Subject: Repatriation of six Zambian UNCIVPOL Observers

Objet:

- 1. Please find attached a note (the English version) pertaining to the above-mentioned subject as well as enclosures.
2. These observers, who did not initially fulfil the conditions set out by the United Nations, were promoted to the rank of officers although the decision to repatriate them had already been made. The issue of their promotion should therefore be tackled by DPKO.
3. It is part of my duties to report when necessary any infringement to United Nations established rules.

Note on the repatriation of 6 (six) CIVPOL Zambia observers

In addition to my report on the CIVPOL personnel situation, the SRSG sent cable CRN418 MIR 2612 dated 30 November to New York to ask DPKO to send back to their respective countries all CIVPOL observers with insufficient knowledge in French or English as well as those who did not have officer rank in violation of requirements applicable for United Nations Civilian Police observers.

By cable CNR 702 P1/1 dated 20 December, DPKO gave its approval for the repatriation of the staff members involved .

In memo No. CIVPOL/MEMO/137/94 dated 23 December 1994, CIVPOL gave details about the content of the cable to the SRSG and informed those affected by the measure through their Chiefs of contingents. The Chief of the Zambian contingent, Superintendent B.C. Mwale, turned to his country to ask that the 6 inspectors be replaced.

When I came back from leave on January 10, I found a message from the Inspector General of Police of Zambia informing me that the six policemen had been immediately promoted to the rank of officers and asking that the six policemen be retained in light of their promotion.

I replied immediately to Superintendent B.C. Mwale that I receive my instructions through United Nations official channels and not directly from member states. I advised him to ask his government to call upon the UN through the usual official channels and he later assured me that he had done so.

I was therefore surprised to read a fax from the permanent mission in Zambia to the UN dated 17 January, especially the


allegations made about me. Fortunately, I had a copy of the fax about our discussion sent by Superintendent B.C. Mwale.

As to whether these six Zambian observers should be maintained at CIVPOL or not, I would like to point out the following to you:

- the requirements for Civilian Police observers are established by the United Nations;
- when the six observers arrived in the mission area, they did not meet the necessary requirements;
- the promotion of officers is the sole responsibility of sovereign states;
- this measure also affects other CIVPOL officers from 3 (three) different countries;
- the reason for such requirements is to ensure a quality of services and to make sure that those supposed to perform CIVPOL tasks are suitable for their mission and rank is one of such criteria.

In light of the above, I think DPKO should make the final decision in this matter according to UN rules. This is precisely the reason why I asked Superintendent Mwale, Chief of the Zambian Contingent, to go through official UN channels so that any request could be dealt with at that level.

I wish to refer to the above subject. Last month I received a telephone call from Superintendent MWALE, Contingent Leader of the ten (10) Zambian Police officers in Rwanda.

He mentioned that there CIVPOL COMMISSIONER had instructions to repatriate six (6) of the Zambian Police officers because they had ranks lower than CAPTAIN. These six Police officers have since been promoted to the rank equivalent to CAPTAIN. But the CIVPOL COMMISSIONER IN Rwanda is understood to be pursuing on the issue of repatriating the six (6) Zambian Police officers under the guise that Mr. MOOSA OBDU KADIR, CIVPOL POLICE ADVISOR based in New York has directed the repatriation.

I beg you, Your Excellency, to inform the Special Representative to the Secretary General in Rwanda UNAMIR and also to prevail upon Mr. MOOSA OBDU KADIR, United Nations, CIVPOL ADVISOR there in NEW YORK to rescind his decision since the officers qualify in terms of rank.

SUBJECT: CIVPOL Staffing

OBJET:

1. To implement the instructions given in UNATIONS New York cable 4184 dated 20 december 1994, the following steps may be taken:

- Regarding those observers affected by repatriation:

The total number is 30 observers, the breakdown is as follows:

Guinea Bissau	15
Jordan	1
Djibouti	8
Zambia	6

Total	30

The repatriation of these 31 observers might be staggered into following grouped departures:

- First departure on 15 January 1995 for the 15 observers from Guinea Bissau;
- Second departure on 30 January 1995 for the second group comprised of the remaining 16 observers (2 from Jordan, 8 from Djibouti, and 6 from Zambia).

2. Following the departure of these two groups, the CIVPOL staff which now numbers 80, will be reduced to 49 (15 French-speaking and 34 English speaking Observers).

3. Such an extremely reduced staff need to be quickly reinforced through the allocation of 71 new observers (composed of 47 French speakers and 24 English speakers) to restore CIVPOL's ideal strength which is estimated to be 120 observers.

4. In order to avoid other similar, inconvenient cases of repatriation in the future, it is necessary that certain very important aspects of CIVPOL's mandate and the United Nations' selection criteria be made known to the countries supplying new contingents.

Re your MIR-2612 on the above, we have carefully reviewed your recommendations and agree that civilian police personnel who do not meet the language and rank requirements should be repatriated. We feel however, that it may be preferable to repatriate them gradually. We would therefore be grateful if you could indicate to us an order of priority and a time-table for the repatriation of the personnel concerned.

2. In the meantime, we are pursuing our contacts with member states, in order to identify suitable replacements. We are pleased to inform you, in this connection, that Germany has agreed to provide 10 civilian police officers. The Permanent Mission here has assured us that they have a good working knowledge of French. Arrangements are being made for them to travel to the mission area as soon as possible.

3. It would be appreciated if you could specify the tasks to be performed by the additional civilian police personnel needed by UNAMIR to enable us to provide more accurate information to potential contributing countries and thereby minimize the risk that they will offer people who do not have the appropriate qualifications. Regards.

5. One should emphasize to the future CIVPOL observers that the CIVPOL mandate stems from Security Council Resolution 872 dated October 1993 and resolution 965 from November 1994 which are worded as follows:

- to monitor the gendarmerie and local police and provide them with necessary surveillance and guidance;
- to assist in the establishment and training of a new integrated national police force.

To implement these mandates, the following actions are required:

- deployment of CIVPOL observers in all sectors;
- assist Prefects in the areas of preserving law and order and complying with existing laws;
- monitor police and gendarmerie operations;
- investigate all infractions related to local authorities particularly human rights violations;
- oversee the process for the return of refugees and displaced persons, investigate and report all incidents resulting from disputes committed by wrongdoers acting alone or in groups;
- assist in setting up training centers for local police in the Prefectures;
- develop accelerated training program for the local police;
- monitor the selection of local policemen and the issuing of identification cards;
- assist in the disarming program and facilitate in the integration of the former RGF gendarmes in Rwanda;
- follow the programme of the training of gendarmerie;
- train instructors;
- assist the military observers and troops in the areas related to police work;

6. The duties described above are many and must be implemented within a specific operational framework and with the appropriate human resources.

7. Therefore the operational concept adopted by CIVPOL for future observers is as follows:


- to be deployed in each Prefecture in teams of at least 7 observers assigned to monitoring, investigation and training;
- animate the Gendarmes Training Centre of Ruhengeri; and
- coordinate activities listed above via Headquarters.

8. It is important to remember that in accordance with the wishes of the Rwandan Government - for which the training of police force is a major concern, the Security Council's new resolution also underlines this essential task. In fact, for Rwandan government, the police training program is an efficient way of establishing a police force to handle tasks involving public safety, to support the judiciary and to preservation Human Rights.

9. Therefore to efficiently fulfil these mandates, future observers must fully satisfy the following selection criteria which stem from conditions set by United Nations:

- be an officer in the police force or gendarmerie with some experience in the area of service in police or gendarmerie units.
- be familiarized with the training of agents;
- be able to read, write and speak fluently :
 - in French and have some ability to speak english (for French-speaking observers);
 - in English and have some ability to speak French (for English-speaking observers);
- posses a valid driver's licence;
- know how to type;
- have physical conditioning required for teaching;

10. Finally, with regards to the 10 CIVPOL officers from Germany, we await their arrival with great anticipation as this support will contribute in part to the replenishment of the large number of CIVPOL personnel soon to be repatriated.

1. General Situation:

The security situation in Rwanda continues to remain calm.

1.1 Political and Administrative activities:

A. UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures.

B. PMT KIGALI Prefecture visited the National Office for Information. A Director General of that office disclosed that Radio UNAMIR should have come into being before and during the war when there was perpetuation of genocide in the country.

C. They also visited the Ministry of Rehabilitation and Reconstruction where a Director General of the Ministry called on UNAMIR to embark on public enlightenment campaign of its goals as majority of the people of RWANDA do not know why UNAMIR is in RWANDA. He also requested that UNAMIR should see to resolve the social problems of the IDPs/Refugees.

1.2 SOCIAL

There are substantial increase in social activities in the country as observed by UNAMIR CIVPOL in the Sectors.

1.3 COMMERCIAL

People continued to go about their businesses peacefully. UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams in Rwanda observe increase in volume of commercial activities.

1.4 ECONOMIC

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers throughout the country have noticed high prices of goods and services. Economic activities are going on unimpeded with visible increase in small scale businesses.

1.5 HUMANITARIAN NTR

2. CRIME WAVE

2.1 UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures reported low crime wave in the country.

3. Investigation:

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers in the prefectures are assisting Human Rights Investigation Teams to investigate cases of Human Rights violations by RPA.

4. Training:

The training of gendarmes at RUHENGARI National Gendarmerie Training School is in progress.

Objet:

1. General Situation:

The security situation in Rwanda continues to remain calm.

1.1 Political and Administrative activities:

A. UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures.

B. PMT-GITARAMA Prefecture visited the Burgmestre of RUNDA Commune who assured them of his preparedness to cooperate with the team. He hinted them that the commune has a number of mass graves located at CYABALIZA, KINYAMBI, RUGALIKA and RAYENKI and that about 80,000 people are believed to have been killed within the area during the period of the war.

He further disclosed that RPA in the commune keep suspects in a temporally prison in RUNDA before being transferred to GITARAMA prisons. Human Rights monitors have been informed accordingly.

1.2 SOCIAL

There are noticeable increase in social activities in the country as observed by UNAMIR CIVPOL in the Sectors.

1.3 COMMERCIAL

People are seen going about their business peacefully. UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams in Rwanda observe increase volume of commercial activities.

1.4 ECONOMIC

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers throughout the country have noticed high prices of goods and services. Economic activities are going on unimpeded with visible increase in small scale businesses.

1.5 HUMANITARIAN

A. PMT-GITARAMA Prefecture visited the Burgmestre of RUNDA Commune and reported that there is one govt. clinic and one privately owned clinic for EGUSE church which are faced with acute shortage of drugs.

B. They also disclosed that a number of NGOS operating in the area are distributing seedlings, farming implements and roofing materials to the locals.

C. The locals however require assistance to repair damaged bridges, restoration of pipe borne water and telephone facilities.

D. The commune has 11 primary schools which are operating with one privately owned secondary school yet to reopen. All the schools lack teaching materials and transports.

2. CRIME WAVE

2.1 UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers in the Prefectures reported low crime wave in the country.

2.2 PMT-GITARAMA Prefecture is assisting the military police in the investigation of 2 accident cases which occurred on 8/2/95 and 10/2/95 involving UNAMIR vehicles Nos. 1936 HR and 1097.

C. The team also visited the Ministry of Rehabilitation and Reconstructions where the Director General accused some NGOS operating in RWANDA as "businessmen" particularly those from the European Community countries. That out of 189 NGOS in RWANDA, 24 of them have turned down the ministry's coordination plan.

He further disclosed that some of them have no programme of action and concern for the victims of the unfortunate crises.

Reported that International Prosecutors charged with compilation of relevant records on genocide detainees have requested the National Gendarmerie HQ. to submit investigation reports and other relevant documents/exhibits in respect of locals who have been allegedly accused of genocide during the war.

1.1 Political and Administrative activities:

A. UNAMIR CIVPOL HQ continued coordination and monitoring of activities of CIVPOL Observers in the Sectors.

B. UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams deployed in Sect. 6 reported that the President of RWANDA, Mr. Pasteur BIZIMUNGU will leave the country on 31. Jan. 95 for an official visit to the FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY.

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Team in Sect. 6 disclosed that RWANDAN DEMOCRATIC MOVEMENT (MDR), a coalition Party in RWANDA and the Party of Prime Minister, accused the RPA of arbitrary arrests, abduction and summary execution of political opponents. They cited an illegal detention camp in RILIMA as an example of places where Human Rights violations are carried out by the RPA. These acts they claim have caused the general insecurity prevailing in the country.

1.2 SOCIAL

People are seen going about their social activities peacefully.

1.3 COMMERCIAL

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observers in the Sectors notice visible increase in commercial activities through out RWANDA.

1.4 ECONOMIC

The prices of goods and services continued to remain exorbitant as reported by UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams in the country.

1.5 HUMANITARIAN

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams in the Sectors have reported of the poor condition of Secondary Schools throughout the country. They further disclosed that due to inadequate infrastructure and finances, these educational institutions are unable to reopen as earlier scheduled.

UNAMIR CIVPOL Observer Teams in Sectors 4 B and 4 C report increase in banditry and armed robbery in their areas. The soldiers of the FRGF are suspected to be behind these nefarious activities. Investigation in progress
