Dear Miss McGeachy: *Ch E*

I am enclosing for your information copy of a letter from the National War Fund to the various agencies providing personnel to cooperate with UNRRA in the Balkans.

It seems to me that the questions of policy raised by the limitations specified by the National War Fund are primarily matters to be settled between the National War Fund and its member agencies.

So far as the President's War Relief Control Board is concerned, I feel that no further action on this subject is required until the cooperating agencies and the National War Fund have come to an understanding in regard to the implications of the proposed limitations in respect to the role of voluntary agencies not only during the military period but also in the subsequent function of providing services in liberated areas. My personal view is that UNRRA's interest in the immediate problem might be dealt with on much the same basis.

Dear Monsignor O'Boyle:

At its meeting on Thursday, April 20, the Executive Committee of the National War Fund approved an addition to the budget of Refugee Relief Trustees of \$68,000. This sum is for the purpose of financing workers to be supplied by participating services of the National War Fund outside their current budgets to work with UNRRA in the Balkans as follows:

This approval follows the schedule presented to me by Clarence King after consultation with National War Fund agencies. Since this is obviously only a preliminary schedule, and in order to expedite the balance of this program as agencies recruit more workers, the Executive Committee authorized the Budget Committee to allow additional workers which can be financed within the framework of budgets already approved and an additional twenty-seven workers to be financed outside current budgets, bringing the total to an amount not in excess of \$122,000 (it being understood that the Budget Committee will keep these expenditures as low as possible).

Because of the policy involved and the long range implications, the Executive Committee took this action with the following limitations and explanations:

1. This is an exceptional situation brought about by UNRRA's agreement with MERRA and neither sets a precedent nor implies that the National War Fund will continue to finance these workers beyond October 1, 1944.

2. It is hoped that UNRRA will put these people on its own payroll at the earliest possible moment, and in any event, not later than October 1, 1944.
3. It is understood that UNRRA will take over as quickly as possible the financing of purchases for supplies and materials which are now being financed by member agencies of the National War Fund, thus effecting savings.
4. UNRRA shall bear the cost of transportation and maintenance, and agency payments per person, on an average, shall not exceed \$2,000 for the period ending October 1, 1944.
5. Workers provided by private funds must be privileged to wear identifying insignia.

Future requests for reallocations within your budget or request for additional amounts to supply workers for the UNRRA project ought to be channelled through the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service in order to insure some degree of coordination and over-all planning. Should you have any further questions about this action, please don't hesitate to raise them.

MEMORANDUM

While in New York, I was permitted to read a paragraph from a letter written by Mr. Jensen of the War Fund, in which the statement was made that UNRRA would be expected to take over by October 1st., at the latest, the salaries of personnel presently being recruited by the voluntary agencies. I was not told to whom the letter was addressed and could not revert to the matter later.

Mr. King thought that the letter was susceptible of various interpretations. He thought it might be merely a "trial balloon" or, perhaps, an attempt to emphasize again the Fund's conviction that the voluntary agencies are providing personnel that should be submitted by UNRRA. One other possibility was that this was to serve warning on the agencies prior to budget hearings that they should expect no further War Funds for salaries of workers.

Since the paragraph was shown in confidence, I think we can do nothing more than you have already done, i.e., reinstate the clause covering UNRRA's financial responsibility to agencies in the basic agreement.

Since Miss Branscombe heard further discussion of the subject last night at the American Association of Social Workers' meeting, I have asked her to add a note, which is quoted below:

"In a confidential conversation with Mr. Zeldich, a representative of the American Association of Social Workers (the national professional organization), on the evening of April 27th., he made a statement to the effect that the voluntary agencies in this country, along with those in others, were to supplement UNRRA by providing a substantial part of its field personnel. He had understood from conversations with the American Council and Mr. King that this was being done because the Congress of the United States had not yet appropriated funds

for UNRRA and that as soon as there was an appropriation UNRRA would assume full financial responsibility for the personnel whose salaries are paid by the respective agencies now. It seems that there is an impression that appropriations would make funds available to UNRRA by October. Mr. Howard and I explained that as far as we knew the present arrangement with the voluntary agencies is not influenced by Congressional appropriations and that certainly to date there has been no agreement by UNRRA to assume responsibility for the salaries of voluntary agency personnel at any time.

It appears to me from the impressions and information which had been conveyed by Mr. King that it is very important to have a clear statement in writing, setting forth the financial responsibility of the voluntary agencies for their own personnel."

SUBJECT: Your draft on UNRRA's Recommendations with respect to Proposed Increased Budgets of Voluntary Societies Engaged in Displaced Persons Work

I think this is a corking memo if you decide to adopt this tack in answering the problem. My own feeling is that it should be much shorter, and we should rest our case on two bases.

- (a) That the National War Fund should permit the Voluntary Societies to fulfill every obligation they have heretofore assumed in their respective spheres of activity, and
- (b) that UNRRA cannot, before a policy decision of the Council, assume any further obligations with respect to refugees, outside liberated areas, than those it has already assumed.

You could use your memo, stripping out as I have indicated. You appreciate, of course, that this is my personal view. Any decision you reach will be sound and have my 100% support.

SUBJECT: Meeting with Coordinating Committee, National
War Fund to be held March 29, 1944.

Mr. Howard and I had lunch today with Mr. Bookman, Assistant Executive Director of the President's War Relief Control Board, in order to get a sense of the matters to be discussed in the meeting on Wednesday, March 29, in New York City, to which you have been invited. This meeting of the Coordinating Committee of the National War Fund is to be held in Mr. Swope's office, 51st and Lexington Avenue, New York City and the following persons will be present:

Consideration of Personnel Proposal by National War Fund

Mr. Bookman traced the route that the Voluntary Agencies' personnel proposal has travelled thus far; on March 6, the Budget Committee of the National War Fund approved the agencies' financing such personnel, although Mr. Swope of the Committee did not approve financing such personnel. Later the Executive Committee of the National War Fund informally expressed itself as being against the proposal but referred the question to the Coordinating Committee for review and recommendation. Mr. Bookman is of the opinion that the action of this Coordinating Committee at next Wednesday's meeting will be the final word accepted by the Executive Committee.

Matters that will be Discussed Next Wednesday

Mr. Bookman believes that you will be asked to describe UNRRA's programme, since some of the agencies feel that they need to know more about what UNRRA is planning to do before committing themselves to furnish per-

sonnel. Mr. Bookman said that he had advised the agencies to go ahead and present personnel and not postpone such action until UNRRA's programme is formulated, since UNRRA would ^{not} be able possibly to say much in detail about the programme. Some agencies retorted that ^{they} ~~they~~ must know something "about their program, if they're to start a training programme". In addition, some specific questions, which Don and I have listed in a separate memorandum, may arise and our answer ^{Mr. Bookman said} should be as specific as possible.

Voluntary Personnel Now Available

You will be interested in knowing that about 94 workers are immediately available for Balkan operations from the voluntary agencies as soon as the National War Fund has given approval and negotiations are concluded. SUBJECT: On the meeting called by the President's
War Relief Control Board.

In attendance at this meeting, chaired by Mr. Charles Taft of the President's War Relief Control Board, were representatives of the War Refugee Board, the National War Fund, the American Council of Voluntary Agencies, the American Red Cross, Colonel Rounds of the U. S. Civil Affairs Branch, Abe Feller and myself.

Discussion centered about the memorandum of March 21st which Mr. Brunot discussed with you and Mr. Feller last week. As you recall, the burden of this memorandum is that American voluntary agencies are asking for certain kinds of refugee relief more funds than there seems any possibility of raising from voluntary sources. The question, therefore, is whether some substantial responsibilities may not be assumed by UNRRA or other agencies or governments, thus relieving the voluntary agency budgets. The two principal items are a sum of approximately \$4,000,000 for the care of Greek refugees in the Middle East and another sum of \$900,000 for the care of Norwegian refugees in Sweden. The latter being in a neutral country is, of course, outside the jurisdiction of UNRRA. This issue, therefore, really boils down to the question as to whether or not UNRRA or some other agency could assume responsibility for Greek refugees who are now being cared for from funds provided by the Greek War Relief Association.

Mr. Feller agreed to present to a later meeting of the same persons, a statement as to what appeared possible for UNRRA to do in this regard. At my suggestion, another meeting of the group was delayed until after Fred Hoehler's arrival, inasmuch as I thought he might be able to make a valuable contribution to the discussion of the division of responsibility for the care of refugees.

At one time or another various suggestions relating to refugee services, as put forward on page 3 of Mr. Brunot's original memorandum, were discussed. The consensus of this discussion appeared to me to be:

1. That it would be desirable for Governmental and Voluntary

programs for refugee care within a given area to be coordinated. It was realized, however, that UNHRA's role in such coordination would vary from area to area, depending upon jurisdiction which UNHRA might be able to assume. While there was general agreement about the desirability of coordination, there was considerable difference of opinion as to how this could be achieved.

2. That Governmental or Inter-governmental Agencies should assume responsibility for the basic care of refugees and that Voluntary Agencies should supplement governmental services to the extent of their resources and in ways acceptable to both the Governmental and Voluntary Agencies. Repeatedly, it was pointed out that Voluntary Agencies could probably contribute most in educational and recreational programs, youth activities, vocational training and morale building programs which would be provided over and above the basic care for which Governmental or Inter-governmental Agencies were assumed to have responsibility. The importance of this division of responsibility was emphasized by Mr. Aldridge, representing the National War Fund, who declared that it is impossible to ask the American people to contribute voluntarily to a program of basic care which it is assumed that governments or UNHRA with governmental appropriations will provide.

3. That personnel furnished by Voluntary Agencies to render supplemental services should be paid for from their own funds. There was also discussion of the suggestion incorporated in Mr. Brunot's memorandum that "When personnel is recruited through voluntary agencies for any accepted governmental function, the governmental agency accepts full responsibility for all expenses incident to their employment, including salaries and transportation to the field of operation."

Although no definite conclusion seemed to me to emerge, it was, I think, Mr. Taft who said that if Voluntary Agency personnel were paid by Governments as suggested, then such personnel should be regarded as Governmental personnel and not as employees of the Voluntary Agency from which they were recruited.

During the meeting Mr. Aldridge declared that the most recent action of the War Fund with respect to the Voluntary Agency personnel requested for service in the Balkans was to disapprove of paying from resources of the American Voluntary Agencies, the salaries of such personnel. There was, however, considerable prophesy on the part of other representatives present that the War Fund would reverse its position in this matter. After the meeting was over I understood Mr. Aldridge to say that if it is made clear that arrangements for Voluntary Agency personnel in the Balkans are not to be regarded as establishing a precedent

for the use of such personnel, but are rather to be thought of in the nature of an emergency measure, then the War Fund might reverse its position. The War Fund Committee which will consider this question is meeting on Thursday, March 23rd.

While other items on page 3 of Mr. Brunot's memorandum received some attention, I think it cannot be said that there were any further conclusions reached.

The meeting had not been designed to take any positions or actions, but rather to explore questions of mutual concern. It was decided that a second meeting would be held approximately one week after Fred Hochler returns.
