2. The UNAMIR Signal Squadron located at Kigali has the responsibility to ensure that all radio nets operate as efficiently as possible. Any questions or concerns about the enclosure should be directed to Signal Operations at UNAMIR HQ.
3. It is requested that addresses ensure the widest possible distribution of the aide memoir.

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AIDE-MEMOIRE  
VOICE PROCEDURE

PURPOSE

1. The purpose of this aide-memoire is to prescribe the basic radio-telephone procedure that shall be used on all UNAMIR radio nets.

GENERAL

1. Transmissions by radiotelephone will be as short and concise as possible consistent with clearness. Since personnel other than trained operators frequently operate radio equipment, all personnel must be cautioned that transmissions by radio are subject to intercept and therefore have no security.

2. Adherence to prescribed procedure is mandatory. Unauthorized departures from or variations in prescribed procedure often create confusion, reduce reliability and speed, and are therefore prohibited. If the procedure prescribed herein does not cover a specific operating requirement, initiative and common sense should suffice.

3. The following basic rules are essential and should be strictly enforced:

a. no transmission shall be made which has not been authorized by proper authority.

b. the following practices are forbidden:

(1) unofficial conversation between operators.

(2) excessive time consumed in tuning, changing frequency or adjusting/testing equipment.

(3) profane, indecent or obscene language.

(4) transmitting at speeds beyond capabilities of receiving operator.

4. To utilize circuit time more efficiently, all messages or their substance should be written down prior to transmission. Those messages which must be delivered by the receiving operator to another person or which are preceded by proword MESSAGE shall be written down.

5. Transmissions by radiotelephone shall be as short and concise as practicable consistent with clarity. The use of standard phraseology enhances brevity.

6. Transmissions over radiotelephone should be clear with natural emphasis on each word (except the prescribed pronunciation of a numeral), and should be spoken in natural phrases, not word by word.

7. To avoid interfering with other traffic, an operator shall listen to make certain that a circuit is clear before making any transmissions thereon.

#### DISCIPLINE

1. Good discipline is essential to the efficient working of radio nets. Irrespective of rank, the CONTROL STATION is in charge of the net, and is responsible for its discipline. Radio discipline includes:

- a. correct use of procedures;
- b. opening and closing of nets or stations;
- c. keeping net or circuit on correct frequency; and
- d. maintenance of radio watch by all stations.

#### ESTABLISHING COMMUNICATIONS

1. Before conducting regular traffic over radiotelephone circuits, it may be necessary to make contact with other stations involved to ascertain that communication is possible.

EXAMPLE A (Conditions good):

1. 2A transmits:  
Two Three - THIS IS - Two Alfa - OVER.
2. 23 answers the initial call:  
Two Three - OVER.
3. 2A having nothing for 23, transmits:  
Two Alfa - ROGER - OUT.

EXAMPLE B (Conditions difficult):

1. 2A transmits:  
Two Three - Two Three - THIS IS - Two Alfa -  
Two Alfa - RADIO CHECK - OVER.
  2. 23 transmits:  
Two Alfa - Two Alfa - THIS IS - Two Three -  
Two Three - WEAK - OVER.
  3. 2A having nothing for 23, transmits:  
Two Three - THIS IS - Two Alfa - ROGER -  
OUT.

RADIO CHECKS, SIGNAL STRENGTH  
AND READABILITY

1. A station is understood to have good signal strength and readability unless otherwise notified. Strength of signals and readability will be exchanged only when requested or when difficulty is experienced.

2. The prowords listed below are for use when initiating and answering queries concerning signal strength and readability.

a. General

RADIO CHECK      what is my signal strength and readability  
i.e. How do you hear me.

ROGER              i have received your last transmission  
satisfactorily. (the omission of comment  
on signal strength and readability is  
understood to mean that reception is loud  
and clear. If reception is other than  
loud and clear it must be described with  
the prowords from paragraphs b and c  
below).

NOTHING HEARD    to be used when no reply is received from  
a call station.

b. Report of signal strength

LOUD                your signal strength is very strong.

GOOD                your signal strength is good.

WEAK                your signal strength is weak.

VERY WEAK          your signal strength is very weak.

FADING              at times your signal strength fades to  
such an extent that continuous reception  
cannot be relied upon.

c. Report of readability

CLEAR                excellent quality.

READABLE            quality is satisfactory.

UNREADABLE          the quality of your transmission is so bad  
that i cannot read you.

DISTORTED            having trouble reading you because your  
signal is distorted.

WITH  
INTERFERENCE        having trouble reading you due to  
interference.

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## NODUFF

1. NODUFF is use when an emergency occurs such as a helicopter MED EVAC, upon hearing NODUFF all stations on the circuit shall stay off the air until the emergency is over.

## PHONETIC ALPHABET

1. When necessary to identify any letter of the alphabet, the standard phonetic alphabet shall be used. This alphabet is listed below:

NOTE: syllables underlined carry the accent.

2. Difficult words or groups within the text of plain-text messages may be spelled using the phonetic alphabet and preceded by the proword " I SPELL". If the operator can pronounce the word to be spelled, he will do so before and after the spelling to identify the word.

EXAMPLE: "Cantenary - I SPELL charlie alfa november tango echo november alfa romeo yankee - Cantenary".

"Rendez vous point is - I SPELL uniform november india mike alfa kilo".

## PRONUNCIATION OF NUMERALS

1. To distinguish numerals from words similarly pronounced, the proword "FIGURES" may be used preceding such numbers.
2. When numerals are transmitted by radio, the following rules for their pronunciation will be observed:

3. Numbers will be transmitted digit by digit, except that exact multiples of thousands may be spoken as such.

4. The decimal point is to be spoken as "DAY-SEE-MAL".

EXAMPLE: 123.4 is to be spoken as "wun too tree DAY-SEE-MAL fow-er".

5. Dates shall be spoken digit by digit, with months in full.

6. Roman numerals shall be transmitted as the corresponding arabic numerals preceded by the word "ROMAN".

## ABBREVIATION IN THE TEXT

1. Abbreviation in the text are transmitted as fols:

a. initials used alone or in conjunction with short titles shall be spoken phonetically.

EXAMPLE: "Para A" - shall be spoken as "Paragraph Alfa".

"APC" - shall be spoken as "Alfa Papa Charlie"

b. personal initials shall be spoken phonetically, prefixed by the word "INITIALS".

EXAMPLE: "G.M. Smith" - shall be spoken as "INITIALS Golf Mike Smith".

c. abbreviations frequently used in normal speech may be used in the same manner when transmitted by voice.

EXAMPLE: "NATO" - may be spoken as "NATO".

d. punctuation shall be spoken as follows:

Oblique stroke	SLANT

#### PROWORDS

1. Prowords are pronounceable words or phrases which have been assigned meanings for the purpose of expediting message handling on circuits where radiotelephone is employed. In no case shall a proword or a combination of prowords be substituted for the textual component of a message.

2. The following prowords are authorized for general use:

<u>PROWORD</u>	<u>MEANING</u>
ACKNOWLEDGE	an instruction to the addressee that the msg must be acknowledged.
ALL AFTER	the portion of the msg to which i have reference is all that which follows.
ALL BEFORE	the portion of the msg to which i have reference is all that which precedes.
ALL STATIONS	means all stations on a net including the control station.
ASSUME CONTROL	you will assume control of this net until further notice.

BREAK	i hereby indicate the separation of the text from other portions of the msg
CALL SIGN	the group that follows is a call sign
CLEAR	the quality of your transmission affords excellent readability
CORRECT	you are correct or what you have transmitted is correct
CORRECTION	an error has been made in this transmission. Transmission will continue with the last word correctly transmitted
DISREGARD THIS TRANSMISSION- OUT	this transmission is in error. Disregard it.
DISTORTED	having trouble understanding your transmission because your signal is distorted
FADING	at times your signal strength fades to such an extent that continuous reception cannot be relied upon
FETCH	used when indicating to whom the caller wishes to speak
FIGURES	numerals or numbers follow
FLASH	precedence FLASH
GOOD	your signal strength is good
GRID	portion following is a grid reference
I AM ASSUMING CONTROL	i am assuming control of this net until further notice



# HOSTILE BROADCASTS

I note in today's report of NY press briefings (message 093) references by a spokesman to pirate radio broadcasts "in Rwanda" that are "an obstacle to the repatriation effort"


I understand that the most recent report of pirate broadcasts in Zone 4 was made by an English-speaking military observer there, on information from local residents. The same residents later told a reliable journalist directly, in kiSwahili, that they had not heard the broadcasts in question for more than a month. The journalist will pursue his inquiries this weekend.

It would be embarrassing if the UN were found to be repeating rumours based on imperfect translations. Several UN agencies in the area have trustworthy employees who speak local languages, and know whether hostile broadcasts been heard recently, or not. Perhaps UNAMIR should make its own prompt inquiries.



**OFFICE PROCEDURES - FORCE STANDARD DISTRIBUTION LISTS**

1. New Standard Distribution Lists for use within the military component of HQ UNAMIR are attached. Staff officers are encouraged to make the maximum use of these Lists as they help ensure that no one is omitted from the distribution of any document and remove the chore of typing long distributions on each document produced.

2. The Lists must, however, be used sensibly. While they act as an aide-memoire for staff officers, they do not remove from them the responsibility of considering carefully who needs the information contained in the document under consideration. There is a balance to be struck if we are to ensure efficient and effective passage of information within the Force - those who need to know must receive the necessary information while those who do not have any interest in the subject do not want to be swamped with masses of paper which they have to read to decide whether or not they need the information it contains. We need, too, to remember that distribution of large documents on wide distributions is expensive in terms of paper, photocopying and the time of our too few clerks.

3. Standard Distribution Lists are flexible in their use, as the following examples demonstrate. If the appropriate Distribution List contains addressees who do not need a particular document, the Distribution on the document might read, for example, 'Lists A and B (less Serials 17 and 21)'. Similarly, the Lists can be used to cover a part of the total distribution of a document thus:

4. It is also possible to differentiate between Action and Information addressees using distribution lists, for example, if it is required to notify the military staff of HQ UNAMIR of some administrative point, but it is intended that senior officers

SUBJECT: Programming of Hand Held Radios

1. Upon the establishment of the Movement Coordination Centre (MCC) the Signal Unit was asked to reprogramme one of the radios of the MCC. During the war the movements organization operated with the military on channel 7 but were recently excluded and have had to change to channel 11. The purpose of allowing the MCC to be on 7 was to coordinate its functions with Air Operations and the Airfield Base Operations. The request to allow the MCC to operate on both channels was denied, as the operator would not be able to monitor the channel 7 at all times.

2. Since then the following incidents have occurred:

a. On two occasions Air Operations were not advised of a change to the flight timings which has caused, to date, over twenty passengers to miss their plane.

b. On one occasion the SAR procedures were almost implemented due to inability of the two sections to communicate.

3. As of yet major incidents have occurred but it may be only a matter of time before one occurs. Accordingly to avoid this, it is strongly recommended that the MCC be approved to have its hand held radios be programmed to channel 7 in addition to the channel they are already now.

1. As indicated in the enclosed memorandum the present Force Comd net (motorolla) needs to be controlled and structured better. The best method of achieving this is to allow access on this net to only those who are absolutely required. The enclosure recommends a list of key appointments within the Force who require access to the net. Furthermore access can be controlled by programming the radios of authorized pers with an access code.
2. It is requested that the enclosed list of appointments and callsigns be reviewed and approved. Upon approval the Force Signal Squadron will coord the return and quick reissue of all radios for reprogramming. The revised callsigns will also take effect upon approval.

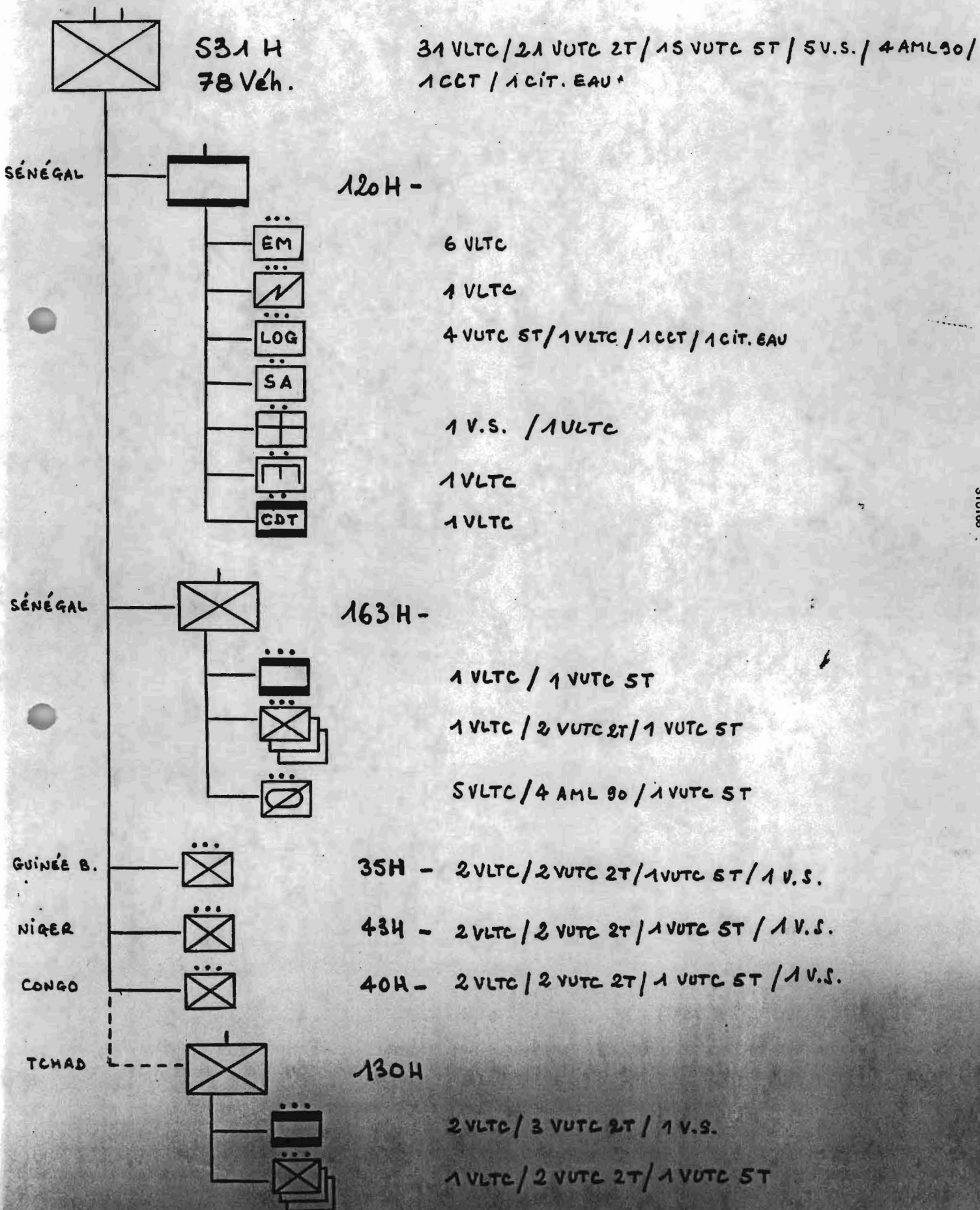

SUBJECT: UN TAC HQ IN THE BUTARE/NGOMA AREA

1. On 1 Aug 94 a recce party from the Tac HQ Tp conducted a recce in the Butare/Ngoma area for suitable locations for UN Tac HQ. Four sites were looked at; however, only the two located on the university campus west of the main highway are suitable. The university campus east of the highway was occupied by the RPA and access to the area was not possible.

2. The assessment of the primary location is as follows:

- a. HQ Location. The primary location for the HQ is in the buildings belonging to the Rwanda Pharmaceutical Laboratory. The main building which will house the HQ has about 3000 square feet of office space on two floors and is in excellent condition.
- b. Communication. The compound is at an elevation of 1700 meters with a clear shot northeast to Kigali, which would allow for excellent HF and VHF communication with the control station in Kigali. There is no visible damage to the repeater station in Butare, which is located about 600 meters north of the compound. The telephone exchange was not located.
- c. Security. The proposed HQ building along with support buildings are located within secure compound surrounded by a two meter high fence. The RPA has a base 600 meters north of the compound and a presence across the highway in the university campus.
- d. Accommodation. The staff could be housed in a building 75 meters from the HQ. This Building is not in the compound but can be secured with a wire fence if necessary. The building can house 35 personnel and is in good condition.
- e. Utilities. There is no electricity or running water in Butare. There is a sub-station located in the compound, in very good condition, that could supply the required power. There is fresh water in Butare but it appears to be under the control of the RPA at their base north of the compound.

3. The Assessment of the secondary location is as follows:

- a. HQ LOCATION. The secondary location is at the building that housed the Faculty of Medicine, 300 meters north of the primary location. The Building is in excellent condition and is large enough to house the HQ and accommodate the staff and HQ Troop.
- b. Communication. The Communication assessment for this location is the same for the primary location.
- c. Security. The Bldg is not in a secure compound but access can be controlled. A secure area will have to be established for vehicles, radio dets and a Generator.

4. The other two locations that were looked at are hotels located in the downtown area. These buildings were looted and would require extra work in order to establish an HQ.

5. The proposed locations belonged to the government of Rwanda and there is no government official in Butare who can give permission for the use of these locations. There is a Mayor in the city but she does not seem to have any control of the city. It will be necessary to establish a presence at one of these location as soon as possible, in order to ensure that the buildings will not be occupied by the locals.







1. THE DEPLOYMENT PROGRAM OUTLINED IN THE REFERENCE FOR THE CANADIAN SIGS UNIT RAISES SOME SERIOUS CONCERNS REGARDING THE APPARENT LACK OF URGENCY OF GETTING UNITS ON THE GROUND AND OPERATIONAL IN RWANDA.
2. THE CURRENT PROGRAM APPEARS TO HAVE 40 SOLDIERS DEPLOYING ON 18 JUL 94 WITH PERS KIT ONLY. THESE SOLDIERS CAN HELP PREPARE FOR THE ARRIVAL OF THE MAIN BODY BUT WITH NO EQUIPMENT CAN DO LITTLE TO ENHANCE THE OPERATIONAL CAPABILITY OF UNAMIR. THE SCHEDULED DEPLOYMENT OF 120 PLUS AN UNSPECIFIED AMOUNT OF ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT ON THE 25TH OF JUL BRINGS THE TOTAL TO ONLY 160 SOLDIERS. THIS LEAVES UP TO 290 THAT WOULD HAVE TO BE TRANSPORTED AT A LATER DATE WHEN THE SITUATION REQUIRES THEM. THEIR EQUIPMENT IS TO COME IN BY SEALIFT AT AN EVEN LATER DATE, LIKE MID-OCTOBER.
3. IF THIS IS TO BE AN EXAMPLE OF THE FUTURE DEPLOYMENT OF FORCES TO UNAMIR, THEN THE FC FEELS THAT THE AIM OF ENSURING THAT UNAMIR BECOMES AS OPERATIONALLY EFFECTIVE AS POSSIBLE, AS SOON AS POSSIBLE, IN ORDER TO ALLOW OP TURQUOISE TO WITHDRAW HAS BEEN COMPLETELY FORGOTTEN.
4. IF WE HAD ANY NON-ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS IN THE FORCE, THE FC WOULD HAVE RECEIVED APPROVAL FOR A FULL AND EFFECTIVE MODEL OF 8100 PERSONS. AT 5500, WE WILL HAVE OUR HANDS FULL UNLESS THERE IS A TOTAL SURRENDER ON THE RGF SIDE AT BEST. THIS IS NOT EMINENT AT ALL. WE MUST STILL GET ALL THE REQUIRED APCs SOONEST AND THEN GIVE THE BATTALION THEIR TRAINING SO AS TO BE ABLE TO MOVE THEM CONFIDENTLY INTO THE HUMANITARIAN

PROTECTED ZONE AND THE RGF ZONE. THE LONGER IT TAKES TO GET THE EQUIPMENT, THE LONGER IT WILL TAKE TO GET THE INTEGRATION TRAINING COMPLETED AND THEREFORE THE LONGER IT WILL TAKE TO RELIEVE OP TURQUOISE.

5. IT IS DPKO AND ALL ITS SUB-DIVISIONS WHO HOLD THE CARDS CONCERNING OUR DEPLOYMENT AND THE FRENCH COALITION RE-DEPLOYMENT IN THEIR HANDS. 7. THE BOTTOM LINE THEREFORE IS THAT ENOUGH AIRLIFT MUST BE FOUND TO LIFT THE SIGS UNIT COMPLETE INTO THEATRE WITH 30 DAYS SUSTAINABILITY. ORDERS TO THE GUARD ON PASS\ENTRY CONTROL

1. CHECK PASSES OF ALL PERSONNEL ENTERING HEADQUARTERS.
2. NO PASS-CALL DUTY OFFICER TO IDENTIFY PERSON AND IF IDENTIFIED AS A UN EMPLOYEE ISSUE A TEMPORARY PASS WHICH THEY WILL RETURN WHEN LEAVING THE BUILDING.

6. THE FOLLOWING PASSES HAVE BEEN LOST AND ANYONE ENTERING WITH THE FOLLOWING NUMBERS IS TO BE HELD AND TURNED OVER TO THE DUTY OFFICER. DO NOT ADMIT PERSONS WITH THESE NUMBERS.
  
7. NO ARMED RGF, RPF OR GENDARMERIES ARE TO ENTER THE BUILDING. THEY WILL WAIT IN THE PARKING LOT FOR WHOEVER THEY ARE ESCORTING.
8. ALL UNAMIR PERSONNEL WILL CLEAR THEIR PERSONAL WEAPON AND REMOVE THE MAGAZINE UPON ENTRY INTO THE BUILDING EXCEPT THE HEADQUARTERS GUARD.
9. REPORT ALL SUSPICIOUS PERSONS OR ACTIONS TO THE DUTY OFFICER. ENSURE YOU MAINTAIN THEM UNDER OBSERVATION.
