- a. Name of Agency: United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America, Inc.

It is a member agency of the National War Fund,
registered with the President's War Relief
Control Board.
- b. President - Rev. Dr. J. B. Koncius, Vice Presidents: Anthony A. Olis,

Kolicius, Pittsburgh, Pa., Mr. Nadas Rastenis, Baltimore, Md.

- The National War Fund approved budget of \$600,000.00 for the
period October 1, 1945 to September 30, 1946. Of this sum
\$174,000.00 has been assigned for displaced Lithuanians in
Germany and Austria.
- c. Our activities will consist primarily of aiding displaced Lithuanians.
The assistance of the President of our organization will be ren-
dered to all other displaced persons regardless of their race, creed,
or national origin. In coordination with UNRRA, he intends to
provide supplementary aid with clothing, medicinals, books,
religious articles and recreational as well as cultural facilities.
Also, to provide from our funds scholarships for the most able and
needy displaced students.

The President expects to work in close cooperation with other
UNRRA approved voluntary relief agencies such as: - American Red
Cross, War Relief Services, Refugee Relief Trustees, International
Red Cross, World Student Relief, J.D.C., etc.

The sum allocated for displaced Lithuanians will be used for
purchasing necessary goods and providing scholarships equally
among displaced Lithuanians in Germany and Austria.

- d. President's War Relief Control Board at its meeting on October 19, 1945 decided to support our request of proposal to send our representative to Germany and Austria for services among displaced Lithuanians. (Photostatic copy of letter attached.)
- e. The representative selected to carry out the proposed program will be the Rev. Dr. Joseph B. Koncius, President of the United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America, Inc. In our opinion he is best qualified for this assignment. He has performed similar tasks during and after World War I, when he repatriated and provided aid for many thousands of displaced Lithuanians in Russia and Germany (1918-1922). Also, he has organized many relief societies and institutions for the relief and welfare of needy Lithuanians in Europe and America. He has command of many languages which include Lithuanian, French, German, Latvian, Russian, Polish, Italian, Czech, Ukranian and Slovak. He has been President of the United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America since its establishment. All necessary organizational equipment will be provided him for his work.

Rev. Dr. Joseph B. Koncius volunteers his time and services without remuneration for this humanitarian work. His travelling expenses and maintenance of his staff will be provided by the United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America.


Dear Sirs:

In line with policy our *policy recently enumerated* we are informally consulting USSR representative of this request but making it clear that in view non-recognition Soviet Lithuania by other member governments UNRRA cannot regard USSR as country whose nationals are concerned for purposes official consultation under new procedure. Will advise you further.



people. A gleam of light in the dark picture was her description of the help being brought to certain communities by American Relief for France. One of these was Saint-Die in the Vosges. Two-thirds of the town had been burned by the Germans before their retreat, and the people were living in huts or in what few houses were left. Telling of the relief activities there, Mme. Davey said:

"The principle on which we work is never to allow any of our trucks or lorries or station wagons to be empty. We arrived at Saint-Die from Paris with a full load of clothing. When that was unloaded, we went to the station, where a train-full of deportees was coming in. Some of these men would have had to walk ten

or fifteen miles to their homes; and they were in no condition to do that, so we took them. On other days we drove to hospitals with repatriated men, who had become ill after they had been back a few days—which so often happens. Other times we carried children being sent off on vacations. Each time we brought back vegetables, or other things the people needed. . . . I want you to know how grateful they all are. I had people tell me, there in the Vosges, and in Normandy and Brittany, they did not know what they would have done without American Relief for France."

Relief Is Sent Lithuanians

The United Lithuanian Relief Fund of America, Inc., a member agency of the National War Fund, has just completed its first year of activity. During that period \$324,000.00 was spent for the relief of Lithuanian war victims scattered all over Europe and in South America. During the same period more than 300,000 pounds of clothing, shoes and other items were collected. Of this amount more than 80,000 pounds of clothing and \$20,000.00 worth of medicaments were sent to Lithuania; 25,000 pounds of clothes were sent to displaced Lithuanians in France; 25,000 of clothing to those in Italy; and 110,000 pounds of clothing to the Lithuanian displaced persons in the Western Al-

The Committee understands that the Agency plans to conduct a drive in October and November, appealing, mainly through its local chapters, to Americans of Lithuanian descent and others interested in its program. It intends to approach community chests in a few larger cities with considerable populations of Lithuanian descent.
3. The National Budget Committee recommends that the United Lithuanian Relief Fund rely for its support upon an appeal to persons and groups especially interested in its program.
4. The Committee takes no exception to any item in the Agency's budget as presented but, in view of the above recommendation, the Committee is not in a position to make any recommendation on the total amount of the proposed budget.

In presenting to you a summary of our proposed budget of long and short-term projects for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1946, may I request your consideration of the following views of our agency:

1. We made a very careful and thorough examination of our projects in conforming with the information given by Mr. Seymour at the meetings with the agency executives and in the memoranda of November 19, ~~December~~ 6 & December 13. We tried very hard to reduce our budget to the least painful minimum.
2. Having in mind that this winter really is the time of greatest need, we propose no reduction in the approved budget for the first six months.
3. In requesting allocations for the second six-month period ending September 30, 1946, we have made drastic reductions with the hope that our own efforts to reduce the budget will be most helpful to the Budget Committee at this time, when the recent campaign does not promise to achieve its goal.
4. We want you to have us recorded as an agency respectfully requesting to be financed by the National War Fund also during the last three months of 1946. We wish to inform you that our anticipated budget for the said last quarter would include at least \$90,000.00 for operational fund and \$25,000.00 for the campaign of the year of 1947.
5. We have complete confidence in the Budget Committee and its Staff. If at the time of your hearing the financial situation of the National War Fund would be brighter, we would like strongly to emphasize the need of larger allocations for the second 6-month period, at least to the extent of tentative balance.
6. We desire once more to express our deepest gratitude to the National War Fund for its kind and sympathetic understanding of the Lithuanian relief problem. With the purpose to increase the benefits of the American people's generosity, Rev. Dr. Joseph B. Koncius, the President of our organization, has willingly acceded to the request of our Executive Committee to make a trip to Europe so that our relief programs could be made more effective and useful.

The requested sum will be used through the American Red Cross to finance medical Institutions in Lithuania.

2 Clothing and other Gifts-in-Kind Drives

The need for clothing and other necessities of war distressed Lithuanians is still very great. We shall continue collecting used clothes, shoes, blankets, bedding, literature (English and Lithuanian), sporting goods, toys, canned food and other gifts-in-kind that are suitable and permissible to ship abroad.

3 Knitted Garments

Our proposed sum for this project will be used to purchase knitting yarn. Our chapter women will continue knitting garments for Lithuanian infants and children, especially orphans.

4 Food and Farming Implements

To aid, even if not to a large extent, the undernourished Lithuanian people with food and such implements that would be helpful in self-support.

5 Lithuanians in Sweden

Requested sum, much smaller than in the past, will be used for assistance of the displaced Lithuanians, primarily children, aged, sick and students who are enrolled in the Swedish institutions of higher education. This project is under the supervision of the American and Swedish Red Cross.

6 Lithuanians in Denmark

There are over 1,900 displaced Lithuanians in Denmark. Our proposed sum will be spent in the same way as in Sweden.

7 Lithuanians in France

This project is supervised by the War Relief Services. We are helping, in the first place, displaced Lithuanians unable to find steady employment and those with larger families. University students are given scholarships and are selected exclusively on the merits of their ability and zealness.

8 Lithuanians in Italy

In carrying out this project, we were helped by the American Relief for Italy, which supervised the distribution of our relief in money and goods. We propose to use our requested sum in the same manner as in Sweden and France.

9 Lithuanians in Switzerland

The majority of Lithuanians in Switzerland are living in two special assembly centers. There, they need help for medical care, additional nourishment for children. 45 students are given scholarships.

10 Lithuanians in Spain

A few stranded Lithuanians in this country will be helped with necessities for existence from the proposed small sum.

11 Lithuanians in Portugal

Same as in Spain.

12 Lithuanians in Germany and Austria

Among the displaced Lithuanians in the American, British and French occupied zones in Germany and Austria there are over 30,000 children ranging in age from infancy to 14 years. Their survival demands our help in providing more appropriate nourishment. Many displaced Lithuanians have not found place in assembly centers, because there are not enough centers and the existing ones are overcrowded; these people receive no official assistance and here our program helps them. Among the displaced persons there are about 3,000 university and college students. Over 600 of them have been admitted to the Allied recognized universities. Their studies and thereby their preparations for useful independent life rest upon the approval of this our proposed project. A more sufficient and workable program of this project for the benefit and welfare of the displaced Lithuanians will be arranged in the very near future when the President of our organization, Rev. Dr. Joseph B. Koncius, will visit the assembly centers in Germany and Austria.

13 American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service

Requested sum is an annual contribution to this organization.

14 Lithuanians in Belgium

We request the approval of our proposed sum to continue our assistance in cash to stranded 2,000 Lithuanians in Belgium. Most of their necessities will be provided from our various gifts-in-kind drives.

Represented by Mr. Laucka. Reported American Red Cross advises medical supplies, food and clothing are not of primary need in Lithuania proper (Projects 1 and 4). Red Cross exploring possibilities of cash aid to indigenous hospitals, orphanages, etc.; in meantime program will be held in abeyance. Work with refugees continuing through such agencies as War Relief Services - NCWC, Swedish Red Cross and American Relief for Italy. State Department describes the Lithuanian Government as "being under duress" and continues to recognize its minister in Washington. The agency intends to go on in the post-National War Fund period, hopes for a federation and chest support, but in lieu of that, would campaign independently through special interest groups.

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECTS IN PROPOSED BUDGET

FOR PERIOD FROM OCTOBER 1, 1945 TO SEPTEMBER 30, 1946, INCLUSIVE

1. Medical Supplies in Lithuania

The requested sum will be used to purchase needed medical and surgical supplies for the civilian population of Lithuania.

2. Clothing and other Gifts-in-Kind Drive in U.S.A.

We shall continue collecting old clothes, shoes, blankets and other gifts-in-kind for the needy Lithuanians in France, Switzerland, Italy, Sweden, and Denmark. We will also make some shipments to the civilian population in Lithuania.

3. Knitted garments for Lithuanian children

We are most anxious to supply our Chapters with knitting yarn so that our chapter women may knit garments for Lithuanian infants and children.

4. Food and farming implements

To assist in the rehabilitation of the Lithuanian people. We want to send them direct aid in food, such as canned goods, also seeds and farming implements.

5. Lithuanians in Sweden

According to the Swedish Red Cross, Lithuanian refugees in that country need \$9,000.00 monthly at the present time. We expect some decrease in relief demands later and therefore are requesting \$8,000.00 per month.

6. Lithuanians in Denmark

Recently received cables from Sweden and Denmark testify that there are about 600 Lithuanian refugees in Denmark. For their relief we are requesting \$48,000.00.

7. Lithuanians in France

According to reports of the War Relief Services, N.C.W.C. the Lithuanian relief situation in France is very tragic. There are over 1,200 Lithuanians now on our relief list. Their needs are much greater than we are able to supply during the first half of this year. For their aid we request \$10,000.00 per month.

8. Lithuanians in Italy

In contacting Lithuanians in Italy we were helped by the American Relief for Italy and by the good offices of the Hon. Myron C. Taylor. The total number of Lithuanians in Italy is now known to be much greater than at the beginning of our relief program for

Italy. A Lithuanian Relief Committee is functioning there which receives our help through the American Relief for Italy and the Hon. Myron C. Taylor. For this project we are requesting \$48,000.00.

9. Lithuanians in Switzerland

The needs of Lithuanian refugees in Switzerland have been attested to by Mr. Roswell D. McClelland, Special Representative of the War Refugee Board in Bern. Last year our relief program succeeded in giving help to over 500 Lithuanians, among them 20 students who were able to continue their studies in the universities. For this project we are requesting \$96,000.00.

10. Lithuanians in Spain

Stranded Lithuanians in this country now are in a better situation than last year. \$1,000.00 per year will cover their necessary aid.

11. Lithuanians in Portugal

Lithuanian refugees in this country also have improved their status and their conditions are better than last year. \$1,000 will cover their necessary aid for the year.

12. Lithuanians in Germany and Austria

According to most recent information, there are over 300,000 Lithuanians in those parts of Germany and Austria now under Allied military control. They are mostly in camps for displaced persons. As soon as the military authorities will allow private relief agencies to enter Germany and Austria, we shall want to extend our help to them in all ways possible. Our program is to send them clothes, shoes, medical supplies, food and money in cash. We have informed our government military authorities accordingly. The International Red Cross has already made inquiry as to whether we are in a position to prepare relief on a vast scale for Lithuanians in Germany. Our preparations to help these unfortunate Lithuanians will depend upon the approval of this project.

13. American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Relief

For this project we request \$500.00. This sum is an annual contribution to the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Relief.
