Dear Jan,

Many thanks for sending me a copy of your letter of 26 April summarizing your discussion with Mr. Blazek of IMF. On page 3 of your letter reference is made to a report prepared by Mr. Leclercq on the need for technical personnel in the field of public finance. If this report is available with you I should be grateful if you would send me a copy.

I appreciate the magnificent support you are giving us and can well visualize the endless hours of work you are putting into the great effort upon which we are involved in the Congo.

We are at present formulating our budget proposals for 1964 and 1965 and I hope that they will be ready for discussion with Mr. Aschman upon his arrival in the Congo on 17 May.

Could you be good enough to let me know the present position concerning the police training project and in particular as to whether any negotiations have been taken up with the US Government for its financing. You will recall that in the exchange of cables which took place from this end with New York in which Cardiner also participated it was our view that this project was eminently suited for inclusion in the general responsibility of ONUC. It was for this reason that in my revised budget proposals for 1963 I attempted to exclude it from the scope of financing arrangements for it under the Congo Fund. I wonder whether there has been any further discussion with the Controller in this connection and if so where the matter stands at present. As you know we are going ahead with the submission of candidates for all expert posts included under the Police project to the Congolese Government but have not taken any action to prepare requisitions for the transport and communications equipment required. The US Police Mission is at present in the Congo and is studying the logistical needs for the Congolese Police. They may well come up with recommendations for direct US support in this field but I am afraid about the delay which might take place in the determination of the final position of the US Government.

The quota in the International Monetary Fund for both is set at \$11.25 million. I am happy to inform you that Mr. Roux OPEX contract is in the process of being worked out. Within a week or so the matter should be settled. The United Nations has, however, not been involved in the recruitment or other arrangements for Mr. Dupont; and there is nothing we can do to assist him.

CONGO

Membership - IMF

It is my understanding that the Congo's membership with the IMF and the OAK is in the same status as that of Rwanda and Burundi. It is therefore up to the Congo Government to have the necessary legislation enacted. Mr. Ahmad is aware of this question; nevertheless I shall remind him of the need for speedy action by the Congo Government.

Assistance to the Congo Fund

We are most happy to learn of your willingness to consider proposing to the IMF Board that the IMF finance some part of the present Congo fund programme. I have noted your particular interest in the Public Finance Project (30-11) which, according to Mr. Cedersell's plans, requires 120 posts. Under this project the Office of the Controller of Public Finance consists of six posts which, on the basis of our average budgeting formula (\$18,000 per expert per annum) would cost some \$108,000 annually of which the Congo Government would contribute roughly 30 percent. I trust that this information, as well as the costing of the other projects and the general status of the Fund, which I conveyed to you, will be of assistance in your endeavours. I assume that as soon as you have sounded out your colleagues, you will be in touch with Mr. Amachree to inform him whether a formal request for this assistance would be warranted.

Your other suggestion, that the IMF could approach the Ministries of Finance of some French speaking countries with a view to obtaining

Your office will be returning shortly to me the Public Finance manning table indicating the posts for which you intend to offer assistance in recruitment. Upon receipt I shall give this list to the United Nations Office of Personnel, so that the necessary coordination can be arranged with the IMF. I hope that the job descriptions of the vacant posts which I left with you will be of assistance.

In regard to the candidates for the Office of the Controller of Public Finance, I have noted your concern over the high proportion of Swedish nationals. This will be brought to Mr. Amichree's attention upon his return on Monday, as well as Mr. Bauer's name as a possible replacement for Dr. Badre.

Similarly, I shall obtain his views on the possibility of recruiting large blocks of personnel of either French or Belgian nationality.

The paper prepared by your office comparing the technical personnel proposed by Mr. Leclercq with that proposed by Mr. Cedersall will, no doubt, be of help in considering Mr. Cedersall's proposals.

Contracts

Please find attached a copy of the usual contract offered to technical assistance experts working in Congo Fund projects. This personnel is governed by the Staff Regulations (200 series), of which a copy is also attached.

Public Works project

I shall investigate the possibility of approaching the ILO for assistance in the execution of this project.

I attach for your information, copy of a report by Mr. Belo on his recent visit to Eville in the company of two American experts, Mr. Ryan and Mr. Beck.

The reference to the close cooperation between the South Katanga police and the Rhodesian police is interesting, as is the favourable impression which Mr. Belo formed of the police training school in Eville.

From paragraph 2, it would appear that Mr. Munongo, posing still as Provincial Minister of the Interior, inveigled the mission into visiting him. As you know, Munongo is now Minister of Health.

I have drawn the attention of the Force Commander to the question of vehicles mentioned in paragraphs 11 and 12 (c).

You will note in paragraph 12 (a) that in Mr. Belo's view, it will not be necessary to station 3 provincial police experts in Eville as at present envisaged in our Police Training project.

Subject Training and Equipments:

On 29th April, 1963, I in company of two American experts Mr. Ryan and Mr. Beck, left Leopoldville on tour to Elizabethville, Albertville and Bukavu.

2. We arrived Elizabethville at 12 noon and were met by Mr. Wildman, ONUC Civilian Affairs Officer, E'ville and we were quartered at ONUC guest house after we had preliminary discussion re our visit and requested Mr. Wildman to arrange meeting of the police authority for the next day in order to enable us to carry out the survey of police establishment, transport and communication.

3. On 30/4/63 at 0900 hrs., we proceeded to police headquarters where we met the Commissaire-en-Chef and his deputy and later joined by the Inspector-General of E'ville Police. We were warmly received and Mr. Ryan did all the talking in French. We were informed that there were five police divisions and three sub-posts in the township.

4. There is ~~one~~ radio control set at the police HQ. controlling three out of five divisions with radio sets. There are ten Motor vehicles and three motor cycles with radio sets but the sets are not working. There are five new volkswagen station wagons on charge to the police. We were conducted round all the HQ. Departments including C.I.D. and Motor Traffic Division. In each of the police station and HQ. departments including the C.I.D., there is a Belgian Police Officer adviser. I was greatly impressed with what I saw.

5. The HQ. Departments are run on a most modern line and are efficient and easily the best police organization in this country. Although the Belgian Officers appear to be master of their jobs, I am incline to believe that impact of the Rhodesian Police organization has favourably affect this force because most of

the C.I.D. records and questioners are fashioned on that of the Rhodesian's in order to facilitate exchange of information. The two Police Forces work hand-in-hand and in a most cordial relationship. I was told that Rhodesian Police are allowed free access to E'ville on investigation and vice versa.

6. The C.I.D. maintained an up-to-date criminal record office and publish weekly police gazette of persons wanted and persons whereabouts wanted; property stolen and/or found. There is a well organised fingerprint branch and this is also based on Rhodesian police method and the two police forces exchange fingerprints of accused persons who are on the 'run' for purposes of identification and to ascertain previous convictions. C.I.D. personnel are hand-picked and they receive weekly lectures on their duties. A very impressive C.I.D. organization.

7. In the afternoon of the same day, I was taken to the training school. This is a three winged school :-

- (s) Recruit training,
- (b) Courses for N.C.Os & Inspectors, and
- (c) Officers training.

At present, there are 37 N.C.O. students, 23 Inspectors students and 21 Officer students. All the officers in training are direct entry candidates from secondary schools. The officer students are due to take their final examination at the end of their six months course. The students appear very keen and intelligent. I understand that the instructors encountered a lot of difficulties in knocking them into the present shape and it is not an easy thing to adopt boys of nowadays into the discipline required in the police and army. I was told that the next course will consist of selected men from the serving members of the force.

8. I watch the Inspector students taking particulars from a staged scene of motor accident. I checked through their notes and I was highly impressed of the high standard reached by these students. I also watched officers performance for leadership training. I admire the courage and persistent efforts to go through all the obstacles throughout the performance. There is ample facilities for leadership training in this school. The accommodation is for 200 students for various courses consisting of quarters for married students and dormitory for unmarried students. There are five Belgian Instructors and a commandant; so also nine Congolese Instructors.

9. On 1/5/63, Mr. Beck, Ryan and I were invited by the Provincial Minister of Interior Mr. Monogo? to his house.

This day being holiday, we were entertained to drink. In addition to two Congolese Provincial Ministers, there were three senior police officers present. The Minister asked question about the National Police Training School Leopoldville. He is very much not in favour of the school being sited in Leopoldville. He wondered why such school was necessary. He suspected that this is an a-ttempt to nationalise police service in Congo. I explained that the idea behind the training scheme was to foster the spirit of co-operation between the provincial police officers i.e. by training together, messing together and living together in a training school, they are bound to make friends among themselves which will eventually make them willing to co-operate and help each other at a provincial level. After all, crime knows no provincial boundry.

10. Nationalisation of Police service in Congo is a matter for the constitution and it is political and the training scheme has nothing to do with it. The Minister seems unwilling and may probably refuse sending three candidates to the National Training School. This Minister talked politics into everything.

11. Requests were made to me about the return of 20 police vehicles alleged requisition^{ed} for by the U.N. and are being used by the A.N.C. and they want these vehicles be returned to the police. It is also requested that the police camp being used by U.N. troops should also be returned to the police in order to accommodate the police trainee who are due to pass out from the training school shortly.

12. About this station, I have the following recommendation to make :-

- (a) In view of the standard of efficiency in police organization and discipline, I recommend that the three provincial police experts should not be sent to this station. There is no need for such.
- (b) That officers students of the proposed National School in Leo. should be sent to E'ville Police School for two weeks leadership course. Training facilities for this course exists there.
- (c) No notice should be taken on the Minister's views about the siting of the school.
- (d) Consideration should be given to the appointment of the present commandant of the officers school on the Instructional staff of the Police National Training School. I will even go so far to say that he is suitable to be the commandant of this proposed training

school. He was former commander of the police training school in Leo. and was second in command of the force in Leopoldville. The standard of the school he commands in E'ville at present, compare favourably with any officers' training school overseas. He is a Belgian due to retire from service in about two months time. He is full of energy and he speaks good English. His name is Mr. SOETE GERARD.

- (e) Consideration should be given to the requests for the return of the vehicles now in hands of the A.N.C. and the re-occupation of the police camp at present occupied by U.N. troops.

13. We visited Albertville and Bukavu between 2nd and 4th May and I returned to Leopoldville on the 5th leaving Messrs. Ryan and Beck at Bukavu to return to Leo. on the 7th. The excuse for their staying behind was that of lack of accommodation on the plane and that they have given their clothing for laundry.

14. Albertville and Bukavu were enthusiastic about the officers training scheme and have no objection to any of the arrangements. In these two provinces, the question of over establishment of police personnel exist. At Albertville, the ratio is one policeman to 23 civilian population and in Bukavu, the ratio is 1 to 500.

15. In Albertville, the total personnel required in my opinion, ought not to exceed 50 as against the present strength of 600 and the whole province should not exceed 600 as against 1,170 all ranks.

16. In Bukavu, efforts are being made by the provincial authority to reduce the present strength of 2,000 policemen to 600. This is a right move provided it does not result into crisis by those who would be thrown out of job.

POLICE SCHOOL:

17. Police schools exist at Albertville and Bukavu and both schools are in operation. The proposed training officers will have to re-organise these two schools in order to conduct Refresher Courses instead of recruits training in view of already heavy over establishment in the police strength in these two provinces.

RADIO EQUIPMENT:

18. There is no police radio equipment at Albertville. There is a radio control set at the police HQ. in Bukavu and three

W/T all not in use. Mr. Beck is looking into this.

19. As I will be returning to Nigeria on 12th May, I suggest that Civilian Operations should send an officer to accompany the two American experts during the remainder of their visit to provinces. Such officer should be a French speaker.

Dear Mr Ahmed,

Within the revised budget for civilian operations in the Congo for 1963, I have noted the project N° 80-01 which deals with police advisory services and training. Within this project I note in paragraph 4 that certain steps are being taken to re-establish the police wireless network in various regions.

At the beginning of last month I took the liberty to request Mr Sigge of ITU to check the police wireless equipment in Stanleyville. This was done in co-operation with the local inspector of the provincial police.

I attach hereto a copy of Mr Sigge's report on the condition of this wireless equipment. As you can see, it would not be very difficult to put this equipment back into operation provided competent personnel were available.

It would certainly simplify or assist greatly the police in their work if this radio network was put back into use as soon as possible and I therefore send you this report in the hope that, as soon as one of the three technical officers envisaged within the project is recruited, he might come to Stanleyville.

En prévision de la remise en service de ce réseau radiotéléphonique, j'ai vérifié, lundi le 8 avril, les installations. Le réseau se compose d'une station principale, située au quartier général de la Police, et de quatre postes secondaires, placés dans le camp central de la Police et dans les postes de police des communes KABONDO, MANGOBO, LUBUNGA, respectivement. La station principale est alimentée par le secteur de 220 V., tandis que les petites stations sont alimentées par accumulateurs.

Les sources de courant, les accumulateurs, n'étaient plus desservis depuis l'Indépendance. Par conséquent, ces accumulateurs sont détériorés et doivent être remplacés. Il n'est également pas possible de vérifier le fonctionnement des postes, sauf le récepteur de la station centrale que j'ai trouvé en bon état.

Voici le rapport en détail :

Le mât de l'antenne peut être posé sur une console (à faire faire) et doit être tenu en place par une bride, fixée au mur. Le câble de l'antenne est suffisamment long pour permettre l'installation de celle-ci plus haut qu'elle ne l'est maintenant et augmenter ainsi le rayon de communication. (Cette question devient d'actualité après la mise en service des stations aéroliées, telles que des patrouilles volantes sur route et sur l'eau).

Par la présente, j'ai l'honneur de vous remettre en mémoire notre entretien du 21 avril 1963 lors de votre bref séjour à Bukavu, concernant l'équipement de la police du Kivu-Central.

Comme je l'ai déjà expliqué à Monsieur GAVIOLA, Chef de la Mission Civile de l'ONU à Bukavu, il est plus qu'urgent de trouver une solution pour que la police du Kivu-Central puisse fonctionner normalement.

Depuis novembre 1961, j'ai passé commande de quelques 3.000 tenues en drill kaki ardoise pour la police du Kivu. Les bons de commande sont bien parvenus aux fournisseurs respectifs, la chose a été rappelée par moi-même en mars dernier à un des fournisseur en l'occurrence Monsieur M. ALHADEFF de Léopoldville. L'habillement en question est bien prêt, il ne reste qu'une chose : LE PAIEMENT CASH exigé par le fournisseur.

Puisqu'au Kivu-Central, il n'y a actuellement pas d'autorité responsable sur le plan politique et économique, la commande n'a pu être honoré, étant donné que plusieurs fournisseurs de l'Etat Congolais n'ont pour ainsi dire plus confiance aux autorités dirigeants dans une région soumise en état d'exception.

En conclusion, je demanderais à l'ONUC de nous fournir dans le cadre de l'assistance technique une somme suffisante pour permettre l'acquisition de cet habillement en stock chez Monsieur M. ALHADEFF - nous fournir si possible quelques 5 jeeps pour faciliter notre besogne dans la ville de Bukavu en particulier et dans toute l'étendue de la Province du Kivu-Central en général.

Vous vous conviendrez bien avec moi, Excellence, qu'une police démunie d'uniforme et de charroi ne peut être contrôler ni travailler convenablement. Voilà donc la carence totale de notre police.

Au cas où, une solution favorable interviendrait, je me permets de vous signaler que je suis très disposé à me rendre en personne sur place pour régler ce litige datant de 1961.

En vous remerciant de tout ce que vous ferez pour nous, je vous prie de croire, Excellence, en notre indéfectible attachement.
