HAPPY NEW YEAR

1. **GENERAL SITUATION.** The general situation has witnessed a slight change. Acts of banditry were on the decline during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

2. **OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.**

a. MILOBS distributed Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS) packets to Nyarusange and Gashweru health centres in MUSHUBATI Commune (6970).

b. 95 CMSG moved a generator within the complex of Gatagara Centre in KIGOMA Commune (7649) on 27 Dec 95.

c. MILOBS assisted in shifting of MILD OFFENDERS from Gitarama to their respective communes. These pers were recently arrested in Kigali for not possessing work permit.

d. FORCE ENGR COY excavator working at the GITARAMA prison has completed its task. It has dug three pits to improve the sanitary conditions in the prison. The size of the pits are 22M x 6M x 3M , 22m x 12M x 3M and 18M x 6M x 3M.

e. INDBATT provided two trucks for transportation of Ballet dancers from MURAMA Commune to Gitarama on 30 Dec 95 to participate in the reconciliation function at the GITARAMA stadium.

f. MILOBS participated in the reconciliation function at the GITARAMA Stadium on 30 Dec 95. The function was attended by the Vice-President, Prime Minister and a large number of ministers from Kigali.

FOR THE PERIOD 18 DEC - 24 DEC 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not seen much significant change. Acts of banditry were on the decline during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. MILOBS distributed Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS) packets to various health centres in all the communes of the prefecture.

b. SECT CDR and HUM OFFR attended a meeting organised by UNHCR with NGOs to coordinate plans for receiving a maximum of 500 returnees daily in GITARAMA Prefecture. The new transit centre at RUNDA Commune (9882) is expected to hold upto 3000 returnees. UNHCR is trying to find another NGO to replace MSF France which was tasked to provide an emergency medical team.

c. HUM OFFR attended a NGOs meeting organised at the prefecture on 22 Dec 95. The meeting was attended by 12 NGOs working in GITARAMA Prefecture. The NGOs gave an overview of activities in the preceeding year and their plans for the following year.

d. FORCE ENGR COY excavator working at the GITARAMA prison has dug two pits. The size of the pits are 22M x 6M x 3M and 22m x 12M x 3M.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food. No change from last report. Food is still reported to inadequate in the communes. CARITAS is distributing food to very poor families in the prefecture on a regular basis.

b. Water. There is a marked improvement in the water supply in Gitarama and surrounding communes.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. Diarrhoea and Malaria continue to be a problem in the prefecture. There is no reported case of any endemic disease. ICRC continues to monitor hygiene and sanitation in the cachots.

d. Housing. LWF and CARITAS are assisting in the reconstruction of houses in KIGOMA and NTONGWE Communes. SALVATION ARMY is constructing new houses in KAYENZI Commune (8389).

e. Education. No change.

f. Farming Activities. People have requested for urgent assistance in the provision of insecticides for treatment of Potato crops which has been affected severely.

g. Roads and bridges. No Change.

h. Electricity. No change.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. NTR.

b. Hospital. SALVATION ARMY will cease support to GITEGA Health centre of NYAKABANDA Commune (6597) wef the New year. ICRC has pledged support.

c. Handicap. NTR.

d. Elderlies. NTR.

e. Widows. NTR.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Returnees. See Annex A for statistics.

h. Prisoners. See Annex B for statistics.

5. ACTIVITIES OF NGOS.

a. ACIST and LWF are undertaking agricultural and rehabilitation programmes in MUGINA Commune (9267).

b. CONCERN is constructing a temporary camp for returnees in RUYENZI SECTOR of Runda Commune (9882).

c. ARDEC is still engaged in the reconstruction of houses in RUNDA Commune (9882).

d. LWF is engaged in repair of damaged houses in TAMBWE Commune (7653) and NTONGWE Commune (9057).

e. CRS is winding up its activities in MURAMA Commune (6749) by distributing seeds, fertilisers and goats to the locals.

f. SALVATION ARMY distributed Christmas items including blankets, jerricans, cups, bowls, footballs and plates in KAYENZI Commune (6389) on 21 Dec 95.

g. CONCERN is feeding prisoners in MUGINA and NTONGWE Commune cachots on a five day basis from Monday to Friday.

6. ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES. Hum Offr maintains constant contact with HRFOR and UNHCR officers. ICRC continues to monitor hygiene and sanitation in the various commune cachots.

7. REQUESTS FOR HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE.

a. Request for septic truck for Nyanza Orphanage and Musambira Commune cachot has still NOT materialised.

b. Favourable action is requested on our request for provision of mattresses, pillows and bed sheets. (MILOBS SECTOR 1B letter dated 22 Nov 95 refers).

8. CONCLUSION. Demand for humanitarian assistance far exceeds our resources. The NGOs are however making efforts at meeting some of the requests. Humanitarian efforts at the sector level will continue to be largely, one of liaison.

9. ASSESSMENT.

a. The activities of the NGOs and agencies involved in looking after the welfare of returnees is slowly, but, surely bearing fruit. It is just a matter of time before things could be expected to return to normal.

b. The outstanding requests as per Para 7 above should be actioned as soon as possible.

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not seen much significant change. Acts of banditry were on the decline during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. MILOBS distributed Oral Rehydration Salts (ORS) packets to various health centres in all the communes of the prefecture.

b. FORCE SIG COY provided one truck to transport PINEAPPLE saplings from RUHANGO to Kabgayi for a WIDOW association 'ASSOCIATION NKUNGANIRE', on 05 Dec 95.

c. One hundred blankets were donated to KABGAYI Orphanage. These blankets were received from Austrian Relief Program.

d. Force Engr Coy representatives completed initial recce on the request of ICRC to dig additional pits to improve the sanitary condition in GITARAMA Prison on 04 Dec 95.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food. No change from last report. Food is still reported to be inadequate in the communes. Prisoners face shortage of food which has been further aggravated by drastic increase in the number of arrests during the month of Nov 95.

b. Water. There is a marked improvement in the water supply in Gitarama and surrounding communes.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. Diarrhoea and Malaria continue to be a problem in the prefecture. There is no reported case of any endemic disease. ICRC continues to provide medical care to prisoners in the cachots.

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not seen much significant change. Acts of banditry were on the decline during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. The Humanitarian Officer collected 225 Boxes of ORS from CISS in trafipro on 02 Dec 95. INDBATT provided one truck for the transportation of the same to Sector HQ, GITARAMA.

b. INDBATT provided one truck to transport furniture from NYAMABUYE COMMUNE to MUSHUBATI Commune (6970) on 27 Nov 95.

c. MILOBS assisted in transportation of 2,500 Pine-apple saplings from Ruhango to Kaggayi in GITARAMA, for ASSOCIATION NKUNGANIRE.

d. MILOBS distributed clothes donated by HR Representatives to orphans in MUGINA Commune (9267) on 28 Nov 95.

e. One hundred blankets were handed over to NUNS at the church at MUGINA for distribution to orphans in the commune.

a. Request for septic truck for Nyanza Orphanage and Musambira Commune cachot has still **NOT** materialised.



FOR THE PERIOD 20 NOV - 26 NOV 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not seen much significant change. Acts of banditry were on the decline during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. The Humanitarian Officer collected 300 blankets from AUSTRIAN RELIEF PROGRAMME on 24 Nov 95 for distribution to orphans. The blankets would be distributed next week.

b. INDBATT provided one truck to transport furniture from GITARAMA Prefecture to MUSAMBIRA Commune (8274) on 25 Nov 95.

c. MILOBS participated in the Prefecture vaccination programme by transporting Polio vaccines and medical staff from GITARAMA PREFECTURE to NYAKABANDA Commune (6597) throughout the week. NGOs working in Gitarama also participated in the programme.

d. INDBATT provided one truck to SALVATION ARMY on 24 Nov 95 for transportation of logs for repair of a bridge in KAYENZI Commune (8389).

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

a. Food. No change from last report. Food is still reported to be inadequate in the communes. Prisoners face shortage of food which has been further aggravated by drastic increase in the number of arrests.

b. Water. There is a marked improvement in the water supply in Gitarama and surrounding communes.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. Diarrhoea and Malaria continue to be a problem in the prefecture. There is no reported case of any endemic disease. ICRC continues to provide medical care to prisoners in the cachots.

d. Housing. No change from previous report.

e. Education. No change.

f. Farming Activities. Shortage of agricultural implements and seeds is being addressed by the Agricultural Dept of the Prefecture. Distribution of seeds and hoes was carried out by NGOs in three sectors of MUKINGI COMMUNE (7160) on 22 Nov 95.

g. Roads and bridges. BOURGEMESTRE of Kayenzi Commune has requested for a truck to transport logs from Commune Office to Bitare Sector within the commune on 29 Nov 95.

h. Electricity. No change.

a. Orphanages. WORLD FOOD PROGRAMME is being approached to provide food to NYANZA Orphanage and CENA of HANIKA centre for unaccompanied children in KIGOMA Commune (7649). Progress will be intimated shortly.

b. Hospital. MUKOMA Health Centre in KIGOMA COMMUNE (7649) is regularly being assisted by INITIATIVE and HUMANITAIRE AFRICAINE by supplying medicine and salary to the staff.

5. ACTIVITIES OF NGOS.

- b. SALVATION ARMY carried out distribution of insecticides for coffee plantations in Bunyonga Sector of KAYENZI COMMUNE.
- c. CONCERN is engaged in construction of kitchen for the prisoners in MURAMA Commune cachot. They plan to provide one hot meal a day and drinking water to the prisoners.
- d. FEED THE CHILDREN distributed schooling material to children of primary school of Butare Sector of KIGOMA Commune (7649). The NGO also repaired the primary school which was damaged during the war.
- e. LWF is engaged in repair of damaged houses in TAMBWE Commune (7653) and NTONGWE Commune (9057).

6. ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES. Hum Offr maintains constant contact with HRFOR and UNHCR officers. ICRC continues to provide medical assistance to prisoners in the various commune cachots.

7. REQUESTS FOR HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE.

- a. Request for septic truck for Nyanza Orphanage and Musambira Commune cachot has still NOT materialised.
- b. Transport request for transportation of desks and benches in MUSHUBATI Commune is still outstanding. (HAC letter No 5000.1 (HAC)/A/1 dated 09 Nov 95 refers).
- c. Favourable action is requested on our request for provision of mattresses, pillows and bed sheets. (MILOBS SECTOR 1B letter dated 22 Nov 95 refers).

8. CONCLUSION. Demand for humanitarian assistance far exceeds our resources. The NGOs are however making efforts at meeting some of the requests. Humanitarian efforts at the sector level will continue to be largely, one of liaison. INDBATT has been very cooperative in providing assistance to the sector even at short notice and needs to be complimented for the same.

9. ASSESSMENT.

a. The activities of the NGOs and agencies involved in looking after the welfare of returnees is slowly, but, surely bearing fruit. It is just a matter of time before things could be expected to return to normal.

b. The outstanding requests as per Para 7 above should be actioned as soon as possible.

However, people have as usual complained about shortage of seeds, fertilisers and insecticides. The overall situation is reported to be calm.

FOR THE PERIOD 30 OCT - 05 NOV 95

1. **GENERAL SITUATION.** The general situation has not seen any significant change. Widespread acts of banditry occurred during the week. MILOBS have reported that people are busy with cultivation. However, people have complained about shortage of insecticides.

2. **OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.**

a. The Humanitarian Officer visited the **CYEZA Orphanage** in **RUTOBWE** commune on 03 Nov 95. INDBATT provided two trucks for transportation of firewood from **Nyamabuye Commune (7570)** to **CYEZA Orphanage** on 04 Nov 95. Balance of the firewood would be transported next week.

b. **MILOBS** and **HRFOR** continued to liaise with **NGOs** in the Prefecture to appraise about the preparations to receive the over 45000 refugees estimated to be arriving from **ZAIRE** and other refugee camps.

c. VIDEO and TV were provided to Nurses School at Kabgayi for recreation of the inmates.

d. Humanitarian Officer visited all the orphanages in the Prefecture. **Nyanza Orphanage** in **KIGOMA COMMUNE (7649)** is in dire necessity of basic amenities like mattresses, food and water.

e. **MILOBS** delivered one **OLIVETTI** typewriter each from the prefecture to **TABA** and **RUNDA** Communes on 31 Oct 95.

f. 95 CMSG LOG Ops moved a container belonging to **CONCERN** from **MUSAMBIRA** to the market at **GITARAMA** on 05 Nov 95. **MILOBS** assisted the recovery team in coord of the recovery of the container.

g. Two trucks from Force engr coy transported 3.5 Tons of rice and 4 Tons of beans from WFP warehouse in KIGALI to **ACEJ Secondary School** in **MUSHUBATI COMMUNE (6970)** on 02 Nov 95.

h. HUM offr visited the commune cachots in MASANGO (6254) and TABA (8883) to assess the requirement for providing doors and locks for more spacious rooms to ease congestions in these cachots. Details of the requirement and estimates will be submitted to FSO.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

a. Food. No change from last report. Food is still inadequate in the communes. Prisoners face shortage of food which has been further aggravated by increase in the number of arrests.

b. Water. There is a marked improvement in the water supply in Gitarama and surrounding communes. TABA Commune is facing accute water shortage.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. Diarrhoea and Malaria continue to be a problem in the prefecture. Diarrhoea is prevalent amongst the prisoners. There is no reported case of any endemic disease. ICRC continues to provide medical care to prisoners in the cachots.

d. Housing. "Agency Rwandese for Development and Cooperation" (ARDEC), a Rwandese NGO, is constructing houses in Runda Commune (9882). They plan to construct 764 houses in that commune. According to their representative, they already have constructed about 100. CRS and Salvation Army have expressed similar sentiments.

e. Education. No change.

f. Farming Activities. Shortage of agricultural implements and seeds is being addressed by the Agricultural Dept of the Prefecture. Distribution of seeds and hoes was carried out by NGOs in MURAMA Commune (6749). People have complained regarding shortage of insecticides to treat crop infected by insects. NGOS are being approached to assist in this regard.

g. Roads and bridges. No change.

h. Electricity. No change.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. NYANZA Orphanage in KIGOMA Commune (7649) is in desperate need of mattresses, blankets and food.

b. Hospital. NTR.

c. Handicap. NTR.

d. Elderlies. NTR.

e. Widows. NTR.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Returnees. See Annex A for statistics. A total of 1410 Returnees are confirmed to have arrived by the MILOBS.

h. Prisoners. See Annex B for statistics. A total of 2858 prisoners are held in the commune cachots out of which 443 prisoners are without food supply.

5. ACTIVITIES OF NGOS. Good. Salvation Army request for transport to transport food from GITARAMA to KAYENZI Commune (8389) is still outstanding.

6. ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES. Hum Offr maintains constant contact with HRFOR and UNHCR officers. ICRC continues to provide medical assistance to prisoners in the various commune cachots.


7. REQUESTS FOR HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE. Request for septic truck for Nyanza Orphanage and Musambira Commune cachot has still NOT materialised.

8. CONCLUSION. Demand for humanitarian assistance far exceeds our resources. The NGOs are however making efforts at meeting some of the requests. Humanitarian efforts at the sector level will continue to be largely, one of liaison.

9. ASSESSMENT.

a. The activities of all NGOs and agencies involved in looking after the welfare of returnees should be well coordinated to avoid duplication.

b. The outstanding transport request for Salvation Army should be actioned as soon as possible.

FOR THE PERIOD 23- 29 OCT 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not seen any significant change. Widespread acts of banditry occurred during the week. Officials attribute this upsurge to the increased number of returnees to the Prefecture. Shop owners and the wealthy as well as cattle are the main targets. Several arrests have been made.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. The Humanitarian Officer visited the **CYEZA Orphanage** in **RUTOBWE** commune and the **ST BERNADETTE School** for orphaned girls at **KAMONYI** in the **TABA** commune during the week.

b. **MILOBS** and **HO** continued to liaise with **NGOs** in the Prefecture to appraise their preparations to receive the over 45000 refugees estimated to be arriving from **ZAIRE** and other refugee camps.

c. Two trucks from **INDBATT** conveyed chemicals for the water treatment plant on behalf of **ELECTROGAZ** from **KIGALI** to **GITARAMA** on 24 Oct 95.

d. Humanitarian Officer met with an officials of **MEMISA** and **MERLIN** to discuss their possible operation in communes not adequately covered by NGO activities.

e. 95 **CMSG LOG** Ops carried out a recce of the container at **MUSAMBIRA** on 29 Oct 95. This is believed to be the last recce for the movement of the container to the **GITARAMA** market on behalf of **CONCERN**.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

a. Food. No change from last report. The situation is further aggravated by the increasing arrests.

b. Water. There is marked improvement in **GITARAMA** and surrounding communes. **TABA** Commune is facing acute water problems.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. CARITAS has taken over the running of KABGAYI HOSPITAL from MSF. ICRC continues to provide medical care for the prisoners. Diarrhoea is still prevalent.

d. Housing. The various NGOs involved in housing projects have intensified their activities. Salvation Army, ARDEC, AFXB are particularly active in the prefecture.

e. Education. Most schools are being rehabilitated but progress is slow as some of the NGOs supporting them have failed to return after the war. The KUSHISHIRO Secondary School in BULINGA commune sponsored by ACODES (Association Pour l'Contribution au Development Economic et Socio-culture) is still yet to open because the school authorities have lost contact with the NGO.

f. Farming Activities. No change. Complaints about lack of seeds continued to be made by farmers to MILOBS.

g. Roads and bridges. No change.

h. Electricity. The electricity situation in GITARAMA has been very erratic of late.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. Request for water tank for St Bernadette, KAMONYI is still outstanding. NTONGWE and BULINGA communes with large concentration of orphans have no orphanages.

b. Hospital. See para 3c.

c. Handicap. NTR.

d. Elderlies. NTR.

e. Widows. NTR.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Returnees. See Annex A for statistics.

h. Prisoners. See Annex B for statistics.

5. ACTIVITIES OF NGOS. About 16 NGOs are engaged on various projects in the prefecture. Details of these projects will be submitted separately.

6. ACTIVITIES OF UN AGENCIES. UNICEF is very active in the

distribution of school materials. Human Rights and UNHCR field officers continue to visit prisons and cachots.

7. REQUESTS FOR HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE. MEMISA requests a water tank for the REMERA-RUKOMA Hospital in TABA commune. The Bourgmestres of TABA and MUGINA request transport to move prisoners to other communes. Eight (8) and ten (10) prisoners respectively are involved. CYEZA Orphanage requires assistance to transport fuel wood to the orphanage.

8. CONCLUSION. Demand for seeds and food has become a recurrent issue. NGOs are however aware of the impact the returnees would have on society and are therefore working hard to avert possible population pressure. MILOBS will continue liaison activities and offer assistance where possible.

9. ASSESSMENT. The situation over the next few weeks will not change much. Isolated acts of banditry will continue. The prefecture will witness increased NGO activity in the coming weeks.



1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week. The Milobs report that people are complaining about shortage of food and agricultural material.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. Milobs continued delivery of UNICEF schooling material from Gitarama to the communes. This week 19 boxes were moved to KAYENZI Commune (8389), 2 boxes to NYAKABANDA Commune (6597), 22 boxes to NYAMABUYE Commune (7570) and 19 boxes to NTONGWE Commune (9057).

b. INDBATT provided 4 trucks for transportation of fertilisers from Kigali. A total of 14 tons was transported and distributed to RUNDA Commune (9882), MUSAMBIRA Commune (8274) and NYAMABUYE Commune (7570). (Two tons each).

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food. Food still remains one of the main problems reported from various communes. Food donated by WFP has already been distributed in all the communes.

b. Water. Water situation in GITARAMA town has normalised for the time being.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. No changes. MEMISA has requested for transportation of approx 10 Tons of rations for supplementary feeding of infants, from Kigali to their clinics in Gitarama Prefecture.

d. Housing. "Agency Rwandese for Development and Cooperation" (ARDEC), a Rwandese NGO, is constructing houses in Runda Commune (9882). They plan to construct 764 houses in that commune. According to their representative, they already have constructed about 100.

Milobs observed some 15 of them in the central village of Runda. ARDEC intends to spread its activities to TABA Commune (8883) as well.

e. Education. No change.

f. Farming Activities. Shortage of agricultural implements and seeds still remains one of the main problems reported from various communes. Agricultural department of the Prefecture still requires to transport 18 tons of fertilizers from Kigali to Gitarama which is likely to be completed in the coming week.

g. Roads and bridges. It is learnt from Force engr coy that repair of three bridges on the road leading to " POLE DE DEVELOPMENT " Centre in RUNDA Commune (9882) has NOT yet been completed.

h. Electricity. Electricity situation in Gitarama town has normalised to a large extent.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. Ruli orphanage at NYAMABUYE Commune (7570) run by CONCERN has closed down and merged with GITARAMA orphanage also run by CONCERN.

e. Widows. NTR.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Good. This week Hum Offr met the representatives of MSF, ICRC, CONCERN and ACIST. "Salvation Army" request for transportation of 25 tons of food from Gitarama to Kayenzi Commune (8389) is likely to be executed in the coming week.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Hum Offr maintains constant contact with HRFOR and UNHCR officers. UNHCR representative operating in this prefecture has 34 tons of seeds and 3,400 hoes to be distributed among the returnees.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. CONCLUSION. Some progress in the humanitarian situation has been noticed due to the activities of different NGOs and UN agencies. We have a lot of requests, the bulk of them may never be executed due to our scarce resources. Nevertheless, constant efforts are being put in for the execution of humanitarian tasks.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS.

(a) There may be a necessity to device ways and means to cut down the time lag between projection of a request for humanitarian assistance and its final execution.

(b) Transport resources may be provided to transport food material of MEMISA from Kigali to Gitarama.

WEEKLY HUMANITARIAN REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD OF 23 - 29 SEP 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week. The Milobs report that people are strongly complaining that UNAMIR only asks them about their problems without rendering any real aid.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. Milobs continue delivery of scholar material from Gitarama to the communes. This week 16 boxes were moved to Rutobwe Commune (7781), 16 boxes to Ntongwe Commune (9057), 16 to Bulinga (6679) and 17 to Kigoma (7649).

b. A special team went to Nyabikenke Commune (7292) to deliver the generator belonging to "Groupe l'Ecole Nyabikenke" after it was repaired in the UNAMIR's workshop.

c. Hum Offr together with Civpol team investigated the case of arresting a 14 years old boy accused for stealing a bicycle without sufficient evidences. He was imprisoned in the Nyamabuye Commune jail. After the intervention of the Gitarama Prosecutor the guy was released till the completion of investigation.

d. Hum Offr delivered one bag of second hand clothes for orphans in Rugalika Sector (9574), Runda Commune, fixed by one of the HCHR officers.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food. Food still remains one of the main problems reported from various communes.

b. Water.

(1) Water situation in Gitarama town has normalized.

(2) ICRC delivered 40,000 L of water to "Centre Rwandais de Formation de Cadres" (see our previous reports), thus their problem was solved for some time.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. Hum Offr met the representative of Karambi Health Center in Masango Commune (6254) supported by MEMISA. Number of beds: 45. Average per day attendance: 50 patients. Needs:

- mattresses;
- gynecological chair and some other equipment for maternity section;
- nutrition for babies;
- ambulance vehicle.

d. Housing. "Agency Rwandese for Development and Cooperation" (ARDEC), a Rwandese NGO, is conducting houses construction in Runda Commune (9882). They plan to construct in that commune 764 houses. According to their representative, they already have constructed about 100. Milobs observed some 15 of them in the central village of Runda. ARDEC intends to spread its activities to Taba Commune (8883) as well.

e. Education. The only secondary school in Bulinga Commune (6679) can not be opened because of shortage of funds to repair the building and purchase necessary equipment. The Bourgomestre has sent a letter to the Minister of Education asking for financing (a copy of the letter is available).

f. Farming Activities. Shortage of agricultural implements and seeds still remains one of the main problems reported from various communes. Agricultural department of the Prefecture still needs transportation of 50 tons of fertilizers from Kigali to Gitarama.

g. Roads and bridges. No changes.

h. Electricity.

(1) Electricity situation in Gitarama town has normalized.

(2) The priest from Kanyanza (7290), Nyabikenke Commune, asked us for repairing and maintenance of generator belonging to his parish. This week the generator has been transported to the UNAMIR workshop.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages.

(1) Hum Offr visited Rugalika Sector (9574), Runda Commune, which previously was known as a place of concentration of unaccompanied children. At present

all the orphans were reported to be accommodated by the local families.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Hum Offr maintains constant contact with HCHR and UNHCR officers. UNHCR representative operating in this prefecture has 34 tons of seeds and 3,400 hoes to be distributed among the returnees. However, since their trucks were given a full-time job she intends to ask for UNAMIR assistance for transportation to Gitarama.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good. Hum Offr met with the Prefect of Gitarama and Sous-Prefect of Ruhango and asked them to give their proposals concerning construction of ten water points.

8. CONCLUSIONS. Some progress in the humanitarian situation improvement due to activities of different NGOs and UN agencies can be noticed. However, many locals do not realize the tasks of UNAMIR and suppose it to fulfil functions of an NGO and to have tremendous capabilities in offering humanitarian assistance. We have a lot of requests, the bulk of them can never be satisfied by our scarce resources.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS.

(1) We should advise to UNAMIR mass media leaders to emphasize explanatory work of UNAMIR's tasks and aims as well as propagandizing facts of practical humanitarian assistance completed.

(2) NGOs operating in sphere of education and other organization whom it may concern should be approached to the problems of secondary school in Bulinga.

b. Milobs transported a psychiatric patient from Bulinga Commune (6679) to Kigali psychiatric facilities near Ndera Camp.

c. Milobs gave a lift to Sub Prefect accompanied by other officials from Gitarama Prefecture for attending an official youth meeting held in Ntongwe Commune (9057).

d. Milobs transported scholar material distributed to this Prefecture by Ministry of Education (see para 3.e.) from Gitarama town to the Communes of Murama (6749), Nyamabuye (7570), Nyakabanda (6597) and Musambira (8257), 15 cartons to each.

e. A meeting with the NGOs operating in Gitarama was held on Tuesday (see para 5).

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. A humanitarian team visited Sainte-Bernadette School in Kamonyi Sector of Taba Commune (8883) to investigate a critical shortage of water at the school (see para 3.e.).

b. Necessary arrangements for the meeting with the NGOs scheduled for 12 Sep 95 have been made this week.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food. Shortage of food is still a usual complain of the locals. This week the food shortage was reported from Kigoma Commune (7649), Karama Sector (6972) of Mushubati Commune, Kinazi Sector (8958) of Ntongwe Commune.

b. Water.

(1) Gitarama Town has no water supply since 31 Aug 95. According the ELECTROGAZ managers the water shortage was caused by the dry season which had lowered the water table to such a level that it makes difficult pumping an adequate amount of water. The officials indicated that the situation may remain the same until the onset of rains.

(2) In the rural areas shortage of water is still a usual complain of the locals. This week the water shortage was reported from Karama Sector (6972) of Mushubati Commune, Kinazi Sector (8958) of Ntongwe Commune.

(3) The humanitarian team visited Sainte-Bernadette

School in Kamonyi Sector in Taba Commune (8883) and reported that there was an urgent need for a water bladder at the school or at least one 10,000 L container. Previously the school had the system of collecting rain water but it was damaged. It should be also noted that the school caters for 70 orphans.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. The representative of APAG, the Rwandese NGO, informed us that in Murama Commune (6749) the construction of a new hospital is about to be completed. The construction started before the war but then was suspended. All equipment which had been already purchased was stolen during the war. Now APAG has no funds to obtain necessary stuff to open the hospital, so they ask for support in providing surgical and laboratory equipment. There are no any hospital in Murama and neighboring communes, so in serious cases the locals have to pass some 30 km to the Kabgayi MSF Hospital which is the nearest one.

d. Housing. We were asked to provide one truck to Runda Commune (9882) on 12 Sep 95 to transport building material for housing construction from Sholi Sector (9379) to the Commune office. The Nyabikenke Director of the APS (Association de parents pour la Scolarisation) has also requested the use of one truck to move building material from one point to another within the Commune.

e. Education. The Nyakabanda "Groupe Scolaire" needs our help to move food from Kigali to Nyakabanda Commune (6597).

f. Farming Activities. NTR.

g. Roads and bridges. The Bourgomestre of Runda Commune (9882) asked us why the repairing of the road between 9983 and 9291, which was underway, has stopped. The repairing was conducted by IndBatt Engr and financed by Padre Jose, the Spanish priest from Bugoba sector (9188) of Taba Commune (see our Weekrep of 18 Aug 95, para 3.g.).

h. Electricity. In Kigoma Commune (7649) the transformer which was sabotaged has been fixed (see our Weekrep of 25 Aug 95, para 3.h.).

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. The person-in-charge of Cyeza Orphanage in Rutobwe Commune (7781) has informed us that tracing program is being carried out very successfully. During last two months 66 children from that orphanage have been handed to the relatives.

(5) Family Kit distribution in Ntongwe and Tambwe Communes (see our Weekrep of 25 Aug 95);

(6) school rehabilitation program in Tambwe Commune. LWF has supplied bricks, tiles, sand and cement, plus logistical support, for Nyundo Primary School (7257). 150 desks have been made and are ready for sully.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. CONCLUSIONS.

a. The situation is not exceeding the bounds of normal routine activities. However, the smooth development of the events can be complicated by the influx of the refugees who are still coming.

b. Two of the requests we obtained the last period seem to

be of first priority:

(1) Providing Saint-Bernadette School in Taba Commune (8883) with a bladder or a water tank or repairing their water supply system (see para 3.e.).

(2) Offering assistance for opening a new hospital in Murama Commune (6749) (see para 3.c.).

However, there are many other requests of the same or grater importance which are pending their solution (see our Weekrep of 25 Aug 95).

9. RECOMMENDATIONS.

a. We have to request IndBatt again for providing trucks to move food and building material (see para 3.d. and e.).

b. For Saint-Bernadette School in Taba Commune (8883) (see para 3.e.) the possibility of providing a bladder or a water tank or the existing water system repairing can be considered.

c. We should attract the attention of NGOs to the problems of newly built hospital in Murama Commune (6749).

d. We should learn the reasons of interrupting the repair works of the road leading to Kabugu Complex in Runda Commune (see para 3.g.).

1. **GENERAL SITUATION.** The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.
2. **OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.**
 - a. Two trucks from INDBATT transported firewood for the RPA from Mukingi Commune (7160) to Birambo Commune (4763).
 - b. This Sector carried out a special task of moving the properties of the new sous-prefect from Ruhango Commune (7653) to Kyumba (7093), in Nyabikenke Commune (7292).
 - c. This Sector coordinated the transportation of 40 000 L of water for the Gitarama prison. 95 CMSG wanted to withdraw the 100 000 L water Bladder from the HQ complex of this sector following the withdrawal of MALICOY troops from Gitarama. The Sector Cdr convinced the team to retain the bladder until the remaining 70 000 L of water is transported to the Gitarama prison where there is an acute shortage of water.
 - d. The detail address of a minor prisoner (9 year old boy) of Ntongwe Commune (9057) cachot, who is originally from Butare Prefecture, was collected by this HQ and his parents were informed to provide him food and make necessary arrangements to transfer him to his home commune.
3. **GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.**
 - a. **Food.** The overall food situation in most of the communes has not changed as projected in our previous report. Some of the communes (Kayenzi [8389], Taba [8883] and Nyabikenke [7292]) have received some food help from WFP during the week but it has not been distributed to the population yet because the quantities are too small to begin a distribution campaign.

b. Water. Almost all of the communes know a shortage of drinking water. The ELECTROGAZ authority is presently unable to provide a minimum quantity of water for the people of Gitarama township because of a shortage of electricity, as reported by them.

c. Health. No change from our previous reports.

d. Housing. The African Housing Fund requested us to provide 60 pieces of plastic sheeting to cover 15 000 tiles which they have contracted in this prefecture to build 10 000 houses in the prefectures of Kigali and Gitarama, as detailed in our last report. The matter should be reexamined as the tiles can be damaged badly by rains which are likely to start soon.

e. Education. No change.

f. Farming Activities. No change.

g. Roads and bridges. No change.

h. Electricity. The generator of a secondary school in Nyakabanda Commune(6597) was repaired by UNAMIR workshop a few weeks ago but the school authority could not operate the generator because of shortage of some electrical wiring as well as a lack of diesel fuel.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. No change from our previous reports.

b. Hospital. NTR.

c. Handicaped People. No change from our previous reports.

d. Elderlies. NTR.

e. Widows. NTR.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Refugees\Returnees. A total of 679 returnees from Zaire arrived in Gitarama Prefecture during the week. We could so far confirm only 399 of them but we are continuing our visit program of all the communes. Commune statistics are available if you require them.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Relations with the NGOs are very good. The Sector Cdr held a meeting with NGOs on 11 Aug 95 and the next meeting will be held on 12 Sep 95. This type of meeting is necessary to develop good cooperation and understanding between working groups.

6. **RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES.** Good. We work together in close contact with all local representatives of UN agencies.

7. **RELATIONS WITH LOCAL AUTHORITIES.** Good.


8. **CONCLUSION.** The overall humanitarian situation is improving slowly in the prefecture. However, it is clearly felt by local authorities that demand will always exceed supply. Accordingly, the local population has to realize that they have to put up with their own survival plan by developing their land capabilities as much as possible.

9. **RECOMMENDATIONS.** The following recommendations, in order of priority are made:

a. A water tanker is requested to transport 70 000 L water from the bladder at our HQ to Gitarama prison.

b. Provide food and clothing packages to Milobs to improve their efficiency in liaising with authorities and locals.

b. Quite a large number of refugees/returnees are now coming back to various communes. When they are coming back to their home commune, authorities do not have enough resources to provide them food and shelter. Efforts could be made through the help of NGOs to provide them this kind of support. Arrangements could also be made to provide them with agricultural equipment on a priority basis so that they can return to a normal lifestyle as soon as possible.

FOR THE PERIOD OF 19 - 25 AUG 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. Two trucks from Indbatt have transported the food donated by the WFP from Gitarama town to the Communes of KAYENZI (GR 8389, five tons) and NYABIKENKE (GR 7292, five tons). Transportation completed. We express our appreciation to IndBatt for offering an important support to Sector 1B in its humanitarian activities through the provision of the trucks.

b. 10 tons of food donated by the Ministry of Education were transported by IndBatt resources from Kigali to NYABIKENKE Commune (7292) for the benefit of the "Groupe Scolaire".

c. A TV and a video were provided for the seminar organized in Gitarama by "Droits de l'Homme et de la Liberte Publique".

d. Ten tons of chemicals required for the water purification by ELECTROGAZ were transported from Kigali to Gitarama by IndBatt resources today.

e. Hum Offr accompanied the HAC representative in his patrol over Gitarama Prefecture. The joint team visited Gatagara Handicap Center in KIGOMA Commune (7146) and Cyeza Orphanage in RUTOBWE Commune (7777).

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food.

(1) Transportation of 416 tons of WFP food (maize,

beans and vegetable oil) is completed successfully. Milobs reported from some of the communes that the food is being distributed to the locals.

(2) In spite of the efforts of WFP, Ministry of Education and NGOs situation has not been changed in general. Milobs are still reporting food shortage from various communes (during the last week from MURAMA [6749] and MASANGO GR [6254]).

b. Water. The local department of ELECTROGAZ is in a constant need of transportation means to deliver chemicals required for water purification from the stock in Kigali to Gitarama.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. In MURAMA Commune (6749) the population complained of the local health treatment. The drugs are in short supply (especially for malaria). The patients have to travel long distance to reach medical facilities.

d. Housing.

(1) The African Housing Fund requested us of providing 60 pieces of plastic sheets to cover 15,000 tiles they have contracted in this Prefecture to build 10,000 houses in the Prefectures of Kigali and Gitarama. This matter seems to be of a great importance and urgency since the sheeting should be provided before the onset of rains.

(2) The Bourgmestre of RUNDA Commune (9882) requested assistance to rebuild damaged houses needed by widows and orphans.

e. Education. No changes.

f. Farming Activities. No changes.

g. Roads and bridges. No changes.

h. Electricity. The ELECTROGAZ Director stated that seven acts of transformers sabotage occurred during last two months in various places of this Prefecture: four in NYAMABUYE (7570), one each in MUKINGI (7160), KIGOMA (7649) and BULINGA (6679). A Milob team visited one of them located in KIGOMA Commune (7649) and confirmed the fact of sabotage (the oil was drained from the transformer). The representative of the local department of ELECTROGAS requested us for help to move these transformers from their location to Gitarama for repair.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages.

(1) The representative of HAC accompanied by the Hum Offr visited Cyeza Orphanage in RUTOBWE Commune (7781). This is a well run establishment comprising 80 children. One of the problems is electricity supply. Electricity is not provided by ELECTROGAZ. The orphanage has a generator, but they need an electrician to check the electric lines which are damaged. Another serious problem is water supply. The orphanage has a system for collecting rain water, but during dry seasons they face serious troubles.

(2) In KAYENZI Commune (8389) a new group of orphans was discovered. The children live together with the group of Spanish nuns from *Misioneras le Maria, Jose et Jesus* headed by Mother Loz Maria. The nuns have no special funds and means to support the orphans, so they are asking for assistance. The details of the situation will be investigated.

b. Hospital. NTR.

c. Handicap. Gatagara Handicap Center (Home de la Vierge des Pauvres) in NGWA Sector (7147) of KIGOMA Commune (see para 4.c. of our Weekrep of 18 Aug 95) was visited by Hum Offr and HAC representative. The team confirmed that the main problem of this facility, which is quite satisfactory in general, is food supply. The administration sends urgent request to any NGO which can help since CARITAS stopped providing food in May '95. They also requested help to obtain the raw material necessary to fabricate artificial limbs.

d. Elderlies. NTR.

e. Widows. NTR.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Refugees. 67 returnees from Zaire arrived in Gitarama on 25 Aug 95. 31 of them are from NYABIKENKE Commune (7292) and 36 are from RUTOBWE Commune (7781). Much more returnees are expected during the next period.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS.

a. "CONCERN INTERNATIONAL" requested us to provide transportation of container quitted on the road from Kigali to Gitarama near Musambira (823745) to the market in Gitarama town where it will be used as a food storage. We were promised by the Canadian Logistics to send a recovery

vehicle this week. However, they could not do it during the last period.

b. The Lutheran World Federation has distributed the *family kits* among 1,383 families of returning IDPs and female-headed families comprising a total of 5,501 persons. The area of the operation was the Communes of NTONGWE (9057) and TAMBWE (7653). The *family kits* consisted of hoes (average ration per family was two), blankets (5), soap (2 bars), casseroles (1 set of 3), plastic sheeting (1), plates (5), plates (5), mugs (5), buckets with lids (1), tridents (1), sickles (2), spoons (2) and axes (2).

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good. We operate in close and constant contact with the local representatives of HCHR and UNHCR.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. CONCLUSIONS.

a. The NGOs are continuing their routine activities which result in definite success. However, the situation is improving too slowly. As we penetrate deep into the situation we discover more and more problems and receive more and more requests which can be hardly satisfied.

b. As first priority matters we consider the following problems:

- continue providing generator electricity for Kabgayi complex (see our previous Weekreps);
- provide sheeting for tiles (see para 3.d.);
- sending a septic truck for Nyanza Orphanage (see para 4.A.i) of our Weekrep of 21 Jul 95);
- providing food supply for Gatagara Handicap Center (see para 4.c.).

c. Among the second priority matters are the following:

- sending a recovery vehicle to transport a container (see para 5.a.);
- transportation of damaged transformers to Gitarama for repair (see para 3.h.) and other problems.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS.

a. We have no ~~any~~ own resources to provide plastic sheeting for covering tiles. However, UNHCR and some NGOs (for example LWF) seem to be organizations possessing the required stuff.

b. The only body possessing a septic truck was Ausmed Batt. Some time ago it was not operational. It seems to be a good time to recollect of the destiny of that vehicle.

c. CARITAS directors should be asked about the reasons of interrupting its support of Gatagara Handicap Center in terms of food. Anyway, we should find some NGO to resume the food supply.

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. Two trucks from Indbatt have transported the food donated by the WFP from Gitarama town to the Communes of RUTOBWE (GR 7781, 10 tons) and MUGINA (GR 9267, 15 tons).

b. Eight tons of bricks were transported by Indbatt resources from Shyoge (Kabgayi) to Gitarama bus station for the construction of latrines.

c. Eight tons of firewood were transported by Indbatt resources from MUSHUBATI Commune (6970) to JAM International Orphanage at Kabgayi.

d. Four tons of food were transported by Indbatt resources from Gitarama to MURAMA Commune (6749) for the benefit of the workers in the two Commune health centers.

e. Five tons of food were transported by Indbatt resources from NYABIKENKE Commune (7292) office to the "Groupe Scolaire" within the Commune.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food.

i) Situation has not been changed in general. Shortage of food is a standard complain from various communes. This week the food shortage was reported from the Communes of KIGOMA (7649), where the last food distribution took place in January'95, MUSAMBIRA (8274) and NYAMABUYE (7570).

ii) Transportation of 416 tons of WFP food (maize, beans and vegetable oil) is being carried out successfully by two Indbatt and two UNHCR trucks. Milobs reported from MUSHUBATI Commune (6970) that the food is being centrally distributed to the locals from the commune office.

b. Water. No changes. The milobs reported that in KIGOMA (7649) Commune the population has to take water from rivers.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. No changes. Milobs report from GATIKABIZI Sector (6572) of MUSHUBATI Commune that the nearest medical center is ten km away and medications are too expensive for them.

d. Housing. See para 4.e.

e. Education. No changes.

f. Farming Activities. No changes.

g. Roads and bridges. The Spanish priest Padre Jose who is in charge of "Pole de Development" project in BUGOBA Sector (9188) of TABA Commune provides financing to construct three bridges on the road leading to that place (see our report of 21 Jul 95 para 3.J). He asked UNAMIR to carry out the construction. This request will be satisfied by providing the resources of Ind Engr Coy.

h. Electricity.

(1) The coordinator of SEVOTA in TABA Commune (8883) and the TABA Bourgmastre requested UNAMIR for aid to equip the local Orphans and Handicapees Center (Structure d'Encadrement des Veuves et des Orphelins) with a solar system of a total price of 851,000 FRw.

(2) We are still waiting for positive solution to our request concerning the 100 KW generator providing electricity to the UNAMIR compound in Gitarama and supplying also some essential facilities run by various church and non-governmental organizations in Kabgayi Complex, including the Kabgayi Hospital which treats the Gitarama prisoners, one maternity ward, doctors' houses, churches and two orphanages. The bishop is also using the generator's power for carpenter and printing shops. These activities are ingrained in the Kabgayi vocation and allow this institution to survive. It should be noticed that the bishop has never charged anything to the UN for all the facilities used by the UNAMIR since its arrival here. To replace this generator with a smaller one would be a terrible blow to this institution which is an enormous player in the reconciliation process. *An immediate action is required because it has been heard*

that the field service was about to come and change this generator for a smaller one.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages.

(1) The situation is satisfactory in KIGOMA Commune (7649) where there is no unaccompanied orphans. However, the families accommodated the orphans do not enjoy any special support and require humanitarian assistance.

(2) The Milobs visited Ruli Orphanage Center in NYAMABUYE Commune (7570) which has 70 orphans. The authorities requested clothes for children, medicines and food. CONCERN continue to support this facility in terms of food.

b. Hospital. NTR.

c. Handicap. A Milobs team visited Gatagara Handicaped Center (Home de la Vierge des Pauvres) in NGWA Sector (7147) of KIGOMA Commune, a very well run establishment possessing a large number of personnel and reach capabilities. There are 170 children from six to 20, among whom 60 are the blinds and the rest are cripples (mutilation of legs). The center has two primary schools (for the blinds and for the cripples) and one secondary school for the cripples, which are also visited by 150 children from adjacent areas. The center also renders assistance for the cripples elder than 20 repairing or providing artificial limbs for them. The center is supported by the Belgian Government (funds), AVSI (fresh vegetables) and ICRC (tracing program). CARITAS was providing food before june. In October'95 the center was visited by the German Minister of Interior who donated DM 18,000. The problems are as follows:

- (a) food. Children have meat some four or five times a year only;
- (b) lack of qualified personnel;
- (c) sport equipment for the handicapped children.

d. Elderlies. NTR

e. Widows. A Milobs team met a group of widows in GATIZO Sector (8677) of MUSAMBIRA Commune and learned that CARITAS was supporting them in terms of food. Their houses were destroyed during the war and they requested assistance for the rebuilding process.

f. IDPs. NTR.

g. Refugees. NTR

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. "CONCERN INTERNATIONAL" requested us to provide transportation of container quitted on the road from Kigali to Gitarama near Musambira (823745) to the market in Gitarama town where it will be used as a food storage. Necessary arrangements have already been made to provide recovery means next week.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES.

a. UNHCR joined our operation for transportation of the WFP food sending two trucks for that purpose. During the last week these trucks were moving the food to various communes.

b. A Human Right field officer transferred 11 prisoners suspected to be genocidaire and two common criminals from MUGINA (9267), MUSHUBATI (6970) and NYAMABUYE (7570) Communes to their home Communes of TAMBWE (7653), NTONGWE (9057) and RUTOBWE (7781) to permit their relatives to bring them food and to visit them.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good. Our own humanitarian activities helps us to make the local authorities of different levels to be friendly and cooperative towards us.

8. CONCLUSIONS. In spite of the activities conducted by various NGOs and UNAMIR the number of humanitarian problems still remains great. We receive numerous requests which can not be satisfied by the UNAMIR resources only.

9. RECOMMENDATIONS. As a first priority matter we regard the request concerning the retention of the 100 KW generator in Kabgayi Complex (see para 3.h.) which, we believe, should receive positive solution. We need HAC support in solving this problem.

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. A meeting with the NGOs operating in Gitarama Prefecture was held on 11 Aug 95 in the Sec 1B HQ (see para 5).

b. Two trucks from Indbatt were transporting the food donated by the WFP from Gitarama town to the Communes of MUSHUBATI (GR 6970, 12 tons, transportation completed), MUSAMBIRA (GR 8274, 14 tons, transportation completed), MUKINGI (GR 7160, 23 tons, transportation completed), NTONGWE (GR 9057, 46 tons, transportation completed) and RUTOBWE (GR 7781, 10 of 23 tons delivered). Total quantity of food moved is 105 tons.

c. The Indian trucks were also used to move logs for the construction of a bridge in MUKINGI Commune (7160).

d. A Milobs team participated in a seminar organized by the "ORGANIZATION DES DROITS DE L'OMME ET DE LA LIBERTE PUBLIQUE". We provided our TV and VCR for the seminar.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food.

i) Situation has not been changed in general. Shortage of food was reported from the Communes of MASANGO (6254), MUSAMBIRA (8274), RUTOBWE (7781), NTONGWE (9057), BULINGA (6679) and KAYENZI (8389). In KAYENZI the market price for beans reached 300 FRw/kg. The poor harvest is the main reason of the problem.

ii) Transportation of 416 tons of food (maize, beans

and vegetable oil) donated by the "WORLD FOOD PROGRAM" to the poorest families is going on successfully (see para 2.b.).

b. Water. No changes. The milobs continue to report acute shortage of water supply from many places.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. NTR

d. Housing. See para 4.e.

e. Education.

i) After the departure of the Mali platoon from NTONGWE Commune (9057) the secondary school which was the Mali troops accommodation needs glasses replacement, walls painting and electrical system repair. The bourgmestre expects to open this secondary school as soon as possible.

ii) The burgomestre of BULINGA Commune (6679) requested assistance to open a private secondary school (ASSOCIATION POUR LA CONTRIBUTION AU DEVELOPPEMENT SOCIO-CULTUREL).

iii) A Milobs team visited Gitwe College in NKOMERO Sector (6749) of MASANGO Commune, a private college supported by the fees from the students' families. It has 750 students, 568 of them being on room and board. This college which is extremely well run should receive support from an NGO. It produces doctors and scientists which can go a long way in helping this country's rebuilding. Requests are as follows:

(1) books for the library;

(2) laboratory equipment for science;

(3) building material to repair classrooms and the nursing room;

(4) food (the college may actually close if there is no assistance before 15 Aug 95).

f. Farming Activities. The population suffers a shortage of agricultural materials (seeds and fertilizers) which is a reason of poor harvest and food shortage in many areas (see para 3.a.i)

g. Roads and bridges. The road maintenance paid by the government is going on in MASANGO Commune (6254).

h. Electricity. We are still waiting for positive solution to our request concerning the 100 KVA generator providing electricity to the UNAMIR compound in Gitarama and supplying also some essential facilities run by various

church and non-governmental organizations in Kabgayi Complex, including the Kabgayi Hospital which treats the Gitarama prisoners, one maternity ward, doctors' houses, churches and two orphanages. The bishop is also using the generator's power for carpenter and printing shops. These activities are ingrained in the Kabgayi vocation and allow this institution to survive. It should be noticed that the bishop has never charged anything to the UN for all the facilities used by the UNAMIR since its arrival here. To replace this generator with a smaller one would be a terrible blow to this institution which is an enormous player in the reconciliation process. *An immediate action is required because it has been heard that the field service was about to come and change this generator for a smaller one.*

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. Orphanages. There is a substantial number of the orphans and no orphanage in NTONGWE Commune (9057). The children live with the relatives and volunteer families. They are in shortage of food, clothes and financial assistance to go to school.

b. Hospital. NTR

d. Elderlies. NTR

e. Widows. Lack of houses is a standard problem of widows. In GIKOMA Sector (5380) of NTONGWE Commune the widows are creating cooperatives to rebuild all houses damaged during the war.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Today we conducted a meeting with the NGOs operating in the area. The following NGOs were represented at the meeting:

- (1) African Communities Initiatives Support Teams (ACIST);
- (2) ICRC;
- (3) Concern;
- (4) Medicus Mundi;
- (5) Caritas;
- (6) Salvation Army;
- (7) Food for the Hungry.

The new mandate was explained to them (including milobs tasks), the security situation was reviewed, the NGOs briefed on their activities and, finally, the relationship with the RPA was

analyzed. It was a resounding success and all NGOs expressed the desire to attend the next meeting that should be held in one month time. The Salvation Army representative who operates in KAYENZI Commune (8389) asked if it would be possible to have his radio reprogrammed to the frequency used by Indbatt for emergency situation. The Sec CDR said that revealing frequencies has security implications but that suggestion had some merit and that the UNAMIR HQ should be contacted to assess feasibility.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. RECOMMENDATIONS.

a. We suppose that the request concerning the retention of the 100 KVA generator in Kabgayi Complex (see para 3.h.) should receive positive solution.

b. It seems to be useful for the humanitarian activities to hold meetings with all Hum Offrs, for example fortnightly, to specify our tasks, exchange information etc.

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

a. A Milobs team transported goods from Gitarama to KAMONYI Sector (8978) in TABA Commune for the "INITIATIVE PRIVEE POUR LA FORMATION DES JEUNES FILLES" which was organizing a meeting in Ste-Benedicte school.

b. The Sec CDR met with the Gitarama Prefet to subjects, including humanitarian problems. The Prefet urgently requested the UNAMIR help for transportation of food (see para 3.A.).

c. Indbatt provided one truck to transport firewood to the Karama ACEJ College in MUSHUBATI Commune (6970).

d. 30 blankets were delivered to the "JESUS ALIVE MINISTRIES" orphanage in Kabgayi.

e. Two boxes of rations were donated for the children in Gitarama prison.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food.

i) Situation has not been changed in general. Shortage of food was reported from JOMA (6450) and RUBONA (6247) Sectors of MURAMA Commune, KIVUMU Sector (8773) of NYAMABUYE Commune (7570), MAHEMBI Sector (7159) of MUKINGI Commune. As usual this problem is caused by the lack of agricultural items.

ii) 416 tones of food (maize, beans and vegetable oil) were donated by the "WORLD FOOD PROGRAM" to the poorest families which comprise 49745 people. Now the food is at the storage in Gitarama town ready for transportation to all the 17 Communes. The Prefecture authorities have no means to arrange the transportation, so the Prefet urgently requests the UNAMIR assistance.

b. Water.

i) No changes. Potable water is still an urgent problems in many areas.

ii) CENTRE RWANDAIS DE FORMATIO DE CADRES in MURAMBI (7670), NYAMABUYE Commune, suffers insufficient water supply. The administration requests the UNAMIR to provide a bladder tank for storing water.

iii) The Murama Health Center (9357) in NTONGWE Commune is still in urgent need of feeling up their water tank.

c. Health Care and Health Problems. No changes.

d. Housing.

i) Houses repairing is gradually going on in many communes. CARITAS and SALVATION ARMY provides building materials for some communes to repair houses.

ii) Situation is poor in the Commune of TABA (8883). The total number houses destroyed is 907, out of which 230 only have since been reconstructed.

e. Education. Schools visited by the Milobs are in shortage of books, stationary, sports equipment and furniture items.

f. Farming Activities. In many areas the people suffer a shortage of agricultural materials (seeds and fertilizers). Producers complain about bad harvest of beans and sorghum because of insufficient fertilization of the soil.

g. Roads and bridges. NTR

h. Electricity. 100 KVA generator providing electricity to the UNAMIR compound in Gitarama at present supplies also some essential services offered by various church and non-governmental organizations, including the MSF Hospital, Orphanage and Seminary. After replacement of the generator for small one all these facilities will face a problem of electricity supply.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

- a. Orphanages. NTR
- b. Hospital. NTR
- c. Handicap. NTR
- d. Elderlies. NTR
- e. Widows. NTR
- f. IDPs.

i) In JOMA (6450) and RUBONA (6247) Sectors of MURAMA Commune IDPs reported shortage of food due to the late arrival from Gikongoro after the distribution of seeds and agricultural material. One of the most urgent needs of IDPs remains to be dwelling.

ii) See Annex A.

- g. Refugees. NTR

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Good.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. CONCLUSIONS.

i) In spite of the NGOs' activity the main problems are being solved very slowly. The Milobs report a great number of requests which we can not satisfy with our own resources. The most of requests have not been satisfied.

ii) After the movement of Mali Coy to Gikongoro the Sec 1B faces a problem of lack of transportation means, so our own capabilities to provide humanitarian assistance are very restricted.

8. RECOMMENDATIONS.

i) Transportation of food (see para 2.b. and 3.a.ii) is supposed to be the first priority matter. After the departure of the Mali Coy from Gitarama the only solution of this problem can be providing trucks by the Ind Batt (at least two per day).

ii) After the withdrawal of troops from Rwanda the UNAMIR property should be revised to determine which redundant and unnecessary equipment can be donated as a humanitarian aid. For example, the UNAMIR, probably, will be able to pass to local establishments some water tanks and bladders (see para 3.b.ii).

iii) The UNAMIR, if possible, should take necessary measures to continue providing the establishments located in the Kabgayi Complex with generator power (see para 3.h.).

22 JUL 95 - 28 JUL 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

A. Transportation.

i) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport Gitarama college sport team to SHOGWE (near Kigali) for a sport competition.

ii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport medicine from Gitarama to MULOMA Health Center in NTONGWE Commune (9057) for the benefit of "IHA" which supports this facility.

iii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport bridge logs from MUKINGI Commune Office (7161) to the bridge location at 7062.

iv) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport building materials from Gitarama to MUSAMBIRA Commune (8274) for the benefit of the Nyamaga Primary School (8972).

v) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport three tons of food from Gitarama to NTONGWE Commune (9057).

vi) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport four tons of food from Gitarama to MUGINA Commune (9267).

vii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport five tons of food from Gitarama to RUNDA Commune (9882).

viii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport seven tons of food from Gitarama to TAMBWE Commune (7653).

ix) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport four tons of food from Gitarama to KAYENZI Commune (8389).

x) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport firewood for Kabgayi Orphanage (7267).

B. Medical. 62 patients including 20 children from Cyeza Orphanage (7777) were treated by Mali Coy in its clinic facility.

C. Roads and bridges. Hum Offrs accompanied the joint HAC/Engr Coy team which visited several damaged bridges for estimation of requirements for their repair (see para34). The team also visited the Burgomaster of KIGOMA Commune (7750) to inform him of the situation and to make arrangements for the preparation of the logs.

D. Miscellaneous.

i) The Milobs provided some plastic sheets and gloves for reburial ceremony held on 23 July in BITARE Sector (8384) of KAYENZI Commune.

ii) A broken generator for the Teachers Training School in NYAKABANDA Commune (6595) was repaired in the UNAMIR workshop and delivered back to the school.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

A. Food. The Milobs reported that in NYAKABUYE (6862), KAMUSENYI (7061), KAMEGELI (6859) and RUTAGARA (6559) Sectors of MUKINGI Commune (7160) and in SHYIRA Sector (9151) of NTONGWE Commune (9057) the locals complained about the shortage of food and agricultural materials.

B. Water. NTR

C. Health Care and Health Problems. The health care situation in the Commune of MUSHUBATI (6971) is not satisfactory because of absence of any medical facilities. This commune is one of the biggest for its square and the second for population (about 60000 inhabitants) in all the Prefecture.

D. Housing. In the Commune of NYAKABANDA (6595) among 177 houses damaged during the war 159 have already been repaired. CARITAS, CRS and the SALVATION ARMY provided building materials.

E. Education.

i) The main problems of primary school visited recently still remain to be books and stationary, building materials for repair of premises, sport equipment, food and clothes for orphans (for some schools).

ii) Two months ago a professional school was opened in NYABIKENKE Commune (7292). It has 96 students and is supported by the Ministry of Youth. Brick laying, carpentry, plumbing, welding, veterinary science and agriculture are taught at this institution. The school needs a welding machine instead of one stolen during the war.

iii) The Karama ACEJ College in the Commune of MUSHUBATI (6970) supported by the Government and the ICRC in terms of food requites the following items:

- 1) books for library which were completely robbed during the war;
- 2) typewriters;
- 3) carpenter shop equipment;
- 4) beds and mattresses.

F. Farming Activities. In many areas the people suffer a shortage of agricultural materials (see para 3.A.).

G. Roads and bridges.

i) A joint Sec 1B/HAC/Engr Coy team visited the damaged bridge on the border between the Communes of NYAMABUYE and MUSHUBATI (702661). The bridge require the construction of a new concrete abutment. In KIGOMA Commune (7750) five bridges were also reported to be in bad condition. They are located as follows:

- 1) 796504
- 2) 806495

Bridges at 4) and 5) were not visited because the team could not pass the bridge at 3). All the bridges are in bad condition and require logs replacement. (See para 2.C.)

ii) One bridge in MUKINGI Commune (7062) has been repaired (see para 2.A.iii).

iii) Road maintenance was going on in RUTAGARA Sector (6559) of MUKINGI commune.

H. Electricity. A secondary school in TABA Commune is still awaiting for an electrician to repair electric lines.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

A. Orphanages. The orphanage supported by "JESUS ALIVE MINISTRIES" in Kabgayi (7167) faces bad sanitary situation because of a local epidemic of scab which affects about 50 children. The orphanage suffers a shortage of potable water, clothes, books and stationary for 200 students. The total number of orphans is 340 (3 to 16 years old).

B. Hospital. NTR

C. Handicap. NTR

D. Elderlies. NTR

E. Widows. The widows met last week in MUGINA Commune (9267) complained about lack of clothing, including clothing for children, blankets, mattresses and financial assistance for children schooling. As they stated the food is not urgent problem, but they suffer lack of potable water. In Kagarama sector ten widows live together with 40 children in rented houses paying 2500 FRW per month.

F. IDPs. See Annex A.

G. Refugees. Refugees coming back to their native communes normally are those who left the country in 1959 or in 1973. As usual they meet the problem of shelter and cultivating because their houses are often damaged and their land is occupied. As a rule they need seeds, pesticides and other agricultural items.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Good.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Good.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. CONCLUSIONS.

i) Some progress in the development of secondary and professional education can be noticed during last period. However, as usual schools and colleges need some equipment for professional training.

ii) The number of IDPs and refugees come back at the moment is not too large in most of the communes, so they do not influence greatly upon the humanitarian situation in

general. But as a rule these people meet a lot of problems and require special support for themselves.

iii) The most vulnerable groups of people in the Prefecture are orphans, widows, IDPs and refugees. Many of them suffer lack of attention from the NGOs.

14 JUL 95 - 21 JUL 95

1. GENERAL SITUATION. The general situation has not noticeably changed during the last week.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES.

A. Transportation.

i) Mali Coy provided two Bedford trucks to transport 14,5 tons of food from Gitarama to MUSHUBATI Commune Office (6970) for the primary school inspector.

ii) Mali Coy provided two Bedford trucks to transport ten tons of cereal from Gitarama to RUHANGO Commune Office (6254).

iii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport food from Gitarama to MUGINA Commune (9267) for the benefit of 31st RPA Battalion.

iv) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport four tons of food from Gitarama to RUTOBWE Commune (7781) for the benefit of the local population.

v) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport five tons of food from Gitarama to MUSAMBIRA Commune (8274) for the benefit of teachers.

vi) Mali Coy provided two Bedford trucks to transport ten tons of food from Gitarama to KIGOMA Commune (7649) for the benefit of teachers.

vii) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport two tons of medicines from Gitarama to MUSHUBATI Commune (6973) and another Bedford truck to transport firewood from Gitarama to the same Commune.

viii) Mali Coy provided two Bedford trucks to transport firewood from RUTOBWE Commune Office (7780) to CYEZA Orphanage in the same Commune.

ix) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport five tons of food from Gitarama to TABA Commune (8984) for the benefit of teachers.

x) Mali Coy provided one Bedford truck to transport five tons of wood from Gitarama to KIGOMA Commune (7649).

B. Medical. 110 patients were treated by Mali Coy in its clinic facility.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

A. Food. NTR

B. Water.

i) Humanitarian team visited the Gitarama water treatment station and found it to be in quite good condition. However, the generator is not operating at the moment, so normal work of the station depends completely on external electricity supply. A power outage on 17 July resulted in absence of water supply in the whole of Gitarama town for three days. The manager approached UNAMIR to supply new batteries and a 60 L barrel of lubricating oil for the generator as well as 600 L of fuel as a reserve. The chemicals for water purification are about to be exhausted.

ii) In reference to that problem, the humanitarian team visited the UNICEF Water Office and was informed that all chemicals, oil and fuel were earlier provided in a large quantity by UNICEF and ICRC to ELECTROGAZ. ELECTROGAZ - GITARAMA has not yet received these items.

C. Health Care.

i) During last week the Milobs visited hospitals and health centers in Gitarama Prefecture. It was revealed that most of them are supported by different NGOs (MEDICUS MUNDI, MSF, ICRC, CARITAS, MEMISA, ADRA etc) which supply drugs.

ii) Children were vaccinated against various diseases in the Communes of MASANGO (6254) and MUGINA (9367).

D. Health Problems. During visits to hospitals and health centers, the following needs were reported:

- (1) Drugs (antibiotics, antimalarial, anti-vomit, for gastritis).
- (2) Infant food.
- (3) Potable water.
- (4) Stationary for clinics.
- (5) Laboratory equipment.
- (6) Generators.
- (7) Ambulance.

E. Housing. NTR

F. Education.

i) A Milobs team visited KABGAYI Nursery School in NYAMABUYE Commune (7470). The number of students is 125, including 67 orphans. The school needs both sex uniforms for these orphans, sport equipment and food.

ii) The team also visited "GROUPE SCOLAIRE SAINT-JOSEPH". No of students is 471, including 102 orphans. They need 70 stools for students, glasses, doors, window frames, locks, sport equipment, books and stationary.

iii) The REMERA Secondary School in TABA Commune (8984) urgently requires a visit of electricians to check their generator and electrical system which are broken down.

G. Farming Activities. Milobs reported from NTEKO Sector of MUGINA Commune (9769) and NYAMABUYE Commune (7570) that the locals in the area complained about shortage of seeds. In NTEKO, they also mentioned security problems which impede them from farming. Agricultural items are distributed by CARITAS.

H. Roads and bridges.

i) Reference our weekly sitrep dated of 07 Jul 95, we are still waiting for an engineer team to recce and subsequently repair the bridge located at 702661. A local engineer provided us with some sketches (see Annex A).

ii) 13 km segment of the road along the Nyabarongo river leading from the main road Kigali - Gitarama to BUGOBA Sector (9188) of TABA Commune (see para 3 J) is in very poor condition.

J. Miscellaneous. Milobs visited the "POLE DE DEVELOPEMENT" project in BUGOBA Sector (9188) of TABA Commune run by the Spanish Catholic Church and supported by MANOS UNIDAS. It comprises a primary school, a medical center and a professional center for plumbers, metal workers and welders. The medical center has one doctor and three nurses from Spain. It has 30 beds and a daily average of 40 to 50 patients. The project is very well managed by the chief coordinator, Padre Jose Raman Amunarriz. He asked for UNAMIR engineering help to improve the road leading to BUGOBA.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

A. Orphanages.

i) The NYANZA Orphanage (7241) is still waiting for a septic truck for cleaning latrines. It has now been three months since they have requested UNAMIR's help.

It is urgently required for the health of 295 children.

ii) All the orphanages are waiting for the antimalarial spraying after Ausmed's recce three months ago.

iii) See para 3 F.

B. Hospital. NTR

C. Handicap. NTR

E. IDPs. NTR

F. Refugees. NTR

G. Prisoners.

i) On 14 July, MILOBS participated in the movement of 225 prisoners from the Gitarama prison to the Nyanza prison. The number of prisoners in Gitarama prison was thus reduced to 6576. That measure has not noticeably improved the conditions of imprisonment which are still terrible. The Sector Commander's estimation is that at least 3000 more prisoners should be sent to other prisons to bring the conditions in the Gitarama prison to a humanly acceptable level. The construction of the new wall around the prison is still not finished. The delay in the construction is due to difficulties in installing latrines in the new holding facilities.

ii) Milobs team visited the Commune prison of MUGINA (9267). The total number of prisoners was 154, including 11 females (3 are pregnant) with three kids. All rooms were rather clean and not overcrowded in relative terms. The prisoners looked fit. They had no mattresses nor blankets. The food is provided by their relatives.

5. RELATIONS WITH NGOS. Good.

6. RELATIONS WITH UN AGENCIES. Humanitarian officers met with UNHCR representative, Mr Ruben Maye Nsue Mangué, and exchanged information on problems of mutual interest. Arrangements for further cooperation were made.

7. RELATIONS WITH THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES. Good.

8. RECOMMENDATIONS.

i) UNAMIR (HAC) should put the highest priority on the

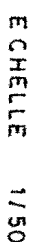
problems experienced by ELECTROGAZ administration. The importance of water supply to Gitarama town, in the schools, orphanages and health centers cannot be overemphasized.

ii) As a second priority, the secondary school in the TABA Commune (8984) should receive the visit of electricians to repair generator (see annex B) and electrical system. It houses 1000 students coming from all of Rwanda and is a very visible institution in bringing about normalization to the country.

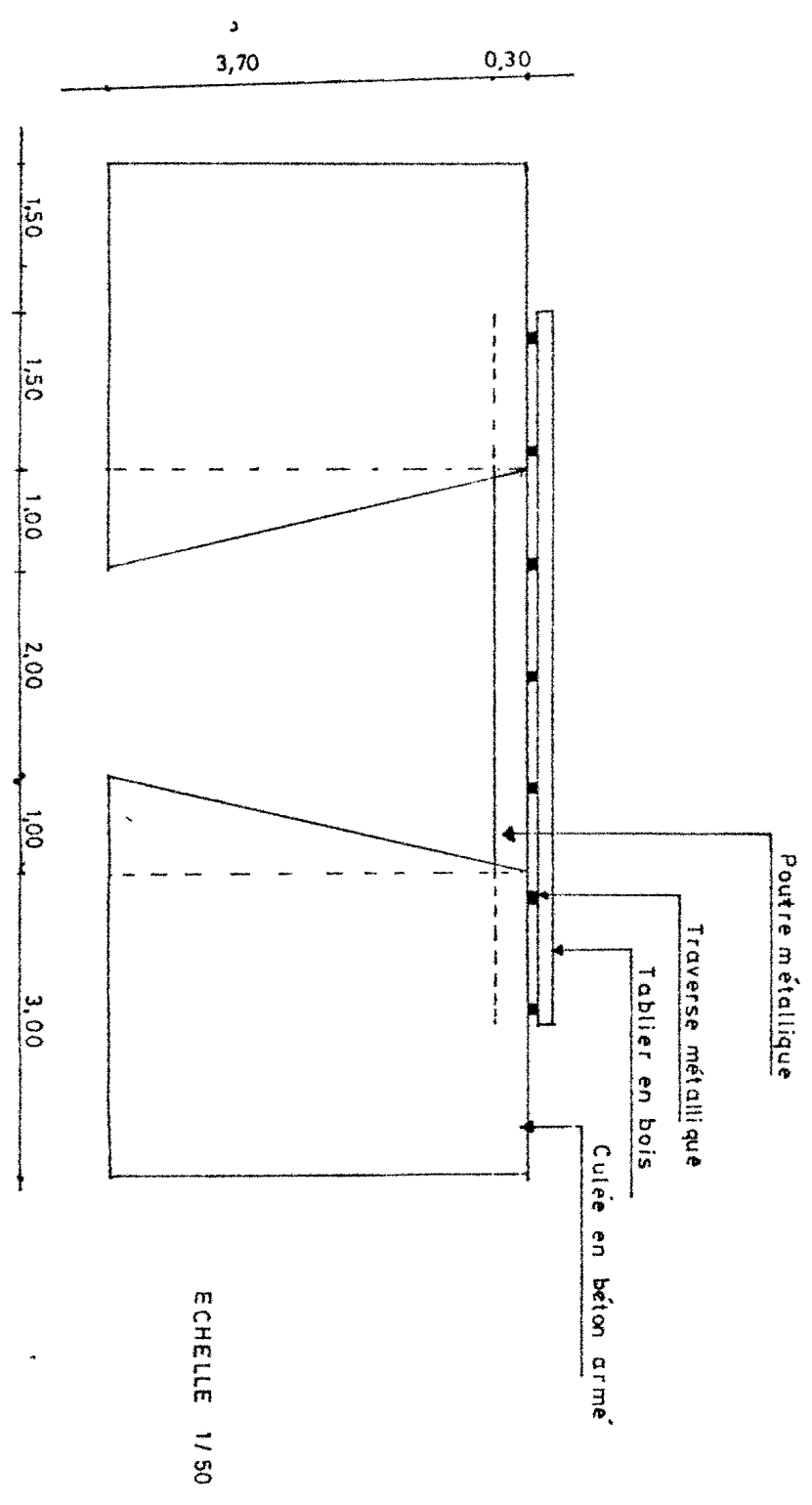

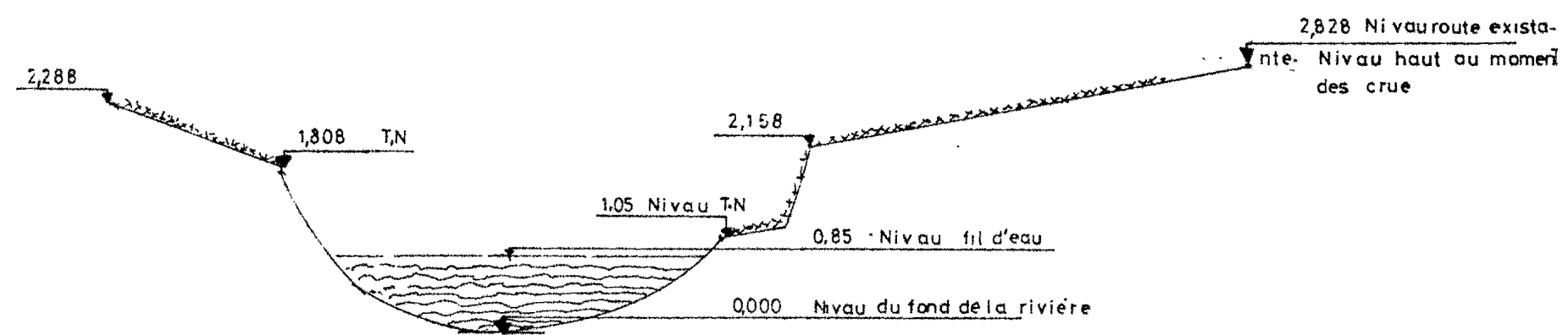

THE HUMANITARIAN TEAM VISITED NYANZA ORPHANAGE AND REPORTED THE SITUATION TO BE IN THE POOR CONDITION. THE MAIN PROBLEM IS LACK OF ATTENTION OF NGO TO THAT ORPHANAGE. THE SECTOR ASKED TO SEND A SEPTIC TRUCK FOR CLEANING THE LATRINES. SOME TIME AGO AND TODAY ABOUT 295 CHILDREN ARE USING THE BUSH FOR THAT, WITH DANGER FOR THEIR HEALTH.

b. HANDICAP.

THE HANDICAPPED CENTER OF GATAGARA IN KIGOMA COMMUNE NAMED "HOME OF VIERGE DES POUVRES" THERE ARE 100 HANDICAPPED PEOPLE, 50 BLIND PEOPLE AND THE STAFF STR ARE 80 INCLUDING DOCTORS. IT ENTER HAS SHORTAGE OF TOOLS AND RAW MATERIALS FOR THE MAKING OF ARTIFICIAL LIMBS. NGO IN A POSITION TO HELP SHOULD BE APPROACH BY UNAMIR GIVEN THE IMPORTANCE OF THIS INSTITUTION.(SEE ANNEX B).

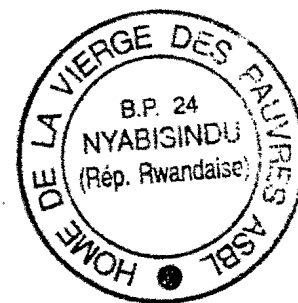

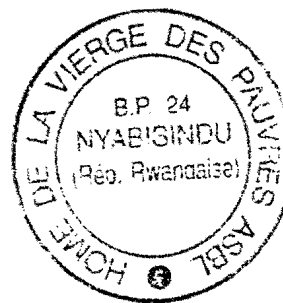

The situation is still relatively calm in AOR.

2. OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

1. Transportation.

i) Mali Coy provided 1 truck to transport food from Gitarama Prefecture to Taba Commune (8883) office.

ii) Mali Coy provided 2 trucks to transport fire wood from Gitarama to Nyabikenke Commune office (7292).

iii) Mali Coy provided 1 truck to transport sanitary equipment from Gitarama to the health center in Ntongwe Commune (9057).

iv) Mali Coy provided 1 truck to transport food donated by WFP to teachers from Gitarama to Murama Commune office (6749).

v) Mali Coy provided 2 trucks to transport food donated by WFP to teachers from Gitarama to Ruhango Commune office (7653).

vi) Mali Coy provided 2 trucks for FOOD FOR HUNGRY to transport 40 tons of food from Gitarama to the NGO location at Kabgayi (7073).

vii) Mali Coy provided 2 trucks to Tambwe Commune (7653) to transport 9 tons of food from Gitarama to the Commune office.

2. Medical.

i) On 02 JUL Mali Coy evacuated 4 RPA soldiers who were involved in a traffic accident in about 5 km from Sector 1B HQ. The 4 injured were taken to Kabhayi MSF hospital.

ii) Mali Coy treated 46 patients in its clinic facility.

3. Orphanages.

i) On 05 JUL 95 Mali Coy doctor visited Kabgayi orphanage to supervise the conditions there.

4. Road Clearance and Bridges. NTR.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

a. Food

1) The situation has not changed in general. Milobs team visited Mukingo sector (7445) in Kigoma commune and reported that 60% of population are in shortage of food.

2) Transportation of food (beans, maize and cooking oil) donated by WFP to teachers is going on. About 200 tones of that food still remain at the storage in Gitarama ready for transporting to the communes.

b. Water

Repairing of water pumps is going on in Mugina Commune (9367).

c. Health Care

No change

d. Health Problems

No change

e. Housing

No change. The situation is very poor in some areas. The burgomestre of Runda (9882) described the problem of dwelling as the most urgent in his Commune. According to him 793 houses were destroyed and 176 ~~dy~~ were rebuilt. In Musambira Commune (7780) 1286 houses were destroyed and 250 rebuilt.

f. Education.

No change.

g. Farming Activities

i) Milobs team reported that in Mukingo sector (7445) of Kigoma commune many people can not cultivate because (1) they returned back too late this year and (2) due to shortage of agricultural materials. They need hoes and seeds.

ii) Now the harvesting of coffee is going on. One of the most important producers of coffee in Gitarama is

Taba Commune (8984). Average income from harvesting coffee in this Commune is 30000 Fr per family.

f. Roads and bridges

One big bridge (702661) on the border between Nyamabuye (7470) and Mukingi (7161) Communes was found to be totally damaged and requiring reconstruction. Since that bridge is on the road connecting Communes of Nyamabuye, Mukingi, Masango (6154) and Mushubati (6971) it is of great importance. The local authorities ask the UNAMIR for assistance in its reconstruction. They promised to provide detailed engineering estimation of requirements.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

i) Many orphans were taken by relatives and families from the orphanage recently in Musambira Commune (7780). Their number is not known because those cases are not registered in the Commune office.

1. GENERAL SITUATION.

The situation remained relatively calm, however we could see IDPs located in some places with an appreciated number of orphans in several Sectors of the Communes. The harvest of coffee coincided with a wave of extortions by RPA and robberies, against the producers. The south of the Sector shows many Communes that are suffering lack of food. It seems that some IDPs that fled from Kibeho are afraid to go back home and actually are not settled in any place, moving inside the Prefecture like nomads, and acting robberies and banditries to survive.

2. Own HAC Activities.

1. Transportation.

- a) Mali Coy provided 4 trucks to LWF for transporting building Materials to repair houses to Ruhango to Mugina Communes.
- b) Malawi Coy transported one metric ton of relief maize for WPF from Kibuye to Mabanza Commune.
- c) Mali Coy provided 8 trucks to the Gitarama Prefecture for collecting schooling materials from Kigali to Maraba Sector of Nyamabuye Commune (7574) and Tambwe Commune
- d) Mali Coy provided one truck to Gitarama Prefecture for transporting road constructing materials.
- e) Malawi Coy transported 700 IDPs from Nyamisyaba (2671) to various Communes within Kibuye prefecture.
- f) Malawi Coy transported one patients from Kibuye to Ruberengera Dispensary.
- h) Mali Coy provided one truck to Mushubati College to transport fire wood.

2. Medical.

- (a) Mali Coy treated 53 patients at its medical

facilities

(b) Malawi Coy treated 26 patients at its medical facilities.

(b) The Humanitarian Officer went to Rugalika Sector (9574) to verify the situation about 150 - 200 orphans, who live in a poor condition in the center of the village, where there are IDPs from the Sector, whom have their houses destroyed; after together with the Sector Cdr, they present the matter to ICRC, who are interested and promise to give some help to these persons.

During the patrol the Humanitarian officer was informed by a teacher from a nearest school, that there are IDPs and orphanages in the same condition at the following places :

The information at Kinyambi sector was confirmed under the way. the complete information will be follow up as soon as possible.

4. Road Clearance

The operation to move the large container has not been completed this week by FSLG 95 personnel, because they do not have the proper lorry to transport this kind of container. For this reason now we request to Brown & Roots, together with FSLG 95, should make the job).

5. Reburial

Humanitarian officer and Milobs team went to Ntongwe Commune, Rutabo sector, Mukoma cellule (9435) to presence the Ceremony of the reburial of last year genocide victims. It was a catholic ceremony, where a thousand of bodies have been reburied.

3. GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS.

No change, lack of drinking water in most hinterland communes.

c. Health Problems.

The health center at Muyunzwe (6260) Sector of Masango Commune is the only dispensary to attend 5 Sectors. Caritas help them but they are of lack beds and requested 20 to UNAMIR.

e. Education.

No change, The Sector Cdr spoke with the Gitarama Prefet about the reasons of the irregular payment of the teachers, who said that, some teachers do not have their files completed in the Ministry and they received only part of their salaries and this circumstances are due the arrival of some teachers from the neighboring countries and the bureaucratic steps that take a long time to solve the problem.

f. Farming Activities.

In Nyamabuye Comune (Gatinzi Sector) there are 78 families, 38 refugees from Burundi and 6 from Zaire, who need agricultural equipment, because they are in lack of food.

4. PEOPLE WITH SPECIAL NEEDS.

a. ORPHANAGES.

- (1) It was requested to IOC by the DFC/CMO the wheelchair for a handicap boy from Kabgayi orphanage, running by JAM (JESUS ALIVE MINISTRIES).
- (2) Cyeza orphanage still waiting for two bladders for drinking water.
- (3) Kavumu Orphanage needs mosquito nets for 110 orphans and medicines.

b. HOSPITAL.

There is only one dispensary to attend the following Sectors in Nyakabanda Commune : Gasovu (6688), Kirwa (6387) and Kagogwe (6490); there is no Doctors and also lacks medical equipment.

c. PRISONERS.

(i) No change. In the most cachots of the Communes due the hygienical bad conditions the prisoners get infections that provoke serious lesions, mainly in their legs and ears.



GENERAL SITUATION

1. The situation remained calm. However, due to move of Malawi Coy and Sub Sector 3 A MILOBS to their new location, humanitarian activities in Kibuye were restricted.

OWN HAC ACTIVITIES

2. Transportation
 - (a) Provided vehicle for move of Public Prosecutor to Taba for investigation into arrest in that commune.
 - (b) A team transported Bourgmestre of Mugina for liaison humanitarian assessment within this commune.
 - (c) Mali Coy One truck to Mushubati Secondary school for move of firewood.
 - (d) Mali Coy 100 boxes of food transported from Ruhango to Gitarama Orphanage on behalf of LWF.
 - (e) Mali Coy 40 boxes of food transported from Ruhango to Murama cachot.
 - (f) Mali Coy 8 refugees from Zaire moved from Tambwe to Murama.
 - (g) Malawi Coy One patient each transported from Mubaya Dispensary and Ruberen Yera Dispensary to Kibuye Hospital.
 - (h) Mali Coy Moved 4 IDP patients from Kabgayi to home Communes.
3. Water Detailed inspection of water pipeline in Mukingi carried out by one Milobs Team with Indian Engr Coy. Break in pipeline now under repair by Indian Engr.
4. Medical
 - (a) Mali Coy treated 214 patients at its medical facilities.
 - (b) Malawi Coy treated 13 patients at its medical facilities.
 - (c) A conference of all NGOs involved in the medical field organised at Sector HQ. The Sector Cdr stressed he needed for coordinated medical efforts in the hinterland areas and he needed for mobile clinics.
 - (d) Mali Coy health team carried out anti malaria spraying in Gitarama Orphanage.
5. Food

- (a) Provided 40 boxes of food to Murama cachot.
- (b) Provided 100 boxes of food for Gitarama Orphanage.

6. Orphanages

One team carried out survey of Nyanza Orphanage to ascertain needs of this failing institution. There is a dive need of furniture, additional food and medical assistance at this orphanage.

7. Road Clearance 95 FLSG carried out clearance of all wreckage on Road Kigali - Gitarama - Nyabisindu under an initiative of this sector. 95 FLSG has now been approached to move a large container, lying on the road, to a location in Gitarama for use by a Widows home to house a Cooperative Shop.
8. MILOBS team carried and survey of communes to ascertain new figures of widows, orphans and IDP, and the state of educational and medical facilities. The exercise is still in progress and details will be forwarded soon.

GENERAL LIVING CONDITIONS

9. Food

Despite bumper harvest food situation in east and West Gitarama Communes is poor, primarily because of the number of mouths required to be fed by a single working member. Very large number of widows/ orphans are living with their relatives adding to this problem.

10. Water. In most hinterland locals are consuming contaminated water because of lack of drinking water.
11. Health Care. NTR. Exercise to ascertain authentic details in progress.
12. Health Problems. Chronic skin problems in all orphanages.
13. Housing. Very little effort by NGO's or Governments to rebuilt destroyed/broken houses. Worst affected. IDP's
14. Education 22 Secondary Schools are open General lack of stationary, sports items and text books. Teachers apprehensive about receiving payments.
15. Farming Activities General upswing - planting in progress but very few NGOs, involved in farming aid. Requirement of hoes and sees still acute.

People with Special Needs

16. Orphanages Nyanza Orphanage in dive need of adoptions

by a suitable NGO. Prefect advised of this letter from Ministry of Rehabilitation required for this purpose inviting any NGO to come forwards to adopt the orphanage.

17. Prisoners Food supplement in commune cachots.
18. Hospital All health Centres require additional medicines. Mobile clinics for hinterland areas. The dispensaries in Rutsiro 3909 and Muhira 3886 have inadequate food stock for the number of patients being treated.
19. Relations with NGOs Medical Conference held at Sector HQ Cooperation of available NGOs is excellent . NGOs in field of farming need greater activation.
20. Relations with UN Agencies Human Right team working in closer cooperation with MILOBS and formed troops. UNHCR transported 247 IDPs from Gisenyi to Kibuye (old case war) The same agency also moved 198 IDPs from Kibuye to home communes.
21. Relations with Local Authorities The Prefect of Gitarama and Sector Cdr had detailed discussions an humanitarian assistance. The major field of work requested by the Prefect related to the patchwork repair of the Road Kigali - Gitarama The states of the road in some parts has deteriorated considerably during the recent heavy rains. The Prefect has been advised to obtain written formal request to UNAMIR from Department of Roads and Bridges appear to be too serious in their approach to solving problems of orphans and widows and no tangible programmes in exist in this directions.

Malawicoy treated 18 locals

Malicoy dentist visited NYANZA orphanage and the Malicoy doctor visited orphanages in Ruli and Kabgayi town both running by Concern.

The hospital in Karengera (1350) which was previously supported by the NGO AFVP until February, is now severely short of supplies (specially anti-malarials and medicines for dysentery).

TRANSPORT.

Malicoy transported 08 IDPS admitted in Kabgayi Hospital due to wounds suffered at Kibeho to their home communes in Taba, Ntongwe and Murama.

Malawicoy transported timber for orphanage center at Ngoma.

Malawicoy transported timber from Gisovu to Mugonero for Mugonero Orphanage.

Malicoy provided two trucks to transport food boxes from LWF store at Ruhango to Murama commune cachot and to Gitarama.

Malicoy provided one truck to Mugina Commune to transport building materials from Kigali to the Commune.

ORPHANAGES.

One patrol went to Byumba (Sector 1) to reintegrate 03 orphans from Cyeza orphanage in Rutobwe Commune with their families located there. One orphan has been restored to his family.

One orphan who has reported to the sector was handed over to the Cyeza.

The Kabgayi orphanage which has shifted from Byimana recently was earlier supplied with drinking water by Brown & Root. However, after shifting no water has been provided and the orphanage is without drinking water for the last week. It is requested that the office of the HAC may please be made use of to urgently arrange for drinking water for around 400 parched throats.

MISCELLANEOUS

Plastic sheeting for reburial in Rutobwe commune provided with the help of LWF.

LWF has given authority letter for the collection of 1400 food packages from their store at Ruhango. These packages are being utilized for augmenting the food for prisoners in the

commune cachots in Murama and Mugina, where the conditions are particularly bad. As well as for the children of Nyanza orphanage.


UNHCR was delivering plastic sheeting in the sector of Mpembe in an effort to repair some of the houses there.
