Memorandum of Understanding on the United Nations  
Development Fund for West Irian (Irian Barat)

(1) General Purpose of the Fund

A United Nations Development Fund is established to assist in the economic and social development of West Irian (Irian Barat). The Fund will finance projects selected with the interests and welfare of the people of West Irian (Irian Barat) in mind. An over-all programme will include capital investment projects to improve the infra-structure as well as pre-investment projects.

(2) Resources of the Fund

The Fund is open to contributions from Member States of the United Nations and the specialized agencies. Contributions will be made in readily usable currency for an initial period of three years. The terms of the contributions shall contain approval by the donor of the terms of the present Memorandum of Understanding under which such contributions will be administered by the Secretary-General.

(3) Organization

The Secretary-General has overall responsibility for the management of the Fund, which shall be administered by him "in trust", under the terms of United Nations Financial Regulations 6.6 and 6.7.

He may call freely upon the services of the United Nations or of a specialized agency to serve as executing agency in respect of projects in their respective spheres of competence and may request the Executive Chairman of TAB to make available to the Fund the administrative and co-ordinating facilities of the Resident Representative and Director of Special Fund Programmes in Indonesia.

In carrying out a project, the organization designated as executing agency shall have, ~~vis-à-vis~~ the United Nations Development Fund, the same status as it would have if acting in a comparable capacity for the United Nations Special Fund.

(4) Programming

The preparation of the overall programme, and of individual projects, shall be co-ordinated by a Special Staff working under the Resident Representative of TAB and Director of Special Fund Programmes. The Special Staff shall, with the assistance of the representatives of the Specialized Agencies where necessary, assist the Government in the preparation and submission of projects and also in respect of the overall programme in its totality, extending over a period of three years.

The programme and the individual projects shall be submitted by the Resident Representative to the Secretary-General for his final approval. Authorization for commencing the execution of individual projects shall be given by the Secretary-General.

(5) Implementation of projects

a. Each project shall be described in detail by a Plan of Operations to be approved by the Government of Indonesia, the designated executing agency and the Secretary-General. Where the United Nations serves as executing agency, the responsibilities pertaining to this role shall be lodged in an appropriate unit of the Secretariat which the Secretary-General shall designate.

b. A project manager shall be appointed by the executing agency and shall be directly responsible to the agency for implementing the project in

co-operation with a counterpart national official designated by Indonesian authorities.

In the case of projects executed by contract to outside firms, the project manager shall have as his main responsibility the task of review and supervision of contract performance.

c. To the extent that projects are of a pre-investment or technical assistance nature, the usual practices and procedures followed by the executing agency in implementing comparable projects under other relevant United Nations programmes shall apply.

d. For capital investment projects, the executing agency shall normally contract execution of the project to an outside firm. International bidding under the relevant financial rules and practices of the executing agencies shall apply. However, when local services, supplies or equipment are available, bidding shall normally be open to firms within Indonesia and West Irian. Each contract entered into must provide specifically, inter alia, for the method of purchase and disposal of capital items to be used by the outside contractor in implementing the Plan of Operations, as well as for the arrangements which would govern termination of the project under exceptional or unforeseen circumstances. Technical and financial supervision of performance under the contract shall be exercised by the project manager who shall report to the executing agency and, as requested, to the Special Staff working under the Resident Representative.

e. The Secretary-General through his Special Staff at Djakarta shall be free to observe at any time the progress of operations carried out by the executing agencies. Each executing agency shall provide to the Secretary-General all written information that he may request, including

records, accounts and supporting documentation. Executing agencies shall also furnish periodic financial reports on the projects assigned to them. All reports shall be submitted at such times and in such form as is mutually agreed by the Secretary-General and the executing agency.

f. As a project nears completion, the executing agency shall consult with the Secretary-General in order that arrangements may be made for the transfer of residual assets from the United Nations Development Fund to the Indonesian Government. All such arrangements shall require the continued application of the residual assets (if any) to the economic and social development of West Irian.

(6) Financial Rules

a. Each Plan of Operations shall consist of a project budget, with estimates of anticipated obligations and cash disbursements shown separately for each year, and with a breakdown between foreign currency and local currency requirements. If required, the Plan of Operations shall also include, separately from the project budget, a budget of overhead costs to cover such anticipated, directly identifiable, extra costs associated with the execution of a particular project as the Secretary-General may agree for payment from resources of the Development Fund.

b. All costs payable in local currency shall be met by the UN Development Fund from currency to be contributed by the Indonesian Government.

c. The basis for determination of overhead costs to be reimbursed to an executing agency shall take into account the nature of the project or projects assigned to the organization as well as the manner in which projects are to be implemented. It is not intended that the administration of Development Fund projects should occasion additional costs against the regular budget

of the United Nations or of any co-operating agency. Reimbursement of overhead costs shall not exceed additional costs actually related to the administration of Development Fund activities.

d. Earmarking of funds to the executing agency will be made at the time of the approval of the Plan of Operation by the Secretary-General. Cash remittances shall be made, either as advance payment, or to cover cash disbursements, upon request from the executing agency.

e. Whenever a revision of an approved Plan of Operations is required, the executing agency shall seek the prior agreement of the Secretary-General.

f. The accounts of a project shall be closed as soon as practicable and normally within twelve months after the completion of the project.

g. The accounts of the Trust Fund itself shall be maintained on a yearly basis. Year-end financial statements shall be presented and audited, internally and externally in accordance with the United Nations Financial Regulations.

h. Except as otherwise provided in this Memorandum or as may subsequently be agreed between the Secretary-General and the executing agency concerned, all financial transactions in the implementation of a Plan of Operations shall accord with the financial policies, rules and procedures which the executing agency applies to operational programmes of similar character. (5) Implementation of projects

a. Each project shall be described in detail by a Plan of Operations to be approved by the Government of Indonesia, the designated executing agency and the Secretary-General. Where the United Nations serves as executing agency, the responsibilities pertaining to this role shall be lodged in an appropriate unit of the Secretariat which the Secretary-General shall designate.

b. A project manager shall be appointed by the executing agency and shall be directly responsible to the agency for implementing the project in

co-operation with a counterpart national official designated by Indonesian authorities.

In the case of projects executed by contract to outside firms, the project manager shall have as his main responsibility the task of review and supervision of contract performance.

c. To the extent that projects are of a pre-investment or technical assistance nature, the usual practices and procedures followed by the executing agency in implementing comparable projects under other relevant United Nations programmes shall apply.

d. For capital investment projects, the executing agency shall normally contract execution of the project to an outside firm. International bidding under the relevant financial rules and practices of the executing agencies shall apply. However, when local services, supplies or equipment are available, bidding shall normally be open to firms within Indonesia and West Irian. Each contract entered into must provide specifically, inter alia, for the method of purchase and disposal of capital items to be used by the outside contractor in implementing the Plan of Operations, as well as for the arrangements which would govern termination of the project under exceptional or unforeseen circumstances. Technical and financial supervision of performance under the contract shall be exercised by the project manager who shall report to the executing agency and, as requested, to the Special Staff working under the Resident Representative.

e. The Secretary-General through his Special Staff at Djakarta shall be free to observe at any time the progress of operations carried out by the executing agencies. Each executing agency shall provide to the Secretary-General all written information that he may request, including

records, accounts and supporting documentation. Executing agencies shall also furnish periodic financial reports on the projects assigned to them. All reports shall be submitted at such times and in such form as is mutually agreed by the Secretary-General and the executing agency.

f. As a project nears completion, the executing agency shall consult with the Secretary-General in order that arrangements may be made for the transfer of residual assets from the United Nations Development Fund to the Indonesian Government. All such arrangements shall require the continued application of the residual assets (if any) to the economic and social development of West Irian.

(6) Financial Rules

a. Each Plan of Operations shall consist of a project budget, with estimates of anticipated obligations and cash disbursements shown separately for each year, and with a breakdown between foreign currency and local currency requirements. If required, the Plan of Operations shall also include, separately from the project budget, a budget of overhead costs to cover such anticipated, directly identifiable, extra costs associated with the execution of a particular project as the Secretary-General may agree for payment from resources of the Development Fund.

b. All costs payable in local currency shall be met by the UN Development Fund from currency to be contributed by the Indonesian Government.

c. The basis for determination of overhead costs to be reimbursed to an executing agency shall take into account the nature of the project or projects assigned to the organization as well as the manner in which projects are to be implemented. It is not intended that the administration of Development Fund projects should occasion additional costs against the regular budget

of the United Nations or of any co-operating agency. Reimbursement of overhead costs shall not exceed additional costs actually related to the administration of Development Fund activities.

d. Earmarking of funds to the executing agency will be made at the time of the approval of the Plan of Operation by the Secretary-General. Cash remittances shall be made, either as advance payment, or to cover cash disbursements, upon request from the executing agency.

e. Whenever a revision of an approved Plan of Operations is required, the executing agency shall seek the prior agreement of the Secretary-General.

f. The accounts of a project shall be closed as soon as practicable and normally within twelve months after the completion of the project.

g. The accounts of the Trust Fund itself shall be maintained on a yearly basis. Year-end financial statements shall be presented and audited, internally and externally in accordance with the United Nations Financial Regulations.

h. Except as otherwise provided in this Memorandum or as may subsequently be agreed between the Secretary-General and the executing agency concerned, all financial transactions in the implementation of a Plan of Operations shall accord with the financial policies, rules and procedures which the executing agency applies to operational programmes of similar character. To the extent that funds are used for the employment of international personnel, the relevant Staff Regulations and rules of the executing agency suitable to the category of personnel required shall apply.

#### (7) Reports

In addition to the annual audited financial statements, the Secretary-General shall report to the General Assembly of the UN on the establishment

of the Fund and periodically on its progress. Special informal reports may be prepared by the Secretary-General in order to give detailed information to the Governments contributing to the Fund.

(1) Purpose of the Fund

A United Nations Fund is established to assist the Government of Indonesia in the economic and social development of West Irian. The Fund will finance projects selected in agreement with the Government of Indonesia with the interests and welfare of the people of West Irian in mind. An overall programme will include capital investment projects to improve the infrastructure as well as pre-investment projects.

(2) Resources of the Fund

The Fund is open to contributions from Member States of the United Nations and the specialized agencies. Contributions will be made in readily usable currency for an initial period of three years. The terms of the contributions shall contain approval by the donor of the terms of the present Memorandum of Understanding, under which such contributions will be administered by the Secretary-General.

The Government of Indonesia will participate by making available a counterpart contribution (funds, local services and facilities) the volume of which shall be decided upon project by project in consultation with the Secretary-General.

(3) Organisation

The Secretary-General has overall responsibility for the management of the Fund, which shall be administered by him "in trust", under the terms of United Nations Financial Regulations 6.6 and 6.7.

He may call freely upon the services of the United Nations or of a specialized agency to serve as executing agency in respect of projects in their respective spheres of competence and will request the Executive Chairman of TAB to make available to the Fund the administrative and co-ordinating facilities of the Resident Representative and Director of Special Fund Programmes in Indonesia. The UN personnel concerned will be in constant touch with the progress of implementation of the projects in West Irian.

In carrying out a project, the organization designated as executing agency shall have, vis-à-vis the United Nations Development Fund, the same status as it would have if acting in a comparable capacity for the United Nations Special Fund.

(4) Programming

The preparation of the overall programme, and of individual projects, shall be co-ordinated by a Special Staff working under the Resident Representative of TAB and Director of Special Fund Programmes. The Special Staff shall, with the assistance of the representatives of the specialized agencies where necessary, assist the Government of Indonesia in the preparation and submission of projects and also in respect of the overall programme in its totality, extending over a period of three years.

The programme and the individual projects shall be submitted by the Resident Representative to the Secretary-General for his final approval. Authorization for commencing the execution of individual projects shall be given by the Secretary-General.

(5) Financial Rules

Except as may subsequently be agreed between the Secretary-General and the executing agency concerned, all financial transactions in the implementation of a Plan of Operations shall accord with the financial policies, rules and procedures which the executing agency applies to operational programmes of similar character. To the extent that funds are used for the employment of international personnel, the relevant Staff Regulations and rules of the executing agency suitable to the category of personnel required shall apply.

The accounts of the Fund shall be maintained on a yearly basis. Year-end financial statements shall be presented and audited, internally and externally in accordance with the United Nations Financial Regulations.

(6) Reports

In addition to the annual audited financial statements, the Secretary-General shall report to the General Assembly of the UN on the establishment of the Fund and periodically on its progress. Special informal reports may be prepared by the Secretary-General in order to give detailed information to the Governments contributing to the Fund.

(7) Period

This memorandum shall not be amended without approval of the donors and of the recipient Government.

The Fund's operations are subject to periodic review by the Secretary-General or the Government of Indonesia. When either the Secretary-General or the Government of Indonesia feels that the situation calls for a substantial revision of the fund's operations, including its termination, it shall consult the other party in order to determine the appropriate steps to be taken by common agreement.

The Office of the Resident Representative in Djakarta is now actively preparing a series of projects in consultation with the Indonesian Government. It is too early to say when the implementation phase will begin, but my office will keep your Permanent Representative in New York informed of the progress made in the preparation of the programme.

In this connexion, I would like to request your Government to make a first payment towards the costs of the small mission in charge of this Fund's operations, which has already been set up in Djakarta. The pace at which subsequent payments towards the cost of projects will have to be made will be known only after I have approved the plans of operations and my office will be in touch with your Permanent Representative in New York in this regard.

Following earlier conversations with your office on the question of accommodating the team of the Fund of the UN for the development of West Irian in the Office of the Resident Representative in Djakarta, I am quoting for your information this passage from a letter from U Mo Myit, Director of the Fund's operations, dated 3 September 1963:

"Dr. Nugroho also informed me that he had discussions with other departments concerned, about the extension of the UN Information Centre building in the TAB compound for purposes of accommodation for us. He said that they were prepared to finance the extension of this building for this purpose out of their contribution to the West Irian Development Fund. He said that that would be their first contribution to the UN Fund. Dr. Nugroho asked to let them have a copy of the blue print so that they could have the funds allotted.

"As you had suggested earlier that after your discussion with Mr. Pavicic it may be possible to provide office accommodation for us in the present TAB building, I informed Dr. Nugroho that we were exploring other possibilities of adjustments in the present TAB building and that we would revert to the subject later. I trust that you will be able to give me an indication on this matter as soon as possible."

I would hope that Mr. Pavicic's forthcoming visit to New York will offer us an opportunity to reach a decision on the two choices which seem now open to us.

I refer to your letter of 5 September 1963 concerning the Fund of the United Nations for the Development of West Irian, informing the Secretary-General of the Netherlands Government's agreement on the draft memorandum submitted to you on 9 August 1963.

On the basis of this agreement, a final document, dated 24 September, has now been approved by the Secretary-General. I am attaching copies of this text for the information of your Government.

As you will note, the memorandum of 24 September is more detailed as new additions have been incorporated relating to the relationship between the Fund and the Specialized Agencies participating in the implementation of the programme. Some drafting changes have been made which relate to the internal organization of the Fund, and the Financial Rules appear now in a more elaborate version. These additions have been made since it was decided to have only one basic document for the Fund.

To the initial text, a new paragraph on Privileges and Immunities has been added.

Finally, the last paragraph on Review and Modification has been slightly amended. In this connexion I wish to confirm that the commitment of the Secretary-General in his letter of 9 August to His Excellency Dr. J.W.A.H. Luns, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, is in no way affected by the drafting changes which have been made.

In carrying out a project, the organization designated as executing agency shall have, vis-à-vis the Fund, the same status as it would have if acting in a comparable capacity for the United Nations Special Fund.

The Representatives of the United Nations and of the specialized Agencies shall assist the Government of Indonesia in the preparation and submission of projects, in consultation with a special staff working under the Resident Representative of TAB and Director of Special Fund Programmes. In the case of projects executed by contract to outside firms, the project manager shall have as his main responsibility the task of review and supervision of contract performance.

c. To the extent that projects are of a pre-investment or technical assistance nature, the usual practices and procedures followed by the executing agency in implementing comparable projects under other relevant United Nations programmes (the United Nations Special Fund or the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance) shall apply.

d. For capital investment projects, the executing agency shall normally contract execution of the project to an outside firm, if it considers that this is the most advantageous procedure to adopt under the circumstances. International bidding under the relevant financial rules and practices of the executing agencies shall apply. However, when services, supplies or equipment are available in Indonesia, qualified firms within Indonesia shall be given preference for the award of contracts in the event that their bids offer conditions substantially equal to those offered by other bidders.

Each contract entered into shall provide specifically, inter alia, for the method of purchase and disposal of capital items to be used by the outside contractor in implementing the Plan of Operations, as well as for the arrangements which would govern termination of the project under exceptional or unforeseen circumstances. Technical and financial supervision of performance under the contract shall be exercised by the project manager who shall report to the executing agency and, as requested, to the Resident Representative.

e. The Secretary-General through his Special Staff at Djakarta shall be free to observe at any time the progress of operations carried out by the executing agencies. The executing agencies shall provide the Secretary-General with all written information that he may request for the co-ordination and supervision of the programme; and shall also furnish periodic financial reports on the projects assigned to them.

(6) Financial Rules

a. Each Plan of Operations shall include a project budget and provide, in annex, a plan of expenditure, with estimates of anticipated cash disbursements shown for each year, and with a breakdown between foreign currency and local currency requirements.

As appropriate, the Plan of Operations shall also include a budget of overhead costs to cover such anticipated, directly identifiable, extra costs to the executing agency associated with the execution of a particular project as the Secretary-General may agree for payment from resources of the Fund.

b. All costs payable in local currency shall be met by the Fund from currency to be contributed by the Indonesian Government.

c. The basis for determination of overhead costs, not provided for in a Plan of Operations, to be reimbursed to an executing agency shall take into account the nature of the project or projects assigned to the organization as well as the manner in which projects are to be implemented. It is understood that the administration of the Fund projects shall not entail additional costs payable from the regular budget of the United Nations or of any executing agency. Reimbursement of overhead costs shall not exceed the costs actually related to the administration of the Fund activities.

d. Earmarking of funds to the executing agency will be made at the time of the approval of the Plan of Operations by the Secretary-General for the full duration of the project. Cash remittances shall be made upon request from the executing agency, either as advance payment, or, to cover cash disbursements.

e. Whenever a revision of an approved Plan of Operations is required, the executing agency shall seek the prior agreement of the Secretary-General.

f. The accounts of a project shall be closed as soon as practicable and normally within twelve months after the completion of the project.

g. The accounts of the Fund itself shall be maintained on a yearly basis. Year-end financial statements shall be presented and audited, internally and externally in accordance with the United Nations Financial Regulations.

h. Except as otherwise provided in this Memorandum or as may subsequently be agreed between the Secretary-General and the executing agency concerned, all financial transactions in the implementation of a Plan of Operations shall accord with the financial policies, rules and procedures which the executing agency applies to operational programmes of similar character. To the extent that funds are used for the employment of international personnel, the relevant Staff Regulations and rules of the executing agency suitable to the category of personnel required shall apply, including the rules and regulations applicable to technical assistance and Special Fund personnel.

(7) Privileges and immunities

The Government of Indonesia undertakes to apply the provisions in Article VIII of the Agreement signed between the Special Fund of the United Nations and the Government of Indonesia on 7 October 1960 to the Fund's operations and the organizations, their assets, and personnel, as well as to other persons performing services on their behalf.

(8) Reports

In addition to the annual audited financial statements, the Secretary-General shall report to the General Assembly of the United Nations on the establishment of the Fund and periodically on its progress. Special informal reports may be prepared by the Secretary-General in order to give detailed information to the Governments contributing to the Fund.

(9) Review and Modification

The Fund's operations may be reviewed periodically by the Secretary-General or the Government of Indonesia. Any proposal of the Secretary-General or of the Government of Indonesia for a revision of this Memorandum of Understanding and of the Fund's operations, or its termination, shall be given full and sympathetic consideration by the other party, and the appropriate steps to be taken shall be determined by common agreement.

It is understood that the donors will be consulted before this Memorandum of Understanding is amended.

Memorandum on the Fund of the United Nations  
for the Development of West Irian

(1) Purpose of the Fund

A United Nations Fund is established to assist the Government of Indonesia in the economic and social development of West Irian. The Fund will finance projects selected in agreement with the Government of Indonesia with the interests and welfare of the people of West Irian in mind. An overall programme will include capital investment projects to improve the infra-structure as well as pre-investment projects.

(2) Resources of the Fund

The Fund is open to contributions from Member States of the United Nations or of any of the specialized agencies. Contributions will be made in readily usable currency for an initial period of three years. The terms of the contributions shall contain approval by the donor of the terms of the present Memorandum of Understanding under which such contributions will be administered by the Secretary-General.

The Government of Indonesia will participate by a counterpart contribution (cash, local services, supplies and facilities) to cover costs payable in local currencies, the volume of which shall be decided upon in consultation with the Secretary-General. The Government of Indonesia will participate, as well, by a counterpart contribution to each project financed by the Fund. The volume of such contribution shall be decided upon project by project in consultation with the Secretary-General.

(3) Organization

The Secretary-General has overall responsibility for the management of the Fund, which shall be administered by him "in trust", under the terms of United Nations Financial Regulations 6.6 and 6.7.

He shall arrange with the specialized agencies or with the United Nations for the furnishing of their services in the capacity of executing agency in respect of projects in their respective spheres of competence, and shall also request the Executive Chairman of TAB to make available to the Fund the administrative and co-ordinating facilities of the Resident Representative and Director of Special Fund Programmes in Indonesia.

In carrying out a project, the organization designated as executing agency shall have, vis-à-vis the Fund, the same status as it would have if acting in a comparable capacity for the United Nations Special Fund.

(4) Programming

The Representatives of the United Nations and of the specialized Agencies shall assist the Government of Indonesia in the preparation and submission of projects, in consultation with a special staff working under the Resident Representative of TAB and Director of Special Fund Programmes. The special staff shall co-ordinate the preparation of

individual projects and of the overall programme in its totality, extending over a period of three years.

The programme and the individual projects as agreed upon with the Government of Indonesia shall be submitted to the Secretary-General for his final approval. The execution of individual projects shall not commence until authorization is given by the Secretary-General.

(5) Implementation of projects

a. Each project or series of projects shall be described in detail by a Plan of Operations to be approved by the Government of Indonesia, the designated executing agency and the Secretary-General.

b. A project manager shall be appointed by the executing agency and shall be directly responsible to the agency for implementing a project or series of projects in co-operation with a counterpart national official designated by Indonesian authorities.

In the case of projects executed by contract to outside firms, the project manager shall have as his main responsibility the task of review and supervision of contract performance.

c. To the extent that projects are of a pre-investment or technical assistance nature, the usual practices and procedures followed by the executing agency in implementing comparable projects under other relevant United Nations programmes (the United Nations Special Fund or the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance) shall apply.

d. For capital investment projects, the executing agency shall normally contract execution of the project to an outside firm, if it considers that this is the most advantageous procedure to adopt under the circumstances. International bidding under the relevant financial rules and practices of the executing agencies shall apply. However, when services, supplies or equipment are available in Indonesia, qualified firms within Indonesia shall be given preference for the award of contracts in the event that their bids offer conditions equal to those offered by other bidders.

Each contract entered into shall provide specifically, inter alia, for the method of purchase and disposal of capital items to be used by the outside contractor in implementing the Plan of Operations, as well as for the arrangements which would govern termination of the project under exceptional or unforeseen circumstances. Technical and financial supervision of performance under the contract shall be exercised by the project manager who shall report to the executing agency and, as requested, to the Resident Representative.

e. The Secretary-General through his Special Staff at Djakarta shall be free to observe at any time the progress of operations carried out by the executing agencies. The executing agencies shall provide the Secretary-General with all written information that he may request

for the co-ordination and supervision of the programme; and shall also furnish periodic financial reports on the projects assigned to them.

(6) Financial Rules

a. Each Plan of Operations shall include a project budget and provide, in annex, a plan of expenditure, with estimates of anticipated cash disbursements shown for each year, and with a breakdown between foreign currency and local currency requirements.

As appropriate, the Plan of Operations shall also include a budget of overhead costs to cover such anticipated, directly identifiable, extra costs to the executing agency associated with the execution of a particular project as the Secretary-General may agree for payment from resources of the Fund.

b. Costs payable in local currencies shall be met by the Fund from currencies to be contributed by the Indonesian Government in accordance with point (2) above.

c. The basis for determination of overhead costs, not provided for in a Plan of Operations, to be reimbursed to an executing agency shall take into account the nature of the project or projects assigned to the organization as well as the manner in which projects are to be implemented. It is understood that the administration of the Fund projects shall not entail additional costs payable from the regular budget of the United Nations or of any executing agency. Reimbursement of overhead costs shall not exceed the costs actually related to the administration of the Fund activities.

d. Earmarking of funds to the executing agency will be made at the time of the approval of the Plan of Operations by the Secretary-General for the full duration of the project. Cash remittances shall be made upon request from the executing agency, either as advance payment, or, to cover cash disbursements.

e. Whenever a revision of an approved Plan of Operations is required, and has been agreed upon with the Government of Indonesia, the executing agency shall seek the prior agreement of the Secretary-General.

Note for the Secretary-General (Visit of Mr. Luns)

UN continuing responsibilities following the  
West Irian Agreement of 15 August 1962

Under Article XVI to XXI of the Agreement of 15 August 1962, the Secretary-General shall:

(1) Designate at the time of the transfer of administration to Indonesia, a number of UN experts after consultation with Indonesia. Their duty is to advise and assist in the preparation for carrying out the provisions for self-determination and other experts functions agreed with Indonesia (on 14 May 1963, the Secretary-General notified Indonesia of his designation of a number of experts and he envisaged periodical visits of these experts to West Irian. The list of experts was subsequently amended by a letter of 2 July 1963. The Government of Indonesia has not formally acknowledged these letters.)

(2) Appoint a UN representative, and a staff (including the experts) to carry out the Secretary-General's responsibility to advise, assist and participate in arrangements for the act of free choice (remaining the responsibility of Indonesia). This appointment will be made one year prior to the date of self-determination, which should be completed before the end of 1969.

(3) Report to the General Assembly on the conduct of the act of free choice and the results thereof.

\*\*\*\*\*

Since May 1963, West Irian is administered as an integral part of the Republic of Indonesia, as envisaged in the agreement. However, the United Nations

has received no official information from Indonesia on the conduct of its administration. Though the letter of the agreement does not give the UN any special responsibility in this regard (Articles XIV, XV, XXII and XXVI which set out the objectives that the Indonesian administration should follow to guarantee the rights of the inhabitants), it might be considered in conformity with the spirit of the agreement that such matters are also within the UN's responsibility insofar as they may directly affect the process of self-determination itself. (Leaving aside the unsettled question of any obligation that could result for Indonesia under Article 73(●) of the Charter: non-self-governing territories.)

\*\*\*\*\*

On 1 December 1963, a number of West Irian leaders made two statements which have been transmitted to the Secretary-General, one called "expression of firm will" recognizing "one unitary state of Indonesia with its territory stretching from Sabang to Merauke", the other one declaring all former political parties dissolved.

On this occasion, some West Irian leaders have allegedly asked for a revision of the provisions concerning self-determination in the Agreement of 15 August 1962 on the basis of their futility in view of the above statements. But, nothing of this appears in the text of the declarations, nor was it mentioned to the Resident Representative by the West Irian leaders when they were received by him on 20 December 1963.

It has been argued in the Indonesian press that the statement of 1 December 1963 from the West Irian leaders constitutes an act of free choice and that these leaders oppose any other procedure. It has also been said that

the procedure of self-determination is not compatible with the existence of the unitarian state of Indonesia.

As far as the UN is concerned, it is bound by the agreement of 15 August 1962. Though the agreement is extremely vague on the concept of the act of free choice, it has established certain limitations. Preparations have to be made at least one year in advance, which must include consultations with the representative councils, determination of a precise date for the act, formulation of clear questions to be put to the inhabitants, eligibility to participate in the act .... etc. However, the act could be a plebiscite or an indirect consultation through elections followed by an expression of choice from the elected bodies. It is for Indonesia to decide, since, contrary to other UN practice, the UN is not asked to supervise (Togo, Cameroon, Western Samoa), nor to investigate (Malaysia), but to assist Indonesia, solely responsible.

It is therefore clear that statements like the one made on 1 December 1963 do not come within the letter or spirit of the agreement as an act of free choice.

\*\*\*\*\*

In January and again early March 1964, Mr. J. Rolz-Bennett mentioned to Ambassador Palar of Indonesia the question of the continuing UN responsibilities in regard to West Irian, and explored the possibility of a visit to Djakarta to discuss this question with the Indonesian Government. According to Ambassador Palar the Indonesian Government was extremely busy with the Malaysian question; he also referred to the coming visit of Dr. Subandrio to the Netherlands where the future of West Irian would be discussed. No official reply was given to Mr. Rolz-Bennett.

\*\*\*\*\*

On the question of the Development Fund for West Irian, some progress has been achieved. The principles of the Fund have been agreed by all concerned and the Government of Indonesia has decided to provide the necessary counterpart funds. The executive secretary of the Fund is presently in Indonesia to assist in establishing a first list of priority requests.

MEMORANDUM CONCERNING THE ACT OF FREE CHOICE IN  
IRIAN BARAT (WEST IRIAN)

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The following points are suggested for consideration by the Government of Indonesia, concerning the further implementation of the Agreement between the Republic of Indonesia and the Kingdom of the Netherlands dated 15 August 1962:

1. The act of free choice provided for in Articles XVI-XXI of the Agreement, to be held in the month of July, 1965.
2. The act of free choice would consist of a two-stage consultation. In the first stage, all those eligible in accordance with Article XVIII, paragraph (d) of the Agreement would be called upon in each of the six districts to elect enlarged councils on the basis of one councilman for each ( ) inhabitants, the elections to be held on the specific issue mentioned in Article XVIII of the Agreement. The councilmen so elected would meet at an appointed date and place and, by a procedure designed to ensure the freedom and secrecy of their vote, would proceed to choose as to -
  - a) whether they wish to remain with Indonesia; or
  - b) whether they wish to sever their ties with Indonesia.This would be the second stage of the consultation.
3. One year prior to the date of the act of free choice, the Republic of Indonesia would invite the Secretary-General to appoint a Representative who, together with an appropriate staff, should carry out the Secretary-General's responsibilities to advise, assist and participate in the arrangements for the act of free choice. In accordance with Article XVII of the Agreement the arrangements for the act of free choice are the responsibility of the Republic of Indonesia.
4. The detailed procedures for the two-stage act of free choice would be agreed upon between the Government of Indonesia and the Secretary-General's Representative.
