(2) Mine Anti personnel - 1

2. Explosive contents still active.

3. This brings to quantity eight (8) the number of unexploded ordnance retrieved pending authority for disposal action.

GENERAL

1. Reference A determined that a Quick Reaction Force of company size was required as a reserve for UNAMIR to react to a threatening situation or to reinforce other UNAMIR forces, anywhere in the country.
2. The quick reaction force is a UNAMIR Force Reserve and as such will be trained, equipped and available for employment anywhere in Rwanda on a 24\7 basis.

AIM

3. The aim of this operational directive is to provide operational guidance for the composition, role, tasks and capabilities of the Quick Reaction Force (QRF).

COMPOSITION

4. The QRF will be based on a company of infantry from RUTBAT, not to exceed 125 all ranks. The QRF, due to the skills it will require will be a permanent tasking for a company of RUTBAT. The QRF, as it is the Force Reserve, will be a Force asset that will be deployed only on order of the Force Commander, or if he delegates, to a subordinate commander.

ROLE

5. The role of the QRF is to be the Force Reserve, capable of reacting, to any situation, within its capabilities, anywhere in Rwanda.

TASKS

6. The QRF will be trained, equipped and capable of conducting any of the following tasks, anywhere in Rwanda:

- a. Demonstrating overwhelming force in critical situations.
- b. Reinforcing other UNAMIR forces.
- c. Escorting, transporting or extracting VIPs or own troops through or out of any danger zones.
- d. Breaking through or crossing obstacles.
- e. Crowd control operations in the DMZ.
- f. Blocking an advance by either party on areas like the CND complex or the airport.

TRAINING

7. As the QRF may be required to conduct a wide range of tasks, it must be in a state of constant training and readiness. Training will concentrate on developing command and control, simple battle drills, effective SOPS, navigation in Rwanda and mobility skills for the tasks outlined in para 6. A weekly training schedule will be forwarded to the Force Chief Operations Officer on a weekly basis, for review by the Force Commander.

8. It must be emphasized that operations may have to be conducted at night, therefore a high training emphasis must be placed on conducting the tasks in para 6 at night.

9. As the tasks and the nature of the QRF demand mobility a high standard of maintenance training of vehicles must be constantly emphasized.

10. The QRF must be familiar with all the major routes and centres in Rwanda. Special training in navigation and familiarization with Rwanda must be conducted.

11. Special skills like fording APCs, night helicopter operations, helicopter navigation etc must be conducted when the resources are available.

PRIORITY OF WORK

12. The QRF will develop in the following manner:

- a. Training up to company level in the tasks outlined in para 6.

- b. Development and publication of battle drills for the tasks outlined in para 6.
- c. Development and publication of Standing Operating Procedures.
- d. Conduct reconnaissance of likely deployment areas with priority on the CND Complex, the Airport etc.
- e. Development and publication of contingency plans for likely deployment areas.

CONDUCT OF TASKS

13. The QRF must be capable of deployment by wheeled APC and/or helicopter anywhere in Rwanda. Movement by APC from Kigali to anywhere in Rwanda should take a maximum of 6 hours and to anywhere within the KWSA in 1 hour. Movement by Helicopter from Kigali to anywhere in Rwanda should take a maximum of 1 hour and to anywhere within the KWSA in 10 minutes. The QRF may be deployed in whole or in part. It will not be deployed in less than platoon strength. It will only be deployed on order of the Force Commander, or if delegated, to a subordinate commander.

14. States of Readiness. The QRF will be on states of readiness as outlined below. Despite the states of readiness for the remainder of the company, drivers and crew commanders for the APCs will always be available for emergency escort taskings. They will however, not be deployed with the remainder of the company without adherence to the states of readiness. The QRF will be tasked from Force Headquarters in the normal warning and orders formats.

15. The states of readiness for the QRF are:

STATE	ACTIVITIES
QUEBEC ROMEO FOXTROT STAND DOWN	8 HOURS NOTICE TO MOVE. UNAMIR GREEN STATE OF ALERT. ALL MAINTENANCE AND TRAINING CONTINUE AS NORMAL. LEAVE AS PER NORMAL. NORMAL EMPLOYMENT OF QRF PERSONNEL AS PER DIRECTION OF CO.

QUEBEC ROMEO FOXTROT STANDBY	4 HOURS NOTICE TO MOVE. UNAMIR YELLOW STATE OF ALERT. NO MAJOR MAINTENANCE OF VEHICLES TO BE UNDERTAKEN. NORMAL TRAINING AND ROUTINE TASKS ARE PERMITTED. TROOPS MAY REST. LOCAL LEAVE IS RESTRICTED. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS CHECKS ARE CONDUCTED.
QUEBEC ROMEO FOXTROT STANDTO	2 HOURS NOTICE TO MOVE UNAMIR RED ALERT STATE UNIT ASSEMBLED TO MOVE. COMMANDERS STANDBY FOR ORDERS. LOCAL LEAVE PROHIBITED. USE OF QRF PERSONNEL OR VEHICLES FOR OTHER TASKS PROHIBITED.

SERVICE SUPPORT

16. A review of the necessary communications, night vision, protection and other equipments is to be conducted by the CO RUTBAT

and submitted through Kigali Sector Commander to the Chief Operations Officer before 15 March 1994.

17. Once approved, Chief Logistics Officer is to initiate demands and maintain continual followup until the items are provided.

CONCLUSION

18. The QRF is the Force Reserve and as such will not be pennypacketed away on normal or routine tasks. It will only be deployed when and where its shock effect, mobility, firepower and presence will ensure the best possible results in a threatening situation.

19. CO RUTBAT is tasked to ensure this force is ready for operations as soon as possible and he is to report its readiness to the FC, through Kigali Sector Commander on a frequent basis.
