SOME REAL HAPPENINGS

CASE 1

Around 5th April 95, on the road Mbilizi - Cyangugu, an antitank mine blast destroyed a car from MDM, killed on the spot two persons and injured three more. At that time it was vastly announced a programmed reburial ceremony to take place in Mbilizi on 7th April, as part of the commemorative events in honour of last year's genocide victims.

When the mine blast occurred due to its tremendous power, the double cabin pickup truck flew about 12 metres, crossed transversely the road and stopped its fly hitting heavily the ground, and lying finally as it were coming from the opposite direction.

But those that put the antitank mine were not satisfied with it. During the night time they placed some antipersonnel mines around the destroyed car. They calculated that the natural curiosity of the people around had to push them to examine the remains of the vehicle ... Unfortunately they were right ... A lady lost a leg in that trap ...

CASE 2

Three boys aged 7, 9 and 11 years old were playing as usual in their neighbourhood, not so far from Kigali town. They were playing with an improvised football, made of plastic bags tied, in the local typical fashion, and coloured by the red ground.

The ball suddenly went out of the camp. One of the children run to take it before falling on a ditch. When he was near of the ball, he saw some strange can lying on the ground, and picked it up, he forgot the ball and run to show the thing to the other boys playing with him, his small brother and his cousin. Then they started trying to grab the new toy from the owner's hands ... And the explosion happened ... Two children died on the spot and the third one at the hospital.

CASE 3

On August 19th at 1530 hours, Memisa's small suzuki jeep with three persons inside was destroyed by an antitank mine near Kiziza one kilometre from their job, the Murunda hospital, before reaching the bridge at the junction with Gisenyi Kibuye road. The people at the hospital heard the blast and went immediately to help them.

One nurse died instantly due to the multiple injuries, and the driver one and half hours later. The third person, a 8½ months pregnant lady sustained burns in around the half of her body's surface, a fracture on one wrist joint and other injuries. She, as the driver, received resuscitation aid. She was evacuated with an UNAMIR helicopter to Kigali for further aid.



MINE AWARENESS

A - Precautions for Driving

- 1 - Only main roads are to be considered as relatively safe.
- 2 - Always follow in the fresh tracks of another vehicles or the lead vehicle (no less than 30 metres between vehicles).
- 3 - Flack jackets should be used as a seat cushion and a foot protection.

Sand bags (filled with sand) are the best

Protection - (Half filled and packed to form a floor cover).

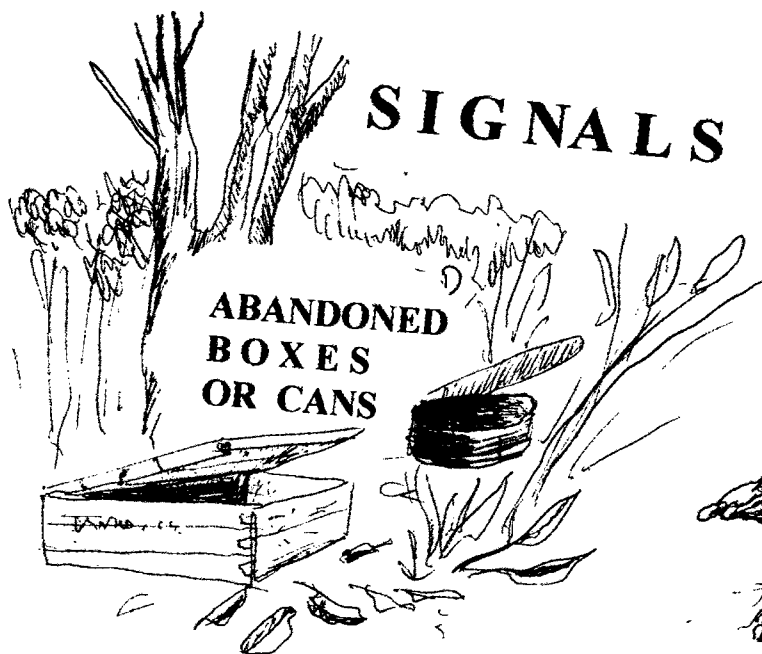
Wear the seat belts (front and rear), roll down the windows - doors unlocked.
- 4 - Stay on the road at halts.
- 5 - Never approach unexploded ordnance that you come across.

B - Where to expect Mines

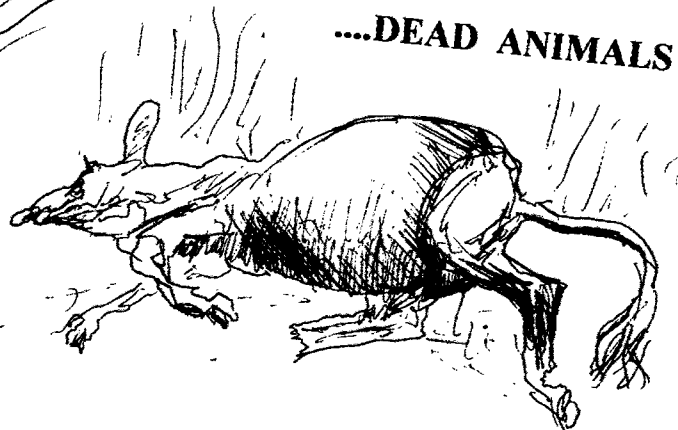
- 1 - Bottle necks like head of bridges, fords in swamps, defiles, etc.
- 2 - On the edge of the roads and tracks which have been cleared.
- 3 - Anywhere on unpaved roads which have not been cleared.
- 4 - In diversions around obstacles.
- 5 - In exit from roads.
- 6 - Around destroyed bridges or sabotaged sides.
- 7 - In damaged roads.
- 8 - In old battlefields that have not been cleared or recorded.

C - Warning signs for Mines and Booby traps. If there are no mine marking signs or fences, and no mines can be seen, the following signs may indicate the presence of mines:

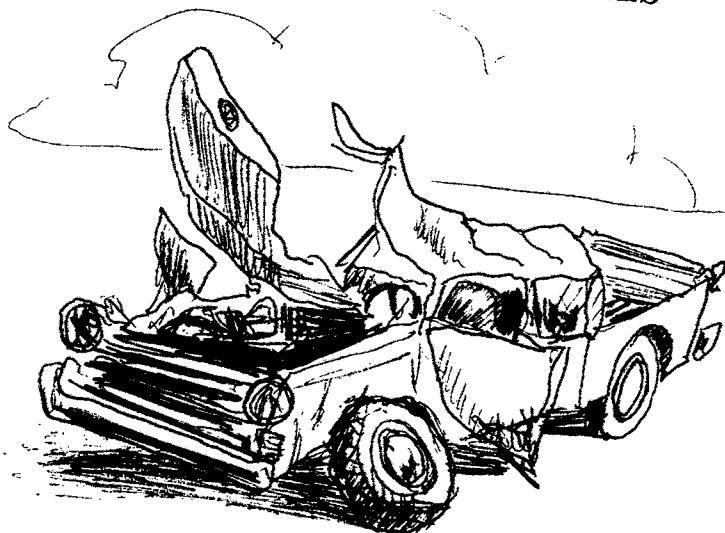

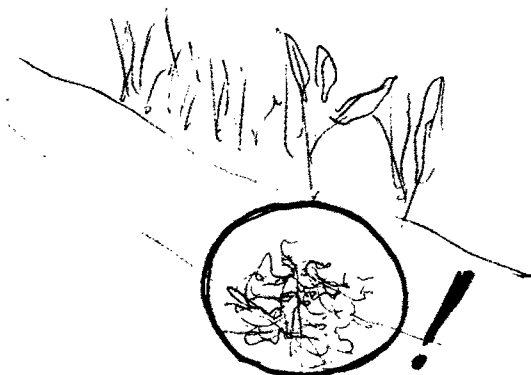

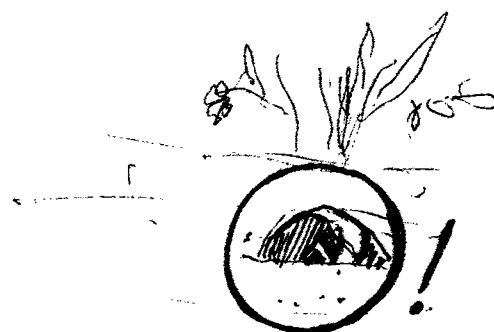

- 1 - *Damaged cars or trucks.*
- 2 - *Removed soil.*
- 3 - *Dead animals.*
- 4 - *Local avoidance of the area.*
- 5 - *Presence of mine boxes or packing materials.*
- 6 - *Suspicious metal, plastic or rubber objects on the ground.*
- *The presence of trip wires is a good indication of booby traps.*

Simple Precaution: *Never move off roads or path which are in daily use - If possible never use unpaved or dirt roads, if paved roads are available.*

DO NOT TAKE UNNECESSARY RISKS.

D - Actions on discovering a Mine

When on foot:

- 1 - *Stop and remain calm.*
- 2 - *Walk back the same way you walked into the minefield - If it's possible, use the same footprints - If you are not sure use a metal stick/bayonet for probing.*
- 3 - *Mark the mined area with whatever is at hand - so others will avoid the danger.*
- 4 - *Report your location by radio through your chain of command - If you have no radio, report ASAP to the nearest authority.*
- 5 - *If you have a map, mark the place in order to register the danger area and pass the grid references through your chain of command.*
- 6 - *If possible, stay in the area and point out the place where the mine was found.*

If in a vehicle:

- 1 - *Stop immediately and stay calm.*
- 2 - *Stay in your vehicle, even if you have a blown tyre or have a damaged vehicle.*
- 3 - *Carefully observe the terrain around your vehicle, trying to find other mines.*
- 4 - *Check that everyone is wearing a seat belt front and rear - If you have flack jackets, check that everyone in the vehicle has one under them.*
- 5 - *Roll down all the windows.*
- 6 - *Notify your location through your chain of command by radio.*
- 7 - *Perform a radio check with your handies.*
- 8 - *Stay with your vehicle and wait for engineer assistance to get you out - You may already have driven through a mined area.*

If you have to leave your vehicle:

- 9 - *Do not move the steering wheel.*
- 10 - *Put on any protective gear you may have.*
- 11 - *Climb over the seats and leave the car from the rear - Walk carefully back along the vehicle tracks.*
- 12 - *Move all your passengers out the same way, at 20 metres intervals, dressing in protective clothes if they have.*

If you have to move the vehicle before help arrives:

- 13 - *Be sure you first performed steps (1) to (7) above.*

- 14 - *Dismount all the passengers as in (11) and (12) above, except one that remains as an assistant in the rear of the vehicle where he can see the vehicle tracks.*
- 15 - *Guided by the assistant, the driver slowly reverses out following in his tracks.*
- 16 - *If there are two vehicles, the rear vehicle moves first reversing 50 mg the lead vehicle then follows in reverse.*
- 17 - *If it is dark, wait in the car until daylight, unless given instructions to the contrary*
NEVER WALK AROUND THE VEHICLE
- 18 - *Close the road, and clearly mark any diversion you have made.*
- 19 - *Report to the nearest authority available.*

E - Actions on a Mine incident

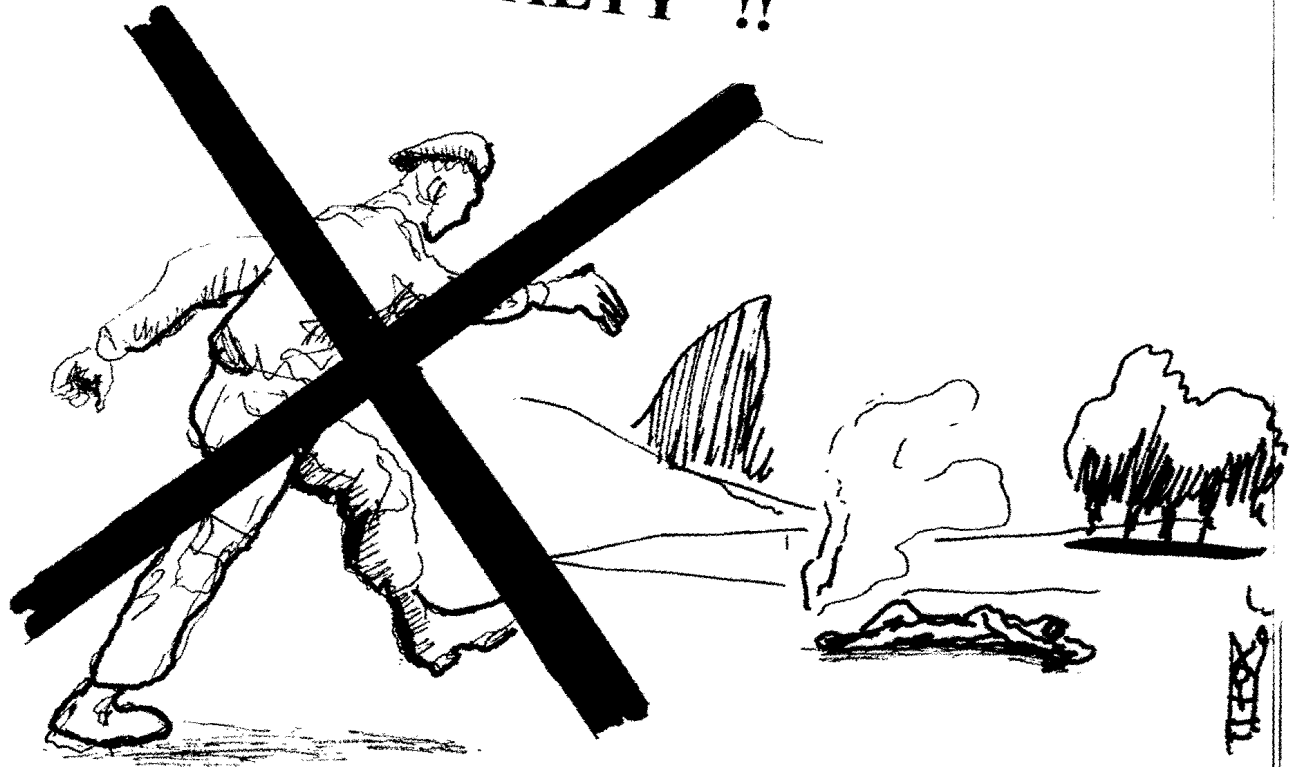
When on foot:

- 1 - **DO NOT IMMEDIATELY RUN TO THE CASUALTY**
STOP, stay calm and assess the situation.
- 2 - *Only one person move to the casualty, moving in his exact footprints, and apply immediate first aid, standing as near to the point of detonation of the mine as possible - If his footsteps are not clear, do not risk another casualty, but hand-clear a path to the casualty using a prodder/bayonet.*
- 3 - *Notify your location and alert CASEVAC system.*
- 4 - *Do not attempt to move the casualty until helps arrives, unless it is absolutely necessary.*
- 5 - *Using a prodder/bayonet, hand clear an area around the casualty, and enlarge the path back from the casualty to a safe area, for use by the medical team - Remember that a stretcher party carrying a heavy load requires a wide cleared area to walk on.*
- 6 - *If the patient is conscious, one member of the party should stay with him/her to give comfort and reassurance.*

If in a vehicle which hits a mine:

- 1 - *STOP immediately and restrain the impulse of run away of the vehicle - Stay calm*

- 2 - *If your radio is working notify your location and alert CASEVAC system.*
- 3 - *If your vehicle has been damaged, give immediate first aid to any casualties.*

If another vehicle is damaged:

<p>DO NOT IMMEDIATELY RUN TOWARD THE CASUALTIES STOP AND CONSIDER</p>
--

- 4 - *Notify your location and alert CASEVAC system.*
- 5 - *Look - Check for access to the stricken vehicle, which may be the front or rear, reaching the vehicle by foot or with your vehicle.*

If you decide to reach the damaged vehicle by foot:

- 6 - *Leave your vehicle by climbing over the seats and leaving from the rear - Put on protective clothing and walk back along your own wheel tracks - Move passengers out in the same way.*
- 7 - *Find an area where the damaged vehicle's tracks and your own coincide, and walk to the damaged vehicle along its tracks.*

<p>DO NOT WALK AROUND THE DAMAGED VEHICLE</p>
--

- 8 - *Enter the damaged vehicle from the rear, and carry out immediate first aid to any casualties.*
- 9 - *Stay with the vehicle, and wait for medical help and engineer assistance to get you out.*

If you have to move a casualty.

- 10 - *Using a prod/bayonet, clear an area around the vehicle so the casualty can be extricated from it.*
- 11 - *Clear a path from the damaged vehicle back to safe ground and carry the casualty*

along it - Wait for CASEVAC assistance.

If you decide to reach the damaged vehicle

12 - Perform steps (4) and (5) above.

13 - Open all windows and doors - Doors should always be unlocked.

14 - Move forward or backwards in the tracks of the other vehicle from the point of both tracks coincide - Move right up to the stricken vehicle.

15 - Using doors or windows get onto the roof of your vehicle.

16 - Assess injuries and administer first aid, keeping the chain of command informed of the injuries to assist medical teams preparations.

17 - If it's possible, move the casualties to your vehicle.

18 - Slowly reverses or move forward in your own vehicle tracks.

19 - Move to a safe area for AIR MEDEVAC or the nearest Aid Post - Keep the chain of command informed.

20 - If it is dark wait in the car until daylight, unless given instructions to the contrary.

21 - Report to the nearest authority available.

22 - Close the road, and clearly mark any diversion you have made.

UNEXPLODED ORDNANCE DEVICES AWARENESS

Unexploded ordnance devices as mortar bombs, had grenades or rifle grenades etc could be actioned unfortunately by children or adults, but more frequently by children that because of curiosity are attracted by them. It is the cause of many tragic accidents affecting kids, then here is a preventive and educative measure:

1. *NEVER TOUCH THINGS THAT SEEMS TO BE A BOMB, OR YOU DO NOT KNOW REALLY WHAT ARE*
2. *NEVER TOUCH IT, A SIMPLE SMOOTH MOVEMENT COULD CAUSE AN EXPLOSION AND KILL YOU AND THE PEOPLE AROUND.*
3. *TEACH 1 AND 2 TO YOU CHILDREN.*
4. *IF YOU CASUALLY FIND SOMETHING STRANGE OR SUSPICIOUS DO NOT HESITATE IN GOING BACK PACING SLOWLY ON YOUR OWN FOOTPRINTS.*
5. *MARK THE PLACE.*
6. *TELL AS SOON AS POSSIBLE GENDARMERIE POLICE, SOLDIERS OR UNAMIR MILOBS WHERE IS THE STRANGE THING.*
7. *FOR EACH MINE FOUND MANY OTHERS YOU HAVE TO CONSIDER THAT THERE ARE PLANTED AT THE SAME PLACE.*
8. *SOME MINES ARE PREPARED TO BLAST WHEN SOMEBODY WORKS TO REMOVE THEM, THEN LET SPECIALISTS TO DO IT, NEVER TRY TO DO IT BY YOURSELF.*

MINES ARE BLIND, EFFECTIVE, TRICKY AND CRIMINAL.

MINES DO NOT SIGN PEACE AGREEMENTS AND DO NOT KNOW WHAT NEUTRALITY MEANS.

WE DO NOT AGREE WITH THE CONCEPT OF "MINE ACCIDENT"... WHEN A MINE BLAST MEANS THAT IT DID ITS JOB... WHO PUT THE MINE KNOWS IT. THERE IS ALWAYS AN INDISCRIMINATE AGGRESSION AND EXCEPTIONALLY AN ACCIDENT e.g. WHEN BLAST DURING INSTALLATION.

YOU CAN AVOID OR PREVENT OR ATTENUATE INCIDENTS WITH THIS AWARENESS MEASURES.

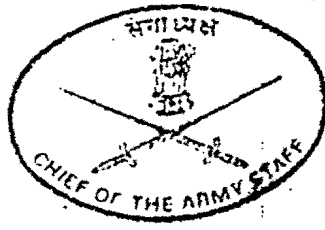

3. RPA.
 - A. SECTOR 2B (KIBUNGO) - RPA HAS ROTATED ITS TROOPS IN THE GENERAL AREA OF RUKUMBO GS 9466. THE STRENGTH SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN INCREASED FROM A PLATOON TO A COMPANY WITH ITS HQ HAVING MOVED FROM RUKUMBO TO PIMIERA GR 9360.
 - B. IN SECTOR 5A (RUHENGIERI), IT WAS CONFIRMED BY AN NGO THAT THE RPA HAVE STOPPED LOCALS INCLUDING TOURISTS FROM ENTERING THE FOREST TO SEE THE GORILLAS.
4. FRGF/MILITIA/BANDITRY.
 - A. IN SECTOR 5C (KIBUYE), THERE WAS AN EXPLOSION AT "HOME SAINT JEAN" CHURCH (SITE OF ITR INVESTIGATION) ON 290800 DEC 95 IN WHICH A SMALL BOY HAD HIS LEFT HAND AMPUTATED AND HAD FACIAL INJURIES. THE BOY CURRENTLY ON ADMISSION. MILOBS INVESTIGATING.
 - B. IN SECTOR 4 (CYANGUGU), ON 29 DEC 95 AT ABOUT 0030HRS, THE NYAMASHEKE MEDICAL CENTRE WAS ATTACKED BY GUNMEN SUSPECTED TO BE FRGF MEMBERS. THREE GRENADES WERE LAUNCHED AT THE MEDICAL CENTRE. GRENADE SPLINTERS AND 15 EMPTY CASES OF 7.62MM ROUNDS WERE PICKED FROM THE SCENE OF INCIDENT. THE ROUNDS USED WERE NOT THE TYPE AK 47 COMMONLY USED BY RPA. FROM THE SPLINTERS, IT WAS EVIDENT THAT TWO TYPES OF GRENADES WERE USED THOUGH THEIR MAKE COULD NOT BE ASCERTAINED. NO CASUALTIES WERE RECORDED. THE WALLS AND WINDOWS OF THE CENTRE WERE HOWEVER DAMAGED.





1. TO MAN THE OPS ROOM 24 HRS FROM 0800 TO 0800 HRS EVERY DAY.
2.
 - A. TO MONITOR THE RADIO AT ALL TIMES.
 - B. RECORD INCOMING CALLS, TAKE RESPECTIVE ACTION AND REFLECT PROPERLY.
 - C. PARA A. AND B. ARE TO BE FOLLOWED ALSO DURING LUNCH AND SUPPER TIME, OR DURING TIME CARRYING OUT PERSONNEL TRANSPORT.
 - D. TO INFORM SDO OR OPSO WHEN LEAVING HIS OFFICE.
3. TO MAINTAIN A SUPPORTING ATTITUDE TO STATIONS OPERATING ON OUR NET.
4. TO SUPERVISE RADIO DISCIPLINE AND VOICE PROCEDURE AT ANY TIME AND INTERFERE IMMEDIATELY IF THERE IS A VIOLATION OF IT. (THIS INCLUDES ADVISORY TO INDSIGS).
5. MAKE RADIO CHECK WITH LISTED UP CALL SIGNS OF THIS SECTOR AT 0730 AND 1930 HRS EVERY DAY.
6. BE AWARE OF EVERY MOVEMENT OF MILOBS IN THIS SECTOR.
7. INFORM IMMEDIATELY SDO, OPSO OR SECTOR COMMANDER ABOUT MAJOR EVENTS OR INCIDENTS CONCERNING THE SECTOR.
8. ROUTE INCOMING MAIL/FAX TO SDO FOR PERUSAL ON ARRIVAL IN THE MORNING AND HALF AN HOUR BEFORE EVENING PRAYER.
9. UPDATE OPS AND BRIEFING MAPS AS WELL AS COMMUNICATION CHARTS ON CHANGES.
10. ENSURE THAT BATTERIES OF HAND SETS IN YOUR CUSTODY ARE KEPT CHARGED.
11. HAND OVER BRFG ROOM STORES AND OTHER EQUIPMENT TO SUCCESSING DUTY OFFICER AND BRIEF HIM PROPERLY.

GUIDELINES
TO DUTY OFFICER'S DUTIES

THESE GUIDELINES CONTAIN MORE DETAILED ADVISES FOR THE DUTY OFFICER
AND HAVE THE SAME IMPORTANCE AS THE HEADLINES IN THE DUTY SHEET.

- TO 1. A. LUNCH TIME IS ONE HOUR.
- B. SUPPER TIME IS ONE AND A HALF HOUR.
- TAKE CARE THAT YOUR COMRADES HAVE FOOD PREPARED IN TIME.
- C. THE DUTY OFFICER IS SUPPOSED TO BE ALWAYS AROUND THE OFFICE,
 ESPECIALLY BECAUSE HE IS ASSISTANCE TO SECT CDR, OPS OFFR AND
 SDO WHENEVER IT IS REQUIRED.
- TO 2. A. THE DUTY OFFR HAS TO HAVE THE RADIO ALWAYS WITH HIM AND TO
 LISTEN TO IT WHENEVER THERE IS TRAFFIC ON THE NET.
- B. ALL CALLS, INCOMING OR OUTGOING, WHICH ARE MESSAGES, INFO,
 MOVEMENT CONTROLLING, EVENTS, ETC. ARE TO BE RECORDED, SO
 THAT AT ANY TIME IT CAN BE FOLLOWED UP.
- C. IF AN INCOMING CALL REQUIRES ACTION, THIS HAS HIGHEST
 PRIORITY. AS SOON AS ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN AND THE TASK IS
 FULLFILLED REFLECT THE OUTCOME IMMEDIATELY BACK TO THE
 CALLER OR THE RESPECTIVE PERSON(S).
- D. PARAS 2.A., B. AND C. ARE TO BE FOLLOWED UP ALSO DURING LUNCH
 AND SUPPER TIME, EVEN IF THE DUTY OFFICER HAS TO LEAVE THE
 MEAL AND TO RETURN TO THE OFFICE. THE SAME IS VALID WHILE
 TRANSPORTING PERSONNEL OF THIS SECTOR.
- E. IF THE DUTY OFFICER LEAVES THE SECTOR HQ PREMISES HE HAS TO
 INFORM SDO OR OPS OFFR AND TO GIVE THE REASON.
- TO 3. SUPPORTING ATTITUDE MEANS WHENEVER SOMEBODY CANNOT REACH
 ANOTHER CALL SIGN, CAN NOT HEAR THE CALLING STATION, ADRESSEE
 IS ABSENT OR HAS NO RADIO, ADVISES OR HELP ARE ASKED THE DUTY
 OFFICER IS TO ASSIST IN PASSING MESSAGES OR OTHER GOOD OFFICES
 REQUIRED.
 ESPECIALLY WHEN PERSONS NOT BELONGING TO THIS SECTOR ARE
 CALLING, BECAUSE THE DUTY OFFICER IS THE FIRST REPRESENTATIVE OF
 THE PICTURE OF THIS SECTOR.

- TO 4.
- A. CALLING ANOTHER STATION INCLUDES ONLY TWO OPENING CALLS AND '...NOTHING HEARD OUT'.
 - B. IF ANOTHER STATION IS BREAKING INTO A CALL OR CONVERSATION WITHOUT 'BREAK,BREAK...' YOU HAVE TO INTERFERE AND ADVISE ACCORDINGLY.
 - C. IF PEOPLE ARE NOT SPEAKING UNDERSTANDABLE OR TOO FAST, ADVISE THEM TO SPEAK SLOW, LOUD AND DISTINCT.
 - D. IF CALL SIGNS ARE CUT OFF, ADVISE THE CALLING STATION TO WAIT TWO SECONDS AFTER PRESSING THE PRESS-TO-TALK BUTTON TO LET THE CHANNEL OPEN FOR TRANSMISSION.
- TO 5.
- A. BE ALWAYS INFORMED WHICH CALL SIGNS ARE ABSENT FROM THE SECTOR, BECAUSE WE DON'T NEED TO CALL THEM.
 - B. WHEN YOU ARE CARRYING OUT THE SCHEDULED RADIO CHECK, TAKE CARE THAT THE STATIONS ARE ANSWERING IN THE SERIAL OF BEING CALLED AND GIVE THEM ENOUGH TIME TO ANSWER YOUR CALL BEFORE YOU CONFIRM.
 - C. THE SECT CDR'S RESIDENCE IS IN A SHADED AREA, SO CALL HIM BY PHONE.
 - D. CONFIRM THE STAND-BY TEAM AND DRIVER DURING THE EVENING PRAYERS. COLLECT MOVEMENT REQUESTS OF TEAMS AND STAFF MEMBERS FOR THE NEXT MORNING DURING/AFTER THE RADIO CHECK TO PREVENT CONFUSION AND GIVE THEM CLEAR ORDERS TO THE STAND-BY TEAM.
 - E. REMIND, IF NECESSARY, THE IND SIGS NOT TO ANSWER THE RADIO WITH THE DUTY OFFICERS CALL SIGN, EVEN WHEN YOU ARE BUSY. WHEN THE CALLER HAS UNSUCCESSFULLY FINISHED HIS CALL THE IND SIGS CAN ANSWER WITH THEIR CALL SIGN AND OFFER HELP OR RELAY A MESSAGE. IN CASE OF MESSAGES THEY HAVE TO WRITE A NOTE AND HAND IT OVER TO THE DUTY OFFICER IMMEDIATELY ON RETURN.
- TO 6.
- A. TAKE CARE THAT YOU ALWAYS KNOW WHICH MILOBS ARE ABSENT, OR ON MOVE IN AND OUTSIDE THE SECTOR.
 - B. MARK ALL POSITIONS GIVEN BY PATROLS ON THE DUTY OFFICERS MAP, SO THAT YOU ARE AWARE OF THE LAST REPORTED LOCATION OF PATROLS AND ABLE TO BRIEF OTHER MILOBS AND STAFF MEMBERS OF THE WHEREABOUTS WHEN REQUIRED.
- TO 7.
- THE MENTIONED PERSONS ARE TO BE INFORMED IMMEDIATELY ABOUT MESSAGES WHICH ARE CONCERNING THE SECTOR IN OPERATIONAL, SECURITY, PERSONNEL AND LOGISTIC ASPECTS. THIS INCLUDES E.G. ALSO ANNOUNCEMENTS OF VISITS OF ANY KIND TO THIS SECTOR.

TO 8.

ALL INCOMING MAIL OR FAXES ARE TO BE COLLECTED IN A FILE FOLDER AND GIVEN TO SDO AS SOON AS HE IS ENTERING THE OFFICE THE FIRST TIME EVERY DAY. THIS FOLDER UPDATED IS TO BE GIVEN TO SDO LATEST 30 MIN BEFORE THE BRIEFINGS. SDO WILL LOOK THROUGH, MARK IMPORTANT PARTS AND ADVISE YOU WHAT WILL BE READ AT THE PRAYERS, WHICH MAIL WILL BE DISTRIBUTED TO WHOM, ETC. BE ALSO AVAILABLE TO MARK THE LOCATION OF SUMMARY EVENTS ON THE BRIEFING MAP.

TO 11.

A. TAKE CARE THAT ALL STUFF UNDER YOUR REponsibility IS IN ORDER AND AVAILABLE. IF THERE IS NEED OF MAINTAINANCE OR REPLACEMENT INFORM THE SDO ACCORDINGLY WHEN YOU HAND OVER YOUR 'HAND OVER/TAKE OVER' FORM TO HIM, TOGETHER WITH THE MAIL FOLDER, FOR HIS SIGNATURE.
