- 1.- With effect from 1 July 1961, the Office of Chief Refugee Relief Coordinator is renamed Economic Relief Coordinator. The responsibilities of the office are enlarged to include the management functions of providing assistance in economic situations where relief measures are required.
- 2.- Mr. Frederick W. Teoby is appointed Economic Relief Coordinator, effective 1 July 1961.
- 3.- The functions of the Office of Economic Relief Coordinator are as follows:
  - a) Centralization of all requests for economic relief action received from field offices and elsewhere; systematic presentation of such requests to the Economic and Financial Policy Group; and carrying out the decisions taken, to the extent that management procedures are involved;
  - b) Formulation of plans of action for relief projects, under policy direction of the Chief of Civilian Operations, and with technical guidance of the Consultants and Technical Advisers;



- c) Coordination of relief action in ONUC with the Administrative procedures of Government, to the extent necessary to accomplish the relief measures authorized by the Chief of Civilian Operations;

1.- With effect from 1 July 1961, the Office of Chief Refugee Relief Coordinator is renamed Economic Relief Coordinator. The responsibilities of the office are enlarged to include the management functions of providing assistance in economic situations where relief measures are required.

2.- Mr. Frederick W. Tooby is appointed Economic Relief Coordinator, effective 1 July 1961.

3.- The functions of the Office of Economic Relief Coordinator are as follows:

- a) Centralization of all requests for economic relief action received from field offices and elsewhere; systematic presentation of such requests to the Economic and Financial Policy Group; and carrying out the decisions taken, to the extent that management procedures are involved;

The two memoranda sent us by Sir Alexander are beautiful examples of what could be done in the way of preventing economic collapse - if only we had the necessary forces to provide security. The only answer to these requests is apparently the one given by the Secretary-General, we do not have the troops to ensure individual protection.

It is heartbreaking to have to repeat this answer over and over again. Would there be any point in trying to elaborate with the military a statement of how many troops would be required to ensure adequate security in economically important areas? It might show up the glaring inadequacy of the U.N. Force to the point where others must realise the need for more troops.

1. As a result of a complete regrouping of military personnel in Lulubourg, Mr. Wood informed me that it is more than probable that UN will be giving up the occupation of the building "Immo Kasai".
2. The Ghana Brigade is concentrating in the St. Louis suburb (about half-way from Lulubourg town and the airfield).
2. I have instructed Viera to recce the St. Louis suburb to find a suitable house as an office for refugee relief and to keep you informed of his findings. He will NOT engage in any renting without specific instructions.
3. I do not know the intention of Mr. Gilpin as it concerns premises for ONUC Civil Affairs and you may want refugee relief to remain grouped with Civil Affairs. If so, perhaps Mr. Gilpin should be informed accordingly and asked to bear our needs in mind when renting premises.

Army Rations for Refugees

1. Where civilian population take refuge with ONUC troops, the Refugee Relief Coordinator can provide basic rations from Panine Relief Fund stocks.

2. A uniform ration schedule may be adopted as follows:

- (a) Rice or maize flour - 300 grams or say 10 ounces per day
- (b) Dried fish or salt fish - 60 grams or say 2 ounces per day
- (c) Palmoil or groundnut oil - 30 grams or say 1 ounce per day
- (d) For children and nursing mothers only:  
Skim milk powder - 40 grams or say 1½ ounce per day

3. Stocks of rice and maize flour are available in Leopoldville, Lubumbashi and Bakwanga. Stocks of palmoil are available at Port Francqui and Lubumbashi. Stocks of dried milk powder are available in Leopoldville and Bakwanga.

4. The Senior Supply and Transport Officer could requisition supplies from the Chief Refugee Relief Coordinator quoting numbers of refugees to be fed. The Chief Refugee Relief Coordinator would designate the stock from which the supplies are to be lifted and would expect the Senior Supply and Transport Officer to arrange for movement of the supplies.

Further to our discussion concerning transport requirements for Bakwanga and Luluabourg, I want to thank you first of all for moving so promptly the thirty-two Bedford trucks.

May I now ask you to arrange immediately for the handing over of the 11 Mercedes Benz trucks in Bakwanga to Mr. Caballero. As I explained, Pakistani drivers cannot be used in the interior and can be employed only on the road convoys from Luluabourg to Bakwanga. For many reasons, the Mercedes are more suitable for distribution work than the smaller Bedfords and they should therefore be transferred. As soon as the transfer has been made, which I trust will be done by an "Operations Immediate" cable, the Pakistani drivers should return to Luluabourg for work on the road convoys.

I would be grateful if you could confirm to me when the instructions for transfer have gone out.


In my weekly report dated 28 January and in my cable ONUCBAK 049 of 24 January this subject was mentioned. However, as it is a very important one, I should like to emphasize the necessity that the load manifest be better prepared.

As you are well aware, this office, by lack of qualified local personnel, has to rely heavily on the load manifests in order to keep the records straight. Unfortunately, in some instances articles have been sent to Bakwanga without manifests and in many cases the description and/or the weight shown on the manifests are misleading.

This office will appreciate that you give your personal attention to the matter in order that:

- (a) No articles be sent without manifest;
- (b) More care be given to the preparation of the manifests and a more adequate description be used;
- (c) If possible, this office be furnished with an inventory of all articles sent from December 16, 1960 up to January 31, 1961, as to enable us to reconcile our records with Léopoldville and from now on to keep them on a realistic basis; and
- (d) To avoid any misunderstanding, all articles be consigned to X. Caballero.

Your help in that matter will be highly appreciated.

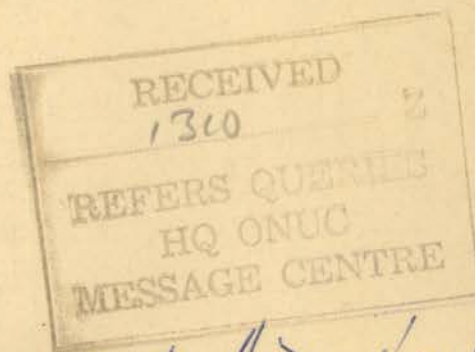

1. It has been noted that consignors frequently go directly to Air Operations with requests for airlifts, often without even notifying Movement Control.
2. This procedure makes it very difficult to plan in advance and thus ensure the despatch of necessary supplies etc. for the troops. Furthermore the number of A/C's available is very limited at present. For example this morning it was only possible to get confirmation for the S/P 3 (Luluabourg - Kamina - Elisabethville) and one special flight (VIP's in the Convair). The requirements however were, among others, 17440 lbs medical supplies for Luluabourg and 20000 lbs fresh food for Coquilhatville. In addition, requirements were submitted for flights to Bakwanga (mainly food relief, of which at the moment approximately 320000 lbs are stored in the hangar at N'Djili).
3. In order to effect improvements and avoid complaints coming in from all sides, it is hereby requested that no administrative moves are approved by Air Operations, but are referred to Movement Control. This also includes requests from the Civilian Food Relief Coordinator. As far as the operational demands for movement of troops are concerned, Movement Control would like to be kept informed.

### STORE DELIVERIES

#### Administrative Instruction No. 3

Please note that a system has been established according to which no deliveries whatsoever can be made from the storage places of the refugee relief operation without presentation of a delivery ticket issued by the central administrative unit.

Therefore, members of the technical teams are requested not to contact directly the storage overseers to ask for delivery of any item of perishable or non-perishable supplies. All such requests should be made to the central administrative unit which will authorize them if justified.

The supplies and goods of the Austrian military medical team are under the direct supervision of the team. Members of other teams should not put any direct requests for supplies out of the Austrian military medical team, nor suggestions tending to the furnishing of any equipment or goods to Government authorities or other institutions. The Austrian team will freely administer its own supplies according to its own needs. It should be understood, however, that this does not include the possibility of transmitting to third parties in particular any piece of their non-perishable supplies without the agreement of the central administrative unit.

#### SUPPLIES AND SERVICES REQUESTED FROM MIBKA

The MIBKA high administration has indicated that various members of the United Nations staff in Bakwanga frequently address various requests for supplies or services of one or other kind to the corresponding departments of the company. The company wishes that all such requests be handled through the central administrative unit. As this request coincides with the needs of good administration on our part, all staff members are requested to comply with this arrangement in the future.

1. Houses are very scarce in Bakwanga, therefore it was not possible to find a suitable place for the office. Arrangements have been made to establish the office at the living room of Mr Caballero. ONU will pay one third of the rent, viz Two thousand five hundred CF per month. This place has been chosen for the following reasons :  
availability of telephone  
large enough to accommodate 6 people

2. LOCAL STAFF

It is planned to hire the following personnel :

- 40 truck drivers
- 1 Supply Acctng Clerk
- 3 Warehousement

After inquiry it was found that the local salary range is much lower than ONUC salary scale. Is it possible to use the local rate in order not to create a discrimination in the working force in Bakwanga ? Your prompt answer will be appreciated.

3. INVENTORY

Actually ONU is using three warehouses. A fourth one will be available next monday. It is absolutely impossible for the present to take a physical inventory due to :

- a) The stacking was made without any order, bags are just piled on bags.
  - b) Due to lack of space, it is not possible to restack them now.
- In consideration of the above, it has been agreed to :
- a) Store all incoming supplies in the new warehouse.
  - b) Storage to be done the " right way " as to permit a count at any time.
  - c) All issues will be made from the old stock until depletion. In one week time, the " piles " should be gone and at that time, inventory cards will be established.
  - d) In the meantime, for report purposes, the book inventory figures will be used. It is estimated that there will be a ten per cent discrepancy.

4. BANKING

As air transportation is available between Luluabourg and Bakwanga almost every day, it is suggested that banking arrangement be made to transfert funds, when needed, thru Luluabourg.

5. As questions 1, 2, 3 are very urgent and are to be solved immediately, it will be appreciated if you cable your answer.
6. Your suggestions and comments are welcomed.

Refugee Relief Operation in the Congo

... The concern expressed by Mr. Abbas and Sir Alexander MacFarquhar, in the attached cable to Mr. Dayal and yourself, that there should be unity of command in the field is well founded. However, I think in this instance it is misdirected.

The decision taken in New York to assign to FAO the basic responsibility for procurement of the food required for the Kasai refugees has not entailed a division of functions in the Congo. Our agreement with FAO requires them to obtain the food necessary and to get it to the Congo on time. The Refugee Relief Coordinator, ONUC, has the responsibility of receiving, moving and storing and of distributing the food in the Congo.

for But there is real cause for concern about the possibility of loss of effectiveness in the relief supply operation in the Congo, because the operation is dependent in transportation and movement on decisions made in the Logistics Branch of Military Headquarters, ONUC, and, for operational communications, on the military units in the area.

Coordination of supply movements in the relief operation is far from satisfactory at present and it certainly cannot be said that we have that unity of command in the field which Mr. Abbas and Sir Alexander stress as essential.

I do not doubt that Mr. Grün will wish to discuss with you the policy aspects of this quite serious operational problem on his return from Bakwanga.

In view of this it has been decided henceforth to abolish the Food Coordinator's Office as such and to incorporate its functions and staff into the Office of the Refugee Relief Coordinator. The Refugee Relief Coordinator will be given an assistant, whose primary task will be to deal with questions of food supplies, both here in Leopoldville and in the field.
