2. MOVEMENTS. None.

3. SPECIAL ACTIVITIES.

The special distribution of milk, sugar and cereal has been discontinued, as a Day Nursery for the children has been opened by the Welfare Dept. A special lunch is fed to the children from one to seven years of age and also to prenatal patients who are over four months pregnant.

4. CAMP HEALTH.

The camp health is excellent. The skin infections continue to be the chief problem, although they are fewer than they were four weeks ago. Since the last report, there have been 5 cases of gonorrhea, one of syphilis and one of chicken pox. Every effort is made to trace the source of the venereal diseases.

5. NUTRITIONAL STATES.

Since the last report, a food supplement has been granted by U.N.R.R.A. Among other foods, additional milk is given to young children and women over four months pregnant. The diet is not well balanced, being too high in calories and too low in calcium and Vitamin A. But no nutritional diseases have been observed, and, considering the general shortage of food in Europe, no complaints can be made.

Lieut. Buschlin manages the inoculations, F.F.I. examinations, and makes follow-up home visits. Miss Linder assists with the inoculations and F.F.I. examinations and gives nursing service in the clinic.

13. FOOD & KITCHENS.

A special kitchen has been started for the Russians, as well as a special diet kitchen for those who cannot eat the regular foods and who need a blander diet. An oven has been added to the Central Kitchen.

14. F.F.I. inspections are made on all new arrivals at the time of Registration, before they receive their blankets and ration tickets. 201 New Arrivals were examined, 12 cases of lousiness were found and 59 cases of scabies.

15. MEDICAL SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT.

An adequate supply of drugs is now on hand, all obtained by "scrounge" from the Army.

16. Inoculations of new arrivals against Typhoid and Typhus has been continued. Sufficient Typhus Vaccine was received during the month, but there is still no small-pox vaccine. 42 Mantoux tests were done on children between the ages of 6 months and 14 years, inclusive.
17. Miniature chest X Rays were done on approximately 1100 of the refugees by an X Ray team from Rome. The results have not yet been reported.

Our Italian Nurses appear to be settling down to life in Leuca very well and I think our exchange of nurses with Di Bagni will prove beneficial.

Miss Ramponi, Italian Nurse, replaces Miss Pilitu in the Maternity Ward. The new Italian Nurses after a few days duty in Hospital, have shown willingness to learn.

MOVEMENTS: Miss Levine went to Rome.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES: Serg. Clay with his job is helpful to the Hospital. The patients get now more rest in bed, because they are kept busy in various kind of work.
Moving picture in the big ward of the Hospital. The patients are very pleased. A photographer took a picture of the patients in the ward.

PATIENTS STATES: No patients are seriously or dangerously ill in Hospital at present.

PREVALENT DISEASES: Many patients come from other camps sick from pleural effusion: They are kept in the Hospital and we discharge them in about 40-60 days. I try to keep them as long as possible because I know that in the Hospital it is easier for them to get well cooked food and a bed.
After arrangements made by Major Brakeley, 6 patients were sent to Lecce Sanatorium.
Patients arrive in Hospital as emergency cases of surgery: in one hour they are in the operating room.
The common diseases of emergency are appendicitis.

DENTAL SERVICE:

Satisfactory for the patients sick from common diseases:
Unsatisfactory for people sick from T.B. If it is not possible that these patients go for dental treatment to Leuca, then the Dentist should come to the Hospital. We keep T.B. patients in Hospital for months, and we cannot help them when they need a special treatment. That is an important point for the improvement of a patient.

HOSPITAL:

- 1) Duty-room converted in dressing room: comfortable for the patients who are in the Hospital and for the patients that come from other camps. Comfortable for the Doctors.
- 2) Big lamp fixed in the operating room: Furniture in the operating room painted white: Cabinet in anti-operating room for all instruments, we need for operations.
- 3) Shelter in the front of the kitchen and at the back of the Hospital: good and useful during rainy weather for workmen, and for the Ambulance car.

1. Personnel - Major Grace Field and Captain Field were assigned to Rome for transfer - October 27.
Miss Esther Detweiler was transferred to Leuca and Miss Dorothea Mead was sent as replacement Nov. 10. Medical Technician. Miss Guiseppa Ramponi was replaced by Miss Maria Pillitu. The exchange was to and from Leuca. Hospital nurse. Refugee personnel continue to render invaluable help. Due to repatriation and the need for replacement there is still considerable change in aid personnel for the hospital and the M.I. rooms.
2. Movements - Oct. 23 Capt. Togasaki left for Gambelluca, Sicily, as escort for infant being returned home. She also took leave following this and returned Nov. 3 for duty.
14 Ambulance trips were made to Leuca with patients.
3. Special Activities: The hospital aides are now taking active part in more responsible duties and are allowed to do minor treatments and pass medicines. Their training has been continued and Lt. Gobel has spent much time with them. The same has been done in the M.I. rooms thru Miss Di Brincat.
4. Camp Health: There have been a few cases of fever undiagnosed in which all physical findings have been negative. Fever lasts about ten to eight days and spontaneously subsides. The predominant infection continues to be deep abscesses or generalized and extensive scabies secondarily infected. Very often with impetigo. It is interesting to note that many of these are the ones who leave camp ^{for a week} and more, having taken very little care of themselves while away, due to lack of facilities.
5. Nutritional State: The supplementary rations allow for more satisfaction from the camp population. At present a plan is being considered to allow for special diets where the doctors consider it necessary.
6. Inoculation State: Since Nov. 7 inoculations have again been started for typhoid and typhus. Because of the geographical problem and scattering of the population in this area, the Kibucos have been first approached. The records previously kept have been so utterly confused that I am able only to give a report of the work done since Nov. 7.

By the next monthly report the complete record of the population should be ready.

7. Patient State: Beginning Nov. 12 the M.I. rooms have been open for treatments only in the mornings, both in Santa Croce and Santa Maria. The afternoons have been devoted to inoculations and special clinics as well as to FFI examination.

8. Prevalent Diseases: See Camp Health.

9. Camp Clinics: Since Nov. 13 Prenatal and well baby clinics are held once weekly for Santa Croce and for Santa Maria. Five rheumatic hearts were found among a total of 41 patients and one with congenital heart.

10. Dental Services: In addition to the extractions and fillings, Dr. Fiel has started to do dental examinations on all new arrivals at the time of the FFI.

11. Hospital: Patient load average has slightly increased to about an average of twenty daily.

Because of the type of hospital building it has been impossible to control the loss of linen. In spite of infinite care on the part of the hospital staff, towels, sheets and pillow cases, as well as the few half dozen diapers we have, are continuing to disappear.

The kitchen is in need of repairs since the rain continues to flood the floor.

The problem of water supply and sewage disposal remains as ever the same.

12. Nursing Services: See Nursing Supervisor's Report.

13. General Sanitation: No report.

14. Food and kitchens:

15. Disinfestation: See report of Public Health Nurse.

16. Medical Supplies and Equipment: With the stores now at Leuca it has been much easier to obtain needed stores. We have been able to obtain needed supplies but the staff continues to exercise great economy in the use of medication.

17. General Comments: The supplies of rations for the hospital have been coming more regularly than before and the food and soap has been adequate. Rations still continue to have a large percentage of damaged lots from such items as eggs and potatoes.

The Ambulance continues to have poor tires and must still make frequent trips to Leuca several times a week.

Personnel. There has been a distinct problem with one of the Italian nurses due to her attitude of superiority and resentment. As usual the fault comes from both the refugees and herself.

However, this has been discussed in detail with her and the sides in the past few days and we hope that a suitable adjustment can be made on both sides and that no radical changes will be necessary.

With the onset of rainy and cold weather the women, especially the pregnant women, ask for warm clothing. The answer has been that until we receive some we cannot distribute. It is hoped that clothing will be allowed for them. Last year, it seems that a certain fuel allowance was given to each house in the form of charcoal. It seems that there is no such this year. Therefore, it seems even more urgent that warm clothing be provided.

Added to the above is the fact that many people must live in houses in which the windows are partially lacking, and many are still without beds. These factors are mainly due to lack of supplies and materials for repair.

Subject - Report of activities of nursing staff - Nov. 1945.

Giuseppa Ramponi, an Italian, was transferred to Leuca Hospital on the 10th of November, and Maria Pillitu arrived here from Leuca the same day. Miss Pillitu acquainted herself with the hospital in a very short time. She has proved to be very capable and reliable.

After the loss of three refugee nurses aides, we started the training of three new persons. They have at present completed half of their training. The five senior nurses aides, who have been at the hospital since the opening of the hospital, are now working on shifts, during which they are in complete charge of the Hospital.

In the past Miss Guerra was having much difficulty in her relationship with the refugee nurses aides. This attitude towards them appeared to be a feeling of resentment and superiority. At present we are trying to clear this by further explanation of our purpose here, "Teach the refugees to care for themselves". We hope that this situation will clear itself here at the camp, as Miss Guerra is very capable of the nursing service required.

1. M.I. Rooms: Attendance in M.I. rooms has greatly decreased as a result of scabies campaign, however, abscesses continue to be very prevalent as well as impetigo and dermatitis. //
2. Disinfestors: Our much needed disinfestors began to function at the end of October, and this factor has been responsible for cutting down in half our attendnace in the M.I. rooms. All blankets of entire Kibucs are being disinfested as well as clothing and bedding of scabies-infected persons. The disinfestors function twice to three times a week. //
3. F.F.I. Still working on F.F.I.'s of Kibucs. Considerable number of scabies are found as well as pediculosis. A general inspection of the dwelling is made following an F.F.I. treatment for skin conditions made, and disinfestation is done the following day.
4. Prenatal and Infant Welfare Clinics: Combined prenatal and infant welfare clinics are being well attended, even during inclement weather. The nurse sees to it that each baby has all necessary diapers, etc.
5. Inoculations: Since arrival of vaccine, typhoid and typhus inoculations have been started for different large groups. Sad to relate the attendnace and cooperation have not been all that could be desired. //
6. Inspection of New arrivals to camp: New arrivals, unless they arrive in large numbers, are directed to the M.I. room in Di Bagni for medical inspection. Treatments and D.D.T. dusting is done when indicated. The issue of blankets is made without the medical certificate of examination.
7. Home Visits: Home visits are made in cases of sick calls and prenatal and infant welfare, as well as visits of home inspections.

SANITATION OFFICER FOR SANTA CESAREA AND TRICASE, AND FIVE DAYS LATER
TOOK OVER FROM LT GLASS.

NEITHER OF THE CENTRES WERE CLEAN THOUGH AT SANTA CESAREA THERE
WAS A SMALL SANITARY SQUAD DOING A LITTLE IN THE WAY OF LATRINE WORK
AND STREET CLEANING. TRICASE, WHICH I WAS TOLD HAD NOT HAD MUCH SUPERVI-
SION ON ACCOUNT OF SHORTAGE OF STAFF, WAS DIRTY EVERYWHERE. THERE A FEW
SANITARY MEN SEEMED TO BE GETTING NOWHERE, FOR WANT OF EQUIPMENT AND
GUIDANCE.

IT WAS MY OPINION THAT A LARGER AND BETTER EQUIPPED SQUAD WAS
NECESSARY AND EXPRESSED THIS VIEW TO THE CAMP MANAGER. HE AT ONCE AGREED
WITH THE RESULT THAT BOTH SQUADS WERE INCREASED IN NUMBERS AND ALSO GIVEN
MORE BROOMS, RUBBISH BINS, DISINFECTANTS, AND CLEAR INSTRUCTIONS OF WHAT
WAS REQUIRED OF THEM.

THE SANTA CESAREA SQUAD NOW NUMBERS 12 UNDER A LEADER WHO IS
A VERY GOOD MAN. AT TRICASE THERE ARE THE SAME NUMBER.

NOT ONLY HAS IT BEEN EXPECTED OF THE SQUADS THAT THEY DO THE
REGULAR DAILY SANITATION WORK AND STREET CLEANING, BUT THERE HAS BEEN
MUCH WORK TO DO THE CLEARING AWAY OF RUBBISH AND HEAPS OF EMPTY TINS FOR-
MERLY JUST THROWN DOWN ANYWHERE.

EACH SANITARY SQUAD HAS A DEPOT FROM WHICH IT OPERATES + HAS
A CERTAIN NUMBER OF TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT; THERE ARE ABOUT 50 GARBAGE CANS
IN EACH CENTRE AND AT SANTA CESAREA TWO SMALL ITALIAN CARTS CARRY THE
RUBBISH TO A DUMP. AT TRICASE THERE ARE NO REGULAR CARTERS COLLECTING THE
RUBBISH AND THEY ARE DEPENDENT UPON A TRUCK GOING ROUND WHEN ONE CAN BE
SPARED. THE RESULT IS THE BINS ARE TOO OFTEN LEFT FOR TOO LONG PERIODS
BEFORE BEING EMPTIED. A RECENT VISIT TO TRICASE SHOWED A VERY MARKED IM-
PROVEMENT IN CAMP CLEANLINESS.

SPECIAL ATTENTION HAS ALSO BEEN GIVEN TO KITCHENS. I HAVE
ASKED FOR AND RECEIVED SOME APRONS FOR THE COOKS AND HOPE TO IMPROVE
UPON THIS AS APRONS ARE MADE AVAILABLE TO ME. THERE IS A NEED FOR
LAUNDRY ARRANGEMENTS FOR WASHING THESE, WHICH IS BEING LOOKED INTO WITH
THE MANAGER AND WORKSHOPS SUPERVISOR.

THE BIG KITCHEN AT HOUSE NO. 18 IS IN NEED OF SOME URGENT
ATTENTION. E.G. A SMOKE STALK FROM ONE OF THE OVENS IS IN A BADLY
DAMAGED STATE AND NEEDS RENEWING. THIS, I AM TOLD, CAN BE DONE BY
REPLACING THE OLD ONE WITH A COMPARATIVELY NEW STALK FROM TRICASE.

A NEW KITCHEN WOULD BE THE ANSWER TO THE KITCHEN PROBLEM
HERE, BUT I CONSIDER THAT WITH A FEW REPAIRS AND ADJUSTMENTS IT COULD
BE MADE DO THE JOB WELL ENOUGH FOR THE WINTER. THE COOKS NEED RUBBER
BOOTS OR WOODEN SHOES TO KEEP THEIR FEET DRY, AND SOME PAIRS OF WOODEN
SHOES ARE BEING MADE BY A COBBLER IN CAMP. A SMALL NEW KITCHEN IS NOW
BEING BUILT TO ACCOMMODATE THE ORGANISED YOUTH OF THE CENTRE WHO WILL
EAT CENTRALLY IN A NEIGHBOURING HOUSE.

SUPPLIES OF SANITARY TOOLS, DISINFECTANTS, ETC, ARE ON
THE WHOLE BETTER THAN AT FIRST THOUGHT, BUT AM LOOKING INTO THIS AND
THERE ARE SOME THINGS THAT I NEED.

AT TRICASE THE TWO NEW KITCHENS BUILT IN THE SUMMER HAVE,
WITH DIFFICULTY ON ACCOUNT OF SCARCITY OF WOOD, NOW ALMOST BEEN COVERED.

AN URGENT NEED THERE IS ALSO THE INSTALLATION OF A HEATING
SYSTEM FOR THE SHOWER BATHS. PIPING, DIFFICULT TO FIND FOR SUCH A JOB,
HAS NOW BEEN GOT, AND THE WORK CAN PROCEED.

SEVERAL INSPECTION VISITS CAME TO CAMP AND HOSPITAL ~~FROM~~ HOSPITAL
 ACCOMMODATIONS WERE FOUND TO BE VERY GOOD AS REGARDS CLEANLINESS
 MANAGEMENT AND ATTENTION TO PATIENTS. S.M.O. HAD SEVERAL MEETINGS
 WITH CAMP POLICE CHIEF IN ORDER TO BE ABLE TO KEEP VISITORS ~~FROM~~
 COMING OUT OF VISITING HOURS. PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE IN THE MATTER.

4. CAMP HEALTH

THE HOSPITAL HAS BEEN CROWDED DURING THE MONTH OF OCTOBER OWING
 TO THE MANY NEW ARRIVALS BEING IN A POOR PHYSICAL HEALTH. BUT
 HEALTH CONDITIONS ARE IMPROVING STEADILY OWING TO ABUNDANCE OF FOOD.
 PREVALENT DISEASES ARE ESPECIALLY PLEURISY AND SKIN DISEASES. IN
 HOSPITAL 35 NEW ADMISSIONS, BUT THERE WAS NEVER ANY EMPTY BED OWING
 TO THE NATURE OF DISEASES OF LONG DURATION: AS CHEST AND SKIN AFFECT-
 TIONS.

THERE WAS TO REGRET THAT OWING TO UNSATISFACTORY HEALTH CONDITION
 OF SOME BARBER SHOPS A BEARD INFECTION OF IMPETIGINOUS NATURE COULD
 SPREAD OUT.

THOSE SHOPS WERE REPORTED FOR ACTION TO THE LOCAL JEWISH COMMITTEE.
 ADEQUATE DESINFECTION HAVING BEEN ORDERED AND CLOSURE OF SHOPS
 FOR TWO DAYS.

HAPPILY NOW IS THE DISEASE WELL UNDER CONTROL.

AS THE ACTUAL FEEDING OF REFUGEES HAS BEEN MUCH INCREASED SINCE
 ARRIVAL OF JEWISH REFUGEES NUTRITION IS GOOD IN SPITE OF COLD

IT IS TO REGRET THAT THE FORMER DENTIST HAS TAKEN WITH HIM ALL NECESSARY INSTRUMENTS FOR FILLING AND TOOTH CARIES TREATMENT. THE NECESSARY INSTRUMENTS WILL BE PROVIDED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE BY CENTRAL MEDICAL AUTHORITIES, INCLUDING DENTAL ENGINE AND LABORATORY INSTRUMENTS.

DR. DESZŐ WAS ASSISTED BY DENTIST ASSISTANT FEDDER JULIUS WHO CLAIMS TO HAVE DENTAL MECHANICS EXPERIENCE.

11. HOSPITAL.

THE JEWISH NURSES WHO REPLACED THE YUGOSLAV NURSES ARE WELL TRAINED; SPECIALLY BERNSTEIN IDA, VERY ABLE HOSPITAL ATTENDANT WHO HAS HAD TEN YEARS EXPERIENCE IN HOSPITAL UNDER POLISH AND LATER UNDER GERMAN MEDICAL SUPERVISION AFTER HAVING FIRST GRADUATED IN NURSING SCHOOL. SHE IS EFFECTIVELY AND VERY SATISFACTORILY TRAINING HER JEWISH STAFF. HOSPITAL ATTENDANCE SERVICE IS WELL UNDER CONTROL AND ACTING WELL.

IT IS HOPED THAT OUR PATIENTS WILL BE ABLE TO PROFIT THIS HOMOGENEOUS STAFF AS LONG AS JEWISH REFUGEES WILL BE RESIDENTS IN OUR CAMP OWING TO THE NECESSITY OF SPEAKING GERMAN AND UNDERSTANDING THEIR PECULIAR MENTAL REACTIONS.

UNFORTUNATELY DURING THIS MONTH JEWISH NURSE BAGNO, ALISA, HAS LEFT FOR PALESTINE AND SO FAR, HER SUBSTITUTE IS STILL MISSING.

SOME VERY ILL PATIENTS HAVE BEEN RECOVERED IN HOSPITAL: PNEUMONIAS - PLEURESIS AND DYSSENTERY AND OTITIS MEDIA WITH HIGH TEMPERATURE. ALL CAME HAPPILY TO GOOD HEALTH.

HOSPITAL KITCHEN INSTALLATION ARE DEFICIENT AND WORN OUT. MEASURES ARE IN ACTION TO REMEDY THE SITUATION.

14. FOOD AND KITCHENS.

FOUR OPERATING: ONE FOR ORTHODOX AND THREE FOR NON ORTHODOX.

- 10) Dental clinic: No camp clinic; emergencies are sent to S.Cesarea.
- 11) Hospital. No hospital in camp, cases are sent to Leuca and S.Cesarea.
- 12) Nursing service; Mrs Brattesani assists Dr. Maier with the inoculations and F.F.I. examinations and follows up with house visits. Miss Clauser assists with the inoculations and gives nursing service in the clinic.
- 13) Sanitation. Fair. We find it necessary to have more latrines and a hot water supply. See sanitary ingeneers report.
- 14) Food and Kitchens. Food supplies are good. there are only two kithens in the camp and they are in very primitive condition; steps are being taken to improve them. It is also planned to start a diet kitchen for pregnant women, children, old people and those whom the doctor may consider unfit for the normal diet.
- 15) Disinfestation. No disenfestation station as yet. We hope to have provided adequatly in the next few weeks; in the meantime cases still go to Cesarea.
- 16) Medical supplies. Adequate.
- 17) Remarks. Inoculation of new arrivals againts typhoid and typhus are continued as the camp is not full and there are new arrivals daily. The first inoculations gave us no difficulties but we foresee that the second batch will prove diffucult as the people object to having more shots, having had so many in other camps. Unfortunately the refugees have no records, so we insist on completing imunisations.
