UNAMIR CIVPOL

REPATRIATION - LIQUIDATION PROGRAMME

Reference to the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1029 (1995) dated 12th December 1995 under article number 6 which requests the Secretary General to withdraw the Civilian Police Component of UNAMIR.

I. BACKGROUND

The evolution of CIVPOL as a component of UNAMIR is closely linked with those of UNAMIR. In accordance with the SECCO Resolution 872 of October, 1993 which established UNAMIR, it has been decided that 60 Civilian Police Observers be deployed to Rwanda, and charged with the responsibility to assist in maintaining public security through monitoring and verification of the activities of Gendarmerie and Communal Police and also to play advisory role within the frame of the Arusha Peace Agreement.

The organisation was as follows:

CIVPOL HQs and Investigation Unit in Kigali	10 observers
Monitoring Team in Kigali	20 "
Monitoring Team in Prefectures	30 "

This small United Nations Civilian Police Unit started functioning until the war broke out in April, 1994. Then the strength was reduced to 15 observers during the war primarily to offer liaison services.

The humanitarian disaster occasioned by the war, by Resolution 918 the Security Council decided to Strengthen UNAMIR, and CIVPOL accordingly to a force of 90 police officers to be deployed in a similar fashion to the military observers, but would be dedicated to maintaining liaison with the local civilian authorities on matters relating to public security.

After the Civil war that devastated Rwanda and destroyed the state structure, a government of national unity was installed in Kigali on 19th July 1994. Following the withdrawal of the National Gendarmerie and the Communal Police alongside the former Rwandese armed forces, the new government requested UNAMIR to assist in the establishment and training of a new national Police Force in view of the enormous responsibilities of the police in creating an atmosphere of peace and tranquillity conducive to national rehabilitation and development.

Sequel to this request, CIVPOL did put in place in conjunction with the relevant government organ, a programme for training of new Gendarmes and Communal Police officers. Resolutions 965 and 997 confirmed the training programme and CIVPOL strength was increased from 90 to 120 police observers.

II. In the framework of CIVPOL's closure, a meeting was held with the representatives of Administration on 14/12/95. Directives as regards to the close down schedule and repatriation of officers were decided.

III. Administration will make necessary arrangements with travel Unit in accordance with the availability of seats on commercial lines.

IV. Aim

In order to have a systematic process of liquidation and repatriation, the mode of transaction has to be introduced. This enables proper means of accountability on the movement of officers and the UNAMIR property.

V. Execution

A. Phase One

- All officers whose tour of duty was extended to 8th of December, will repatriate to their home countries immediately. Their departure will depend on the availability of seats on planes to be used from Nairobi. This is in collaboration with the Travel Unit;
- The officers whose tour of duty are still valid may be redeployed to other U.N. missions or be repatriated to their home countries depending on the decision from the UN and the contributing countries;
- The repatriating officers have to clear their, rent, water and electricity bills before departure. This serves the good image of the mission and deters any future claims by landlords and electrogas;
- Observers who were involved in the aborted teaching programmes, bind and pack all teaching materials and hand them over to the Rwandese commanders of the two training Institutions;
- All CIVPOL documents shall be compiled and packed. A closing report of the above activities will then be produced or written.

VI. Phase Two

All eighteen local workers attached to CIVPOL shall be handed over to the Chief Civilian Personnel officer for his further necessary action.


VII. Phase Three

The liquidation team shall comprise of staff officers listed in Appendix 'A':

Upon completion of the above transactions, the liquidation team shall formulate lists of all items at hand viz:

- All M/vehicles to be accounted for;
- All stores and handed over items to be documented;
- All computers to be accounted for;
- All CIVPOL HQs office furniture to be accounted for;
- All communication equipments to be accounted for.

The liquidation team shall thereafter proceed to hand over M/vehicles to transport, all stores and articles to the main stores, and all communication equipments to communications and then depart the mission area.

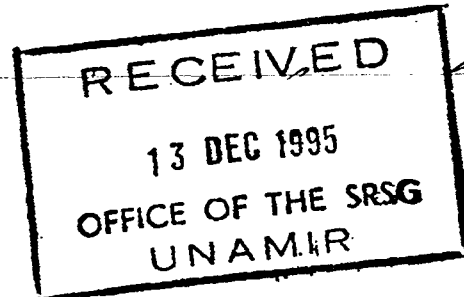

Monitoring Teams

Six monitoring teams of five officers are working throughout Rwanda and on the daily basis report on the situation together with Military Police.

National Gendarmerie Training School

16 Instructors are deployed in the school in Ruhengeri. They have just finished the marking of the examinations of 517 Gendarmes who ended their training in November 1995 and are waiting for graduation.

Communal Police Training Centre

22 instructors are deployed in the training centre in Gishari where 750 students are ready to start training for 3 months after having undergone a test of assessment. The students recently arrived at the centre.

CIVPOL HQs

The HQs is coordinating the closure of prefectures and the two training schools.

2. As a result of your instructions, all officers have been instructed to start withdrawing and prepare to depart the mission area.

SUBJECT: Security of CIVPOL Personnel

1. I refer to your fax memo 3558, CNR 327 of 14/11/95 and my memo CIVPOL/MEMO/989/95 of 16th November 1995 in respect of the above subject and in particular the safety of German CIVPOL Observers.
2. Capt Bernhard Lenhard a German Observer who is based in Cyangugu was interviewed and confirmed that he made a report to his contingent leader about the situation in the area of his operation. He stated that the security problem encountered in Cyangugu is communication with the sector H/Qrs. The hand radio that he has, cannot pick the sector H/Qrs in case of emergence. The only communication that can pick the sector H/Qrs is the set installed in the motor vehicle. The chief communication officer was contacted, who confirmed the sentiment and promised to install a base radio on 21/11/95 at CIVPOL Offices. He however attributed the communication failure to the location of CIVPOL Location and that of Sector H/Qrs. Apart from the communication problem Capt Lenhard declared everything to be safe.
3. Capt Sontowsky who was based in Gikongoro but now in Kigali was also interviewed. He stated that his hand radio was easily communicating with the sector H/Qrs and had no problems. He further confirmed that he as well wrote a report to his contingent leader about the security situation in his area of operation mainly on the two incidents of landmine explosions and the gun fights in the forest. Apart from the two above references, he said everything was safe.

Objet:

1. I refer to your Fax Memo 3558, CNR 327 of 14/11/95 in respect of the Germany contingent CIVPOL observers' security.

2. The seven Germans have a house in Gikondo Location next to the Presidential residence where security is total for the later. All German officers are equipped with hand radios for any emergency. The following are the incidents which have come to our knowledge because they did not report to us through the duty officers as per standard practice nor even Military Police:

- a. In September their house servant stole some goods and he was sacked. No report made to CIVPOL nor Military Police.
- b. Second house servant in September 1995 also stole the same and he was sacked. No report made to any of the two organs.
- c. A house maid (Lady) stole 400,000 RF and disappeared. Major Bastian reported the matter to Gendarmerie and not to CIVPOL nor Military Police. The Gendarmes are still looking for the lady.
- d. On date unknown but during the month of September 1995 two men putting on hoods on their heads attempted to gain entrance into the compound but were repulsed by the watchman. No report was made to either CIVPOL nor Military Police.
- e. Gikongoro

Five officers were posted to this prefecture and were living together in one rented house. Capt Sontowsky later opted to reside with the sector commander of that area. The Chief Police Monitoring in charge states that there were no threats of any kind to any of the officers. The same goes to Cyangugu Prefecture where all five officers inclusive Capt. Lenhard Benhard were and are still living into rooms within the offices area. No threats nor banditry activities experienced. On the other hand we have never received any threats of insecurity from all Rwanda Prefectures where our CIVPOL officers have been deployed.

3. Amongst all CIVPOL Contingents operating in Rwanda, its only the Germany Contingent which was equipped with hand radio on personal to holder basis.

4. There is no specific threat on the German Contingent because the situation in Rwanda is relatively calm. Whilst its noted that there have been pockets of incidents of robberies and hijacking on UNAMIR personnel and NGOs, these cases have been reported to Military Police who have endeavously tried to investigate them. In UNAMIR, there are security measures which have to be undertaken by all UNAMIR personnel which are covered by SOMA.

**NOTE TO THE HIGH ATTENTION OF SRSG ON THE REQUEST OF
THE VICE-PRIME MINISTER AND MINISTER FOR INTERNAL AFFAIRS AND
COMMUNAL DEVELOPMENT**

SUMMARY : The request is centred on five (5) items which UNAMIR could provide in order to support the training programme i.e Transport, Communication, Fuel, Office Machinery and Housing.

ANALYSIS :

(i) Transport:

The idea of the assistance programme of UNAMIR is not to support the field operations of the Communal Police as a whole but to provide transport assistance to the Communal Police Training School. In order to allow for the Director to be mobile and to monitor activities at the school, I propose that one additional vehicle possibly a four runner be given to the school.

(ii) Communication:

Communication is vital to the Communal Police Training programme and I propose that in the event of the mission winding up the request be included among the list of items to be donated to the Government.

(iii) Fuel:

According to the project, UNAMIR is to provide fuel for the training. I think the request is reasonable and I therefore support it.

(iv) Office Machinery:

The requirement of the Communal Police Training has been met but if the assistance is to be made to the entire Communal Police, then I propose that the request be included among the items to be given to the host country by UNAMIR in an event of the mission closing down.

(i) Housing:

It is not economical for United Nations to ship out the containers and prefabs and so I therefore I propose that the request be included among the list of items to be handed over to the Government when the mission finally closes down.

CONCLUSION

The request of the Vice-Minister is important especially in view of the poverty state the Communal Police is in. Despite the financial constraints faced by the mission especially in obtaining equipment, I propose that in addition to the items cited above, a project request be made and submitted to UNDP for financing by the Trust Fund.

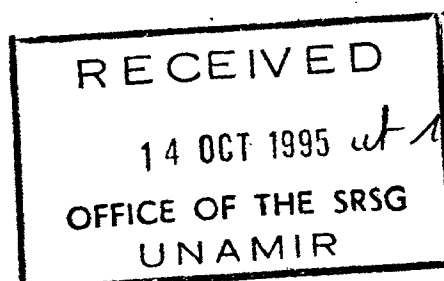

VISIT TO THE NEW TRAINING CENTRE AT GISHARI FOR COMMUNAL POLICE

A joint mission of high level authorities from UNAMIR, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Community development visited the Construction site of the new Training Centre at Gishari for Communal Police.

The UNAMIR Members comprised of:

- CIVPOL Commissioner
- Special Tasks Officer
- Chief Logistics Officer

The Rwandese Government entourage consisted of:

- Director of Cabinet in the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Community Development
- Director of the Communal Police.

On arrival at the site, the entourage was met by the Commander of the Training Centre and CIVPOL Monitoring Team of Rwamagana.

It should be stated here that the rehabilitation of the Training Centre is being financed by the UN TRUST FUND for an amount of US\$ 400,000.00. The project includes UNDP, UNAMIR, WHO, WFP and the Rwandese Government.

The rehabilitation of the Centre involves the construction of fifteen(15) dormitories, Ten (10) class rooms, Recreation rooms, Toilets Medical Unit and renovation of existing old buildings in order to accommodate Seven Hundred fifty (750) students and about thirty(30) instructors.

As at today, out of US\$ 100,000.00 budget, 75% of the construction work has been completed while a total of US\$ 125,733.00(Budget Line) was budgeted. The work is progressing satisfactorily.

During the visit the following constructions were noted to have been accomplished:

- 10 Dormitories out of 15.
- 80 showers out of 83
- All Toilets, 2 recreation rooms and the Kitchen.
- 10 projected class room project are about to be completed.

Most of the needed bedding, food items and medicines have already been provided. However, it is necessary to note that despite efforts made for a maximum achievement by spending less money it is still necessary to execute some additional essential work which was initially not approved in the budget. It will be thus necessary to allocate an additional budget

to cover the cost related to the above mentioned work. The Rwandese are to make a request for that purpose.

As for the commitment accepted by UNAMIR in the project, the following provisions have already been done:

- Training curricula have already been worked out.
- Instructors have been chosen and deployed at the site.
- One truck and a pick up have been released to the centre to solve various transportation problems encountered by the Training Centre.

On water and Electricity supply, appropriate UNAMIR services have been contacted and proposals have been made in conjunction with the Rwandese.

In addition the Training period provided for the Police Agents is to last for a maximum of 12 weeks. A question arises here as to whether the Training will be entirely covered before the UNAMIR Mandate expires on 8/12/95, not to mention the training of the second contingent of 750 students. This question requires special attention from the UNAMIR authorities and should be discussed with the appropriate Rwandan authorities.

Finally the entourage realized the viability of the Rehabilitation of the Training Centre which offers to the Rwandese Government facilities which will enable them solve important requirement for Trained Police Agents in solving matters related to Public Security in Communes.

On Saturday 7th October 1995, at about 1815 hours as I walked along Avenue des Communications rd with my servant, coming from Zambia "A" house where I had gone to visit friends and going to my house which is also within KICUKIRO. A person who was standing near the red gate of a certain house near the road came following us behind and asked me to stop. He referred to me as Muzehe.

After I had stopped he asked who I was. I informed him that I am a member of UNAMIR. In no time he grabbed the walkie talkie I was holding in my left hand. I struggled with him until I got it away from him. I showed him my UNITED NATIONS identity Card which he also grabbed intending to take it away from me I struggled and retrieved it from his hands.


He referred to himself as Captain Mushishi and a personnel Officer at Gendarmerie. During the time I was putting my identity card away in my pocket he beat me on the left side of my face near the eye. I sustained a cut from where I was bleeding.

When vehicles from both sides approached. I walked back to Zambia "A" house from where I was driven to Military Police Company.

I reported the incident. I gave my statement and my servant gave his. Later I was taken to REMERA Gendarmerie Brigade. Where I also reported the matter to Gendarmerie. Then I was driven to UNITED NATIONS HOSPITAL. After receiving treatment I was taken to my house.

I am able to recognize the person with whom I struggled and is the person who hit me on the left side of my face if I see him again. Because as I was walking along the road I saw him standing near the Red Gate to the house he later claimed to be his.

During the first time he was talking to me he was putting his hand in the right hip pocket as if he was going to pull a pistol or something else.

NOTE ON THE UPDATED ASSISTANCE PROGRAMME FOR THE RWANDAN POLICE

I. INTRODUCTION

The civil war of April 1994, which has shaken all the administrative departments has not spared the National Gendarmerie and the Communal Police. Both security forces were directly involved in the tragedy.

At the end of the war, there was the increasing needs for public security and judicial police. It is therefore necessary for the new Rwandan authorities to redynamise the two Police Forces by allocating to them equipment and human resources necessary for implementing their duties.

The needs of the National Gendarmerie and the Communal Police are enormous and require the assistance of the International Community.

II. DETAILS OF UNAMIR ASSISTANCE

A. Training

The assistance programme for the new Rwandan Police Forces started in August 1994 upon request of the Government of the National Unity. At that time, the Government solicited the training for 6,000 Gendarmes and 1,500 Communal Police Officers.

As of today, 403 gendarmes among which five are officers have been trained in two phases and the third training phase for 515 new gendarmes is under way in the National Gendarmerie Training School in Ruhengeri.

Concerning training of the Communal Police, contrary to the Gendarmerie, the program did not start due to the lack of infrastructures and financial resources.

Meanwhile training would start in early October as soon as the construction and renovation at the Training Centre is completed.

Currently, a Director of Communal Police and a Director of the Training Centre were nominated. The selected site is located at Gishari at 50 km East of Kigali.

Moreover CIVPOL has prepared the necessary documents and nominated instructors for the purpose of the training.

While in training, subjects of professional and legal character would be taught aiming at giving the Gendarmes and Police Officers the knowledge to enable them carry out their duties efficiently. Additionally, military, physical and sport training will be given to the students.

The revised short-term plans are as follows:

- *The training of 100 instructors of gendarmes to follow the ongoing training of 515 gendarmes in December for a period of 12 weeks;*
- *The training of 2,250 Communal Police Officers recruited in successive groups of 750 persons for a period of 13 weeks each, starting from September 1995;*
- *The training of the last batch will be followed by the training of 50 instructors.*

B. Advisory Assistance

CIVPOL provides advisory assistance to the Gendarmerie HQ and Communal Police Direction by giving them experts in preparing documents regarding restructuring and operational needs of both new Gendarmerie and new Communal Police.

C. Material Assistance

UNAMIR is supporting the ongoing training by providing teaching materials and renovation of the training premises. Recently UNAMIR has been assisted by UNDP which has provided an amount of US\$350,000.00 to the Gendarmerie Training Programme and US\$400,000.00 for the Communal Police Training Programme to be disbursed from the UN Trust fund.

CONCLUSION

The assistance for the Rwandan Police is in progress in its various areas i.e. training, advisory and material assistance. The nucleus of 403 gendarmes already trained are deployed throughout the country. It is expected to have up to the end of the mandate 918 gendarmes and 750 Communal Police Officers. Both Training centres would be renovated.

Objet: speaking Class at the EGENA

1. I have the honour to inform you of the meeting I had with Colonel Kayumba, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Rwandan Gendarmerie, about the English-speaking class at the EGENA.
2. In the course of our meeting, that Authority, after having thanked UNAMIR for its assistance in training, directly expressed his concern and dissatisfaction with the way lectures are given to the English-speaking Class and asked that steps be taken forthwith to ensure that lectures be given directly in the trainees' language as in the case of the French speakers.
3. You will recall that there are presently 513 trainees undergoing training in Ruhengeri, in 10 classes of which 8 are French-speaking, 1 English-speaking and 1 Rwandese-speaking. Not having bilingual instructors capable of understanding documentation in French while giving lectures in English, the compromise I had arrived at was to give lectures in French to the English-speakers with simultaneous interpretation into English. This solution was indeed not without inconvenience, but seemed to be the only acceptable one at the time. The experiment was moreover a success, which was proven by the well above-average results obtained by the only English-speaking class in the previous intake of 301 trainees in 6 classes. Nonetheless we were aware of the weaknesses of that solution. The question has resurfaced as a concern of the Rwandan authorities and at their request.
4. Replying to the Deputy Chief-of-Staff, I gave the reasons for our choice and I assured that Authority that I was committed to ensure that steps were taken to remedy the situation which could in his view not only affect the performance of English-speaking trainees but even be a source of complexes and frustration for them.
5. For the above mentioned reasons I propose the following solutions:
 - a. Forthwith
 - Appoint to the English-speaking Class 2 Swiss officers and 1 German officer who are all bilingual, as well as 2 Zambian officers;
 - The lectures to be given will be shared by these 5 officers who will be assisted by a translator for their preparatory work;
 - 5 Nigerian officers will be appointed as assistants to relieve the others in case of need.

b. In the Short-term

- Request you to kindly contact New York so that bilingual (English-French) countries such as Canada can be asked to deploy as soon as possible ten or so bilingual instructors for the English-speaking classes. This is all the more important because it is very probable that we will encounter the same difficulties very soon when courses begin at the Communal Police Training Centre.

6. In my meeting with the Deputy Chief of staff I also raised the issue of the imbalance between French- and English-speaking trainees, a concern expressed in your memo of 18 August 1995.

7. In reply, that Authority explained to me that this situation is not because of any deliberate policy and results rather from the fact that most of the refugees were in Zaïre and in Burundi that use French in contrast to those who were in Uganda and Tanzania that use English. If we add to that the Rwandans who lived in the country before the war and who are French-speaking, then it is easy to understand why French-speaking children outnumber the English-speakers.

8. I would be grateful to you to contact New York in order to find a solution to this situation which is of major concern to the Rwandan authorities.

J'ai l'honneur de vous rendre compte de l'entretien que j'ai eu avec le Colonel Kayumba, Chef d'Etat-Major Adjoint de la Gendarmerie Nationale à propos de la classe anglophone à l'EGENA.

Au cours de l'entretien, cette autorité, après avoir remercié la MINUAR pour l'assistance en formation, a manifesté de façon directe ses préoccupations et sa non-satisfaction concernant la manière dont les cours sont dispensés à la classe anglophone et a demandé que des mesures immédiates soient prises pour que les cours soient dispensés directement dans la langue des élèves à l'instar de la classe francophone.

Vous vous souviendrez qu'actuellement à Ruhengeri 513 étudiants sont en formation répartis entre 10 classes dont 8 sont francophones, 1 anglophone et 1 rwandaphone. Faute d'instructeurs bilingues capables en même temps de comprendre la documentation en français et de dispenser les cours en anglais la formule de compromis que j'avais trouvé jusque là a été de dispenser les cours en français aux anglophones, avec traduction simultanée en anglais. Cette solution n'était, certes pas sans inconvénient mais paraissait la seule acceptable, à l'époque. L'expérience, du reste a été concluante et confirmée par les résultats bien au-dessus de la moyenne obtenus par la seule classe anglophone qu'il y avait au sein du contingent précédent de 301 gendarmes organisé en 6 classes. Néanmoins, nous avons conscience des faiblesses de la solution. La question revient donc en terme de préoccupation et de requête des autorités Rwandaises.

En réponse au Chef d'Etat-Major Adjoint de la Gendarmerie, j'ai donné les raisons de notre choix et ai assuré cette autorité de m'engager à faire prendre les mesures appropriées permettant de remédier à cette situation qui à ses yeux pourrait non seulement affecter le niveau des élèves anglophones et même constituer une source de complexe et de frustration au niveau des différents élèves.

En raison de ce qui précède, la solution que je préconise est la suivante :

a) dans l'immédiat

- affecter pour la classe anglophone 2 officiers suisses et 1 officier allemand tous bilingues ainsi que 2 officiers zambiens
- Les cours à dispenser seront répartis entre ces 5 officiers qui seront assistés d'un traducteur pour leurs travaux de préparation.
- 5 (cinq) autres officiers Nigériens seront affectés en qualité d'assistants en vue de les suppléer en cas de besoin.

b) à court terme

- vous demander de bien vouloir intervenir auprès de New York afin qu'il contacte les pays bilingues (Anglais/Français) tel que le Canada, afin d'obtenir le déploiement dans les plus brefs délais d'une dizaine d'instructeurs bilingues qui seront utilisés pour l'instruction des classes anglophones. Ceci est d'autant important qu'il est très probable que nous rencontrions les mêmes difficultés très prochainement lorsque les cours commenceront au niveau du centre de formation de la Police Communale.

2. J'ai évoqué aussi avec le Chef d'Etat-Major Adjoint la question de la disproportion entre élèves francophones et anglophones, souci exprimé dans votre memo du 18 août 1995.

En réponse, cette autorité m'a expliqué que cette situation n'est pas le fait d'une quelconque politique délibérée et résulte plutôt du fait que la plupart des réfugiés étaient au Zaïre et au Burundi, pays francophones par rapport à ceux qui étaient en Ouganda et en Tanzanie, pays anglophones. A cela si on ajoute les rwandais qui résidaient dans le pays avant la guerre et qui sont francophones on comprend aisément que les enfants francophones soient plus nombreux que les anglophones.

3. Je vous aurais gré de bien vouloir saisir New York en vue de trouver une solution à cette situation qui constitue une préoccupation majeure des autorités Rwandaises.

1. By fax attached recently sent to the UNAMIR CAO by PMSS/FALD, I have been informed on the evolution of the question of administrative implementation of my appointment in particular the need of the approval by the GA which is not soon to be held.
 2. As you are aware, I have been serving as CIVPOL Commissioner since July 1994 when I was first appointed on an Acting basis by your excellency, with the main task of organising a training programme to meet Rwandan's urgent requirements for a trained police force. This task which followed a request from the New Government of Rwanda, was confirmed formally by the Security Council under its Resolution 965 of 30 November 1994. Subsequently on 12 April 1995, following your recommendation my appointment as CIVPOL Commissioner was also confirmed by Under-Secretary-General Mr. Annan of DPKO in his code cable N° 1173 of 12 April.
 3. Since my initial appointment in July, UNAMIR administration informed me that arrangements were being made for the administrative implementation of my appointment. Proposal have been accordingly submitted in response to the outgoing Fax No. 3.30.90 of 12 December 1994 from FOD regarding the details of training programmes, together with material and personnel costs including CIVPOL Commissioner and support personnel to the training
 4. In addition, on 21 March 1995, UNAMIR Acting CAO, in a memo to the SRSG (Copy attached), indicated that a proposal has been submitted for inclusion of provision in the budget regarding my appointment.
 5. With Mr. Annan's formal confirmation of my appointment in April, it was my understanding and expectation, as I had to believe, that the necessary administrative implementation would follow immediately then after in accordance with the Code Cable consequently. I redoubled one's efforts to take up the challenge of the training of the Rwandan New Police Force in extremely difficult conditions.
 6. I would like also to remind that in May, before your consultation visit to UN HQs on the new mandate, I requested your assistance to clarify the situation and find a solution.
 7. The Fax of 25 July 1995 from FALD therefore comes as a surprise. I have discussed FALD's Fax with UNAMIR CAO and CCPO. It seems that at this stage only a temporary solution can be found in the current budget where appropriate posts do exist which could accommodate the implementation of my appointment.
 8. I thank you for your support and your commitment to bring my mission to a successful conclusion.







Background and Justification

The Police Force in Rwanda is composed of the Communal Police and the National Gendarmerie. As opposed to the Gendarmerie who have National jurisdiction and fall under the Ministry of Defense, the Communal Police are normally unarmed and under the supervision of the Bourgmestres who are accountable to the Ministry of Interior and Communal Development. Their stations will be equipped with firearms but they will not be used on a routine basis. They will only be used in extreme emergency cases.

The bulk of the former members of the Communal Police took part in last year's genocide and fled the country along with former soldiers, militias etc. This left the country with no policemen to enforce local law. As well, many had been recruited along corrupt and ethnic lines, were ill trained and often worked to fulfill the interests of their patrons. Many other officers who did not take part in the massacres were killed or fled as well. Thus, the country's Communal police force ceased to exist and all its equipment was lost or destroyed.

Today in Rwanda as administrative structures take root the lack of police in the communes makes local administration difficult and gives the people little confidence in the law enforcement system. Under the current situation the role of law enforcement is assumed by the military who have neither the training nor the capacity as law enforcement officers.

Today the Government, through the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communal Development, has established a site for a national school of Communal Police training with a view of giving the new policemen proper training and a national outlook. Repairs and equipment for the site are required to render the school operational. A curriculum has been written in conjunction with the Ministry of Interior and the first 750 cadets are ready to begin the course. Due to budgetary constraints however, the programme at present is at a standstill.

In order to continue the training programme as initially established by UNAMIR/CIVPOL, there are urgent needs to address. A building with the capacity to train and house 750 men at a time has to be constructed. The four buildings on the site need to be renovated and furnished. Food and supplies for a total of 1,500 men for are also required.

CIVPOL has already completed a training programme curriculum in consultation with the Ministry of Interior. With the appropriate resources the first training session under this project can begin in July and with the first group completing training in October.

Development Objectives

The long range goal of the training programme is the restoration of law, order and a sense of security at the commune level throughout the country. An important step towards achieving this is by re-establishing a credible Rwandan Communal Police Force. As part of their detail to enforce the payment of taxes Communal police also serve to improve local government's ability to provide other needed services.

Immediate Objectives

The immediate objectives are to:

1. Provide a training facility, necessary staff and equipment to train Communal Police officers
2. Commence the training of the initial 750 candidates in the use of police equipment and in the proper discharge of their duties.
3. Prepare for the subsequent training of an additional 750 police officers..

Outputs

A facility, necessary equipment, instructors and administration for the training of Communal Police officers. Trained Police Officers who will be deployed in communes throughout Rwanda with a minimum of 4 per commune.

Description of Activities

- a) Rehabilitation of buildings and necessary infrastructure at existing site
- b) Construction of 1 library, classrooms and dormitories for 750 men
- c) Identification and recruitment of trainers, police training candidates and support staff
- d) Training of 1,500 men in two separate groups of 750 with each receiving three months of instruction in the maintenance of the law and order. The course is three months long and includes 8 weeks of theory, 1 week of practical training, 1 week of revision and two weeks of examination. Training will be in French, English, Kinyarwanda and Swahili. Some of the topics to be covered include:
 1. Implementing law enforcement techniques
 2. Guarding sensitive areas
 3. The protection of human rights
 4. Receiving complaints and depositions
 5. Filing Police reports
 6. Carrying out administrative police missions
 7. Searching and utilizing intelligence related to public order and security.

Inputs

Government

The Rwandan Government has appointed a Commandant to manage the school and will provide 15 trainers. The training curriculum has been devised by the Ministry of Interior and the UNAMIR CIVPOL. The Communal Police Training centre site at Gishari has four buildings already available but which need cleaning, improvements and a variety of materials to serve their new functions. The four, pre-existing buildings will provide space for:

- Administrative offices
- Housing for trainers and other necessary personnel
- Storage rooms
- Dispensary

To be fully functional these 4 buildings will need:

- Cleaning and repair materials
- Utilities (water, electricity, waste disposal)
- Office furniture and supplies for school administration
- Bedding for trainers, administrative staff and support staff

UNDP

UNDP will assist in the renovation of these buildings plus provide the construction, necessary materials and furnishings for: classrooms, library/study rooms, and dormitories. In addition UNDP will provide administrative equipment, materials, basic school supplies and 11 support staff for duration of training.

UNAMIR

The training curriculum has been devised by UNAMIR Civpol with the Ministry of Interior. The Director of Studies and the necessary translators will be provided by UNAMIR as will a variety of equipment which includes two vehicles, a generator and water drums.

WFP

- Basic foods will be provided by WFP.

Basic medicines for first aid needs will be provided by WHO

Background and Justification

In Rwanda there are currently not enough sufficiently trained personnel to carry out the responsibilities of the National Gendarmerie. Many of the previous Gendarmes were killed or fled during the war. Therefore, as noted in the United Nations' Security Council resolution 965, the current force needs to be increased but at the same time should receive proper training for carrying out their responsibilities in the areas of law enforcement, criminal investigations and assistance to the judiciary. Instruction in proper codes of conduct is particularly important if the Gendarmes are to comport themselves in a professional manner that will engender respect and trust from the local community. Untrained men in positions of authority can be more of a threat than a stabilizing presence to a commune.

The project will enable the Government, but more specifically, the Ministry of Defense to properly train recruits for positions as Gendarmes. The outcome will be a more professional, reliable and responsible Gendarmerie to serve the country. This will benefit all elements of the population living within Rwanda by bringing a greater order and sense of security to the country which in turn serves to attract those staying outside to return.

At a time when there are still tensions in the country it is imperative that a trained force is capable of maintaining public order without violating human rights. It should also have the capacity to properly (as agreed in international standards) arrest suspects and conduct investigations.

This strategy (the support of the training facility) has been chosen because it is necessary to have greater security at the commune level where the internally displaced have just returned and where the majority of refugees are watching for indications of the country's safety. The Gendarmerie also assists the work of the Judiciary which is critical for reestablishing justice within the country. A well trained and bipartisan gendarmerie is essential to provide both of these services and this project is being implemented in conjunction with others from UNDP to improve the safety and well being of Rwandans throughout the country.

The creation of the International Liaison Unit (ILU) comes as the result of increased security problems over the past months to members of the international community in Kigali and the lack of appropriate responses to the these.

Development Objectives

The long term objective of the project is the restoration of order and security throughout the country by establishing a professional and impartial Gendarmerie. As stated in the Round Table document, and Programme of National Reconciliation and Socio-Economic Rehabilitation, it is of paramount importance to restore the functioning and management capacity of the Rwandan Government and its national institutions. These are necessary conditions to ensure, among others, a climate of peace and national reconciliation.

The Arusha Peace Agreement specifically assigns the National Gendarmerie the role of:

- Re-establishing the maintenance of public order;
- Prevention of crimes; and
- Serving as Judiciary police.

The mobile team assigned to the International Liaison Unit will receive special training on how to initially respond to residential emergencies, traffic accidents, and medical emergencies for the international community; these skills can then be applied to the needs of the local population. The team will also benefit from the presence of a UNAMIR Civpol Officer or Military Police who would accompany the team on each call. The operating equipment would be supplied by UNDP and the international community then kept by the unit after the needs of the international community have ceased.

Immediate Objectives

The immediate objectives are to build the National Gendarmerie's capacity to properly train recruits to carry out its responsibilities. This will be achieved by making necessary structural improvements to the training facility and providing it with essential administrative, educational and accommodation facilities.

The creation of an emergency response force, the ILU, for the safety of the international community and the capacity building of local Gendarmerie.

Outputs

By the end of 1995, the training center will be equipped with the following:

- a) furniture, materials and equipment for the dormitories, kitchen and cafeteria
- b) desks, chairs and chalk boards for classrooms
- c) administrative office equipment
- d) dispensary furniture and refrigeration
- e) communications equipment
- f) The provision of subcontract work for structural repairs
 - on staff housing, on the most damaged roofs and in other badly damaged areas
- g) The formation, training and equipping of the ILU

Inputs

The Government of Rwanda has named Major Eugene Ruhetamacumu to provide the administrative and management services for the project. As the National Project Coordinator he will also conduct pricing surveys on the contract work, equipment, furniture and materials to be purchased. UNAMIR has already assisted in some renovation of the training center, provided instructors and committed further technical services to be provided in this project. WHO will be asked to contribute basic medicines to the project. The United Kingdom has donated mattresses and the Netherlands' Minister of Development Cooperation has indicated its willingness to provide financial assistance. Following the meeting on Friday 26/5/95 between the SRSG and the Minister of Interior in the presence of CIVPOL Commissioner about the assistance of UNAMIR to the Communal Police Training, there was another meeting on Wednesday 31/5/95 with the Minister of Interior on the preparation for the opening of the Communal Police Centre.
3. During the meeting the following were decided:
 - a) To establish a small committee to amend the training programmes;
 - b) To develop the adopted programmes;
 - c) To prepare course hand-outs, time table and the organisation of the centre.
4. A second committee will prepare the operational requirements of the Communal Police to be submitted to the donors.
5. On Wednesday 2/6/95 the Resident Representative of UNDP in Rwanda called on the CIVPOL Commissioner to seek information on the training programmes of the Communal Police to be able to determine the financial assistance that UNDP could provide the different training programs prepared by UN CIVPOL.
6. As a result of these two meetings the question of Training in respect of the mandate has been raised. Despite the request of the Minister of Interior to start the training, it was mentioned that it would be more appropriate to wait for the new mandate.
7. The same observation is valid for the training of the 400 gendarmes which was planned to commence at the beginning of June. Meanwhile instructors are at the centre preparing the teaching documents.
8. Regarding the operational requirements of the Communal Police, CIVPOL will provide assistance in determining the organization and the needs of the new Communal Police until a contrary order from your end.


