1. GEN SITUATION.

A. THE MILITARY SITUATION IN RWANDA IS CALM ALTHOUGH THE BORDER AREAS AND SELECTED COMMUNES REMAIN TENSE.

B. DETAILS OF BORDER CROSSING:

B. DFC AND DCOS OPS VISITED KIBEHO CAMP AND NOTED THAT DESPITE THE URGENT SITUATION AND APPALLING CONDITION OF THE IDPS THAT MANY OF THE AGENCIES AND NGOS HAD NOT YET RESTARTED HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITY. IDPS WERE CROWDED TOGETHER IN UNSANITARY, UNHYGENIC CONDITIONS WITHOUT FOOD AND WATER. UNAMIR WAS VERY SINGULARLY ATTEMPTING TO MOVE IDPS USING TRANSPORT COLLATED FROM ALL UNITS AND USING OWN RESOURCES AND RPA ASSISTANCE TO REGISTER IDPS. 950 IDPS WERE MOVED TO BUTARE COMMUNES AND SOME TO BUTARE TRANSIT CAMP. 2. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES.

A. THE SRSG, AMBASSADOR KHAN, PRESIDED OVER HIS REGULAR HEADS OF UN AGENCIES MEETING DURING WHICH HE DISCUSSED, AMONG OTHERS, SECURITY ISSUES, INCLUDING THE EVENTS IN KIBEHO CAMP. HE HELD A PRESS CONFERENCE DURING WHICH HE ADDRESSED QUESTIONS OF SECURITY AND, ESPECIALLY, THE DEVELOPMENTS IN KIBEHO CAMP. HE CONCLUDED BY MEETING WITH MR. TAKEHITO NAKATA, THE HONOURARY AMBASSADOR FOR THE

UNITED NATIONS VOLUNTEERS TO DISCUSS THE UPCOMING ARRIVAL OF UNVS.

B. THE FOLLOWING WAS REPORTED ON RADIO RWANDA:

(1) THE RWANDESE GOVERNMENT ON TUESDAY BEGAN THE OPERATION TO CLOSE THE SEVEN CAMPS IN GIKONGORO WHICH HOUSE 120,000 INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE. ON TUESDAY, THE GOVERNMENT ARMED FORCES INITIALLY SURROUNDED THE KIBEHO CAMP AND FIRED INTO THE AIR, CAUSING PANIC AND A SUBSEQUENT STAMPEDE OF THE CROWD. SOME CHILDREN WERE CRUSHED TO DEATH IN THE STAMPEDE AND A WOMAN WAS WOUNDED.

(2) THE MILITARY LEADERS HELD A MEETING WITH THE POPULATION, AND THE DISPLACED PEOPLE ANNOUNCED THAT THEY WERE HAPPY WITH THE OPERATION AND WERE EAGER TO RETURN HOME. THE POPULATION WAS INFORMED THAT UNAMIR AND NGOS OPERATING IN GIKONGORO HAD STOPPED DISTRIBUTING FOOD AID IN THE CAMPS.

(3) THE RWANDESE MINISTER FOR REHABILITATION AND SOCIAL INTEGRATION, MR. JACQUES BIHOZAGARA ANNOUNCED AT A PRESS CONFERENCE IN KIGALI THAT THE OPERATION TO CLOSE THE CAMPS HAD INITIALLY BEEN PLANNED TO BEGIN ON 15 APRIL BUT WAS POSTPONED UNTIL 18 APRIL BECAUSE OF THE MOURNING WEEK IN MEMORY OF THE VICTIMS OF GENOCIDE.

(4) HE UNDERLINED THAT UNAMIR AND THE INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATIONS AND NGOS OPERATING IN THE CAMPS HAD BEEN INFORMED AHEAD OF TIME. HE CALLED FOR THE DISPLACED PEOPLE TO RETURN HOME, AND HE GUARANTEED THAT THEIR SECURITY WOULD BE ENSURED AS IT WAS ENSURED FOR THE REST OF THE POPULATION IN THE COUNTRY.

(5) SPEAKING AT THE PRESS CONFERENCE, MR. BIHOZAGARA ALSO ANNOUNCED THAT A DECISION HAD BEEN MADE STIPULATING THAT PEOPLE WISHING TO GET BACK THEIR PROPERTY WOULD BE REQUIRED TO HAVE A PERMIT SIGNED BY FOUR MINISTERS, NAMELY THE MINISTER OF DEFENSE, THE MINISTER OF INTERIOR, THE MINISTER FOR REHABILITATION AND SOCIAL INTEGRATION, AND THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE. MR. BIHOZAGARA EXPLAINED THAT, UP UNTIL NOW, ONLY THE INTERESTS OF PROPERTY OWNERS HAVE BEEN RESPECTED, WHILE THE INTERESTS OF HOMELESS GENOCIDE SURVIVORS HAVE BEEN IGNORED BY THE INTERIOR-MINISTRY-CONTROLLED NATIONAL COMMISSION WHICH HAD BEEN, UP UNTIL NOW, IN CHARGE OF RESTORING PROPERTY TO THE RIGHTFUL OWNERS.

(6) THE RWANDESE MINISTER FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS, MR. ANASTASE GASANA, RECEIVED IN HIS OFFICE THE REPRESENTATIVE OF ACCT (AGENCE DE COOPERATION CULTURELLE ET TECHNIQUE), MR. JEAN FRANÇOIS BONNET. MR. GASANA PRAISED THE AGENCY FOR ITS ASSISTANCE IN THE JUSTICE AND EDUCATION SECTORS IN RWANDA.

3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES.

A. RPA/GENDARMERIE

(1) RPA ATTEMPTED TO SEARCH AN AUSMED VEH ON BLVD DE NYABUGOGO GR 048857. AUSMED SOLDIERS POLITELY REFUSED TO CONSENT TO A SEARCH AND VEH WAS ALLOWED TO MOV ON.

(2) ZAMBATT REPORTED THAT RPA CONTINUED WITH DAY AND NIGHT PTLs IN THE CORDONED DPCs. THEY CONTINUED TO DESTROY SHELTERS AND LOOT VALUABLES INCLUDING LIVESTOCK. IN KIBEHO, RPA HAVE STARTED REGISTRATION OF IDPs FOR REPATRIATION.

(3) GHANBATT REPORTED THAT RPA HAVE INTENSIFIED SY MEASURES ALONG THE RWANDA - BURUNDI BORDER.

(2) THE FC MET WITH SRSG TO DISCUSS THE GEN SITUATION. RECEIVED DEBRIEF FROM DFC, DCOS OPS AND ~~COs~~ ^{GIVE} AFTER RECCE OF KIBEHO. MET WITH MR. RANDOLPH KENT OF UNREO TO DISCUSS HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE AND ADVICE ON KIBEHO SITUATION. FC IS AWARE OF RPA REASONING AND ALTHOUGH NOT SUPPORTING THE METHODS, HE SUPPORTS DIRECT ACTIVITY THAT WILL QUICKLY AND SAFELY MOVE DISPLACED PEOPLE BACK TO THEIR COMMUNES.

(3) HE ALSO MET WITH AND BID FAREWELL TO CO OF ETHIOBATT AFTER EIGHT MONTHS OF DUTY IN SECTOR 4C, ONE OF THE BUSIEST SECTORS IN UNAMIR.

(3) MILOB GP HQ. CONTINUED COORDINATION AND MONITORING OF MILOBS ACTIVITIES IN THE SECTORS. THE DFC/CMO HELD A MEETING WITH UN AGENCIES AND NGOS TO URGE THEM TO ASSIST IN THE EVAC OF IDPs BEING EJECTED FROM THE DPCs BEFORE THEY START DYING OF HUNGER. UN AGENCIES AND NGOS HAVE HOWEVER DECIDED TO SEEK APPROVAL FROM THEIR VARIOUS HQs BEFORE ASSISTING SINCE FORCED EVACUATION OF IDPS WAS AGAINST THEIR MANDATE. SOME NGOS HOWEVER AGREED TO ASSIST WITH FOOD AID STARTING ON 20 APR 95.

(4) IN SECTOR 1-BYUMBA CONDUCTED PTLs IN AOR. NOTHING SIGNIFICANT TO REPORT.

(5) IN SECTOR 2-KIBUNGO.

(A) CONDUCTED PTLs IN AOR.

(B) MILOBS INVESTIGATING A CASE OF HARASSMENT REPORTED BY A WOMAN AND HER 6 CHILDREN IN GATI (GR 4392). THE FAMILY IS STILL UNDER GHANBATT PROTECTION.

(C) MILOB PATROLS TO GIRIMA (GR 5487) REPORTED THAT DURING A FOOTBALL MATCH FOR CHILDREN UNDER 15 YEARS, ONE OF THE SPECTATORS THREW A GRENADE ONTO THE FIELD. NO CAS REPORTED. SIX PERSONS HAVE HOWEVER BEEN ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH THE INCIDENT.

(6) IN SECTOR 3-KIBUYE/GITARAMA.

(A) CONDUCTED PTLs IN AOR.

(B) PATROL TO KIBUYE COMMUNE EXPRESSED CONCERN ABOUT THE INCREASING ANIMOSITY TOWARDS MILOBS BY LOCALS. LOCALS OFTEN APPROACHED PATROLS ASKING WHAT UNAMIR WAS DOING IN RWANDA AND DEMANDING THAT THEY GO HOME.

(C) MILOBS FOLLOWED UP THE RADIO BROADCASTS ON RADIO RWANDA INVOLVING TWO CATHOLIC FATHERS IN THE TABA (GR 8883) AND RUNDA COMMUNES. BOTH MEN BELIEVE THEY ARE NOT IN DANGER. THEY INFORMED MILOBS THAT THE ALLEGATIONS WERE STARTED BY AN INDIVIDUAL WHO IS NOW THE SUBJECT OF RWANDESE GOVERNMENT ACTION. THE PRIESTS ALSO MENTIONED THAT THE LOCAL RPA HAVE ENCOURAGED THE NEGATIVE ATTITUDE EXPRESSED ON RADIO RWANDA. THE

BOURGEMESTRE OF TABA COMMUNE INFORMED SECTOR 3 HQ DURING THE PERIOD THAT HE HAD DEPOSITED A TESTIMONIAL WITH THE PREFECT SUPPORTING THE PRIESTS AND DEMANDING THAT RADIO RWANDA RETRACT THE ALLEGATIONS AGAINST THE PRIESTS.

(D) PATROL TO KAYENZI COMMUNE LEARNED THAT ARBITRARY ARRESTS WERE STILL BEING CARRIED OUT IN THE COMMUNE. THE NAMES OF 4 RECENTLY ARRESTED PERSONS WERE COLLECTED FOR INVESTIGATION BY THE TEAM. THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMUNE OFFICE INFORMED MILOBS THAT THE RPA SELDOM INFORMED THE BOURGEMESTRE OF ARRESTS AND THEREFORE COULD NOT PROVIDE ANY INFO.

(E) PATROLS TO RUTONDE VILLAGE (GR 5880) IN THE KIVUMU COMMUNE WERE INFORMED THAT RPA TROOPS DRESSED IN CIVILIAN CLOTHES WERE HARASSING LOCALS AFTER EVERY VISIT BY UNAMIR PERSONNEL. LOCALS ALLEGED THAT RPA TROOPS APPROACHED LOCALS WHO WERE INTERVIEWED BY MILOBS AND DEMANDED A LIST OF QUESTIONS ASKED. RPA TROOPS OFTEN TRIED TO TELL THE LOCALS THAT UNAMIR WAS NO GOOD FOR RWANDA. IT WAS ALSO ALLEGED THAT PERSONS ARRESTED ON SUSPICION OF HAVING PARTICIPATED IN THE GENOCIDE WERE BOUND AND DRAGGED THROUGH THE STREETS IN RECENT TIMES.

(F) PATROL TO KAVUMU SECTEUR (GR 3355) OF GISIVU COMMUNE WAS UNABLE TO GATHER ANY INFORMATION DUE TO THE PRESENCE OF RPA TROOPS WHO FOLLOWED THEM THROUGHOUT THEIR PATROL AND HARASSED THEM THROUGH THEIR INTERPRETER.

(7) IN SECTOR 4A-GIKONGORO.

(A) SITUATION IN THE SECTOR WAS CALM EXCEPT IN THE KIBEHO AND NDAGO CAMPS WHERE THERE WAS REPORTED TO BE TENSION DUE TO THE IMMINENT FORCED CLOSURE OF THE CAMPS BY RPA TROOPS.

(B) IDPS FROM THE MUNINI CAMP HAVE CONVERGED AT THE ZAMBATT PL POSN FOR ASSISTANCE.

(8) IN SECTOR 4B-BUTARE.

(1) CONDUCTED PTLs IN AOR.

(2) PATROLS TO KIBEHO AND NDAGO IN SECTOR 4A REPORTED THAT ALL UN AGENCIES AND NGOS HAD SHUNNED THE EXERCISE AND THAT ONLY UNAMIR HAD DESPATCHED VEHICLES TO EVAC IDPs. A TOTAL OF 14 UNAMIR TRUCKS TRANSPORTED 825 PERSONS FROM THE CAMP TO VARIOUS COMMUNES IN THE BUTARE PREFECTURE. 1 PERSON^{WAS} ~~WERE~~ ALSO REPORTED DEAD FROM INJURIES SUSTAINED IN THE STAMPEDE DURING

(9) IN SECTOR 4C-CYANGUGU.

(A) CONDUCTED PTLs IN AOR.

(B) THE SITUATION IN THE SECTOR REMAINED UNSTABLE. SEVERAL ACTS OF BANDITRY WERE REPORTED. SOME LOCALS ARE STILL SEEKING PROTECTION WITH MILOBS AT NIGHT IN NYAMASHEKE. THE UVIRA CROSSING POINT REMAINS CLOSED ON THE RWANDESE SIDE.

(C) MILOBS REPORTED THAT BETWEEN 2200-0100 HRS ON THE NIGHT 18/19 APR 95, 19 ARMED BANDITS DRESSED IN MILITARY UNIFORM CROSSED THE LAKE IN A LARGE ROWING BOAT AND ROBBED 7 HOUSEHOLDS OF ALL PROPERTY AND LIVESTOCK IN GASAYO (GR 9941). THE BANDITS WERE REPORTED TO HAVE LEFT A LIST OF 7 INDIVIDUALS WHO HAD BEEN TARGETED FOR KILLING ON CHARGES OF BEING TRAITORS. THE MESSAGE ALSO WARNED YOUNG MEN TO MAKE THEMSELVES READY FOR TRAINING AT IJWI. ONE MAN WAS KIDNAPPED AFTER HIS HOUSE WAS ROBBED. THERE WERE NO DEATHS FROM THESE INCIDENTS HOWEVER SEVERAL PERSONS WERE INJURED. LOCALS REPORTED THAT THIS GROUP HAD BEEN THE SAME ONE THAT CARRIED OUT THE ROBBERIES ON 17 APR 95. THEY IDENTIFIED SOME OF THE BANDITS AS FORMER RESIDENTS OF THE AREA.

(D) MILOBS REPORTED HEARING THE FIRE OF AT LEAST ONE HEAVY MACHINE GUN AND SMALL ARMS OFF THE SOUTH-EASTERN COAST OF IJWI ISLAND AROUND 1630 HRS. THE FIRING LASTED APPROXIMATELY 30 MINS. IT WAS NOT AIMED AT THE MAINLAND. MILOBS SURMISE THAT SOME FORM OF TRAINING ~~MUST~~ MAY HAVE BEEN TAKING PLACE ON THE ISLAND.

(E) MILOBS HELD CONFERENCE WITH THE SUB-PREFECT AND RPA COMD OF BUGUYUMA TO DISCUSS THE INCIDENT OF 14 APR 95. THE SUB-PREFECT AND RPA COMD'S REMARKS INDICATED THEIR SUSPICIONS OF AN ORGANISED ATTEMPT BY THE FRGF AND MILITIA TO HARASS THE RPA AND TO RECRUIT LOCALS FOR TRAINING, WITH THE ULTIMATE AIM OF STAGING A COMEBACK TO RWANDA. THEY SAID THEY EXPECTED MORE OF SIMILAR INCIDENTS IN THE FUTURE.

(F) ABOUT 40 LOCALS FROM NYAMASHEKE WERE REPORTED TO BE CAMPED OUTSIDE THE MILOBS ACCOMMODATION FOR PROTECTION.

THERE WERE NO DEATHS FROM THESE INCIDENTS HOWEVER SEVERAL PERSONS WERE INJURED. LOCALS REPORTED THAT THIS GROUP HAD BEEN THE SAME ONE THAT CARRIED OUT THE ROBBERIES ON 17 APR 95. THEY IDENTIFIED SOME OF THE BANDITS AS FORMER RESIDENTS OF THE AREA.

1. **SITUATION.**

a. Both KIBEHO and NDAGO camps have Threat Force elements (Interahamwe/FRGF/Bandits) amongst the population. They have been responsible for acts of harassment, intimidation, theft and murder both within the camps and in the areas surrounding the camps.

b. Threat Forces have also been responsible for the spreading of anti RPA propaganda within the camps and actively dissuading refugees from returning to their home communes. It is possible that they have a significant following as a result of this propaganda.

c. It is considered likely that the Threat Force elements have access to small arms and grenades in addition to traditional weapons such as machetes and similar implements.

d. The RPA have been subjected to mob violence in the past when they have entered refugee camps.

e. Recent reported incidents affecting the KIBEHO and NDAGO area include:

(1) Ghanbatt found 3 hand grenades during a search of KIBEHO camp on 20 Nov.

(2) A suspected FRGF soldier was shot dead by the RPA in the KIBEHO area on 25 Nov.

(3) On 28 Nov at 1130 am, DP's killed two bandits at NDAGO, apparently for stealing food.

(4) Two bandits were killed in NDAGO camp on the night of 28/29 Nov.

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(5) On 3 Dec unidentified bandits threw a grenade and attacked DP's in KIBEHO with machetes, seriously injuring 7 people.

(6) Over 50 killings have been allegedly attributed to bandits, criminals or Militia in a 15 km radius of these camps.

19. CIVILIANS IN THE AREA OF GISORARA (GR 492913) HAVE REPORTED THAT THE RPA COME INTO THEIR HOMES AT NIGHT AND STEAL ANIMALS AND EXTORT MONEY FROM THEM.

20. LOCALS IN THE VILLAGES OF BISATE (GR 4639), SHINGIRO (GR 4835), NYARUGINA (GR 4938) AND HUHINGO (GR 4733) HAVE REPORTED THAT RPA HAVE BEEN RAPING THE WOMEN OF THE AREA AND ARRESTING PEOPLE AT NIGHT.

32. RPA WERE SEEN ESCORTING 3 PRISONERS WHO THEY CLAIMED WERE MEMBERS OF THE INTERAHAMWE; WHO KILLED A MAN AT GR 392910. RPA ESCORTS LED MILOBS TO THE REPORTED KILLING SITE WHERE A DEAD BODY WAS FOUND. THE DECEASED IDENTIFIED AS MR JEAN NTAMUKENUMWE WAS HACKED TO DEATH WITH MACHETE.

23 OCT 94

33. IN SECTOR 3, 7 RPA SOLDIERS ON PTL AT RURUMBA GR 4726 WERE ATTACKED BY LOCALS ARMED WITH MACHETES, SPEARS AND OTHER LOCAL WPNS. THE SOLDIERS WERE RESCUED BY GHANBATT TPS IN AN APC WHO LATER CONVEYED THEM TO THEIR BASE AT KIVU GR 8310.

24 OCT 94

34. 3 PERSONS WERE INJURED AT RUNYINA GR 4807. TWO OF THEM SUSTAINED MACHETE WOUNDS AND ONE BY GUN SHOT. MSF FROM KIBEHO ALSO REPORTED HEARING GUN SHOTS AND GREN BLASTS DURING THE NIGHT OF 23/24 OCT 94.

35. LOCALS AT KADABO GR 5749 REPORTED THAT FEW PEOPLE SUSPECTED TO BE INTERAHAMWE FROM GIKONGORO RAIDED THE VILLAGE ON 23/24 OCT 94 NIGHT AND KILLED AN INFANT AND INJURED ONE OLD LADY.

36. AT RUSHUBI GR 6141 THREE RPA SOLDIERS ATTACKED LOCALS AND BEAT THEM UP. TWO WOMEN WERE IN CRITICAL CONDITION AND THEY WERE EVACUATED TO THE MSF HOSP IN RUKONDO FOR MEDICAL TREATMENT.

37. AT GAHUNGA GR 5763 AT ABOUT 231100B OCT 94 TWO RPA SOLDIERS

ALONG WITH ONE CIVILIAN HARASSED AND BEAT UP SOME LOCALS. THEY ALSO TOOK AWAY 7 COWS BELONGING TO THE LOCALS.

40. IN SECTOR 4C, AT ABOUT MIDNIGHT 24/25 OCT 94, BANDITS SHOT AND KILLED ONE MR NONTAKASI AND HIS WIFE AT RUVUNGURA GR 8713. THE MAN, A SHOP OWNER AT BUGARAMA WAS ORDERED TO SURRENDER CASH BUT HE REFUSED. THE SAME GROUP OF BANDITS WERE REPORTED TO HAVE ROBBED ANOTHER PERSONS OF CASH AND PROPERTY IN THE SAME TOWN.

OFFICE PROCEDURES - FORCE STANDARD DISTRIBUTION LISTS

1. New Standard Distribution Lists for use within the military component of HQ are attached. Staff officers are encouraged to make the maximum use of these Lists as help ensure that no one is omitted from the distribution of any document and remove the chore of typing long distributions on each document produced.

2. The Lists must, however, be used sensibly. While they act as an aide-memoire for staff officers, they do not remove from them the responsibility of considering carefully who needs the information contained in the document under consideration. There is a balance to be struck if we are to ensure efficient and effective passage of information within the Force - those who need to know must receive the necessary information while those who do not have any interest in the subject do not want to be swamped with masses of paper which they have to read to decide whether or not they need the information it contains. We need, too, to remember that distribution of large documents on wide distributions is expensive in terms of paper, photocopying and the time of our too few clerks.

3. Standard Distribution Lists are flexible in their use, as the following examples demonstrate. If the appropriate Distribution List contains addressees who need a particular document, the Distribution on the document might read, for example, 'Lists A and B (less Serials 17 and 21)'. Similarly, the Lists can be used to cover a part of the total distribution of a document thus :

Lists A and B
HAC
C Log O.

4. It is also possible to differentiate between Action and Information addressees using distribution lists, for example, if it is required to notify the military staff of HQ UNAMIR of some administrative point, but is intended that senior officers should also be aware, and as the matter impinges upon the civilian component of the HQ, the following might be used :

Information

5. In the circumstances in which we find ourselves, any system of distribution lists must be dynamic. They will be reviewed regularly by my staff but addressees are invited to offer suggestions for additions, deletions or amendment to the structure of the lists.

6. For CAO. If you wish, we can include a separate CAO list within this document, thus making one set of Distribution Lists for use throughout the HQ.







3. I personally raised the CTO on the telephone so that I could convince him to raise a vehicle for the impending task. He (CTO) refused citing the same reason of security. I told him that I was going to provide an armed escort from INDBATT for security, but he could not be convinced.

4. Immediately after my conversation with the CTO, Lt Col G Borglah, who had travelled with the DFC from Gitarama to UNAMIR HQ, came and told me that, he had been directed by the DFC to come and make arrangements for transport to go and pick up the stranded crew in Gitarama. I told him that, I had been speaking to the CTO over the same task but he had refused to raise a vehicle for the same task. The senior officer told me to go along with him to the CTO's office. He presented the problem to the CTO who insolently replied that "there was need for common sense to prevail over a situation like this one". He advised that, either the crew with everybody spends a night in Gitarama or transport be provided from there, to transport everybody to Kigali.

5. The Col told him that the only two vehicles that were available were used to transport the Deputy Force Commander and part of his entourage back to Kigali. He was still not convinced. The Senior Officer told me that we could leave and he was going to brief the DFC/COS about the outcome.

6. When I came back to the Ops room I briefed the Duty Officer and advised him to report back to the DFC about the stance the CTO had taken. This is what happened sir.
