3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

a. RPA the RPA continued to conduct patrols and mount road blocks throughout the country.

(i) TUNBATT reported that a local has claimed that a man named NYANDEMA was killed by the RPA on the night

of 07 Nov 94 at CYAMBARA (GR3419). An investigation is in progress.

(ii) 2 soldiers from GHANBATT were arrested by the RPA in REMERA, KIGALI on the night of 08 Nov 94 as they attempted to sell a TV set to civilians. The RPA brought the soldiers to UNAMIR HQ and impounded their vehicle. The vehicle will be released later today after a preliminary investigation by the RPA.



4. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS

a. In RUGARAMA (GR 065285) Sector 1, NICOY reported that they had discovered 2 x AP mines, 1 x ATK mine and 1 x hand grenade. These were recovered and taken to BYUMBA. A booby trap comprising of 5 rifle grenades, mines and plastic explosive charges tied together with det cord was also discovered. This booby trap is yet to be cleared.

b. ZAMBATT reported that suspected underground elements in Sector 4B are inciting DPs not to be repatriated from camps in the sector.

c. MILOB Gp HQ reported that locals in Sector 4C complained of the arrest of 2 pers at KEMEMBE (GR 8031) by the RPA. The RPA took them to NYUNGWE forest and returned without them. They were suspected to have been killed. A MILOB investigation is in progress.

--- Security Council hears calls for lifting of arms embargo against Bosnia and Herzegovina; Bosnian representative says status quo is unacceptable; Federal Republic of Yugoslavia (Serbia and Montenegro) warns of uncontrollable escalation of conflict.

--- Security Council, in Presidential statement yesterday, welcomes joint decision of Tajik Government and opposition to extend cease-fire agreement until 6 February 1995.

--- Secretary-General, back in New York, voices concern at reports of renewed hostile acts between Iran and Iraq; urges both sides to exercise maximum restraint.

--- General Assembly approves report of Preparatory Committee for Fiftieth Anniversary of United Nations; welcomes commemorative programme for occasion.

--- Special Representative for former Yugoslavia expresses grave concern at deteriorating military situation in Sarajevo; appeals to parties not to endanger safe areas or civilians.

--- United Nations launches inter-agency appeal for \$242 million for humanitarian operations in former Yugoslavia in first half of 1995.

--- General Assembly elects 18 States to fill vacancies in Economic and Social Council as of 1 January 1995.

--- Special Commission on disarmament of Iraq starts contingency planning for incremental closure of operations because of shortage of funds; needs \$5 million in December to continue current activities.

--- Social, Humanitarian and Cultural Committee hears statement by UNHCR as it considers refugees and related issues; approves draft resolutions on right to self-determination and elimination of racial discrimination.

Numerous Member States have called on the Security Council to lift the arms embargo against the Government of Bosnia and Herzegovina. Those calls were made at a meeting which began yesterday and continued today, after Pakistan requested that the Council consider the recent General Assembly resolution encouraging it to take such action.

The representative of Bosnia and Herzegovina said the application of the arms embargo against both the victim and the well-armed aggressor had failed to bring about peace. "I'm

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... we have reached a point of last resort -- the last resort is the status quo", he stressed. He went on to say that there was no peace for the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) to keep, and that the benefits of the Force's presence were being outweighed by the costs to the Bosnian people. The representative of Pakistan, speaking also as Chairman of the Organization of the Islamic Conference Contact Group on Bosnia and Herzegovina, said the Council should respond swiftly to the recent General Assembly resolution. It should also declare the 51 per cent of the territory proposed for the Muslim-Croat Federation a "safe area".

The representative of the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia (Serbia and Montenegro) warned that lifting the arms embargo would lead to an uncontrollable escalation of the conflict. He said the Council, acting in a one-sided manner, had almost exclusively blamed the Bosnian Serbs for the conflict and for whatever atrocities were committed, ignoring acts committed by the Muslims and the Croats. The representative of Croatia said the Council had imposed an arms embargo on the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia -- a State that had ceased to exist. Instead of perpetuating a mistake, it should consider how lifting the embargo would contribute to a new balance of power in the region. The representative of France warned that the pursuit of a military solution in Bosnia and Herzegovina would halt the political process and lead to the withdrawal of UNPROFOR.

The Security Council has welcomed the joint decision of the Tajik Government and opposition to extend to 6 February 1995 the 17 September Agreement on a temporary cease-fire and cessation of hostile acts in Tajikistan. In a statement read out yesterday by its President, Madeleine Albright (United States), the Council also welcomed the signing of the Protocol of the Joint Commission charged with monitoring the Agreement.

The Council welcomed the reaffirmation by the parties to resolve the conflict through political means and the agreement to hold the next round of talks in early December in Moscow. It emphasized the importance of full and timely implementation by the parties of their obligations. Reaffirming its support for the Secretary-General's efforts to facilitate the political dialogue between the parties, the Council invited them to make all necessary efforts to achieve further progress in the next round of talks. It also asked the Secretary-General to present recommendations on the United Nations role in implementation of the agreements.

Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali, back in New York after visiting several countries, today expressed concern at reports of a renewal of hostile acts between Iran and Iraq. He urged both sides to exercise maximum restraint and to refrain from all such acts which could only lead to an increase of tension in the area.

The General Assembly today welcomed the commemorative programme being formulated by the secretariat of the fiftieth anniversary of the United Nations. It requested that emphasis continue to be placed on the development of programmes addressing the general public, in particular youth and children.

In a resolution adopted without a vote, the Assembly

the report of the Preparatory Committee for the 50th Anniversary of the United Nations. It decided that the Committee should continue its work and report to the Assembly at its fiftieth session and/or during the forty-ninth session, as required. The Assembly will hold a special commemorative meeting for the fiftieth anniversary at Headquarters from 22 to 24 October 1995.

In a second resolution adopted without a vote, the Assembly endorsed the creation of a United Nations Fiftieth Anniversary Coin Programme. It also endorsed the offer of the United Kingdom Royal Mint to manage that programme and requested the secretariat to make the necessary arrangements to implement it.

Special Representative Yasushi Akashi has expressed grave concern at the deterioration in the military situation in Sarajevo in recent days. He called attention to increasing violations of agreements regarding the Mount Igman demilitarized zone, the Sarajevo cease-fire and heavy-weapons exclusion zone, and the cessation of sniping. Saying he was particularly disturbed by the reported deaths of four civilians -- three of them children -- yesterday, he urged both warring parties to make every effort to avoid civilian casualties and provocative acts.

Mr. Akashi noted a general increase in the level of hostilities throughout Bosnia and Herzegovina, and appealed to the parties to refrain from military action which endangered safe areas and the civilians in them. He stressed that humanitarian agencies and the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) were doing everything possible to alleviate civilian suffering, and reiterated the need for the warring parties to accept a negotiated settlement to the conflict.

The United Nations today launched a revised inter-agency appeal for \$242 million to provide humanitarian assistance to the former Yugoslavia for the first six months of 1995. The appeal was issued jointly by the Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs, Peter Hansen, and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), Sadako Ogata. They noted that while some regions in Bosnia and Herzegovina were benefiting from a cessation of hostilities, civilians in other areas suffered harassment and insecurity, and were subject to ethnic expulsion. Those civilians were in extreme need of international protection and assistance, they said.

Refugees and internally displaced persons continue to need emergency assistance, particularly in Bosnia and Herzegovina and in the United Nations Protected Areas (UNPAs), according to the appeal. Continuing unrest and ethnic conflict in the Bihac pocket in northern Bosnia has resulted in fresh outflows of refugees, while the unsettled situation in eastern Bosnia could give rise to an exodus there. Meanwhile, assistance is still needed in Croatia, the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia (Serbia and Montenegro) and The former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, where the situation has stabilized somewhat.

The General Assembly yesterday elected the following 18 States to fill vacancies in the 54-member Economic and Social Council: Australia, Belarus, Brazil, Colombia, Congo, Cote d'Ivoire, India, Jamaica, Luxembourg, Malaysia, Netherlands,

Poland, South Africa, Sudan, Thailand, Uganda and United States. The new members will serve three-year terms, beginning on 1 January 1995.

The election was held to fill seats being vacated by Angola, Australia, Bangladesh, Belarus, Belgium, Benin, Brazil, Colombia, Ethiopia, India, Italy, Kuwait, Madagascar, Philippines, Poland, Suriname, Swaziland and the United States. States are eligible for immediate re-election.

The United Nations Special Commission on the disarmament of Iraq is so short of funds that it has started contingency planning for the incremental closure of its operations. In a letter to the President of the Security Council dated 3 November, the Executive Chairman of the Commission warned that if adequate funds were not received, non-resident inspection teams would cease to be deployed into Iraq on or about 15 December. Resident monitoring teams would gradually halt operations as personnel would not be replaced. Ongoing monitoring and verification support teams would not carry biological and chemical monitoring equipment into Iraq in December, and would begin to remove remote site cameras and other sensor equipment in January. Meanwhile, operational and analytical staff in New York would be dispersed.

The Special Commission and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) would continue to carry out their duties for as long as possible, and to seek the necessary funds, the Executive Chairman stressed. If operations and planning were to continue at the present level, \$5 million dollars would be needed in December. A total of \$25 million would be needed in 1995, including the \$5 million for December.

A proposal to deploy international police and/or military personnel to refugee camps in eastern Zaire will be presented to the Security Council within days, United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Sadako Ogata told the Third Committee (Social, Humanitarian and Cultural) today. Introducing reports on refugees and related issues, she said such a deployment, which had been agreed on yesterday at a meeting chaired by the Secretary-General, was needed because of insecurity in the camps. She added that the forces of the former Rwandese regime were endangering the lives of refugees and humanitarian workers, disrupting aid deliveries, and obstructing voluntary repatriation to Rwanda.

Yesterday, acting without a vote, the Third Committee approved a draft resolution on the right to self-determination and two drafts on the elimination of racial discrimination. By the draft on self-determination, the General Assembly would declare its firm opposition to acts of foreign military intervention, aggression and occupation. It would also call on States responsible to immediately cease their military intervention in, and occupation of, foreign territories and all acts of repression and maltreatment.

By another draft, States parties to the International Convention on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination would be urged to take measures to enable the entry into force of certain amendments to the Convention. Those amendments would

for the Secretary-General to provide for the effective performance of the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, which monitors implementation of the Convention. The other anti-racism text would have the Assembly request the Secretary-General to continue to ensure adequate financial arrangements to enable the Committee to function. It would also urge States parties to the Convention to accelerate their domestic ratification of the amendment concerning the Committee's financing.

NEEDS OF 16 MILLION REFUGEES AMONG ISSUES TO BE DISCUSSED AS
THIRD COMMITTEE BEGINS CONSIDERING QUESTIONS RELATING TO
REFUGEES AND DISPLACED PERSONS

The challenges posed by the increasing number and complexity of humanitarian emergencies as well as the needs of the world's 16.4 million refugees will be of central concern as the Third Committee (Social, Humanitarian and Cultural) this afternoon begins considering issues relating to humanitarian questions, refugees, returnees and displaced persons.

According to reports before the Committee, the number of persons of concern to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) has reached 23 million, including refugees as well as certain groups of internally displaced and others of humanitarian concern. It is estimated that by 1995, the cost of financing programmes to meet their needs will reach \$1,133,291,900.

Particular attention will be paid to the plight of women and children, who make up some 80 per cent of the world's refugee population. The UNHCR has implemented new measures to prevent sexual violence and to provide care for women who have been subjected to it. In emergency situations, refugee children should not be available for adoption, according to UNHCR's policy, which stipulates that any adoption of an unaccompanied child must be determined as being in the child's best interests, and must be carried out in accordance with applicable international law. One report points to concern that some evacuations are being undertaken without adequate registration and documentation, thus reducing the possibility of reuniting children with their families.

The UNHCR has been called upon to address the humanitarian needs of internally displaced persons in a number of situations, including Bosnia and Herzegovina, the Caucasus and parts of central Asia and Africa. Involuntary displacement of persons within their own countries is a problem of global dimensions, according to a conclusion of the Executive Committee of UNHCR, which stressed that such persons remain within the territorial jurisdiction of their own countries, and that the primary responsibility for their welfare and

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tection lies with the State concerned.

While some 1 million Mozambican refugees have been successfully repatriated in recent months, Africa continues to host 7.2 million refugees as well as 20 million internally displaced persons. It is reported that "unprecedented levels of hardship and suffering" prevail in many parts of the continent. In Somalia, the continuation of humanitarian operations is threatened by heightened insecurity caused in part by the scaling down of United Nations forces there. Assistance to Rwandese refugees and displaced persons has so far involved food commitments valued at over \$100 million. Political unrest and the worsening security situation in Liberia have led 50,000 persons to flee to neighbouring countries.

The UNHCR has continued to address the situation in the former Yugoslavia, which constitutes the "largest single group of persons in need of international protection worldwide", according to a report before the Committee. Another report deals with the consequences of the six-year conflict which has been raging in Nagorny Karabakh, stating that it has generated some 250,000 refugees from Armenia, along with an additional 658,000 people who are internally displaced. "Thus, close to a million refugees and displaced persons are now crammed into the houses of relatives, schools, collective farms, tents and thousands of makeshift shelters across Azerbaijan", the report states.

The five-year process of the International Conference on Central American Refugees (CIREFCA) was formally concluded this June, according to a report on that matter. In its place, a broad framework for sustainable human development has been adopted, which shifts the emphasis from short-term programmes to strategies for promoting human rights and democratic processes, eradicating poverty and social exclusion, and resolving the outstanding problem of populations uprooted as a result of the conflicts of the past decade.

Fourth report of the Multinational Force in Haiti
dated 7 November 1994

I. INTRODUCTION

1. Security Council resolution 940 (1994) authorizes "Member
States to form a multinational force (MNF) ... to use all
necessary means to facilitate the departure from Haiti of the
military leadership, consistent with the Governors Island
Agreement, the prompt return of the legitimately elected
President and the restoration of the legitimate authorities of
the Government of Haiti, and to establish and maintain a
secure and stable environment that will permit the
implementation of the Governors Island Agreement." The
resolution further requests States members of the
multinational force "to report to the Security Council at
regular intervals".

2. This is the fourth such report, summarizing multinational
force operations in Haiti from 20 October to 6 November 1994.
It reports the coalition's progress towards achieving the
objectives laid out in resolution 940 (1994).

II. SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS

3. At the end of its seventh week of operations, the force
level stands at about 16,500, with an additional 800

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international police monitors, representing troops and international police monitors from nearly 50 nations. The majority of the multinational force's operations continue to be centred in Port-au-Prince, but United States Special Forces troops have visited nearly 500 towns in the countryside and are in place at 27 sites outside the capital. Police monitors will soon expand their operations from Port-au-Prince, Cap Haitien and Les Cayes, into St. Mark, Gonaives and other locations.

4. The period from 20 October to 6 November was characterized by increased stability and security in Haiti as well as decreased Haitian-on-Haitian violence. Since the last report, there have been no attacks on multinational force personnel and no incidents in which multinational force personnel had to fire their weapons in self-defence. Multinational force operations have promoted a secure and stable environment, setting the stage for eventual transition to the United Nations Mission in Haiti (UNMIH). United Nations Special Representative Lakshar Brahmaj visited Haiti from 23 to 26 October to observe conditions on the ground.

5. The expansion of the multinational force into the outlying areas, including the larger cities, towns and villages, has assisted in maintaining stability throughout Haiti. The 1,35-person Bangladeshi battalion assumed the security missions for Port-au-Prince airfield, Fort Dimanche, the Haitian Sugar Company and Camp d'Application, taking over from United States forces. The Guatemalan contingent deployed to Cap Haitien and was immediately integrated into security operations by assuming the port security mission and conducting patrols. The Caribbean Community battalion continued to provide security at the Port-au-Prince port and for the ongoing repatriation operations of Haitians from Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

6. With input from the Government of Haiti, the multinational force is overseeing the dismantling of several companies of the Forces Armees d'Haiti. The weapons reduction and weapons buy-back programmes have resulted in well over 13,000 weapons and explosives being taken out of circulation. When provided with credible intelligence, the multinational force continues to conduct raids to confiscate weapons caches. Most of the confiscated and purchased weapons have been destroyed. The weapons buy-back programme has moved into a new phase, in which multiple buy-back sites will operate concurrently. The programme will receive more publicity, and the multinational force in outlying areas will be provided with funds to facilitate immediate payment for weapons offered.

7. The multinational force continues to detain Haitians who pose a threat to the Government of Haiti, or the United Nations personnel in Haiti. Of the 200 people detained to date, 32 are still being held. It is believed that other former army or paramilitary members have gone into hiding or left the country.

8. The establishment of an interim Haitian police force is on track. The employment of combined patrols by the Forces Armees d'Haiti, international police monitors and multinational force Military Police is proving effective in

Cap Haitien and Port-au-Prince. The Haitian police are visibly more confident and competent in the performance of their duties. The international police monitors are expanding their operations to the countryside, with security provided by multinational force assistance as needed and appropriate.

9. The International Criminal Investigative Training and Assistance Programme (ICITAP) completed the first class of the six-day transition course on 29 October, and the second class on 5 November, resulting in a total of over 700 graduates to be deployed in the Port-au-Prince area. Participants in the next several one-week classes will be recruited from the outlying areas. The plan for the permanent police academy is well-formulated and on schedule. Close coordination between the multinational force and UNMIH police commanders is ongoing.

III. ESTABLISHING A SECURE AND STABLE ENVIRONMENT

10. The last two weeks have seen exponential improvement in the security environment in Haiti. The multinational force in Haiti has succeeded in maintaining the environment necessary to facilitate the operation of the Government by the legitimately elected leaders while continuing infrastructure improvements to set the stage for the hand-over of operations to UNMIH. An important part of these improvements are the recently completed base camps, three in Port-au-Prince and one in Cap Haitien, which currently house multinational force troops and will eventually be turned over to UNMIH. In addition, close coordination and collaboration between the multinational force and the UNMIH advance team staff continue on a daily basis in an effort to smooth the transition from the multinational force to UNMIH.

11. Political developments have encouraged the trend towards stability and security. President Aristide continues to reach out to his former opponents, and has met with a large and inclusive range of leaders to discuss the timing of upcoming legislative elections. His nomination of a Prime Minister was another sign of progress. Agreement on an electoral commission will further the process considerably. A United Nations elections specialist has visited Haiti to assist with preparations.

12. The need for emergency humanitarian civil affairs projects has decreased somewhat. The multinational force civil affairs division will now assess humanitarian civil affairs projects and serve as a liaison between appropriate agencies. Recently, 30 civil affairs advisers were deployed to assist the United States Embassy/United States Agency for International Development and the Government of Haiti in planning and setting up functional government ministries.

13. Delivery of civilian fuel on 20 October in the Port-au-Prince area, and to outlying areas beginning 22 October, was a significant signal that Haiti is returning to economic normalcy. The return of fuel had an immediate impact on the local economies with the clear return of vendors to the markets and goods for sale. The streets and markets are open and crowded; traffic jams are routine. Local markets all over the country are functioning at a much higher level than in the recent past, as fears of crime and corruption have diminished.

3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

a. RPA the RPA continued to conduct patrols and mount road blocks throughout the country.

(i) In NDANGO (GR 5201), RPA are reported to have 3 persons of a HUTU family and wounding a 10 years old boy. They also abducted 3 other people from the same area. Locals in the camp vowed never to return to their villages as long as RPA remain in power.

(ii) In BUTARE (GR 6913), An RPA Officer is reported to have cut off power lines within BUTARE area. He also stopped a patrol from MALAWI Coy which was escorting ELECTROGAZ workers repairing power lines within BUTARE, He told the patrol not to escort NGO's close to RPA locations, NGO's should travel on their own.

(iii) In RUTAGARA area (GR 1919) north of GISENYI, RPA have increased their strength in the are following an incident which occurred on the night 29/30 Oct 94. They also asked locals to move 1 Km inside the country. However people are allowed to work in the field.

4. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS

5. ASSESSMENT

a. The feelings expressed by DPs in NDAGO camp indicate that some of the DPs (HUTUS) do not feel free to go back to their villages in fear of RPA. This may also apply to some refugees across the borders.

The Secretary-General's Special Representative for Rwanda, Shahryar M. Khan, had returned from a trip to Naara, United Republic of Tanzania, where he had visited the Benaco camp, which was the largest there, and had met with relief agency representatives and the Tanzanian district commissioner. They discussed the safety and status of refugees returning to Rwanda. While there was an element of intimidation in the camps in Tanzania, it was a much less serious problem than in Zaire: the situation in the Tanzanian camps had been described as much more stable.

A World Bank advance party had arrived in Rwanda, Mr. Sills continued. The rest of the party was expected to arrive on either 10 or 11 November. The World Bank had held a meeting in Paris on 27 October which focused on the need for bilateral funds to be made available to clear up the arrearages of Rwanda to the Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Under the regulations of those two organizations, they could not disburse any new loans until current arrearages had been paid. At that meeting, the need for immediate financing had been recognized.

The Commission of Experts investigating violations of international law in Rwanda was in the country this week, Mr. Sills said. Consideration of the draft resolution before the Security Council on the international tribunal on Rwanda, would be delayed for one week, due to concerns of the Government of Rwanda about the resolution and the disinclination of several members

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of the Council to change the draft resolution to meet the needs and complaints of that Government. As a result, the Director of the Office of the Legal Counsel and Deputy to the Legal Counsel, Ralph Zacklin, would travel to Rwanda to explain the resolution and statute to the Government there. It was a technical mission; he would not enter into any negotiations. He was expected to leave shortly and would return within a couple of days, as the Council wanted to act on the draft next Monday.

On Haiti, Mr. Sills said that the Secretary-General's Special Representative for that country, Lakhdar Brahimi, was in Washington, D.C., today for a private meeting at American University. He might also meet with United States officials; he was expected to return to New York this evening.

In that regard, Mr. Sills said that he had seen press reports, particularly one in the Canadian press, which had a headline that read: "UN Force's Fumble Key Task of Reforming Haiti's Police". He called that "really muddled reporting", as the United Nations and the United Nations Mission in Haiti (UNMIH) had not yet taken over from the multinational force, and until that happened, the United Nations was not involved in "reforming" Haiti's police. Therefore, it was difficult to understand how the United Nations was "fumbling". Such reports were not an accurate portrayal of the situation in Haiti.

Mr. Sills said that he could not yet confirm that the Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Mozambique, Aldo Ajello, would be meeting today with Mozambican President Joaquim Alberto Chissano and the Mozambique National Resistance Movement (RENAMO) President Atonso Dhlakama, although that meeting had been planned. However, the Special Representative was expected to make an interim, procedural statement on the elections today, although it was not expected to be a declaration regarding the freedom and fairness of the elections.

On Somalia, Mr. Sills said that General Mohamad Farah Aidid, leader of the Somalia National Alliance, had convened a national reconciliation conference today. The Secretary-General's Special Representative for Somalia, James

Victor Gbeho, had been invited to attend and address the conference but had declined. In today's briefing of the United Nations Operation in Somalia (UNOSOM II), Acting spokesman Eugene Forson had said that while not supporting the meeting convened today by the Somalia National Alliance and its allies, UNOSOM would keep the lines of communication open and maintain contact with all political factions in its continuing effort to bring about genuine national reconciliation. It was UNOSOM's view that any national reconciliation conference should be broad-based, representative and inclusive. Mr. Sills said that it was the United Nations's view that the conference which was being convened today did not meet those criteria.

Mr. Sills then referred to a question posed at yesterday's briefing on the report of the Office of Inspections and Investigations and the seeming inconsistency of the statement that millions of dollars had been saved by the interventions and recommendations of the Office and a table that appeared later in the report showing a total recovery of only \$418,000. He said that the two references were to two separate matters. The "millions of dollars" referred to savings resulting from the fact that, after the Office looked into problems in the procurement and contract areas, changes were made which resulted in large savings, but that the amount could not be quantified. The \$418,000 figure referred to funds that had been directly recovered on the basis of audits.

Mr. Sills then announced that a memorial service would be held at 5:30 p.m. today at the Church of the Covenant on East 42nd Street for former Under-Secretary-General Davidson S.H. Nichol, who had passed away last month.

Commenting on General Assembly activities, the spokesman for the Assembly President, Amadou Moustar Gueye, informed correspondents that this morning the plenary had continued its consideration of the report of the Security Council. The report had been introduced yesterday by the outgoing President of the Council, Sir David Hannay, the Permanent Representative of the United Kingdom. Yesterday, 16 countries had spoken and there were 15 on the list for today.

Mr. Gueye said that the 1994 United Nations Pledging Conference for Development Activities was under way in the Trusteeship Council Chamber. Statements regarding pledges were contained in documents A/CONF.173/2 and A/CONF.168/2/Corr.1. This afternoon, statements of pledges would be heard for the 1994 United Nations/Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) Pledging Conference for the World Food Programme (WFP), also in the Trusteeship Council Chamber. (See also Press Release DEV/2038-GA/8786.)

On forthcoming meetings, Mr. Gueye said the plenary would be discussing agenda item 39, the situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina, on Thursday morning, and not tomorrow, as had been originally scheduled. The General Committee was scheduled to meet on Friday, in order to consider a request for the inclusion in the agenda of an additional item, entitled, Capital Punishment (document A/49/234). That meeting had been postponed from last week.

Asked about an agreement that had been announced about a month ago between the Government of Zaïre and the Secretary-General's Special Representative to separate the former Rwandese military forces from the civilian refugee camps, Mr. Sills replied that that had been an agreement in principle, but it had not been possible to implement it yet. There had been a number of proposals that had recommended various options, which all seemed to have major problems, including costs and risks. For instance, one option was to request a Member State to conduct the action, but there would be great risk to its personnel, and it was not known which State would agree to undertake that task. The situation of the refugee camps, which was now the greatest problem, had not been solved.

In response to a question on what Rwanda's arrearages were to the World Bank, Mr. Sills said that he would check on that figure. Asked about where the money would come from to pay the World Bank, Mr. Sills repeated that it would have to be from a bilateral source, as the United Nations could not pay the arrearages and Rwanda could not take out a loan from the World Bank to repay an earlier loan from the Bank.

In response to a question about assistance to Serb refugees from

the Bihac
area. Mr. Sills said the UNHCR was continuing to provide food and other
assistance to them.

The Government of Angola and the National Union for the Total Independence of Angola (UNITA) yesterday initialled a comprehensive peace agreement in Lusaka. Welcoming that step, Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali said the upcoming military talks between the two sides must be quickly brought to a successful conclusion so that the Lusaka Protocol could be formally signed by mid-November. A long-lasting peace in Angola would be possible only on the basis of compromise, genuine national reconciliation, tolerance and security for all Angolans.

The Secretary-General strongly appealed to the parties to establish an effective cease-fire without delay, thus enabling the Security Council to restore the strength of the United Nations Angola Verification Mission (UNAVEM II) to its previous level. The cease-fire would also improve the delivery of humanitarian supplies to more than three million Angolans who were in desperate need of assistance.

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He paid tribute to Special Representative Alioune Blondin Beye for his patient efforts and hard work. He also expressed gratitude to the representatives of the three observer States -- the United States, Portugal and the Russian Federation -- and to the Heads of State of the sub-region for their invaluable aid in the search for peace in Angola.

The Security Council increasingly tends to consider as its domain certain issues which have nothing to do with the powers conferred on it by the United Nations Charter, the representative of Cuba told the General Assembly today as it concluded its consideration of the annual report of the Council. He said the Council's tendency to act as an autonomous body was extremely dangerous, given its power to impose sanctions or resort to the use of force.

The representative of New Zealand said the Charter did not assert that the General Assembly was the superior body and the Security Council a subordinate one. However, there was room for improving the relationship between the two organs within their respective constitutional roles. The representative of Japan joined several other speakers in stressing that the views of the Assembly should be reflected in the deliberations of the Council. Information on the Council's activities, particularly on the progress of its informal consultations, could be made more readily available to Member States.

Continuing his visit to Georgia, Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali today met with Prime Minister Otar Patsatsia. They discussed the question of refugees and displaced persons from Abkhazia and Georgia's economic crisis. The Prime Minister expressed regret at the lack of progress regarding the refugee situation. The Secretary-General recalled that the Georgian/Abkhaz talks under the aegis of Special Representative Edouard Brunner would resume in Geneva on 14 November, and expressed the hope that political advances would lead to progress on refugee questions.

The Secretary-General then met with Foreign Minister Alexander Chikvaidze, who expressed appreciation for the establishment of a United Nations office in Tbilisi in 1992. He later addressed the Parliament of Georgia, and was the guest of honour at a dinner offered by President Eduard Shevardnadze.

The mandate of the United Nations Observer Mission in El Salvador (ONUSAL) should be extended until 30 April 1995 in order to ensure that certain key provisions of the Salvadorian peace accords are fully implemented, according to the Secretary-General. In a report to the Security Council dated 31 October, he said the Mission's strength could be reduced to not more than 100 international staff. He added that he was exercising maximum suasion on the parties, both directly and through his Special Representative, to honour their commitments in full and promptly.

The Secretary-General said goals in the area of public security, particularly the disbandment of the National Police and the National Civil Police, could be attained in five months. United Nations military and police personnel would not be needed in El Salvador thereafter. It would then be possible to consider how best to approach the remaining verification duties, relating to such matters as institutional reforms in

the judiciary, the recommendations of the Commission on the Truth, and the reintegration programme. He noted the widely held view that the termination of ONUSAL should not mark the end of United Nations efforts to consolidate peace in El Salvador.

The Fourth Committee (Special Political and Decolonization) has said that the General Assembly should consolidate the role of the Committee on Information as its main body mandated to make recommendations relating to the work of the Department of Public Information (DPI). It took that action yesterday, by approving, without a vote, texts submitted by the Committee on Information on "United Nations public information policies and activities" and on "information in service of humanity". It also approved a draft decision by which the Assembly would increase the Information Committee's membership from 83 to 88 and would appoint Belize, Croatia, Czech Republic, Kazakhstan and South Africa as new members.

The text on United Nations information policies would have the Assembly encourage the Joint United Nations Information Committee to continue its consideration of the status of Development Forum. It would ask the DPI to ensure that its publications fill an identifiable need, avoid duplication and be produced in a cost-effective manner. The Assembly would reaffirm the importance attached to the role of United Nations information centres and its own role in relation to the opening of new centres. It would express its full support for the wide and prompt coverage of United Nations activities through United Nations press releases in both working languages of the Secretariat.

The Assistant Secretary-General for Public Information, Samir Sanbar, said that in its search for innovative and cost-effective means of delivering the United Nations message, the DPI would be greatly assisted by the statements made in the Fourth Committee. The Department would make every effort to meet the expectations of Member States through the efforts of a dedicated staff who were now mobilized to work closely with them in communicating an effective and coherent message.

Senior staff responsible for contracting and procurement should be made to submit financial disclosure statements to guard against conflicts of interest and other abuses of the enlarged authority being granted to them by United Nations reforms, the United States representative told the Fifth Committee (Administrative and Budgetary) yesterday. He made that comment as the Committee continued its review of United Nations efficiency, and began considering financial statements and reports of the United Nations Board of Auditors.

The representative of India said the group of experts invited by the Secretariat to review United Nations procurements and establish a competitive and fair process must be drawn from all geographical regions. The results of its work should be made available to Member States. Germany, speaking for the European Union and Austria, said the Committee for Programme and Coordination (CPC) and the Fifth Committee deserved credit for their persistent advice to a reluctant Secretariat on the need for the highest standards of managerial competence.

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DAILY PRESS BRIEFING. 1 November 1994

The Spokesman for the Secretary-General, Joe Sillis, began today's noon briefing by informing correspondents that a press release had been issued earlier detailing the Secretary-General's activities during Monday, 31 October, the first day of his trip to Georgia. Those included his meeting with the Georgian Head of State, Eduard Shevardnadze, at which there had been a discussion of the situation in Abkhazia, Georgia, and the role of the United Nations Observer Mission in Georgia (UNOMIG). They had also discussed United Nations development and humanitarian programmes, and the observance in Georgia of the fiftieth anniversary of the United Nations. Later in the day, the Secretary-General visited the offices of the United Nations system in Tbilisi, where he addressed the staff. (See Press Release SG/T/1903.)

Today, the Secretary-General held a meeting with Georgia's Prime Minister, Otar Patsatsia, in which they discussed the question of refugees and displaced persons from Abkhazia, and the Georgian economic crisis. The Prime Minister expressed his Government's regret at the lack of progress in the refugee situation. The Secretary-General recalled that the Georgian/Abkhaz talks under the aegis of his Special Representative for Georgia, Edouard Brunner, would resume in Geneva on 14 November, and expressed the hope that advances in the political area would result in progress on refugee questions.

Continuing, Mr. Sillis said that the Secretary-General then met with the Foreign Minister, Alexander Chikvaдзе, and discussed the United Nations programmes in Georgia and the plans for the fiftieth anniversary observance. He then visited the Centre for International Research on East-West Relations, which had elected him as an honorary member. There, the Secretary-General delivered an acceptance speech devoted to peace-keeping operations. He then went to Mtskheta, and visited the Svetitskhoveli Cathedral, which is on the "World Heritage" list of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), and paid a call on the Patriarch of all Georgia, Ilia II.

Tonight, the Secretary-General would attend a dinner given

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in his honour by Mr. Shevardnadze, and tomorrow, he would leave for Yerevan, Armenia. Further details were contained in a press release that would be available shortly, Mr. Sills added.

The Secretary-General's statement to the 1994 United Nations Pledging Conference for Development Activities taking place today at Headquarters would also be available shortly, Mr. Sills said. That statement would be delivered by Ismat Kittani, Special Adviser to the Secretary-General.

The Secretary-General's report on the United Nations Observer Mission in El Salvador (ONUSAL) (document S/1994/1212) had been issued, Mr. Sills continued. In that report, the Secretary-General recommends to the Security Council the extension of the mandate of the Mission until 30 April 1995. He states that by that date that part of its functions that required military and police personnel would have been completed. Before the Mission's termination, he would present to the Council his thoughts on mechanisms to maintain continuing United Nations verification as well as technical assistance programmes, electoral assistance and other support that would contribute to the political and social stability of El Salvador.

On Angola, Mr. Sills said that the agreement had been initialled in Lusaka yesterday. A formal proclamation ceremony would be held today. The two delegations would then depart Lusaka to return to Huambo and Luanda. As stated in the Secretary-General's recent report on the United Nations Angola Verification Mission (UNAVEM II), D+2 -- the day of initialling plus two days, would be tomorrow. The meetings of the military commanders that had been scheduled to begin at that time would be convened later, possibly Monday, 7 November.

The issues they would deal with would not be easy to resolve: there was still a great deal to be negotiated. The day of the full signing of the Lusaka Protocol would be D+15, and D+17 would be the day for the formal cease-fire to go into effect. While there had been tremendous progress in Angola, and the initialling of the agreement had been a great step forward, there was still a lot to be done. It had been disconcerting to receive reports that fighting was intensifying in certain parts of the country, and there seemed to be no inclination to observe a cease-fire before the date it was set to go into effect, despite the Secretary-General's appeal.

The Security Council did not have any meetings planned for today, Mr. Sills said. It was the first day of the Presidency of the United States, and traditionally, the new President conducted bilateral negotiations for the first couple days of the month.

On the former Yugoslavia, Mr. Sills said that the Bosnian Government's offensive continued in the Bihac pocket and east of Mount Ioman. Sarajevo airport was open and the humanitarian airlift was continuing, in spite of the small arms attack that he had mentioned at yesterday's briefing. Yesterday, 24 flights of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), 4 of the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR), and one plane of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) landed there. Also, the UNHCR land convoys had delivered almost 1,000 metric tons of humanitarian aid.

However, the situation in the eastern enclaves continued to worsen due to the lack of food and fuel stocks.

Yesterday, the Spokesman's Office had made available a press release issued by the the Secretary-General's Special Representative for the Former Yugoslavia and Chief of Mission of UNPROFOR, Yasushi Akashi, on All Saint's day, which was today. On this occasion, visits to family graves took place in six separate locations in the zone of separation in the United Nations Protected Area (UNPA) Sector South, with several hundred people escorted by UNPROFOR.

The area of the Bihac pocket remained tense, and the situation there had been described as potentially destabilizing. Mr. Sills continued. The situation on the new confrontation line was unclear because that line had moved out of the range where UNPROFOR had freedom of movement. Mr. Akashi was meeting today with Bosnian Vice-President, Enko Ganic.


4. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS

b. MILOBs patrolled the area of GIKUNDAMBURA (GR 9309) and found about 3000 refugees from BURUNDI. They are reported to have fled from the fighting in BURUNDI and are in desperate need of food and tentage.

5. ASSESSMENT

a. The 3058 refugees who have fled to RWANDA from BURUNDI would appear to indicate that the level of violence in BURUNDI has increased. Recent reports from BURUNDI have indicated that tension is at a high level but our only source of information from this area is the sporadic reports received from NGOs. Should the violence continue then RWANDA can expect to receive a large number of Burundian refugees which would place a corresponding burden on the humanitarian effort in those sectors bordering BURUNDI.
