
Dear Mr. McCarty,

Dear Secretary-General Ban:

On behalf of the faculty and students of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University, the Korean American Students Association (KASA), and the WWS Gender and Politics Network, I am pleased to invite you to present a public lecture during the 2008 Spring semester as part of the Dean's Lecture series. Each year we invite a selected group of speakers to participate in panel discussions or to present keynote lectures in conjunction with our regularly scheduled public affairs programming events. These special lectures are among the most important public affairs events at the Woodrow Wilson School. They address pressing issues of public policy and international affairs and attract University-wide, regional and national attention.
