK. INVESTIGATION IN PROGRESS.

(3) RPA CONTINUED ROUTINE DAY AND NIGHT, FOOT AND MOBILE PATROLS AND MANNING OF CHECK POINTS.

(4) PTLs CONDUCTED TO GASHORA AND KANZENZE COMMUNES REPORTED AREAS CALM EXCEPT AT RUNDU GR 5974 WHERE PTLs FROM KIBUNGO WERE TOLD BY RPA SOLDIERS NOT TO GO BEYOND MENTIONED VILLAGE BECAUSE IT WAS A RESTRICTED AREA. 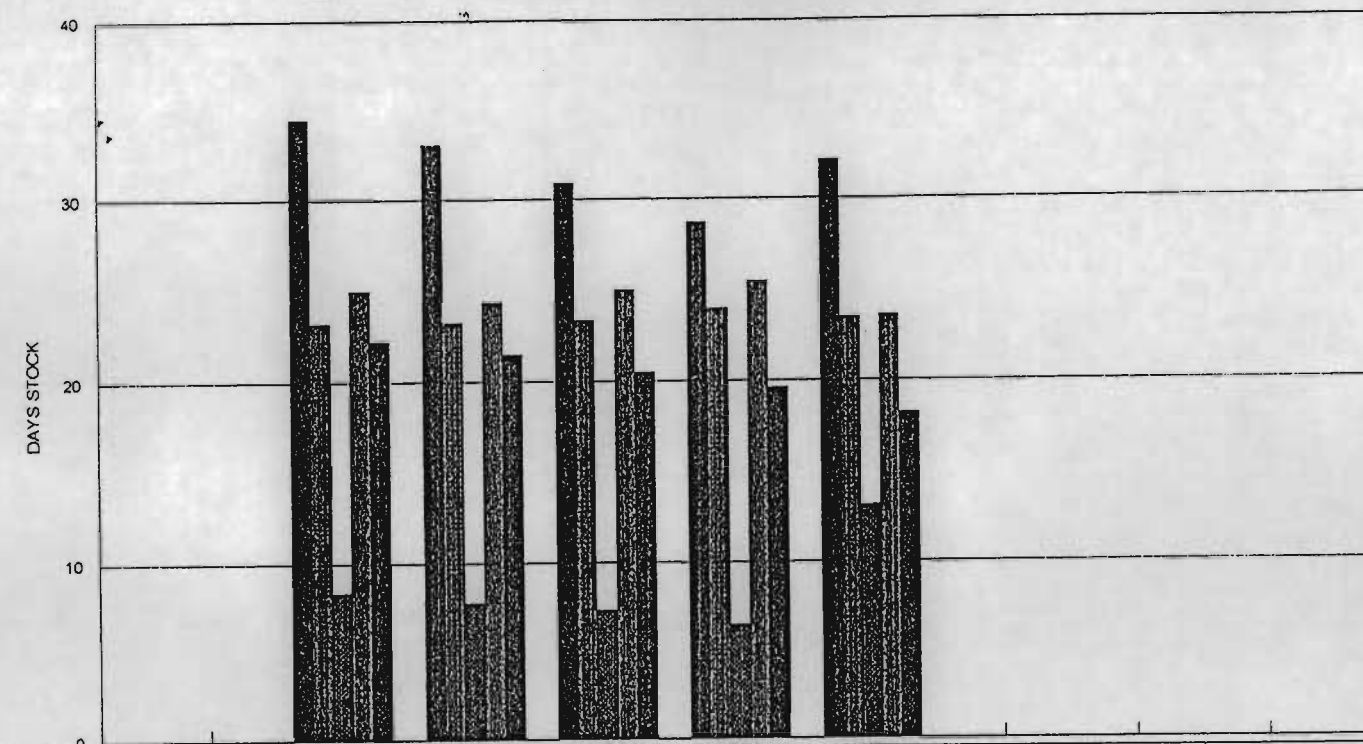




