RELATIONS WITH INTER-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS

UNITED STATES DRAFT RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE
INTERNATIONAL PENAL AND PENITENTIARY COMMISSION

The Economic and Social Council,

Considering that intergovernmental activities in the field of prevention of crime and treatment of offenders should be primarily carried on within the United Nations in close relationship to the other aspects of the social program of the United Nations,

Recommends to Member Governments which are also members of the International Penal and Penitentiary Commission that they should take steps, within the Commission, to bring about the dissolution of the Commission and the transfer of its assets and functions to the United Nations to become effective subsequent to the termination of the Twelfth International Penitentiary Congress scheduled to be convened in 1950;

Recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of a resolution by which the General Assembly would--

1. express the willingness of the United Nations to take over such of the functions and assets of the International Penal and Penitentiary Commission as the Commission may decide to transfer to the United Nations;

2. establish the following general principles to govern the carrying on, within the United Nations, of a program in the field of prevention of crime and treatment of offenders:

- a. the organization of a periodic Congress open to qualified persons from all countries eligible for participation in United Nations conferences;

b. participation in the work in this field, within the United Nations, of persons having professional, technical, or scientific experience in penal and penitentiary matters;

c. utilization of such of the assets of the International Penal and Penitentiary Commission as may be transferred to the United Nations for the purposes of furthering the work of the United Nations in the field of prevention of crime and treatment of offenders.

Continues to believe that the purposes of the IPPC as set forth in Article 1 of its Constitutional Regulations can be carried out within the United Nations while fully safeguarding the expert and professional character of the work undertaken in this field;

Suspends any further action on this matter until such time as the Secretary-General may be in a position to submit a report to the Council on any further proposals which may be put forward by the IPPC ~~===~~ looking toward the eventual integration within the United Nations of the International Penal and Penitentiary Commission, and

Invites member governments to transmit to the Secretary-General any comments they may wish to make on this subject.



Your memorandum of 15 July to Dr. Sze has been referred to me.

The Comparative Review hitherto, in covering the work programmes of the United Nations and the specialised agencies in the economic and social fields, has dealt primarily with the commissions of the Council, their corresponding secretariat units, and the specialised agencies. The Council receives a report on the work programme of the commissions and Economic and Social Departments, and the agencies report on their work programmes in their annual reports to the Council. In fact, the Comparative Review is based on these reports concerning work programmes. The omission of the Legal Department is no doubt due to the fact that it presents no corresponding work programme report to the Council, and also to the fact that the Comparative Review stems from Council Resolution 128 (VI) which is concerned primarily with reports on the work programmes of the Economic and Social Departments, the commissions of the Council, and the specialised agencies.

I think you are quite right in your suggestion that the Legal Department and its work in the economic and social fields should be included in the Comparative Review - E/1351/Rev. 1. 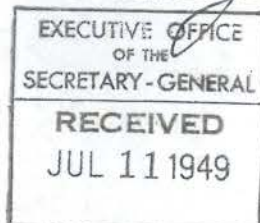

The Fourth Conference of the American States Members of the International Labour Organisation,

Having examined the Report on the conditions of life and work of indigenous populations of Latin America submitted by the Office for consideration as a basis for the general discussion of the problem, and

Considering

(a) that, in general, for the purposes of the International Labour Organisation, the problems relating to the conditions of life and work of the indigenous population of Latin America and, consequently, the action required to solve them are essentially social and economic in character;

(b) that, numerically, these populations constitute important manpower resources in several Latin American countries;

(c) that a more effective utilisation of these resources would result in an improvement of the social and economic conditions of these populations and, at the same time, in a fuller development of the national economy of each of the countries concerned;

(d) that in various countries of the Continent these populations have not yet been integrated in the national economy and represent an incompletely evaluated factor in regard to production as well as to consumption;

(e) that important groups of these populations are living in precarious conditions and are working under special circumstances which prevent them from enjoying the benefit of the protection afforded by legislation to workers in general;

(f) that in conformity with the principles set forth in the Declaration of Philadelphia, the Resolution of the Third Conference of American States Members of the International Labour Organisation, the Solemn Declaration of Fundamental Principles of the First Inter-American Indigenous Congress, the Charter of Social Guarantees of the Ninth International Conference of American States, and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of the United Nations all human beings should be accorded equality of rights and opportunities without distinction of race or nationality;

(i) that in many of the countries of the Continent the conditions of work of these populations have not yet been adequately investigated in relation to demographic and occupational distribution, forms of wage payment and other methods of remuneration, forms of economic organisation, extension of the benefits of social insurance, labour inspection, technical training and health;

1. Reaffirms the principles of equality of rights and opportunities without distinction of race or nationality;

2. Requests the Governing Body of the International Labour Office to recommend that Governments should take steps to put into effect legislation adapted to the real needs and the special characteristics of life and work of the respective indigenous populations concerning, in particular:

6. Requests the Governing Body of the International Labour Office when drawing up the agenda of the Fifth Conference of American States Members of the International Labour Organisation to consider the advisability of including the question of the utilisation of indigenous manpower in relation to national plans for economic development and the raising of the standard of living of the working population in general.


