Dear Sir,

There is a lot of materials and equipment that might be useful to us coming into the Pakistan Depot, R.S.S.D., 16th Street, Limete. There are two grades of equipment: "serviceable" and "unserviceable".

The serviceable equipment is generally for sale but the "survey board" can allocate lots of equipment to charitable or deserving groups. The unserviceable equipment should not be difficult to obtain: supplies have already been allocated to the Red-Cross.

I have already seen the secretary of the Ordinance Board regarding the unserviceable equipment. I have also seen colonel N.N. Madam regarding the serviceable. He suggests that a letter be sent to the G.A.O.M. Twigt U. Nations stating that we should like priority regarding marques, tents, tools, blankets, camp-beds, cooking utensils, mattresses, mosquito-nets. I believe you have already done this through Mr. Ahmed.

I attach a list of equipment that might be useful to us. Also I have made enquiries about storage, though I have found a room in the ministry (I am not so happy about it).

1. As you are aware, we have now declared a large number of vehicles as surplus to our requirement, and these vehicles are awaiting disposal instructions. Vehicles beyond local repair include vehicles that can be put on road, provided necessary spare parts can be made available.
2. According to our agreement with the A.N.C. - we have promised logistical help to them from our resources if considered necessary.
3. The vehicle fleet of the A.N.C. is much too inadequate and is also in a poor state of repair. They are therefore unable to carry out effective patrolling which is required to maintain law and order throughout the CONGO.
4. I, therefore, consider that there is a justifiable case for providing the A.N.C. with some of our surplus vehicles, subject to a modality acceptable to ONUC and the Central Government. In view of the comparative poor state of these vehicles, this in itself will not resolve the problem.
5. Some suitable arrangements are required to be made for the provisioning of necessary spare parts and repair facilities. We are unable to offer repair facilities from our meagre ~~EME~~ resources to them.
6. However, I am given to understand that the A.N.C. may be able to organise the repair organisation themselves from the A.N.C. and local civilian resources. They will, however, need help in the provisioning of spare parts. Some spare parts could, of course, be obtained by cannibalizing certain vehicles.
7. In case you agree in principle regarding the issue of certain of our surplus vehicles to the A.N.C., you may wish to pass on this case to the Chief of Civilian Operations/Chief Administrative Officer, for further examination.

In connection with our policy to sell surplus ONUC stocks in the open market, there are several aspects I want you to take into account for future sales:

As I already mentioned to you, this Administration was approached by the Congolese Government, both military and civilian, with the view to obtaining preferential treatment for the Congolese Government in the sale of surplus stocks. Also the Civilian Operations side of the U.N. work in the Congo has a definite interest in these sales. Therefore, and pending further policy directives from New York, I would like you to take the following steps:

1. Civilian Operations should be advised in advance of the quantities of surplus stock we intend to sell. Such a list in several copies to be agreed upon with the Civilian Operations Administration would serve the purpose of:

a) advising Civil. Ops. of what we are planning to sell. This would mean that they could inform us of their interest in the matter;

b) allowing Civil.Ops. to channel this advance notice of sale to the Congolese Government and finding out what this Government would like to buy from us.

2. In consultation with the Force Commander's office, we should also give advance notice to the Congolese army in order to find out their interest in the surplus stocks.

I should explain that it is my opinion that this preferential treatment regarding sales to the Congolese Government should be based on cost (to include 20% for handling).

In the case of Civ. Ops. the question of payment should form the subject of a discussion at a somewhat later stage.

In all cases, however, we should be given a definite reply in a matter of days, certainly no longer than one week. This is obviously necessary in order to maintain a fairly rapid procedure indispensable in this kind of liquidation.

Ces camions sont destinés à notre filiale SANKALOM à KABINDA. L'aire d'activité de cette société est très étendue; comprenant la province du LOMANI, territoires de Senteriy et de Kabinda, et la province du SANKURU, territoires de Lodja, Lomela, Katakombé, Koke et Lubefu. Nous vous rappelons que cette société a eu à sa disposition 2 camions ONUC en permanence mais qu'ensuite, ces camions lui ont été retirés.

RELANCE AGRICOLE EN MILIEU COUTUMIER

La situation vivrière dans l'ensemble du Congo est à ce point compromise qu'il faut, aujourd'hui, y importer des vivres alors que jadis la production suffisait largement aux besoins et aurait permis l'exportation du surplus n'eut été l'éloignement des lieux de production qui en rendait l'exportation impossible à des prix rémunérateurs pour les producteurs.

Il s'impose aujourd'hui de relancer la production agricole toute entière et vivrière, en particulier, à défaut de quoi l'on s'expose à des difficultés sans nombre tant sur le plan de l'alimentation des centres extra-coutumiers que sur le plan politique.

L'expérience a démontré que la relance agricole est impossible si elle n'est assurée, d'une part, par un cadre efficient de propagandistes et si, d'autre part, les producteurs ne bénéficient -par la vente de leur production- d'une rémunération équitable pour leur travail.

Comment atteindre ce double objectif?

1 - Propagande agricole

D'après les dernières statistiques officielles, la population mâle adulte en milieux coutumiers - donc agricoles- s'élevait à 2.778.000 unités.

Ce chiffre comprenait 882.000 planteurs se livrant particulièrement à la culture cotonnière et à des cultures vivrières qui constituent le prolongement normal du coton, les vivres étant plantés sur la sole ayant servi en avant culture pour le coton.

Renforcer le cadre des propagandistes coton contribuerait donc automatiquement à améliorer la production cotonnière, mais aussi la production vivrière qui y fait suite.

C'est donc dans un but de relance agricole toute entière que l'on devrait obtenir de l'Administration qu'elle intervienne auprès des Sociétés Cotonnières, qui disposent encore de techniciens expérimentés et encadrés, pour qu'elles reprennent la propagande en milieux coutumiers. La charge financière qui en résulterait pour elles pouvant leur être fournie par le canal du Cogenco (Comité de Gestion de la Caisse de Réserve Cotonnière), qui contrôle toutes leurs dépenses.

Ce point mérite une attention toute particulière du Gouvernement Congolais et de tous les organismes qui se préoccupent particulièrement de ce problème vital pour le Congo.

2 - Octroi aux planteurs d'une rémunération équitable pour leur travail

Il est évident que l'agriculteur congolais refusera tout effort dépassant ses propres besoins alimentaires s'il ne perçoit pour son travail une contre-partie qu'il estime suffisante.

Or, tel est bien le cas actuellement : le planteur percevant pour ses produits coton, maïs, riz, arachides, manioc un prix équitable sans doute, mais ne pouvant malheureusement se procurer avec ses revenus les biens essentiels de consommation, soit parce que ceux-ci font défaut, soit parce que leur prix est prohibitif.

Un des principaux facteurs de relance agricole consisterait donc dans la mise à la disposition des planteurs des biens de consommation à des prix raisonnables.

Cet élément n'a échappé ni à l'attention des Sociétés Cotonnières intéressées tant à la relance du coton qu'à celle des produits vivriers, ni à l'attention du Cogerco et du Gouvernement Congolais, qui a décidé que 10 % de la production des filatures locales, des fabrications de couvertures et bonneteries devaient être mis à la disposition de cette population agricole et ce, par le canal des Sociétés Cotonnières qui se sont engagées à livrer ces marchandises à ces seuls producteurs individuellement et au prix strictement égal.

Pour excellente qu'elle soit, cette mesure ne suffit évidemment pas à provoquer ce mouvement de relance escomptée, les moyens mis en oeuvre n'étant pas proportionnés au but à atteindre.

Le but est, en effet, d'arriver dans le délai le plus bref à une production cotonnière de 100.000 tonnes de coton-graines (contre 44.000 tonnes en 1963 et 179.000 tonnes en 1959) et à un accroissement proportionnel de la production vivrière.

A elle seule, cette production cotonnière procurerait à la masse des planteurs un montant de 750.000.000 de francs congolais. En admettant que la moitié de cette somme soit consacrée à des dépenses diverses; il resterait à mettre à leur disposition des marchandises pour une valeur de 375.000.000 de francs.

Estimant avec beaucoup d'optimisme que l'industrie locale et le commerce soient à même de satisfaire ces besoins à concurrence de 60 %, il subsiste un manque d'approvisionnement annuel correspondant à :

$$\frac{375.000.000 \times 40}{100} = 150.000.000 \text{ francs}$$

C'est donc pour un montant mensuel de 150.000.000 : 12, soit 12.500.000 francs, que des quotas d'importation devraient être accordés aux Sociétés Cotonnières moyennant engagement pour ces dernières de céder ces articles de traite au prix légal et aux seuls producteurs vivriers sur présentation de leurs fiches de production.

Le chiffre annuel de 150 millions de licences d'importation paraîtra élevé et l'on pourrait, à juste titre, se demander comment le Gouvernement Congolais se procurera les devises nécessaires. Celles-ci lui seront très largement fournies par les recettes en devises provenant des tonnages de coton vendus à l'exportation. En effet, et en admettant que des 34.000 tonnes de coton-fibres provenant des 100.000 tonnes de coton-graines escomptées, 18.000 tonnes soient exportées et 16.000 tonnes livrées aux filatures locales, ces 18.000 tonnes procureraient au Congo en devises au bas mot, 18.000.000 kg. multipliés par 28 francs belges au kilo, soit 504.000.000 de francs belges.

Les 150.000.000 de francs à réserver aux planteurs ne représentant donc que 28,17 % de cette rentrée en devises.

L'application des propositions ci-dessus d'octroi de licences ou de quotas d'importation donnerait lieu à répartition entre les différentes Sociétés Cotonnières, suivant les coefficients ci-dessous calculés en fonction de la production de chacune de ces Sociétés en 1959 :
