AGREEMENT  
ON HUNGARIAN REFUGEE RELIEF IN AUSTRIA

With a view to providing adequate relief for refugees from Hungary during their stay in Austrian camps, the Federal Ministry of the Interior on the one hand and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (hereafter briefly referred to as High Commissioner) and the League of Red Cross Societies (hereafter referred to as League) on the other hand concluded the following agreement :

1. From 1 March to 30 June 1957, the League will provide, on its sole responsibility and at its own expense, food (2,400 calories per head per day), clothing, and medical care for all refugees who, following events in Hungary, have crossed the Austrian frontier since 23 October 1956, and are being sheltered in Austrian camps.

Moreover, in view of existing needs, the League will try to further the interests, talents, and work of refugees remaining in Austria for some time to come, by adequately planning and carrying out various occupational, educational, and recreational programmes, as far as resources permit. These programmes will be planned and carried out in agreement with the competent Austrian authorities.

In principle, the cooperation of other relief organisations in the execution of such occupational, educational, and recreational programmes will be welcomed. However, in view of securing the necessary coordination, it can only be accepted with the agreement of all three parties concerned.

2. The list of camps for which the League has provided or will provide food, clothing, and medical care as well as occupational, educational and recreational programmes, can be altered at all times, as can the refugee capacity of any given camp, by mutual agreement between the contracting parties.

3. The League will reimburse the Austrian Republic for any outlay made by the Federal Ministry of Interior after 1 March 1957 in the camps listed by mutual agreement, for food, clothing, and medical care, as a result of the non-fulfilment of the present agreement.

On the other hand, the Austrian Republic will reimburse the League for any outlay caused by the non-fulfilment of duties undertaken by the Austrian Republic in the present agreement.

4. In the camps maintained by the League under clauses 1 and 2, all cooking installations and other equipment necessary for its services will be made available to it free of charge, insofar as the competent Austrian authorities are entitled to dispose of them. As soon as the League discontinues the services provided for under the present agreement, it must return the equipment which has been entrusted to it in good order to the competent Austrian authorities.

The present agreement does not include the camps of Stadl-Paura, Enns, and Ebelsberg, which had no kitchen equipment when taken over by the League.

Similarly, all stocks of food, clothing, and medical supplies available at the time these camps were taken over by the League will be handed over to it free of charge by the competent Austrian authorities, insofar as the latter have the right to dispose of them. Upon termination of its activities, the League will hand over all stocks of the aforesaid categories remaining in the camps in good order to the competent Austrian authorities.

5. The League will establish the services it considers necessary for the fulfilment of its engagements. These services will be placed under the exclusive authority of the League.

The rooms necessary for the discharge of these services will be placed at the disposal of the League. As far as possible, space for these services will be found inside the camps.

6. It is agreed between the contracting parties that all camps indicated in the enclosed list will be placed under the authority of the competent Austrian administration and that the activities of all organisations and agencies working in these camps will be subject to Austrian Law.

7. In order to obtain smooth cooperation between all organisations and agencies associated in the running of camps for Hungarian refugees, the following division of responsibilities has been envisaged by mutual agreement :

(a) In connection with its obligation to provide food and clothing for Hungarian refugees in these camps, the League will (at its own expense), take charge of all details of domestic economy in relation to these responsibilities.

(b) Medical care as provided by the League will include only *first aid* and care of patients not requiring hospital treatment ; under the present contract, all other medical treatment including specialised and dental care as well as the provision of protheses of every kind, spectacles and other medical apparatus for refugees will be the responsibility of the competent Austrian authorities.

Medical treatment given by the League will be confined to refugees in camps. With regard to sanitary measures, it is agreed that, as concerns persons, they will be taken by the League's medical staff and assistants. All other sanitary measures, such as the disinfection of buildings, the construction and maintenance of washrooms and water-closets in sufficient number, will be the responsibility of the Austrian administrative services concerned.

(c) All matters of an official or administrative nature will be dealt with by the Austrian camp authorities. Their responsibilities will in particular include :

All police matters in connection with the refugees and camps, including the admission and registration of refugees, the guarding of the camps, and all other matters pertaining to public safety ; transportation of refugees on arrival and departure ; equipment and maintenance of camps and provision of lighting, water, and fuel for the whole camp area, including kitchens, store rooms, offices, and quarters of Red Cross personnel, as well as all rooms needed for carrying out the "occupational, educational, and recreational programme" ; and the recruitment of voluntary workers from among Hungarian refugees living in the camps.

8. The High Commissioner will have the right to visit camps run by the League and to check the use made of the funds he has provided for this purpose.

9. The contracting parties agree to settle between themselves all problems resulting from the present agreement as well as cases not provided for under the present agreement.

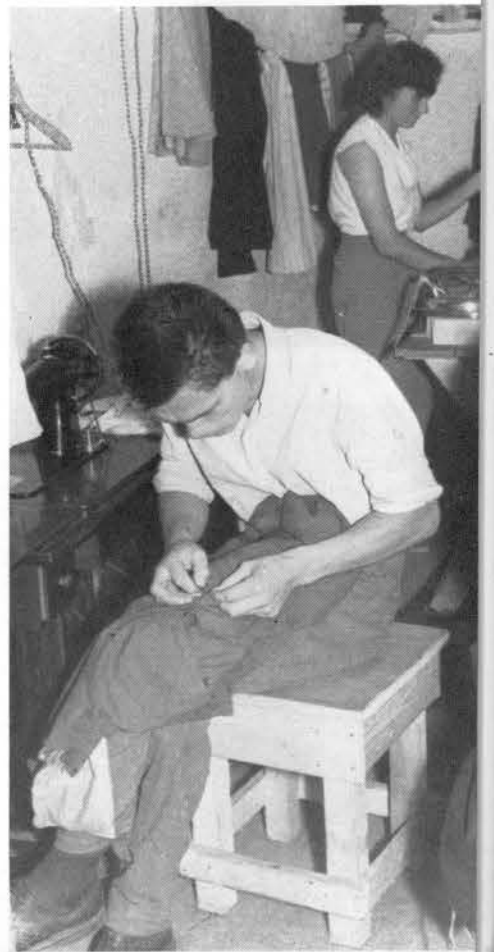


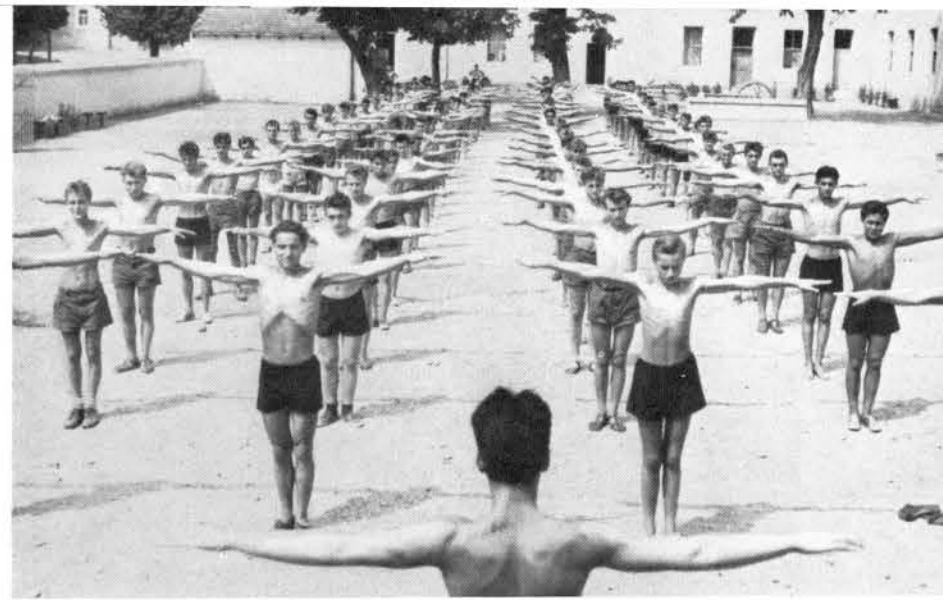


The Yugoslav Red Cross undertook to provide feeding, clothing nursing and welfare services for all refugees...

In Yugoslavia emigration was long delayed and many returned to Hungary

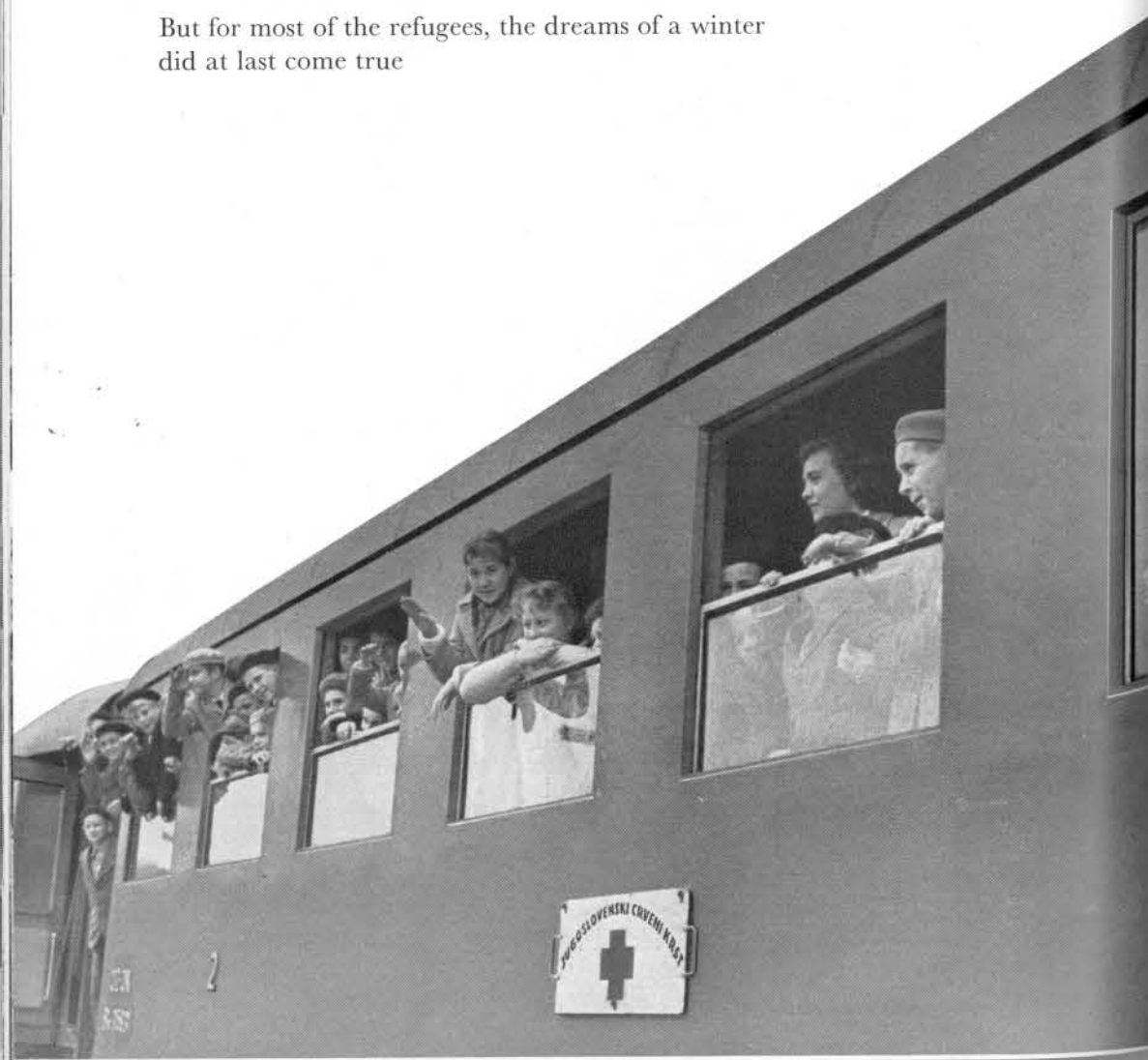

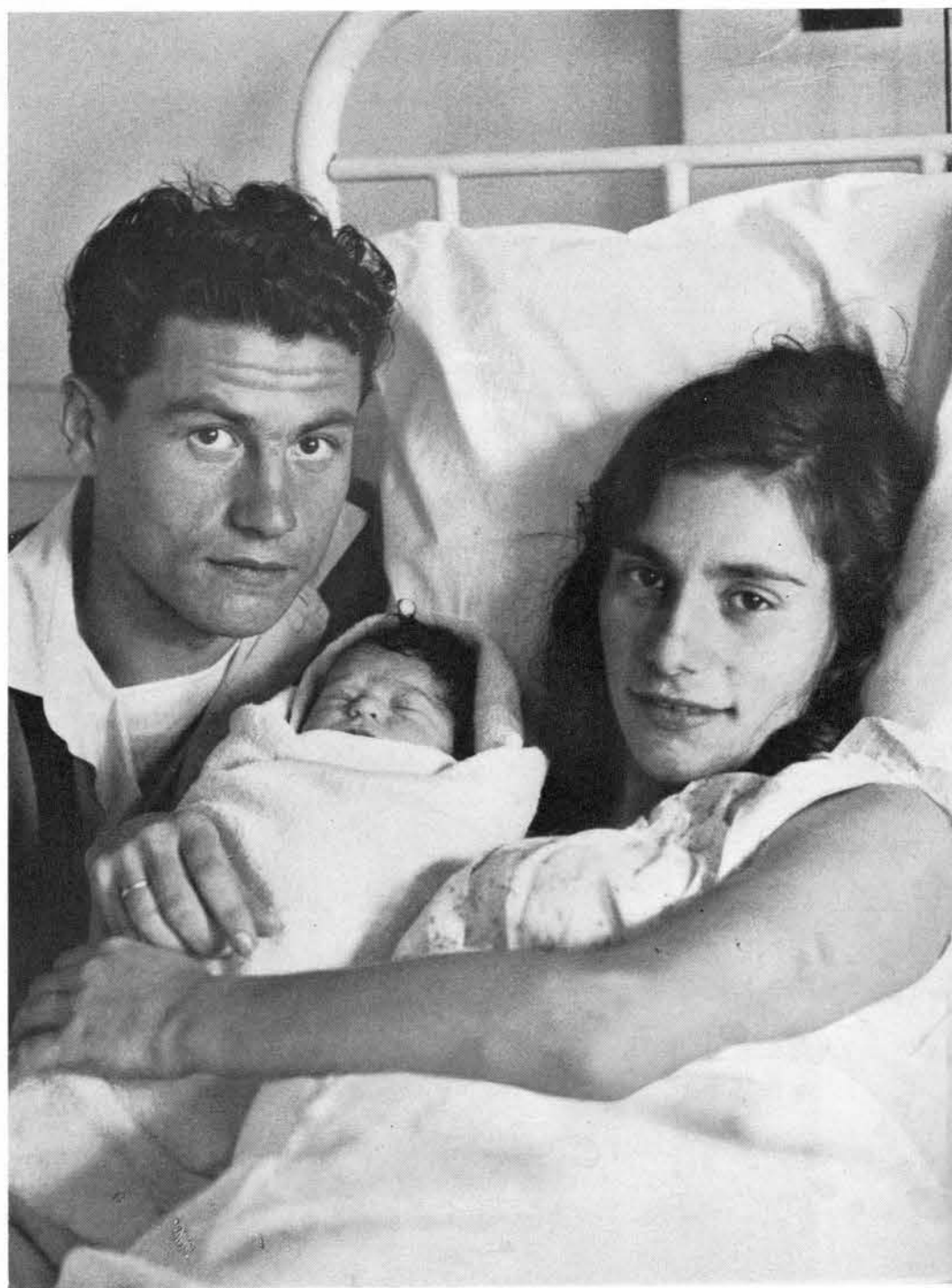

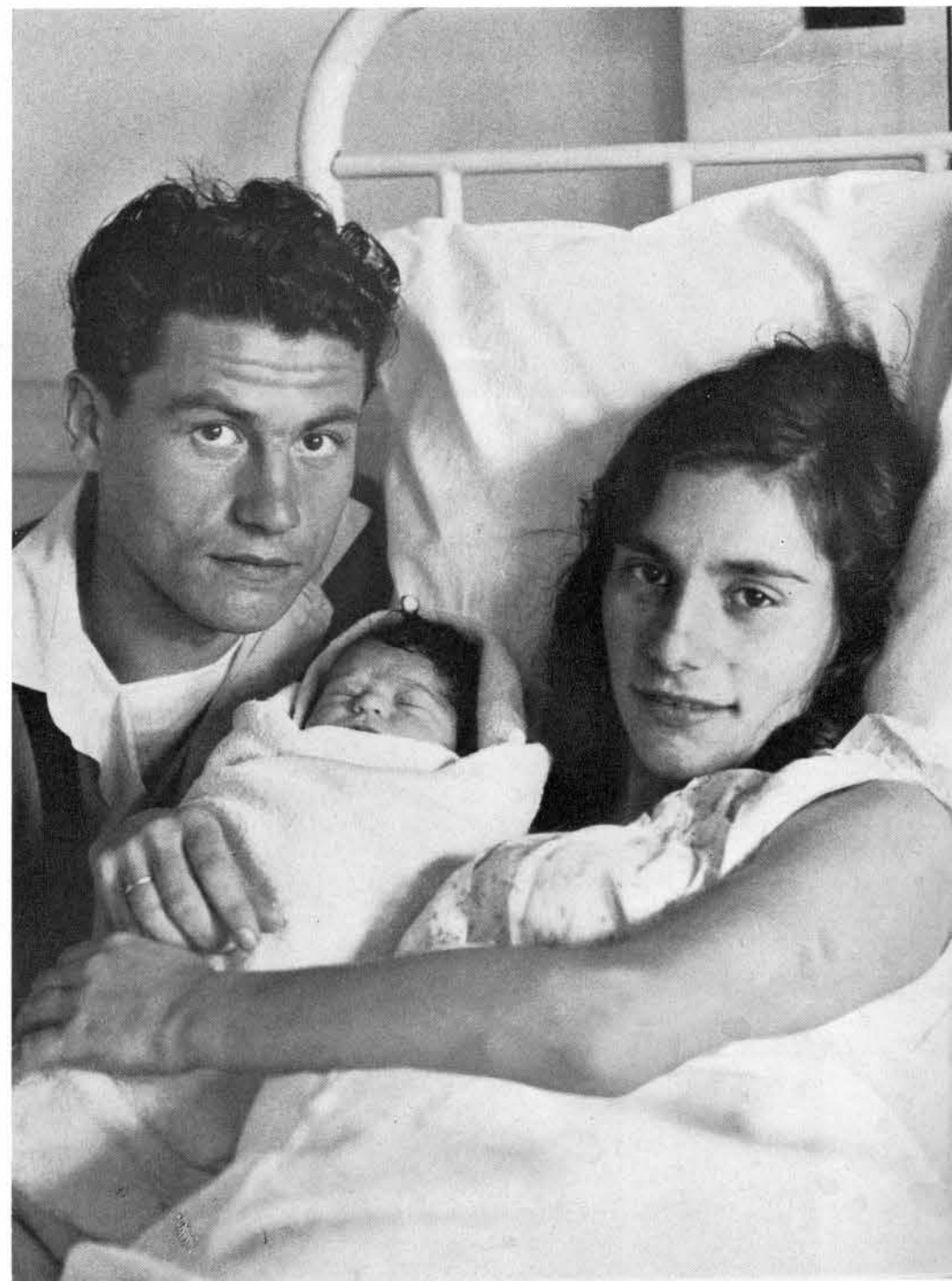

Indonesian Government

1. The Programme shall be carried out under the terms of the agreement between the International Committee of the Red Cross and the Hungarian Red Cross Society, dated 27 June, 1957.
2. The gift of the Indonesian Government consists of:
  - 3,000 Kg of tea
  - 2,100 Kg of coffee
  - 12,033 Kg of sugar
3. The distribution shall be made in accordance with the attached distribution schedule of the Hungarian Red Cross to hospitals, welfare institutions, special schools, infants homes, creches, apprentices' hostels and the Remedial Gymnastics Institute.
4. The goods, on arrival at the station of destination, will be handed over by the ICRC with a collective delivery note to the Hungarian Red Cross. For its part, the HRC undertakes to obtain receipts for the goods from the responsible final recipients. These receipts shall form an integral part of the Programme.
