In conference with Colonel Niller, Colonel Cottrell, and Miss Grant Glass this morning, it was decided that a change would be made in the position of murse at the UNRRA Children's Home, Bad Schallerbach. The responsibility for this will rest with the Mursing Division and Miss Grant Glass is getting in touch with Miss Visscher. I had mentioned the fact that Miss Bretoi said Mrs. Uchman had mursing experience and I tried to find her personnel record, but was unable to. It must be in the personnel office in Salzburg. Miss Grant Glass is suggesting that Miss Visscher look into her qualifications as a possible person to use. However, Hiss Grant Glass and I are agreed that any person who is employed must be interviewed by the administrative staff of the home from the point of view of an integrated overall programme. Below is a copy of report on my visit to Bad Schallerbach Childrens Home.

BAD SCHALLERBACH CHILDRENS HOLE. Present population 54 children included 42 babies 6 months to 32 years. Very satisfactory diet is Present population 54 children received from Austrian Authorities with adequate supplies of milk , but there is at present a shortage of fresh vegetables. There is an UNRRA nurse attached too the team though her relations with other members of the team are not particularly happy. An UNRRA doctor visits the home once weekly . This doctor is not particularly trained in paediatrics and alternative medical arrangements have been discussed with the Acting Director of the team. In case of emergency, the local village doctor is called in . In addition, there is a good Austrian childrens hospital in the wicinity with a trained paedistrician. The Acting Director of the Team has been asked to ascertain whether this woman would be willing to run a regular twice monthly babies school childrens health clinic at the home. If she is willing to undertake this, it is strongly recommended that this appointment be made. For dental services , the children attend a local village dentist , and all children have been examined once by him. Medical records kept at this childrens home are not satis factory , the UNRRA doctor at present supervising the Home will shortly be declared redundant and a new doctor will be appointed to supervise and to arrange for the keeping of adequate resords. At Present the Home is somewhat overcrowded , but it is hoped to take over a new building any day to which older children and some of the staff can be moved , allowing for better spacing of the babies . Owing to present shortage of electricity , there is great shortage of water on the upper floors , but the older children go to the sulfur baths in he village twice weekly . All the children appeared well , happy and full of good spirits , and are taken out into the fresh air even during the winter at least every second day. As soon as the weather becomes warmer a very fine sun balcony will be put into use. It was stated that there is also some shortage of cups and spoons at this Home as at Leoben.

UNRRA Nurse Miss Grant Glass, Chief Nurse Austrian Mission, asked me to discuss with Miss Wilhelmina Visscher, Chief Nurse US Zone, what the duties were of the UNRRA Nurse who is a member of the Children's Home Team 314, Bad Schalle Abach. At present, Miss Nettle is the UNRRA Nurse on the team. It should be known that she is not only a nurse but is also responsible for the total training and care of the younger group of children up to the age of six, Miss Visscher and I outlined her duties as follows: A. Prevention of illness of children and staff: 1. General hygiene, children and staff; 2. Supervision of cleanliness within home; 3. Care of dispensary; 4. Isolation for newcomers, etc. 5. Immunization. Training and Care of small children under six. C. Training and supervision of nurses aides in care of small children. D. Contact with children who are hospitalized, and E. Supervision of children's diets. Miss Wilhelmina Visscher and I decided it would be wise to visit the Children's Home together. This we did on November 26th. The purpose was to discuss with the UNRRA Staff members at the Children's Home their various duties. It happened that during our visit we met Doctor Samuel Kanarienstein at the home and he joined in the meeting. We reviewed briefly with the staff Miss Nettle's duties and the Welfare Officer's duties which are as follows: 2. Welfare Officer A. Reception and billeting of children, clothing for all children, recreation, education of children and staff, individual case records, and household maintenance and staff. There is some question as to whether or not the murse or the Welfare Officer should be responsible for messing. It was decided at the time being that the nurse should assume this responsibility. 3. Director Owing to the shortage of time, duties of the Director were discussed very briefly. 5. Messing Officer

It was suggested at this meeting that a Messing Officer visit the Children's Home to set up moves, check on preparation of food and calories. This point was later discussed with the Zone Nutritionist who arranged for the Messing Officer of Team 337 to visit the Children's Home at regular intervals. After discussing the duties and responsibilities of the Resident UNRRA Staff in the Children's Home - Mr. Bialuski and Miss Nettle and Miss Bretoi and the Visiting Staff, Doctor Kanarienstein and Mr. Meres, Messing Officer, consideration was given to the importance of a daily staff meeting so that information would be passed from the Director to the Staff; also the numbers of household staff was discussed.

6. Household Staff , nurses - aides.

With small children under three, it was considered essential to have one nurses, aide to every five children. At the present time, this age group requires nine nurses' aides, a fully trained night nurse, and a fully trained truth day nurse was also considered essential. In the kindergarten, children from 2-5 hat would be cared for and two persons should be in charge of the kindergarten.

To facilitate To facilitate work and to give assurance to members of the staff, a daily schedule and weekly schedule indicating duty and time off was suggested to be posted on the Bulletin Board.

> It was considered important that provision be worked out for recreational facilities for members of the staff. Since there was additional space in Bad Schallenbach, this seemed easy to organize. The nearest town is Wels which is 17 kilometers. Because of the length of the meeting and the bad weather conditions, Miss Visscher and I did not have an opportunity to visit Bad Schallenbach, the new Children's Home, which at one time was a "kurhaus". It is beautifully located, gets the maximum amount of sun in a small rural village, and is 7 kilometers from Pichl where a group of children was found. The village people today have been most helpful and there is stationed at Bad Schallenbach a group of 250 soldiers who are receiving special training. The Children's Home is on the military line and also has a civilian telephone so that communication is easier.

September 3rd a request was sent to Mr. Haverstick, Area II Director, for requisitioning property suitable for winter quarters. Goisern, Park Hotel had been located by me as the most suitable place for a Children's Home, as Mr. Greely, Billeting Officer failed to find anything adequate elsewhere. 2. September 6, following our conversation with Mr. Corkery and Mr. Bugelli regarding the move, I submitted all the information about the requirements to the Salzburg Office, attention Mr. Greely. 3. Mr. Greely then contacted the US Army and Military Government for authority to proceed with the acquisition of the property. 4. With the understanding that UNRRA approved the move and repairs to the buildings, I proceeded to prepare the hotel for occupation before the cold weather set in. 5. Exlectober 8 Col. Ross visited bensee and disapproved the transfer of the Children's Home from Rindbach to G isern as he felt that it was too far from supply channels and could never have approved such a move had be been aware of such a plan. 6. October 9 1 was instructed by IMERA Offices Salzburg and Linz that it was absolutely necessary for me to accept one of a number of places suggested by the US Army. 7. Following day after contacting Mr. Sewell Field Supe visor Linz I visited Col. Ryan, who informed me that a Kurhotel in Gallspach should be inspected by me as a prospective children's home. 8. October 11, after having Miss Bretoi, my Welfare Officer, examine the building, I notified Col. Ryan that I found little repair to the hotel necessary and as the weather forced me to move the home as soon as possible, I wanted his assurance that we could have it without any further difficulty and that we could look for assistance from the Army with regard to fuel and other needs that could not be fulfilled by UNRRA Or authorised Austrian sources. 9. Messrs. Bugelli and Sewell were immediately informed of Col. Ryan's assurance to assist. Mr. Greely was delegated to take inventory and make the necessary requisitions. 10. The Gallspach Buergermeister and local tradesmen cooperated and agreed to start the required repairs immediately. Some of the work is already under way. (Signed) Rudolph L. SUBJECT: Movement of Children's Home from Ebensee to Goisern.

According to prociedure set forth in an statement dated June 6th Mr. BIALUSKI, director of the Children's Home reported in writing to his immediate Superior area director Mr. HVERSTICK, that the Children's Home at Ebensee would move to Goisern. In view of the merger of Area I & II, Mr. Havenstick forwarded this correspondence pertaining to the move to U.S. UNRRA Zone director.

The move from Ebensee was necessitated for the following

reasons.

1. The house was not planned for winter quarters.

2. Consumption of fuel would be very great in order to keep

the place warm. 3. Extensive stove repairs were necessary as well as major

roof repairs. 4. The building is in the shadow of the mountain so therefore

gets no sun. 5. The building proved to be too small for the present number

of children. It lacked proper isolation facilities.

At present there is a waiting list of children who cannot accomodated to lack of space.

The Goisern building offer adequate space, proper heating

and a good exposure.

In a memo written by Mr. John C.L. Andreassen, dated June 6th 1946 (see enclosed copy) it was purposed that the person in charge of Villa Mendelsohn be designated as Deputy Director of the Ebenses Team. On July 15th it was purposed to UNRRA - Director of Area 2 Mr. Haverstick that the UNRRA staff of the Children s Home become a separate Team and accordingly on Aug. 16th this was approved but to date has not been confirmed. On Sept. 28th I checked into this matter when in Vienna and discussed that Children s Home staff was to be given Team No. 314 but that official confirmation of this action had not yet been made. I would like to recommend that when confirmation is received regarding establishing the Children s Home staff into a Team that the following personnel actions be made: 1.) Mr. Bialuski as Director should be gradel0 At present he is classified as Deputy Director grade9. " continuation"

It is my opinion that at the time he was designated as Deputy Direc-

- 2.) Miss Bretoi principal Welfare Officer grad 10 remain unchanged.
- 3.) Miss Nettl be opgraded to grad 8. It is my understanding that her automatic increase due last April will be effective forthwith and that her upgrating to 8 will be effective as of July 1st 1946.

Beside the 3 UNRRA staff there are four Class II employeepositions with the following designations and budgetlines set up as of August 15th 1946.

At present budgetline EB 3 is filled by Mrs. Uchman - Tuska and Mr. Uchman is House father EB 4. They have been at the Childrens Home since July 1st and to date have received no payment. This matter was discussed with Mr. Turner, Vienna C.H.Q. who stated they would both be placed on September payroll. At present there are two vacancies which will be filled in the near future.

Director, Mr. Rudy Bialuski; Welfare Officer, Miss Viorica Bretoi; Nurse, Miss Nettl. Although this matter has been approved, confirmation has not yet been received in the field. Since two members of the staff at this time are being reclassified. From: Subject: Purchase of Winter Apples for Children's Home, Ebensee Supplemental Diet. 1. Probably Miss Brownlee spoke to you about the possibility of a ton of winter apples being obtained locally costing approximately 80 groschein a kilo, the total costing 1190 Schillings. This seemed to be a wise purchase for it did supplement the dildren's diet with something fresh and green. I talked this matter over in Salzburg with Supply and the Mutritionist. In the absence of Mr. Bugelli, I referred it to Miss Brownlee. This morning I had a chance to talk to Mr. Adrien, DP Supply, who told me there was no emergency found for such purchase. I talked with Mrs. Starr who is familiar with the nutrition situation at Ebensee. She said that the children's diet is fairly well balanced. She strongly advised the purchase of any apples and considered that the Children's Home was not in such a good position to get supplemental fresh food and fruit as were the camps; For it was her experience that most of the families in the camps were able to exchange and pick up fresh food etc. to supplement their daily diet. The Children's Home does a little exchanging, but this will soon come to an end. 2. It had been my thought that what was good for the Children's · Home was good for all children and I did not wish to request an exception, but if the camp diet on the whole is slightly better them I would like to recommend expenditure of funds for winter apples which would benefit the children during November, December, January, and February. "EBENSEE CHILDREN'S HOME - UNRRA"- Sept. 6, 1946

On Saturday, August 31st, we examined the 50 odd children at present in the Centre, some of them had arrived only the previous day from Braumau. Some 4 or 5 were absent, in hospital or attending for dental treatment elsewhere.

Practically all the children show evidence of previous ricketts, excepting 7 or 8 older children, but the 40 old under 4 years all showed evidence of deformity of bones. All were somewhat over neurished with prominent bellies and pronated feet; there is, however, no evidence of any active deficiency diseases other than anemia at present. Remarkably there is no dental caries whatever in the group 3 years old and under, though there is dental caries in the 5 and 6 year old group.

The diet seemed adequate containing a liter of milk for each child per day.

The Home seems adequately staffed with the 3 UNRIA personnel and 22 Class II employees. The UNRIA personnel in particular seemed extremely been, the children show complete confidence in them, and are for the most part decidedly extrevert in manner. The equipment of the Home seems adequate other than some shortages of toys for indoor play. The building seems well adapted though somewhat overcrowded as regards sleeping accommodation for a summer colony. However, they propose moving to a larger centrally heated hotel for the winter.

Some of the children did show evidence of emotional disturbances, apprehension and crying, I child has rather severe night terrors; on the whole no more emotional disturbances than one would find in any protected divilian group of the same age, if anything less so; they are now receiving a good deal of T.L.C. and responding adequately.

The new group brought in the previous day from Braumau show some scabies and impetige all with some old ricketts in spite of the administration of Vitamin D the previous winter, though none now active.

This too I consider to be a very creditable improvement but feel that these children are fit to be repatriated as soon as possible, so that they may develop their emotional stability and sense of security more rapidly in permanent surroundings in their own countries.

SUBJECT : Children's Centres - Leoben and Ebensee.

Following your request, I paid a short visit to the UNERA Children's Centres at Leoben and also at Ebensee on August 29th and 31st respectively.

LEOBEN.

Doctor Smith and I were very kindly received by the Staff and between us did a combined physical and mutritional survey. I found the children happy, inresponsive, well fed, showing no evidence of any deficiency diseases and at present adequately clothed. Some of the children showed evidence of scabies and a great number of them showed the prominent abdomen frequently associated with a high carbohydrate diet. Many showed evidence of healed ricketts but there were no cases of active ricketts.

The physical surroundings in the Home seemed good, the accommodation adequate, bedding and food satisfactory and the staff very interested in what they were doing. The physician of the Home had apparently just arrived an a young Yugoslav doctor who qualified only a year or two ago at Zagreb.

I would concur that all the children are fit to be repatriated, though there are 4 who require prolonged orthopeadic care and 1 other who will require plastic surgery. However, as it is my belief that the National Governments of the individual countries should have the determining voice in their care after repatriation, I would respectfully recommend that these children be repatriated as soon as it is feasible.

We also visited another children's camp which had recently repatriated 90 of the children to Poland and had only some 25 remaining. All these adolescents appeared small for their age but adequately nourished, bright and cheerful and showed no evidence of disease on cursory inspection.

The staff of 5 UMRRA and 25 Class II employees impressed me as being somewhat expensive for so few. Mrs. Klok expressed a good deal of satisfaction over the efficiency of the Unit, which is quite pardonable. I did feel, however, that she was showing a rather excessive amount of indiscriminate affection to the children who have admittedly been in need of this evidence of security. The nurse seemed extremely capable, had a well established M.I. room and afforded us a great deal of co-operation.

It was kind of Mr. Cherry - the Child Welfare Officer for the British Zone - to meetus and give us his time and help.

On the whole the Leoben Children's Camp seems a very successful venture, though I would hazard the opinion that it is not our function to convert this into a permanent establishment.

EBENSEE.

Here we were very kindly received by Mr. Baliuski who is in charge of the Children's Camp for UNRRA, Miss Nettl, the nurse, and Miss Bretoi the Welfare Officer and we were given very comfortable billets.

On Saturday, August 31st, we examined the 50 off children at present in the Centre, some of them had arrived only the previous day from Braunau. Some 4 or 5 were absent, in hospital or attending for dental treatment elsewhere.

The Children's Home at Ebensee was planned primarily for Polish children. They were a special problem because the first group were taken from the influence of the Polish Red Cross 2nd Corps, which operated in the UNERA Camp at Hellbrunn, and which was known to have influenced the children against repatriation. Most of the children had been for several years in German and Austrian institutions, and some spoke no Polish at all.

In order to make repatriation possible and provide a transition period for the children it was thought essential to have Polish staff recommended by the Warsaw Government. Accordingly staff was secured through the Repatriation Mission in Vienna. When the first members were screened on May 10 1946, we were advised by Personnel that Class II employees (Mr. Andreassen had decided teachers should be Class II) were to be employed by the Area Office and that our responsibility in Central Headquarters was only to secure travel for them, which was done.

The difficulties of administration of the Home as between Team Area and Central Headquarters have been very great. They culminate in the fact that no Class II employees have been paid at all, nor have any staff supposed to be on the Burgomeister's payroll been paid.

We now find that Dr. Boba is returning to Poland on the transport which leaves August 10. He has received no salary - he has paid his own money for various small things for the children. He has been working practically 24 hours a day as he lived at the Home and was primarily responsible for the children. It is largely he who is responsible for the fact that the older children now ask when they too may go to Poland.

It is a tragedy in our relationships with a member nation, if we permit him to leave Austria with no compensation.

May we request approval for payment of all Class II (teaching) employees?

Arrangements had been made by me through the Buergermaister of Ebensee on 26 April 1946 for the exchange of the Seehetel, Rindbach to UNERA Team 313 Ebensee. The Meriangasthof which was being utilized by the UNERA Team for Displaced Persons was to be turned over to the Buergermeister so that the inhabitants of the Seehetel, mostly displaced persons could be billeted there without causing any difficulties in the removal of these people.

The Sechotel is needed for billeting the staff, which is required for maintaining the Children's Center in Villa Mendelsohn, Rindback. The Buergermeister could suggest the Sechotel as the only premises now available and suitable by virtye of its proximity to the Children's Center.

The Mariengesthof itself is too distant from the Children's Home to be of any use and with transportation difficulties always arising, a place closer to the Center is required as soon as possible, so that space necessary for Children at the Home will not have to utilized for staff.

The owner of the Hotel, who, it is claimed is still a strong Nazi, has refused to accept the Buergermeister's suggestion and demands a Military order before she will release her place for UNERA use.

The Area Director, Mr. Cornwall, states in his report -

"Reports of Area Medical Officer, Area Nurse and Area Nutritionist indicate lack of coordination between the Child Welfare Specialists and other UNITA personnel with the result that health sanitary and welfare standards are below normal."

The Medical Officer does not mention the Children's Home, the Nutritionist's report is not included, but the Area Nurse reports -

"Rindbach:

After 2 months' UNRRA work at Rindbach the orphanage has not improved at all. There is no school, there are no team games, adolescents are lying in bed in the afternoon, rooms are still in disorder, mess, play rooms are dusty, and they are only now beginning to prepare rooms for babies and brothers expected from Brauman and Pischl."

Miss Grant Glass, Central Headquarters, made a competent and acceptable report on this matter relating to the same visit. I consider these comments from Area II unprofessional and incompetent, and only slightly related to the nursing function. Miss Geraldine Aves, Director of Child Welfare from E.R.O., reported this month favourably on the general care of the children and particularly upon the fine approach of the Director to child welfare problems and his understanding of what is important in the lives of children.

He should, however, have the privilege of using certain team services so long as the team is there or able to render them. These might include billeting and messing of some or all staff, maintenance of transport (Homes should have own transport), supply, incidental labor (not maintenance staff) and medical care. SUBJECT Arrangements had been made by me through the Buergermeister of Ebensee on 26 April 1946 for the exchange of the Seehotel, Rindbach, to UNRRA Team 313 Ebensee. The MariengastHof which was being utilized by the UNRRA Team for Displaced Persons was to be turned over to the Buergermeister so that the inhabitants of the Seehotel, mostly displaced persons, could be billeted there without causing any difficulties in the removal of these people. The Seehotel is needed for billeting the staff which is required for maintaining the Children's Center in Villa Mendelsohn, Rindbach. The Buergermeister could only suggest the Seehotel as the only premises now available and suitable by virtue of its proximity to the Children's Center. The Mariengasthof itself is too distant from the Children's Home to be of any use and with transportation difficulties always arising, a place closer to the Center is required as soon as possible, so that space necessary for children at the Home will not have to be utilized for staff. The owner of the "otel who, it is claimed is still a stonch Nazi, has refused to accept the Buergermeister's suggestion & and deminds a Military order before the will release her place for UNRRA use. Contact was made with Lt. Miller, Real Estate Department, 42 Div., Linz, for authority to requisition the above mentioned premises but he informed me that any new property that was requisitioned by the Military had to have the approval of Col. SUBJECT We have been informed that we must now communicate directly with USFA Engineers for approval to requisition the "Seehotel", Mindbach near Ebensee. This extra-procedure after our correspondence with you and Area II Headquarters is causing much delay in carrying out our operations efficiently. Please consult our request of May 21 and 22 for detailed information. The fellowing information has been requested. 1. The "Seehotel" is required for the billeting of staff, mainly Displaced Persons, which is employed for the maintenance of the Children's Center in Villa Mendelssohn, Rindbach. 2. Approximately 15 persons will occupy the premises. The kitchen facilities are adequate and necessary for providing messing separate from the children's mess at the Villa Mendelssohn. 3. The hotel is approximately 400 m or about a 5 Min. walk from the Children's Center and is within easy reach in case of emergency. Staff billeting here would also not require the transport which is so difficult to provide regularly. 4. Present occupants of the hotel are the families of 2 engineers comprising 9 members, several transient personnel and also several families of Viennise Displaced Persons (approximately 14 people.) We have at present 20 children in the Ebensee camp and ten more will be admitted next week, and 20 more in a matter of two - three week's time. Rations can only be drawn on the strength of children already in the institution. It is extremely important that we have a reasonable quantity of food in reserve, so that there will always be sufficient food to meet any emergencies and to supply their rations for a matter of two or three days' time ofth anisaion. With the reduction in team personnel it will be increasingly difficult to move quickly on any urgent problem such as food. I understand from Miss Brownlee that in Groedig there were a number of barrels containing boxes in the shape in which the Red Cross packages had to be broken down, and there are quantities of cans and packages of single items that would serve as this reserve basis in Ebensee. I would strongly recommend that immediate action be taken to make these available to the Ebensee Children's Center. Most of these children are Polish children and have been benefitting from the contributions of the Polish Red Cross London, which is extremely critical of our ability to provide for the children properly. here west. 10th April 1946. Mrs. N. West, Chief Welfare Officer. SUBJECT: Personnel for Children's Home. We have secured the promise of the military release of Villa Mendelssohn in Rindbach, Enensee. After considerable discussion with both the Ebensee team and the Area Office, we think that the necessary UNRRA staff will be a Director, a Welfare Officer, and a Supply Officer. This staff will be semi attached to the Ebenses team, upon which it will depend for certain services such as transport, supply, medical and nursing and so forth. The other staff we hope will be of the national group, which will be largely Polish. We have taken steps in the Area for the release of Rudolph Bialewski, now Welfare Officer at Ried Camp, to be Director. This was cleared verbally with Mr. Andreassen yesterday. At that time he stated that a team could be set up without budget lines if it had the approval of Relief Services. We should also like to ask for the appointment of Miss Viorica Bretoi as Welfare Officer. We should like these transfers to be made immediately, as we hope that Mr. Bialauski will report this week for duty if the Army has released the building.
