Dear Mr. Micuta,

The Commission de change has worked out a list of goods for essential needs for which import licences can be issued.

This list is needs limited on account of the shortage of foreign exchange; it is also subject to monthly review in order to adjust it to the most urgent needs of the country.

We feel that it would help the Commission de change to keep the import list up-to-date by knowing a little more about the import needs of the provinces. The representatives of civilian operations in the provinces are invited to let us here know what import requirements there are in the provinces and what degree of priority must be attached to them.

I have some doubts as to your being able to gather the required information, but nevertheless forward the question, hoping it will not imply too much work for you.

Situation in Inongo

I had a talk on 15 November with the team of Japanese Red Cross who came back from Inongo after three months work over there. This is the substance of their remarks:-

- (a) The political and social situation during their stay was absolutely quiet. No incidents and no troubles. The population seems hardly to be awakened to the political and social problems of the day. Both the local authorities and the population had been very friendly and cooperative.
- (b) The local authorities furnished the house, servants and telecommunications free. The ONUC Guinea troops went out of their way to make living for the Japanese Red Cross quiet and comfortable.
- (c) The economic conditions in Inongo seemed to deteriorate during the last two months. It became very difficult to buy vegetables, meat and cigarettes from the beginning of October. The daily diet of the Japanese team was ameliorated by the food sent to them by the League of the Red Cross in Leopoldville. There are great possibilities for fisheries industries in Inongo which are hardly exploited by the primitive methods of fishing. There is neither an ONUC representative nor a WHO representative in Inongo.
