

4. TRANSPORT SUPPORT. See Annex B.

5. SECURITY AND CUSTOMS.

- a. Personal Luggage and unit stores will be security and customs cleared 011400BMAR95. Luggage and stores will be palletised on completion of check.
- b. Personnel carrying electrical items purchased in Rwanda are to ensure they are in possession of all relevant receipts.
- c. On completion of the security check no other items are to be added to the consignment. All cargo will remain at the freight terminal.
- d. Four unit personal are to remain at the Airbase overnight 01 March 1995.

5. CARRIAGE OF DANGEROUS CARGO.

- a. A DC brief will be given to all personnel the day prior to and the day of deployment.
- b. A 10% check will be conducted of all cabin luggage. If DC is found in any persons luggage a 100% check will be conducted.
- c. All personnel are to ensure that no ammunition is carried on the person or in personal luggage.

1. Following the initiative taken by this sector towards revealing the prison conditions in Gitarama, I tasked Sub Sector 3A to carry out a visit to the Butare Prison, in conjunction with the Human Rights Team. I feared that the conditions in this prison would be something akin to Gitarama Prison. These fears were proved correct. A report on the prison, prepared by the Butare Team, is attached for your perusal please. My comments on the same are given in succeeding paragraphs.


2. The prison conditions in Sector 3 continue to be appalling and may be considered to be a major human rights disaster. The authorities till now, when questioned were always of the opinion that the detainees are all criminals of the worst kind and thus deserve the conditions that they languish in. This line of thinking, which appears to be changing substantially after the Force Commander's visit to Gitarama, is obviously not in consonance with the Rwandese Govt's policy of diluting ethnic tension through transparent justice. If justice is to return to Rwanda we need to follow up the Force Commander's visit with efforts towards changing the psyche of the bureaucracy and the military.

3. On the face of it, the increasing number of arrests in the communes in the last few weeks appears to be a direct result of OP RETOUR. This cannot yet be confirmed until a more detailed check is made on the number of arrests and whether these pertain mainly to IDPs. OP RETOUR has quite evidently achieved substantial success in its primary aim of getting the people home but if its ultimate aim of targeting the refugees across the boirder is to be achieved, we have to find the means to convince the Rwandese Govt of the need to stop witch hunting. The operation appears to have indirectly created a situation where personal vendetta and extortion can carry on under the garb of detaining suspected criminals who in actual effect may be innocent IDPs, having returned under the assurances of the Govt and the UN. The increase in prison population does seem to be a direct result of this.

4. The Force Commander's visit to Gitarama Prison appears to have woken the authorities to the realities of the situation. Already, the Prefect of Gitarama, the local RPA Bde Cdr and the Bishop of the local Diocese have met and discussed the issue. It is learnt that the Bishop has promised to make available some funds for the efforts towards improvement of prison conditions. However, these

efforts can, at best, be considered to be purely local. What, perhaps needs to be looked into is the possibility of a national effort towards this end which could then include other prisons, such as the one in Butare, within its fold.

5. While the overall effort towards improvement in prison conditions goes on, UNAMIR needs to guard against the possibility of the local authorities (at commune level) resorting to holding arrestees within their confines in clandestine holding facilities. The authorities could well make transparent efforts to prove that prisons are no longer being filled, while continuing these arrests and detaining arrestees away from the eyes of the UN organisations. There is already evidence of one such possible clandestine holding centre in KIGOMA Commune in Gitarama Prefecture. The same is being investigated and a detailed report will be forwarded subsequently. Possibly it may be worth suggesting that efforts to ascertain similar actions by Govt authorities in other sectors be made, if not already done so, to obtain a larger picture of what may be a deliberate effort on the part of authorities to dilute the pressure that UNAMIR has already brought about through the active interest being taken in the prison conditions all over Rwanda.

MILOBS REPORT ON A VISIT IN BUTARE PRISON.

On wednesday 15 Feb,95 a team of Milobs and human Rights(HR) representatives jointly visited Butare prison to make a general assessment of the prison living conditions.

The team was welcomed by the prison Director who gave out a short brief before the Milobs and HR representatives took a tour of the prison. The first observation the team took note was the Directors inability to give instructions to soldiers responsible for the prison security. The team had to negotiate on its own to be let into the main prison complex. This indicated to the team that the Director is there just as a figure head, while total control of the prison is the responsibility of the gendarmerie.

PRISON CAPACITY.

As on the 15 Feb,95 there were 4,445 detainees in the prison. The standard capacity of the prison is 1,200. The present number of detainees clearly shows the stretch on the prison facilities designed for a smaller number of detainee. And from the current trend, more detainees are expected to be flooded into the same complex. Almost 60% of the detainees sleep outside the blocks in the open. Eventually, even the open area will not be enough. Presently, some people use bathrooms as lodging facilities.

The prison is holding:

1. 75 Women
2. 75 Minors
3. 17 Children staying with their mothers.

Women detainees are now living in a separate block from male detainees. However, minors are still staying with adults.

SANITATION.

The prison has piped water, limited electricity, bathrooms and toilets(pit latrines). However, these facilities were designed for 1,200 detainees while the number has now tripled.

The bathrooms and toilets are in a pathetic condition. The water is not enough through-out, as such, the stench becomes unbearable though some people use bathrooms as lodging areas. ICRC is taking some limited responsibilities in putting things in order.

FEEDING.

The detainees feed once a day. Food is provided by ICRC. However, the cooking facilities are only supposed to cater for 2,500 people. Therefore, in such a situation food has to be prepared twice.

There is a serious shortage of firewood. Detainees sometimes feed on high energy biscuits provided by ICRC. Some people bring food for their detained relatives to subsidize on the little given in the prison. However, the amount of food provided is unbelievably small.

MEDICAL.

ICRC is running a clinic in the prison compound. Most of the medical staff manning the clinic are detainees themselves. Several medical staff in the former Government are in detention and as such they assist in treating fellow inmates. There is only one Government nurse employed to look after the detainees. The average number of patients treated in a day is about 120. Due to persistent exposure to the cold, several detainees have breathing problems (pneumonia). The main common diseases in the prison are:

1. Pneumonia
2. Dysentery
3. Malaria

It is believed that for every thirteen detainees brought into the prison one dies. 82 detainees have died in the last five weeks. The improvised wards are full of patients of which most of them seem to be hopeless cases.

CONCLUSION.

As outlined in the report, the Milob's visit was to assess the prison conditions. As such the team perceives that there is an immediate need to improve the prison conditions by possibly reducing the number of detainees. However, such an action should be done in conjunction with ICRC which is doing its best in sustaining the situation now.



1. **GENERAL SITUATION.** Calm but remains unstable. Curfew remains enforced by RPA (not Gendarme). Arrests of many civic/commune officials of Cyangugu has contributed to the ongoing instability; however, sit within the communes/sectors appears ok at this time.

2. **FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES.**

A. **RPA.**

(1) There is an apparent increase in number of RPA in Kamembe commune area. Will continue to inquire if correct and long term or part of recent relief in place. Soldiers seen herding 20 head of cattle near border of Ruzizi one. Soldiers would not offer any info regarding their destination or where the cattle came from. There is no apparent recruitment policy in the sector area; volunteers are accepted for as long as they are needed, but leaving the RPA is difficult at the moment.

(2) There has been a recent effort in direction of arrests in the sector; particularly to many commune officials, and in some cases, the burgermeisters themselves. It is known that on 16 Feb the burgermeister of GISHOMA, Mr. Theodhil, was arrested (reason unknown) and Mr.

KAYUMBA was arrested for genocide allegations. Of interest to note is that the burgemeister of Gishoma has been of good assistance to Human Rights tms in assisting the compilation of Genocide lists. He is known to be a member of MDR which may conflict with current govt likes and differences amongst senior ministers at this time.


B. **RGF.** Prisoner captured by Ethiobat involved in incident 19 Feb is reported as former RGF. According to locals and loc RPA Lt at BUGEZA 9244 that over last month there have been almost nightly attacks from boats coming from Zaire in the north and the west. The method is basically with FRGF in motorized boats and toher boats with civilians. The main purpose is for money and food. The soldiers are dressed in uniform and armed with rifles. The locals have organized themselves to fight against these incursions. The prisoner captured 20 Feb at approx 0200 hrs was interviewed at Gafunzo commune. His name is Francois RUGANINTWALI, originally from Kagano commune, and is FRGF. He stated that there are about 100 soldiers of his age (24) on the coast of Ijwi Isle.

C. **MILITIA.** It is possible that the Militia currently occupying the camps in Zaire have been going through some reorg. Some may have changed their name from Interahamwe to something believed to be in French, but is not yet confirmed.

3. **CIVIL AFFAIRS.** Prefecture of Cyangugu has moved into its new location at ITUZE Resort in former facility utilized by MDM as clinic and IOM/BDA offices.

4. **OWN ACTIVITIES.** Patrols were carried out in the area of responsibility and the reports are being sent separately.

5. **HUMANITARIAN.**

 a. Liaison continues for provision of static secur at Rusayo Orphanage and to obtyain a battery for bulldozer reqr for use at the site.

b. IRC conducting vaccination training at Gatare hosp. UNICEF has provided a gas refrigerator for vaccine storage.

c. Food and oil were distr to people of Bugarama via WFP and UNHCR

d. There are 87 refugees from Zaire who have gathered at Gishuma 8211. UNHCR was informed and will despatch a team tomorrow. All refugees who were waiting tpt have been repat to Cyangugu from Bugarama.

e. Refugees crossing from Zaire to Rwanda: 20 Feb-35, 21 Feb-11.

6. **LOGISTICS.**

a. Obvious need of vehicles continues as patrol tasks and op effectiveness are drastically affected. The time and distance problem for routine and unplanned maint is the most difficult from this sector. We now need at least two veh on loan with veh 1061 reqr unsheduled maint. ADVISE.

b. Req status on earlier reqs for jerry cans for emergency fuel storage at tm sites.

7. **MISC.** Channel 12 was in use by all sectors today except sector three. Req that other freq be maint for sectors outside of sector 4. It was directed by Milob HQ that only English or French be utilized on the net, and considering the apparent non-compliance, poor rad discipline and added call signs, the problem is severely compounded. Is it possible for Human Rights to be on same (repeater) freq for all sectors rather than use channel 12.



ACCURACY IN REPORTING

1. Every day one or more units submit reports containing vague details of incidents. These types of reports raise more questions than they answer and necessitates someone chasing down the missing information in an effort to obtain an accurate report of the event.

2. The effort necessary to achieve the required detail can be minimized if duty and/or operations officers at all levels were to answer the following questions when they are preparing and receiving reports:

a. **WHAT** happened: a short accurate description of the incident, usually in the chronological sequence that the incident developed and concluding with what further action will be taken by the various people, unit(s) and agencies involved;

b. **WHERE** did it happen: the location of the incident should be as specific as possible but at a minimum the report must include the name of the closest community and the community's grid reference.

c. **WHEN** did it happen: the time of the incident and any significant action(s) within the incident should be identified preferably with a date/time group (ie 161420 Feb 95)

d. **WHO** was involved: the individual who made the initial report should be identified as well as anyone who was affected by the incident or took an active part in the incident. In identifying people, their full names should be given and any official title, position or rank included. For UN personnel, their UNID number should also be included to aid in identifying these people at a later date if necessary.

e. **WHY**: an explanation of the reason why the incident occurred. In providing this detail the source of the reason should be identified so that its credibility can be assessed. If the reason is unknown then any opinion expressed should be stated as such.

3. The UNAMIR Operations Duty Officers will be instructed to critically read all incoming reports against the above questions and to automatically seek clarification where points are unclear or unanswered. This however should be unnecessary if units observe the elements of reporting and remember that brevity should not be at the expense of clarity.

4. If reports continue to be received which do not include the above elements then we will insist on a proforma which provides the necessary details.



There seems to be new command and control elements attempting to create their kingdoms on Ijwi and, like in mainland, control large amounts of refugees under Ex-RGF rule. The current complaint is their use of force and issuing of threats to refugees.

Veh 1077 (stolen from workshop) and 1127 are awaiting parts with no possible date of repair aval. it is urged that any new veh arriveing in theatre be considered for prioity to sectro 4C. It is requested that the present state of current veh be supervised.



3. The introduction of an information-gathering patrol proforma, based on both the SRSG report and a related UNHCR proforma, has proven to be very effective. A comprehensive data base that provides detailed information on all communes in the sector is now complete. Analysis of this data base is focusing future patrol tasks as well as highlighting areas of concern for all aid agencies. A copy of this proforma is attached to this report. Working in concert with MILOBS at the joint Sub-Sector HQ Ruhengeri UNHCR has completed a detailed report profiling the RUHENGIERI Prefecture. This report is available through UNHCR.



1. Recent events in BURUNDI have led to a relatively tense situation where UN intervention might be considered. Should this course of action eventuate, the effect on UNAMIR's capacity to maintain the integrity of current operations in RWANDA could be significant. In order to fully appreciate the factors which might affect UNAMIR, the following guidance is sought:

- a. What is the likelihood of an expansion of UNAMIR's mandate?
- b. What is the likelihood of a Chapter 7 mandate?
- c. What are the tasks which UNAMIR might be required to undertake?

- (1) General security ?
- (2) Security for humanitarian operations?
- (3) Monitor (MILOBS)?
- (4) Logistic support to a separate Mission?
- (5) UNAMIR to effect C2 of a separate Mission?

- d. In the event of commitment of UNAMIR to operations in BURUNDI, could troop augmentation be expected and would the UN seek host nation agreement in principle in order to provide sufficient flexibility to structure the most effective force ?

2. Considerations with respect to the development of contingency plans for operations in BURUNDI are similar to those for the military option in ZAIRE. The provision of UN guidance (in the form of assumptions, if necessary) is required if credible options are to be developed.



SUBJECT: ADJUSTMENT OF SECTOR BOUNDARIES

1. This refers to the Sector 5 letter dated 18 Jan 95 on the above subject.
2. The present northern boundary of our sector cuts off five communes of the Gitarama Prefecture. This has caused a number of practical difficulties as, each time that the Prefet wishes to contact the UNAMIR authority responsible for these communes, he must come to use our communications facilities. Further, each time Sector 5 MILOBS need to conduct business within these communes, they must touch base with the Gitarama Prefet. The RPA battalion responsibilities follow the prefecture boundary and this adds a further complication. Finally, the distance between Gisenyi and these communes virtually ensures that they do not get as much attention as the others.
3. The communes in question are within easy reach of Gitarama and thus we find ourselves approached by both the commune authorities and the few NGOs in the area as a matter of convenience. It is suggested that all of the problems mentioned above can be easily solved by changing the boundary between Sector 5 and Sector 3 to follow the Prefecture boundary. The increased area of responsibility could be handled with the resources presently held in this sector but some adjustment to the placing of repeaters for our Motorola net will be necessary.
4. It is requested that this matter be given serious consideration. The Prefet of Gitarama made a special visit to this HQ to bring the problem to our attention. Since it causes as much trouble to the civil authority as it does to us the issue might therefore be worth addressing.


