**CAMPAIGN BETWEEN HUMANITARIAN AID SPENT IN CAMPS AS  
OPPOSED TO RWANDA**

Tricky. Has attracted a lot of attention; polemics perhaps.

According to the 1995 UN Consolidated Inter-Agency Appeal (CAP), as of 5th Feb 1996, herebelow is a summary of the total requirements and contributions as compiled by DHA for the Sub-Region:

Adj Requirements :	\$ 668,214,031
Pledgs/Contributions:	\$535,412,857
Carry over Funds:	\$161,586,918
Total Funds available:	\$ 696,999,775

Against the background of the Rwanda perspective, a look at the resource mobilization features/characteristics attempts to give an indication of the true picture thus:

- UNICEF- over \$48m (87% of needs covered)
- FAO - all \$ for sub-region available for use in Rwanda i.e. over \$ 12m.
- WFP - over \$ 276m required for persons affected by the crisis in Rwanda (Rwanda and the Sub-Region).

Approximately \$36m of the above WFP amount of \$276m is for use inside Rwanda m (13%).

Yet this 13% covers an average of 130% of the food needs (WFP) of Rwanda. Also, please note that according to the mandate of WFP, food follows need. i.e. where the refugee is.

UNHCR - over \$263m out of which \$30 m falls within the Rwanda perspective (about 11%).

In view of the reservations expressed in certain quarters (particularly the rwandese government), UNHCR in 1996 has budgeted approximately \$60m for use in Rwanda; out of the estimated \$280m budgeted for the sub-region; subject, of course, to the availability of funds.

Of this \$60m, \$22m is for repatriation activities proper: i.e.

- The Joint Commission
- BDA -vehicles
- IOM costs
- Transit centers, etc.

Whilst the remaining \$38m is intended for rehabilitation activities: i.e.

- Health
- Water & sanitation
- Shelter (30%)
- Empowerment and capacity building, etc.

**About 70% of the shelter program is intended for old case-load refugees resident in Nyagatare, Byumba, Kibungo, Gisenyi and South Kigali.**

**The remaining 30% of new housing is for survivors of genocide and other vulnerable groups.**

In Butare, Gikongoro, Gitarama and Cyangugu where there are no discernible old case-load settlements, vulnerable groups and other survivors of genocide will become the main beneficiaries.

#### **Some UNHCR cost-reduction activities in camps**

1. Systematically reducing refugee labour costs, including the salaries of those working for NGOs in the camps so that these camp labour charges are less attractive than what obtains what obtains in Rwanda.

2. Discouraging new development of social and physical infrastructure and other facilities in the camps.

#### **Bottom Line:**

No debate. Just two different perceptions; bordering sometimes on the emotional.

#### **Could it be avoided?**

Perhaps no; taking the respective mandates of the Agencies into consideration.

## **Remedy?**

Co-management of humanitarian programs? Frowned at by donors, Agencies and NGOs alike. As a policy, however, humanitarian programs should be consistent with the macro-economic and sectoral strategies of the Rwandese government. Humanitarian programs should also be more transparent. The government should be involved in the identification, formulation and implementation of humanitarian packages within Rwanda.

## **Is Humanitarian Aid part of the Round Table? If so, what %?**

To the extent that the Geneva RT of Jan1995 had, as its theme, **The Program of National Reconciliation and Socio-Economic Rehabilitation and Recovery**, humanitarian aid could hardly be considered as part of the RT.

In the RT document, the Government of Rwanda estimated a budget of \$353.9m is required for the **Settlement needs** of 200,000 households and **Resettlement needs** of 360,000 households in the Geneva RT presentation. The net financial resources required by the government was \$273.6m under the sub-head **Social Rehabilitation of Refugees and Displaced Persons.**

## **Overlap**

Out of the \$576.6m pledged at the Geneva RT, it is estimated that there was an overlap of about \$130m under The Consolidated Appeal (CAP) in terms of requests. The overlap in pledges was estimated at \$40m by UNDP and the STP (Permanent Technical Secretariat of MINIPLAN).

## **Juggling of Figures**

UNDP asserts that out of pledges of \$586m made in Geneva, \$527.9m has been disbursed as at Feb 26, 1996. i.e Disbursement is 90% of pledges. The lag is estimated at \$64.6 million.

STP on the other hand, says that out of \$576.6m pledged in Geneva, \$300m has been disbursed; with a lag of \$145.5m as at 26 Feb '96.

For the same time frame, STP gives the revised pledges for Agencies and NGOs as \$406m, Committed funds - \$297.3m with \$272.3 disbursed.

DHA, on the other hand, gives a figure of \$109m as Humanitarian Aid to Rwanda as at 5 february.

## **Conclusion**

One should therefore be cautious; and avoid any temptation of dogmatism about these figures anyway.

### **How much direct Humanitarian Aid has been given to the Survivors of Genocide**

Until the Thematic Consultations of 21 & 22 November 1995, survivors of genocide and other associated vulnerable groups were not given pride of place.

Only then did the government declare that like the **themes of repatriation, rehabilitation and socio-economic reintegration**, the **needs of vulnerable groups** most affected by the tragic events of 1994 should be included as a theme.

### **Composition/Categories of Vulnerable groups:**

1. Widows and widowers
2. Unaccompanied children
3. Vulnerable families i.e.
  - receiving unaccompanied children
  - single families headed by adolescents and/or girls who could not meet their basic needs.
4. Traumatized children, adolescents and women. These include young girls and raped women.
5. Children and women in prisons or in detention.
6. Child soldiers
7. Handicapped persons

**Numerous Projects have been slated**

### **The main ones:**

1. 14,000 new homes estimated at \$2.85m with MINIREISO, MINITRAPE and local feminine organizations as partners.
2. Demobilization of Child Soldiers
  - 2,500 Child soldiers- estimated at \$1.2m
3. Mobilization of Youths in favour of peace (Green Hills of Peace).

Min of Youths- 500,000 youths targeted in 145 communes and 11 Prefectures.

**Direct Aid**

Assistance to Orphans \$0.6m

Assistance to Prisons \$1.0m

Street Children \$0.36m

Traumatized Children \$1.8 pledged; **0.36m disbursed.**

Action for Women \$1.0m

Demobilized Child Soldiers \$0.41

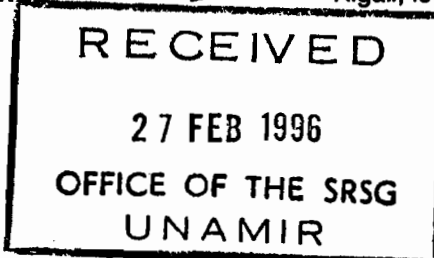

6. **Présentation de l'Organisme Porteur du Projet:** L'Association des Eglises Baptistes au Rwanda (AEBR en sigle) a été créée en 1965 et a obtenu sa personnalité juridique le 20 mai 1967. Depuis ce temps, elle s'est employée à propager la Bonne Nouvelle du Christ, appuyer, initier et lancer des Projets de Développement en faveur des populations les plus défavorisées et nécessiteuses. Elle oeuvre sur toute l'étendue du pays. Avant la guerre, elle comptait 88.000 membres. A présent, ceux qui sont rentrés et présents au pays sont au nombre de 68.000 adhérents, 15.000 sont morts pendant les événements tragiques d'avril-juillet 1994 au Rwanda, et 15.000 restants sont encore en exil. Cependant, l'AEBR multiplie des contacts avec ses brebis qui vivent encore en exil, par les rencontres tenues successivement dans les camps de NGARA (Tanzanie), KATALE (Zaïre), NAIROBI (Kenya). Aujourd'hui, ils rentrent petit à petit.  
A présent, l'AEBR compte:

- 22 écoles primaires, 11 écoles secondaires, 3 dispensaires, ainsi que des Groupements, des Ateliers de menuiserie et de couture dont la liste se trouve sur les pages qui suivent.

## **I. Rappel des objectifs du département de développement**

Pour mieux approcher les communautés villageoises dans le secteur du développement socio-économique, l'Association des Eglises Baptiste au Rwanda a créé son département de développement qui s'est assigné les objectifs suivants:

- Promouvoir l'auto-emploi de la jeunesse dans les milieux touchés par l'Eglise;
- Promouvoir l'auto-emploi de la jeunesse dans les paroisses
- Encourager et soutenir les associations qui se créent dans les villages;
- Promouvoir la santé communautaire;
- Encourager les petits projets d'auto-promotion;
- Organiser les formations au niveau de la base et au niveau des leaders;
- Promouvoir l'éducation formelle des jeunes ;
- Evaluer les programmes.

## **II. Analyse de la situation socio-économique actuelle du Rwanda**

Le Rwanda vient de sortir d'une guerre meurtrière qui a duré 4 ans de 1990 à 1994. Après 9 ans d'activités, le bureau de développement avait largement atteint les objectifs qu'il s'était assignés. Malheureusement tous ces résultats ont été presque anéantis par cette guerre.

- Le massacre des civils a occasionné l'abondance des veuves et des orphelins
- Les réfugiés rentrent du pays en état des nécessiteux
- Cette guerre a augmenté le nombre d'handicapés physiques et mentaux.
- Les terres n'ont pas été défrichées et les coopératives n'existent plus puisque les membres ont soit été tués, soit fui à l'étranger.

Etant donné ces difficultés que traverse le pays, le département de développement de l'AEBR a défini des objectifs prioritaires qui sont:

- La réhabilitation et le rééquipement des institutions socio-économiques détruites (Ecoles, centres de santé, Eglises, groupements, coopératives).
- L'aide aux réfugiés nécessiteux : Cette aide devrait être orientée vers l'octroi des semences et des intrants agricoles pour que ceux-ci puissent être autosuffisants dans les jours à venir.
- Promouvoir et consolider le mouvement associatif pour les réfugiés et les autres populations. (Cette philosophie permettra aux coopérateurs de travailler ensemble, de partager et de dialoguer. Ce sera selon notre entendement la pierre angulaire de la Réconciliation Nationale.
- Séminaires sur la conception, élaboration, exécution et suivi des projets ainsi que sur l'administration et la gestion coopérative.
- Faire le suivi et l'évaluation de ce programme.

## **III. Les activités prévues**

### **A. Réhabilitation des infrastructures pré-existantes endommagées par la guerre**

Il existe 22 écoles primaires et 11 écoles secondaires de l'AEBR. Tous ces établissements ont été quasiment détruits et pillés, si bien même certaines fonctionnent aujourd'hui c'est dans des conditions difficiles. Nous avons commencé déjà à les rééquiper et les redynamiser.

L'AEBR disposait de 3 centres de santé, eux aussi ont été endommagés. Leur réfection et équipement sont dans cette priorité intitulée ci-haut. Nous avons commencé également à les faire démarrer. Le Bureau de Développement compte organiser des séances de formation en santé communautaire.

Il existe 14 régions ecclésiastiques qui ont chacune au moins une église partiellement détruite et pillée, 3 centres de santé, 2 centres professionnels et 9 bâtiments des coopératives ayant gravement démolis et pillés.

Les techniciens du Département de Développement se rendront de préférence sur terrain pour évaluer les dégâts avec les bénéficiaires et faire un projet de demande de fonds. Dans le cas où

Ils ne pourront pas se rendre sur terrain, ils reçoivent les Pasteurs concernés des idées de projets en leur fournissant les données nécessaires tirées à la base; faute de moyen de déplacement.

## **B. Assistance aux réfugiés nécessiteux qui rentrent au pays**

Normalement, ces réfugiés nécessiteux sont signalés dans certaines communes de la préfecture de Gisenyi, Ruhengeri et Kibuye. En effet ce sont en grande partie des anciens réfugiés de 1959 qui habitaient les zones de Masisi et Rutshuru (Zaire). Après avoir fui une guerre civile qui y sévissait, ils ont été dépouillés du peu de biens qu'ils ont pu amener à la frontière Zaïro-Rwandaise par des militaires Zaïrois. Comme les communes qu'ils ont occupées ont un sol très fertile, le bureau de développement a orienté leur demande d'aide vers les semences et les intrants agricoles. Ainsi dans le temps à venir, ces réfugiés pourront être autosuffisants. Notez que le Ministre de la Réhabilitation et de l'Intégration Sociale leur a donné des terres et des parcelles pour habiter.

## **C. Promotion du mouvement associatif**

Avant la guerre, le département de développement animait 18 groupements agricoles et 2 ateliers de couture des dames.

Naturellement avec la guerre, les bâtiments de ces coopérations ont été détruits et les membres ont été tués, ou ont fui à l'étranger. Le Département de développement se propose donc:

- De veiller à la réfection et à l'équipement des bâtiments détruits
- Animer la population pour une adhésion massive des membres.
- Organiser des séminaires de formation:

- \* Administration et gestion d'une coopérative
- \* Concevoir, élaborer, exécuter et faire le suivi d'un projet

Ces séminaires seront suivis par les pasteurs, les responsables des écoles et les responsables des coopératives et d'autres groupements.

- Créer de nouvelles coopératives.

## **D. Auto-emploi de la jeunesse**

Quatre menuiseries et trois briqueterie et tuilerie étaient opérationnelles avant la guerre.

Actuellement aucune des deux ne fonctionne puisque tout le matériel a été pillé. Pourtant après la guerre, beaucoup de jeunes sont désœuvrés puisque les écoles sont chères et difficile à trouver et plus la jeunesse a tendance à laisser les activités agricoles aux plus âgés. C'est pourquoi nous voudrions être un catalyseur pour les animer à se regrouper dans des associations. Notez que le marché de leurs produits de menuiserie ou briquetterie et tuilerie sont agogo car la reconstruction et réfection se font sentir dans tout le pays.

Le bureau de développement se propose de multiplier ces centres de formation professionnelle pour occuper cette jeunesse désœuvrée.

**N.B.:** Les projets sont conçus avec la base, ils sont élaborés, exécutés avec elles: Le suivi et l'évaluation doivent se faire également avec elle en collaboration avec notre Département. Le suivi des projets se fera 1 fois par trimestre, tandis que l'évaluation sera à la fin de chaque projet.

## **E. Assistance aux veuves et orphelins**

- Il s'agira de soulager leur détresse en les aidant à réfectionner leurs maisons détruites pendant les événements tragiques d'avril-juillet 94
- Leur assurer un petit équipement ménager de base
- Leur assurer de la semence et outils agricoles pour leur auto-suffisance alimentaire.
- Leur stimuler à se regrouper en Mouvements Associatifs pour essayer de résoudre en commun leurs problèmes dus aux exigences naturels connus par notre pays. Bref les aider à s'auto-suffire en vue de leur permettre à éduquer leurs orphelins.
- Assister les orphelins en équipements scolaires (uniformes, objets scolaires et frais de scolarité) pour ceux n'ayant aucun membre de famille rescapé des massacres et génocide au Rwanda en avril-juillet 95.

#### **IV. JUSTIFICATION DU BESOIN**

Selon notre entendement, la gestion dde ce Programme quinquennal Inclut 5 opérations Importantes que nous pouvons énumérer dans l'ordre suivant:

Gérer: Planifier, Organiser, Administrer, Contrôler et Evaluer toutes ces opérations. Il va de soi que celles-ci seront réalisées par le Département de Développement de l'AEBR, à l'égard de tous les Projets dont l'AEBR suscite l'éclosion.

Pour y arriver, des ressources sont nécessaires. Parmi celles-ci, nous soulignons le besoin d'un matériel roulant pouvant assurer le déplacement en commun de plusieurs agents. Ce Projet rendra service non seulement à l'Eglise mais aussi à toutes les populations touchées par notre département de Développement qui encadre à présent plusieurs Projets socio-économiques situés dans toutes les Préfectures du pays (voir chapitre de "champ & type d'activités"

Aujourd'hui, Il nous est parfois difficile d'atteindre tous les Projets car Il nous arrive d'emprunter le transport public (taxi muni-bus, de transport en commun), de demander des rift, ou de faire le pieds. Quand nous marchons à pieds pour visiter les veuves et les orphelins, ou visiter les Projets initiés par la population, ou entendre leurs problèmes, il y a des endroits où nous faisons 5 heures de marche à pieds (surtout dans la préfecture de Kibuye, Gikongoro, Byumba, Kibungo, Gisenyi et Cyangugu).

Signalons qu'avant la guerre l'AEBR disposait de 5 véhicules et de 2 motos-qui, malheureusement ont été pillés, parmi lesquels un véhicule tout terrain et une moto appartenant au Département de Développement. Ce véhicule et cette moto servait au Département de Développement/AEBR pour la gestion de Projets encadrés par lui. A présent, l'AEBR dispose d'un véhicule du Représentant Légal, nous offert en avril 95 par des bienfaiteurs. 

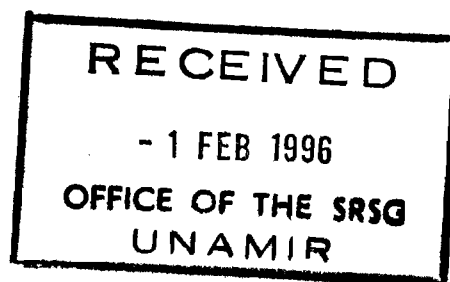

The United Nations proposed on Wednesday a \$70.5 million program to repair damage to the environment and infrastructure in countries hosting Rwandan refugees.

A package of projects was presented to a technical meeting of donors in Geneva called by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the United Nations Development Program. A pledging conference is expected to be convened later to raise funds for specific projects of interest to donors.

Kamal Morjane, director of UNHCR's Regional Bureau for Africa, expressed the hope that the international community will support the projects. He said such support would acknowledge the generosity and show appreciation for the hospitality extended to the refugees by the people of the countries of asylum over the past three years.

"This initiative is vital in the effort to help repair the ravages of a massive human tragedy which has affected the lives of many people, not only in Rwanda, but in neighboring countries as well," said Alan Doss, director of UNDP's European office.

The proposed portfolio of projects worth \$70.5 million was designed for rapid implementation over a short period and would complement projects already underway. They involve efforts to stop environmental damage, including an end to unregulated wood cutting by refugees outside the camp; reforestation; rehabilitation of roads, ports and communications facilities and sanitation, health and education services; and poverty alleviation and income generation activities.

Wednesday's meeting implements one of the decisions taken during the Conference on Assistance to Refugees, Returnees and Displaced Persons in the Great Lakes region organized by the Organization of African Unity and UNHCR in Bujumbura in February 1995. The Bujumbura conference requested UNDP to prepare a program, in collaboration with UNHCR, that addresses environmental damage caused by the influx of some 1.8 million Rwandan refugees in Zaire, Tanzania and Burundi.

Last year's meeting in Bujumbura also called for the voluntary repatriation of about 1 million Rwandan refugees in Zaire, nearly 600,000 in Tanzania and 152,000 in Burundi. However, the large majority of these refugees have not yet returned home.

**SUBJECT:** HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

1. As you are aware, the subject of Humanitarian assistance has been discussed on several occasions in the past few months.
2. Considering that UNAMIR has very limited assets and money available for the Services Contract to support the Mission, it has been decided that only very specific WORs requesting services would be authorized once approved by HAC and CISS/CAO. These WORs once approved will be executed in the normal course of activities.
3. However, some of the tasks not eligible to be executed on a WOR will be considered to be accomplished by UNAMIR military, civilian and Contractor staff during their free time. This concept based on my previous experience in past missions was proposed a few weeks ago and was accepted by all concerns.
4. Therefore, prior your departure on leave a few weeks ago, I asked you to discuss the matter with your international and TCN employees to see if some of them (mainly in the services and transport activity sectors) would agree to give some of their time to provide humanitarian assistance. Mr Tompkins, in your absence, indicated that indeed some of your employees would be happy to help.
5. Following the reception of this positive answer, I informed the HAC civilian representative, Mr Lombardo. I asked him to have HAC to review the requests that they had received so far in order to provide me a list of services requested. This list was

received at my office this morning and is attached to this memo.

6. As previously mentioned, these tasks should be executed only when the equipment is not required for official UNAMIR tasks. Employees involved will not be paid during the time they execute those tasks but they will be considered on duty. UNAMIR will accept the liability if an accident, not due to gross negligence, occurs and will provide the fuel/maintenance of the vehicles/equipment involved to provide this assistance.

7. Mr Lombardo will monitor the situation and screen these humanitarian assistance requests to ensure that only valid requests are accepted and that your personnel is not overtaxed. Each case will be allocated a priority (1 to 5) and within each priority group, tasks should be executed according to the reception date of the request. I would appreciate that you inform me and CHAO and STO periodically (suggest every two weeks) on the tasks which have been accomplished. New task requests will be sent to me and I will forward them to you.

8. On behalf of UNAMIR, I take this opportunity to thank you and your staff to accept to participate in this program and to help the Rwandese community.

In rural settlements and camps, in addition to basic life-sustaining activities, self-reliance projects in agriculture and livestock and vocational training will be offered. A forestry project implemented by the national authorities in Tanzania will start with UNHCR support in order to limit the environmental damage caused by the massive presence of refugees in Ngara region.

The complexity of this programme also requires that UNHCR support large refugee administrations of Governments, NGO implementing partners and UNHCR field offices in each country. In addition to staff salaries and allowances, UNHCR provides office premises, office equipment and supplies, as well as vehicles and other equipment. UNHCR will seek the assistance of UNV specialists to strengthen its implementation capacity.

In response to continued spontaneous repatriation of Burundi refugees, UNHCR will be continuing its assistance programme in the main commune of origins in Burundi. Activities meant to complement actions by the ICRC and NGOs will focus on food distribution and the provision of building materials and essential domestic supplies.

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<sup>14</sup> UNHCR is appealing for resources to fund activities on a regional level, in order to meet the needs of Rwandan and Burundi refugees and returnees for the period 1 January-31 December 1994. Funds requested here represent the shortfall for that period. UNHCR will be issuing a more detailed document on this programme to supplement this Appeal.

Multisectoral assistance has also been planned for a potential spontaneous return to Rwanda. Wide in scope, this programme will include activities to meet immediate emergency needs (including food distribution, provision of domestic items, shelter and water and sanitation facilities) as well as rehabilitation activities (including training of health personnel and rehabilitation of health centres, agricultural incentive programmes, income generating activities and community service programmes).

In the absence of complete calm in Rwanda and with fighting continuing in the west of the country, the possibility of further refugee outflows cannot be excluded. The fragile situation in neighbouring Burundi may also result in further flows of refugees. A contingency provision is therefore included in this Appeal for possible new influxes. Contingency resources are also needed for potential further returns of Burundi refugees.
