MONTHENDING : 24th August 1946

1.) Medical Personal consists of the following 3 Doctors :

CLASS I : Dr.A.J.ROUILLIER

CLASS II : Dr.M.TENENBAUM

CLASS III : Dr.KADISCH.

SANITARIAN: Dr.SOMOGYI,CLASS II

Dr. Tenenbaum is at present in sick Leave.

2.) Cinecittà is a large Transit-Camp and there is a great deal of movement into and out of the Camp.

3.) The medical services liase with the Welfare Department to provide recreation for the refugees especially the children with trips to the seaside wherever possible. There is a Camp-Cinema and Theatre,where shows are given at regular intervals.

4.)Camp-health is good.

5.)Rations to scale : supplemental items of food are issued by the camp medical officer in selected cases,such as pregnant women,nursing mothers and post hospital cases.



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- 7.) No particular disease is prevalent in the camp: There have been a small number of cases of bronchitis among the children. The attendance at the ambulatorio is for minor complaints.
- 8.) There is a children's creche and school which is under the supervision of the medical and Welfare Services.
- 9.) There is no Dental Clinic.
- 10.) There is no hospital.
- 11.) The nursing service is provided by a grade 5 Nurse.
- 12.) The standard of Hygiene has been raised and some improvements made.
- 13.) LATRINES : The old wooden latrines which were so unsatisfactory have been demolished and water-flushes-latrines have been installed in there. *BN*

SEWAGE - FARM : The engineering firm, which installed the plant have been approached for an estimate for its repair and for the provision of a motor. Their reply is awaited.

FLIES : The camp has been sprayed with D.D.T. and the results are very satisfactory.

SWILL : Is disposed of to a local Italian.

REFUSE: Is burnt in a dump.

WATER : Negotiations have been completed for installation of a pump to supply an extra amount. When this is installed there should be an ample supply water.

- 14.) Medical-supplies and equipment are satisfactory.

MONTHLY NARRATIVE REPORT.

for the period ending 15. September 1946.

1.) Personnel consists of :

2.9 A polish refugee-train, with repatriates for Poland; consisting of upwards 200 persons left Cinecittà on the 31.8.1946.

Accompanying it in their respective capacities were Dr.Kadisch and sister Phillips. They had an uneventful trip to Poland. Medical stores were supplied for this train from the Medical Warehouse, Cinecittà.

Dr. Tenenbaum was granted sick leave for the period 20. August to 30. August. His Excellence, the Polish Ambassador, made a tour of inspection of Cinecittà and expressed himself very pleased with the conditions there. His visit was on the 12.9.1946. Dr. Tenenbaum took up duty at Via Toscana on the 15.9.1946.

3.) No special activity can be reported.

4.) For a Transit-Camp the health of Cinecittà is remarkably good. This is probably explained by the fact, that the inoculation state is very high. We are singularly free from Malaria,, Typhoid and Typhus cases. The attendance at the Ambulatorio is for minor cases only as a scrutiny of the weekly and

monthly returns will show.

5.) The diet as laid down by UNRRA - scales is sufficient, but I consider a greater amount of fresh meat and fresh vegetables would be appropriate.

6.) The inoculation state on the 21. September 1946 was as follows :

The usual difficulties is experienced in making people attend for inoculation : for new arrivals in the camp we resort to the practice of withholding their foodcards until they have been protected.

7.) No particular disease is prevalent in the camp. We had an outbreak of furunculosis during the past month, which was combated by an issue of Vitamin-tablets and the outbreak is now subsiding.

8.) It is hoped in the near future with the extra nursing help promised to us to start a Clinic for children and pregnant women. At present pregnant women and women with children attend the Ambulatorio, are examined by Dr. Kadisch and records kept of their progress. Regular F.F.I's are carried out by the medical officer in the children's chreche and school. With the Welfare-Department the children have outings to the seaside and such recreation.

9.) There is no dental clinic in the Camp/ Patients requiring dental treatment are sent to the Eastman Clinic in Rome.

10.) There is no Camp hospital: patients are hospitalised in the

local Italian Red Cross hospital and the hospitals in Rome depending upon their particular complaint.

11;) The nursing service is supplied by a Class II nurse grade 5 assisted by a medical aid.

12.) Sanitation.Water supply : Reference has previously been made by Dr.Somogyi to the water supply of the camp : technical difficulties are still holding up the installation of the water pump and when there are overcome their should be an ample supply of water for all purposes.


Sewage farm .Previous reference has already been made to this. An engineer is being sent by the firm to report upon the condition of the installation and prepare an estimate for its repair.

Labour. Considerable difficulties are experienced in getting an adequate number of men to form a hygiene squad to keep the camp clean,however we are doing our best with an inadequate number of men,to keep the camp as clean as possible.

Insects. There was a sudden return of the fly nuisance in the middle of the month.This was combated by spraying with D.D.T.

13.) There is a medical warehouse situated in the camp under the control of Capt.BIRD, indents are made through this warehouse for medical supplies.

14.) Plans are well in hand for the installation of a diet kitchen -in the camp,where selected persons may have special food provided for them. Supplies for the kitchen are on hand. The present system of issuing supplemental food is always been recognised as unsatisfactory;as these supplies very often find their way to the wrong quarters. With the event diet kitchen this abuse should cease.

cards is in progress.
Examination of out of camp assistance of sick D.P.s. for
admittance to care in the Camp has been continued.

Camp Health. The general health of the camp population is good
No epidemics have occurred. A typhoid carrier was found and
immediately isolated and his habitation disinfected.

Nutritional State: There are many complaints especially from the
workers kitchen and the Class 2 Mess that the food is not
adequate and I consider that for physical workers the food
is not sufficient. The D.P.s complain that there is not enough
variety in the diet and they need more vegetables.

Prevalent Diseases: During the past month there has been some increase
in respiratory diseases. I feel this is due not only to the
inclement weather but to; the bad accommodation in the camp
The camp is always overpopulated the roofs of most of the
buildings leak and there are very few windows, and therefore
the people are not well protected against wind and rain.
It is impossible to give proper accommodation to old and
infirm people and young children. To improve the conditions
at once would it be possible to issue straw mattresses and
extra blankets to all the people. Two blankets of poor quality
are not enough to keep them warm.

Camp Clinics: It has been decided to open a Childrens and Pregnant
Womens Clinic next week. This will make the M.I. Room work
easier reducing the work to pathological cases only.
The feeding of babies who are artificially fed will be
controlled in this Clinic an experienced nurse aide has been
found in the camp and she will instruct the mothers in the
preparing of the milk.

F.F.I.S. are carried out in the School and Creche every week. the children are able to have showers three times a week and their general health and Cleanliness is good.

Dental Clinic: An average of 12 new cases are sent to Dr. Fischer at the Eastman Clinic Rome. each week.

Hospital: During the month 47 cases have been sent to Hospital 12 were admitted to the town Hospitals 7 surgical cases 2 T.B. cases 1 Maternity case and 2 V.D. cases To the camp Hospital we sent 4 Maternity cases and the rest slight ailments.

Nursing Services: See Nurse Supervisors Report.

Sanitation and Hygiene: The sanitation and hygiene of the camp has become worse. I wrote a letter to the Hygiene Officer drawing her attention to this. She replied that she agreed with me but that there were "all sorts of difficulties" which cannot be eliminated She did not state what these difficulties were, but had reported the matter to the Camp Director.

Medical Supplies: The supplies are adequate and issued from the stores every month.

General Comments: The opening of a Diet and Childrens Kitchen has been discussed with the Camp Director and Welfare Officer, and the Welfare Officer has promised early in this month to prepare a room and necessary staff and equipment. This will eliminate the unsatisfactory system of the issue of supplements.

Owing to the transit population and continual movements of these people it is impossible to have a rigid control over communicable diseases and I would suggest that for the sake of hygiene each person in the camp is supplied with their own eating utensils, which they can wash themselves.

I have recently made new arrangements for Xray services with the San Giovanni Hospital and I hope this will prove more satisfactory than the previous service.

Special Activities. The Examination of the Static Population is proceeding slowly, owing to the increased movements of the D.P.s this month. The people are also very reluctant to come to the M.I. Room for the examination. The examinations for "out of camp assistance have continued as before.

On Wednesday afternoons a nurse is visiting the various Hospitals where our patients are admitted to supervise the giving of Supplements, with the Welfare Officer.

Camp Health. The general health of the population is good, but owing to the increased population the work in the M.I. Room has increased considerably. No epidemics have occurred. 10 cases of Scabies were found amongst the new arrivals this week and treated in Hospital.

Nutritional State. The general diet of the D.P.s and workers has been improved and in consequence the cases of Furunculosis have decreased. The issue of Supplements is now controlled by me and issued on Medical grounds only.

Prevalent Diseases.

During the past month the prevalent diseases have been coryza and bronchitis owing to the bad weather and the leaking condition of the accommodation provided for the refugees. There has however been a further distribution of blankets and straw mattresses which has added to the comfort of the people.

Camp Clinics.

A Childrens Clinic is now being held on Thursday afternoons and is very well attended. Supplements of sugar, milk butter, cheese, and oats are given to the Pregnant Women, Nursing Mothers, and for babies who are artificially fed. A control has been made of the Pregnant Women, and a Register compiled.

Dental Clinic.

The school and creche are visited each week, and the health and general health of the children is good. An average of 12 patients are sent to Dr. Fischer at the Eastman Clinic each week.

Hospital.

During the month 46 cases have been admitted to Hospital. 7 were sent to the Town Hospital, 4 Maternity cases 21 Scabies 3 Bronchitis, 1 Sarcoma of rectum and minor ailments were sent to the Italian Hospital.


General Comments.

The opening of a Diet and Childrens Kitchen is still under discussion, but with the help of the new Welfare Officer it is hoped to overcome the present difficulties, and to get the project working soon.

During the last month the patients admitted to the various hospitals have been of Slav nationality and difficulties have arisen between the doctors and patients owing to the different languages spoken. Several times I have been called to go to the hospitals and have acted as interpreter and have done my best to settle these difficulties.

A good interpreter is urgently required as this sort of thing takes up a good deal of my time which would be better employed in the Camp.

Camp Health.

The general health of the Camp population has been good, with the exception of the last group of Poles from the Near and Far East. These people were suffering from various chronic diseases, such as Malaria and Rheumatism, and owing to the change of climate were subject to respiratory complaints fortunately of a mild character.

Nutritional State.

Supplements have been a great difficulty this last month, and there is a great need for a Diet Kitchen. The general nutritional state is good.

Prevalent Diseases.

Respiratory and Catarrhal otitis have been the prevalent diseases owing to the overcrowding in the accomodation and the cold weather. but it has not been heavier than is usual for a large population.

Camp Clinics.

The Childrens Clinic is held each week, and well a attended. The babies are weighed and examined and show improvement. Supplements are issued for them and the Pregnant Women.

Dental Clinic.

An average of 12 people are sent to the Eastman Clinic Each week.

Hospitals.

During this month owing to the fact that we have no U.N.R.R.A. camp hospital our work has been very difficult. I wish to comment that frequently our patients in the town hospitals make requests for medicines of the most simple kind, because the doctors in these hospitals expect U.N.R.R.A. to supply these medicines.
 8 patients have been sent to the Policlinico, 2 to Osp. Israelito, 1 to San Giovanni and 27 to the Camp Hospital.

Nursing Services

Sanitation and Hygeine.

With the help of the Welfare Officer I have arranged the services of a Camp barber, for the staff and Medical Services. It is under our control and running well.

Medical Supplies.

The supplies issued each month are good and adequate.

General Comments.

I was greived to hear that the project of a Diet Kitchen has been rejected. It is hoped that it will be possible to organise a temporary diet kitchen with the help of the Operating Services Officer in the Camp.

MOVEMENTS

Dr. Tenenbaum went to Naples on February 7th to meet a ship from Shanghai with Displaced Persons on board. He selected and sent to hospital those people unable to travel to Austria. He returned to Cinecitta' on February 10th.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

Nothing special to report.

CAMP HEALTH

The health of the static people is good. The last group of 500 people from Austria were in a very unhealthy state, many of them suffering from Gastric diseases requiring special diet. Their teeth, especially among the young people, were in bad condition. V.D. and Syphilis late cases are prevalent amongst them. I fear there are cases not reported and I am doing my utmost in the Camp to persuade them to report to the M.I. Room as soon as possible.

NUTRITIONAL STATE

The food issued is adequate in quantity but not in quality, and many complaints have been made that Haricot beans are issued too often and the diet is very monotonous.

PREVALENT DISEASES

Gastro Intestinal diseases have increased but are in most cases old chronic cases. Furunculosis has also increased during the past month. During the bad weather, in spite of the poor accommodation serious respiratory diseases have not occurred.

CAMP CLINICS

The childrens Clinic is held each week and well attended. The babies are weighed and examined and are in good condition. Supplements are issued for them and Pregnant Women.

DENTAL CLINIC

There has been a marked increase in Dental cases, an average of 34 people attending the Eastman Clinic each week. Owing to the fact that the last group of people to arrive here are mostly the Dental cases and not expected to remain in the Camp very long, necessary artificial dentures have not been authorised.

HOSPITALS

During the last month it has often been difficult to find accommodation in the Rome and Camp Hospitals and many people had to be treated in the Camp. 12 cases were sent to the C.R.I., 2 to the San Giovanni Hospital, 1 to the Policlinico, 2 to Forlianni, 1 to Osp. Israelito and 1 to a Mental Hospital.

NURSING SERVICES

See Nurse Supervisor's report.

SANITATION AND HYGIENE

Two cases of lice were found in the Camp, and disinfection of the people and clothing and bedding of the whole Camp is in progress.

MEDICAL SUPPLIES

The supplies issued are adequate and supplied each month.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Owing to the large number of Gastric cases requiring supplements, and the number of Hospital cases also requiring supplements, I feel that 5% supplements issued is not sufficient, especially as some of the items of food are not able to be used without a diet kitchen.

Special Activities.

During the last month special attention has been given to F.F.I. inspections. The whole camp population has been controlled. A few cases of previously unknown cases of Scabies, one body lice and a few dirty heads were found and immediately treated. The general condition and cleanliness of the people was good. There have been an increased number of people requiring emigration health certificates which takes up considerable time. Each person going to several consulates and requiring a certificate for each one.

We are now beginning an extensive inoculation drive, and with the energetic support of the Camp Director we feel this will prove successful.

Camp Health.

The health of the Camp population is good. One case of Parotitis has been isolated. There has been an increase of Pyrexia of unknown origin among the babies, and many cases had to be treated in the Camp owing to the difficulty of getting beds for them in the hospital. Seven cases were hospitalised, and all the cases resolved in a few days without complications.

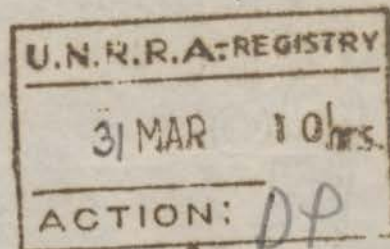
Nutritional State.

The nutritional state is good. During the month I had to condemn two issues of fish, part of which was uneatable, also the quality of the potatoes has been very poor. I also controlled the issue of biscuits, eliminating 15 lbs. which were deteriorated.

Prevalent Diseases.

The prevalent diseases during the month have been pyrexia among the children and gastro intestinal disturbances.

Camp Clinics.

The childrens clinic is progressing well and their condition is good.

The school and creche is visited regularly. Pregnant women have been controlled, and urine tests made and measurements taken. Arrangements are being made during the next month for Kahn tests to be made on all the pregnant women. Those suspected of any abnormalities are being sent to the Gynec. Specialist.

Dental Clinic.

We are sending an average of 18 patients to the Eastman Clinic each week. I have sent a request to Dr. Fischer to come here to examine the childrens teeth as soon as possible.

Hospitals.

The Camp Hospital this month has been very crowded with Italian patients, and frequently our cases have had to be treated in the camp owing to no available beds in the hospital. 31 cases were sent to the C.R.I. 5 to Policlínico, 1 to Casa di Cura Firenze, 3 to Osp. Israelitico and 1 to San Camillio.

Nursing Services.

See Nurse Supervisors report.

Hygiene and Sanitation.

Mr. Wright the chief Hygiene Officer visited the camp on March 28th. giving good advice and suggestions for improvements. He has promised urgently required materials and a large pump to disinfect infected rooms.

Medical Supplies.

The supplies are adequate and ordered each month.

General Comments.

The Diet and Childrens Kitchen is now ready to open, and in a few days will be functioning. This kitchen will provide meals for children from 1 to 14 years., and patients requiring a special diet as selected by me.

I have been in consultation with Dr. Jones Medical Director with regard to the Supplement issue for this kitchen, and explained to him that the 5% supplement now issued is not sufficient for the diet kitchen, hospital patients, needing extra diet and the remaining people in the camp requiring supplements, who do not need to go to the diet kitchen. In this Camp we have a higher proportion of people requiring supplements in the hospitals, because many of them are sent from other U.N.R.R.A. camps to Rome through Cine Citta.

Movements: Dr. Tenenbaum left Rome on Saturday, April 5th, by ambulance to accompany to Vienna Mrs. SZANTO Else heavily sick with TBC. Mrs. Szanto belonged to the Chinese transport but was not fit for transport until then. Dr. Tenenbaum returned to Rome on Sunday, April 20th, after having brought the patient safely to Vienna.

Special activities. During this month special attention has been given to an inoculation drive, which all the camp population had to undergo. With posters the camp population has been warned that only those who have undergone the whole course of inoculation will have their food cards stamped and get their PX rations. In view of this warning the result of the drive was almost complete, the static population is nearly all protected.

Camp Health: The health of the camp population is good. There were no serious diseases at all, only slight Gastro-Intestinal ones. There were no communicable diseases except one case of Measles, which promptly was isolated.

Nutritional State: The nutritional state is good. It is evident that the diet kitchen was, especially for the sick persons and the children, a very necessity, from which both categories of the camp population are now benefiting.

Prevalent Diseases:

The prevalent diseases during this month have been gastro-intestinal ones, none of them serious.

Camp Clinics:

The children's clinic is ~~visiting regularly~~ progressing well and their condition good. The school and creche is visited regularly. Pregnant women are clinically controlled and urine tests made.

Dental Clinic:

On April 4th the teeth of 40 children have been inspected by Dr. Fischer, and 29 children have been found with bad teeth. It has been arranged that these children have to go to the Eastman Clinic to have their teeth treated.

Hospitals:

In April we sent 13 patients to the C.R.I., 2 to Casa di Cura Bellosguardo, 6 to Ospedale Israelitico, 2 to Policlinico, 1 to Casa di Cura Forlanini, 1 to the Regina Elena, and 2 to the Joint Sanatory.

Nursing Services:

See Nurse Supervisor's report.

Hygiene and Sanitation:

Mr. Wright promised on March 28th, on occasion of his visiting the camp, to send us an urgently required pump to disinfest infected rooms. This pump we did not yet receive. - Hyg. Squad has during this month thoroughly spread all the camp with DDT.

Medical Supplies:

The supplies are adequate and ordered each month.

General Comments:

I have again to draw the attention of Dr. Jones, Medical Director, to the low percentage of the Medical confort. He promised to ~~rise~~ raise this percentage above the level of 5%, but up to now this has not been permitted. If the diet kitchen shall function properly it has to keep all the Scale C, and we are not able to have the kitchen run, to send parcels into the town to our patients, and to provide some categories of the camp population (f.i. feeding mothers, pregnant women) with supplementary food. In the case we should not be allowed a higher percentage of Medical confort we shall be compelled to restrict the supplementary food issue for the s/m categories to only milk.

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Movements: Miss Cosulich was on escort duty to Trieste from May 13th to May 20th, while Miss Bressan was on leave from May 22nd to May 29th.

Special activities: Nil.

Camp Health: The health of the Camp population is good. An evident increase of V.D. cases, in the majority old ones and especially Syphilis, is to be noticed. - 2 cases of Whooping Cough were immediately isolated and up to now no further cases were registered. -

Nutritional state. The nutritional state is good. By combining the Children and Diet kitchen we are able to improve the food for the children, especially for the small ones. We are preparing for the feeding in the Children kitchen of babies below one year of age, who up to now were given only the milk, and starting with June 2nd the babies will have their meals prepared carefully and with all precautions. We hope to be able by this system of feeding to prevent the numerous gastrical disturbances of babies which use to increase in the hot season, by way of carefully guarding the preparation of the food.

Innoculation State. We are able to maintain a high state of inoculation by persuasion and education of the Camp population.

Prevalent Diseases. Not serious gastro-intestinal disturbances, acute and of short du-

~~RATION~~ ration. V.D. cases increasing but the sources of the infections outside the Camp.

Camp Clinics. The children's clinic is progressing well and their condition good. The school and creche is visited regularly. Pregnant women are clinically controlled and urine tests made.

Dental Clinic. See Dr. Fischer's report.

Hospitals. There have been difficulties in accomodating our patients in hospitals. It occurs often that our patients leave the hospitals after a short stay there, against the advice of the doctors, and return to the camp. They complain about difficulties concerning the language, and about bad nursing and bad food. The camp hospital, too, has always less and less beds for our use and we are often compelled to keep patients in the camp, which means many home visits, and other difficulties, with regard to therapy and treatment. Thus we are faced with difficult tasks.

In May we sent 34 patients to hospitals, out of them: 19 to the C.R.I., 3 to the Hospital Bambino Gesù, 1 to S. Giovanni, 1 to the Clinica Bastianelli, 1 to the Mental Hospital Monte Mario, and 9 to the Joint Sanitorium.

Nursing Services: See Nurse Supervisor's report.

Hygiene and Sanitation: This month a large scale FFI. inspection was made with satisfactory result.- The pumps recently received from Mr. Wright are very useful for the disinfection of the rooms.

The general cleanliness of the camp, especially the maintenance of the WCs and the garbage dump is poor, but Dr. Rusz has to do it with unwilling labours. This, and the camp being a transit camp is probably the reason why the people take so little care.

Medical Supplies. Many hospitals ~~not~~ often require not only Penicillin for our patients, but other medicines too. I want to draw Dr. Jones' attention to the fact, that these requirements are gradually increasing and I beg to be instructed whether I shall issue these medicines. Many Gonorrhea patients want to be treated with Penicillin before their departure. It is easily understandable that they want to be cured as soon as possible, insist upon being treated with Penicillin and refuse any other treatment. I therefore want to be authorized to use this treatment in justifiable cases.-

Nutritional state: The children kitchen does not work well, as at the moment it is regarded as more important to satisfy the children above 3 years of age. Especially since a few days some rations have changed for worse for children between 1 and 2 years of age. These children cannot eat "pasta asciuta" and sardines. The fats are not for these children. If the children up to 2 years of age could at least be fed with the sick diet, we could have avoided, especially now in the hot season, many cases of acute enteritis. - The promised diet for children between 6 months and 1 year of age has not yet been prepared, it seems because of many reasons, especially because of lack of hygienical conditions.

Prevalent diseases: There is an increase of gastro-intestinal disturbances of the children as well as of the adults. They are of short duration, ~~and~~ easily curable, caused mainly by eating unwashed fruit and tinned fish and fats.

Camp Clinics: The children's clinic is progressing well and their condition good. The school and creche is visited regularly. Pregnant women are clinically controlled and urine tests made.

Dental clinic: See Dr. Fischer's report.

Hospitals: We have great difficulties with the hospitals because of lack of discipline of our patients. It would be important to arrange that every patient who leaves on his own initiative a hospital is losing the right to be treated in a hospital. This would save us time and difficulties to accommodate new patients in Italian hospitals.
In June we sent 34 patients to hospitals: 16 to the C.R.I., 7 to the Policlinico, 3 to S. Giovanni, 2 to the Clin. Oste-trica, 4 to Ospedale Israelitico, 1 to Forte Aurelio, and 1 to the Joint Sanitorium.
