CYPRUS: Mineral Resources Development

Mission Report of D.A. Harkin, Technical Adviser, 17-20 July 1975

1. This mission was undertaken in response to a request made during a June visit to United Nations Headquarters of Mr. Y. Hadjistravrinou, Director of Geological Survey, and later asked for officially through the UNDP office in Nicosia. Discussion of the possibility of United Nations technical co-operation in the investigation of bentonitic clays in the southern part of Cyprus was the major reason for the visit.

2. The writer arrived in Cyprus (Larnaca airport) from Athens early in the morning of 17 July and departed for Turkey (via Beirut) on the morning of 20 July. The day 17 July was taken up in preliminary talks with Mr. D.K. Biswas, Acting UNDP Resident Representative, and Mr. C. Wijnen, Assistant Resident Representative, and in technical discussions with Mr. Hadjistravrinou, Mr. A. Panayotou (economic geologist) and Mr. S. Afrodisis (hydrogeologist) in the Geological Survey Department. Accompanied by these Geological Survey officers, a field trip to an area of major interest for bentonite north of Paphos was undertaken on 18 July and a project document and expert job description were drafted on 19 July, after further discussions with Mr. Biswas. These were left for review and completion by Mr. Hadjistravrinou, thereafter discussion of the contents with the Government Planning Bureau and the UNDP office. Formal submission may be expected shortly.

3. Stated briefly, clays with bentonitic affinities are common in certain formations of the Cretaceous sediments in Cyprus but until recently were not considered to be of commercial quality. Extensive deposits of higher grade bentonitic clays are now known, on the basis of field and laboratory investigations, to have a considerable economic potential, and a small bentonite mining and processing operator has already obtained orders for drilling mud use in Syria and Kuwait.

4. The Geological Survey Department's exploration and assessment investigations of the several areas of interest, where large tonnages of easily extractable (by opencast) bentonitic clays are undoubtedly present, cannot be advanced without the special laboratory equipment and mineral engineering expertise necessary for testing the material from the various deposits and determining its suitability in terms of the several major commercial uses for bentonite products - drilling mud in oilfield drilling, oil industry decolorizer, bonding agent in moulding sands and iron ore pelletizing, etc.

5. Marketing possibilities can be explored more extensively when this information becomes available as well as priority assigned to economic feasibility assessment of specific deposits. UNDP assistance in provision of the laboratory equipment and the services of one expert and certain consultant services, are being sought in order to establish a Geological Survey Department capacity for the technological testing required by the overall programme. The project "Development of Bentonitic Clay and Umber Resources," as the title implies, will also pay some attention to umber resources. Specialist advice is here required with the objective of maximizing processing of this material prior to its export from Cyprus.

6. The UNDP and counterpart project budgets could not be finalized during the writer's short visit but must await joint discussions of the Director of Geological Survey with the Government Planning Bureau and the UNDP Resident Representative within the next week. The UNDP contribution is expected to be around \$50,000. The project duration has been entered as one year and four months from 1 September 1975, when the necessary equipment would be requisitioned. Expert services would be scheduled for the first quarter of 1976 when the equipment would be available for installation and test-work begin.

7. The mission was greatly facilitated by the assistance and courtesies extended by the Director of Geological Survey and his staff and by the Acting Resident Representative and other UNDP office personnel in Nicosia.

Subject: Technical Co-operation among Developing Countries

I refer to your letter dated 17 April 1975 regarding the implementation of the UN General Assembly Resolution No. 3521 and drawing the the attention of all concerned in particular to the recommendations contained in paragraphs 43, 44 and 45.

We have been informed by the Government that expert services in most fields within UNOTC's responsibility would be available in Cyprus. It is therefore suggested that in the future UN vacancy lists and job descriptions be sent to the Director-General, Planning Bureau, Republic of Cyprus, Nicosia, for further distribution.

As to the firms which can offer supplies, equipment or services to development assistance projects, we expect to communicate a comprehensive list of Cyprus firms shortly. The Government has advised us that future correspondence on this matter may be addressed to the Director-General, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Republic of Cyprus, Nicosia.

The Government is further informing us that the following training facilities can be used for placement of UN fellows:-

1. The Higher Technical Institute - This Institute is offering three-year post-secondary courses in mechanical, electrical and civil engineering, which leads to a diploma largely equivalent to the Higher National Diploma of the City and Guilds of the London Institute.

Enrolment is open to Cypriot students who have completed full secondary education (12 years of schooling) in Cyprus, or to students of other countries who have qualified in an entrance examination.

The Higher Technical Institute has received UNDP assistance during the initial years of its functioning from April 1968 to April 1973. (Project CYP/67/505 executed by UNESCO).

CYPRUS: Mineral Resources Development

1. The Centre for Natural Resources, Energy and Transport was visited on 4 June by Mr. Hji Stavrinou, Director of the Geological Survey of Cyprus, for the purpose of discussing the possibility of United Nations technical co-operation in certain mineral resources exploration and evaluation programmes which the Geological Survey is pursuing on an urgent basis. In particular, the bentonitic and other clay resources of the southern half of Cyprus offer good export possibilities, but require evaluation by specialists in this field.

2. In order to make a preliminary assessment of needs and advance matters as quickly as possible, Mr. Hji Stavrinou expressed a wish that Mr. D.A. Harkin, Technical Adviser, visit Cyprus for a few days during his forthcoming mission to Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey. Mr. Hji Stavrinou indicated that he would be making a formal request for such a visit through the UNDP Resident Representative on his return to Cyprus.

The day 17 July was taken up in preliminary talks with Mr. D.K. Biswas, Acting UNDP Resident Representative, and Mr. C. Wijnen, Assistant Resident Representative, and in technical discussions with Mr. Hadjistravrinou, Mr. A. Panayotou (economic geologist) and Mr. S. Afrodisis (hydrogeologist) in the Geological Survey Department. Accompanied by these Geological Survey officers, a field trip to an area of major interest for bentonite north of Paphos was undertaken on 18 July and a project document and expert job description were drafted on 19 July, after further discussions with Mr. Biswas. These were left for review and completion by Mr. Hadjistravrinou, thereafter discussion of the contents with the Government Planning Bureau and the UNDP office. Formal submission may be expected shortly.

3. Stated briefly, clays with bentonitic affinities are common in certain formations of the Cretaceous sediments in Cyprus but until recently were not considered to be of commercial quality. Extensive deposits of higher grade bentonitic clays are now known, on the basis of field and laboratory investigations, to have a considerable economic potential, and a small bentonite mining and processing operator has already obtained orders for drilling mud use in Syria and Kuwait.



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6. The UNDP and counterpart project budgets could not be finalized during the writer's short visit but must await joint discussions of the Director of Geological Survey with the Government Planning Bureau and the UNDP Resident Representative within the next week. The UNDP contribution is expected to be around \$50,000. The project duration has been entered as one year and four months from 1 September 1975, when the necessary equipment would be requisitioned. Expert services would be scheduled for the first quarter of 1976 when the equipment would be available for installation and test-work begin.

7. The mission was greatly facilitated by the assistance and courtesies extended by the Director of Geological Survey and his staff and by the Acting Resident Representative and other UNDP office personnel in Nicosia.

4. Draft the relevant tender documents, including terms and conditions of contract, to be used as the basis for an international call for tenders.
5. Advise on a long-range development plan for the bentonite and terra umbra industry, including, but not being limited to, the proposed bentonite and terra umbra plants, and assess the need for further UNIDO assistance.
6. Requisition of laboratory equipment and apparatus necessary for technological test work and training laboratory staff on bentonite and terra umbra samples.

Preliminary research in certain areas of Cyprus have indicated good commercial possibilities of exploitation of the bentonite clay. With continuous falling of foreign reserves in bentonite and with increasing demand of good quality bentonites it is imperative that advantage is taken of the existing mineral deposits in the island. Bentonites are of great commercial value and are used in the drilling mud for oil wells, as well as bleaching clays to remove colouring matters from oils and as clarifying agents for products such as wines and beer. They are used also in the foundry industry for bonding moulding sands.

Cyprus has also extensive mineral deposits of good quality terra umbra which are primarily used for manufacture of paints and pigments. At present terra umbra is exported in an almost unwrought form (Heat-treated or not) the result being loss of considerable amount of foreign exchange. It is felt that the creation of a model industrial unit for full treatment of terra umbra before export as well as exploitation of new markets may result in increasing the foreign exchange earnings of the island from this source.

In order to be able to advise on the further processing requirements the Geological Survey Department requires that its laboratory be able to undertake the necessary test work in pulverization. The question of new markets for the product should also receive additional attention.

In order to advance the development of the bentonitic clays and terra umbra deposits of Cyprus, through demonstration of the technological testing required while concurrently strengthening the facilities and technical capacity of the Geological Survey Department for this work, and to develop the full treatment and processing of bentonitic clays and terra umbra, the Government of Cyprus requests the technical cooperation of the United Nations Development Programme in terms of the provisions outlined in this project document.

Thank you for your cable DP63 informing me that the request of the Government of Cyprus for the services of a senior Hotel Expert does not fall within the competence of the instructions contained in UNDP/PROG/Field/44.

While the Government is faced with the acute problem of accommodating thousands of Lebanese pouring into the country daily, due to the present situation there, and every hotel room and house is full, there appears to be no spill over from the present IPF ceiling for 1976 to finance the services of a Senior Hotel Expert. This Expert is urgently required to examine the possibility of Cyprus making good use of the much needed and presently unused accommodation facilities in the mountain areas of the island; of course, the present development is also linked with the slow and healthy increase in tourism industry which was lost after the 1974 summer events. Although the recovery would take some years to reach the 1973/74 level (nearly C£29 million). There is no problem in obtaining the present statistics and I have already discussed the matter with the Director-General of the Cyprus Tourism organization. However, the financial situation precludes any consideration of the project, but if you are interested in up-to-date information on the status of tourism, I will be very pleased to gather and provide it.

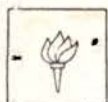



We are informed that several agencies may have received requests for technical assistance from Mr. Rauf Denktash, Leader of the Turkish Cypriot community, signing as "President, Turkish Federated State of Cyprus". In order to assure a unified approach from all the United Nations agencies, I wish to draw your attention to General Assembly resolution 3212 (XXIX) endorsed by the Security Council resolution 365 (1974), which states in paragraph 1 "calls upon all States to respect the sovereignty, independence, territorial integrity and non-alignment of the Republic of Cyprus and to refrain from all acts and interventions directed against it", as well as Security Council resolution 367 (1975) which "requests the Secretary-General to undertake a new mission of good offices" in order to facilitate a negotiated solution of the Cyprus problem. In our endeavour to allow technical assistance programmes to serve both communities in a practical way, without however implying recognition of any government other than the Government of Cyprus, the Administrator of UNDP, in co-ordination with the Secretary-General, is presently preparing concrete procedural proposals to Mr. Denktash, spelling out possible steps in this direction with the concurrence of the Government. A letter containing these proposals will be copied to all agencies requesting their co-operation. Meanwhile, I propose that no action be taken on the technical assistance requests from Mr. Denktash other than possible acknowledgements and, if appropriate, add that the matter is now under study. Such letters should be addressed only to "His Excellency, Mr. Rauf Denktash, Nicosia, Cyprus" and should be delivered through the Office of the Resident Representative, UNDP, in Nicosia, Cyprus.

Institutions"

Please refer to your memorandum of 14 January 1974. We have reviewed the final report submitted by Mr. Jenkins on his mission to Cyprus. Part "A" below will summarize the mission's report and Part "B" will contain our general comments on it:

Part A: Summary of the Report

1. The Consultant's general proposal is to establish a Housing Finance Agency for the purpose of promoting a "social housing scheme" in Cyprus, i.e. to assist low and middle income groups to obtain decent housing at reasonable terms.
2. The HFA according to the consultant should be divided into two departments: (a) the Mortgage Bank for issuing long-term loans up to 50% of the total value of land and building (1st mortgages), and (b) the Building and Loan Society issuing long-term loans from 50 to 70% (or 75%) of the total value of land and building (second mortgages).
3. The Consultant has covered the following areas in relation to establishment and operation of HFA: (a) legal status, (b) institutional set-up, including General Assembly, supervisory Board, Management, Tax exemption, and (c) Operational purpose.
4. The purposes and conditions of establishment and operation of the Mortgage Bank and the Building and Loan Society have been described briefly by the Consultant.
5. The Consultant under the heading of "fiscal incentives" has briefly discussed the objectives of the Third Five-Year Plan and its targets with regard to domestic savings. He concludes that the domestic savings at 21.7% of disposable income in comparison with Western Countries indicates a very high propensity to save. Therefore, the increase in savings does not seem to be a problem, the problem is how to provide incentives to direct these savings into sectors with high social priority like housing for the low and middle income groups.
6. The incentives suggested are:
  - (a) Buyers of bonds from the Mortgage Banks be entitled to deduct this amount from their annual taxable income, and



- (b) to channel the revenue obtained to the HFA to strengthen its financial position.

Part B - CHBP's comments

The report covers the whole range of problems related to a social housing Finance System and from the theoretical and structural viewpoints is well-founded.

However, it does not carry, nor does it refer to any analysis of local conditions justifying the adoption of the suggested scheme. In spite of lack of data and precedence on offering the suggested incentives - which is cited by the Consultant as a hinderance in attempting any predictions with regard to reaction of the public to it, and predictions of probability of reduction in income tax revenues - the consultant could have attempted a sensitivity analysis of the outcome under various behavioural assumptions. This point, however, does not detract in anyway from the usefulness of the study carried out by the consultant. It is to suggest that the report be regarded only as an outline, and further work in this area should be attempted before the actual establishment of the HFA, the Mortgage Bank and the Building and Loan Society.

It should be remembered that the Project Document has envisaged two visits of 2-month duration, each to assist the Government in this field. Mr. Jenkins due to other engagements was not able to stay for the full duration of the first 2-month visit in Cyprus and obviously many additional required studies could not be undertaken.

Therefore, we are suggesting that the second mission as soon as the Government is ready for it should take place.

The main purpose of the second mission would be to elaborate further on proposals already made by Mr. Jenkins to perform the sensitivity analysis mentioned above and make the final recommendations with regard to establishment of the HFA, the Mortgage Bank and the Building and Loan Society.

We are recommending that the Report in its present form along with our comments be submitted to the Government.

1. We refer to your memorandum of 31 August 1973 on the above-mentioned subject, and the copy of the letter dated 24 July attached thereto from the Director-General of the Planning Bureau, Cyprus, to the UNDP Office in Nicosia.
2. We note that the Planning Bureau has expressed interest in training some people from both the public and private sectors in the fields of port development and management, airport and highway development, and project evaluation (ports, airports and highways). Information was also requested in the letter about a training course run by the United Nations School of Ports and Shipping in Copenhagen.
3. From 1959-1969, eight United Nations Ports and Shipping Training Centres had been held in Copenhagen for port personnel at the executive level. They were held under the joint aegis of the United Nations and the Danish Government, the latter financing these Centres as a part of their contribution to the United Nations technical assistance. Each session was limited to 30 participants and lasted three weeks, followed by a one-week study tour. Covered were such topics as port construction, operation, administration, personnel and labour; dredging, hydrography, navigation, port finances and statistics; ship construction and operation; freight rates and conferences; and merchant marine personnel, economics, finances and statistics.
4. The Transport Section, Resources and Transport Division, at Headquarters was responsible for these Centres until 1969, at which time UNCTAD was created in Geneva and officially assumed responsibility in the ports and shipping fields. Since that time UNCTAD is active in the training of port personnel, although in a manner somewhat different from the sessions previously sponsored by this Office and the Danish Government.

Highway Development

The United Nations has organized a number of training programmes in the field of highway development, generally on a country basis, through UNDP financing. The possibility of organizing an appropriate programme in Cyprus may be discussed by the Planning Bureau with the UNDP Resident Representative in Nicosia.

At present, we are planning to hold an inter-regional seminar on the techniques and economics of low-cost roads in developing countries in 1974, likely in East Africa. As soon as the project is approved, we will be glad to send you the relevant information in due course and invite the participation of Cyprus in accordance with established specifications.

Post title: Social Welfare Research Adviser

Duration: Nine months

Date required: July 1973

Duty station: Nicosia

Duties: In co-operation with the Ministry of Labour and Social Insurance, Social Security and Social Services sector, the expert will be expected to:

1. Review all ongoing social research programmes and existing facilities;
2. Undertake collection of information concerning the socio-economic situation in Cyprus;
3. Interpret data for the purpose of formulating both short and long term social development plans;
4. Assist in setting up priorities for action, and specifically to assist in carrying out pilot social welfare research projects;
5. Train needed counterpart staff to man the research projects.

#### Qualifications:

University degree with specialization in social sciences preferably in sociology and social welfare. Broad experience in social research as applied to social welfare including social welfare policy and planning is essential. If possible, experience in criminological research work would be useful.

Language: English

#### Background information:

Technical assistance was provided to Cyprus in the past. First with the assignment of a General Social Welfare Adviser from March 1963 through March 1965. Secondly, a Social Work Training Adviser assisted the Government from January 1965 through December 1966. From the inception of technical assistance advisory services, a number of nationals of Cyprus were awarded fellowships to study social work abroad. It is assumed that most of those fellows have returned and are actively engaged in carrying forward various social welfare programmes. In 1970 an adviser in social welfare research for six months and another in social legislation undertook a four-months mission to assist in the formulation of social legislation. It is now desirable to obtain the necessary up-to-date sociological data on which to base planning for social welfare services and other development programmes in the context of national development. The Government plans to establish a social welfare research and planning unit to assist on the best organizational arrangements for the integration of ongoing social research programmes in the overall development, assist in establishing priorities for action, carry out pilot social welfare research projects, and train counterpart staff.

ANNUAL REVIEW OF COUNTRY PROGRAMME  
WORKING PAPER  
FOR MEETING ON 20 JUNE 1973

Background

The Country Programme for Cyprus, 1972-1976, involving expenditure by UNDP of \$5m and counterpart expenditure by the Government of C£3,332m, was approved by the Thirteenth Session of the UNDP Governing Council in December 1971, and became operational from 1 January 1972. The outline of the approved programme was published and circulated as Governing Council Document DP/GC/CYP/R.1 dated 1 December 1971.

Object of the Review and General Considerations

The main purpose of the current exercise is to generally evaluate the progress achieved and adjustments made during the first year; and, given the revised estimates of resources available, examine the future shape of the programme. For this purpose, it is felt generally unnecessary to reopen the basic assumptions or directions of the programme which were almost wholly dictated by ongoing projects in 1971-1972.

In so far as progress achieved is concerned, consensus indicates that projects remain mainly satisfactory in concept, content and execution - and relevant to the country's development objectives and priorities; and, thus far, on the operational side, no serious factors have emerged with major adverse effects on the efficiency and effectiveness of the programme. Pruning of projected activity was made necessary, however, as a result of unforeseen costs of ongoing projects carried over into 1972 but originally

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budgetted for expenditure in 1971. These were of such magnitude as to whittle away the carefully set-aside unplanned programme reserve of \$351,000. It may, however, be possible to retrieve some semblance of programme reserve - but primarily at the expense of delayed implementation and cancelled projects.

#### Level of Implementation

It was planned that the budgetted expenditure during 1972 would be \$2.061m. As now transpires from rough expenditure figures received, the level of expenditure in 1972 was \$1,667.5. Since this figure includes unplanned carryover from 1971, it may be construed that implementation is lagging, but, whilst partially true, this would not reveal the full picture. Reassessment of some planned small-scale projects, for instance, (e.g., Industrial Training and Apprenticeships and Trade Standards and Testing), indicated that these could remain unformulated, and their objectives achieved without extra cost within the aegis of large-scale operational projects. Six small-scale projects scheduled to begin in 1972 were delayed; five out of six had to be postponed because of Agency delays in recruitment. The sixth - Handicrafts - was postponed by the Government until 1974. Delay in formulating the large-scale Industrial Development Services project accounts also for under expenditure in 1972.

#### Programme Adjustments

In the process of the continuous review with the Planning Bureau, various adjustments have been introduced into the Programme. Technical



considerations, the projected diminishing level of resources, the strengthening of linkages within the programme, all played a part in deciding that the following planned projects would not be formulated:

Public Administration (Training)

Land Taxation

Induced Breeding of Grey Mullet

Hydrologist

Mining Law

Curriculum Development

Industrial Training and Apprenticeship

Food Technology

Desalination

Trade Standards and Trade Testing

On the other hand, due to newly emerging and justifiable need, it was agreed that the following small-scale projects would be extended, as indicated:

CYP/70/002 - Senior Economic Planning Adviser - 3 months

CYP/70/005 - Industrial Project Evaluation - 1 year

CYP/71/008 - Seed Testing - 6 weeks

The following projects, not foreseen at the time the Programme was prepared, have either continued unexpectedly into the IPF period, have become operational, or are under active formulation:

#### Current and Future Status of the Country Programme

Taking the adjustments mentioned above into account, a revised list of projects has been prepared, and is attached as Annex I. This has mainly been drawn up on the basis of approved budgets for ongoing

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projects (as of 3 February 1973) and the estimated cost of new projects. [We await complete, definitive expenditure accounts for 1972, and the consequent rephased budgets over the period 1973-1976. Until these are received, we will not have an accurately refined estimate (although educated guess work is possible) of the resources available for the balance of the programme period.] In any event, the level of resources available would scarcely permit the introduction of new projects, unless this be at the expense of other planned activity in the programme. For all practical purposes, we calculate that, at this stage, the planned programme is estimated to cost \$4,896,777. An amount of <sup>103,000</sup>~~\$97,000~~ (or approx. \$180,000 if the Plastics Engineering (\$30,000), Petroleum Fellowships (\$13,000) are dropped, as has been discussed, and an amount of \$40,000 accrues, as seems possible, from delayed implementation of the Industrial Development Services Project) would be available, therefore, to cover extensions of existing projects. The figure is so relatively small that agreement as to disposal should be comparatively easy. In the order of priorities, as understood at this time, it is suggested, for discussion, that two projects could mainly consume the full amount, e.g., the Live-stock Production Improvement Project, and an extension of the Senior Irrigation Engineer. The Planning Bureau is also considering at present the possibility of extending the project on the Inventory of Cultural Property.

It is uppermost in mind, however, that the effects of the disastrous drought may dictate a revised order of priorities, centering perhaps on possible enlarged, urgent activity under the Morphou/Tylliria Feasibility Study.

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General Evaluation Remarks - Large-scale Projects

One large-scale project - Higher Technical Institute - has now drawn to a successful close. Assistance to the Institute will be shortly continued, however, through the assignment of a Production Engineer (small-scale project) for one year. In addition, it is possible that a regional role could be forged for the H.T.I. within the regional IPF of UNDP; but this is a matter for separate discussions.

The Cyprus Water Planning Project (Paphos) is also in its final stages. A development plan has been formulated by the Project - and is at present under consideration, for financing purposes, by the IBRD.

The Morphou-Tylliria Feasibility Study is proceeding on schedule, and will be completed in 1974. The IBRD is maintaining close interest, for possible financing when the findings can be adopted, and a development stage reached.

The Strengthening of Veterinary Services Project also concludes in 1974. It proceeds close to schedule, and no implementation difficulties or serious shortfalls, are being encountered.

A Project Revision has been prepared for signature for the Vocational Training and Management Development Project (C.P.C.), which implies assistance through June 1974. Thereafter, it is expected that this project can sustain itself nationally, and some ten years of UNDP financing will be concluded.

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As will be gathered from the above, no serious, but merely transitory constraints intrude on the implementation of the fore-mentioned large-scale projects.

A long-delayed building programme limited the effectiveness in 1972 of the UNDP/ILO man-power element in the Hotel and Catering Institute. Many of the international team have already concluded their assignments and, physical facilities at the new site not being ready, their concluding months did not represent an apex of achievement. Three experts remain; and it will be for discussion to consider whether marginal extensions might be effected (within the overall remaining budgetary allotment) to at least service the first high-level training course, scheduled to begin in October 1973.

The Livestock Production Improvement Project has made a decided impact. Although operations are running close to schedule in most areas, an extension is warranted to capitalize and extend on findings to date. An extension would consolidate the utilization of those work areas which have commenced late - e.g. Artificial Insemination Centre, Training Centre, Mechanized Milking and Milling Facilities - as well as providing a buffer effect against the absence of local project staff on overseas courses.

The last remaining large-scale project - Industrial Development Services - has now become operational, under Preparatory Assistance, with the arrival of the Acting Project Manager, who is expected to be joined by some other project personnel in the months ahead.



Small-Scale Projects: General Remarks

Attention is to be drawn to two specific projects - Industrial Projects Evaluation and the Social Research Centre. No counterpart has emerged in the first case and has only lately emerged in the second case.

Apart from these projects there is, overall, a general high-level of performance, with the necessary counterparts and facilities being provided by Government as required in the Project Documents.

Regional and Inter-regional Projects

A list of the projects in which Cyprus is participating is attached as Annexes II and III. For regional projects (Annex II) some activity has occurred in 1972 - e.g. the regional Co-operative Development Adviser (REM/68/670) has visited Nicosia, and has organized a much-appreciated seminar, in addition to advising the Director of Co-operatives on the establishment of a Co-operative College; the Near East Animal Health Institutes' (NEAHI), now renamed Near East Animal Production and Health Development Centre (NEADEC) (REM/72/047), has continued to play its co-ordinating role vis-a-vis the CYP/72/515 - Strengthening of Veterinary Services Project - and, in particular, under its SIRM component, plans are well advanced for setting up a repair workshop for laboratory apparatus, etc., and, also, for training local technicians. A sub-regional training course was held in Nicosia in 1972 under the aegis of REM/71/174 Near East Institute of Statistics.

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Concerning Annex III, Inter-regional projects, only one project has been operational during 1972 - INT/71/027, Generalized System of Preferences. The other projects listed have not yet reached an operational stage as far as Cyprus is concerned.

The level of UNDP-financed regional and inter-regional activity in 1972, then, has been relatively modest, but is considered generally effective and apposite. Greater momentum is expected from 1973 onwards, when projects reach a more operational stage.
